## Teacher pay upped

A ten percent across the board increase for Corona teachers will bring that school district's base salary to \$10,842 in the new budget now being prepared by the Superintendent Mel Root and the Board of Trustees.

The salary increase was made possible by the increases to school voted by the legislature as in all New Mexico schools much of the increase is being taken by inflated utility bills, supplies and a reduction in average daily membership of the classes.

Corona anticipates and will budget for 131.5 students in the 1977-78 year. This is down 8.5 students from last year and will cost the school in state funds.

The school has offered contracts which have been accepted by all the teaching staff except for Martha Bond who has resigned. She will not be replaced with another teacher.

In this, Corona is moving forward on the State Department of Education's recommendation that schools refrain from increasing teaching staffs in face of declining school populations.

The Corona board will vote on its acceptance of a budget at the May 10 meeting. The public hearing will be in June when the state will take its look at the proposed figures.

## Fem cause head here

Tasia Young, the executive director of the New Mexico Commission on the Status of Women, will speak before three groups in Carrizozo Thursday.

She will address the Carrizozo Rotary at their noon luncheon. At 3 p.m. she will speak on "Education and Women" at the Carrizozo Woman's Club. Ms. Young will also speak to the sociology class at the high school in the afternoon.

Ms. Young has been the Executive Director for the New Mexico Commission on the Status of Women since July 1, 1975. Prior to taking this position, she was a Human Relations Specialist and worked for the Human Rights Office of the city of Albuquerque.

She is a member of the Advisory Council for New Mexico Women's Political Caucus and, in fact, is the founder of that organization.

She is a member of the National Organization for Women. She taught a class at the Community College at UNM entitled "How Women Find Jobs."

She produces a bimonthly TV show called "Noticias De Mujeres." Tasia has been married for 19 years to an Albuquerque attorney and has five children.

## County moves early on energy problems

Lincoln County stepped out ahead of President Jimmy Carter's call for war against the nation's energy crisis.

The first in a series of weatherization clinics was held last week at the Senior Citizens Center in Ruidoso under the auspices of the Lincoln County Senior Citizens Forum and the Lincoln County Extension office.

The clinic was financed out of a \$2200 grant made under Senate bill 18 for the aid in weatherizing the homes of senior citizens.

Gary Park, a graduate student at NMSU in agricultural engineer and Mary Ellen Payne, County Home Economist describe techniques in do-it-yourself energy conservation measures.

With the President's energy program calling for weatherproofing of 90 per cent of the homes in the United States, Lincoln County will have a hard time complying.

But in addition to meeting the nation's crisis, people who begin now to insulate their homes will realize big financial advantages as well as perhaps being eligible for some of the proposed tax benefits.

Park told the people attending the clinic that heat bills could be cut by as much as 75 percent by proper insulation.

He said that insulation included more than rook wool and fiberglass attic and wall linings. Carpet and carpet pads; drapes and drape linings; storm windows and doors, and window and door stripping were described as major forms of insulation.

Park said that a fiber carpet pad provided better insulation than, for instance, a foam rubber pad.

He recommended that residents build light frames and cover them with plastic to weatherproof windows. The frames should fit exactly in the inside window frame.

This was only one of the 'You Can Do It' home care projects proposed that would save the nation's short supply of energy and the householder dwindling supply of cash.

Cooling and heating use about 60 percent of the total energy expended in the average American homes. The percentage, 40 percent, for cooling would be far lower in naturally air conditioned Lincoln County by in the cold mountain regions the heat percentage, 20, is about right.

Perhaps the biggest heating aid in this country is our abundance of sun power and it should be used. The air layer between two fix pieces of glass will provide a lot of insulation and heat. Curtains should be open to take advantage of the sun in the day and closed to prevent heat loss at night.

