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## County investments show big earnings

Other counties may not be handling their revenue to the fullest investment advantage, but Lincoln County is way ahead.

In a report to the County Commissioners Tuesday, the County Treasurer Veta Allen wrote:

In a recent press statement to Fred Buckles, Al Romero, Chief of Department of Finance and Administration, accused all County Treasurers of losing New Mexicans up to \$3.36 million per year by not properly investing property tax revenue. This statement does not apply to Lincoln County.

Since taking office in January of 1975 we have earned for Lincoln County \$90,028.36 for an 18 month period, ending June 30, 1976. This with a modest projection for the final 6 months will produce revenue in 2 years of more than the entire earnings for the previous 5 years. And this has been realized with interest rates extremely low.

Fiscal year prior to my term showed earnings of \$21,119.16. Earnings during my term of office: 1st 6 months 26,511.61, 1st full fiscal year 63,516.75. Representing more than 3 times the previous earnings. These figures are a matter of public record and speak for themselves.

## \$190 million ag program opens

Bill Trammell, County Executive Director for the Lincoln County ASC Committee today announced a \$190 million 1977 Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) to be activated October 1 in all U.S. Agricultural Counties.

Farmer-elected county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committees have full authority in identifying critical farm conservation problems and developing local plans for solving them on a priority basis.

According to a State ASC Committeeman Kenneth Sweetser of Deming, the delegation of authority to county ASC committees places decision-making in the hands of local farmers who are in the best possible position to evaluate local conservation needs and priorities. "We are pleased with the past performance of the ASC committees and are sure that they will continue to provide good service to farmers," Sweetser said.

ACP provides up to 75 percent of the cost of carrying out approved soil, water and woodland conservation practices. All approved practices in effect under the 1970 National ACP are eligible.

Trammell also announced the 1977 funding for the Forestry Incentive Program (FIP) at the \$15 million level authorized by Congress. FIP is designed to increase the production of timber products on small, private timber tracts and will be available in most states in specifically designated counties, with high resource potential for increased timber production.

ACP and FIP are administered by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service Office (ASCS).

## Capitan kindergarten

The Capitan Schools Kindergarten Program will begin January 27, 1977 and run for sixteen weeks.

Children who are five years of age and will be six prior to Sept. 1, 1977 will be eligible for the Program. The school needs a pre-enrollment count. The Lincoln County Sheriff reports that David E. Swift, 21, has been arrested on charges of contributing to the delinquency of a minor. He has been released on bond.

Carrizozo went to Hatch and came home still unmarked. Hatch made six turnovers and that was all she wrote.

In the first quarter it was a defensive effort from both teams that held the period scoreless.

About mid way into the 2nd, the Grizzlies got moving and Eddie Lueras scored on a ten-yard run. The team ran for the extra two and missed.

The first half ended 6 to 0. In the third quarter Danny Sandoval took a pass from Jimmy Samora and made it pay. Ray Beltran kicked the extra point.

In the fourth the defense took over again and Hatch's one good drive was stopped on the 20 yard line.

Ray Beltran once again showed top rank offensive quality but it was an aggressive Carrizozo defense that partners with the ball carriers.

Danny Sandoval intercepted two passes, one in the third period and one in the fourth.

## Hunting season opens

Already special hunts are underway for Lincoln County's abundant crop of game animals. The bow hunters get the first chance and are followed by muzzle loaders and special permits.

Open seasons are again stratified for trophy sized deer running concurrent with bear, turkey and cougar seasons. Hunters may have a go at the game,

choosing one and only one of three periods: Nov. 6 thru Nov. 7, Nov. 9 thru Nov. 14, Nov. 13 thru Nov. 21.

Hunters are reminded that while much of Lincoln County's best hunting is in the National Forests and open to the public, there are cattle grazing in many areas.

Private lands must be respected and

all care with the public lands must be exercised. Above all, please see what you shoot at. A moving blur may be a person not a deer.

At the request of many readers, here are some of the rules and regulations. Complete information is available by writing to the New Mexico Fish and Game Department, Santa Fe, New Mexico 87503.

