## Carrizozo looks for Mayor

Carrizozo's Mayor Bud Payne decided the town problems were too much for him and the "help wanted" sign was up at city hall again after only five weeks.

Corona is also looking for a mayor but that town's situation is considerably different. Mayor Ken Fuller's resignation took effect last Thursday. He leaves the town in good financial shape although there are long range problems with water and sewer updating to be done.

Lee Mulkey was appointed mayor pro tem at the Corona Board meeting and told to sign the checks. Mulkey will be asked to take the Mayor's job at the next meeting Thursday but he may be hard to persuade.

In Carrizozo, Mayor Payne opened the meeting with an announcement of his resignation and Mayor pro tem Manny Hernandez closed the meeting with a not too farcical request that the News do a little free advertising for a mayor.

Payne said that he was resigning because he felt there were illegalities going on in which he could not participate as mayor. His letter of resignation read:

recommended that all, except emergency, expenditures be halted until the review is completed. Macias spent time with the trustees determining what bills could be paid and what bills would have to wait.

The resignation of Gene Baker as relief officer was accepted. Dave Vermillion, James McSwane are now assisting Chief Choncho Morales.

Bill Gomez of the New Mexico Extension Service was present to announce a \$5000 grant by the Bureau of

Recreation for playground and picnic equipment in Carrizozo's four parks. The project will cost the town no money, its share being the labor involved.

The equipment will go in Spider Park, Spencer Park, The Recreation Complex and perhaps Fred Chavez Park.

Problems with the Industrial Park were discussed following a letter from the Department of Commerce regarding proposed changes in the proposal.

The feds refused to proceed with the project until certain matters are

cleared. Most of the delays are being caused by technical problems which come under the responsibility of the project engineers.

Evidently there have been lags in paper work from the engineers to the government. Of concern, according to Bill Payne who has been asked to expedite the park, are some changes in the overall plan. Cost of construction caused the town to ask that modification be made in the water, drainage and paving. The town is

## Big "C" three sweep grid

Carrizozo, Capitan and Corona all put on their winning suits Friday night and made the hometown folks happy.

It was winning night in all three towns and forecasted a heated district contest ahead for Carrizozo and Capitan.

The Carrizozo team took Animas 41 to 12 in a game that showed good team effort but sounded like a Ray Beltran solo match. Capitan smeared Quemado 57 to 0 even playing mostly subs all the way through the second half.

Corona had a cliff hanger bringing home the bacon in the final minutes for 27 to 20 victory over Mountainair. (More stories and pictures inside) Friday-the-three teams will be playing out of town: Capitan at Hagerman, Carrizozo at Hatch and Corona at Roy in games that are called evenly matched for the most part.

At Carrizozo Friday, Ray Beltran took the ball on the first play and ran 70 yards for the first score and after that the Zozo defense hardly got any first half practice.

Beltran missed the extra point kick but made up for it a few minutes later with a three yard run over the goal line for another six pointer. This time he kicked the extra point.

Animas had little chance to get the pigskin warm when Jim Owens recovered a fumble on the 10 yard line. Eddie Lueras carried the ball on over the line for another six. Beltran kicked the extra point to end the first quarter 20 to 0.

In the second quarter Jimmy Samora threw a 43 yard pass into the willing arms of Danny Sandoval who headed for pay dirt. Beltran kicked the ball and the first half ended 20 to 0.

Midway into the third period Eddie Lueras bolted three yards at the end of a drive to make another mark. The team ran for an extra two but missed.

Animas took advantage of Zozo's second string defense to turn a 30 yard pass into the money. They missed the extra point but were on the board with six, bringing the end of the third to 33 to 6.

In the fourth Beltran moved seven yards for another score and Samora capped it with a run for an extra, two points to make the Grizzly's 41 total.

Animas got on the board again in another pass play, this time for 35 yards. The kick was missed and the game ended 41 to 12.

## Palomarez resigns board

Nat Palomarez announced his resignation from the Carrizozo School Board Tuesday at the regular meeting. A new member will be appointed in the next school board meeting.

With only five months of his term left, Palomarez resigned so that his wife could accept an appointment as a teachers aide.

