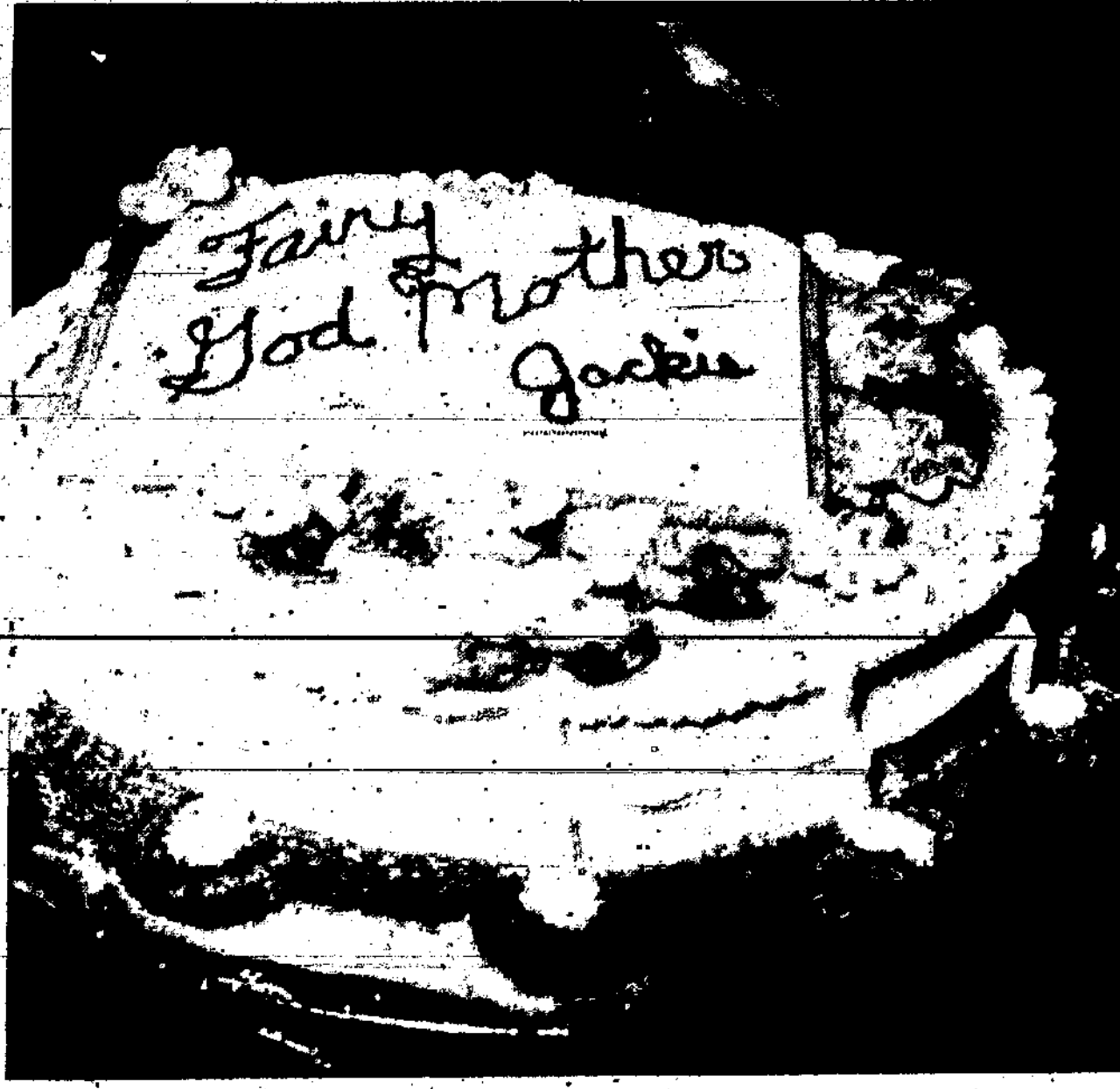
Hostess and host Mr. and Mrs. Henry Vega were at the head table with Jackie.

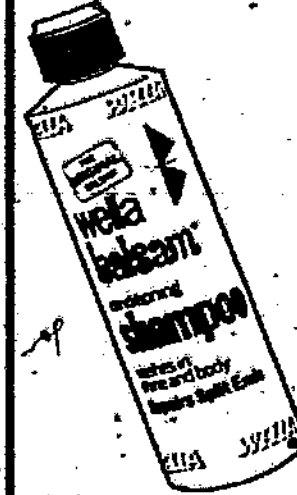

# How to plant trees



Dig a hole one and one-half times as big as the root mass.