## Stratification of Deer Seasons, & of Concurrent Bear, Turkey, & Cougar Seasons

### RESTRICTION OF HUNTERS TO HUNT PERIODS WITHIN FRAMEWORK OF OPEN SEASONS

With two exceptions, anyone hunting during the period Nov. 6 thru Nov. 21 will be restricted to hunting in certain more limited periods within those season dates. The hunter may choose one, and only one, of the following hunt periods:

A-One	Nov. 6 thru Nov. 7
A-Two	Nov. 9 thru Nov. 21
A-Three	Nov. 13 thru Nov. 21

The following licenses will be validated for a hunt period by the license vendor at the time of issue: resident big game, nonresident big game, resident general hunting, resident general hunting and fishing, nonresident deer bowhunting. The vendor will record on the license the hunt period code and dates chosen by the licensee. With the two exceptions, during the period Nov. 6 thru Nov. 21, this validated, stratified license is valid only during the hunt period marked on the license.

During the period Nov. 6-21, it is unlawful to hunt deer, bear or turkey with an unvalidated license, except on Indian reservations or in Entry-permit Area E-4.

Even if you do not plan to hunt during the period Nov. 6-21, your license must be validated for a hunt period. You might later change your mind and hunt during the stratified season after all. For the same reason, your license must be validated for a hunt period even if you plan to hunt only on an Indian reservation or in the E-4 entry-permit season. Your stratified license remains valid all days of the open seasons on Indian reservations and in Area E-4.

More than one deer license? Some hunters have wondered if they could not hunt in more than one hunt period by buying a separate deer license for each hunt period. State law makes it a misdemeanor to buy or use more than one license to hunt each big-game species in one year. (For two-deer seasons, the additional-deer license is used. No two-deer hunts are expected to be set for 1976 except on certain Indian reservations.)

### CHANGE YOUR MIND?

If you change your mind and want to hunt in a hunt period other than the one already marked on your license, your license may be changed to accommodate this. You must do this, however, no later than Nov. 5, 1976. In addition, all such changes must be made only by Game Department personnel or at Game Department offices with the use of special Game Department validation stamps.

### BEAR, TURKEY, OR SQUIRREL HUNTING WITH STRATIFIED LICENSES

From Nov. 6 thru Nov. 21, stratified licenses are valid for hunting bear or turkey, as well as deer, only during the hunt period marked on the license. Exceptions: Stratified licenses are valid on any open-season dates on Indian reservations and for deer in Area E-4.

Before Nov. 6 and after Nov. 21, stratified licenses are valid during any open season for the species covered by the license, whether deer, bear, turkey, or squirrel. Squirrel season dates fall outside the period Nov. 6-21.

### COUGAR HUNTING AND STRATIFIED SEASONS

Anyone hunting cougar in an open cougar area during the period Nov. 6 thru Nov. 21 shall have in his possession, while hunting, both a valid cougar license and a validated, stratified, deer license. From Nov. 6 thru Nov. 21, the person so licensed may hunt cougar only during the hunt period marked on his deer license.

Anyone who hunts for protected game must have a license, regardless of age. All nonresidents must be licensed, even for hunting unprotected (non-game) species.

The mother of the bride wore an old fashioned long cream gown with a high neck line featuring a wide ecru lace. Her flowers were blue carnations.


The bridegroom's mother wore a dark blue two piece dress and yellow carnations.

We might entitle it the Carrizozo Wheatfield War with assurances that any resemblance to the Milagro Beanfield War is purely accidental.

I do not believe that the Wheatfield War was caused by Carrizozo intellectuals reading the "Milagro Beanfield War" by John Nichols. However, the interesting time connections between the two Wars (fact and fiction) might at some time arouse a certain type of bookburning investigation.

Therefore, while the facts are still fresh and the fires of the war still smolder, I will attempt to disclose the beginnings of the war, a description of the principle battle, the outcome as near as can be determined.

Once again, any connection between the Beanfield War and the Wheatfield War has to be of a psychic nature rather than a physical one.

