Nogal Camp meeting will be July 20-24

Nogal Mesa Ranchmen's Camp meeting in Lincoln County will hold its 37th annual encampment July 20 to 24. Problems of civil rights, bureaucracy, economic and political strife, corruption, are all left behind as Christians of all denominations gather to share the annual experience of true brotherhood.

Once again, faith and fellowship will be renewed as the forested hills on Nogal Mesa resound with the singing of those persons clasping hands, wishing neighbors well, and counting the multitude of blessings we enjoy in a most enchanting portion of God's earth.

Opening services will be held Wednesday evening, July 20 and continue through Sunday evening, July 24. This year the preachers will be Rev. Mickey Fugit from Texas, and Rev. Bob Cook from Louisiana. Both men have been speakers at the meeting before. Paul Biggs and John Walker will again be in charge of the music. Harry and June Carl of Alamogordo will supervise twice daily services for young people in the youth tent. Ministers of all faiths are requested to offer assistance in counseling, be available for help, and if possible

camp on the grounds. Esther Van Soelen is bringing a group of young people from Clovis to help with the camp work.

Rick Steele, a pastor in Aledo, Illinois, has for years been camp manager. Officers include Walt Wilson and Johnson Stearns of Carrizozo, and Opal and Lamoyne Peters of Capitan. They report that a mobile home and camper-trailer have been set up for the clergy; a new hot water tank and gas tank have been installed, and the light plant rewired, with other repairs.

For those attending for the first time, there is camping space available at no charge for those participating in the services. All young people must be sponsored or accompanied by adults. Dogs would be much happier left at home, as they roam free and disturb by barking. Bring your own campers, tents, or bedrolls. Meals are provided with expenses defrayed only by donations. All persons are asked to register at the booth for that purpose.

The tabernacle and dining halls give roof shelter, but jackets and rainwear are essential for chill evenings and summer showers. The altitude is 7000 feet. A fenced play area with sponsors is provided for young children.

If camping is not possible, everyone is welcome to attend daily services. Meals are served chuckwagon style at 6:30 a.m., 12:30, and 6:30 p.m. Tabernacle services are held at 11:00 a.m., 3:00 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. Group prayer meeting are at 4:30 p.m. Choir volunteers are welcome and practice before each service.

The general business meeting is 1:30 Sunday. Memorial services for those who have passed away during the last year will be held Saturday at 3:00 p.m. "The Good Shepherd" is the featured theme under the direction of Mrs. Gill Peters and Mrs. Leale Armstrong.

There are still number of booklets available telling the history, experiences of the founders, and general information about the Nogal Mesa Camp Meeting. The registrars will answer any questions, settle any problems of encampment, and try to make your stay totally enjoyable. A nurse is present for minor physical handicaps.

The grounds can be reached by the Lincoln National Forest road turning off US 380 about 5 miles west of Capitan and 15 miles east of Carrizozo; or by the road off St. road 37 by Nogal Lake. Further information may be obtained from Johnson Stearns, Citizens State Bank, Carrizozo, New Mexico, 88301. No reservations are necessary.

Cancer Control Clinic now open in Zozo

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Weekly screenings are currently being conducted each Thursday and Friday at the health clinic. The Southwest Health Care Corporation (SWHCC) is a sub contractor with the New Mexico Community Based Cancer Control Program, a federally funded project of the University of New Mexico.

During the next few months, SWHCC will provide public education programs, screening detection,

diagnosis, treatment, follow-up care & rehabilitation to a number of selected rural communities.

Screenings will be concentrated on high risk women (women over 40, or those who haven't had a Pap smear for over a year). Screenings will consist of a physical exam and various tests.

The cancer control group will be at the clinic each Thursday from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. and on Friday mornings from 9 a.m. to 12 noon.

Pony Express Race set for Aug. 6

Entries for the annual pony express race from White Oaks to Lincoln are still being taken, according to Ralph Dunlap, Lincoln County Extension agent.

The 41 mile race will be held on August 6, and the last day to enter the affair is August 5.

According to Dunlap, in order to participate in the race, four horses and one or two riders must be entered for each team. The first rider, if there are two, will go from White Oaks to Encinosa and the second rider from Encinosa to Lincoln.

