'C's keep wins coming

It was another good week for schoolboy football in Lincoln County as the three 'Cs' all came up with Friday night winners. Corona squeaked by last year's state runnerup Reserve with the magic toe of Scott Nalda making a 14-12 difference. Capitan let Vaughn on the board, barely, to win with 37 to 6. The Carrizozo Grizzlies made up for last year's disaster against Cloudfroft and looked good with 9 to 0. Capitan and Carrizozo have their homecomings next week and appear to be in good shape for the games. Corona will be playing Mountainair there and should win. The Cardinals have their homecoming on October 8. Robbie Richardson, Capitan's top Tiger, wound up the game against Vaughn to take the lead as state scorer No. 1, while his team moved into No. 1 position according to UPI and Channel 7 sports writers. AP ties Carrizozo and Capitan for the early season ratings. Capitan took the opening kickoff and marched 80 yards to the 5 where David Hightower carried the ball over the big line. Rocky Willingham made the running conversion for an extra two points. The Tiger defense paralyzed Vaughn and The Tigers took over. Robbie Richardson took off around right end and made 30 yards for another TD and his first of the evening. The try for an extra two failed. In the second quarter Tony Garcia of Vaughn picked up a fumble and ran 80 yards for that teams only score. The Tigers took the kickoff on a long drive and Richardson made another six pointer. Ronnie Works kicked the extra point. The third period gave the Tigers two more big ones. Richardson carried the ball in from the 12 yard line and racked up his own two point conversion. David Hightower repeated the show and carried the pigskin in from the seven, and then ran for his extra two. That was the game and the score, 37 to 6. The fourth quarter was a work out for the Tiger subs and while they held

Vaughn there was no more point gathering. Coach Billy Henson said his defensive team showed a lot of progress and played a great game. Rocky Willingham, Dan Chavez, Ronnie Works, David Hightower, Bert Schrecengost, Robbie Richardson, Ray Dexter. Carrizozo's unbeaten record Byron Carpenter and Adam Aldaz got the pats for the defense effort. In Carrizozo it was another victory night for the Grizzlies who were out for revenge against Cloudfroft. It didn't look easy at the end of the first quarter. Both defense teams were holding their own and Carrizozo's one big drive had stalled around the five yard line. In the second period Ray Beltran climaxed a 60 yard drive with a three yard run to get on the board. The try for an extra point failed. In the third quarter it was defense all the way. Neither team was able to put a drive together. In the final period Ray Beltran toed one over the uprights for three points, the final score of the game. Coach Ray Manly said that the win had been a good one. "Cloudfroft is a well coached, well disciplined team with a lot of confidence." This was the Bears second defeat, having fallen to Dexter. RC&D accepts five projects

The South Central Mountain RC&D met at the Recreation Center in Carrizozo Tuesday afternoon with 38 from around the state in attendance. Chairman Lewis Merritt of Yeso had the group make introductions. A.W. Hamelstrom, State Conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service in Albuquerque, outlined the RC&D organization and its functions.

He emphasized the importance of coordination of efforts, progress or development of the area, coordination of the various state, federal and local agencies. The RC&D is the means of getting things accomplished on a local level. David King, Stanley, N.M., represented the State RC&D Council and stressed the importance of concentration of ideas and efforts as applicable to the RC&D's. This can be accomplished through the State RC&D Council. Local problems should be solved through the RC&D unless assistance from the State level is needed and requested. Dennis Jeter, Carrizozo school teacher, expressed his thanks to the SCMRCD for the assistance they have provided by having various agencies give educational talks to the schools in the area. He suggested that this program be instigated on a statewide basis. The SCMRCD approved this project for another year. This will be the third year for these talks in the Capitan, Carrizozo, and Hondo schools. Five new project measures were accepted by the Steering Committee. These are: Lincoln Ditch: This project involves improvements on the intake works for the Community Ditch at Lincoln. Modifications are needed on the actual intake to make the irrigation system more reliable. Ft. Stanton Hospital Farm Irrigation Project: This involves renovation of the irrigation system which supplies water to the vocational farm. The present system is badly deteriorated. Ft. Stanton Cemetery: This will include a beautification plan and getting the cemetery on the national register. A beautification plan for the Capitan School Gym was submitted by the Capitan Woman's Club. Finding a source of funding for purchasing school bus radios to be used in emergency situations. The next meeting will be November 23rd in Ruidoso.