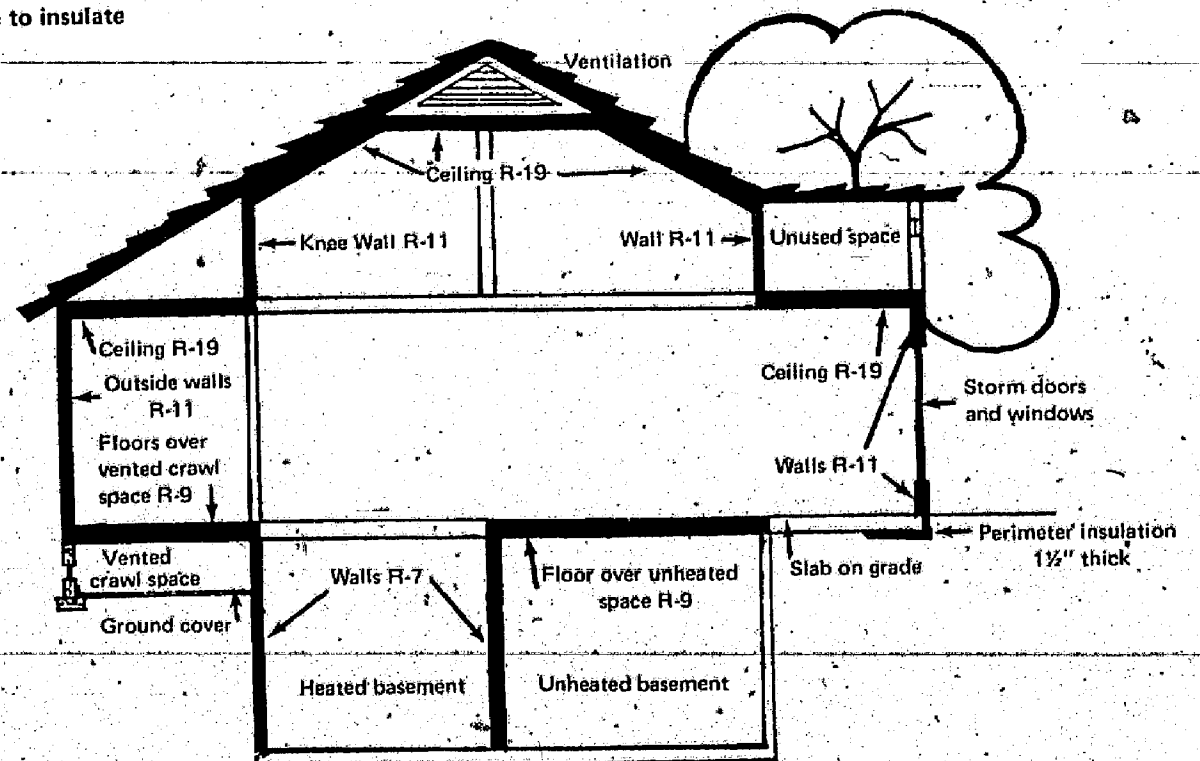
Experts use "R-value" in determining the resistance of a particular material to the passage of heat. The higher the R-Value, the more effective the material is.

Mrs. Payne hopes to have clinics in Carrizozo, Capitan, Hondo and Corona under the joint sponsorship of the Senior Citizens and the Extension office.

The following chart gives the R-value of various materials and the sketch shows the spots in the average home that need insulation.

## Secrets of living are simple

There are three keys that open the door to the enjoyment of your life, according to Dr. John Alken of Socorro.

The first is nutrition, the second is exercise and the third is an understanding of the meaning or purpose of life.

The teacher-physician met with members of the Carrizozo Woman's Club Thursday for a discussion of these three elements of healthy life.

Dr. Alken claims to be 75 years old but it was hard to believe from his appearance, just and demonstration of yoga exercises.

He spent the first 55 years of his life trying to fix up sick and injured people. The last twenty year he has devoted to

"drivers education" which is name for teaching people how to take care of their bodies.

He told the audience to try to eat natural foods and to avoid additives, white sugar and flour. He and his wife raise most of their own foods and even grind their own flour. He said this was easy to do with a food blender.

It is difficult to find foods in a small town, he said, which do not contain harmful chemicals, but it is worth the effort. He urged mothers to breast feed their babies and to avoid commercially processed baby foods.

The body is just like any machine that needs care Dr. Alken said. If you take good care of your car it will give

you long, trouble free service. The same is true of your body, Dr. Alken told the women.

If your body is in good condition you will enjoy your life and live longer. He said that people had a better chance at keeping a good body when he was a youth. There were only natural foods then, Dr. Alken said, and there was no television. The kids played outside and built strong bodies.

Exercise is necessary to a healthy body, according to Dr. Alken. He recommended two kinds of exercise. The huffing and puffing exercises such as rope jumping and running clean out your body, improve breathing and circulation. Yoga exercises tone the muscles with stretching and can actually heal certain conditions.