Western dress is required and all horses must be properly shod. In addition, each rider must carry a letter given to him at the start of the race. He must dismount at the edge of Lincoln and carry the letter on foot to the courthouse to complete the race.

The entry fee will be \$20 per team (\$5 per horse) and cash awards will go to both first and second place winners. Also, silver engraved plates will be awarded to the first two places.

Riders must be at least 14 years old or older, and entrants must follow the marked course.

The first lap will be from White Oaks to the John Robinson turn-off, a distance of 9.7 miles, with the second lap to continue on for ten miles to Encinosa. The third lap will take the rider 8.3 miles to the south base road turn-off and the final lap of 13 miles will conclude the ride at Lincoln. The total distance is 41 miles.

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800 Pounds

Marijuana found in Claunch

New Mexico State Police officers, along with U.S. Customs officials converged on Claunch last Sunday evening and recovered a reported 800 pounds of marijuana.

According to Dale Housley of the New Mexico State Police in Carrizozo, a report came in from Ernest Copeland of Claunch that a large load of suspected marijuana had been dumped on his ranch earlier that evening.

Housley along with Joel Pafford of the New Mexico Game and Fish Department investigated. They were joined by two officers from the U.S. Customs, Air Support division, and a sergeant with the N.M. State Police, narcotics division, who flew in from by helicopter from Albuquerque.

Housley reported that the 800

pounds of the illicit weed was obviously dumped hurriedly and that tracks indicated that a tricycle type landing gear airplane had landed in the area and dropped the load.

Housley also reported that as of this time, no suspects have been apprehended but it is possible that this load could be linked to four suspects who were arrested in Albuquerque last Sunday night.

Housley said that according to Duncan Majors, who lives in the area where the dump was made, he heard a plane land that evening and it sounded as if the plane had developed engine trouble.

An investigation is still continuing into the matter.

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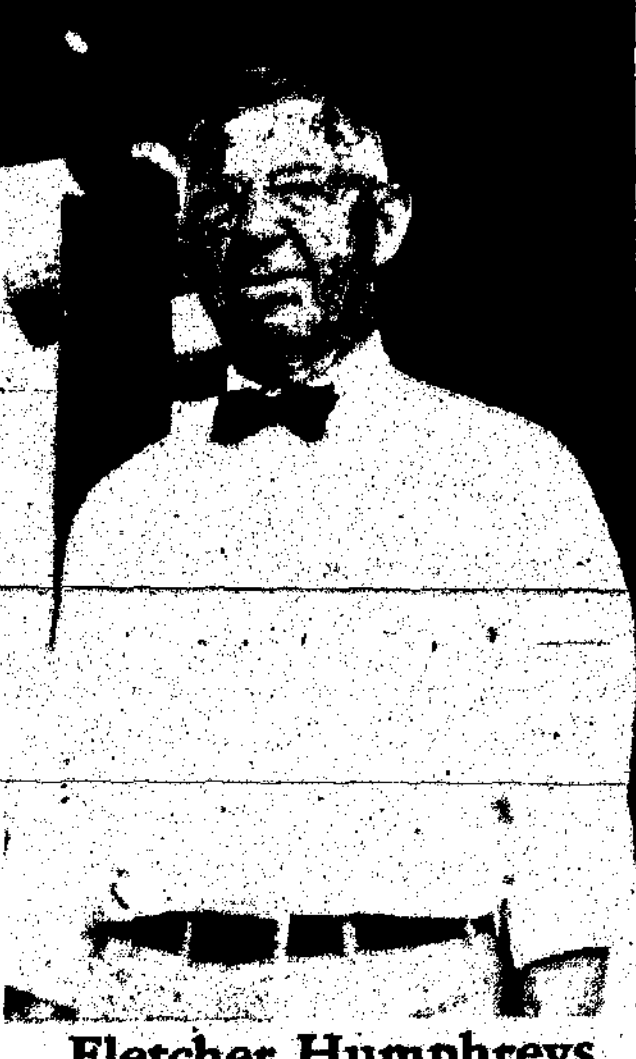

Obituary

Funeral services for Fletcher Humphreys Hall, Sr., a retired rancher and business man, were held last Thursday in Albuquerque, N.M.

