SCRMRA funds okay

The South Central Mountain Resource Area RC&D meeting in Ruidoso Downs Tuesday heard good news about federal funding.

Clemens Weindorf, Area Conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service in Roswell, introduced Cecil Daniels, Area Congressional Representative for Senator Pete Domenici. Mr. Daniels said he was happy to announce that the SCRMRA has been funded by the federal government, which means that certain project measures are now eligible for federal funds. Mr. Weindorf read the Washington, D.C. news release to the audience.

Howard Abercrombie, Resource Conservationist for the SCRMRA, praised everyone in the group for making the organization what it is and stated that "as long as we have interested people we'll see nothing but good times ahead."

Tom Keyse, Executive Secretary of the State Natural Resource Conservation Commission, talked about Public Law 92-500, the Federal Water Pollution Control Act Amendment of 1972. Keyse said that this is a very complex law. It was passed in 1972 after 24 years of debates and over a presidential veto.

The major objectives of this law are to restore and maintain the chemical, physical, and biological integrity of the nation's waters. By July of 1983 the waters are to be restored to the condition suitable for swimming, fish, and wildlife. And by 1985 there should be no pollutant discharge. This will be accomplished in three general ways: first with waste water management through a federal grant system. Second, to regulate discharge into streams or bodies of water at a specific point and third, research to eliminate pollution from generalized areas.

Major elements which will make the law work are uniform nationwide standards, enforceable regulations, and a permit system based on effluent limits, enforced by penalties ranging up to \$25,000 fine per day.

Keyse feels that the RC&D's might be the best source to bring information about this law to the public.

Horace Cordova of Ft. Stanton, requested assistance in training students in agriculture so that they can be employed.

A request was made to tape Willie Gallacher's stories for posterity. Clara Snow asked that the entrance to the Nogal Camp meeting road off highway 380 be improved because it is hazardous. This brings the total project measures to 173.

Frank Potter, assistant manager of Ruidoso, explained the progress on Eagle Creek Dam.

Bill Hart said that the subdivision regulations will be decided on January 27, and then we will have an enforceable set of regulations to work with.

Les Olson, Lincoln County Manager, reported that at the recent Commissioner's meeting they agreed to expand the Planning and Zoning Committee to nine members so that a park committee can be formed to decide park facility needs for Lincoln County. He said that if anyone is interested in serving to contact his office.

Factory may locate in Carrizozo

Labor survey required here

The possibility of a clothing factory establishing a plant in Carrizozo has caused the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce to begin an intensive survey of the labor market in the area.

Last week Chamber officials met with Jim Rhodes of the New Mexico Department of Development to discuss steps which might lead to the industry locating in Carrizozo.



Rhodes told the group that the president of the concern wanted a small town that would actively want his industry to locate; that a certain size building would be needed the first year and the business would build its own plant the second year; that the concern would need call transportation; that 50 predominantly female employees would be required the first year increasing to 200 in the second year of operation.

Rhodes said the concern was reliable and firmly established elsewhere in New Mexico. This would be an additional plant. He described the industry as a cut and sew operation manufacturing for a large chain retail outlet.

He said that a previous unfavorable situation involving another town had led the head of the business to require that any potential town be actively interested in having an industry.

It appeared to Rhodes and the Chamber committee that Carrizozo met all the requirements however a labor survey to prove the availability of workers was required.

All people in the Carrizozo area and outlying towns within a 45 mile radius area are urged to return a questionnaire if they are in need of or would want a job. Women are especially asked to reply.

The questionnaire is in this issue of the NEWS. Other copies are available in Carrizozo, Capitan, Corona and Tularosa.

The return of the questionnaire is not an application for a job. It will be kept confidential and will be used only to prove that there are people who want jobs in the Carrizozo area.

Parents of Carrizozo young people now living in other areas who might want to return to Carrizozo to work are asked to supply that information.

Rhodes assured the Chamber that this is an extremely reliable concern and would be an asset to the community. Chamber Vice Chairman Jim Stepreis urged a community effort is completing the labor survey.

St. Joseph to lease hospital

The board of directors of the Lincoln County Municipal Hospital in Carrizozo has reached a tentative lease agreement with St. Josephs Hospital in Albuquerque.

The agreement which is expected to be completed Friday turns the hospital over to St. Josephs for a three year period with a renewal option.

The proposition was outlined to the board in a letter from Roland Walsh, St. Josephs administrator and former Ruidoso Hospital administrator.

Walsh said that the Albuquerque hospital would plan to upgrade the equipment, upgrade out-patient care and provide services of specialists where needed, and determine the direction of in-patient care.

