Would you like to make something to get rid of the winter-doldrums?

Occasionally you may have noticed an ad in this newspaper, "Aluminum Sheets for sale 26 1/2 x 30 1/2, clean one side. Handy all around the ranch, farm, home, business. At the Lincoln County News."

You can get rid of the winter doldrums by hand crafting aluminum boxes, tree decorations, mobiles, etc., from these aluminum sheets.

Make articles any size you wish, leave unfinished, or add your own designs and color. To get a brushed finish, rub surface with fine steel wool.

Use punch or sharp instrument to scribe designs on sheet of aluminum. With sharp scissors, cut out.

For boxes use length or scrap wood, fold along pre-inscribed lines. Next, run your thumb over folds for sharper creases. Boxes stay firm after you crimp edges with hammer and wood. Browse thru the Bookmobile and search the craft books for patterns to trace.

Frame a mirror with aluminum flowers and leaves. Before attaching to mirror they may be sprayed gold or silver. If you do not have a mirror, flowers may be set in vase.

How about an aluminum angel with stand up wings for the Christmas tree top?

Gold fish, butterflies and birds for a hanging mobile or for Christmas tree decorations. Paint with brush for detail after spraying favorite shade.

If you really feel creative try your hand at imitating the Mexican craftsman by making an ornamental rooster with a large costume jewelry eye or an elaborate mask with an ornate headdress, fringed eyelashes and dangling earrings.

## Cloudcroft tree sale set

Fred T. Arbogast, Cloudcroft District Ranger, wishes to announce that Christmas tree permits for personal use, will go on sale at the Cloudcroft Ranger Station beginning November 15, 1976.

Christmas tree permits will be sold for \$1.00 each and entitle one individual to cut on tree up to ten (10) feet in height. Only one Christmas tree and permit will be granted per individual. Persons or groups desiring trees from 10-foot-1-inch (10'1") to 20 feet in height, will be charged \$2.00 for each tree. Groups such as city chambers of commerce, etc., who desire trees over 20 feet in height will be charged \$2.00 for the first 20 feet, and \$.50 for each additional foot over 20 feet.

Present plans call for the Cloudcroft Ranger District to allow 500 trees of the Pinyon and Juniper varieties to be cut, and 3,500 mixed-conifer. There will be no commercial sales on the Cloudcroft District.

