## Banks pay top money

Lincoln County youth took home \$12,810.10 from the Junior Livestock sale at the County Fair Saturday.

The county's two banks paid the top money for animals with \$1,912.69 coming from the Citizens State Bank and \$1,360.99 being paid by the Ruidoso State Bank.

Ginger Cooper's Reserve Grand Champion calf was bought by the Ruidoso State Bank for 85 cents a pound. The Citizens State Bank paid 72.5 cents for Melinda Sidwell's Champion Angus and Laurie Voss's champion hereford was purchased by the Ruidoso Bank for 67.5 cents.

The Wool Growers Center, represented by Kim Hibbard, paid a top \$2 for Jerry Lovelace's grand champion lamb and Todd Lindsay's swine brought top money of 90 cents.

With this money made through the sale, the 4-H and FFA members will be able to purchase new animals for next year's fair or go on to represent Lincoln County at the New Mexico State Fair and/or Eastern New Mexico State Fair. This money is also used to further their education after they graduate from high school and without your support some would not be able to go on to college.

## Committee delays Zozo action

The newly formed advisory committee to the Carrizozo Board of Trustees found itself with insufficient data for decision making Monday night and set a second meeting for Wednesday.

The group elected Jessie English as Chairman and Ariene Najar as secretary. English said that he would have complete information on the water and sewer operation cost and income for the group to consider at the next meeting.

Mayor Bud Payne told the meeting that of the 457 water meters in Carrizozo, 40 were on minimum because the meters are out of order. He said that 10 residents were on garbage-sewer fees only.

The group discussed recommendations for a decrease in town employees. There are now some 30 employees including CETA and other specially funded personnel.

The general feeling was that no recommendations could be made to the trustees until the committee had a broader picture of the problems of the town. Several committee members felt that the town's problems might be solved by better budgeting and more efficient collections.

## Stoneman is arrested

Law enforcement officials in Holsington, Kansas apprehended Sammy Stoneman accused cattle rustler early Wednesday on information from a National Crime Information Center bulletin. Lincoln County Sheriff Leandro Vega reported.

Stoneman, a former New Mexico Cattle Inspector, is wanted in Lincoln County on eight counts of larceny of livestock and in Bernalillo County for receiving stolen property.

Holsington officers arrested Stoneman and he was transferred to Barton County jail in Great Bend, Kansas Wednesday. Sheriff Vega has requested that the Barton County District Attorney waive extradition proceedings and hopes to bring him back to Lincoln County in the next few days.

## Burro fate in air

The future of 15 wild burros currently held in Roswell will be one of the subjects discussed during the Las Cruces Bureau of Land Management Advisory Board meeting.

The burros were originally taken from a ranch near Three Rivers by the New Mexico Livestock and Sanitary Board to allow more forage for domestic livestock. After lengthy court disputes regarding the constitutionality of the law that protects wild horses and burros, the Supreme Court ruled that the law is constitutional and the fate of the burros should be up to the BLM rather than the State of New Mexico.

The Capitan School District voters will go to the polls next Tuesday, September 7 to decide whether to spend \$450,000 to remodel their outdated high school and elementary school buildings.

Monday night the Board of Education and Superintendent Richard Clifton reviewed the proposed bond issue for school patrons.

Clifton said that the cost of building a new school would far exceed the bonding capacity of the area. The school administration and the state department of education believe that the building exteriors are sound and that complete interior remodeling would bring the school up to acceptable standards.

The high school was built in 1937 as a WPA project and the grade school was built in 1948. The high school inner improvements would include a section specially designed for vocational areas, business, home ec and industrial education. Other needed improvements are six new classrooms, a remodeled band area, a complete remodeling of principal and counselor area; improvements to old gym. The entire high school would have new heating, plumbing, and lighting systems with lower ceiling and carpets.

The elementary building interior is also to be completely remodeled with new heating, lighting and plumbing. Rearrangements will include four large classrooms, special ed room, elementary library and two rest rooms.

The whole program exceeds the bonding capacity of the school. The \$450,000 is the maximum allowable however. Senate Bill 9, adopted in the 1975 legislature, allows a school whose bonding capacity is at maximum, may pass a 2 mill tax on all district property over and above the operating fund taxes. Capitan hopes to pass this tax and produce an additional \$18,500 for each of three years to assist in the program.

Cost of the program to individual tax payers is based on an eleven year payment schedule.