The board discussed the extent of medical care

that would be provided by St. Josephs. Nancy Knight talked by phone to Walsh and expanded on the proposal.

St. Josephs would need and expect continued financial support from the town and county. Local members would be asked to serve on the hospital Board and Med-We-Care programs would be continued under the lease agreement.

Expansion of in-patient service would depend on demand now and in the future. A survey by the three local doctors was deemed inadequate to make a decision immediately.

The board agreed to accept the proposal subject to clarification of certain points. A meeting was called for Friday at 1:30 p.m. with the Carrizozo Board of Trustees, the county commissioners and Roland Walsh present to confer with the Hospital Board.

Valuation notices go out

Starting this week the Assessors Office will be mailing out the Notices of Valuation.

A person upon receiving the Notice should do the following:

1. Check to make sure that your name,

address, and legal description of your property is correct.

2. If you have claimed as head of the household last year, the exemption will be applied automatically this year. If you did not claim the head of household exemption last year, then you should sign the appropriate lines in the front of the Notice and mail the Notice back to the Assessors Office.

3. If you are claiming Veterans exemption, than you should sign the appropriate lines on the front of the Notice and mail the Notice along with your Veterans certificate to the Assessors Office.

4. If you feel that your PROPERTY HAS DECREASED in value for some reason (Example: torn down, destroyed by fire, water, etc.) then you should fill out "Schedule A" on the reverse side of the Notice of Value and mail back to the Assessors Office.

5. If you HAVE BUILT ANYTHING, added to your present structure and you did not fill out a building permit, then you should take out

Capitan School Superintendent Richard Clifton is calling a public meeting Jan. 14 at 7 p.m. to select a committee to study the needs of the school district.

The meeting which will be conducted by the New Mexico Department of Education is a part of a general "needs assessment" required of all schools by the state.

The meeting will be in the school cafeteria and parents, teachers and students are urged to attend to assist in this project.

Four parties named in suit

Four additional parties were added to the complaint in the Water Canyon Road case which Lincoln County is carrying against the Stephenson Ranch.

Monday, on advice of the District Attorney, the complaint was amended to include the U. S. Forest Service, Otero County Electric Cooperative, Leandro Vega, Jr., Lincoln County Sheriff and the Town of Carrizozo.

Several weeks back, Judge George Zimmerman had ordered the plaintiffs to include all parties involved in the complaint.

Following a hearing on a proposed Park Commission the commissioners decided to expand the Planning and Zoning Committee from 7 to 9 members and give that group the duties of the Park Commission.

The commissioners voted to increase the salary of the deputy county clerk to \$700 a month; allowed the County Treasurer to hire one additional person for a one month period; authorized the Sheriff to hire a jailer at \$450 a month.







Club adopts new program

The Carrizozo Women's Club has adopted a program, Business for Beauty, that will encourage improved appearance standards by local firms. Making the announcement was Mrs. Cantrell, club president.

The primary purpose of the club's program will be to convince both small and large businesses that simple landscaping and renovation can do much to give their firms a new look and improve the community's environment.

Business for Beauty, which has been conducted nationally since 1968, is co-sponsored by the General Federation of Women's Clubs and Cities Service Company.

Mrs. Cantrell said that "A community's environment depends upon many things, among them the visual standards of businesses and homes. Business establishments which do not reflect high standards of design, landscaping and maintenance can be a particular liability since they are usually located on heavily traveled streets and highways. On the other hand, good appearance helps both the business and the community.

All local businesses completing any kind of improvement to their exterior appearance between February 16, 1974, and February 15, 1976, will be recognized with certificates of commendation from the club. One local firm will be singled out for additional recognition and go into state competition. Winners from all states will then enter national competition.

Local businesses are encouraged to let the Carrizozo Women's Club know if they have made or are planning to make improvements. This will make it possible for them to be recognized. Firms should contact Mrs. Cantrell at 648-2392.

Since its adoption by the General Federation of Women's Clubs in 1968, the Business for Beauty program has recognized improvements by thousands of firms.

In state judging the top two entries from clubs will earn those groups cash awards of \$100 and \$50 respectively. The winning business in the state will receive a beautiful plaque from Cities Service Company.

The six national business winners in the program will receive trips to an awards program, scheduled for late spring, 1976 in Washington, D.C. A representative from the sponsoring club and state will also attend this event. Cash grants totaling \$6,900 will be distributed among the clubs sponsoring the six national winners with a first prize of \$2,000.

Thomson said a preliminary review of the budget situation indicated the following action would be taken.


A reduction of three in the seasonal work force, including two park technicians and a maintenance employee.