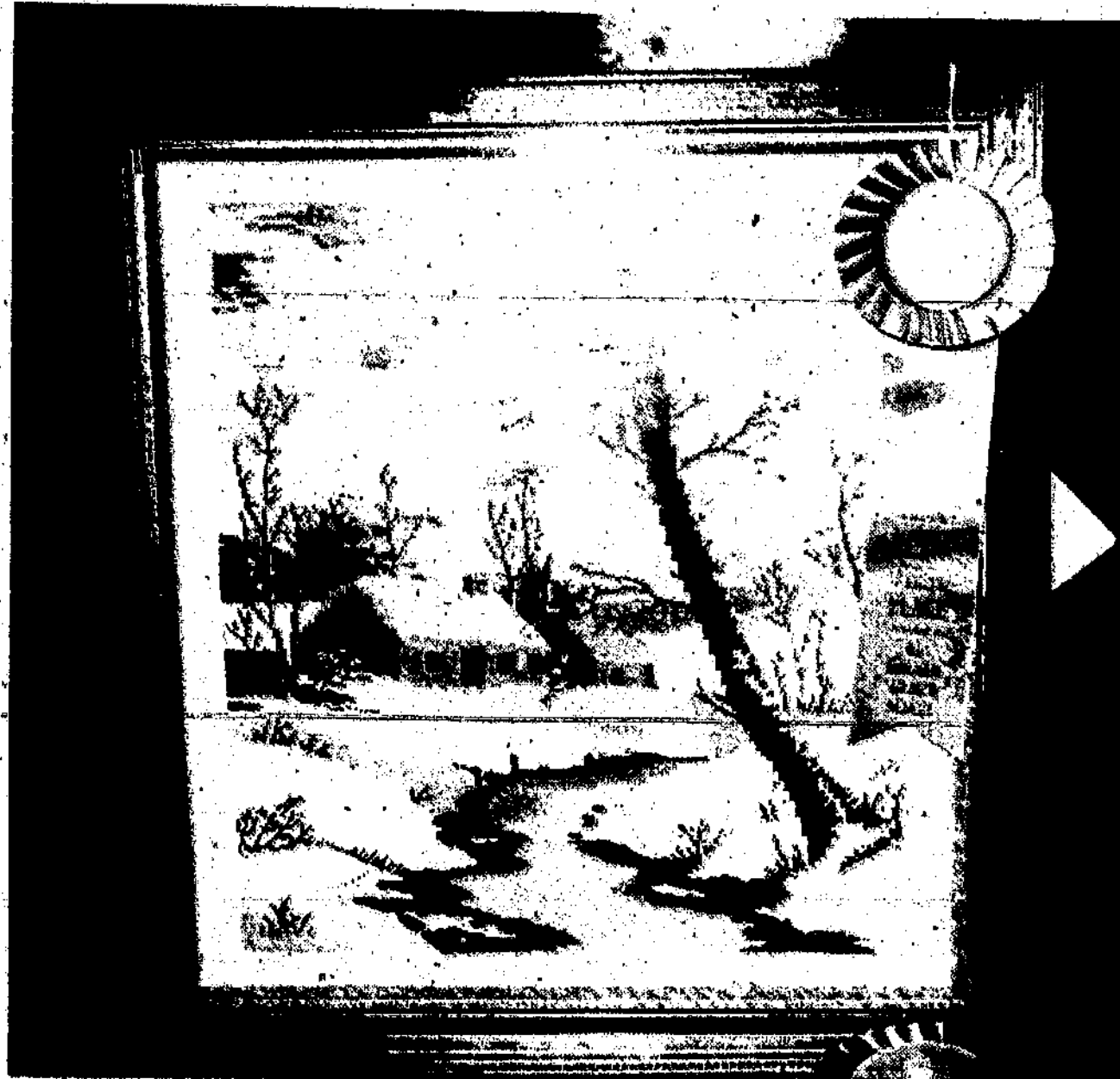

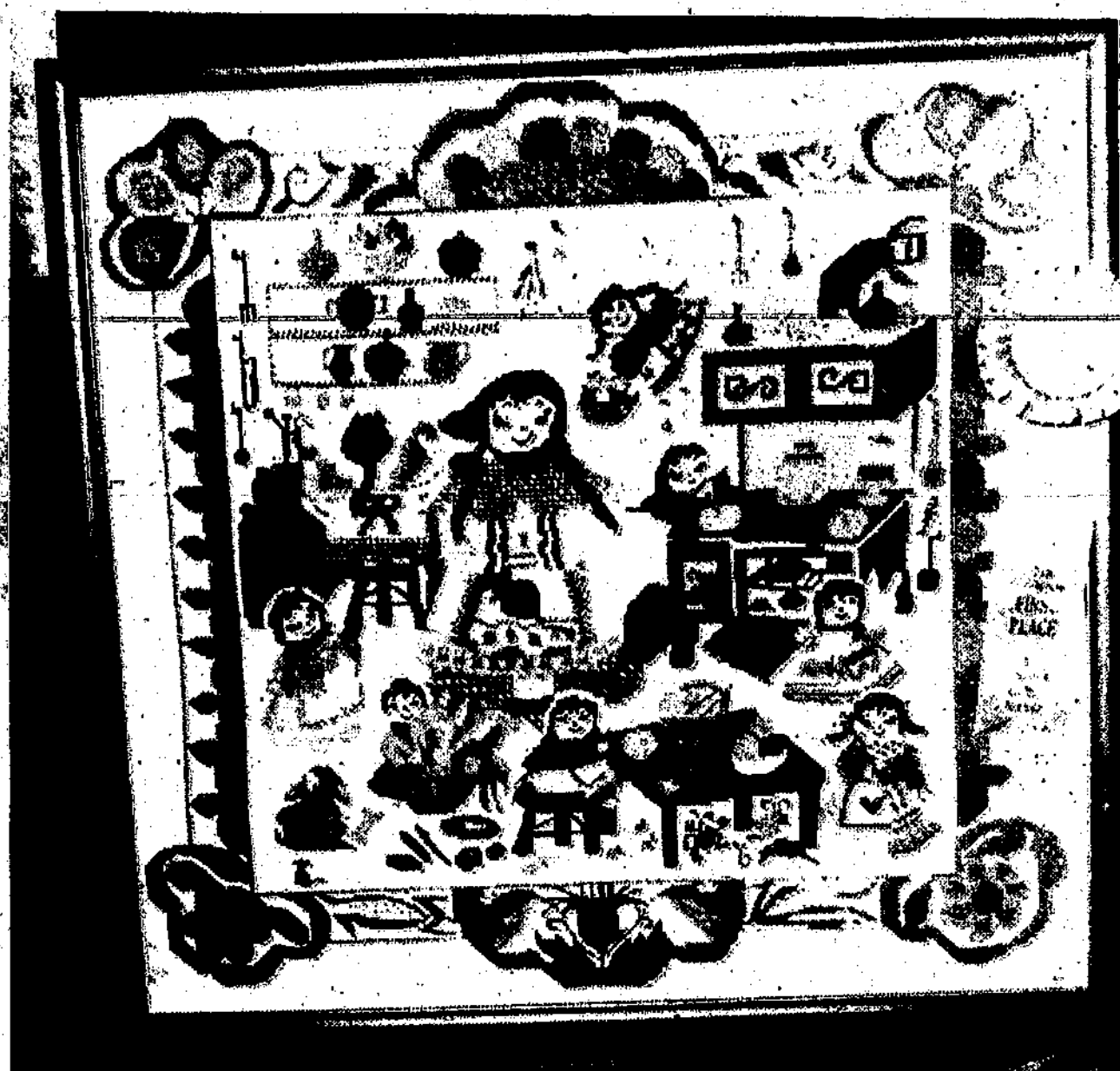

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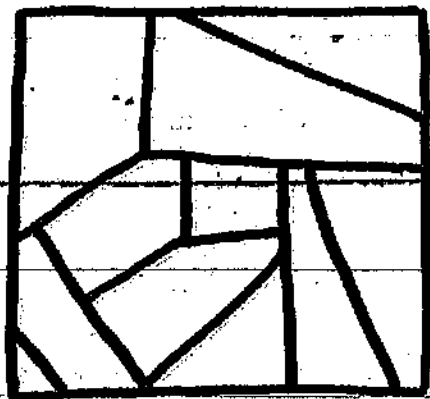

## The Quilting Bit By Polly Chavez

### CRAZY QUILT SQUARE



### HERRING-BONE STITCH

Trapunto, applique, Hawaiian, pieced, crazy, log cabin; all different styles of making bedcovers. Not all need to be quilted but are called 'quilts' anyway.

The crazy quilt, originally born of necessity, was made in an all over design consisting of pieces of material saved from worn or discarded clothing sewn together in helter-skelter fashion, usually lined but seldom hand-quilted.

Open your sewing basket, look over your supply of scraps or remnants and try you hand at a crazy quilt.

Each square is 12 1/2 inches, 1/2 inch is allowed for seams around each square when they are connected.

The number of squares you make depend on the size of the bed you are making the quilt for.

Scraps in different shades of the same color or closely related colors add unity to patch work.

Because this is a crazy quilt, all squares will be different, but the typical square shown maybe used as a guide.

Cut cotton patches and arrange by shape and color in 12-inch squares of muslin or old sheet. Patches may be trimmed to fit together.

Straight edges are easier to join smoothly than curved edges. Join patches with 1/4 inch seams by hand or machine.

On right side embroider herring bone stitch over each seam.

Sew squares together with 1/2" seams. Work herring bone stitch over each seam.

Back finished top with cotton broadcloth, tack at several places to keep top and backing together. The original crazy 'quilt' was not padded or quilted.

Finish with narrow border, trim boarder seams with herringbone stitch, also.

