Club votes Lyric aid

The Carrizozo Women's Club will buy a 16 mm movie projector for the Lyric Theater. The \$850 for the projector has been raised by the members at rummage sales, bake sales and last week at a tamale sale and raffle.

The club had voted to contribute \$500 toward renovation of the theater, Mary Rich president said. The CCAPA board which owns the theater said that the projector was needed immediately to begin a program of movies which in turn would raise money for the theater restoration.

The Woman's Club Community Improvement Project Committee chaired by Vice President Elinor Olson voted to buy the projector and the Executive Board gave its approval Sunday.

Mrs. Olson's Committee decided to raise another \$350 so that the club could contribute the entire cost of a projector. The group which included Sister Gayle, Peggy Najjar and Eileen Serna sold 20 dozen tamales and took orders for about 40 dozen more. A raffle earned another \$25 and the committee, Mrs. Olson said, will have snacks for sale at the Fireman's Ball and will continue to take tamale orders.

"We are all enthusiastic about the movies planned for the Lyric and the CIP Committee is working hard on raising the projector money. The tamales are excellent and we just hope our members can keep them coming," Mrs. Rich said.

The rummage and bake sale raised an additional \$400 for other club projects, Debbie Bhasker, sale chairperson, reported.

Luminarias to be sold

The Speech Team at Carrizozo High School is selling luminarias this Christmas as a project to raise funds for trips and to help decorate the town in a traditionally New Mexican manner.

The Lincoln County Courthouse became one of the best customers when Tammy Hourigan appeared before the commissioners Tuesday. Tammy said that 150 lights would be needed to decorate the front of the building.

Commissioner John Sudderth made the contribution of \$37.50 for the lights. Tammy said that the speech team would charge 25 cents per light and would light the candles each evening beginning Christmas Eve for as long as the candles lasted. She said the members would promise to clean up after the holidays.

Jackie receives high Interior award

The United States Department of Interior honored Carrizozo's Jackie Spencer with its highest award December 7 in Washington D.C.

Secretary of the Interior Thomas Kleppe presented "Lincoln County children's fairy godmother" with the Public Service Award for a citizen who

has made an outstanding contribution to conservation and recreation programs.

A reception followed the 2 p.m. presentation and New Mexico Senator Pete Dominici congratulated Mrs. Spencer on the tribute paid her for contributions to New Mexico children.

Other government officials and congressional representatives were on hand for the occasion.

Jackie was nominated for the award by representatives of the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation's New Mexico office.

Gaylan Coffman of that office said

that he and others interviewed people in this area and attempted to do a comprehensive study of Jackie's many contributions to New Mexico.

"I am sure the presentation is incomplete," he said. Her involvement personally as well as financially with recreation programs, school children and youth with problems has been tremendous and a lot has been unrecognized and even forgotten.

Coffman said that Jackie has contributed more than one million dollars to recreation programs since 1960, that his office was able to discover, and that he was sure her total contributions in the state amounted to much more.

Jackie began her involvement with a recreation program for Carrizozo by matching federal funds for a swimming pool for the youth of the town.

Recreation tax funds had been earmarked for a pool but there was not enough money for a pool large enough for swimming meets," said Ruth Armstrong.

Ruth worked with Jackie and other women in the community on recreation programs. She says there was some opposition to a community pool at the beginning.

Jackie added enough money to the pot to enable the construction of the facility.

Along about the same time a plan was being made and the planner was persuaded by the ladies to include a study for a park. The Carrizozo Women's Club decided that the park would be its project that year and Jackie again came to front with a contribution that made the three acre park possible.

There was nothing for the youth of the town to do in the evenings and the ladies decided to open a recreation center. There was a vacant building on the area now occupied by the Post Office.

Jackie paid the \$50 rent monthly, bought equipment and supplied paint for the youngsters to decorate the inside.

Ruth remembers the day that Jackie walked into the building and found paint pans, rollers and brushes sitting on the floor covered with dried paint.

"Jackie took the whole mess home and washed the pans and brushes. The next day she gave them back to the children saying that this was the proper way to leave painting equipment."