Mr. Hall, a former long-time resident of Lincoln County, died July 4, 1977, in Albuquerque's Western Elder Nursing Home at the age of 97.

Mr. Hall was born August 31, 1879, in Oxford, Mississippi. As a young man, he moved to West Texas where he and a brother ranched.

In 1914 he filed a homestead claim north of Capitan. He carried the mail from Capitan to Spindle. Later he built a drug store in Capitan which he operated for many years before moving to Albuquerque in 1950.

While living in Capitan, F.H. Hall was active in many civic and religious affairs. He helped incorporate the village of Capitan and was elected its first mayor, serving the village in that capacity for twelve years. He was active in the Democrat Party serving various terms as precinct and County chairman.

He also served on the local school board. While living in Capitan, he was an active member of the Methodist Church and later the Christ United Methodist Church in Albuquerque.

F.H. Hall was preceded in death by his first wife, Tinnie Owens, in 1918 and their daughter, Christell Thomas of Tularosa. Also of this union, he is survived by a daughter, Wyona Brister of Palm Springs, California, and a son, Fletcher H. Hall, Jr. of Capitan.

Mr. Hall and Eunice Pickering were married in 1923. She preceded him in death this year. Their daughter, Mary Elizabeth Cook of Albuquerque survives. Mr. Hall is also survived by twelve grandchildren and fifteen great-grand children.

Fort Stanton

Norman Ham, David Pacheco, and John Genta have returned from military leave. For the last two weeks the men have been in Kansas for their annual National Guard Summer Training. Fort Stanton is much cooler than Kansas and the men seem to be ready to go back to work. Norman will take his vacation and will return to work in another two weeks.

Orlinda Luna has been released from the hospital but will not be able to return to work for several more days. Mrs. Birch and Charlene Whitned are still recovering from surgery and no date has been set for them to return to duty. Rudy Garcia and Steve Moro have been on a tour of Mexico and word came in that they have been delayed. Robert Trujillo will not be back to work for an additional six weeks. His back injury has not improved in several months. Mike Lawson had a slight injury while working with one of the Eddy Cottage boys. Mike pulled a muscle in his back when he was working on developing another way to teach motor development skills. His back is sore but he is still able to jump on the trampoline.

Eddy Cottage visited at our home Saturday and we had fun with the trampoline. All of the boys attempted to jump and seemed to enjoy watching our son turn flips. Mike has worked on the trampoline for four years and is now able to do a variety of stunts including forward and backward flips, double flips, front to back layouts and others which have no names. We use the trampoline to help children establish dominance. The coordination needed to jump helps develop eye, hand coordination and body dominance. Dr. Kephart, a noted special education professor, established his program using the trampoline to help develop gross motor skills. His program has been successful and is used in many areas. School districts who have trampolines in their PE departments often have problems with injuries. The tramp can be very dangerous if safety precautions are not used. Strict rules must be adhered to as well as having enough spotters at all times. Children can only jump for short periods of time because injuries usually occur when a person is over tired. We use all safety procedures when using the tramp in the school program. At our home we allow jumping only when adults are present. Only one child on the tramp at a time and having everyone around the edges is also required. We teach children to jump only in the middle and no stunts are allowed until all basic steps have been learned. Children with reading problems (reversals, encoding, decoding) often have a marked improvement in reading when they follow the Kephart program. The tramp does seem to help establish a dominant eye which also seems to help in the reading process. Elizabeth Pittman, Mona Griego, and Carrie Billy were with the boys from Eddy. They did not jump this time but next time for sure.

We are having a lot of fun with the summer program at the Fort. Last week Sierra I had a picnic and their classes at Bonita Lake. Bonnie McEuen drove the bus. Teachers attending were Barbara Noonan and Paul With. Client Service agents attending were Gloria Griego and Darlene Herrera (summer aide). Eddy Cottage is having another camp out for ten boys. All boys will go to the camp for supper (stew and fry bread) and then return to the cottage. Eddy, Jones, Michael Arraneo, and Eulacio Skinner will spend the night. Wayland Holbrook, Al Sanchez, Lilly Montes, Debbie Dalton, and Christine Wood will help with supper. Paul With, Mike and I will make the fried bread. The three of us worked on the Navajo Reservation for years and all cookouts had to have stew and fry bread. For those who are interested, fry bread is the most simple of the breads to make.