Garbage woes hit

Carrizozo almost lost its garbage system Tuesday when a representative of EMCO arrived to collect two months back payments or repossess the garbage truck.

A quick conference by members of the board of trustees, the city attorney, Al Romero of the State Local Government Department and Advisory Committee chairman Jesse English resulted in a postponement of the loss of the new truck, but the town will have to make a financial decision at the next meeting.

Last week at a special meeting the board voted a gross receipts tax of 1/4 of one percent and called for an election to add another 1/4 of one percent at the earliest possible date.

The revenues will be some time coming but will help put a patch on the town's leaky budget.

Indications from the board members and the advisors committee were favorable, for a rate increase in water, sewer and garbage at the next regular meeting.

The trustees decline to pass a new recreation ordinance and a barking dog ordinance. The members all said that the existing ordinance governing the recreation committee was adequate. The barking dog problem was postponed until the next meeting.

The garbage problem came to a head early this week when a representative of the manufacturing company which sold the system to the town was told that the town would be unable to make back payments of \$2200.

The News was informed that the truck would be sent back to EMCO in Plainview Tuesday. Trustee Willie Silva consulted with Attorney Bill Payne and Mayor Pro Tem Manny

Hernandez and was able to delay the repossession which would have left the residents of the town without garbage collection.

The old truck is not in working condition at the present and many residents have discarded their garbage cans since the collection bins were installed several months ago.

Hernandez said that the old truck is being repaired but State Local Government Head Al Romero has asked for an estimate before the work is done.

Tuesday Romero told the News that his department was studying the towns financial position. For several weeks state officials have collected data in Carrizozo and the figures are now in Santa Fe.

Romero told the News by phone that a first glance indicated that the town had overspent last year's budget by \$20,000. He said that the town must come up with funds to restore the overspent budget out of this year's income. Pending a completion of the investigation, all spending has been halted by state orders except for emergency needs.

Willie Silva and Jesse English said that they would study the garbage operation and present the next town meeting with figures that would indicate if the new system could be continued. Silva said that he believed the new system was less costly in the long run than a return to the old system.

Church dance is benefit

The second annual benefit dance for the Santo Nino de Atocha Church at Three Rivers will be held at Tularosa on October 2.

This year more than ever the chapel has again symbolized the fascinating legend and loving tradition represented by the Santo Nino as faithful pilgrims from near and far have continued to make their way to the heavy wooden door of the quaint white chapel hidden away in the Three Rivers valley. The chapel is always open and regular masses have been held the second and fourth Sundays of each month at 4 p.m. In addition literally hundreds upon hundreds of people attended both the January and May fiestas. But the deep reverence for the Holy Child has throughout the year been demonstrated most of all by the offerings of flowers, milagros, and wee-shoes that appear weekly as people make their way (often unobserved during the week) to the peaceful shire with their petitions of need; or aims of grateful thanksgiving.

Even on the darkest nights the windows glow softly from the flickering votive candles as a kind of silent testimony that the tradition and love for the Santo Nino is still very much alive in the hearts of the people.





Twenty Years Ago

(Note from Payton, back at typewriter Sept. 26 after several week's absence. Will select top front-page news of weeks we missed).

From Lincoln County News Sept. 14, 1956.

Elbert Brown tells the "Ramblin' Around" editor how water rights were secured on the Bonito watershed. It was 1907 or 1908, The El Paso and Southwestern Railroad company could not use water at Carrizozo because the water was so hard it scaled the engine boilers. Railroad officials contacted Dr. Cobb who was commanding officer at Fort Stanton, he started out one morning from Fort Stanton with a brief case full of money and contracts. He drove all the way up Bonito creek that one day and contacted every man

who was at home. He pretended that he intended to buy a place of his own for a summer home or a little ranch - made excuses for each one. They signed contracts and he paid them in cash. That one day he bought practically two-thirds of the homesteads along the creek before the settlers in the valley knew what he was in to. That is how the railroad got the Bonita water in the first place.

The Daham Memorial Trophy was awarded by Alex Hindi of Duran in memory of his champion-Arab stallion Daham at the state fair horse show.

Johnson Stearns, Carrizozo town clerk, has completed mailing refund checks to the donors to the Carrizozo swimming pool fund. The refund amounts to 83 cents on the dollar.