Reading was the initial cause of it all. Editor of your paper whose duties include reading a waste basket full of press releases daily (which is the resting place of most) happened across an announcement about fund available for communities who wanted to celebrate the Bicentennial but were poverty stricken.

Carrizozo seemed a possible fit for such funding.

So on a cold November morning, in the offices of the Lincoln County News, an idea was germinated. Little did the unsuspecting solitary participant in this sprouting dream that it would, someday become the County of the Carrizozo Wheatfield War.

We asked the County Commission to sponsor some kind of Bicentennial celebration. Those three gentlemen agreed and in due time a Bicentennial committee was formed, met and made decisions.

It was all very peaceful, filled with good will toward men and women and absolutely well intentioned.

In order to get funds from states and federal bodies you must have a program. It is best if the program has a title that is high sounding.

We presented the proper state committee with a Bicentennial undertaking called "People's Market Places".

All of you out there by now are familiar with the people's markets that took place in each community this summer and end with the October Apple Festival in Old Lincoln.

In Carrizozo, the Carrizozo Woman's Club was initiating sponsor of the day of fun and fiesta and fair. We planned to use the Woman's building for arts and crafts but we needed an outdoor space for food, animals, fiddling and other kinds of fun. The big vacant lots across from the building seemed perfect.

It could be perfect we thought, if the weeds were cleared off, the debris removed, the holes filled, etc.

Your editor and president of the CWC spoke up at the next town meeting and asked the town to help clear the lot.

The gentlemen agreed. (Time passes in Mayor Siegrist resigns; problems beset town; Payne becomes mayor).

The date of the Carrizozo event was approaching and the vacant lot remained in its sad condition so your Editor and president of the CWC speaks up again at the town meeting.

The gentlemen agree to push the clearing project.

Before continuing it is necessary to understand one of the major problems in this affair.

Bud Payne is a good friend. He is an obliging sort of guy — helpful and generous. He also is inclined to act independently and when something seems to need doing, he just goes ahead and does it.

It is August and Bud is the new mayor and I am fussing about the vacant lot. So Mayor Payne takes his tractor and proceeds to clean up that half block himself.

Here we have a nice, plowed expanse of dirt. Well, it doesn't rain but it looks cloudy on most afternoons. The vacant lot gets dustier and hotter looking and the ladies of the CWC decided that it is not the perfect place to have the people market place.

They decide that the green lawn by Spider Park shaded from the sun by beautiful trees and protected from showers by a canvas roof would be perfect for the event. Then too, there was a promise of electricity for the band and the cooks from your editor, whose building backs up to the park.

Now, I felt a little badly about having put the town and the mayor to all of that trouble about the vacant lot. But the girls said, never mind, it needed clearing anyway.

The park was perfect for the people market place. We did have a lot of sun and then a lot of rain and the foresight of the ladies paid off.

But just after that the wind started again and the first four inches of the cleared vacant lot wound up several adjacent homeowners living rooms.

These homeowners happen to be my friends and their protests fell on listening ears. The mayor also listened.

Being a nice guy and wanting to make everyone happy, he said that he would plant something to hold the dirt down if we would provide the seed. We decided to have a pretty green wheat field for the winter.

Now surely this was a happy solution. An unsightly large vacant lot in the middle of town was being turned into a beautiful green field of wheat.

Who knows, we thought, this would be the beginning of something good for the town. Maybe others would follow.

Certainly there was no thought of profits from the wheat. The lots belong to the Episcopal Church and there was no plans for any harvest. I am sure that the "Bishop-in-Albuquerque" is quite unaware of his "Arbujo in Carrizozo".

Well, dear readers, after that one day of rain on the peoples market place, it stopped raining in true Lincoln County fashion.

This is the reason that farming is not a big thing in these parts. It only rains when the hay has just been cut, when a picnic is underway or in the middle of a rodeo.

There was the wheat planted and no rain came.

The mayor, being an agriculturist, put down a minimum deposit and hooked a sprinkler up to the fire hydrant and started watering. In a few days there was a frosting of green on the vacant lot and the Carrizozo Wheatfield was born.