I never measure but the following amounts are about right. Each person makes the bread a little differently and change the amounts to suit their own tastes. Two cups flour, 1 teaspoon baking powder, 1/2 to 1 teaspoon salt, cold water to make a sticky dough. Work dough ten minutes. Let rest for thirty minutes, roll out or pat between hands until very thin. Fry until brown or bake on griddle. Add more salt if needed. Many of the Navajo people add

powered milk to the mix. Others add a small amount of lard. Some add more baking powder. We make ours to eat with beans-chili or make Navajo tacos. A lot of people like butter and honey and eat the bread as dessert. We will be making fried bread for around 50 people and it should be fun. We like to let the students roll out their own piece of bread. It seems to taste better if you make it yourself.

Jake Chavez, Ward Lockhard, Laura Hopkins, and Sylvia Chavez had a barbecue for Socorro cottage on Wednesday. They had planned to cook steaks but by mistake got weiners. The dietary department furnishes all food for the picnics, and cookouts. Tommy Aldaz is head of our dietary department. We appreciate all of their help. We have been going on two to five picnics, cookouts, campouts per week and the dietary department always has the food we request. When departments work together as do here it makes the program run more smoothly and the children are the ones who benefit from it.

Eddie Romero, an attendant who works in Socorro Cottage, was given the responsibility of working with eight of the more difficult older residents in his cottage who had peaked academically but who could not function in the vocational program. We call his group pre-vocational. For the last several months the boys have been cutting fire wood, cleaning flower beds, transplanting bulbs, and cleaning the area near their cottage. The boys have made excellent progress. At this time they are able to go to various areas to return tools or to pick up items needed by the others. They are working for several hours and are much happier. Temper tantrums have virtually ceased and the boys are more aware of the work skills needed for the vocational program. Eddie usually has a project planned for each week. To date he has had the boys replant all of the cannas by the dietary department. Another week they built a fence at Socorro and planted iris, cannas, and other flowers in several beds. Last week they cleaned out flower beds which had overgrown with morning glories. The boys dig, pull weeds, use a wheel barrow, follow more complex commands, and enjoy being assigned duties. Pride is developing and many of the staff are amazed to see boys, who just a few months ago were discipline problems, working and accomplishing difficult assignments. Eddie has done an outstanding job with his crew and should be commended highly.

The fourth of July was rather quiet at the Fort. Many people were on vacation and others were at the local rodeos. Gloria Griego and her family have returned from their vacation in Colorado. Lucy Griego is still on vacation and will not be back for another week. Horace Cordova worked at the Chuck Inn for the holiday. Timmy went on a trip to El Paso. Vaccinate your horse soon

Horse owners are encouraged to have their animals vaccinated for equine encephalitis (horse sleeping sickness) as soon as possible. Horse sleeping sickness is often a serious problem once the mosquito season arrives, says William A. Ljunghahl, Extension livestock specialist at New Mexico State University.

Horse owners across New Mexico should see their veterinarians about vaccination to protect against Eastern, Western and Venezuelan encephalitis. The vaccines are effective for only one year, so re-vaccination is necessary every spring.

Combined killer-virus vaccines are available for Eastern and Western equine encephalitis (EEE and WEE); and also for Venezuelan (VEE). EEE and WEE occur seasonally in many parts of the country. VEE has not been diagnosed since 1971 when this foreign disease invaded South Texas.

Research has shown that VEE has a complex natural history and many hosts. It isn't known which of these hosts may exist and harbor the virus in Mexico and the United States, or when the virus may re-emerge to affect either country.

All three sicknesses (EEE, WEE, VEE) affect humans as well as horses. But there are some significant differences between VEE and the other two. Birds usually function as a disease reservoir, carrying the viruses of Eastern and Western encephalitis. Mosquitoes transmit these diseases from the birds to horses or humans.

VEE, however, multiplies so rapidly in horses that mosquitoes biting infected horses at certain disease stages can pass the virus to susceptible (non-vaccinated) horses or humans.

All suspected horse sleeping sickness should be reported to a veterinarian or to animal health officials so steps can be taken to prevent or control possible epidemics.