Atty. H. Alfred Jones has purchased the Geo. L. Zimmerman law office building across from the courthouse in Carrizozo.

H. G. Welk, superintendent of utilities says meters will be checked on the property. Carrizozo has approximately 413 water meters and 530 light and power meters.

From the Lincoln County News Sept. 21, 1956.

The county-wide fair held at Capitan was described as an outstanding success. Grady Eldridge had the champion and Gil and LaMoyné Peters the reserve champion in open class range beef cattle. In the sheep exhibit John A. Cooper of Tinnie had the champion and Fuller Ranch of Picacho the reserve champion.

About 175 persons were served at last Saturday night's Lions Club chuck wagon supper. Next Saturday is work day to prepare Lions Park for grass seeding.

A pre-permit has been issued for work on the Capitan (Salado) dam, estimated to cost \$344,800.

Coach Stratton's strong Capitan football team defeated Estancia 27-6. Penny McKnight passed to Joe Aldaz two times, with the running of Carol Jones, Ernie Francis and Ralph Vance Capitan marched to the 4th touchdown.

From Lincoln County News Sept. 23, 1956.

John Gallacher has been drilling a well at his ranch on the mesa about 25

miles east of town, & got caught in the blizzard out there last week. He says he doesn't want a well where it freezes so hard that every time he pulls the drill out the hole comes with it and he has to put it back with a piledriver.

This issue of the News is full of soil conservation news, pictures and advertisements. The Shafer Motor Co. sponsored ad showing stock tank on the Truman Spencer Jr. Ranch in 1955. Bonnell Hardware in Ruidoso has closing-out \$25,000 surplus sale.

The Corona Cardinals won their third game of the season from Estancia, score 43-6.

A.A. Brooks has started construction of a two-bedroom home, facing west on a street behind the R.G. Firman residence in the Harkey addition.

Carrizozo Woman's Club room had a new look to start out the Fall season. Mrs. Kelley Stephenson, Mrs. T. E. Kelly and Mrs. A.N. Spencer had spent long hours sanding, filling and refinishing the floors; cleaning the walls and drapes.



News & Notes

Pruning A Year-Round Task: Pruning flowering shrubs, plants and trees isn't only a winter or spring job but should be a year-round activity. Removing the spent flowers from your rose bushes, lilacs, pansies, rhododendrons, and other plants before the seed heads form means you'll have lots of flowers next season as well.

The best time to prune any flowering shrub is immediately following its blooming period. This allows the plant a full year to grow new wood and set flower buds for next year. Shrubs and trees which must be pruned regularly to control their size can be pruned by pinching shoots during the soft growth stage. This will often eliminate the need for severe pruning later on. Water sprouts and unwanted sucker growth can be pinched out easily before the tissue becomes woody. When you prune by pinching soft new growth, you avoid the larger wounds left by removing woody limbs so there is less damage to the plants.

It's Clean Up Time for the garden: Fall is a good time to clean up around the garden. Clean and repair all equipment before storing for the winter.

Sort through the garden chemicals. Destroy those that have lost their effectiveness. Seal and label any

chemicals that can be used again.

It's clean up time for the vegetables and flowers too. Many plants have completed their life cycle and the debris can be put in a compost pile. Remember, however, that diseased plants should not go in the compost pile. If you don't have a compost pile, now is a good time to start one. The compost pile is also a good place for vegetable parings, leaves from shade trees and weeds.

Composting occurs more rapidly during the warm days of spring, summer and early fall. Keep the pile moist and aerate it occasionally by turning. Sprinkle a small amount of nitrogen fertilizer over the pile. Vegetables like pumpkin, squash and muskmelon should not be thrown in the compost pile unless the seeds are removed. Seeds attract rodents to the area.

RECIPES

Stewed Hippo

- 1 Hippopotamus
- 2,000 bullion cubes
- 1 box salt
- 3,000 carrots
- 1,500 celery stalks
- 2 rabbits (optional)

Unless you get help from your friends, start this dish 3 months ahead, because it takes about 1 1/2 months for one person to cut the hippo meat in cubes and about one month to cook it. Add 3,500 quarts of water, bouillon cubes, carrots and celery stalks. Salt to taste. This takes a pan a bit larger than a 3 horse watering tank.

Unless you have a large stove, you might want to chop enough wood to keep your water boiling for about 3 weeks.

