Judge Payne in real primary race

Most contests on Democratic ticket

Three different ballots will be used in Lincoln County for voting in the primary election Tuesday, June 1, 1976. This is necessary to handle the three state representative districts.

Representative District 50, Frank T. Encinas the democrat and John F. Bigbee the republican candidate, includes all of Lincoln County except Carrizozo and Angus precincts. This district also includes Torrance County and parts of Guadalupe and DeBaca.

Representative District 51, John J. Mershon, democrat the only candidate includes only the Angus precinct in Lincoln County and all of Otero County.

Representative District 52 includes only the Carrizozo precincts in Lincoln County and all of Otero County. Leroy H. Hightower, Jr. is the democratic candidate, Maurice Hobson, incumbent republican candidate.

Voting for state representative in the primary should be no problem. There is no competition.

There are two sets of problems for voters on this primary ballot. Democrats have a choice of Joseph M. Montoya or Robt. R. (Rich) Sims for U.S. Senator. Republicans have been on the outside looking in the senate office for many years. They have a choice of three candidates in their effort to select a man who can race Montoya to the wire. Harrison (Jack) Schmitt, Eugene W. Pierce, Jr., and Arthur Alfred Layne and listed on the republican ballot in that order.

The biggest problem for democrats will be selection of commissioners in all three districts. This voting, by the way, is county wide even though each commissioner is supposed to

represent a district. George Henry Stoneman and R. C. Nunez (incumbent) are District 1 candidates. This district includes Capitan and Hondo in the southeast corner of the county.

George L. Straley Jr., and Eddie O'Brien are District 2 candidates representing the largest area, including Carrizozo and Corona on the west side of the county.

Commissioner District 3 is small by thickly populated, including Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs in the extreme southwest corner of the county. District 3 democratic candidates are John F. Suderth, Elmer R. Pirelli and Leon A. Farrar, all of the Ruidoso area.

Republican commission candidates are Paul Pacheco in district 1 and Elias H. Otero in district 2. No republican in district 3 race.

The democrats have a rather hot race going for sheriff. Bill Elliott who campaigned well two years ago and Rafael R. Romero who has the backing of present sheriff.

Democrats also offer a contest for county clerk with Aurelia B. Lueras and Sunny Bonds Hirschfeld campaigning. Three democrats are running for Div. III District Magistrate. They are W. A. Hart, Fred A. Bernard and Sam. J. Nunnally.

There is only one contest on the county level for republicans. That is between J. N. McDaniel and Kenneth Nosker for Probate Judge.

Democrats can choose between John A. Elliott, Lee Davis Catanach and Joe H. Barela for corporation commissioner, and Dan Sosa Jr. and Harry E. Stowers Jr. for supreme court

justice, 8 year term.

A big one for Lincoln County voters will be the district judge, Division II race on the democratic ticket. Three from Otero County one from Lincoln County. Judge Billy Gene Payne of Carrizozo will need a solid vote from the home folks to compete successfully with the three candidates at Alamogordo. They are Jack Underwood, Richard A. Stanley, and James J. Weldon. Payne practiced law in Otero County before coming to Carrizozo several years ago.

You can take your choice without paying any money at this event, the Bicentennial Primary Election of 1976. Probably the selection of senator and representative will mean more to New Mexico than the other offices. Picking a good slate of commissioners will mean a lot of Lincoln County, as will the district judge. Actually, we (Payton) consider all these political offices important -- and your vote important.

Police actions discussed at meeting

Carrizozo town council met in special session May 21 to hear complaints about the police department. The department has been expanded by addition of three new officers under the Comprehensive Employment Training Act (CETA). The new officers are John Knajdl of Flushing, N.Y., Michael Farley of Alamogordo, and John Millitzer of Alamogordo.

The Town of Carrizozo has four other people working under the CETA program. Carol Zamora in the town office, Bobby Baroz in street department, Joseph Chavez and Pat Jiron at the golf course.

Police Chief Concho Morales, State Policeman Max Watson and John Knajdl, a month on the force, were at the meeting. Much of the complaining was directed at one of the new officers who was not present. There was no way to answer those complaints.

One officer had run up too close on a motor bike, impounded car, pried open trunk, harassed son-in-law, they followed me around, John almost ran over me -- was the way complaints were noted by the News reporter.

Part of the problem stems from case in city court, Fred Serna charged with reckless driving, unlawful use of operator license and unlawful possession of controlled substance, marijuana on May 15. Charges were brought by Officer John Knajdl, Serna is out on bond. Judge Bill Payne has recused himself and will not hear this case as it involves the town and Payne is attorney for the town. Serna had been advised by attorney not to discuss this case.

The request was made by the Town for the three new officers and the request was approved. The council talked about holding a second meeting to hear complaints, no date set.





Money for youth job sponsors

New Mexico prime sponsors will receive \$2,744,766 as their share of the \$528.4 million special appropriation for this year's summer jobs for youth.

The program will be administered under the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act. Summer program participants must be 14 to 21 years old and economically disadvantaged. They will be paid at least the federal minimum wage of \$2.30 an hour and can work as many as 40 hours a week. The average in past summers has been about 25 hours.

Programs can start as soon as school is over and must finish by Sept. 30. In Carrizozo Elsie Paেকে, of State Employment Commission, says there should be

more than 15 jobs and they can use more people than have signed up so far. Her office is in the courthouse annex upstairs. This is an on-the-job training program.

Microfilm reader aids tracing family trees

Those participating in Ruidoso's Community Bicentennial Project will now have the extra services of a microfilm reader in tracing their family tree, according to librarian Monese Barron.

Donated by the Ruidoso State Bank and repaired by Western Office Equipment, the reader can be used for transcribing both personal and rented microfilm.

Microfilm pertaining to family background data can be ordered through the library from the Southeastern Genealogical Society at a minimal fee, according to Vicki Hall, Bicentennial project coordinator.

Ruidoso's Bicentennial project involves a challenge to citizens to trace their ancestors back 200 years and, if desired, enter the biography of an interesting relative who lived from 1776-1800 in the community contest.

The Slurry Seal company has contract to seal US380 in the Indian Divide area between Capitan and Carrizozo. Donnie Rickerson was employed as flagman and night watchman, using small trailer near the Divide.