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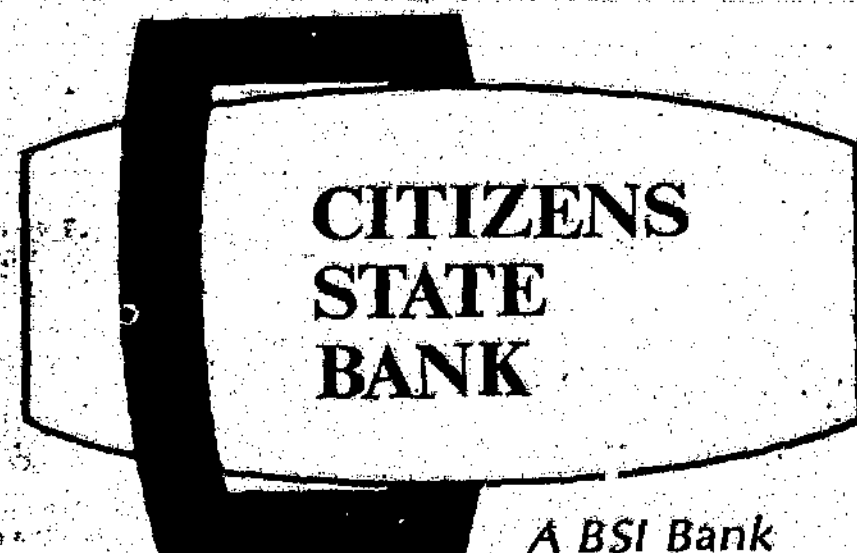

N.M. cycle laws see changes made

Recent legislation which changed motorcycle helmet usage requirements, for certain age groups, did not affect the law that requires all motorcyclists to wear eye protective devices, according to the Department of Motor Vehicles.

According to the Motor Vehicle Code, 1976 edition, statute 64-18-55, "any person operating a motorcycle, motor scooter or motor driven cycle, not having a fixed windshield of a type approved by regulation of the commissioner, shall wear an eye

protective device which may be a face shield attached to a safety helmet, goggles or safety eyeglasses."

The restricted helmet usage law, which was passed by the 1977 legislature, now only requires motorcyclists under 18 years of age to wear helmets. Previously, the law required all motorcyclists to wear the head protection gear.

Cyclists who choose not to wear the eye protective gear may be cited by law enforcement officials for failure to obey the Motor Vehicle Code.

A bowl of activities

A Flash of Fun for Nogal Residents!

Harvesting your own peanuts! Yes, try your own peanut plant, when you open your peanut, open a raw one and very carefully - try to keep from damaging the red skin around the seed. Take the nut or seed, and soak it in tepid water over night. Start three or four nuts, because some of them won't germinate. After they have soaked over night, take them and plant them about 2 inches under soil in at least a 12" wide pot. Keep the soil moist and 5 to 10 days the plant will poke through the soil. You may have to transplant them because you can only grow one plant in a pot. When you separate them take each one carefully gathering the roots, dig a small hole and fill it with water then place the roots in the hole covering lightly. Your soil should have a little sand in the soil if filled with caly or add peat moss. The plant needs 5 hours of sun a day and may be planted in a warm place out side. If you love peanuts here is the answer! Here is something else fun to do this summer!

If you happen to be walking over the mountains and you find some wild flowers, pick them and save them. An easy way to dry flowers is to place them between sheets of newspaper put under a pile of books for several weeks.

Blossoms to be used in dried bouquets can be air-dried-hung upside down in bunches just after they are picked. The length of time for hanging varies. Each variety goes through different stages of limpness. Pick flowers that adapt to air drying and remove all foliage from stems. Gather the stems together into small bunches and hang from coat hangers. Choose a place that is warm, dark and dry but also airy.

Then there is the borax and sand method. Use three parts borax and one part sifted clean fine sand, that is found at the hobby store. The flowers are layed under this moisture for about 14 days.