This eleven year payment schedule will require a tax increase of approximately \$5.74 per \$1,000 of Assessed Valuation. For example, if a taxpayer's property has an appraised value of \$3,000 and an assessed value of \$1,000 (1-3 of the appraisal value) the cost increase would be 48 cents per month or \$5.74 per year. As a further example:

The tax increase will be reflected in the November 1977 tax notices, no change for the 1976 tax year.

The total district property evaluation is \$9,400,000 and bonding capacity is based on 6 percent. At present the district has bonds of \$140,000 outstanding for the construction of the new gym-library complex.

Questioned about the reason for carpets, Clifton told the audience that the fuel bills had drastically increased in the past three years: from \$8,020 in 1974 to \$12,000 in 1976 and additional increases forecasted. He said experts had proved that indoor-outdoor carpeting cut heating costs and also drastically reduced maintenance costs of which floors are a major part.

Clifton said that if the school were not modernized the state could, in six or seven years, close the Capitan schools. He said the increased taxes would be the same for in and out of town dwellers and that while no one wanted taxes to be increased the area had a responsibility to educate the children.

Clifton said that this year the student body had increased by 20 students to 271 enrollment and that the state had recommended that the district should be prepared for 300. With the improvements there should be room for 300 students.

Lincoln County residents are invited to help out with the cleanup which will start at 9:15 a.m. Saturday and 10:00 Sunday. Partial tours of the cave will be offered on Monday afternoon between 1:00 and 4:00 p.m.

and restoration or tour are asked to wear shoes or boots suitable for rough hiking and to bring lights. Helmets or hard hats are recommended. The restoration is being sponsored by caving groups in New Mexico and Arizona with the cooperation of the Bureau of Land Management.

Fort Stanton Cave, near the village of Fort Stanton, has about 8 miles of passage was the second cave to be mapped in the west. Explorations of the cave date from the mid-1800's to the present. The cave is a Natural Landmark registered with the Department of the Interior in Washington, D.C. Much of the beauty in easily-reached passages has been destroyed by rockhounds, vandals who covered the walls with graffiti and broke formations, and just plain careless explorers who didn't watch where they were walking. While the work planned for the Labor Day weekend will not replace missing cave formations, it will uncover some beautiful formation floors buried under several inches of mud and will remove much of the graffiti.

## Capitan gets sewer grant

Approval of a \$40,714 grant to help expand a sewer system in Lincoln County was announced today by Governor Jerry Apodaca, New Mexico member, and Stan Womer, Federal Cochairman of the Four Corners Regional Commission.

Womer said the grant was made to the Village of Capitan by the Federal state agency as part of the Commission's program to foster economic development in New Mexico.

The project involves installation of 4,300 feet of sewer collection line, manholes, and related structures needed to expand the system.

Local officials state that this project is part of a development program that will enable Capitan to meet increasing demands from tourism and recreation growth expected with the Smokey Bear National Park and museum being developed by the U.S. Forest Service.

The Farmers Home Administration, U.S. Department of Agriculture, is making a \$10,178 loan to the Village of Capitan to complete the \$50,892 total cost of the project.

Lincoln County high school football kicks off Friday with all teams playing in the county.

The Carrizozo Grizzlies meet a fast Ruidoso team at Ruidoso Friday night at 7:30. That is also kick-off time for the Corona-Cardinals who go up against the Capitan Tigers in Capitan.

The Carrizozo team brings a 'Number Two' rating in the district to the first game. The Grizzlies are considered a growth team and Coach Henry Paul has forty players contending for positions this year.

A number of the Grizzlies are returning to the grid after a year out of play but last year's team gained a lot of experience and Paul hopes his team will look good against Ruidoso.

Jimmy Samora will start as quarterback. He was injured in pre-season scrimmage against Corona but is ready to go Friday. Paul hopes his toughened defense will hold the fast Ruidoso offense.

Both Tiger Coach Billy Henson and Corona's John Warfield are looking for wins: Capitan downed Tatum seven touchdowns to three in pre-season play and held up well at the football jamboree, Henson says. He has only five returning seniors and may be troubled by inexperience. "We have no stars, just a lot of men who will execute their assignments and a high team morale," Henson said.

The Capitan coach predicted that as the team got into the season the experiences gained would put Capitan into contention for the state championship.