He told about a patient who had avoided a spinal fusion by learning and using certain yoga techniques.

Dr. Alken and some of the women took off their shoes and tried a little yoga along with lunch. The members were warned not to force anything but to gradually build their strength and muscle tone. The group practiced proper breathing techniques which are known and important to singers and horn players.

Dr. Alken believes that an understanding of the spiritual nature of human life is essential to physical and mental well being.

He said the death of his two sons cause him to become aware of the necessity of understanding. Dr. Alken believes in continuation of awareness after death, in the immortality of the spirit. He told the club that the body is merely the temporary home of the person but as such, must be kept and maintained carefully.

He was asked to consider periodic classes in nutrition and yoga in Carrizozo. Anyone interested in participating will be welcomed, Elinor Olson, vice chairperson in charge of the program said.

The contrasts in Mexico require a getting used to.

The new buildings in Juarez and especially the Pronof Center are beautiful in design. The materials are colorful creative use of tiles, iron, glass and rock make a visual delight—at a distance.

We decided for a total enjoyment of Mexico it helps to be a little nearsighted, be there twilight, avoid looking too closely.

The workmanship is often shoddy and after a few years the artistry in concrete is obscured by flaking and cracks. It is too bad this happens. There is a quantity of labor available and that is the reason for all of the beauty. Why, then, is the quality so low?

This is not true everywhere. There are beautiful homes being built around the Country Club and I am told that the owners see to the quality of construction. Perhaps it is only in public buildings that a little too much sand goes into the old mixer.

The Juarez Country Club is a marvelous place to spend the day. The golf course is fantastic even to a non-golfer. There is an olympic size indoor pool, saunas, steam baths, sun decks, exercise machines and then excellent food.

Hazel English says that the JCC was the scene of one of the best luncheons she has ever attended.

Saturday afternoon the ladies played poker and I laughed a little, thinking that it looked and sounded like any other country club in the world on Saturday afternoon.

If you want to know if you are being listened to, make some absolutely outrageous remark in an ordinary tone of voice. If there is no response, you will know.

At the airport, waiting for the computer to do its readout or whatever, I casually said last summer in Houston riding that 25 miles from the airport to downtown, I asked the cabbie why they had put the airport so far from town. He

I am truly concerned about some of the proposed solutions to the energy problem. There is no way small communities in rural New Mexico can institute mass transit. Any attempt to force that by the increased price of gasoline is unfair.

The people in Nogal must have automobiles to drive. Most people in these parts far from wealthy and too many are barely making ends meet.

An increase of 50 cents a gallon in gasoline would be cruel and unusual punishment for living in a decent environment.

We can walk around the town and I am inflating my bike tires this week. We can insulate our homes and certainly we can use wood stoves.

Few of us have thermostats to cut back on either the furnace or the air conditioner. In these parts not many folks even have air conditioners.

We should get brownie points for using pot belly stoves.

A lot of people do solar heating by accident. Those south windows really warm the house and this time of year we especially benefit from our big sun.

Pickups, our favorite Lincoln County vehicles, do use a lot of gas but the multiple use pays for that. You can pick up a load of feed on your way home from work. That saves a whole round trip.

We don't have a lot of RV's in Carrizozo. We are already here where the RVB's are coming. Those vehicles really eat up the fuel and it may be that they will be victims of the energy crunch unless the RV people can invent their own argument such as statistics showing how much energy you are not using at home when you are on the road.

I have appointed a committee to look for everyone over 87 years old in Lincoln County. We have a surprise in mind. Our committee is one at large, whatever that means, and help is welcome. Tell Rosa Chavez or Mabel Vigil about any of these pioneers that you know.

## A Cupful of Research!!!

Top researchers and industry experts have revealed to certain publications that the new sugar substitute could reach the market as early as this summer — when the Food and Drug Administration plans to begin its ban on saccharin. This action could affect all diabetics and consumers of diet food, low calorie soft drinks, and certain brands of gum.

"This new sweetener is the answer to the ban on saccharin," declared Dr.

Arthur Morgan, director of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Western Regional Research Center, which has been testing the sugar substitute. "It could be used in all foods and drinks."