Alfonso Lucero was coming from Capitan, the last vehicle through the flag stop area so he carried the red flag to the 8-mile road block and gave flag to Rickerson.

Apparently Lucero was invited into the trailer and was later shot in the left side of head with pistol for reasons unknown Monday.

Sheriff Leandro Vega said he was to meet with the district attorney later in the day Monday to decide on charges to be filed, probably aggravated battery.

Lucero was examined by Dr. Marie Cortelyou at Carrizozo Health Center and released.

Ruidoso has interesting Bicentennial project

Ever wonder what your great great grandfather was like? Was he a pioneer? A presidential candidate? A highway robber? Ruidoso's official Bicentennial project may provide the incentive you need to find out about your long lost forgotten ancestors.

Approved by the Ruidoso Board of Trustees last week, the project urges all citizens within the Ruidoso Municipal School District boundaries to research their family trees through the last 200 years.

The project is the brainstorm of Vicki Hall, a three and a half year resident of Ruidoso. Ms. Hall heard of a similar project in a small town of 1,500 in Oregon and asked herself, "Why not Ruidoso?"

"Ruidoso didn't have a Bicentennial project which could involve the whole community and this sounded like a good one," she said.

Assistance for the project can be obtained at the Public Library where librarian Monese Barron has set up a Bicentennial Project table to help with the research.

Highly qualified in the area of genealogical research, Ms. Barron said the inter-library loan system will also be available to researchers as well as informative books and forms.

Upon completion of an individual study, citizens are then invited to select the biography of an ancestor who lived between 1775 and 1800

and submit the story of his or her life to the Bicentennial contest.

The contest will be judged in two age groups, 12-18 years old and 18 and over, and three categories:

- Most interesting famous personality.
- Most interesting nonfamous personality.
- Most interesting "skeleton-in-the-closet" or shady character.

All entries must be typewritten in English, double-spaced on an 8 1/2 x 11 inch paper, typed only on one side and contestants may only submit one biography in each category.

Each biography must not exceed 1,500 words and the contestant's name may not appear on the manuscript, but on a separate title page containing address, title, age and phone number. Each contestant is required to authenticate the biography and lineage chart.

Deadline for the contest is Sept. 15 and winners will be announced during Aspencade, probably Oct. 1-3. Any business or individual wishing to donate prizes or money to go toward a savings bond for the first place entries should contact Ms. Barron, 257-4335.

Further information about the project can be obtained at the Ruidoso public library. A question box will be set up at the library's project table and will be checked daily. Entries should be sent to: Ruidoso Bicentennial Project, P. O. Box 3595, Hollywood Station, Ruidoso, N.M. 88345



call on the girl. Also he generally sends the Mother a box of sweets of a gift. The next step is to get a "daking tawo," or a leading man in the community to act as match-maker, then comes the Sayud or discussion of terms and conditions of marriage. This includes the "bugay" or bride price—a gift to the Father for the loss of a helper and the expense of her upbringing. The gifts are usually—a house and a well, \$3 to \$7 for Mass offering, and for relatives—a cow or a pig for the marriage feast, the brides wedding apparel. If a house has to be built, both families take turns and build it. The "bugto," is the severing of the engagement. The boy warns all his relatives, who will serve the feast to make everyone happy. The bride has custody of the rings and a few coins, symbols of fidelity, if the bride drops the coins—her veil falls off it is a sign of dissension or death. A Sanctus of the nuptial Mass cord in the shape of infinity is entwined around their necks and the veil placed on the boy's shoulders and the girl's head. At the brides house a relative gives them a glass of water that they drink together—then break the glass to signify the oneness. Rice is thrown on the heads to bless prosperity and fertility, then the hair is combed to insure a peaceful wedded life. Then they kneel holding a lighted candle before a

small altar, while the parents give them a long sermon of their duties to each other, then they rise and kiss the parents hands, the wedding veil is now removed, and the newlyweds start eating from the same plate. A performer dances and puts a coin in the brides feet, then others throw coins at their feet.

There can't be a wedding within 6 months or a year after the death of any member of either family. They have many superstitions—such as dropping a handkerchief. If the boy picks it up, then the girl will run the family. All this maneuvering actually goes on and the outcome is eagerly awaited by the relatives. So if you are in the Philippines and want to avoid all this, just elope. But they have a proverb that says "ang lana ug ang tubig dili magsagol!" oil and water don't mix!

TELEPHONE FRANCHISES CHAPTER II CONTINENTAL TELEPHONE EASEMENT RIGHTS ORDINANCE NO. 4 AN ORDINANCE GRANTING CERTAIN RIGHTS AND PRIVILEGES TO THE CONTINENTAL TELEPHONE COMPANY OF THE WEST ITS SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS

BE IT ORDAINED by the County Commission of the County of Lincoln, State of New Mexico.

SECTION 1. Grant of Authority. There is hereby granted by the County of Lincoln, hereinafter called the "County", to the Continental Telephone Company of the West, hereinafter called the "Company", the non-exclusive right and privilege to construct, erect, operate and maintain, in, upon, along, across, above, over and under the roads, highways, public ways and public places now in use or dedicated, and all extensions thereof, and additions thereof, in said County, poles, wires, cables, underground conduits, manholes and other communications fixtures necessary or proper for the maintenance and operation in said County of the Company's communications business; provided however, that no poles or other fixtures shall be placed where the same will interfere with any electric light, water hydrant, or water main, and shall be placed in such a manner as to cause a minimum interference with the rights or reasonable convenience of property owners who adjoin any of said roads, highways, or public ways and places, and all such poles or other fixtures placed in any road shall be placed at the outer edge of the road or highway in such a manner as not to interfere with the usual travel on said roads and public ways.

SECTION 2. Company Liability. The said Company shall, at all times during the life of this franchise, be subject to all lawful exercise of the police power by the County and to such reasonable regulation as the County may, by resolution or ordinance, hereafter provide. It is expressly understood and agreed by and between the said Company and the County that said Company shall save the County harmless from all loss sustained by the County on account of any suit, judgment, execution, claim or demand whatsoever, resulting from negligence on the part of said Company in the construction or maintenance of its telephone system in the County. The County shall notify the Company's representative within five (5) days after the presentation of any claim, or demand, either by suit or otherwise, made against the County on account of any negligence as aforesaid on the part of the Company.