Early filers get returns sooner

Taxpayers who file their returns in January or early February can expect any refund due in four to five weeks or roughly half the time late filers have to wait, Arturo A. Jacobs, IRS District Director for New Mexico, said. In urging taxpayers to file early, Mr. Jacobs said that individuals who delay filing until late March or April—the peak filing time—may have to wait for their refunds as long as ten weeks. Another advantage to filing early, according to Mr. Jacobs, is avoidance of careless errors often made by last-minute filers who are rushed. These errors—which frequently involve incorrect arithmetic, use of the wrong tax table, or failure to sign the return—can further delay processing of the return as well as the refund check.

Mr. Jacobs said that taxpayers should begin now to gather their records, such as receipts of cancelled checks, to substantiate itemized medical deductions, charitable contributions and others. With records in order, Mr. Jacobs added, the taxpayer can begin to fill out the tax return as soon as the tax package arrives by mail. Last year, 338,207 taxpayers in New Mexico received refunds amounting to \$114,418.

Summer job aps ready

Individuals seeking summer jobs (work between May 12 and Sept. 30) with the Forest Service will be interested in a new system initiated in the Southwestern Region for 1976. Personnel Director Harold N. Watson announced today.

Special application forms which supplement the SF-171 application for Federal employment are now available at all Forest Service offices throughout the Southwestern Region, which includes Arizona and New Mexico. Applications must be filled out and sent to the Regional Office in Albuquerque, where they will be computerized and used for filling jobs on National Forests in this Region only. Applications will be accepted only between January 1 and February 15, 1976 for positions in grades GS-2 through GS-4. Forestry Aid (Fire, Timber, Recreation) and a few Engineering and Surveying Aids. All applicants must be at least 18 years old at the time they report for duty.

As in the past, applicants will be hired on a merit basis, according to previous work experience and education. Competition for summer employment is especially keen in this Region Watson said. Only a small percentage of those applying can be hired. Also, applicants should be aware that some jobs are in isolated areas. In addition, most fire position applicants must pass a physical examination plus a physical fitness test as a condition of employment. Nepotism regulations prohibit the employment of sons and daughters of Department of Agriculture employees through agency employment systems for summer employment.

The Forest Service requested that each individual send an application to only one of the nine Forest Service Regions in the United States. This will eliminate most of the confusion and duplication of effort experienced in other years. Applicants for all Forest Service programs will be given equal consideration without regard to race, color, religion, sex, creed or National origin.

In less than two weeks 107 men and 5 women will begin spending your money--more than \$500 million of it.

The 1976 Legislature will vote appropriations for the fiscal year starting July 1. Legislators don't raise taxes in an election year. But prospects are also dim for tax relief.

In the Senate the chief signal callers will be President Pro Tem I. M. Smalley, D-Hidalgo-Luna-Sierra, Majority Leader C. B. Trujillo, D-Taos; Majority Whip Odie Echols, D-Clovis, and Aubrey Dunn, D-Alamogordo. Finance Committee chairman.

Senate Republican Leader John Conaway, Lincoln-Otero, will underscore his party's positions. But Senate Democrats outnumber Republicans 29-13.

Democrats also own a big advantage in the House. Among House chieftains are Reps Richard Cafajal, D-Belen; Alvaro Castillo, D-Colfax-Union, and Fred Luna, D-Los Lunas. The House Republican leader, Rep. Hoyt Pattison, Curry-Lea-Roosevelt, is an effective strategist. The House GOP Whip is Rep. Maurice Hobson, Lincoln-Otero, a banker.

Although he is an ex-senator Gov. Jerry Apodaca appears to muster more strength in the House than in the Senate. Apodaca is a Las Cruces Democrat. The crucial fight will be over the fiscal 1976-77 spending level.

Atty. Gen. Toney Anaya filed a civil fraud suit on questioned land sales practices in Hidalgo County District Court at Lordsburg. The action will try to force refunding of up to \$3 million to purchasers of land in Hidalgo County, New Mexico, and Cochise County, Arizona.

The suit names as defendants a large group of individuals and companies ranging from Lordsburg to Phoenix, Tucson and Minneapolis. The petition alleges many violations of the Land Subdivision Act. Among them are failing to file required documents and failing to obtain approval of advertising brochures and publications.

New Mexico stockmen objected to an increase in federal fees for livestock grazing on Bureau of Land Management and Forest Service lands. Cattle rancher Ruben Pankey of Monticello, Sierra County, said: "The livestock industry needs a continued moratorium on the increase of grazing fees due to our economic status."

Pankey is a national representative of the Public Lands Council, representing 11 Western States and North Dakota. Pankey said the New Mexico Congressional delegation was asked to oppose the fees increase.