Corona's John Warfield predicted a hard game against the Capitan team but the Cardinals are ranked first to win, in their district. Warfield says his team have been doing some hard work and proved it in scrimmage against Carrizozo. "We have a good sized team that is well balanced with running and passing ability," he said. End Cully Nalda and Scott Williams have speed and size. Steve Warfield will be starting quarterback and has the experience to lead the team through a good season.

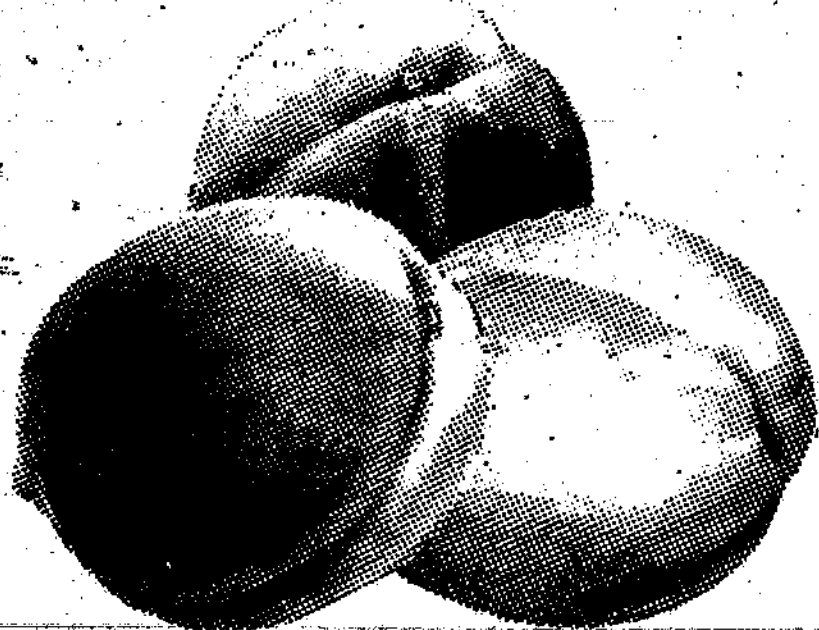

## Downs big sale set

The 15th Annual All-American Quarter Horse Yearling Sale gets underway on Thursday on at Ruidoso Downs.

The venue - the world's largest for quarter horses - is limited to yearlings which are eligible for the 1977 All-American Futurity.

Once again, four sessions are slated, starting on Thursday and extending through Sunday. The site is the All-American Sales Arena on the track grounds. Each session gets underway at 7 p.m.

About 1,000 buyers, representing virtually every state in the union - plus Canada, Venezuela, Australia and a handful of other countries are expected to be on hand. "The buyer interest this year has been the greatest in the history of the sale," opines sale manager Richard Thompson.

A total of 481 head have been catalogued, and about 485 are expected to pass under the gavel of auctioneers Tom Caldwell, Bill Tackett and Scott Caldwell.

"We'll be seeing a tremendous increase in the quality of the sale stock," Thompson said "on that basis, I think it's safe to predict we'll be setting an industry record in regard to the average price."

The record record, Thompson noted, was set at \$7,948 in 1972. Last year's average price was \$7,695.

"As always, the All-American Sale will be represented by the finest sires in the quarter horse industry," Thompson said. "What seems particularly noteworthy this time is the fact such a remarkable abundance of first-rate mares are included."

Other top mares with offspring in the All-American Sale include Fan Jet, the dam of Gigantus (a winner of \$43,000); Sugarette Bars, who produced the top West Coast mare, Band of Angels; and Alamitos Angel, a winner of \$156,000 and a second place finisher in both Kansas and Rainbow Futurities.

The thoroughbred, Azure Te, has over 50 sons and daughters in the All-American Sale, and holds that top spot in the category. Azure Te is the sire of such quarter horse standouts as A Zure Request, Come Six, Azure Teen and Twelve Five.

The great Easy Jet is the second most popular sire in the All-American Sale with 20 head. Next is Go Man Go with 20.

All-American Futurity winners whose bloodlines are represented in the sale are Easy Jet, Rocket Wrangler, Mr. Kid Charge and Three Oh's.

## Beef buy

Beef Supplies Good: You will be hearing a lot about beef during September. Beef, on the hoof and in the meat counter, is unusually plentiful and economical, right now. Beef at the store is priced quite a bit lower than a year ago. This is a good time to buy beef for the freezer and for serving often. Homemakers should be aware of the benefits from the protein in beef and the many other nutrients it provides.