SECTION 3. Repair of Roads, Etc. In case of any disturbance of roads or highways, the Company shall, at its own cost and expense and in a manner entirely satisfactory to the County, and subject to the jurisdiction of said County, respecting the subject, replace and restore all such roads or highways in as good a condition as before said work was commenced.

SECTION 4. Any person or corporation desiring to move a building or other structure along, or to make any unusual use of, the roads, highways and public ways of the County which shall interfere with the poles, wires or fixtures of the Company, shall first give notice to said Company, and shall pay to the Company a sum sufficient to cover the expense and damage incident to the cutting, altering and moving of the wires or other fixtures of said Company and before a permit is given by the County therefor, the applicant shall present a receipt from the Company showing the said payment. Thereupon the Company, upon presentation of said permit, shall within a reasonable time thereafter provide for and do such cutting, altering and moving of said wires and fixtures as may be necessary to allow such moving or other unusual use of the roads, highways and public ways of the County.

SECTION 5. It is understood and agreed that the acceptance of this franchise by the Company does not constitute a waiver of relinquishment of any rights or privileges the Company may have with respect to the roads and highways within the County by virtue of the Constitution and statutes of the State of New Mexico.

SECTION 6. Term of Franchise. The franchise and rights herein granted shall continue in force and effect for a term of twenty-five (25) years after the effective date of this franchise.

SECTION 7. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force and effect thirty (30) days after its passage and recording in the manner provided by law.

'ROUND THE CAPITOL

A primary election campaign that appears to have stirred little voter interest moved into its final days. The election will be Tuesday.

Crystal balling our forecasts of winners: U.S. Sen. Joseph M. Montoya will easily capture his Democratic renomination battle over Albuquerque Rich Sims. U.S. House District 1 will be ex-state Rep. Raymond Garcia defeat artist-media consultant Quinn Mizer for the Democratic nomination. Both are Albuquerqueans. Garcia is a Penasco native.

The Democratic race for the State Corporation Commission nomination will be close but Santa Fean John Elliott enjoys an edge over Leo Catanach and Joe Barela. Elliott quit as SCC Pipeline Division manager to run. SCC member Floyd Cross is retiring.

Ex-astronaut Harrison Schmitt of Albuquerque and Silver City will cop the Republican U.S. Senate nomination. His opponents are ex-State Rep. Eugene Peirce of Albuquerque and Arthur Lavine of Moriarty. State Supreme Court Justice Dan Sosa of Las Cruces will win the Democratic nomination for an eight year term on the high court over District Judge Harry Stowers of Albuquerque.

An average pay raise of \$1,019 or 9.26 percent was approved for Hagerman teachers at the annual school district budget hearing. The new average teacher pay at Hagerman is \$12,021. Dexter teachers were increased \$900 or 7.55 percent to an average of \$12,813. The boost for Lake Arthur teachers was \$74 or 7.52 percent to \$10,612.

The State Public School Finance Division said Hagerman Schools listed more than \$600,000 in capital outlay needs. Needs span a media center, science facility and vocational space. Local bonding capacity could supply \$300,000 of the projected total. Dexter schools forecast a need for almost \$700,000 in capital outlay. A major remodeling project and a new vocational facility are among Dexter Schools capital improvement requirements.

Valencia County Assessor Lucy Keys Brubaker, 49, is an alternate for Arizona Rep. Morris Udall on the New Mexico delegation to the national Democratic convention. Her husband, Dr. Richard E. Brubaker, is a physician. They live in Belen. Mrs. Brubaker was an uncommitted delegate to the state party convention in Albuquerque. But she swung to Udall when uncommitted delegates in U.S. House District 2 were insufficient to elect a delegate to the New York parley.

Mrs. Brubaker says of Udall, "I like his philosophy. He's from a neighboring state. He's very warm, very appealing, very sincere." Active in politics 30 years, Mrs. Brubaker was Valencia County-clerk in 1967-70. She says Jimmy Carter's campaign for the Democratic presidential nomination "Has peaked and Udall's chances are good."

The State Park and Recreation Commission certified need at a meeting in Capitan for the State Board of Finance to sell \$400,000 in state severance tax bonds to develop a series of mini-parks ranging from Cochiti through Albuquerque to Belen. The facilities will be part of a network identified as Rio Grande Valley State Park.

The state park commission approved an agreement with the State Highway Department for \$10,000 in fencing to solve livestock grazing problems at Rio Grande Gorge State Park. The park commission ordered additional study by its staff on recreational potential of the Los Esteros area

seven miles north of Sant a Rosa. The U.S. Corps of Engineers plans \$631,000-in-recreational site development related to dam construction in the Los Esteros area.

Dr. William P. Stephens, director of the State Department of Agriculture, underscored potential range caterpillar infestation spanning 10 million acres in nine counties-Chaves, DeBaca, Colfax, Union, Lincoln, Harding, Guadalupe, Mora and Quay. Threat of a grasshopper infestation on range land totaling 500,000 acres was also reported by Dr. Stephens in Chaves, Lea, Union, Lincoln, McKinley and Roosevelt Counties.

He said 20,000 acres of Durham wheat-500 to 600 carloads-will be shipped from Sierra and Dona Ana Counties to the Houston area from Gulf Coast ports. He said the wheat was grown in quantity in the Dona Ana-Sierra sector for the first time.

California Gov. Jerry Brown's Democratic primary victory in Maryland in the presidential joust sparked a New Mexico drive for \$5,000 to qualify him for federal campaign money. Brown contributions were solicited in Espanola, Los Alamos, Fort Sumner, T or C, Deming and Lordsburg among other New Mexico cities.

Highest bid at a State Land Office sale of oil and gas leases in regular sale oral bidding was \$100,000 by Superior Oil Co., Midland, Tex., for 638.48 acres about 20 miles southwest of Eunice.

represent the men Bonney is said to have killed. That figure has been disputed by modern historians, who place it closer to 10.

