Crenshaw is mayor

A former professional football player and a home town product is Carrizozo's new mayor. The town trustees unanimously selected Bobby Dan Crenshaw to head the financially troubled town last week.

The trustees also voted utility rate increases and, after a prolonged discussion, voted to let the new garbage truck and containers be repossessed by the manufacturing company.

Garbage rates in residential areas will go from \$2.75 to \$3.25. Commercial rates will be increased 18.2 percent. The water minimum was raised from \$3.00 to \$4.00 for the first 300 gallons. It will be 55 cents per thousand thereafter...

The trustees hope that the rates will make up some of last year's operating deficit. They are still below rates in other Lincolncounty towns.

The trustees were split on the matter of the garbage system. Manny Hernandez and Robert Luna favored a return of the automated system to the manufacturer. Willie Silva and Roy Harmon said they felt the new system should be kept. The new Mayor said he was not yet familiar with the financial picture and would not vote.

Proponents of the system said that the town was obligated and allowing a repossession would hurt the town's credit. They also said that the town was much cleaner, that in the long run the new system would pay for itself and that the old truck was costly to operate if indeed it could be put into operating

Hernandez and Luna felt that the new system had not proved adequate and that residents would not be willing to pay increased garbage rates necessary to pay the indebtedness on the system.

Roy Harmon, evidently tired of the long debate, changed his vote and the truck and containers will be removed. Mike Richardson, a representative of

She was a member of the First. Christian Church, Ruidoso: Associate Matron of the Ruidoso Order of Eastern Star No. 65, and past president of the



Richardson expressed disappointment in the decision. He said that while the residents would have to pay about \$1.00 per month per household for the new containers, it would cost each family more than that to buy their own new garbage cans. He said that had the town kept the system it would have been paid for in 5 years and them produce revenue for the town.

The city fathers will have an opportunity at the next regular meeting, Monday Nov. 8 to reconsider this action.

Mayor Crenshaw said that he would be working for the next few weeks to put the city's books in shape and to get a true picture of the financial status of the town. He said that meetings in the future would be orderly and conducted according to parlimentary procedure. He said that citizens would be welcome to make statements but that they must be kept short, to the point and not be disruptive.

Crenshaw said that in the future, complaints about town personnel or services should be in writing and would be first investigated by the department head involved and then by the trustees. He said that the town meetings were no place for uninvestigated rumors.

The new mayor is a graduate of Carrizozo schools. He is 32 years old, is married to the former Mary Guck and has two children, Lisa and Kenny.

He was graduated from New Mexico State University and received a masters degree from Highlands University. He is the community service coordinator and a counselor at Ft. Stanton.

Crenshaw played professional football following an outstanding athletic career at NMSU. He coached for several years and was employeed asa technical engineer before returning to Lincoln County.

Fire recalls shootout memory

The old T.E. Kelley Mortuary, once a respectable Carrizozo establishment on . El Paso Street burned down Saturday night. It had been vacant for about forty years and was only the shell of a building, a shelter for vagrants and adventurous youngsters.

When Judge S.M. Ortiz asked me what I did Saturday night, I told him I went to a fire. He said, "Well the last people I saw in that building were Deputy Tom Jones and Glen Hunsucker. They were both dead at the





Occassionally you may have noticed an ad in this newspaper. "Aluminum Sheets for sale 26% x 30%, clean one side. Handy all around the ranch, farm, home, business. At the Lincoln County. News.

You can get rid of the winter doldrums by hand crafting aluminum boxes, tree decorations, mobiles, etc. from these aluminum sheets.

Make articles any size you wish. leave unfinished, or add your own designs and color. To get a brushed finish, rub surface with fine steel wool. Use punch or sharp instrument to scribe designs on sheet of aluminum.

With sharp sicissors, cut out. For boxes use length or scrap wood, fold along pre-inscribed lines. Next, run your thumb over folds for sharper creases. Boxes stay firm after you crimp edges with hammer and wood.

Brouse thru the Bookmobile and search the craft books for patterns to

Frame a mirror with aluminum flowers and leaves. Before attaching tomirror they may be sprayed gold or silver. If you do not have a mirror, flowers may be set in vase.