Most towns, and Carrizozo is no exception, have their unelected guardians of the public welfare. Almost always these are people who have time on their hands to take a personal interest in what is going on. They go to town meetings, school meetings, board meetings. They spend a lot of time debating issues such as efficient garbage systems, police protection, the condition of the sidewalks, the quality of the newspaper, the pay of town employees and the reliability of elected officials.

Some of the members of Carrizozo's town guardians noticed the wheat field, saw what appeared to be city water being used generously and reacted promptly.

When some of the ladies heard that their Wheatfield was being attacked, they responded. About twenty offered to pay the water bill (which the mayor had already paid) and to stand guard at the borders if necessary.

There was a hot exchange of words between at least one of the ladies (me) and one of the attackers; the mayor and another protester and a strong letter of complaint to the town fathers (elected).

In the middle of the war, sparrows rained down from nearby trees, cause of death still undetermined. The health office was called, the environmentalist notified.

One member of the guardians was observed collecting birds in plastic sacks. County Extension agent Mary Ellen Payne was so unnerved by the episode that she screamed in horror when handed a plastic bag by a friend (it was a bag of cookies).

After five weeks in office, the mayor resigned, a victim perhaps, and the rains came and the war went into an uneasy truce.

The wheat continues to grow. Like all wars, the results are often obscure. Will other fields be planted, or will planters be deterred by history? I know not what choice others may make, but as for me I'll plant on.

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

## Polly's Bulletin Board

There was once a tree on the old Manslick Road outside of Louisville, Kentucky, which bore the legend "D. Boone kill a b'ar 1803."

Bear meat was frequently seen on the tables of the pioneers' but comparatively few people have eaten it today.

The secret of preparing bear meat lies in removing every trace of bear fat, which is apt to taste strong, even in the tenderest 'b'ar. The meat should also be marinated (soaked) overnight and part of the next day in this mixture:

- Herb mixture for marinating bear, (this is enough for a roast three to five pounds.)
- 1 cup salad oil
- 1 large onion, chopped
- 1 clove garlic, crushed
- 2 or 3 bay-leaves

Pinch of rosemary  
1 teaspoon dry mustard  
dash of Worcestershire sauce  
1/2 cup catsup  
dash of celery salt  
salt and pepper

Turn the meat occasionally during the marinating process. Then remove meat from herb mixture, rub with salt and brown well in a small amount of fat. Add enough boiling water to the roasting pot to cover one-fourth of the roast; add marinating mixture and cover the pot. Simmer gently, allowing 45 minutes cooking time to each pound of meat. Be sure to keep the liquid up - always covering a quarter of the roast. Turn meat to keep it moist. Before serving, remove roast from the liquid, thicken the gravy, and strain.

The New Mexico Game and Fish Department has a booklet "Hunting and Trapping in New Mexico." Get one where ever you buy your license to find out about hunting days, hours, area boundaries, bear bag limits and go-git-the 'little lady' a b'ar to roast.

## State funds county roads

The New Mexico Highway Commission has approved a cooperative agreement with Lincoln county to assist in the improvement of Hull and Gavilan Canyon Roads. Total cost of the project is estimated at \$105,609.

Under the terms of the cooperative agreement the county will spend \$53,639 and the Highway Department will contribute \$51,970.

Commenting on the commission's decision, which came at its regular monthly meeting in Roswell on Sept. 16, State Highway Engineer James A. Bird said, "Agreements of this sort are the best kind of cooperation between state and local government. They let our hard pressed counties, cities and towns stretch their budgets to provide for their citizens in ways which might otherwise not be possible."

Department economists point out that the total impact of such spending on an area's economy is usually three to five times as much as the dollar amount of the original expenditure.

Before the vote on the Lincoln county project, Commission chairman Julian Garcia said, "Every dollar we can help pump into one area of the state helps the economy of the entire state."

The county will do the grading on the 2.4 mile stretch of road as well as laying the subgrade and base course. The Highway Department will apply a double penetration chip seal coat to the roadway.

Project measures progress will be reported on with several new project proposals expected to be presented for adoption by the group.