Xmas light contest set

The Citizens State Bank and the Lincoln County News will sponsor a residential Christmas lighting contest in Carrizozo this year.

"We believe that the joy of the holidays is enhanced by Christmas lights. Lighting Homes give a great deal of pleasure to a lot of people and to us makes the expense and week worthwhile," said Johnson Stearns, president of the bank. The bank will contribute \$100 for prize money. First prize will be \$50; second prize \$35 and third prize \$15.

"We are hoping that home lighting will encourage the businesses to do a little extra in decorating this year. It is certainly to our benefit to stimulate Christmas shopping at home and Christmas decorating is one way to add a little zest to Christmas buying," Paul Payton News Publisher said.

The News will provide space in the paper to promote the contest and will print pictures of the best business and residential decorative lighting.

It is traditional that a couple traveling through town is asked to do the judging. This year Willie Silva at the Four Winds Restaurant will make the selection of the judges and after they have done their work he will buy their dinner.

Local job rate good

Lincoln County has been removed from the substantial unemployment category by the New Mexico Labor Market Review as of November 1.

That is the message that County Manager Les Olson gave, the County Commissioners in their final meeting of 1976 Tuesday.

The Lincoln County unemployment rate is a healthy 4.8 percent as compared to a national rate of 8.1 percent and a New Mexico 7 percent figure.

Those figures, however Olson explained, do not accurately tell the employment story in the county. Unfortunately the county has a high percentage of what is now called "underemployed" people, i.e. workers making a less than adequate wage or only working part time.

Most ranch workers and service people such as motel maids and waitresses are not working full time and many receive less than minimum wage. Lincoln County also has a high percentage of seasonal employment, he said.

The average county family income is only \$6,400 a year as compared to a national figure of over \$11,000. Federal standards rate less than \$12,000 a year for a family of four as inadequate.

An interesting side effect of full employment is reflected in the federal Anti-Recession Fiscal. The program gave money this year to county governments to hire people for basic programs as an anti-recession move.

Lincoln County received \$8,113 and used part of it for an additional road department salary. The commission at this meeting added a mechanic for four months with the balance of the funds.

With the new employment figures, the county will probably lose this and other government funds in the future that are designed to combat unemployment.

The commissioners presented a inscribed gavel to its chairman R.C. Nunez, who leaves the commission on the first of the new year. Also going out of office is Bud Payne.

Both new commissioners, Lee Straley and Shorty Stoneman were on hand for the brief Tuesday session. Other business considered included an agreement to replace gates with cattle guards on the road leading to the home of Ralph Dunlap. Rosalie Dunlap told the commission that other people living off the county road left the gates open and the Dunlap sheep were frequently found on the highway.

County Treasurer Flora Vega was given the authority to have an audit for incoming treasurer, Mike Kimbrell. She was also told to hire temporary help if it was needed for the remainder of the month.

Decision on a joint powers agreement for a regional mental health board was postponed until the next meeting.

The forest service will increase its contribution to the Sheriff's department by \$6000 next year. The money is paid to provide rescue service in the forest and to provide extra patrol time in the government areas. Sheriff-elect Bill Elliott told the commissioners that he thought the department should have a four wheel drive vehicle for the rescue work and the commissioners agreed. At

Feds share forest fund

The office of U.S. Sen. Pete Domenici announced Friday that the State of New Mexico received \$222,432 from the Department of Agriculture. Lincoln County's share is \$11,336.

The sum represents 25 percent of the money collected by the Forest Service from the sale of timber, and from grazing, recreation, minerals, and other land use charges on national forest land between July 1 and Sept. 30, 1976.

By law, a quarter of the national forest receipts are returned to the state for distribution to the counties where national forests are located. The funds are used for public schools and roads.

It is never too late

There are twenty adults in Carrizozo who are attending school under the Adult Learning Program.

The students who range in age from twenty to seventy plus are working toward a high school diploma and the test for the General Equivalence Diploma January 3, 4, 5, will tell them how well they have done.