Bowlin said a couple identified only as Mr. and Mrs. Branham of Granbury visited his museum last summer and read a posted notice that the

tombstone was missing. They told an unnamed employe they knew where the stone was and invited the employe to visit Granbury and see it. She made the visit earlier this year and photographed the stone.

Grave marker for Billy returned

Fort Sumner - The tombstone called him the "Boy Bandit King" and repeated the folklore that credits him with 21 killings before his violent death at the age of 21.

But the granite marker, three feet high and nearly two feet across, disappeared 26 years ago from the Fort Sumner grave of William H. Bonney, who achieved a measure of immortality as Billy the Kid.

Now the stone is back in the southern New Mexico village for the first time since August 1890.

It was found in the Texas town of Granbury, about 60 miles southwest of Dallas. Authorities said it apparently had been buried near the town and served as a local curiosity for several years after its accidental discovery by a local resident.

It was returned to Fort Sumner last week through the cooperation of sheriffs, in DeBaca County, N.M. and Hood County, Tex. and the persistence of Joe Bowlin, who operates a Billy the Kid Museum in Fort Sumner.

Bowlin said the stone is to be put back over Billy's grave during ceremonies June 19, when the village begins its weeklong "Old Fort Days."

Bonney, whose name may have been Henry McCarthy or Henry William Antrim died at Fort Sumner early in the morning of July 14, 1881, shot in the chest by Sheriff Pat Garrett.

The celebrated shootout in Pete Maxwell's bedroom has been replayed thousands of times in movie theaters and the scores of books that turned the young outlaw into a folk hero of sorts.

Billy's fame, and his death, grew out of his participation in the Lincoln County War - a bloody range war that ranged several years in the area.

The marker was erected in 1940. It said Billy "died as he lived" and bore 21 notches to







Defendants. NOTICE OF CLASS ACTION AND PROPOSED SETTLEMENT IN CONNECTION WITH BREAD PRODUCTS

Pursuant to Rule 23, Fed. R. Civ. P., YOU ARE HEREBY NOTIFIED:

There is now pending in the United States District Court for the Western District of Texas, El Paso Division, the above styled and numbered cause brought by purchasers of bread products. This action is brought on behalf of persons and entities that have purchased bread products in the "El Paso area" between January 1, 1954 and January 1, 1976. The class, and the products, and the geographical areas are defined more fully in Paragraph 3 herein.

The Plaintiffs allege that the Defendants, in violation of the anti-trust laws, engaged in a conspiracy to raise, fix, stabilize and maintain prices in the sale of bread products to Plaintiffs and to members of the alleged class. The Defendants deny the alleged violations.

The parties have agreed to settle all claims by all persons against any or all of the Defendants for alleged violations of the anti-trust laws relating to sales of bread products between January 1, 1954 and January 1, 1976, to any person or entity, whether direct or indirect. You may be a member of the class hereinafter defined and established by this Court for purposes of settlement. If so, your rights may be affected by the pendency of this action and the settlement described herein. This Notice is not to be understood as an expression of any opinion by this Court as to the merits of any of the claims or defenses asserted by either side in this action, but is furnished for the sole purpose of informing you of its pendency and of the settlement described herein so that you may make appropriate decisions as to what steps, if any, you may wish to take in relation to this action and its settlement and your rights therein.

1. This Action. The above numbered action alleges in substance a conspiracy among the Defendants and others to raise, fix, stabilize and maintain prices and discounts, at which bread products were sold by the Defendants bakeries. The Plaintiffs allege that they and each alleged class member paid higher prices for bread products than they would have paid in the absence of the alleged conspiracy. The conspiracy is alleged to have begun as early as 1954, and its effect is alleged to have continued to at least December 31, 1975. Plaintiffs seek recovery of money damages for three times the amount of alleged overcharges on purchases by the Plaintiffs and by members of the class, together with recovery of counsel fees and costs.

Each Defendant has taken the position that it has not violated any law, has denied any liability whatsoever, continues to deny all allegations of wrongdoing asserted by Plaintiffs, and disclaims any liability with respect thereto. The Defendants contend that there was no illegal conspiracy or agreement concerning prices or discounts of bread products and deny that the Plaintiffs or the members of the alleged class were injured as alleged or are entitled to any damages. Defendants maintain that there is no substance to the charges

made against them and that they have valid defenses thereto. The defenses enumerated by the Defendants include their contention that the claims of Plaintiffs and of members of the alleged class are barred by the applicable statute of limitations, that Plaintiffs lack standing to sue, and that any price stabilization resulted from natural and free market pressures resulting in lower price per unit costs and, as a result, purchasers have not been damaged.

Plaintiffs' attorney has made an investigation of the facts and the law relating to the matters involved in this action, and while discovery has not been entirely completed, Plaintiffs' attorney has inspected full and complete economic data relating to the Defendants' financial condition and operations. This information has been reviewed by expert analysis employed by Plaintiffs' attorney. After such review, Plaintiffs' attorney has considered the many sharply contested issues that will be involved, the risks attending further prosecution of this litigation (including questions concerning whether this suit could be maintained as a class action under Rule 23, Fed. R. Civ. P., the statute of limitations, the problems of proof as against each individual Defendant, and individual Plaintiffs' problems of proving actual damage for the period of the alleged conspiracy) and the likelihood that if a recovery were made in excess of the amount offered in settlement, the ability of one or more of the Defendants to continue in business would be jeopardized. Jeopardizing the ability of any of the Defendants to operate could result in a reduction of competition, an oligopoly in the business of bread products in the El Paso area and price leadership resulting in increased prices over the long run. As a result, Plaintiffs and their counsel have concluded that the benefits to be received pursuant to the proposed settlement of this case upon the terms provided herein are in the best interests of the Plaintiffs and the proposed class.

Defendants desire to settle and compromise the claims asserted against them in order to avoid the further substantial expenses and burden of protracted litigation, in order to avoid jeopardizing their financial condition, and to put this controversy to an end.

The preceding and subsequent description of the litigation and settlement is only a summary set forth in detail sufficient to permit you to decide what steps, if any, you wish to take with reference to this litigation. The pleadings, court orders and other documents regarding the suit are filed at the office of the Clerk of the United States District Court, Western District of Texas, El Paso Division, United States Courthouse, Room 108, El Paso, Texas, 79901, and are available for your inspection at that office. In addition, the attorney for the Plaintiffs will provide you with further information that you may request.