The participation of girls in football and boys in basketball got a full discussion from the administration, coaches, Title 9 advisor and the board.

After considering all the questions and laws involved the board decided to table any action on the difficult problem of integrated sports.

The problem arose when Lisa Crenshaw turned out for junior high football. Lisa has been practicing with the boys and the administration asked

the board if they wanted to set a policy on the participation of girls in contact sports as allowed by federal and state rules. The rules also leave it up to individual schools as to participation of boys on girls volley ball teams.

Coach Henry Paul and Jetty Jo Paul, school counselor, were present to discuss the issue. Paul said he had told the parents of Lisa that he would expect one of them to be present at every game that Lisa played. He said Lisa had been fully advised of the difficulties and dangers of participation but seemed determined to play.

Although the law is somewhat involved and confusing, it was the consensus of opinion that girls participation in contact sports was subject to school board policy. Also, according to Superintendent Jim Steinepreis, the athletic department expect some request from boys to play girls volleyball. It was noted that last year in the midwest a girls volleyball championship was won by a boys team.

The law seems to indicate that boys may be denied participation in girls sports where the participation would be detrimental to the girls efforts. The seemingly pro-female emphasis is felt to be an effort to equalize sport opportunities for girls.

On motion of Bob Stearns, seconded by Nat Palomarez, the matter of policy was tabled and the program will continue as it is. Any problems will be considered at a later date. Lisa will be allowed to participate if she desires.

Principal Larry Wilkinson reported that the \$542 gate at the Friday game was the largest in three years. Wilkinson also reviewed the curriculum and enrollment for the year. At the end of last year there were 367 students and 20 in preschool. This year there are 368 and 29 in kindergarten.

A special reading program begins this year, the principal said. The program has 14 levels and will cover grades one thru eight. He noted that in the 1930's highschool students read an average of 500 books while now 50 books seemed the average. It is hoped that the new program will encourage and improve reading levels. More will be reported later.

The board approved the lease purchase of a used computer and the school participation in an American Legion Oratory Contest.

Victor Simeros presented the request for the competition which is sponsored by the local chapter.

The new administration building will be dedicated in late October.

## Lincoln has new forester

The appointment of James R. Abbott as Supervisor of the Lincoln National Forest headquartered at Alamogordo was announced today by Southwestern Regional Forester M.J. Hassell.

Abbott, who will take the new post September 28, is with the Forest Service's fire management staff in Washington. He succeeds John Haterson.

Following graduation from Washington State University with a forestry degree in 1959, Abbott was assigned to the Kaniku National Forest in northern Idaho. Later he served in District Ranger posts and Forest staff positions in Idaho and South Dakota where he gained wide experience in fire management. He became National Fire Training and Safety Officer in Washington in 1973.

Abbott and his wife, Janice, have two sons, Bruce, 13, and Gregg, 11.

## College to open

The Carrizozo Community College will register students for credit courses Monday, Sept. 20 between 7 and 7 p.m. in the school administration building.

There are four courses being offered for college credit this year. They are Beginning Speech, Freshman English, College Algebra and Beginning Accounting.

Registration for non credit courses will be announced later. Teachers for the college are still needed.

Being born and raised in the County of Lincoln, I will continue to be an active citizen of the Town and take part in most activities, especially the ambulance service, which I was instrumental in activating. The County has contributed over \$30,000, to the ambulance service, and the town has not contributed any money.

I would like to have the Town of Carrizozo call a special election; vote the next mayor in and also the 1/4 cent tax allowed.

Payne said that he felt he had initiated investigations into the town's financial conditions that would eventually result in a solution to the more than \$15,000 deficit but that he had friends involved in the problems and could not freely do the job of mayor.

The former mayor was dissatisfied with the ordinance governing the Recreation Committee and the Composition of the committee. He had written letters asking for the resignation of all committee members and planned to appoint a new group.

The mayor was also concerned about the future of the garbage system, fire department purchases and had been criticized for his part in a clean up program initiated by the Carrizozo Women's Club.

A special meeting had been called for September 23 to consider a new recreation ordinance, an ordinance governing barking dogs and two 1/4 cent gross receipt tax increases.


