Work continues at Lincoln

Plenty is happening in Old Lincoln Town these days and the tourists who come through today will probably have a rough time telling they've returned to the same place should they return five years or so from now.

Fortunately, all that is happening is not development in the traditional sense. What is taking place is called restoration-restoration of the past.

A little over a month ago, the Lincoln County Heritage Trust began negotiations with The Old Lincoln County Memorial Commission to see if they could enter into a management-lease agreement for the purpose of renovation and managing Old Lincoln Town.

At that time they were given tentative approval, and rather than waiting for all the formalities to be completed, John Meigs, executive director of the Trust, Robert O. Anderson, chairman of the board for the Trust, and their crew have negotiated a number of buildings in Old Lincoln and are in the process of restoring them.

In a recent interview, Meigs reported that the Trust is completing negotiations for the Josepina and Ramon S. Luna property in Lincoln for the Trust and the Trust is embarking on a program to locate funds for its restoration.

In addition, renovation of the Montano Store is continuing and Meigs expects to open it as a Spanish residence typical of the 1890's. The mercantile store will handle convenience items for the Lincoln store this year.

The Wright house is also undergoing interior and exterior renovation and will be used as a residence by Tedd Freeman. Freeman is currently working along with Meigs and the Trust in many different areas. Soon he will be the manager of the Montano Store. He has been employed by the Trust for the past six months.

Regarding the lease management agreement with the state, Meigs said that state officials are currently working out the details of the agreement. Meigs has had a number of meetings with state officials and representatives from the Attorney General's office on the contract.

Last week, Meigs met with Bill Lumpkin, an architect, in Lincoln and discussed projects which will be funded for Lincoln in the near future. Included in these items were the renovation of the Old Lincoln School, restoration of the Luna Property, an addition to the Wortly Hotel and the possible relocation of the Pageant grounds.

Meigs noted that the state has a 40 acre parcel of land in back of the old school house and that site has been under consideration for the Pageant grounds.

In the event new Pageant Grounds are developed, the Trust is considering a full series entertainment program on weekends during the summer. One of the projects under consideration would be a sand and light program depicting historical highlights from around this area, he said.

Work is continuing at the Old Lincoln School although there has been some objection and even some legal investigation by Harvey Abercrombie of Capitan.

According to Meigs, the school house will be used partly as a museum depicting what he calls "four different cultures." Meigs would like to see displays of the Spanish, Indian, Anglo and Military influence in this area.

Meigs noted that at the last meeting of the State Board of Finance, the board, on the advice of the Attorney General's Office, unanimously approved the transfer and purchase of the Lincoln School property to the State of New Mexico.

Following this action, the Old Lincoln County Memorial Commission unanimously approved a contract with the Lincoln Heritage Trust for a 20 year lease with renewal options. Under the terms of the agreement, the Trust will restore, maintain and open to the public a museum facility in conjunction with the state museum properties already open to the public.

Also included in the plans for the school will be a conference room where groups may meet for seminars or public discussion.

"We feel the main courthouse building should be returned, as far as possible, to the 1880 period with museum pieces concentrated in another area," he said.

There have been plenty of rumors about a potential land boom of sorts around the area of Old Lincoln Town.

Meigs does not feel this is taking place on as large a scale as many people might think. He said that many individuals who have raised the price of their holdings over the past few months have about priced themselves out of the market. "In this way, it will help slow the growth of the area as a living community."

In conclusion, Meigs stated, "In the event that a contract agreement is reached with The Old Lincoln County Memorial Commission, there will be a status quo situation as far as state properties in the area are concerned, with emphasis in the initial period of the contract on restoration and development.

Smokey Stampede

July 1-2-3

The 18th annual Smokey Bear Stampede is just around the corner and the hooks for the rodeo entries will be open on June 29 at 8 a.m.

The Stampede will be held on July 1, 2, and 3 this year in Capitan and Edcar Wilson will produce the rodeo.

Other than the rodeo, many extra attractions will take place along with the stampede. On July 1, a night rodeo will be held at 8 p.m. with a dance from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m.

On July 2, the schedule is the same as July 1. Then, on July 3, a Parade will be held at 11:30 a.m. through Capitan with a barbecue at 12 noon. The crowning of the Lincoln County Fair Queen will take place at 1:30 with the final day of top rodeo action taking place at 2 p.m.

Walt Jones will serve as the rodeo secretary this year and headquarters will be at the Rodeo grounds in Capitan. The books will open on June 29 at 8 a.m. and close at 5 p.m. on June 30. Each class event has a limited number of entries and no checks will be cashed.

The events, added money and entry fees are as follows: Saddle bronc riding, \$40 entry fee and \$100 added money; Bareback bronc riding, \$40 entry fee and \$50 added money; Calf roping, \$50 entry fee and \$50 added money; Steer Wrestling, \$40 entry fee and \$50 added money; Bull riding, \$40 entry fee and \$50 added money; Ladies barrel racing, \$40 entry fee and \$25 added money; Ladies pole-bending, \$40 entry fee and \$25 added money; Old man's breakway roping (60 and over) \$40 entry fee and \$50 added money.

There will also be a calf scramble for boys and girls 12 years and under.

Admission to the rodeo will be adults, \$3.00 and children 12 years and younger, \$1.00. The Jones Hatband will be featured at the dance and their will be a charge of \$3.00 per person at the door.

Forest closed

Field day planned at Straley ranch

4-H'ers and FFA'ers from across New Mexico will attend three livestock field days scheduled between June 25 and July 15, says Bill Ljungdahl, Extension livestock specialist at New Mexico State University.

The first New Mexico Simmental Field Day is set for Saturday, June 25 starting at 9 a.m. The field day will be on the Straley Ranch at Ancho, 25 miles north of Carrizozo on U.S. 54. The day's activities will include livestock judging, a weight guessing contest and a grass identification contest. The day will end with a noon barbecue and a tour of the Straley ranch.