2. Claims. Unless you elect to be excluded from this action as hereinafter provided, this settlement, if consummated, shall bar any present or potential future claim under the anti-trust laws against Defendants, their assigns, subsidiaries, stockholders, officers, directors, partners, agents and employees, past and present, where such claims are based on sales of bread products made in the El Paso area by any person, directly or indirectly, to any person or entity from January 1, 1954 until January 1, 1976.

UNLESS YOU EXCLUDE YOURSELF FROM THIS SETTLEMENT, ALL CLAIMS BASED ON SALES OF BREAD PRODUCTS BETWEEN JANUARY 1, 1954, AND JANUARY 1, 1976, WILL BE BARRED, IF YOU ELECT TO PARTICIPATE IN THE SETTLEMENT, YOUR RECOVERY WILL BE BASED SOLELY UPON PURCHASES MADE BETWEEN JANUARY 1, 1954 AND JANUARY 1, 1976.

3. The Class. The Class will include all persons whomsoever who purchased, directly or indirectly, any

bread product between January 1, 1954 and January 1, 1976 from any of the Defendants, directly or indirectly, in the El Paso area. The words "person" or "persons" means, refers to and includes individuals, corporations, partnerships, trusts, firms, associations, and any and all other entities of whatever kind or character, and whether public or private, except for the United States of America or any agency of the United States Government. The term "bread products" means bread, rolls, buns, pies, cakes, sweetgoods and all other products produced, sold or distributed by any of the setting Defendants. The "El Paso area" refers to the following Texas counties: El Paso, Hudspeith and Culberson; and the following New Mexico counties: Dona Ana, Otero, Lincoln, Hidalgo, Grant, Sierra and Luna.

4. Settlement. In final settlement of all present and potential claims, including claims for costs and attorney's fees, against the Defendants and related persons (such as the Defendants' subsidiaries, directors, officers and employees) alleging violation of the anti-trust laws relating to sales made directly or indirectly to any person of bread products between January 1, 1954 and January 1, 1976, the Defendants have severally agreed to pay, when judgment becomes final, the total sum of \$510,000.00. That sum is to be paid in four payments as follows:

One-third within thirty (30) days of the date this proposed settlement is approved by a final judgment, and the balance in three successive, equal payments 180 days apart, commencing 180 days from the date of the first payment aforesaid.

Pursuant to the Plan of Distribution conditionally approved heretofore by order of the Court for the purpose of providing notice of the settlement and of the hearing for final approval thereof, the settlement shall be shared by all of the members of the class in the proportion which their claims during the period from January 1, 1954 to January 1, 1976 bear to the total claims of all claimants during this same period. Claims for purchases made between January 1, 1954 and December 31, 1969 and January 1, 1974 through January 1, 1976, will be allocated 10 percent of the value of claims for purchases made between January 1, 1970 and December 31, 1973.

Under the proposed Plan of Distribution, computation of purchases will be upon a "unit" basis, each package of bread products purchased shall constitute one unit, e.g., each loaf of bread, each package of rolls, etc., shall constitute one unit.

Claims may be made by reporting, without duplication, the number of bread product units purchased during each relevant year or by reporting the claimants' dollar purchases of all bread products for each relevant year.

Pursuant to the terms of the Settlement Agreement, the costs of administration of the Settlement Fund, the cost of this Notice, and the fees of Plaintiffs' counsel shall be paid from the Settlement Fund. Arthur Gochman, an attorney at law, is designated class counsel and is responsible for administration of this Settlement Fund, except as otherwise may be provided, and subject to supervision and further orders of this Court. The total amount of costs and attorney's fees is estimated to be approximately \$150,000.00.

Each member who does not elect to be excluded from this action as provided below shall be bound by the Plan of Distribution if it is finally approved by the Court.

5. Advantages and Disadvantages. As is true of most settlements, this Proposed Settlement has advantages and disadvantages to both the class members and the Defendants. Among the advantages which accrue to the class members are assured partial recoveries for all valid claims in the claim periods, payment within a reasonably and comparatively short period of time, significantly smaller costs of litigation, and minimum disruption of the

regular business functions of class members for the purpose of proof of damages. The primary disadvantage of participation in this settlement is that class members will forego the opportunity to establish Defendants' liability, if any, at trial and to prove and receive greater monetary damages than would be recovered pursuant to this settlement.

The factors which entered into the decision by Plaintiffs' counsel to recommend this settlement are:

a. The fact that any recovery in excess of the amount agreed upon, \$510,000.00, would jeopardize the ability of one or more of the Defendants to continue in full operation and to maintain the ability to be competitive in the area. Any reduction of competition in the El Paso area in the bakery industry would likely result in oligopoly, price leadership, and eventual price increases.

b. The difficulties in proving an anti-trust conspiracy action, both as to liability and damage. Counsel for Plaintiffs believe these difficulties of proof for the purchases made from January 1, 1954 to December 31, 1969 and from January 1, 1974 to January 1, 1976, are much more difficult and tenuous than between January 1, 1970, and December 31, 1973, and have thus recommended that the purchases made during those periods should be valued at 10 percent of the claims for purchases made between January 1, 1970 and December 31, 1973. Furthermore, counsel for Plaintiffs advise that they have no evidence of illegal conspiracy before January 1, 1954 or after January 1, 1976 and recommend that there be no recovery on claims made before January 1, 1954 or after January 1, 1976 and recommend that there be no recovery on claims made before January 1, 1954 or after January 1, 1976.

c. The time lapse between institution of litigation and final termination.

d. Problems relating to the statute of limitations.

e. Problems relating to proof that any price stabilization action among the Defendants resulted in prices being raised rather than lowered.

f. The fact that any class member not wishing to be bound by the settlement may exclude itself therefrom and, subject to applicable law, proceed on its own behalf.

6. Contingencies. This settlement is subject to the right of any settling Defendant to withdraw from the Settlement Agreement in the event that sufficient class members have requested exclusion and such exclusions are believed substantial by the Defendants. Also, the Court might not approve this settlement whether there are exclusions or not.