"It's sweet and non-caloric and has been shown to be safe in animal tests. This incredible sweetener is known as neohesperidihydrochalcone, and is derived from the bitter compound in grapefruit peels. Dr. Robert Horowitz, a chemist at the USDA's Laboratory, discovered the sweetener in 1961 — but at this time there was no demand for it.

The sweetener has been used on animals more than seven years and there was never any hint of cancer or any other disease. Dr. Morgan feels that the FDA should approve this substance for public use. Perhaps this will be the answer for diabetics and other people who have to abstain from sugar.

1 pkg (10 oz) frozen cut asparagus spears  
1 can (10 1/2 oz) cream of celery soup  
1/4 cup milk  
1 cup grated sharp cheese (1/4 lb.)  
1 tablespoon chopped parsley  
2 lbs. ham left over or fresh or more  
4 hard cooked eggs

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## Eleanor Baker

Eleanor Baker puts up over 500 jars of beautiful fruit, vegetables and

pickles every year. She is our cook of the month.

Our delightful cook this month has become a familiar face around the Lincoln County Fair since she moved to Capitan four years ago. The Fair is the first place I started to notice her beautiful canned goods. Last year Eleanor Baker was Assistant Superintendent of the Canned Goods Division and helped make that department run like "clock work."

Eleanor lived in Ruidoso 19 years before moving to Capitan, so she really claims Lincoln County is home. She

says she remembers Ruidoso when "it was a one street town, and a narrow one at that!" She was born in Huntsville, Missouri and moved to Texas when she was a young teen. Some of her family has stayed in Texas. Her mother, who is 83 years young, and two sisters live in Amarillo.

Eleanor and husband, W.L., who she always refers to as "Baker" chose Capitan to live so they can be close to the family that means so much to them. Eleanor's brother Don Stark, wife Sara and their daughter Sally (Sis) Tolbert are all Capitan residents. Sally's two boys Trent and Terry are frequent visitors at Eleanor's especially when she has a special treat cooked for them.

Like so many residents of Lincoln County who live in the Ruidoso area, the race track - Ruidoso Downs - brought them initially to the area. W.L. was electrician at Ruidoso Downs for 19 years.

Eleanor became interested in exhibiting at the County Fair about six years ago and has received well over a 100 ribbons in those years. What she shows at the fair is only a small part of what she preserves every year. She puts away 4 to 500 jars of canned food each summer. I asked her how big her garden was and she just laughed. She doesn't have one! She cans on shares with friends, cans from brother Don's garden and buys food when it is at peak supply. She is not only an avid canner and good cook but has some interests that would keep anyone busy many hours a day. She loves to crochet, and crochet she does! Afghans are her specialty. For years she has completed six or seven afghans a year, and already in 1977 there are five completed. Her pride and joy is the king size "Rose Garden" crocheted bedspread that she plans to exhibit in the fair this year. The afghan has 21 colors of orlon acrylic yarn.

It would seem that making afghans would take up all her time, but she does other smaller things also. She has been giving the afghans as gifts, but is interested in turning her hobby into a money making venture. She will take orders for special afghans people want.

Some of her interest in needlework stems from the bedspread made by W.L.'s uncle's mother over a 100 years ago. The lady spun the yarn and wove the bedspread that Eleanor cherishes.

Eleanor is no stranger to the working world, she worked seven years at the Jockey Club and five years in the Chamber of Commerce Office in Ruidoso. She belongs to Lincoln County Development Association and her husband is a member of the Mounted Patrol - in fact he says it is his hobby.

One of their favorite dishes to make for company and to take to various meetings is:

**ITALIAN CHICKEN**  
1 package (10 oz.) spaghetti  
1 cup chopped onions  
2 tablespoons butter or margarine  
1/2 cup chopped celery  
1 green bell pepper chopped  
2 cups diced cooked chicken  
2 cups tomato paste  
1 tablespoon chili powder  
1 can 8 oz. mushrooms (stems & pieces)  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon pepper

Boil spaghetti until cooked but not too soft. Sauté onion, celery and green pepper in fat until transparent.

Stir in remaining ingredients, simmer for 45 minutes adding chicken stock or broth to keep moist as it cooks. For a company meal Eleanor serves hot garlic bread and a green salad for a complete dinner. This recipe came from her brother and wife who lived in Pampa, Texas. They are both deceased now and the recipe is a keepsake.