The A.F. Flint and Sons ranch, Bard, will host the 1877 Junior Angus Field Day on July 9 starting at 8 a.m. In addition to the judging contest, the participants will see the junior Angus showmanship contest and the junior Angus queen contest. Tattoo, health and grooming demonstrations will be given. Topping the day's schedule is an auction of various items donated by members of the New Mexico Angus Auxiliary.

The Hereford Field Day will be held on July 15, starting at 7:30 a.m. at the Gardner Ranch. The field day is located 25 miles west of Las Mesa. Activities will include judging five classes of market and breeding cattle, a public speaking contest and a showmanship contest.

Enjoy Your Pool !!!

There has been plenty of action at the Carrizozo Swimming Pool during its first full week, according to Mike Swickard, manager of the pool.

Swickard said that he would like to see more adults take part in the evening swimming program that takes place each day from 5 to 7 p.m.

Swickard stated previously, in order to keep the pool open in the evening for adults, at least 10 people must be using the pool. Also, Tuesday and Thursday evening courses will be offered for adults in swimming.

It has also been pointed that high school aged students, 15-years and older, who are working during the day, may use the pool facilities during the adult hours as long as they behave like adults.

Cancer clinic scheduled

A cancer control clinic will be starting in Carrizozo in July at the Health Center. Weekly screenings will be conducted at the center beginning in July on Thursdays from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. and on Friday mornings from 9 a.m. to 12 noon.

The Southwest Health Care Corporation (SWHCC) is a subcontractor with the New Mexico Community Based Cancer Control Program, a federally funded project of the University of New Mexico. SWHCC will provide public education programs, screening detection, diagnosis, treatment, follow-up care, and rehabilitation to a number of selected rural communities.

Screenings will be concentrated on high risk women (women over 40, or those who haven't had a Pap smear for over a year). Screenings will consist of a physical exam and various tests.

Many attend Girl State

The 30th annual New Mexico Girls State took place on the New Mexico Highlands University campus last week, with 288 high school juniors from throughout the state participating.

Sponsored by the American Legion Auxiliary, the weeklong activities exercise in representative government centered on mechanics and functions of the three branches of the federal government and their counterparts of the state and county level. The girls divided into groups of eight mythical cities, two counties and two political parties.

Girls State delegates elected and organized an exact model of the New Mexico State Legislature, complete with governor, lieutenant governor, supreme court justices, 20 state senators and 36 representatives, among other county and city posts. Election of city officials was conducted and from the group, three girls were selected to attend Girls Nation held in Washington, D.C. this summer.

Suit pending on Lincoln school

The suit filed by Harvey Abercrombie against the New Mexico Board of Finance regarding ownership of the Old Lincoln School in Lincoln is still far from over.

In a telephone interview with William F. Carr, Abercrombie's attorney, he said that "Mr. Abercrombie and I are ready to go and we intend to fight it all the way."

Abercrombie was the high bidder for the Old Lincoln School, but lost his bid when the state board of finance turned down his \$45,000 in favor of a request from Vincent Montoya, state finance director, to allow the Old Lincoln Memorial Commission 30 days to come up with enough money to match his bid.

The Commission came up with the money, and since that time, the title has been transferred to them.

Carr explained, that he had just received a motion to dismiss the entire case from the Attorney General's office, but he and Abercrombie intend to continue the fight.

Carr expects to begin taking depositions sometime in July and that further court action should come before the end of the month.