7. Hearing. Pursuant to an order of the United States District Court for the Western District of Texas, El Paso Division, dated April 29, 1976, a hearing will be held before the Honorable John H. Wood, Jr., United States District Judge in the United States District Courtroom of the United States Courthouse, El Paso, Texas on the 14th day of June, 1976, at 8:00 o'clock A.M., at which time the Court will consider whether the Settlement Class should be determined and ordered to be final and whether the Class Representatives shall be as provided in the Settlement Agreement; whether the Plan of Distribution submitted to the Court shall be approved; whether the settlement of this action in the manner and on the terms set forth in the Settlement Agreement shall be approved as fair, reasonable and adequate; whether the applications for attorney's fees and other expenses, which are expected to total approximately \$150,000.00, shall be approved; and whether the final judgments of dismissal with prejudice shall be entered against all settling Plaintiffs and members of the class who have not timely excluded themselves from these actions.

At that hearing, any member of the class who has not timely excluded himself from this action and who wishes to oppose the settlement of this action on the terms described herein and in the Settlement Agreement, or to oppose the

application for attorney's fees or other expenses, or to interpose any other opposition to the settlement or any of its terms, may present evidence or argument relevant to the issues, provided that any such member has filed and served a timely written notice of intention to appear, as described below.

NOW, THEREFORE, TAKE NOTICE:

1. Unless, on or before June 21, 1976, you file with the Clerk of this Court a request to be excluded from this action, you will be bound to look only to the Settlement Fund referred to above for relief as to any claims you may have against the Defendants for anti-trust violations in sales of bread products in the El Paso area by any person between January 1, 1954 and January 1, 1976. Should you decide to participate in the settlement without objection, the amount of your recovery will be based solely upon purchases made by you between January 1, 1954 and January 1, 1976. If you elect to be excluded from this action, you must file with the Clerk of this Court a request to be excluded substantially in the form of the "Election to be Excluded" shown below. If you send such a request, you cannot participate in this settlement, you will be excluded from the classes established, and will not be bound by any judgments entered herein.

2. If you do not elect to be excluded from this action, you will nevertheless be precluded from participating in this settlement unless you mail to the Clerk of the United States District Court for the Western District of Texas, United States Courthouse, Room 108, El Paso, Texas, 79901, not later than July 6, 1976, a sworn written statement of your claim using the form of "Statement of Claim" which appears below, or a substantially identical form. If additional copies of the form are desired, they may be obtained upon written request therefor to the Clerk of the Court, United States Courthouse, Room 108, El Paso, Texas, 79901.

3. If you are a member of the class and either do not (a) elect to be excluded on or before June 21, 1976, or (b) do not file a valid Statement of Claim on or before July 6, 1976, you will be barred from recovery in this settlement, you will be bound by the dismissal of this action if the Court approves this settlement, and you will not receive notice of any future proceedings, hearings, orders or other matters.

4. On June 14, 1976, at 8:00 o'clock A.M., a hearing pursuant to Rule 23(d) and (e), Fed. R. Civ. P., will be held before Judge John H. Wood, Jr. in the U.S. Courtroom, United States Courthouse, El Paso, Texas, at which time the Court will determine whether final approval of the class should be made and whether the settlement of this case on the terms set forth above should be approved. Any member of the class may, either by appearance or in writing, show cause why:

(a) The class should not be ordered to be a final and permanent class for purposes of the above numbered anti-trust action;

(b) The class counsel should not be as provided in the Settlement Agreement;

(c) The settlement of this action in the manner and on the terms set forth above, and in greater detail in the Settlement Agreement, should not be approved as fair, reasonable and adequate;

(d) The application for attorney's fees and other expenses should not be approved;

(e) Final judgment of dismissal with prejudice should not be entered against all Plaintiffs and members of the class who have not timely excluded themselves.

If you desire to appear at this hearing, you must file a written statement of your intention to do so. If you desire to appear through counsel, your counsel must file a notice of such intention in which the basis of your objection is stated. You are not required to appear, but may file your objection in writing.

And other papers must be filed with the Clerk of the United States District Court for the Western District of Texas, United States Courthouse, Room 108, El Paso, Texas, 79901, on or before June 7, 1976. Copies of

all such notices, objections or other papers must be served in person or by mail upon Plaintiffs' Representative Counsel, Arthur Gochman, Trust Building, San Antonio, Texas, 78205, and Defendants' Representative Counsel, Sam Sparks, Esq., P. O. Drawer 1977, El Paso, Texas, 79950.

5. Your Election to be Excluded from this action or, in the alternative, your Statement of Claim, should be addressed to: Clerk of the United States District Court

NOTICE OF CLASS ACTION AND PROPOSED SETTLEMENT IN CONNECTION WITH BREAD PRODUCTS

Pursuant to Rule 23, Fed. R. Civ. P., YOU ARE HEREBY NOTIFIED:

There is now pending in the United States District Court for the Western District of Texas, El Paso Division, the above styled and numbered cause brought by purchasers of bread products. This action is brought on behalf of persons and entities that have purchased bread products in the "El Paso area" between January 1, 1954 and January 1, 1976. The class, the products, and the geographical areas are defined more fully in Paragraph 3 herein.

The Plaintiffs allege that the Defendants, in violation of the anti-trust laws, engaged in a conspiracy to raise, fix, stabilize and maintain prices in the sale of bread products to Plaintiffs and to members of the alleged class. The Defendants deny the alleged violations.

The parties have agreed to settle all claims by all persons against any or all of the Defendants for alleged violations of the anti-trust laws relating to sales of bread products between January 1, 1954 and January 1, 1976, to any person or entity, whether direct or indirect. You may be a member of the class hereinafter defined and established by this Court for purposes of settlement. If so, your rights may be affected by the pendency of this action and the settlement described herein.