Don't plant a \$10 shrub in a "two-bit" hole, advises Doug Bryant, Extension horticulturist at New Mexico State University.

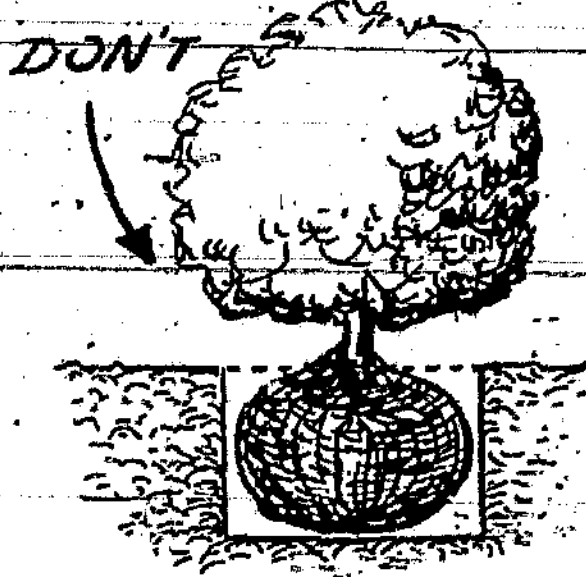
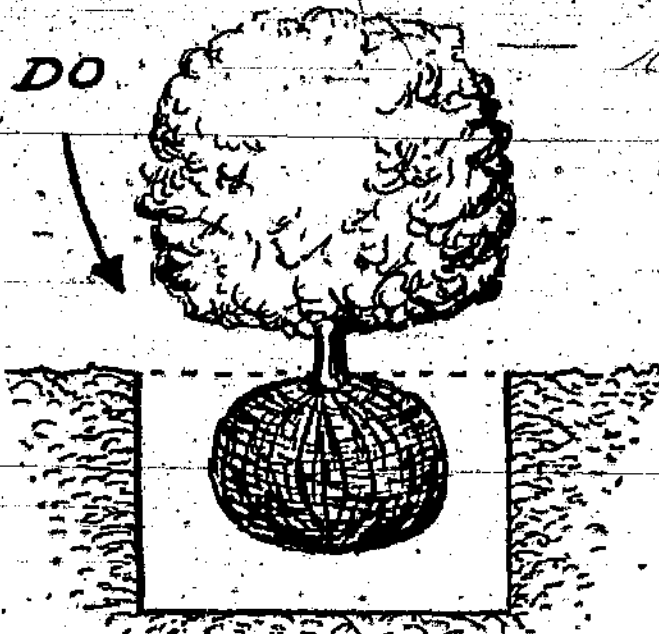
Dig planting holes one and one-half times as wide and deep as the root system of the shrub being planted. The hole should be at least 15 inches deep by 18 inches wide.

In many cases, the soil to be replaced around the roots should be improved by adding organic matter, coarse sand and plant food. About one-fourth of the soil to be placed around the roots may consist of organic matter, such as well-rotted manure, horticultural peat or compost. Another fourth can be coarse sand.

About one-fourth of a cup of 12-12-12 fertilizer can be mixed into each bushel of soil to be placed under and around the roots. A sandy loam soil is ideal for planting, Bryant advises.



Fill hole with one-fourth organic matter, one-fourth sand and one-half soil.



Pack the soil firmly as you plant.

# County Agent

The Annual Fruit Tree Conference will be February 4, 1977 starting at 10:00 a.m. in the Valencia Room of the Corbett Center at New Mexico State University. The grower planned program includes apple marketing, foliar feeding, frost protection, bloom delay and community apply Dayze reports. Put February on your calendar and plan to attend.

On February 7 and 8, 1977 there will be four pesticide meetings to certify private application so that they can buy and use restricted pesticides designated by the Environmental Protection Agency. The meetings will be held as follows:

February 7, 1977; 1:30 p.m.; Hondo School, Home Economics Room.  
February 7, 1977; 7:00 p.m.; Capitan, Lincoln County Fair Building.

February 8, 1977; 9:00 a.m.; Corona School, Multi-Purpose Room.

February 8, 1977; 2:00 p.m.; Carrizozo, Rural Electric Building.

Each meeting will take about three hours and cover the many aspects of safe handling of pesticides. All those attending these sessions will receive a private applicators license. Anyone who uses insecticides to spray cattle, fruits or vegetables as well as herbicides, must have the private applicators license to buy restricted insecticides. A study course and test will be used for anyone wanting to qualify for the private applicators license.