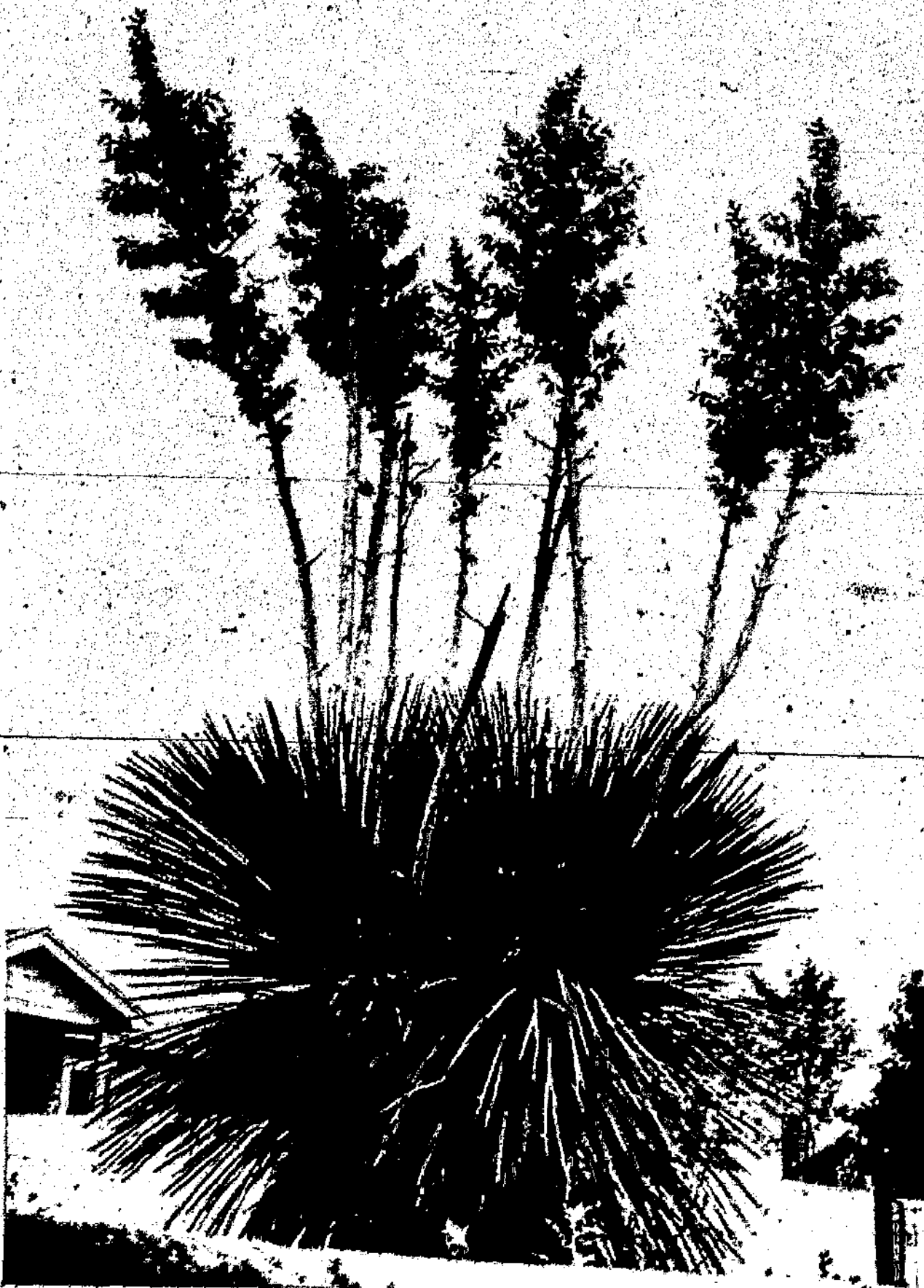

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Meeting held for VFW

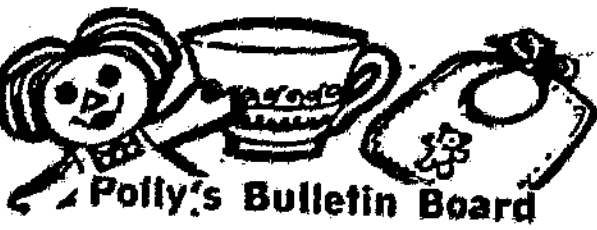

Let's forget about daily household duties and slaving over a hot stove. If we are constantly shining and cleaning the house for unexpected company, when will we ever find the time to plan a garage sale or host a weed party?

If Mrs. Tidy sees a cobweb by your "Bless this Mess" plaque tell her it's Susie's summer 4-H project.

Spring has sprung and gone. Those too-good-to-throw away things you saved from spring cleaning are taking up valuable space. Place an ad in your local newspaper and have a garage sale. An ad doubles your sales dollars.

When children do it, it's called "trash picking" when adults do it, it's called "going to a garage sale". Persons of all social, economical and educational levels are seen at garage sales.

That takes care of your indoor ecology. Result: back-pocket money. Now lets move on outdoors. The weeds are greener than the grass. Pretty soon you can use a hedge-trimmer on them and pass them off as shrubbery.

Now is the time to have a "weed party". (Be prepared to explain your intentions to law enforcement officials). Line your children for roll-call. Tell them to gather their neighborhood friends for a party. Have available plenty of hoes, rakes and trash cans. Encourage all children to play Handy Hoe, Rake Race and Trash can Relay. After the "games" serve store bought cookies and Kool-aid. Results: clean yard.

Votes taken July 5-15

Cattle Producers to Vote in Beef Referendum: Voting in the national beef referendum starts Tuesday July 5 at the ASCS office in Carrizozo. Voting ends Friday, July 15. Any Lincoln County cattle producer who registered June 16-17 is eligible to vote.

It's important to remember that if you registered and then don't show up to vote, it's almost the same as casting a "no" vote. This is because 50 percent of those registered must vote to validate the referendum.

To many cattle producers, the referendum is a long awaited chance to build a more profitable future in the cattle business. Others have questioned the program. Now it's decision time, it takes a two-thirds majority to pass the referendum. If you registered, it is important to make your vote count.

One vote per business entity will be allowed. Any principal in the entity - husband, wife, partner - may cast the vote for the business.

Feed Your Vegetables: Plant food is a must if you want healthy plants. The best gardeners feed their vegetable plants two to three times during the summer. The first feeding is at planting time. Mix the manure or other fertilizer into the soil before putting in seeds. Then after seeds have sprouted and the plants are established, apply a second dose of fertilizer. Leafy vegetables and root crops should be lightly sprinkled with a balanced garden-fertilizer or manure. In the case of tomatoes and other plants that set fruit, wait until they blossom before feeding them again. Two feedings are usually enough, but another application later on will keep your garden vegetables healthy and productive well into the fall.