The trustees, following Payne's resignation, indicated that they would not pass the recreation ordinance and asked that members of the recreation committee continue in office. The committee was commended for its work and praise was given for the condition of the golf course. Golf Course manager Henry Vega, Dr. and Mrs. A.N. Spencer whose support funds the recreation program, and members of the committee were present.

The ordinance along with the other three will be considered on the 23rd special meeting but it seems evident that it will not be passed. Comments by the council indicated that members felt the present ordinance is all that is needed.

On hand for the meeting were Jim Macias of the New Mexican Department of Local Government. That office has been reviewing the Carrizozo financial condition and has

## Stoneman is indicted

Sam Stoneman will be arraigned Tuesday Sept. 21 at 1:30 in Magistrate Bill Payne's court.

The former New Mexico Livestock Board inspector was indicted Monday by a Lincoln County grand jury on three counts of larceny of livestock.

Stoneman's indictment on two counts involved larceny of livestock of cattle stolen from Mr. and Mrs. Donn Dose, and a third count of larceny of livestock from the Harvey Cattle Company. Pat Kennedy, assistant district attorney for the 12th Judicial District, said the charge is a third degree felony and is punishable by two to 10 years in prison and \$5,000 fine, or both, on each count, upon conviction.

All county candidates will be present: Paul Pacheco, candidate for Commissioner District 1, James Wheeler, candidate for District Magistrate Division 3, Jane McSwane, candidate for County Clerk, Flora Vega, candidate for County Treasurer, Marian Schlarb, candidate for County Assessor, Ernest Sanchez, candidate for County Sheriff, Kenneth Nosker, candidate for Probate Judge, Tom Sandenaw, candidate for District Judge Division 12, will be in attendance.

The art show is for Lincoln County school children from the first to sixth grades and the theme for the art is "A Lincoln County Poster". Leota Pfingsten is in charge of the art show. Ribbons will be awarded on the Danish system with every entry receiving a ribbon. Ralph Forsythe has agreed to have a gold panning booth with buckets of the soil from the Nogal area for people to use. This area has gold particles in the soil. Many booths featuring the arts and crafts of the area will be featured at this event. Plan to attend the last Bicentennial Arts and Crafts show of the year in Lincoln County.

## Apple goodies

Here are some delicious sounding recipes.....

### Apple Relish Salad

- 2 avocados
  - 4 red apples
  - 1 cucumber
  - 2 medium onions
  - 1/2 cup diced celery
  - Yogurt Dressing
- Peel stone and slice avocados; core and slice apples without paring them. Score and slice cucumber, without peeling it. Slice onions; separate into rings. Combine all ingredients except dressing. Serve as a first course, topped with dressing. Makes 8 servings.

### Yogurt Dressing

- 1/2 pint Yogurt
  - 1/4 cup French dressing
  - 1 teaspoon celery seed
- Combine all ingredients, garnish with additional celery seed if desired.

### Topsy Turvy Apple Pecan Pie

- 1/4 cup softened butter or margarine
  - 1/2 cup pecan halves
  - 2-3 cup finely-packed brown-sugar
  - pastry for two crust pie
  - 6 cups sliced tart apples - (about 2 1/2 lbs.)
  - 2 tablespoons lemon juice
  - 1 tablespoon flour
  - 1/2 cup sugar
  - 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
  - 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
  - 1/4 teaspoon salt
- Spread softened butter evenly on bottom and sides of 9 inch pie pan. Press pecan halves, rounded side down, into butter. Pat brown sugar evenly over pecans. Roll out enough pastry for 1 crust, place in pie pan over sugar; trim, leaving 1/2 inch overhang. Combine remaining ingredients; pour into pie pan, keeping top level. Top with remaining pastry; trim even with bottom crust; fold edges together, flush with rim; flute. Prick top of pie with fork. Bake in hot oven, 450, 10 minutes; reduce heat to moderate, 350; bake 30 to 45 minutes longer, or until apples are tender. Remove from oven. When syrup in pan stops bubbling, place serving plate over pie; invert. Carefully remove pie pan. Serve hot.