The date is embroidered in center or corner. Remember that for your children, grandchildren, nieces or nephews the quilt will be a treasured heirloom, so embroider your name too.

Peter, the Lincoln County News pressman, said his son wanted a three speed bicycle. Peter told the boy maybe Christmas would bring forth such a vehicle. The lad said, "Christmas???" What about my birthday? It's in October."

That seemed like a long time off to a boy . . . a whole month of waiting. To Peter, of course, and all parents, Christmas already looms ominously on the horizon.

Our thinking today involves reality. Christmas is a long way off to a boy of, for example, six years old. Four months is 1-18 of his whole life. A year is 1-6th of his life.

If I were to say to a reasonable adult of sixty years, next year we will . . . ? The length of real time, in part, will depend on the item mentioned. If it is of no consequence such as having a picnic in the spring, then the time will seem relatively distant and not of any particular meaning. But if the object of the planning is a trip to Europe or paving all the streets in town, then a year seems like a very short time to prepare. That year is only 1-180 of her life and an undertaking of significance has to be evaluated on the basis of similar lifemarks.

It won't be too long (too long for most of us, alas) until people live 400 or more years, so they now say. That space would appear to make the difference between a forty year old and a ninety year old negligible.

Wait a minute though. A healthy happy minded sort of person of forty might have more in common with a healthy optimist of that future 300 year old than with a miserable broken down ninety year old.

I have a lot of youngish friends with whom I share ideas, ideals, interests and activities. Several of them have remarked, kindly, that I seem closer akin to them in spirit and mind than with some of my contemporaries.

It is a pleasant thought but there are such important elements missing in those relationships that I can more easily relate, perhaps the word is comfortably rather than easily, to a generation behind me than a generation ahead of me.

I am glad that my children look upon war and killing in any form as a kind of insanity; incomprehensible human behavior. I would not want them to think otherwise.

But how can I share with them those vital years of my life when World War II made death and destruction the noblest behavior and our nation lived to die for a cause.

To those of us who celebrated the construction of a factory, the building of a dam, the paving of a road, the stringing of a power line, the lighting of a furnace, the puff of a locomotive as an event proving the perfectability and nobility of the human race; a landmark of achievement; a move forward in mankind's conquest of terrifying natural elements—to those of us who remember these things it is difficult to see our cities as only concrete jungles and our highways and utilities as corruptors of our air and water.

We thought if we took the children out of factories, away from chopping cotton and picking beans and put them in schools; if we cured rickets, infantile paralysis, TB, pellegra, gave everybody a 48 hour work week, full bellies, a warm house, a week vacation and a pair of shoes, then sin and crime would disappear from the face of the earth.

Were people simpler then or were we just simple minded?

I don't feel like the human race is getting worse or that this world is going to pot. It does seem, though, that the bad people are getting badder and maybe the good people are getting gooder.

This started out to be a piece of relative values. I'm told that it is not how far you fall that counts; it is how hard you hit. There are those who say that it's not how far you have been that's important but how much further you have to go. I am reasonably sure that history takes less note of how long you live than of how you live.

I have one more observation for you: The older I get, the younger older people seem and the younger younger people seem, and they all seem to get prettier every day.

# In other years

**TWENTY YEARS AGO**  
From Lincoln County News Friday, Nov. 2, 1956. Mrs. Amelia Church, talking to Ramblin' Around editor - Lincoln's first jail was built in 1877, just before the Lincoln County War. It was built about 200 feet in front of our house-between our house and the river. George Peppin dug a pit 20 feet by 10 feet and I suppose about 12 feet deep. They brought pine logs from the Captain Mountains and peeled them and laid the floor of logs and the walls and roof down in the pit. They cut a doorway, called a trap door. Two rooms of adobe were built on this structure. The first jail occupant was Billy the Kid. He'd been in this pit, as I remember about three weeks. My mother would see the boy when they would take him out and back.