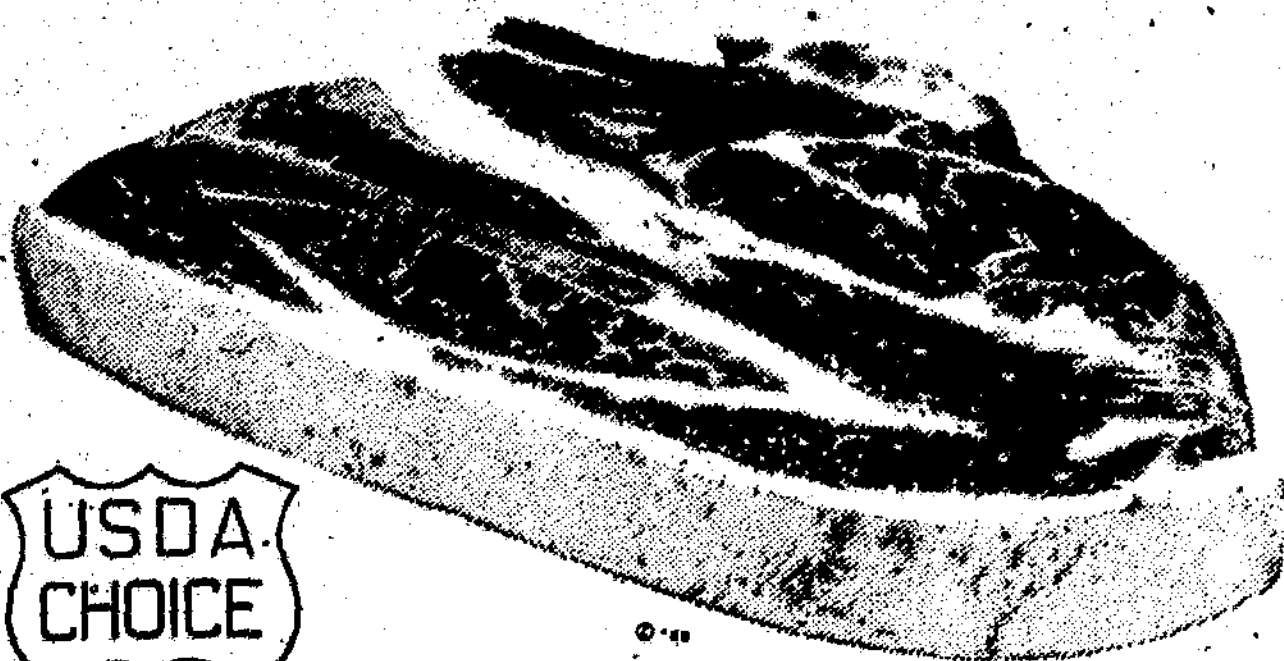

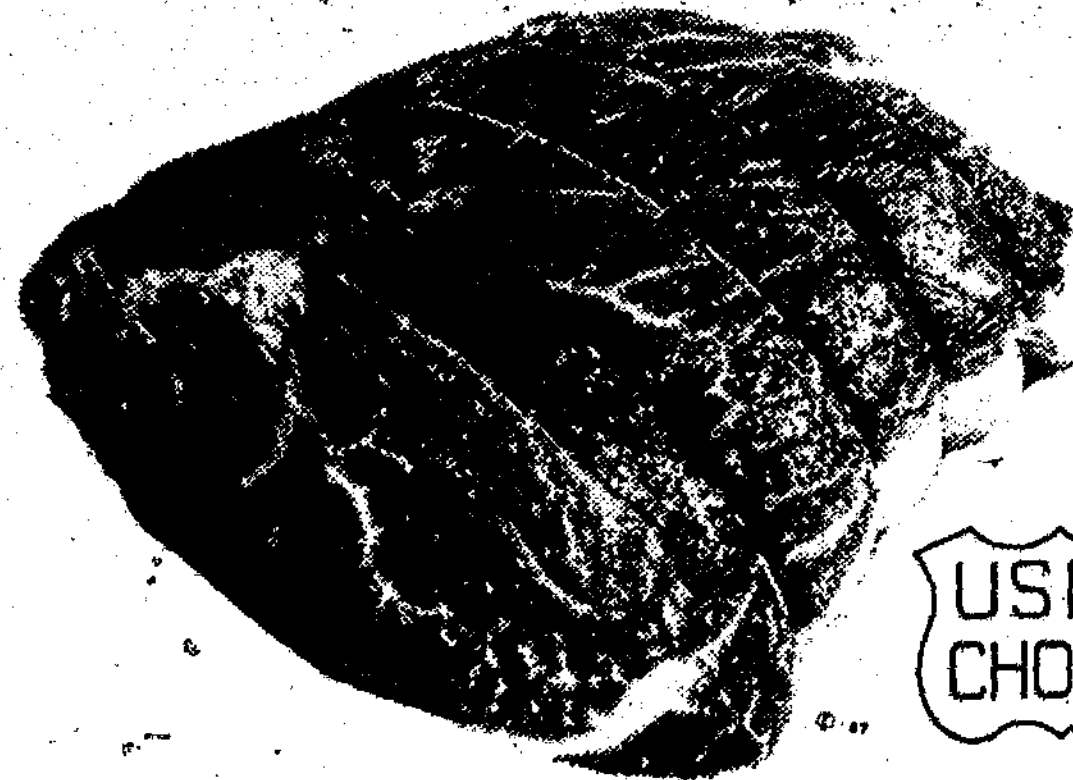

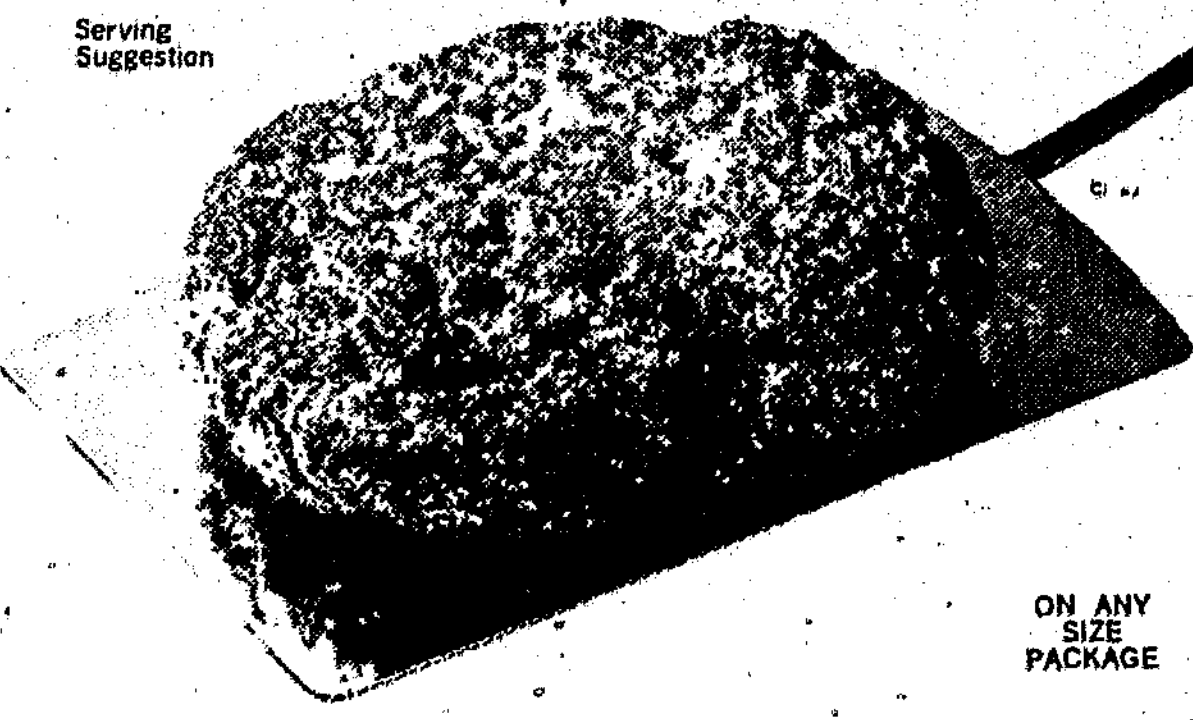

Safety tips for boating

Driving a boat like a car can leave a person in a wake of trouble - because boats neither maneuver nor stop like automobiles and waterways are not marked with center stripes or other traffic-control devices.

Coast Guard officials say that more persons die in collisions than in any other type of boating mishap. Last year four were killed and 11 injured on New Mexico waterways.

The Insurance Information Institute (I.I.I.) advises New Mexico residents that a review of their boating insurance should also be one precaution for a summer on the water. No standard policy exists to cover all types of crafts; boaters can check with their insurance agent to make sure their coverage is adequate.

The I.I.I. also offers the following safety reminders to boaters:

- Develop good seeing habits, keeping alert for traffic coming from all directions on the waterways. If the lake is unusually low, watch for submerged objects; tree stumps and other hazards may now be just below the surface.

- Don't overload the boat, and arrange passengers and cargo so the weight is distributed evenly.
- Make sure the boat is in sound mechanical condition, with fuel hoses properly connected. Last year 217 fires and explosions occurred on boats in the U.S., injuring many and killing 17.

- Make sure all passengers are wearing life jackets or a personal flotation device. Coast Guard officials estimate that 80 per cent of the 1,200 boating deaths in the U.S. last year could have been avoided had all the victims been wearing life jackets. Officials also point out that persons who are thrown from a boat may be in no condition to swim even a short distance.