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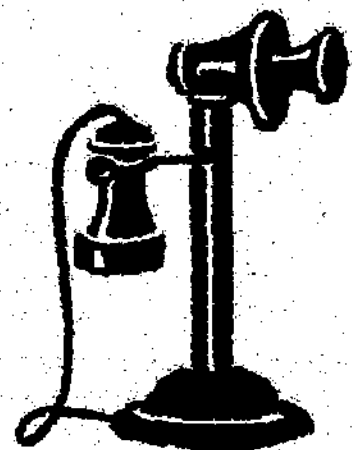

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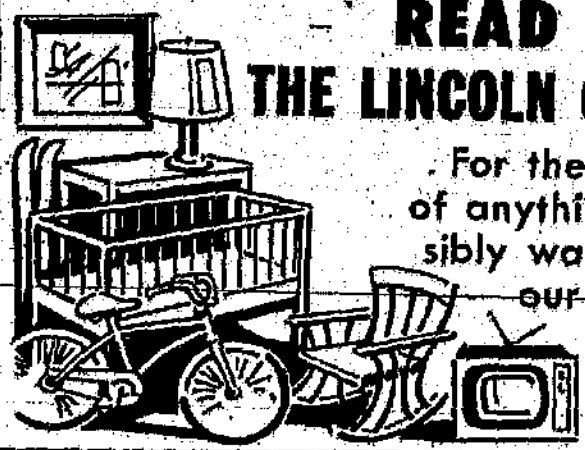

Zozo voters will go to the polls July 26

Registered voters in Carrizozo will be going to the polls on July 26 to decide whether or not the gross receipts tax should be raised another 1/4 of a percent which would bring the town sales tax to 4 1/2 percent as of Jan. 1, 1978.

A similar tax voted in last year took effect July 1, raising the sales tax to 4 1/4 percent and should this measure be approved by a majority of the voters of this area, it would raise the sales tax to 4 1/2 percent on the first day of 1978.

It has been pointed out, that if the additional tax is not voted into effect at this time, it would be July 1, 1978 before the sales tax could be raised again by voter approval.

It has also been noted that with the

present financial condition being what it is, the additional tax would certainly help matters, but similar taxes have been voted down in both Capitan and Ruidoso recently.

The proposition as it will appear on the ballot will read as follows: "Shall the Town of Carrizozo adopt a Municipal Supplemental Gross Receipts Tax Ordinance imposing an additional tax of 1/4 of 1 percent of the gross receipts of all persons doing business in the Town of Carrizozo (for a total rate of 1/2 of 1 percent Municipal Gross Receipts Tax)?"

The polling place for this election will be at the Carrizozo Town Hall and will be open from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Old Lincoln Town

Many people lost a wonderful friend when Helen Keller Pfingsten, wife of Fritz Pfingsten passed away at the Medical Center in Roswell at 9 p.m. on June 27, 1977.

She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H.E. Keller who owned and lived at Loma Grande Ranch. Her parents preceded her in death.

Helen attended school at Nogal Mesa until she entered High School at Capitan and later at Carrizozo. She and Fritz Pfingsten were married at Fort Stanton, November 25, 1927.

Notes from County Agent

Fail contracts for calves and lambs have been slow to develop. I have not heard of any fall contracts. Some July and early August deliveries show a little strength.

Some choice calves sold for 40-42 cents per pound for the steers and 34 to 35 cents per pound for heifers. These calves are expected to weigh about 500 pounds. Another calf sale was for 43 cents per pound for some 475 pound black baldface steer calves.

Some late July delivery of Whiteface lambs are reported to have sold for \$48.50 per hundred weight and are expected to weigh 70 pounds. About two thirds of the lambs will be wether lambs.

Livestock scales testing will start in Lincoln County on about August 15th this year. Ranchers who have had their scales tested last year will be notified when their scales will be checked by the New Mexico Department of Agriculture. Be sure to check your scales before the Inspector arrives so that you can get any broken parts fixed.

If any gate to the scale or if the scale itself is locked, please arrange to have it unlocked for testing purpose. If you wish to send us an extra key, it can be returned after the inspection.

As in the past, there will be no charge for our inspection provided the scale passes inspection. However, due to the expenses involved charge will be made on "call back" inspections that do not result in approval of the scale. This charge will be at the rate of 20 cents per mile and \$10 per hour from the inspectors' home base.

Protect Stone Fruits From Borers: Borer injury can kill young and old trees alike. Summer bark sprays or lindane paint will prevent this injury to peach, plum, apricot, cherry and nectarine trees. Peach-tree-borer moths lay their eggs on the trunks of peach and other stone fruit trees in early July. A coat of long-lasting insecticide on the bark when the eggs hatch will kill borers when feeding begins.