Elinor Olson the Carrizozo instructor

and coordinator of this Continuing Education program, says that there are many reasons that motivate a return to school.

People who have inquiring minds are interested in the learning for its own sake, she said. A high school diploma is necessary for certain employment and is often the passport to work advancement.

Some students want the satisfaction of finally completing their high school education, Mrs. Olson said.

After the January test, the program will break for the remainder of January and February and will resume March first. Another GED test will be given in mid June of 1977.

Thirty two people have acquired a high school diploma through this Carrizozo program in its four sessions.

In increasingly large number New Mexico adults are returning to college and the GED makes this further education possible for those who did not complete high school.

Ms. Olson said that her students are proof that for education, it is never too late.

The National Honor Society is going to have a Christmas party on Dec. 12 at their sponsors, Mrs. Brown's house.

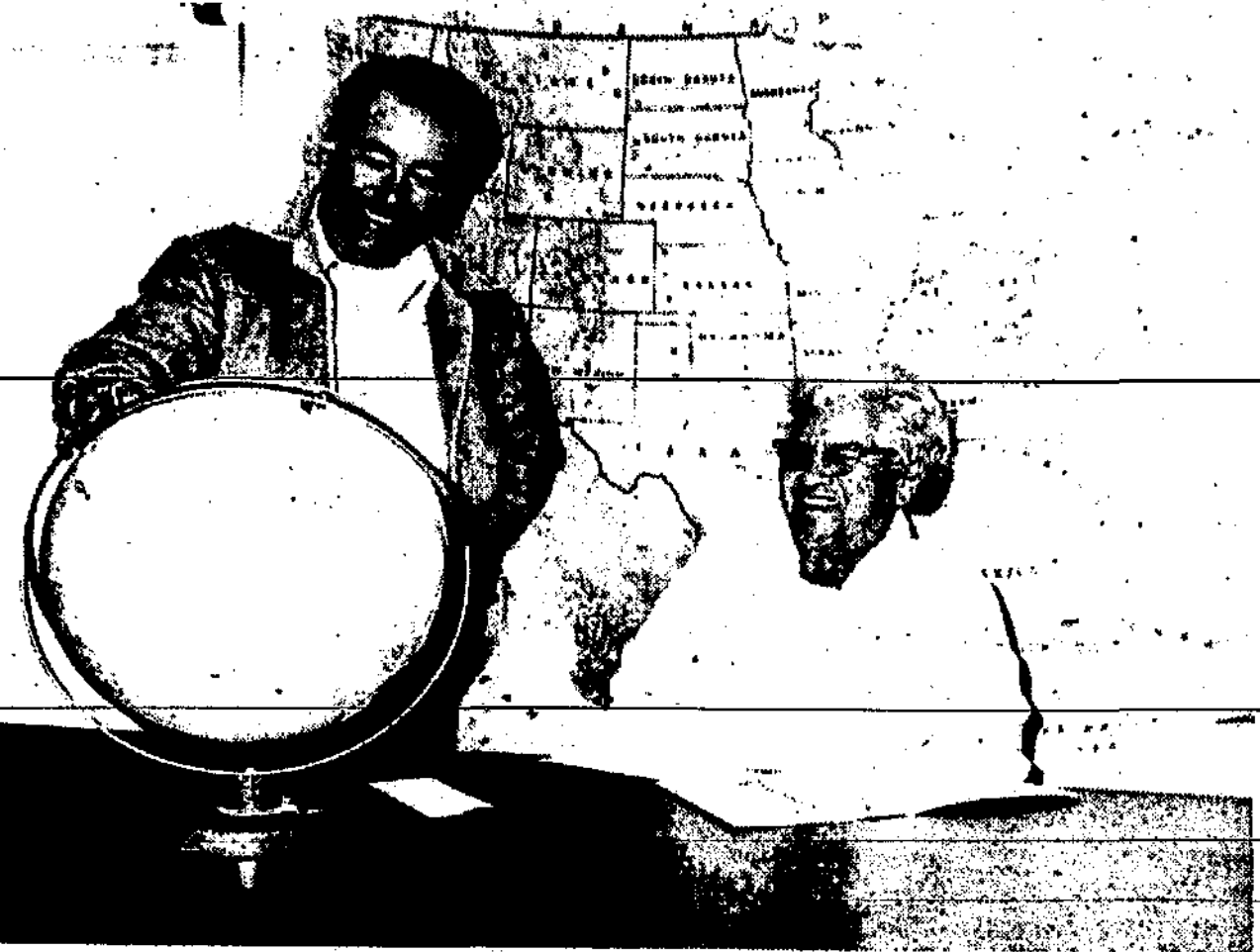

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County Commissioner's Report