- Apple Cream
- Fold together equal quantities applesauce and whipped cream. Top with chopped nuts.

- Strawberry Surprise
- Defrost 1 package quick-frozen strawberries. Add 1 cup diced apple. Top with dairy sour cream and a sprinkle of nutmeg.

## American Legion attends school


A group from Lincoln County attended the American Legion and Auxiliary school of instruction at the Alamogordo Holiday Inn Sept. 11.

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

We decided that Billy Stephenson could solve the problem and he very kindly drove into town with a truck suitable for moving sheep.

We have more and bigger problems in these parts and perhaps in the near future when the walking wounded are all back in shape I will tell you the story of the Carrizozo Wheat Field War, a saga that will replace the Lincoln County Wars in future history.

## Questions about swine influenza

Should I be immunized against swine flu?

This is the question many New Mexico residents are asking themselves today.

To aid them in making a wise decision, the state's Health and Social Services Department has compiled this group of questions and answers about the "swine" type of influenza.

A: What is "swine flu"?

A: In 1918-19, an influenza virus caused a worldwide epidemic. In the United States alone, more than 500,000 persons died of influenza or its complications. Within a few years, however, this particular strain of virus disappeared from humans and was found only in swine - hence the name, "swine influenza." Then, last winter, an outbreak of influenza at Fort Dix was found to be caused by the "swine flu" virus. About 500 cases were recorded, one of which resulted death.

Q: Can we be sure there will be an epidemic this winter?

A: No. But if one does occur, the death rate could be appalling.

Q: How is swine flu different from regular flu?

A: Influenza - popularly called flu - is a disease caused by a virus. There are several strains of this virus. The swine flu, as it occurred in 1918-19, was a particularly severe type and had a greater tendency to cause complications, including pneumonia or death.

Q: Is influenza a dangerous disease?

A: Yes. Although mild in most persons, even the mildest strain of influenza can cause a number of complications. Most common of these is pneumonia, which may be fatal, especially in the elderly and chronically ill. The Asian flu was blamed for about 80,000 deaths in this country in 1957-58 and the Hong Kong variety for about 40,000 deaths in 1968-69. Swine flu was blamed for about 500,000 deaths in 1918-19.

Q: Who is "high risk" from influenza?

A: Several groups in the population have been found to be more susceptible than others to influenza and its complications, and have a higher death rate from them. These include persons aged 65 or older, persons with heart disease of any type and persons with a number of chronic diseases, including lung disease, diabetes, kidney disease and cancer.

Q: Why should I be immunized?

A: The purpose of any immunization is to protect the person against a specific disease. To protect as many people as possible against the swine flu, the state's Health and Social Services Department will conduct a massive immunization campaign this fall.

Q: Should all persons be immunized?

A: No. Since the vaccine is produced in eggs, persons with an allergy to eggs should not be given the vaccine. Neither should young children.

Q: How effective is the vaccine?

A: The field trials found persons 24 years of age and older had an 80 to 85 percent level of antibody protection against the swine flu after vaccination. Vaccinated persons who do develop influenza tend to have the disease in a milder form than if they had not been immunized.

Q: Are there "side effects" from the vaccine?

A: Some individuals experience mild side effects. But there is no danger of contracting the disease from the vaccine since it does not contain the live virus. A small percentage of persons - 1 to 4 percent in the field tests - develop a mild fever of short duration. Tenderness and a mild swelling in the arm occur more frequently and are related to the "shot" in the arm. For many of the free immunization clinics, however, a "Jet" injector will be used. This injector sprays a mist of vaccine through the skin. Sometimes a burning sensation will be felt for a few minutes after the vaccine has been sprayed into the arm.

Q: How much does immunization cost?

A: The vaccine is being furnished free of charge by the federal government. Immunization will be free at county health offices and the clinics. Private physicians will make a small charge for administering the vaccine.

Q: Where can a person be immunized?

A: A person can be immunized by his private physician, at county health offices or at special clinics which will be set up in a number of locations in all areas of the state. Times for

vaccinations at the health offices will be announced, as will times and places of the special clinics.

Q: When can I be immunized?

A: Special vaccine for "high risk" persons should be available in early September; that for other persons two or three weeks later.