This dish will serve about 6,000 people but if more guests arrive you can add

the rabbits. However, think twice about this - as some people don't like to find "hare" in their stew.

TEXT OF AMENDMENTS AND STATE EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTION BOND ACT GENERAL ELECTION, NOVEMBER 2, 1978

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 1

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 10, SECTION 2 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO REPEAL CERTAIN LIMITATIONS ON TERMS FOR CERTAIN COUNTY OFFICERS.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 10, Section 2 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"Except as otherwise provided in this constitution, all county officers shall be elected for (a term of two years, and after having served two consecutive terms, shall be ineligible to hold any county office for two years thereafter) two-year terms."

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 2

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 5, SECTION 1 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO ALLOW STATE EXECUTIVE OFFICERS TO SERVE CONSECUTIVE FOUR-YEAR TERMS.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 5, Section 1 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"The executive department shall consist of a governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, state auditor, state treasurer, attorney general and commissioner of public lands, who shall, unless otherwise provided in the constitution of New Mexico, be elected for the term of four years beginning on the first day of January next after their election. The governor and lieutenant governor shall be elected jointly by the casting by each voter of a single vote applicable to both offices.

Such officers shall, after having served (one term) two terms, be ineligible to hold any state office until one full term has intervened, except that the lieutenant governor may be eligible to hold the office of the governor.

The officers of the executive department, except the lieutenant governor, shall during their terms of office, reside and keep the public records, books, papers and seals of the office at the seat of government.

(Upon the adoption of this amendment by the people, the terms provided for in this section shall apply to those officers elected at the general election in 1978 and all state executive officers elected thereafter. Provided, no person who has been elected to a state executive office prior to the adoption of this amendment for two consecutive terms shall again be eligible to hold the same office unless one full term has intervened; provided, further, the commissioner of public lands, the attorney general and state treasurer, elected to a two-year term in 1978, are eligible to hold the office of commissioner of public lands, attorney general or state treasurer, respectively, until one full term has intervened.)"

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 4

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING TO AMEND THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO BY REPEALING ARTICLE 12, SECTION 6, AND ADOPTING A NEW ARTICLE 12, SECTION 6, PERTAINING TO THE STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION AND THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend the constitution of New Mexico by repealing Article 12, Section 6, and adopting a new Article 12, Section 6, to read:

"A. The state board of education and the state department of education are created.

B. The state board of education shall:

- (1) provide leadership for all public schools;
- (2) direct, supervise and coordinate all public schools;
- (3) control the budgets and expenditure of funds by public schools;
- (4) recommend the level of financial support for the public schools;
- (5) determine public school and vocational educational policy; and
- (6) appoint a commissioner of education who shall direct the operation of the state

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 3

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 10, SECTION 2 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO REPEAL CERTAIN LIMITATIONS ON TERMS FOR CERTAIN COUNTY OFFICERS.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 10, Section 2 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"Except as otherwise provided in this constitution, all county officers shall be elected for (a term of two years, and after having served two consecutive terms, shall be ineligible to hold any county office for two years thereafter) two-year terms."

department of education subject to the policies established by the board.

C. The powers and duties set out in Subsection B shall be exercised as provided by law.

D. The state board of education consists of nine members appointed by the governor, with the consent of the senate, for staggered terms of six years beginning on January 1 of odd-numbered years so that no more than three terms expire in any one year. The members shall be qualified electors and not more than five shall be members of the same political party at the time of their appointment. The members shall be appointed so as to give geographic representation to all areas of the state as provided by law.

E. Members of the state board of education shall not be removed from office except for financial conflict of interest, incompetence, neglect of duty or malfeasance in office. Removal proceedings may be initiated by the governor or by a majority vote of all the members of the senate, both as provided by law. The supreme court has exclusive original jurisdiction over proceedings to remove members of the state board of education."

In those counties having a population of more than one hundred thousand, as shown by the most recent decennial census, and having a final, full assessed valuation in excess of seventy-five million dollars (\$75,000,000), the elected board of county commissioners shall consist of five members. The county shall be divided into five county commission districts which shall be compact, contiguous and as nearly equal in population as practicable. One county commissioner shall reside within, and be elected from, each county commission district. Change of residence to a place outside the district from which a county commissioner was elected shall automatically terminate the service of that commissioner and the office shall be declared vacant."