This is the first of a series of weekly reports from the Lincoln County Commissioners' office. The reports will discuss county functions, activities and issues. We hope, the weekly reports better inform the public of county government operations, problems and issues.

Since it is tax paying time again some information on procedures in paying those taxes may be in order. If you have not paid your first half taxes by November 30 you will be penalized \$5.00, a half percent for the month of December and one and one half percent per month for every month thereafter. That adds up fast so don't delay.

Your second half taxes are due April 1st, 1977 and can be paid up till April 30th without penalty. Again failure to pay your taxes by April 30th will result in a five dollar penalty plus 1 1/2 percent per month.

If you believe your taxes are too high, based on last years assessment, you may file a petition of correction in District Court. The fee for that is \$20.00. The State Property Tax Department and the District Judge will ultimately decide your case. Obvious clerical errors in computation, address, and property description can be corrected by the Assessor without filing a petition. But, if you are protesting the amount of the assessment for reasons other than

clerical errors, than you have to file a petition and pay your taxes "under protest" by December 15th. After that you can't protest.

If you don't pay your property taxes you may find your property listed for auction a year or so later. Once your property is listed for auction you may still pay the taxes, but an additional 2 per cent penalty will apply plus back interest.

The new Notice of Valuation will be coming out in late February and early March. We'll discuss again what you should do to correct errors and protest the amount of the assessment at that time.

In other areas, the currently elected officials and the officials-elect and their deputies will be attending the Mid-Winter New Mexico Association of Counties Conference in Santa Fe on December 9th and 10th. New information on procedures and new ideas on getting the job done easier are usually provided to help smooth the transition from one official to another.

The Road Department has now received the two new maintainers, one two-yard loader and three pickups. Seven maintainers will be back in the field this week. The road crew, made up of four dump trucks, one bulldozer, one blade and one loader is presently improving the long school bus routes north of Capitan Mt. The crew road will be in the Northern part of the County for about six months, barring bad weather.

If you discover a road repair need that needs immediate attention, call Superintendent Guy Henley at 354-2203 in Capitan between 7 and 8 a.m. so he can assign someone to the problem that day. For less immediate road repair needs write the County Manager at Box 711, Carrizozo or call 648-2313.

After working elsewhere for over a year top bladesman Jack LaMay is back on a county blade. We're pleased to have him back. Good bladesmen are hard to come by.

The subject of bathing came up the other day during the big freeze up when a number of bathrooms in Carrizozo were without water.

Someone remembered that forty years ago in the best social circles a bath once a twice a week was considered most adequate.

And fifty years ago the Saturday night bath was a institution in clean homes. Everyone went to the tub that night, need it or not. The next day was Sunday and cleanliness is next to Godliness. Anyway you certainly didn't want to put on your Sunday-go-to-meeting clothes without a bath.

We didn't change our clothes everyday in yesteryears. Dress up clothes were mostly not washable and dry cleaning to often was said to be bad for wool and silks. I remember being told that English gentlemen never had their good woollens cleaned. They were spotted, brushed and hung to air.

English gentlemen also used a lot of cologne and probably English ladies had a lot of stuffy noses in the cold wet winters.

There are countries, particularly in the Eastern part of the world where baths have always been considered a daily ritual for health, cleanliness and general recreation.

When the elite Arabians were lounging in their baths in the early centuries of recorded history, the Europeans were scratching their crusts & perhaps dabbing faces with a dash of water. Bathing was considered dangerous and often deadly in the northern parts. The Indians on this continent and the inhabitants of Scandinavia were given to hot sweat baths followed by a tumble in the snow.