Fresh Fruits and Vegetables: There are many gardens and fruit trees in Lincoln County this year, providing families with an abundance of fresh food. The fruits and vegetables at the Lincoln County Fair this weekend were plentiful and beautiful. Most families can't use all of the fruits and vegetables as they are ready. The "left-overs" need to be preserved for later use.

A homemaker can freeze, can, dry or store the excess produce. If you are a first timer at preserving food for later use you may want some help. If you are an old hand at it you may also want some help. There are booklets on freezing, canning, drying and storage available from the County Extension Office. Please call or come in to the office for this information.

Eggs Anytime: Eggs are used many ways. Too many times we think of them just as a breakfast dish. Since they contain protein, vitamin A, D and the B complex as well as iron and phosphorus, they can be the basic for meals other than just breakfast. A dish that can be considered as a vegetable or a main dish is Mexicali Egg Casserole.

8 hard-cooked eggs, sliced; 2 cans (16 oz. each) stewed tomatoes; 1 can (12 oz.) Mexican-Style corn, drained; 2 cups corn-flavored salt; 3 teaspoons chili powder; 2 teaspoons salt; 1/2 teaspoon garlic salt; 1/4 teaspoon pepper.

Reserve 5 center egg slices. Drain 1 can tomatoes and combine with remaining ingredients; mix well. Pour into greased 2-quart casserole. Bake in preheated 350 degrees F. oven 30 minutes, or until of serving temperature. Garnish with reserved egg slices; serve immediately. Makes 12 vegetable or 6 main dish servings.

When the gavel came down and Ginger Cooper had sold her Reserve Grand Champion Calf for 85 cents a pound to the Ruidoso State Band, this meant that Mike Capps would come up with 49 cents a pound over the market price for that 1190 pounds of calf. With the market price being 40 cents, Johnson will pay Lisa an extra \$100 more than he can sell it for.

There were other dollars for the youngsters. Travis Paraley at Piggly Wiggly added \$50 on to the sale price of every Carrizozo youngster with a winning animal in the ring. Friends and neighbors added money onto the prices and there was a jackpot put together for the losers.