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 5

"A. In those counties having a population of more than one hundred thousand, as shown by the most recent decennial census, and having a final, full assessed valuation in excess of seventy-five million dollars (\$75,000,000), the elected board of county commissioners shall consist of five members. The county shall be divided into five county commission districts which shall be compact, contiguous and as nearly equal in population as practicable. One county commissioner shall reside within, and be elected from, each county commission district.

Change of residence to a place outside the district from which a county commissioner was elected, shall automatically terminate the service of that commissioner and the office shall be declared vacant.

County commissioners serving on (a) five-member boards of county commissioners pursuant to this subsection shall serve terms of four years, and after having served two consecutive terms, shall be ineligible to hold any county office for four years thereafter.

Provided, that in the first general election immediately following the adoption of this amendment, two county commissioners shall each be elected for a term of two years; two county commissioners shall each be elected for a term of four years; and one county commissioner shall be elected for a term of six years; thereafter, each county commissioner shall be elected for a term of four years.

B. In those counties having a population of less than one hundred thousand, but more than forty-three thousand, as shown by the most recent decennial census, and having a final, full assessed valuation in excess of sixty-five million dollars (\$65,000,000), the elected board of county commissioners shall consist of five members; a majority of the voters in the county voting thereon, according to the procedures established by law, approve the creation

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 7

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 4 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO ESTABLISH THE MEMBERSHIP OF THE LEGISLATURE.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 4 of the constitution of New Mexico by repealing Section 3 and enacting a new Section 3 to read:

"A. Senators shall not be less than twenty-five years of age and representatives not less than twenty-one years of age at the time of their election. If any senator or representative permanently removes his residence from or maintains no residence in the district from which he was elected, then he shall be deemed to have resigned and his successor shall be selected as provided in Section 4 of this article. No person shall be eligible to serve in the legislature who, at the time

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 6

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 8 BY ADDING A NEW SECTION TO THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO SET ASIDE IN A PERMANENT TRUST FUND CERTAIN REVENUES DERIVED FROM NATURAL RESOURCES, PROVIDING FOR THE USE AND INVESTMENT OF THE FUND AND PROVIDING THAT THE INCOME FROM THE FUND BE USED TO DEFRAY OPERATING EXPENSES OF THE STATE THEREBY DECREASING DEPENDENCE UPON TAXES FOR SUCH PURPOSES.

B. The senate shall be composed of no more than forty-two members elected from single member districts.

C. The house of representatives shall be composed of no more than seventy members elected from single member districts.

D. Once following publication of the official report of each federal decennial census hereafter conducted, the legislature may be statute reapportion its membership."

pledged for the prompt payment at maturity of the principal and interest of all the bonds which may be issued and sold as provided in the State Educational Institution Improvement Bond Act.

Section 4. The proceeds from the sale of the bonds shall be expended solely for the capital expenditures to permit the state educational institutions and their branch community colleges and the New Mexico junior college of Lea County to make improvements by constructing, replacement, remodeling and renovation of buildings and utility facilities, and for the purpose of funding the purchase of instructional equipment. The amounts for each such institution and college are to be established by the board of educational finance, hereinafter called "the board". For the purposes of the State Educational Institution Improvement Bond Act, instructional equipment shall not include computer equipment.

The sum of three million four hundred thousand dollars (\$3,400,000) of each issue shall be allocated by the board for constructing, replacing and renovating buildings and utility facilities at individual institutions and colleges.

The sum of one million six hundred thousand dollars (\$1,600,000) of each issue shall be used for the purpose of funding the purchase of instructional equipment at such institutions and colleges.

Prior to the allocation of any funds deriving from bonds authorized by the State Educational Institution Improvement Bond Act, the board, with the cooperation of the higher education institutions, branch community colleges and the New Mexico junior college of Lea County, shall conduct a long-range planning study and project a coordinated, detailed, tentative five-year improvement plan for these institutions. Based upon such study, the board shall establish the percentage of the proceeds of each bond issue to be allocated to the individual institutions and colleges, according to the procedure to be established as hereinafter provided, for the improvement of such institutions and colleges.