- A fire extinguisher and oars should be standard equipment on any boat.

- Take one of several boating safety courses offered by the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary, the Red Cross or other organizations. For further information concerning Coast Guard safety courses, call the nearest Coast Guard Auxiliary or write to the 8th District Coast Guard, (b), Custom House, New Orleans, Louisiana, 70130.

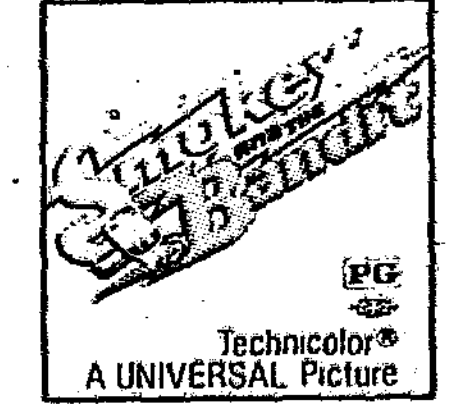

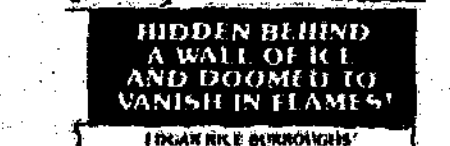
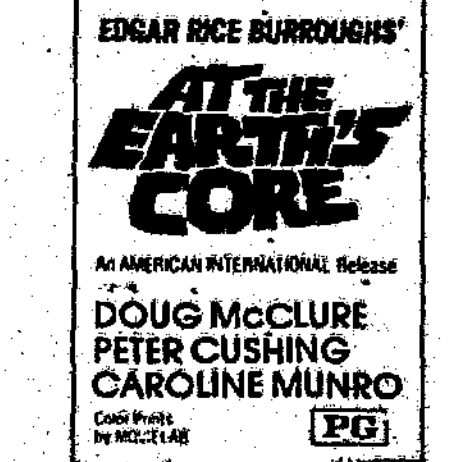

Benefits increase

"Because of the increase in the cost of living during the past year, the supplemental security income benefits payable through the Social Security Administration will be increased 5.9 percent, effective with the July 1 check," Dan Mathis, social security field representative said.

"Although all supplemental security income benefits will be larger on July 1, the amount in an individual case will be affected by the living arrangement, whether or not the individual is married, and the amount of other income.

"The maximum benefit an individual living in his own household will receive is \$177.80 (up from \$167.80); if he's living in the household of another, the figure would be \$118.53. A couple living in their own household could possibly receive the maximum benefit of \$266.70 (up from \$251.60). If they lived in the household of another, their benefits could not exceed \$177.80. Other living arrangements would produce different figures.

"This increase will be received by 253 people drawing SSI benefits in Lincoln County," Mathis said.