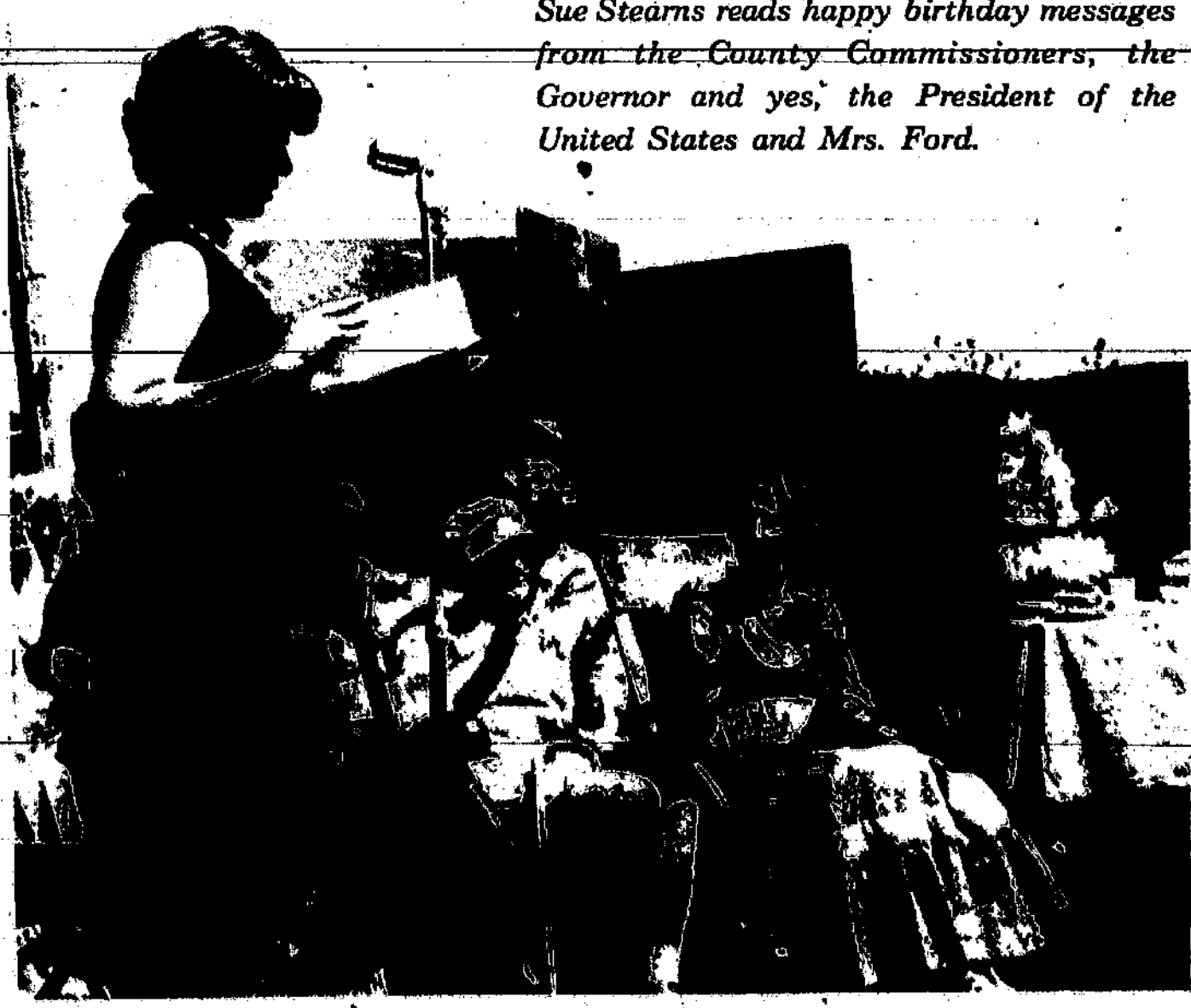

In the 1920s the El Paso railroad shop baseball team ran a special train to Carrizozo when it had a game with the Lincoln County Team. The train was loaded with routers the El Pasoans.  
Corona school will have three new men teachers. Coach James Spangler from Mountainair, Clyde Sowan teacher of Spanish from Albuquerque, and Elbert Daniel who will teach music and band from Lordsburg.

At the Democratic convention at the court house last Saturday 51 delegates were selected to attend the convention in Albuquerque.  
Three years ago this morning No 4 went through the 5-mile bridge, carrying to their deaths Engineer Grotts and Fireman Randall and nine others. That was the last real rain to visit this section until Thursday night of this week, lacking but 24 hours of the 3 years to the dot. -- Tucumcari American.

## Sixty Years Ago

From Carrizozo News Sept. 1, 1916.  
Working of clearing the ground back of Johnson Bros. Garage has commenced, to extend the present building back 50 feet, making room for a repair shop.  
Parsons - Most of the summer colony have departed for their homes, but a few white tents still dot the hillsides. George Reddy went to Captain the first of the week after freight and supplies. He was accompanied by Messrs. Hall and Morris, who were returning to White Oaks. The daily rains still keep the country looking green but it makes the roads soft and hard on

those trying to haul in limber and supplies.  
William H. Sexton of the Mesa was in town Tuesday making a shipment of cream to the El Paso creamery. Mr. Sexton is pushing this new enterprise and the milk from a herd of fine Jerseys, and says it is a good go.  
The hotels felt the influx of visitors Friday night when trains were held owing to the coal train wreck at Ancho.  
A mixing of autos occurred Sunday at the corner of Railroad Avenue and Fourth Street, when the cars of Ira Johnson and Johnnie Gallagher mixed noses.

"Yes," said manager Porter of Foxworth-Galbraith lumber company, "I would say there has been fully a 50 per cent increase in demand for building material in Carrizozo in the past two years."  
The local ice plant is putting out chill so far, as its capacity will permit. It was not expected the demand for ice in Carrizozo would be so big.  
Returned Sunday night from that polar region of the north (on the map, Santa Fe), somewhat chilled, yet fairly intact for that quadrennial task of boosting the elephantus americanus to the front and victory. Henry Lutz of Carrizozo, county commissioner Rumaldo Duran, of Encinosa; Judge Francisco Gomez, of Lincoln; Prof C.Y. Belknap, of Captain; and W.H. Osborn, of our town. After a six-day trip, all in good shape, apparently not an arm gone, not a leg busted, heads on straight and apparently normal - except, "I'm for prohibition!" cried Henry. "Yes, I'm for woman suffrage."  
Carrizozo's new opera house on Alamogordo Ave. is taking on a front that distinguishes its purpose. When the building is completed, Carrizozo will have a theatre, built for the purpose, which will afford a troupe enroute reason to stop and show.