I am sure that those who survived were extremely healthy people.

There are those who believe that frequent baths wash away important skin oils and there are others who believe that bathing washes away unhealthy skin oils and germs.

Someone said that you don't sweat enough in Lincoln County winters to need many baths. My only reply to that is the observation that I need to bath every day winter and summer to wash away the Carrizozo dust.

We were discussing the morals of teenagers as compared to my generation and then hers. There are really tremendous differences in what was accepted behavior and what the adult society was willing to accept.

Mother remembers being in a "Model A" full of youngsters one evening. The kids had a lark driving on the downtown sidewalks of Angleton, Texas. I'm sure they were chased by wrathful adults.

No-one wound up in a juvenile court and probably some hot words from fathers was the extent of the punishment. If that had happened in my day, the result would have been very serious, depending of course, on who the kids were and what town the incident took place. Fines and even a probated sentence could have been the consequences of what twenty five years back was a prank. Of course there was a big difference in the traffic, the size of the cars and the potential damage.

If such a thing happened today in some towns the parents would be fined; in others the kids thrown in jail. But again the potential damage has greatly increased as has our bewilderment in understanding our children. I have heard parents talking about their kids as if they were creatures from outer space.

Mother recalls a beach party where the young people ended up spending the night on the beach, unchaperoned, because of a broken down car. It caused a lot of talk and tsk tsk.

If that happened today there wouldn't be any talk. The kids would have planned it, the parents agreed, and everything that was whispered about and didn't happen sixty years ago would have happened this time.

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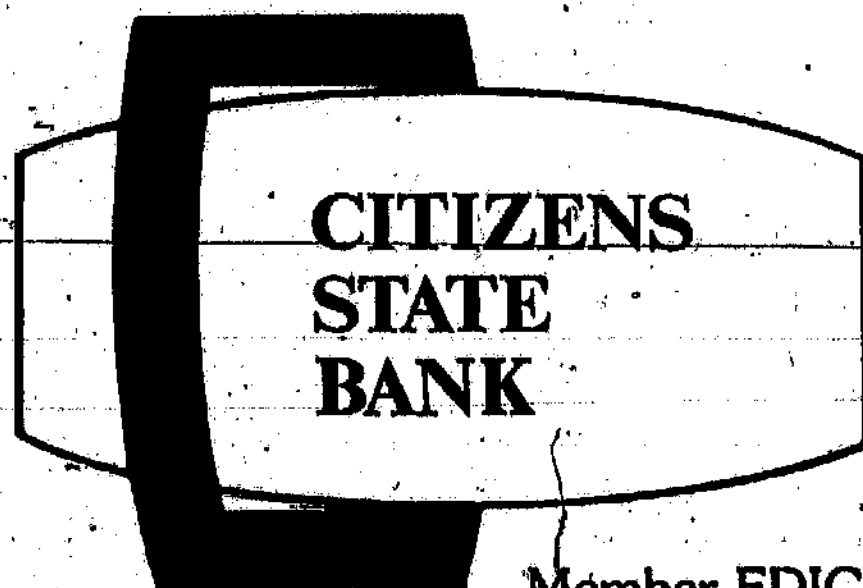
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4-Hers recognized at annual dinner