1. This Action. The above numbered action alleges in substance a conspiracy among the Defendants and others to raise, fix, stabilize and maintain prices and discounts at which bread products were sold by the Defendants bakers. The Plaintiffs allege that they and each alleged class member paid higher prices for bread products than they would have paid in the absence of the alleged conspiracy. The conspiracy is alleged to have begun as early as 1954, and its effect is alleged to have continued to at least December 31, 1975. Plaintiffs seek recovery of money damages for three times the amount of alleged overcharges on purchases by the Plaintiffs and by members of the class, together with recovery of counsel fees and costs.

made against them and that they have valid defenses thereto. The defenses enumerated by the Defendants include their contention that the claims of Plaintiffs and of members of the alleged class are barred by the applicable statute of limitations, that Plaintiffs lack standing to sue, and that any price stabilization resulted from natural and free market pressures resulting in lower price per unit costs and, as a result, purchasers have not been damaged.

Plaintiffs' attorney has made an investigation of the facts and the law relating to the matters involved in this action, and while discovery has not been entirely completed, Plaintiffs' attorney has inspected full and complete economic data relating to the Defendants' financial condition and operations. This information has been reviewed by expert analysis employed by Plaintiffs' attorney. After such review, Plaintiffs' attorney has considered the many sharply contested issues that will be involved, the risks attending further prosecution of this litigation (including questions concerning whether this suit could be maintained as a class action under Rule 23, Fed. R. Civ. P., the statute of limitations, the problems of proof as against each individual Defendant, and individual Plaintiffs' problems of proving actual damage for the period of the alleged conspiracy) and the likelihood that if a recovery were made in excess of the amount offered in settlement, the ability of one or more of the Defendants to continue in business would be jeopardized. Jeopardizing the ability of any of the Defendants to operate could result in a reduction of competition, an oligopoly in the business of bread products in the El Paso area and price leadership resulting in increased prices over the long run. As a result, Plaintiffs and their counsel have concluded that the benefits to be received pursuant to the proposed settlement of this case upon the terms provided herein are in the best interests of the Plaintiffs and the proposed class.

Defendants desire to settle and compromise the claims asserted against them in order to avoid the further substantial expenses and burden of protracted litigation, in order to avoid jeopardizing their financial condition, and to put this controversy to an end.

The preceding and subsequent description of the litigation and settlement is only a summary set forth in detail sufficient to permit you to decide what steps, if any, you wish to take with reference to this litigation. The pleadings, court orders and other documents regarding the suit are filed at the office of the Clerk of the United States District Court, Western District of Texas, El Paso Division, United States Courthouse, Room 108, El Paso, Texas, 79901, and are available for your inspection at that office. In addition, the attorney for the Plaintiffs will provide you with further information that you may request.

2. Claims. Unless you elect to be excluded from this action as hereinafter provided, this settlement, if consummated, shall bar any present or potential future claim under the anti-trust laws against Defendants, their assigns, subsidiaries, stockholders, officers, directors, partners, agents and employees, past and present, where such claims are based on sales of bread products made in the El Paso area by any person, directly or indirectly, to any person or entity from January 1, 1954 until January 1, 1976.

UNLESS YOU EXCLUDE YOURSELF FROM THIS SETTLEMENT, ALL CLAIMS BASED ON SALES OF BREAD PRODUCTS BETWEEN JANUARY 1, 1954, AND JANUARY 1, 1976, WILL BE BARRED. IF YOU ELECT TO PARTICIPATE IN THE SETTLEMENT, YOUR RECOVERY WILL BE BASED SOLELY UPON PURCHASES MADE BETWEEN JANUARY 1, 1954 AND JANUARY 1, 1976. 3. The Class. The Class will include all persons whomsoever who purchased, directly or indirectly, any

bread product between January 1, 1954 and January 1, 1976 from any of the Defendants, directly or indirectly, in the El Paso area. The words "person" or "persons" means, refers to and includes individuals, corporations, partnerships, trusts, firms, associations, and any and all other entities of whatever kind or character, and whether public or private, except for the United States of America or any agency of the United States Government. The term "bread products" means bread, rolls, buns, pies, cakes, sweetgoods and all other products produced, sold or distributed by any of the settling Defendants. The "El Paso area" refers to the following Texas counties: El Paso, Hudspeth and Culberson; and the following New Mexico counties: Dona Ana, Otero, Lincoln, Hidalgo, Grant, Sierra and Luna.

4. Settlement. In final settlement of all present and potential claims, including claims for costs and attorney's fees, against the Defendants and related persons (such as the Defendants' subsidiaries, directors, officers and employees) alleging violation of the anti-trust laws relating to sales made directly or indirectly to any person of bread products between January 1, 1954 and January 1, 1976, the Defendants have severally agreed to pay, when judgment becomes final, the total sum of \$510,000.00. That sum is to be paid in four payments as follows:

One-third within thirty (30) days of the date this proposed settlement is approved by a final judgment, and the balance in three successive, equal payments 180 days apart, commencing 180 days from the date of the first payment aforesaid.

Pursuant to the Plan of Distribution conditionally approved heretofore by order of the Court for the purpose of providing notice of the settlement and of the hearing for final approval thereof, the settlement shall be shared by all of the members of the class in the proportion which their claims during the period from January 1, 1954 to January 1, 1976 bear to the total claims of all claimants during this same period. Claims for purchases made between January 1, 1954 and December 31, 1969 and January 1, 1974 through January 1, 1976, will be allocated 10 percent of the value of claims for purchases made between January 1, 1970 and December 31, 1973.

Under the proposed Plan of Distribution, computation of purchases will be upon a "unit" basis, each package of bread products purchased shall constitute one unit, e.g., each loaf of bread, each package of rolls, etc., shall constitute one unit.

Claims may be made by reporting, without duplication, the number of bread product units purchased during each relevant year or by reporting the claimants' dollar purchases of all bread products for each relevant year.

Pursuant to the terms of the Settlement Agreement, the costs of administration of the Settlement Fund, the cost of this Notice, and the fees of Plaintiffs' counsel shall be paid from the Settlement Fund. Arthur Gochman, an attorney at law, is designated class counsel and is responsible for administration of this Settlement Fund, except as otherwise may be provided, and subject to supervision and further orders of this Court. The total amount of costs and attorney's fees is estimated to be approximately \$150,000.00.

Each member who does not elect to be excluded from this action as provided below shall be bound by the Plan of Distribution if it is finally approved by the Court.

5. Advantages and Disadvantages of the Proposed Settlement. As is true of most settlements, this Proposed Settlement has advantages and disadvantages to both the class members and the Defendants.