## School use for elderly is requested

The use of public school classrooms, cafeterias, and gymnasiums by the elderly is the end sought by the Commission on Aging in its negotiations with the State Department of Education.

Commission on Aging director, Roberto Mondragon, said that the first step in multi-purpose use of school facilities is a Memorandum of Understanding between the Commission and the State Dept. of Education.

The memo, which was signed last month by Mondragon and Leonard De Layo, Superintendent of Public In-

struction, endorses the concept of use of school facilities but leaves the actual details to local school districts and the initiative to local programs for the elderly.

Mondragon said that many schools already participate in nutrition programs for the elderly by preparing food that is delivered to senior centers. Several schools serve the elderly in school cafeterias before the students' lunch-hour.

Mondragon added that more use should be made of schools for community projects, adult education, and after hours use for the elderly, especially in small communities without senior centers.

## Governor wants recipes

The State Division of Human Resources, Office of the Governor, is calling on innovative cooks throughout the state to contribute recipes for "Sugarless Snacks" that can be easily prepared for children.

DHR Director Herman C. Grace said "we are preparing for publication a book which will be titled "Sugarless Snacks" and which we hope will be utilized in Headstart and other early childhood education programs and which we plan to make available to low income parents of school children."

Grace said the division already has compiled many sugarless snack recipes, but added: "We are sure there are many innovative cooks—women, men, home economists and other professionals who can offer a wide variety of intriguing snacks that will help wean children from their addiction to junk foods."

The DHR director said the consumer and nutrition component of his office has commissioned illustrations for the book. "When we have collected as many sugarless snack recipes, as possible, we'll pick out about 50 to 75 of the most interesting and tastiest, have

All persons wishing to contribute sugarless snack recipes to the book should send them to: "Sugarless Snacks," Division of Human Resources, Villagra Building, Santa Fe 87503. Grace said those providing recipes will receive credit when the book is published.

## A Pinch of School!

What is wrong with the lunch programs? The U.S. Department of Agriculture shows, that half billion dollars worth of food paid for by taxpayers will be tossed down the garbage chute in 1977. American children won't eat their school lunches.

This gigantic waste represents about one-fourth of the more than \$2 billion worth of food and milk served to 25 million youngsters this year in the program, which is paid for by the federal and local governments. About

10 million youngsters receive the lunches free and the rest pay from 45 to 55 cents.

One of the main reasons behind the waste is that more schools are serving pre-plated, or frozen, type lunches which are cheaper than food prepared in school kitchens, but a lot less appetizing, say nutritionists. The plastic cold pack foods are the next closest thing to junk food, complained Montgomery County, Md., public health nutritionist, who graded the pre-plated dinners with five F's.

They are fake, often bland and soggy-odorless tasteless, high in starch sugar and refined foods. Parents say over and over that their children can't stand the food. How ever nothing has been done to solve the problem. Some say "Would it be wise to pack your child's lunch, some children do bring their lunch anyway. Mass food cooking, in the school kitchen isn't always as tasty and nutritious as it should be. What is the answer, when the children are bussed away so far from their homes that they can't eat at home and even though the government pays

for good food the kitchens are hard to staff, with competent people obviously, the child is getting the short end of the stick so to speak.

Our recipe this week is Southern Pecan Pie.

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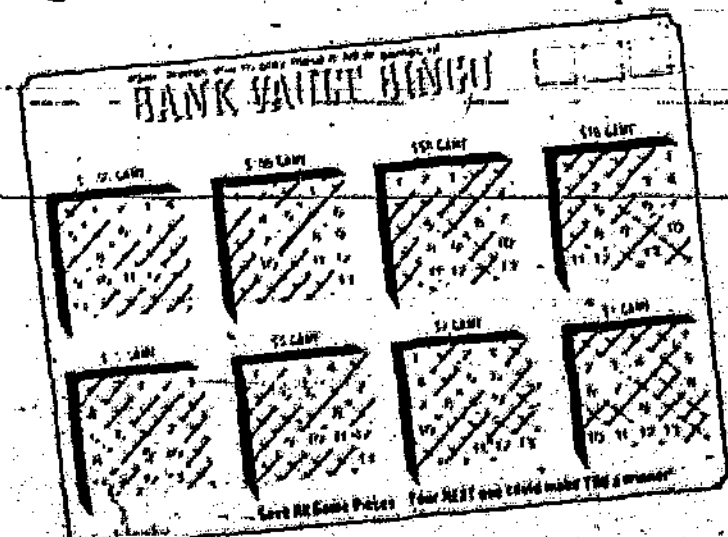