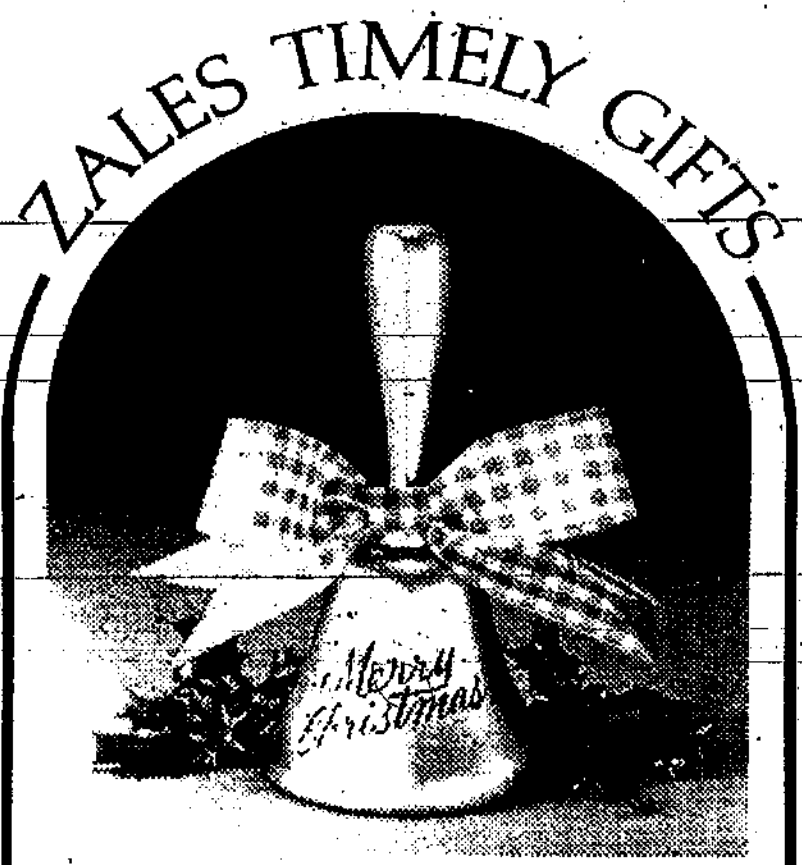

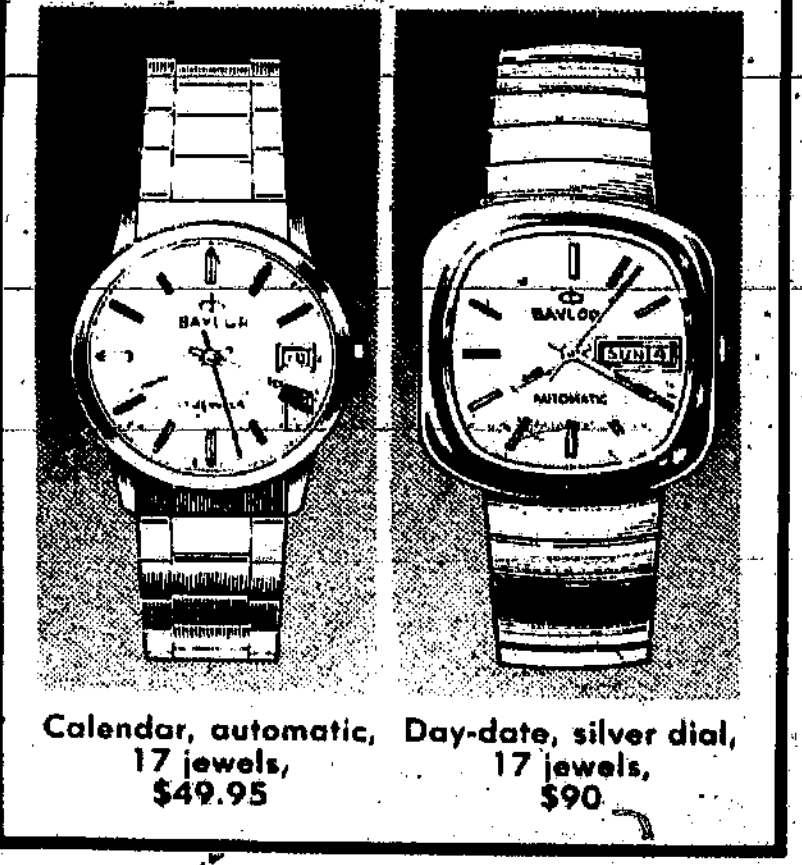

The Rio Grande Sun publishes the county vouchers, could be done for several towns as well. In Rio Arriba County the vouchers run two columns long - a lot of space some weeks in our newspaper.

The Belen News-Bulletin prints divorces asked, and divorces granted as well as marriages in it's courthouse record. Are News readers curious about who is divorcing who?