Among the advantages which accrue to the class members are assured partial recoveries for all valid claims in the claim periods, payment within a reasonably and comparatively short period of time, significantly smaller costs of litigation, and minimum disruption of the

regular business functions of class members for the purpose of proof of damages. The primary disadvantage of participation in this settlement is that class members will forego the opportunity to establish Defendants' liability, if any, at trial and to prove and receive greater monetary damages than would be recovered pursuant to this settlement.

The factors which entered into the decision by Plaintiffs' counsel to recommend this settlement are:

a. The fact that any recovery in excess of the amount agreed upon, \$510,000.00, would jeopardize the ability of one or more of the Defendants to continue in full operation and to maintain the ability to be competitive in the area. Any reduction of competition in the El Paso area in the bakery industry would likely result in oligopoly, price leadership, and eventual price increases.

b. The difficulties in proving an anti-trust conspiracy action, both as to liability and damage. Counsel for Plaintiffs believe these difficulties of proof for the purchases made from January 1, 1954 to December 31, 1969 and from January 1, 1974 to January 1, 1976, are much more difficult and tenuous than between January 1, 1970 and December 31, 1973, and have thus recommended that the purchases made during those periods should be valued at 10 percent of the claims for purchases made between January 1, 1970 and December 31, 1973. Furthermore, counsel for Plaintiffs advise that they have no evidence of illegal conspiracy before January 1, 1954 or after January 1, 1976 and recommend that there be no recovery on claims made before January 1, 1954 or after January 1, 1976 and recommend that there be no recovery on claims made before January 1, 1954 or after January 1, 1976.

c. The time lapse between institution of litigation and final termination.

d. Problems relating to the statute of limitations.

e. Problems relating to proof that any price stabilization action among the Defendants resulted in prices being raised rather than lowered.

f. The fact that any class member not wishing to be bound by the settlement may exclude itself therefrom and, subject to applicable law, proceed on its own behalf.

6. Contingencies. This settlement is subject to the right of any settling Defendant to withdraw from the Settlement Agreement in the event that sufficient class members have requested exclusion and such exclusions are believed substantial by the Defendants. Also, the Court might not approve this settlement whether there are exclusions or not.

7. Hearing. Pursuant to an order of the United States District Court for the Western District of Texas, El Paso Division, dated April 29, 1976, a hearing will be held before the Honorable John H. Wood, Jr., United States District Judge in the United States District Courtroom of the United States Courthouse, El Paso, Texas on the 14th day of June, 1976, at 8:00 o'clock A.M., at which time the Court will consider whether the Settlement Class should be determined and ordered to be final and whether the Class Representatives shall be as provided in the Settlement Agreement; whether the Plan of Distribution submitted to the Court shall be approved; whether the settlement of this action in the manner and on the terms set forth in the Settlement Agreement shall be approved as fair, reasonable and adequate; whether the applications for attorney's fees and other expenses, which are expected to total approximately \$150,000.00, shall be approved; and whether the final judgements of dismissal with prejudice shall be entered against all settling Plaintiffs and members of the class who have not timely excluded themselves from these actions.

At that hearing, any member of the class who has not timely excluded himself from this action and who wishes to oppose the settlement of this action on the terms described herein and in the Settlement Agreement, or to oppose the

application for attorney's fees or other expenses, or to interpose any other objection to the settlement or any of its terms, may present evidence or argument relevant to the issues, provided that any such member has filed and served a timely written notice of intention to appear, as described below.

NOW, THEREFORE, TAKE NOTICE:

1. Unless, on or before June 21, 1976, you file with the Clerk of this Court a request to be excluded from this action, you will be bound to look only to the Settlement Fund referred to above for relief as to any claims you may have against the Defendants for anti-trust violations in sales of bread products in the El Paso area by any person between January 1, 1954 and January 1, 1976. Should you decide to participate in the settlement without objection, the amount of your recovery will be based solely upon purchases made by you between January 1, 1954 and January 1, 1976. If you elect to be excluded from this action, you must file with the Clerk of this Court a request to be excluded substantially in the form of the "Election to be Excluded" shown below. If you send such a request, you cannot participate in this settlement; you will be excluded from the classes established, and will not be bound by any judgments entered herein.

2. If you do not elect to be excluded from this action, you will nevertheless be precluded from participating in this settlement unless you mail to the Clerk of the United States District Court for the Western District of Texas, United States Courthouse, Room 108, El Paso, Texas, 79901, not later than July 6, 1976, a sworn written statement of your claim using the form of "Statement of Claim" which appears below, or a substantially identical form. If additional copies of the form are desired, they may be obtained upon written request therefor to the Clerk of the Court, United States Courthouse, Room 108, El Paso, Texas, 79901.

3. If you are a member of the class and either do not (a) elect to be excluded on or before June 21, 1976, or (b) do not file a valid Statement of Claim on or before July 6, 1976, you will be barred from recovery in this settlement, you will be bound by the dismissal of this action if the Court approves this settlement, and you will not receive notice of any future proceedings, hearings, orders or other matters.

4. On June 14, 1976, at 8:00 o'clock A.M., a hearing pursuant to Rule 23(d) and (e), Fed. R. Civ. P., will be held before Judge John H. Wood, Jr. in the U.S. Courthouse, United States Courthouse, El Paso, Texas, at which time the Court will determine whether final approval of the class should be made and whether the settlement of this case on the terms set forth above should be approved. Any member of the class may, either by appearance or in writing, show cause why:

(a) The class should not be ordered to be a final and permanent class for purposes of the above numbered anti-trust action;

(b) The class counsel should not be as provided in the Settlement Agreement;

(c) The settlement of this action in the manner and on the terms set forth above, and in greater detail in the Settlement Agreement, should not be approved as fair, reasonable and adequate;

(d) The application for attorney's fees and other expenses should not be approved;

(e) Final judgment of dismissal with prejudice should not be entered against all Plaintiffs and members of the class who have not timely excluded themselves.

If you desire to appear at this hearing, you must file a written statement of your intention to do so. If you desire to appear through counsel, your counsel must file a notice of such intention in which the basis of your objection is stated. You are not required to appear, but may file your objection in writing.

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
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
