along the crest of the Rocky Mountains fvom Glacier National Park on the Canadian border.
The hikers, Stephen Studebaker and
Loren Froemke, set Loren Froemke, set out Tuesday (Novi:
16) on another leg of their border-toborder walk which will take them to White Sands National Monument, N.M. Their final destination is Boquillas,
Mex., just across the border from Big Mex, just across the border from Blg
Bend National Park, Tex The twosome will cross through parts
of the Cibola and Lincoln National Forests at the highest elevations possible on their way to white sands, of early parts of their trip which began in early June on the snow-capped peaks of Glacier.