How about an aluminum angel with stand up wings for the Christmas tree

CRAZY QUILT SQUARE





Trapunto, applique, Hawaiian, pieced, crazy, log cabin; all different styles of making bedcovers. Not all need to be quilted but are called 'quilts'

The crazy quilt, originally born of necessity, was made in an all over design consisting of pieces of material saved from worn or discarded clothing sewn together in helter-skelter fashion, usually lined but seldom hand-

Open your sewing basket, look over your supply of scraps or remnants and try you hand at a crazy quilt.

Each square is 12½ inches, ½ inch is allowed for seams around each square when they are connected.

The number of squares you make depend on the size of the bed you are making the quilt for.

Scraps in different shades of the same

color or closely related colors add unity to patch work.

Because this is a crazy quilt all squares will be different, but the typical square shown maybe used as a guide.
Cut cotton patches and arrange by
shape and color in 12 inch squares of

muslin or old sheet. Patches may be -

immed to fit together. Straight edges are easier to join smoothly than curved edges. Join patches with 1/4 inch seams by hand or machine.

On right side embroider herring bone stitch over each seam. Sew squares together with 1/2" seams.

Work herring bone stitch over each Back finished top with cotton broadcloth, tack at several places to


keep top and backing together. The original crazy 'quilt' was not padded or Finish with narrow border, trim boarder seams with herringbone stitch.

That seemed like a long time off to a boy . . . a whole month of waiting. To Peter, of course, and all parents, Christmas already looms ominously on the horizon,

Our thinking today involves reality. Christmas is a long way off to a boy of, for example, six years old. Four months is 1-18 of his whole life. A year is 1-6th of his life.

If I were to say to a reasonable adult of sixty years, next year we will ? The length of real time, in part, will depend on the item mentioned. If it is of no consequence such as having a picnicin the spring, then the time will seem relatively distant and not of any particular meaning. But if the object of the planning is a trip to Europe or paving all the streets in town, then a year seems like a very short time to prepare. That year is only 1-180 of her life and an undertaking of significance has to be evaluated on the basis of similar lifemarks.

It won't be too long (too long for most of us, alas) until people live 400 or more years, so they now say. That space would appear to make the difference between a forty year old and a ninety year old negligible.

Wait a minute though. A healthy happy minded sort of person of forty might have more in common with a healthy optomist of that future 300 year old than with a miserable broken down ninety year old. .

I have a lot of youngish friends with whom I share ideas, ideals, interests and activities. Several of them have remarked, kindly, that I seem closer akin to them in spirit and mind than with some of my contemporaries.

It is a pleasant thought but there are such important elements missing in those relationships that I can more easily relate, perhaps the word is comfortably rather than easily, to a generation behind me than a generation

I am glad that my children look upon . war and killing in any form as a kind of insanity; incomprehensible human behavior. I would not want them to think otherwise.

But how can I share with them those vital years of my life when World War II made death and destruction the noblest behavior and our nation lived

to die for a cause. To those of us who celebrated the construction of a factory, the building of a dam, the paving of a road, the stringing of a power line, the lighting of a furnace, the puff of a locomotive as an event proving the perfectability and nobility of the human race; a landmark of achievement; a move forward in mankind's conquest of terrifying natural elements-to those of us who remember these things it is difficult to see our cities as only concrete jungles and our highways and utilities as corruptors of our air and water.

We thought if we took the children out of factories, away from chopping cotton and picking beans and put them in schools; if we cured rickets, infantile paralysis, TB, pellegra, gave everybody a 48 hour work week, full bellies, a warm house, a week vacation and a pair of shoes, then sin and crime would disappear from the face of the

Were people simplier then or were we just simple minded?

I-don't feel-like-the human-race is getting worse or that this world is going to pot. It does seem, though, that the bad people are getting badder and maybe the good people are getting

This started out to be a piece of rélative values. I'm told that it is not how far you fall that counts; it is how hard you hit. There are those who say that its not how far you have been that's important but how much further you have to go. I am reasonably sure that history takes less note of how long you live than of how you live.

I have one more observation for you: The older I get, the younger older people seem and the younger younger people seem, and they all seem to get" prettier every day.