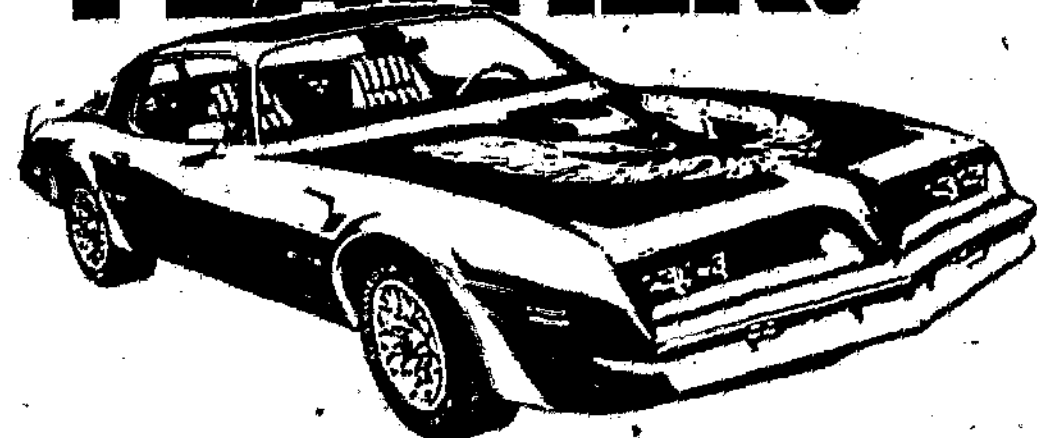

Valley of Fires State Park is one of the many features in New Mexico Magazine this month. Sheila Tryk did a nice two page spread with colorful pictures and some interesting reading. She points out that the 44 mile long black flow is the youngest in the United States. She also writes, "The Malpais, the Spanish called this lava flow. The badlands, Black jumbled rocks that would tear a man's boots or a horse's hooves to shreds in minutes. Cacti with lethal spines. Bayonet-sharp yucca. Mysterious black mice, rats and squirrels - animals who have cousins of the same breed in the White Sands, just a few miles south, that are almost as white as the sands themselves. This information is of course, not new news to anybody from around Lincoln County, but is interesting and encouraging to see this fine publicity as the heavy tourist season sets in.

Public assistance is being requested by the U.S. Forest Service in completing an inventory of roadless areas in the National Forest System. The inventory will help determine the suitability of these roadless areas for wilderness or non-wilderness use. Workshops are being slated all over Region 3 and in this area, one will be conducted in Alamogordo on July 20.

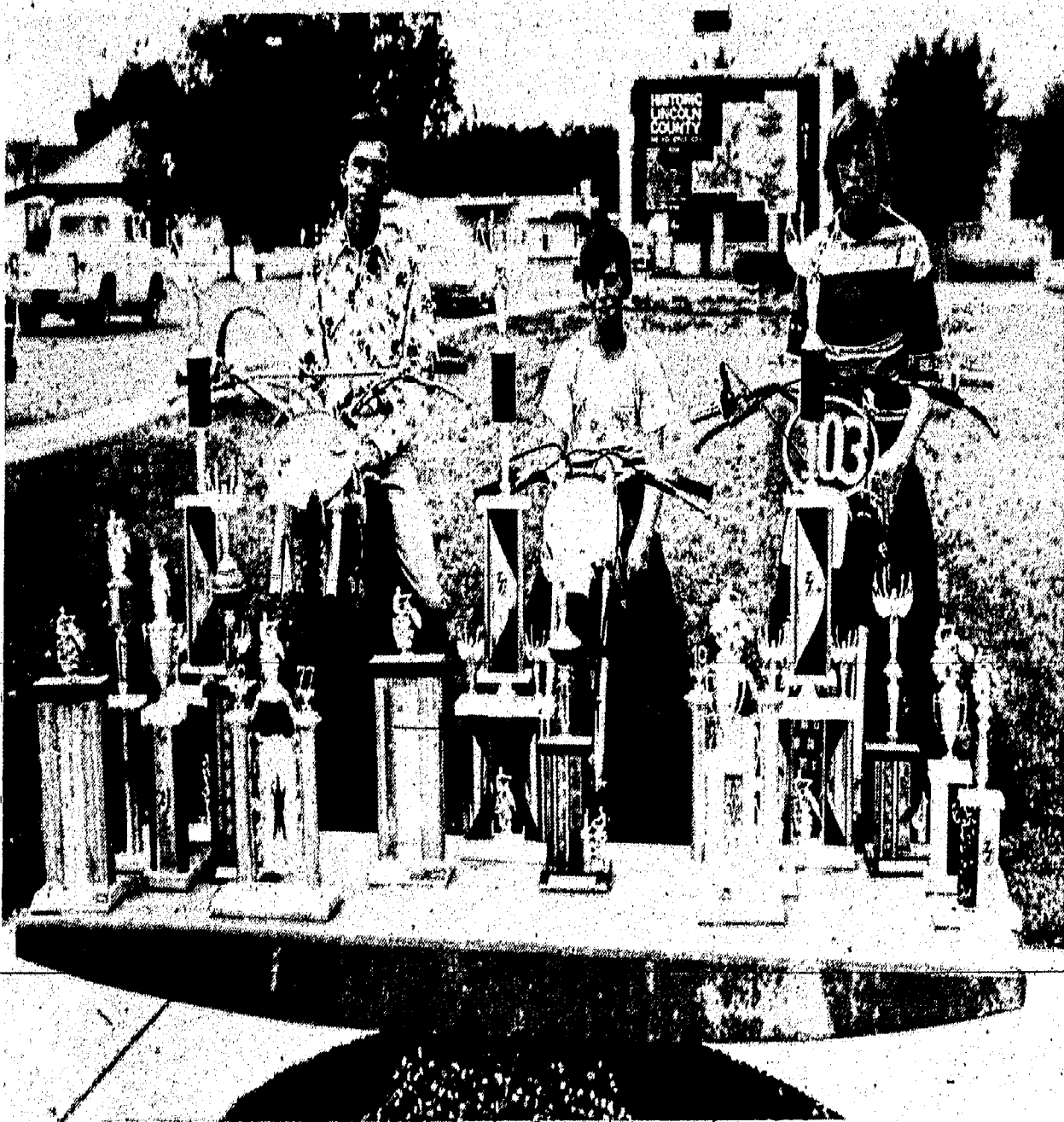
M. Rupert Cutler, assistant secretary of the Interior, has stated the planning survey is necessary to provide better coordination of the Forest Service's land management planning, to help develop the administration's positions on wilderness proposals which come before Congress, and that the new information is needed for the 1980 national assessment of forest and rangeland and 1980 Forest Service program. The assessment and program are required to be updated by the Forest and Rangeland Renewable Resources Planning Act of 1974.