Are school menus a big deal with you mothers? The weekly Hobbs Flare says they are serving Beef Ravioli on Monday, taco burger, corn dogs, frito meat pie, and baked macaroni the rest of the week. School honor roll for 2nd six weeks takes up about 30 inches of space in the Truth or Consequences Herald. We don't know that any such honors are posted in our area. Would you like to read about your youngster in school? The Taos News is large enough to

have features we do not - such as family record, Taos arts, theatre, review. No question but that we could do more writing and reporting, and probably should but not in the arts and entertainment area.

The Sierra County Sentinel at T or C is a dandy newspaper because it is most all local getup! Has 'Speaking on Sports' column, Hatch doing, local business picture feature each week, plus many more local ads than we have. Nice feature (we love feature articles) story about flight of snow geese at Bosque del Apache in the Defensor Chieftain at Socorro.

The Deming newspapers win the general excellence awards a lot of years, and they do a lot of good things with these newspapers. They have 'Out of the past', honor roll, real estate corner, short take on railroads, windmills essential to settlement, game and fish report, editorial page with editorial, also reader forum - how much of this would you like to read?

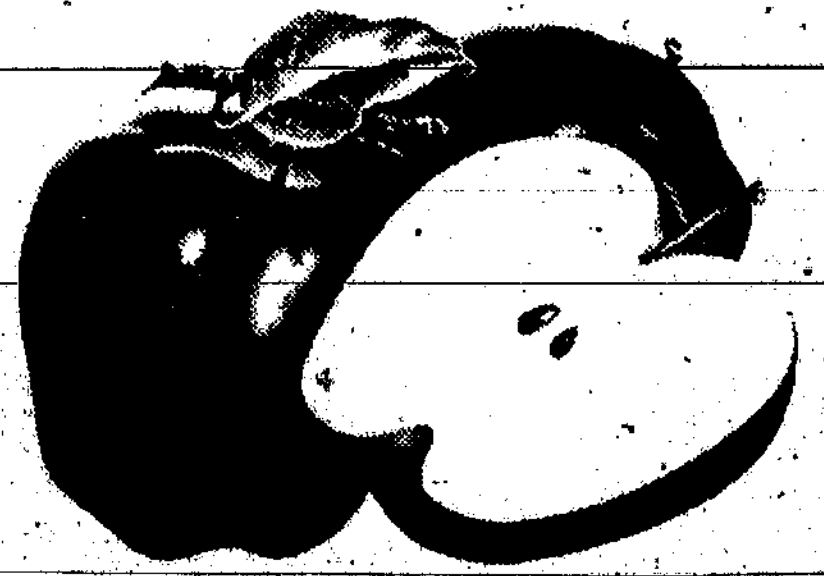

KNOW YOUR FOOD

HOW MUCH MEAT TO BUY?



Learning to estimate the number of servings various cuts of meat will provide comes only from experience...but the learning does pay off! Pieces of a single cut of meat may vary in the amount of gristle, fat and bone they contain, so the exact amount to buy often must be determined at the meat counter. This is one of the reasons it's important to buy meat at a store that close-trims its meats. You'll get more meat and less waste for your money. Here are some guidelines that can help you estimate:

If average amounts of waste are assumed and 3 ounces of cooked lean meat is counted as one serving, a pound of meat will provide:-

- 3 to 4 servings of cuts with little or no fat or bone: flank steak, boneless loin steaks, ground meat, round steak, lean stew meat, boned roasts with little fat, liver, center cut of ham, veal cutlets, fish steaks and fillets.
- 2 to 3 servings of cuts with a medium amount of bone: most roasts, some chops and steaks, ham, poultry, dressed fish.
- 1 to 2 servings of cuts with much bone, gristle or fat: lamb, pork, or veal rib chops, plate and breast of lamb or veal, spareribs, shank, short ribs, chicken wings and backs.

You may want to serve more than 3 ounces or less than that amount depending on how much each person wants or the size of pieces, such as chicken parts, chops or steaks.