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

I am glad that my children look upon war and killing in any form as a kind of insanity; incomprehensible human behavior. I would not want them to

think otherwise. But how can I share with them those vital years of my life when World War II made death and destruction the noblest behavior and our nation lived

to die for a cause. .To those of us who celebrated the construction of a factory, the building of a dam, the paving of a road, the stringing of a power line, the lighting of a furnace, the puff of a lecomotive as an event proving the perfectability and nobility of the human race; a landmark of achievement; a move forward in mankind's conquest of terrifying natural elements-to those of us who remember these things it is difficult to sée our cities as only concrete jungles and our highways and utilities as

corruptors of our air and water, We thought if we took the children out of factories, away from chopping cotton and picking beans and put them in schools; if we cured rickets, infantile' paralysis, TB, pellegra, gave everybody a 48 hour work week, full bellies, a warm house, a week vacation and a pair of shoes, then sin and crime would disappear from the face of the'

Presentations Friday afternoon included "Communications in the Family" given by Fern Clemmer, Associate Professor-Psychology and Socialogy, NMSU-A. "Beauty is Skin Keep" and "To Your Health" - Dr. Larry Starr, local pediatrician. "Tomorrow Happens Today" filmstrip and discussion by Mary
-Lattin, State Youth Advisor and Carl Malone, State Youth Chairman (both of

March of Dimes). A wide variety of recreation wa offered including swimming in the indoor olympic size pool.

Saturday topics included: "Touching Me, Touching You" by Loretta Armenta, March of Dimes Staff Representative, Albuquerque. "Smoking & Alcohol: The \$50,000 Habit", filmstrip and discussion. "Girl Talk" by Dr. Mary Kelly and "Boy Talk" by Dr. Franklin Ashdown. "I've Been Therel" by Phillip Jaramillo, former drug addict, now rehabilitation worker, DARE Center, Albuquerque, Panel Discussion: "Careers

Available in the Many Health Fields" Billie Kissiah, Associate Professor, NMSU-A, Biology and Medical Laboratory Technology Fred Livingston, Speech and Hearing Specialist, Zia School and Therapy Center, John Maxson, Co-ordinator of Mobility Inhabilitation, N.M. School for the Visually Handicapped. Jeff Loigue, March of Dimes Health Service.

The Waddells lived in Burgos, in old Castile, the land of castles and knights, and in Navarre, the home of the Basques, a mountain people of sturdy and independent character.

During the Middle Ages, this area was a theatre of almost constant struggle; Christians against Moors, Christians against Christians, and Moors against Moors.

Most of the sculptures were to be found on the churches. The church of that period was the guardian of the culture of the period; books were scarce, few people could read and the scenes carved in stone became instructive in character as well as illustrative.

The Waddells were working mostly in the small rural communities, still reminiscent of the Middle Ages, and their cameras and sketches quite naturally reflect this period. The Waddells say this created a feeling for the very roots of the Medieval days, and the possibility of the epic tales of knights and the feudal days becoming reality would not be surprising.

They visited the Altamira Caves with their paintings done 15,000 years B.C., and walked on old Roman floors, drove old Roman roads, crossed Roman brides, and saw the ruins of hospitals that sheltered the travelers on the Pilgrim Roads. They saw Greek, Iberian, and Celetic potsherds, and the engraved Visigothic stones of the Fifth Century, artifacts of ancient civilizations. Both Lyle and Helen are members of the Gallery La Luz and their work is continuously shown at the gallery. Both have conducted classes at the gallery. This show will be different from any they have presented before, as all the work in this show is taken from the sketches and slides made during their tour of Spain.

The reception for the public, honoring the two artists, will be given November 14, from 1:30 to 4:30 p.m. The show will be open-every afternoon, following the reception, from 1:30 till 4:00 p.m. during the month of November.


Medicare deduction

The Medicare hospital insurance deductible will be \$124 starting January according to Gordon G. Lunsford social security field representative.

A Medicare patient who goes into a hospital and starts a benefit period after December 31 will be responsible for the first \$124 of the hospital bill. The 1976 deductible was \$104. Under the Medicare law, the amount of the deductible is tied to the average cost of one day's stay in a shospital.

The increase in the deductible means there also will be increases starting in January in three other amounts Medicare patients pay for covered care. For a hospital stay of over 60. days, the patient will pay \$31 a day (up. from \$26) for covered services furnished on the 61st through the 90th