Gov. Apodaca renamed Clayton rancher Karl Butt to the State Fair Board for a term ending in 1980. The State Park and Recreation Commission will consider proposed acquisition of water rights for recreational purposes at Summer Lake State Park near Fort Sumner at a meeting in Clovis today (Thursday).

A presentation to the commission was also set by Albert Matlock of Clovis on cabin site lease rental fees at Summer Lake State Park. The state

As the new year began, Democrats were expected to nominate Minnesota Sen. Hubert Humphrey for president. New Mexico Republicans will probably send a 21-vote delegation, divided between Gerald Ford and Ronald Reagan, to Kansas City.

Carrizozo to have new garbage system plan

Carrizozo is going to have a new garbage system soon, an industrial park someday, and a labor survey, the first step in industrial acquisition, today.

All of this and more was accomplished by the town trustees at a regular meeting Tuesday night.

The town will advertise for bids on an automatic side-loading garbage system. The city will provide residential and business areas with 19-gallon metal containers placed in alleys and in a few cases on streets.

The Environmental Impact Agency has required that 55 gallon containers use stop neck year because of litter and health hazards.

The new system which will cost about \$50,000 makes a sharp cut in labor costs and will, according to City Manager Johnny Johnson, be feasible under the existing budget.

Board members heard Mike Richardson of EMCO, a company selling the system, explain financing methods. Richardson said the equipment would be paid for in five years. Thereafter, he said, the city would have a large sum to use elsewhere in the budget.

Johnson said that a new truck was needed immediately and he recommended this system be acquired. Mayor Floyd Siegrist told the audience that no increase in rates need result from the new system.

Members voted to begin purchase procedures. Ted Ashbury, a consultant with William Matotan Engineers, was on hand to ask for a 60-day delay across the board in sewer system, water system and industrial park construction work, voted for by the people a year ago.

Ashbury said that survey problems concerning Highway 380 had cost the company considerable time in initial planning. He said the highway department was unable to supply adequate surveys to indicate the location of a feeder road from the park to the highway.

He said that Lincoln County Abstract Company had done extensive work in order to make the survey possible. He also said that a covered survey bench marker at the airport had added to difficulties.

A number of people present asked questions including a representative of SENMED, Bill Burkett, who indicated concern with the delay. He said that it was important to proceed rapidly to take advantage of the slack in the construction industries if the best park for the least money was to be built.

The Federal Government spent a total of \$38.7 billion during fiscal year 1975, and according to U.S. Rep. Harold Rumsfeld, D-N.M., \$2.3 billion of the expenditures were credited to the State of New Mexico and \$14.2 million was credited to Lincoln County.

"The 1975 figures represent a \$2.9 million increase in the county's share of the federal budget, when compared to last year," Rumsfeld said.

The Congressman said the data was obtained from a report prepared annually by the Community Services Administration for the Executive Branch. The report provides a detailed breakdown of all federal spending by agency and in each county of the state.

Rumsfeld emphasized that the report is an estimate of federal spending in Lincoln County. "Some of the figures represent actual expenditures by a federal agency in New Mexico and other figures are the County's prorated share of a federal expenditure," he said.

The Congressman added, "I am releasing this information as I have in past years to provide New Mexico's residents with an indication of the economic impact of federal spending in our state. It is not my intention to either claim any credit for the expenditures or imply that I have supported all of the federal spending in our State, for I have not done so."

The Federal Government's largest expenditure credited to Lincoln County in fiscal year 1975 continued to be from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare with \$4.4 million. This includes \$3,040,000 for Social Security benefits and \$540,000 for Medicare benefits.

The American Farmer of 1907 tells that Professor Bolley has discovered formaldehyde for the treatment of smut in grain. And, the Santa Fe New Mexican dated Feb. 15, 1907 forecasts "Willard Will be Important Point. Must Become Great Trade Center Soon". The Roswell Register of 1907 says the city is going to do something permanent about the ditches.

Henry the Fiddler came to town for a couple of days last month. He and Randy, my new son-in-law, played for Lucy's wedding. They gave us a bit of "Bestlovers' 9th," the "Lucy's Waltz," which Randy had composed and finally a medley of country fiddling.

We had a lot of fine music, classical and folk and blue grass and country-western, while Henry was here. It was a pleasure, of course, to have Randy entertain us after Henry left. And one night, Doug Jarrard, my ex-pupil teacher, added his lovely sound.

Henry the Fiddler claims this as his new name. He has cut himself apart from his past and, as for names, he says originally last names were used to identify a man by his trade or his family. Henry, like so many of his age, is looking for something new, or old—a beginning or a return.