Q: Who do I call for more information?

A: Your private physician or county health office.

## Eastern Fair

The Eastern New Mexico State Fair Junior Livestock Show this year will be a terminal show; for the first time in the fair's history.

This means that junior livestock shown in the show - except for breeding animals, sheep, poultry and rabbits - will be sold to the packer. A carcass contest will be conducted in the steer division.

The main reason for this is to educate youngsters who place the animals in the show. Grading information on steers from the packers will be given to county agents and vocation agriculture teachers to pass on to the young showmen.

Bill Thompson, Chaves County agent, said the fact that this year's show is a

terminal show should help obtain higher packer bids on the market livestock entered in the show.

In addition, market steers will be shown only by weight classes, and not by breed, the county agent said.

He said the Eastern New Mexico State Fair Junior Livestock Show - the biggest in New Mexico in 1975 - is the first in the state to conduct a terminal show and show steers by weight classes only.

"It's more practical and educational for the kids," Thompson said. "They can pick a good calf to show rather than raise a show animal."

"It also will give them a more practical knowledge of the cattle industry," he added.

Thompson explained that the show is more practical because "packers use a similar system when they buy."

He said cattle were chosen for the carcass show this year, but added that he hopes the carcass show will eventually include swine and sheep.

Among the items carcass judges will be looking for in the terminal show are:

- Amount of fat over ribeye.
- Carcass weight.
- Ribeye area size relative to weight.
- Carcass quality.
- Yield grade.

Thompson said that livestock for the show is due at the Eastern New Mexico State Fairgrounds by 8 a.m. Sept. 26 - one day earlier than during past fairs.

This year's Eastern New Mexico State Fair will begin on Sept. 28 and will continue through Oct. 2.

**Grazing contracts to be awarded**

Grazing contracts for 241,000 acres of military withdrawn land on McGregor Range will be awarded to highest bidders September 28.

Eleven grazing units ranging from 8,000 to 39,000 acres will be offered for grazing use by the Las Cruces District Office of the Bureau of Land Management.

Bob Calkins, Area Manager for the White Sands Resource Area, stated that a "show me" trip of the units to be offered will be held on September 17, beginning at the junction of U.S. Highway 54 with State Highway 506, 12 miles north of Orogrande, N.M. The inspection trip will start at 8 a.m. and last all day. Travel is recommended by pick-up. Prospective bidders are urged to make the inspection.

The number of cattle allowed per individual grazing unit will be from 250 to 850 head. The grazing period on the various units will be from 7 1/2 to 9 months. Grazing use will begin between the 16th and 30th of October for the various units. The 11 units this year will support approximately 4,625 cattle. Two units (16S, and 20) will be contracted this year for a three grazing season period.



## Scientists research whale suicides

Despite growing efforts to "Save the Whales," some whales seem bent on self-destruction.

Thirty false killer whales beached themselves on Florida's Loggerhead Key late in July, the third mass stranding of whales on Florida beaches in less than a month.

In each case, scientists and rescue workers saved most of the big animals by passing lines around them and towing them free with power boats. Often Are Stranded

Strandings of pilot whales and false killer whales, as well as porpoises and dolphins, are fairly common, the National Geographic Society says. The animals' suicidal behavior remains a puzzle to scientists.

Belated recognition that too little is known about the world's largest living creatures helped launch international campaigns to protect the decimated herds and spurred a relatively new science: cetology, the study of whales.

A full report on the progress of conservationists and some of the surprising discoveries of cetologists is being prepared for the December 1976 issue of National Geographic.

Although today the smaller, toothed whales most frequently run aground, in previous centuries when the larger whales were more numerous they occasionally beached themselves and died by the dozens.

Records show that in 1784 a herd of 32 sperm whales dashed headlong onto a beach in France. As a fully grown sperm whale is from 40 to 80 feet long and can weigh up to 100,000 pounds there was no way of pulling them free and all the animals died.

In recent years, there have been scores of reports of whales who seemed determined to die. In 1970 some 200 pygmy whales grounded along an eight-mile stretch of the Florida coast. Towed out to sea, they promptly swam ashore again.