Marvin Roberts, C. O. secretary, said that signs are to be placed on Highways 380 and 54 in all directions out of town. The signs will advertise Carrizozo.  
The 1957 Plymouth is on display this week at the Shafer Motor Co.  
Drilling of a second test well for Village of Corona was started by M.M. Penix on the Perkins Ranch. The well was drilled to a depth of 200 feet this week, with as yet no sign of water, the first well was drilled to 700 feet and produced only two gallons per minute.  
About 90 fruit growers in the Hondo Valley attended a dinner and business meeting at the school Oct. 16. The Hondo Valley apple crop, estimated at 140,000 bushels in 1956, was almost three times as large as the 1955 crop. Bert Bookout of Tularosa hauled in a

large amount of feed for Orris Smith last week. Due to drought conditions Mr. Smith has made arrangements to winter some of his stock in Tularosa. Jerry Sidwell of the Foster Ranch was an Ancho visitor Sunday.

A Halloween social there's going to be at White Oaks hall come.

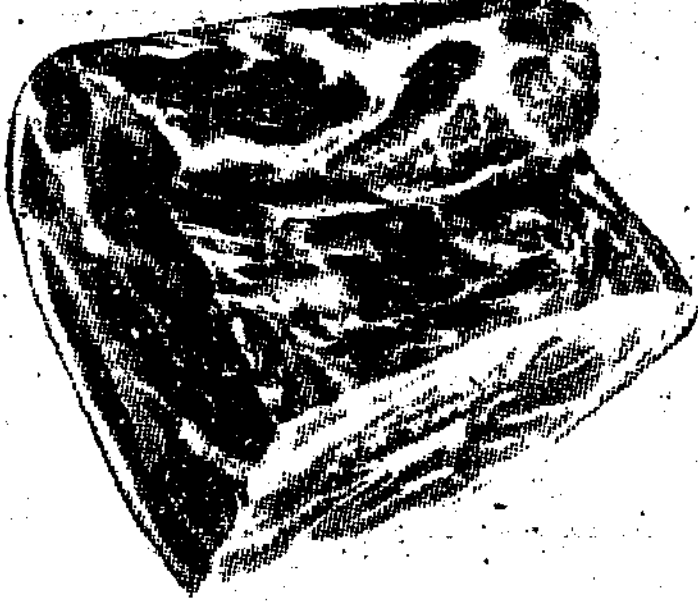
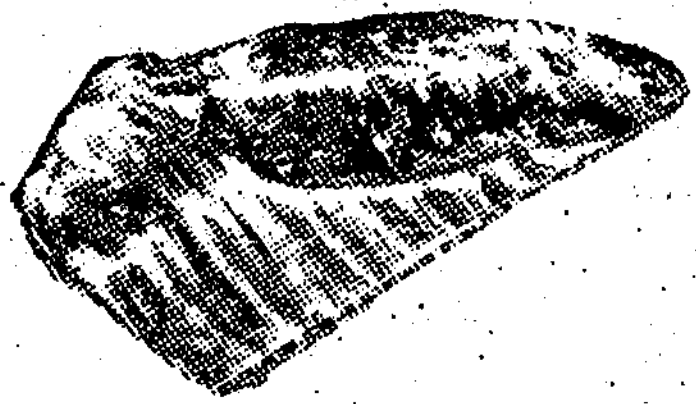

Peter, the Lincoln County News pressman, said his son wanted a three speed bicycle. Peter told the boy maybe Christmas would bring forth such a vehicle. The lad said, "Christmas??? What about my birthday? It's in October."

That seemed like a long time off to a boy... a whole month of waiting. To Peter, of course, and all parents, Christmas already looms ominously on the horizon.

Our thinking today involves reality. Christmas is a long way off to a boy of, for example, six years old. Four months is 1-18 of his whole life. A year is 1-6th of his life.

If I were to say to a reasonable adult of sixty years, next year we will depend on the item mentioned. If it is of no consequence such as having a picnic in the spring, then the time will seem relatively distant and not of any particular meaning. But if the object of the planning is a trip to Europe or paving all the streets in town, then a year seems like a very short time to prepare. That year is only 1-180 of her life and an undertaking of significance has to be evaluated on the basis of similar lifemarks.

It won't be too long (too long for most of us, alas) until people live 400 or more years, so they now say. That space would appear to make the difference between a forty year old and a ninety year old negligible.