Dr. Cutler said the Forest Service had conducted inventory in 1973 of its "Roadless Area Review and Evaluation" of western national forests, but subsequent planning has identified some areas which were overlooked. The inventory, for example, did not include eastern national forests nor the national grass lands. Also, additional areas and needed revisions within the western states have been brought to the department's attention. Thus, a refinement and expansion of the earlier study is necessary, he added. The inventory and study will also help determine public views about alternative uses of national forest roadless areas, including wilderness, he said.

In discussing the public role in the process, Dr. Cutler pointed out that the study is a vehicle for carrying out the department's commitment to public involvement. "Public involvement will begin immediately, he said.

A series of more than 200 public workshops will be conducted across the country in July and August. Participants in these workshops will be asked to suggest possible additions to the roadless area inventory in their states and to make recommendations on the suitability of the land units in the inventory for wilderness or non-wilderness use.

Written comments to suggest areas for inclusion in the inventory and their suitability for wilderness or non-wilderness use can be sent to local Forest Service offices until September 15.

Aguilar is married to the former Carmen Vidauri of Carrizozo, N.M., and they have two sons, Mark 13 and Matthew 7.

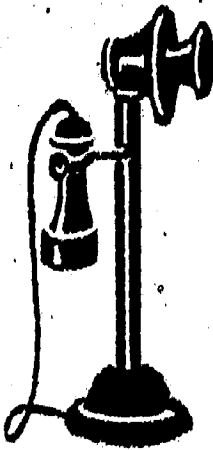

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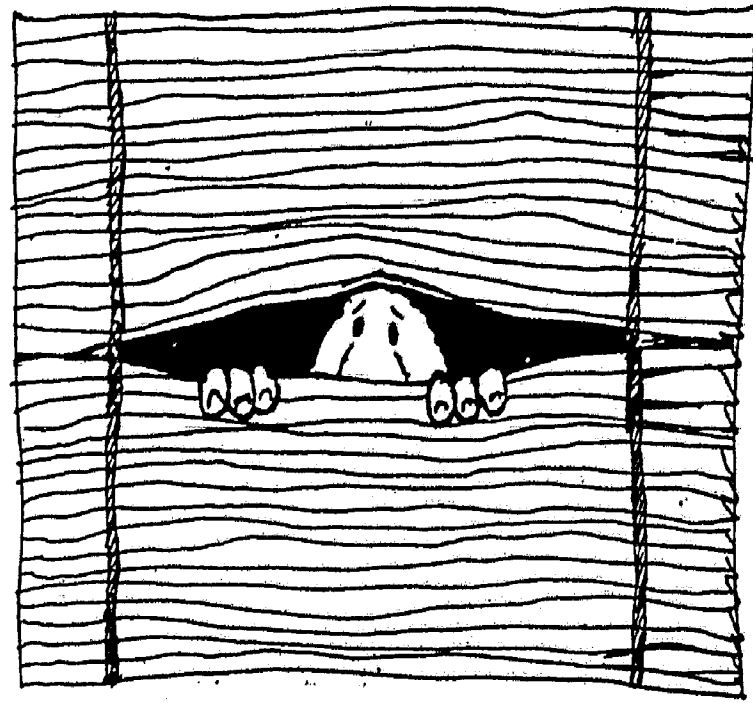

Many long hours have gone into making ready the fair and rodeo grounds for this gala event and few rodeo fans will be disappointed in the top notch action.

The books are already open for the cowboys and will close this evening (Thursday) at 5 p.m. Walt Jones is the

secretary and sign-ups are being taken at the Carrizozo Rodeo Grounds in the main building.

But the rodeo itself isn't the only thing that makes the Smokey Bear Stampede an event not to be missed. In addition to the action in the rodeo arena, there will also be two nights of dancing to the fine country sounds of The Jones Hatband. The Rodeo Dance will be held both Friday and Saturday nights beginning at 9 p.m. and lasting until 1 a.m. The price of admission for both evenings is \$3.00 per person.

Health problem sited

Members of the sub area Health Services Planning Advisory Board met with Mike Brown, planning director for St. Joseph's Hospital in Albuquerque, to discuss the health situation in this area.

Brown reported that the number of out patients at the Carrizozo Health Clinic has increased from 400 patients per month to approximately 650 per month.

He also noted that an X-Ray machine has been installed at the clinic and a new EKG machine has been purchased for the facility.

In Brown's opinion, the clinic is running on fairly sound financial basis doing about \$8,000 in business a month.

Since both doctors at the clinic are leaving in the near future, and the National Health Corps has not found any replacements, it is possible that Dr. David Rouleau of Carrizozo may work at the clinic on a part time basis until a new doctor can be found.

One and possibly two nurse practitioners are also on the agenda for the clinic. One of the practitioners would be exclusively for Carrizozo, and the other, although based in Carrizozo, would handle the Corona area.

Les Olson, county manager, clarified the hospital situation saying, that under the County Commissioners contract with St. Joseph's, the Carrizozo Hospital has never been slated to re-open. In the opinion of all medical persons who have examined the area and the facility, there is just not enough business to justify the hospital's re-opening.

By contrast, the Ruidoso Hospital is considered a marginal facility.

Although they do quite well during the summer months and during skiing season, the rest of the year, the hospital has a rough time making ends meet.

Mary Rich, a member of the advisory board, asked Brown about a dentist for Carrizozo. Brown informed her that all of Lincoln has three dentists and that meets the area's quota for dental care. He is going to look into the possibility of bringing a dentist here since all three of the county dentists are currently located in Ruidoso.

The dental care question will be brought up at the Aug. 5 meeting in Roswell for the entire district.