The following year, 47 pilot whales did the same thing. In both cases, some of the stranded animals rolled upon their backs, blocking their blowholes and suffocating.

### Wrong Direction

But researchers are not convinced the animals are acting out a death wish. One theory holds that a herd of feeding whales pursuing a school of fish into shallow water may neglect to veer off, and find itself high and dry.

In one instance, an 80-ton fin whale chasing a school of herring rushed through a narrow inlet into a pond near Burgeo, Newfoundland, a few years ago and was trapped by the falling tide.

For days a second whale, presumably the animal's mate, remained nearby & herded more fish into the pond to sustain the trapped animal. But before the next month's flood tide could free the whale, it was killed by "sportsmen" who daily lined the shore and fired hundred of bullets into it.

However, the theory that whales may beach themselves through carelessness does not explain why freed animals sometimes swim directly back onto the shore.

Cetologists who examined the inner ear of one of the victims of this summer's strandings found it was infested with nematodes, or round worms. They speculated that the parasites could have damaged the whale's navigational organs, causing the animal accidentally to lead the rest of the herd aground.

But not enough is yet known about whales' physiology, or blood and body chemistry, to provide a positive answer for their erratic behavior. Researchers would need to study tissue from healthy as well as sick whales, to provide a basis for comparison.

### Autopsies Reveal Parasites

Autopsies of pygmy sperm whales, pilot whales, and a dolphin have disclosed "Heavy infestations of parasitic nematodes in the air sinuses," reports the Smithsonian Institution's Marine Mammal Division.

But the scientists add that this could prove to be a normal condition for the marine animals and there is evidence that "such parasitic loads are commonly carried by unstranded narwhals and porpoises."

Cetologists are still seeking the reason why whales that easily navigate the world's oceans swim ashore.

Meanwhile, wherever the animals are found stranded, volunteers will continue to play water over them to keep their skin from cracking under the unaccustomed exposure to the sun—and try to haul them back to the safety of their own element.

## Carrizozo looks for Mayor

unable to go beyond the bonding already authorized and thus far, estimates indicate that the original plans would cost considerable more money than is available.

The federal authorities refused a request to eliminate paving of an access street from Highway 380 into the complex. The government and the town will attempt to solve the problems in the next few weeks. Bill Gomez and Bill Payne will be assisting.

Jessie English, chairman of the advisory committee appointed to look into town problems, reported on his group's initial work.

English said it would be impossible to make a comprehensive report until the state had completed its investigation. English had obviously done an

intensive study of utility rates here and in neighboring towns. He had looked into the Carrizozo broken meter problem and said that of the 457 meters in the town, 48 were inoperable and customers were paying minimum bills.

That there is at present 457 water meters being billed each month, of these 48 are being billed the minimum. An additional 10 bills are being billed for sewer and garbage only. By actual count there is 527 houses with persons living in them and using utilities. The committee feels that a door to door check should be made to see if utilities are being paid on these.

The problem of broken and covered water meters was discussed. The meters that are covered with dirt can not be read and this can easily be corrected by cleaning them out. The ones that are broken should be repaired or replaced at earliest date possible. This includes the main meter at the treatment plant. Also the parks served by the town should be metered. On broken water meters statements should be checked for the past year (if they have not been broken that long) and take the average to use as the amount of water used. Recommend the council take action to correct this as soon as possible.

Emilio Beltran, town foreman, said that already about half of the meters had been repaired and the others were being worked on.

The problem of deliberately broken meters and the solution of that were discussed. There is legal recourse available to the city and a bill averaging policy will be initiated in these cases.

English said that rate increases on all utilities would probably be needed. For water sewer and garbage, Carrizozo pays at \$8.25 minimum as compared to \$10.50 in Capitan and Ruidoso. More information is needed, he said, before a final recommendation can be made.

Bill Payne said that Joe West has sold the cable TV company to a party who wished to be unnamed. His office is accepting payment of cable bills.

If the people will send in their regular cable TV fees to Paynes office, he will see that the cable expenses are met. He reported that the new cable company was proceeding with its construction and that service could be continued until that was completed if cable subscribers continued to pay for service.