Wait a minute though. A healthy happy minded sort of person of forty might have more in common with a healthy optimist of that future 300 year old than with a miserable broken down ninety year old.

I have a lot of youngish friends with whom I share ideas, ideals, interests and activities. Several of them have remarked, kindly, that I seem closer akin to them in spirit and mind than with some of my contemporaries.

It is a pleasant thought but there are such important elements missing in those relationships that I can more easily relate, perhaps the word is comfortably rather than easily, to a generation behind me than a generation ahead of me.

I am glad that my children look upon war and killing in any form as a kind of insanity; incomprehensible human behavior. I would not want them to think otherwise.

But how can I share with them those vital years of my life when World War II made death and destruction the noblest behavior and our nation lived to die for a cause.

To those of us who celebrated the construction of a factory, the building of a dam, the paving of a road, the stringing of a power line, the lighting of a furnace, the puff of a locomotive as an event proving the perfectability and nobility of the human race; a landmark of achievement; a move forward in mankind's conquest of terrifying natural elements—to those of us who remember these things it is difficult to see our cities as only concrete jungles and our highways and utilities as corruptors of our air and water.

We thought if we took the children out of factories, away from chopping cotton and picking beans and put them in schools; if we cured rickets, infantile paralysis, TB, pellegra, gave everybody a 48 hour work week, full bellies, a warm house, a week vacation and a pair of shoes, then sin and crime would disappear from the face of the earth.

Were people simpler then or were we just simple minded?

I don't feel like the human race is getting worse or that this world is going to pot. It does seem, though, that the bad people are getting badder and maybe the good people are getting gooder.

This started out to be a piece of relative values. I'm told that it is not how far you fall that counts; it is how hard you hit. There are those who say that it's not how far you have been that's important but how much further you have to go. I am reasonably sure that history takes less note of how long you live than of how you live.

I have one more observation for you: The older I get, the younger older people seem and the younger younger people seem, and they all seem to get prettier every day.

**TWENTY YEARS AGO**  
From Lincoln County News Friday, Nov. 2, 1956. Mrs. Amelia Church, talking to Ramblin' Around editor - Lincoln's first jail was built in 1877, just before the Lincoln County War. It was built about 200 feet in front of our house-between our house and the river. George Peppin dug a pit 20 feet by 10 feet and I suppose about 12 feet deep. They brought pine logs from the Capitan Mountains and peeled them, and laid the floor of logs and the walls and roof down in the pit. They cut a doorway, called a trap door. Two rooms of adobe were built on this structure. The first jail occupant was Billy the Kid. He'd been in this pit, as I remember about three weeks. My mother would see the boy when they would take him out and back.

Marvin Roberts, C. of C. secretary, said that signs are to be placed on Highways 380 and 54 in all directions out of town. The signs will advertise Carrizozo.  
The 1957 Plymouth is on display this week at the Shafer Motor Co.  
Drilling of a second test well for Village of Corona was started by M.M. Penix on the Perkins Ranch. The well was drilled to a depth of 200 feet this week, with as yet no sign of water, the first well was drilled to 700 feet and produced only two gallons per minute.  
About 90 fruit growers in the Hondo Valley attended a dinner and business meeting at the school Oct. 16. The Hondo Valley apple crop, estimated at 140,000 bushels in 1956, was almost three times as large as the 1955 crop. Bert Bookout of Tularosa hauled in a

large amount of feed for Orris Smith last week. Due to drought conditions Mr. Smith has made arrangements to winter some of his stock in Tularosa.