From her grandmother came another recipe she cherishes -

### HEAD CHEESE

Clean hog head thoroughly and soak in salt water for several hours before cooking. Drain and add water to cook. Cook until tender and remove meat from bones. Combine:

6 lbs. ground meat after cooking  
3 tablespoons salt  
4 teaspoons pepper  
2 teaspoons red pepper or to taste  
2 teaspoons aspic  
1 teaspoon cloves

Strain broth and add 2 quarts to mixture and bring to a boil, then add meat until thick stirring constantly and cook for a few minutes after thick but don't scorch. Pour up in square containers until cold, then wrap in wax paper or foil. Freeze to keep. Can eat this way or slice and flour and fry.

Eleanor says to flour and fry the sliced Head Cheese, it is delicious!

Canning specialties she is sharing with us are:

### ZUCCHINI RELISH

10 cups diced unpeeled Zucchini  
4 cups diced onions  
4 cups diced red bell peppers  
5 pods hot peppers diced (red)  
4 tablespoons salt

Soak above ingredients over night.

Drain - Add:  
4 tablespoons flour  
2 teaspoons celery seed  
2 1/2 cups vinegar  
4 cups sugar  
1 tablespoon prepared mustard  
1 teaspoon turmeric  
1 teaspoon powdered mustard  
1 teaspoon black pepper

Bring to a boil and simmer for 45 minutes. Seal in hot sterilized jars.

### STRAWBERRY FIG PRESERVES

3 cups peeled figs  
3 cups sugar  
1 (6 oz.) package strawberry jello  
Mix good and boil for 5 minutes. Take off burner. Seal in sterilized jars. This is a real surprise to people who don't know what they are eating when you tell them it is figs.

Another good recipe for company and to take to covered dish events is:

### CHEESE CASSEROLE

1 pound ground beef  
1/2 cup diced onion  
1 can tomatoes  
1 can cream of mushroom soup  
1/2 teaspoon each of garlic powder, thyme and oregano  
1 teaspoon worcester oil  
1 1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 cup minute rice  
3 or 4 slices of cheese

Brown meat in oil, add onion. Cook until tender, stir in the ingredients in order given except cheese. Bring to a boil and reduce heat and simmer for five minutes, stirring often. Place in baking dish and top with cheese grated. Bake until cheese is melted at 350 degrees F. about 15-20 minutes.

A meal is not complete without dessert and the king of dessert's has to be:

**MISSISSIPPI MUD CAKE**  
Cream two sticks of oleo with two cups sugar. Beat in four eggs. Add 1 1/2 cups flour sifted with 1-3 cup cocoa. Add 1 tablespoon evaporated milk, two cups chopped pecans, one cup coconut and vanilla.

Bake in oblong pan, well greased and floured for about one hour at 325 degrees F.

Bring to a good boil and spread on top of marshmallow topping to look marbled.

Have ready -  
1 stick oleo  
5 tablespoons evaporated milk  
1-3 cup cocoa  
1 box powdered sugar  
2 cups chopped pecans  
1 cup coconut  
Vanilla

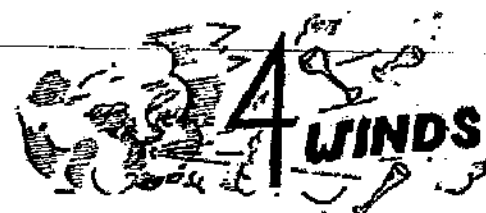

**EXTENSIONS OF CERTAIN DEADLINES FOR TAX YEAR 1977**

1. The deadline for county valuation protests boards to decide protests which is found in subsection C of Section 72-31-27 NMSA 1953 (Supp. 1975) is hereby extended from "...one hundred and twenty days of the date the protest is filed..." to two hundred and ten days after the date the protest is filed. This effect of this Order is that all protests to 1977 notices of valuation filed with county assessors pursuant to the provisions of Section 72-31-24 NMSA 1953 (Supp. 1975) are required to be decided by the county valuation protests board for each of the counties within two hundred and ten (210) days after the date the particular protest is filed. This extension is made to permit both the county assessors and the county valuation protests boards sufficient time to comply with the procedural requirements set forth by the Court of Appeals of the State of New Mexico in the Matter of the Petition of the First National Bank, et al. v.