The board unanimously agreed to recommend to the State Department of Hospital & Institutions that the Town of Carrizozo is in favor of Ft. Stanton utilizing the Carrizozo Hospital facilities as had been previously discussed. A group of local citizens & Mayor Bobby Dan Crenshaw will meet with DHI officials in the near future.

Finally, members of the board met with four nurses from the Southwest Health Care Corporation who will be opening a cancer detection clinic in Carrizozo on July 7.

SWHCC is a subcontractor with the New Mexico Community Based Cancer Control Program, a federally funded project through the University of New Mexico.

The group will provide public education programs, screening detection, diagnosis, treatment, follow-up care, and rehabilitation to a number of selected rural communities.

The corporation will work in Carrizozo at the health clinic beginning July 7.

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Gavilan Canyon to be paved

The paving of Gavilan Canyon Road by the State Highway Department will be completed by the first of August, according to Les Olsen, Lincoln county manager.

This will provide a much needed bypass for individuals traveling from Carrizozo to the Hondo Valley, or wish to get around the congestion in Ruidoso.

This project was begun in 1974 as a joint venture between the county and the state. The county has provided their portion of the work, and the state will be paving the road late this month.

The state will probably take the road into their system for maintenance at a later date.

Olson files court case

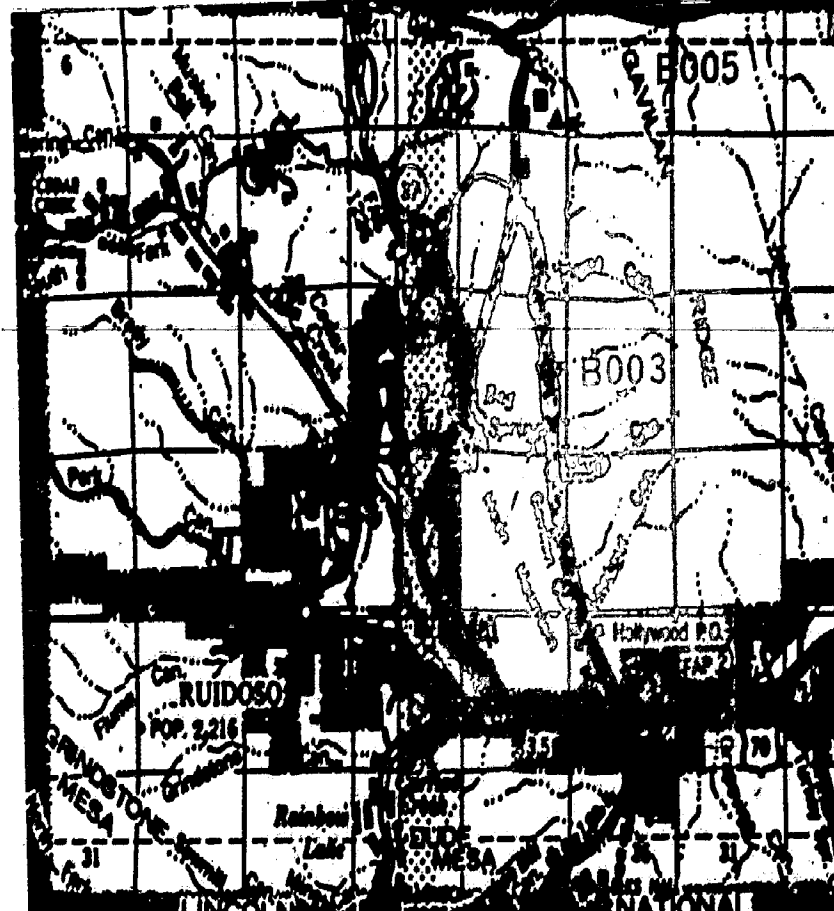
A civil case has been filed in the 12th Judicial District by Elinor Olson alleging that she was mistreated and that she has suffered immeasurable public scorn as the result of a comment made allegedly by a member of the Carrizozo School Board.

According to the affidavit filed by Olson's attorney, Frank R. Coppler of Santa Fe, Wesley Lindsay, a member of the school board, responded to a question posed by Richard Vega, also a member of the board, as to why Elinor Olson should not be considered for hiring as a teacher saying, "My kids are not going to be taught by a braless school teacher."

The suit maintains that as a result of the statement, Mrs. Olson has been denied the opportunity for employment by the school district, although she is qualified.

The plaintiff, Mrs. Olson, is seeking \$240,000 in actual damages, \$150,000 exemplary damages, \$150,000 in punitive damages and reasonable attorney's fees as well as the cost of the suit.

In addition, the suit states, "Plaintiff further prays judgement of the court that Defendants failure to offer employment to Plaintiff be found arbitrary, capricious and contrary to the law and that defendant be ordered by this court to hold a public meeting to reconsider the decision and offer a suitable teaching position to the plaintiff."



At this time, Lindsay and the Carrizozo School Board are negotiating with attorneys who will answer the suit.

The comment was allegedly made at the last meeting of the Carrizozo School Board on June 14.

Lindsay stated that he had no comment to make at this time regarding the suit.

Attorneys for Lindsay and the district will have to answer the suit within 30 days.

News sued

A complaint was filed this week in the Twelfth Judicial District naming Paul W. Payton, Eleanor Payton, Lincoln County News, Torrance County Citizen and the Village Press as defendants. Mary Rich, former manager of the News, is the plaintiff.

The complaint states that on or about Oct. 16 or 17, 1975 he entered an agreement with Ms. Rich and that on May 2 she was discharged without proper cause.

The complaint calls for Ms. Rich to receive 15 percent of the entire business, 10 percent of the net income of the business for the year 1976, for an order requiring the sale of the defendant's remaining interest in the business to the Plaintiff for a fair price to be determined at the trial, for \$25,000 in punitive damages and reasonable attorney's fees and court costs.

Representing the plaintiff is Sharon Stridley Mitchell of the Payne and Mitchell law firm in Carrizozo.