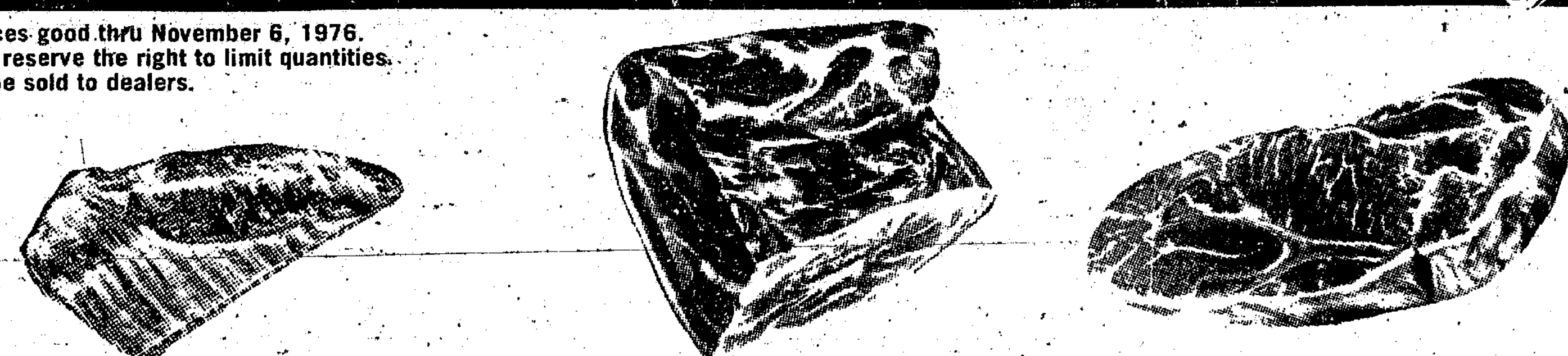



(for 20 people)  
3 large hens (3 to 5 lbs.)  
6 large onions  
2 large bunches of celery  
6 cans water chestnuts  
3 8-oz cans mushrooms (stems & pieces)  
6 cans bamboo shoots  
6 cans bean sprouts  
3 bottles of soy sauce  
2 tbs. molasses  
Boil hens in water (no salt) with 2 onions, two outside stalks of celery and one teaspoon whole cloves, until tender (do not pressure). Let hens cool in broth and when cool, enough to handle, remove chicken from bones. Strain broth and save. Skim off fat. Cut onions and celery in bite size pieces and cook in chicken fat until tender. Do not brown. Add mushrooms and cook 10 minutes longer. Add 3 quarts of broth, molasses and soy sauce and thicken with cornstarch, which gives a clear glaze. Add chicken cut up in small pieces--stir just enough to mix. Heat vegetables in their own juice. Drain and

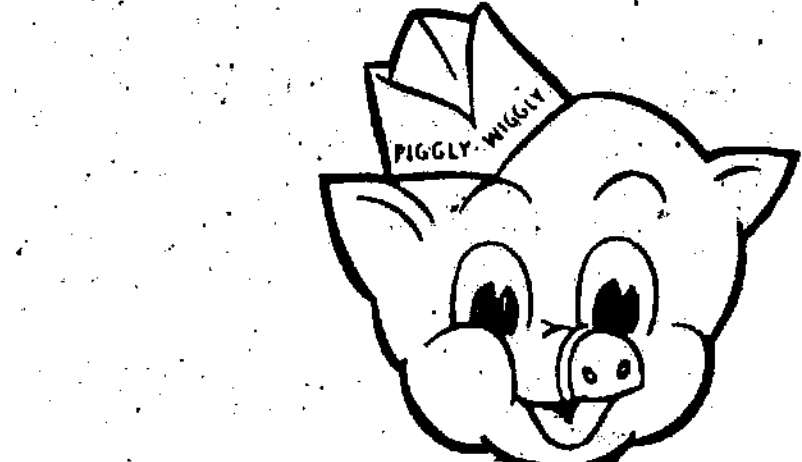

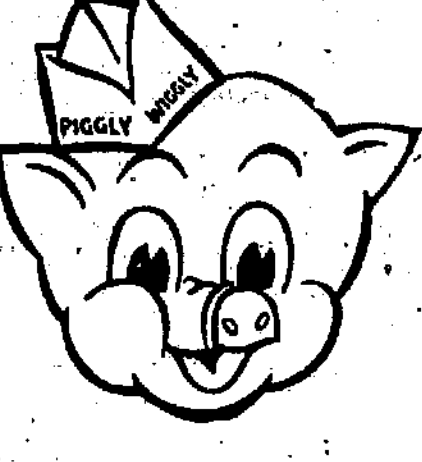