For the purpose of allocating that portion of the proceeds of each issue for facilities, construction, replacement and renovation the board shall take into consideration the quality and quantity of existing facilities and the projected need, based upon the tentative long-range study for additional facilities. For the purpose of allocating that portion of the proceeds of each issue for the purchase of instructional equipment, the board shall establish a fair and equitable quantitative formula taking into consideration the full-time equivalent enrollment of each institution. The board of educational finance shall also take into account the quality and quantity of existing inventories of equipment at each institution. Prior to the allocation to the institutions and colleges of any funds made available by this bond issue, the state board of finance shall approve a fair and equitable allocation formula. Any change in the allocation formula made by the board subsequent to this approval shall be approved by the board of finance.

Based upon such formula and the percentage of each issue to be allocated on this basis, the board shall establish for each higher education institution and college a projected approximate allocation of such institution's share of the total funds to be allocated on this basis from the bond issues authorized by the State Educational Institution Improvement Bond Act. On the basis of this projection, each institution and college shall develop a five-year plan for construction, replacement and renovation and for the acquisition of instructional equipment. The plan and any subsequent modifications shall be reported to the board.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 6

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 8 BY ADDING A NEW SECTION TO THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO SET ASIDE IN A PERMANENT TRUST FUND CERTAIN REVENUES DERIVED FROM NATURAL RESOURCES, PROVIDING FOR THE USE AND INVESTMENT OF THE FUND AND PROVIDING THAT THE INCOME FROM THE FUND BE USED TO DEFRAY OPERATING EXPENSES OF THE STATE THEREBY DECREASING DEPENDENCE UPON TAXES FOR SUCH PURPOSES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. This act may be cited as the "State Educational Institution Improvement Bond Act".

Section 2. For the purpose of providing funds for capital expenditures at state educational institutions as named in Article 12, Section 11 of the constitution of New Mexico, branch community colleges thereof and the New Mexico junior college of Lea County, successive indebtedness of the state is hereby authorized for each of the following years and in the amount specified for each year, 1977-five million dollars (\$5,000,000), 1978-five million dollars (\$5,000,000), 1979-five million dollars (\$5,000,000), 1980-five million dollars (\$5,000,000) and 1981-five million dollars (\$5,000,000), or any lesser amount as may be legally issued under constitutional limitations existing at the time of issuance of bonds evidencing the indebtedness, or any lesser amount as may be recommended by the board of educational finance and approved by the state board of finance.

Section 3. The state treasurer shall prepare successively negotiable serial bonds of the state of New Mexico, to be known as "State Educational Institution Improvement Bonds - Series 1977," and "State Educational Institution Improvement Bonds - Series 1978," and "State Educational Institution Improvement Bonds - Series 1979," and "State Educational Institution Improvement Bonds - Series 1980," and "State Educational Institution Improvement Bonds - Series 1981," as the case may be, in denominations as the governor shall determine, to be numbered consecutively, and to be dated January 1, or July 1, of the year in which they are issued. The bonds shall bear interest payable semiannually on July 1 and January 1 of each year. The bonds authorized under the State Educational Institution Improvement Bond Act shall be sold by the state board of finance at such time and in such manner and amounts as the board may elect, to the highest bidder for cash at not less than par and accrued interest to date of delivery. The state board of finance shall publish a notice of the time and place of sale in a newspaper of general circulation in the state and also in a recognized financial journal outside the state. The publication shall be made once each week for two consecutive weeks prior to the date fixed for the sale, the publication thereof to be at least ten days prior to the date of sale. The notice shall specify the amount, denomination, maturity and description of the bonds to be offered for sale and the place, day and hour at which sealed bids therefor shall be received. At the time and place specified in the notice the state board of finance shall open the bids in public and shall award the bonds to the bidder or bidders offering the highest price therefor. No bid shall be accepted which is less than the par value of the bonds plus the interest accrued from the last preceding interest date to the date of delivery. The state board of finance may reject any or all bids and readvertise. The state board of finance may, at any time, sell the bonds, or any part thereof, to the state treasurer at private sale at not more than four percent interest. The state treasurer is authorized to purchase any of the bonds with the permanent funds in his hands for investment at any time. The bonds are legal investments for any person or board charged with the investment of any public funds and may be accepted as security for any deposits of public money.

Section 7. The department of finance and administration shall make a record in a book kept for that purpose in which shall be entered the date, number and amount of each bond sold and the amount for which the same was sold. "Except as otherwise provided in this constitution, all county officers shall be elected for (a term of two years, and after having served two consecutive terms, shall be ineligible to hold any county office for two years thereafter) two-year terms."