Home gardeners should use one tablespoon of lindane, 20 percent liquid concentrate, per gallon of water. If fruit is still on the tree, apply the mixture with a paint brush or a coarse spray to the trunk bark and lower limbs. Don't spray fruit or foliage. Also treat two feet of ground around the tree base and any exposed roots. Repeat application every 21 days until frost.

Signs of injury can be seen by digging dirt away from the tree base. Finding gum containing reddish brown droppings and sawdust indicates past or present borer action. A full-grown borer is a worm about one-inch long with brown head and cream-colored body.

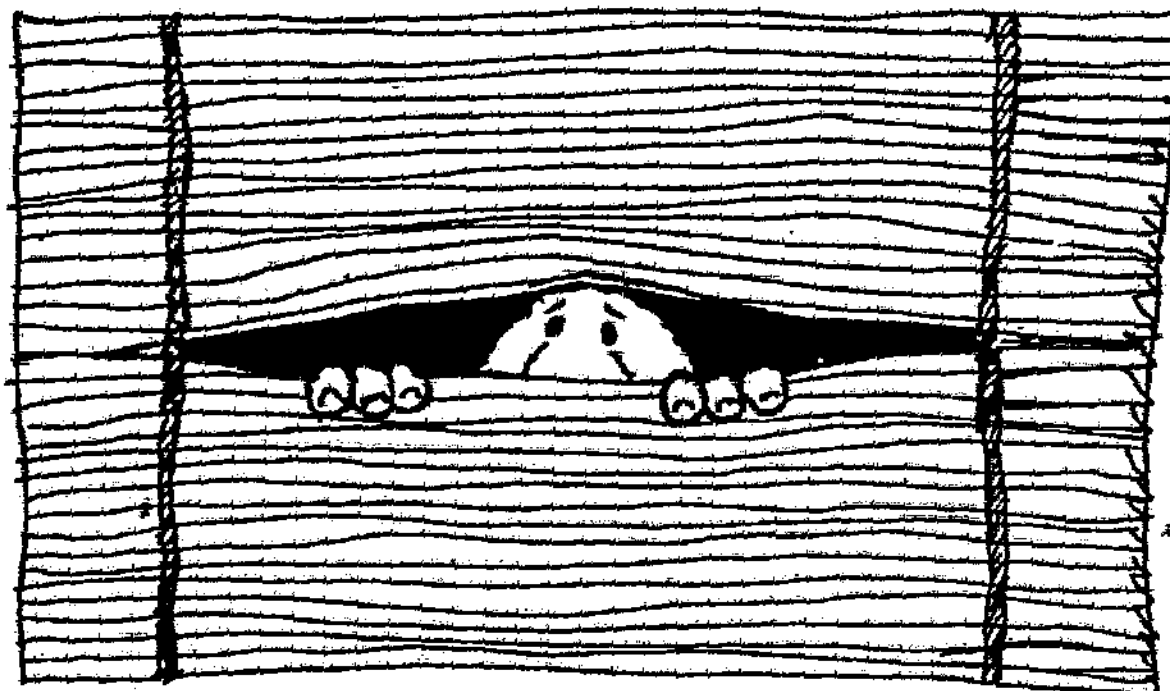

GENERAL ORDER NO. 31 June 6, 1977

EXTENSIONS OF CERTAIN DEADLINES FOR TAX YEAR 1977

Pursuant to my authority under Section 72-31-85 NMSA 1953 (Supp. 1975), I hereby extend the following deadlines found in the Property Tax Code with respect to the 1977 tax year only:

1. The deadline for the Property Tax Department to prepare and send to the Director of the Department of Finance and Administration an amended compilation of net taxable values, the deadline being found in subsection B of Section 72-29-32 NMSA 1953 (Supp. 1975) is hereby extended from August 1, 1977 to August 22, 1977. This extension is made to permit the Department to include additional information regarding final valuations resulting from completed protests and information on pending protests.

2. The deadline for County Valuation Protests Boards to decide protests which is found in subsection C of Section 72-31-27 NMSA 1953 (Supp. 1975) is hereby extended from " . . . one hundred and twenty days of the date the protest is filed . . ." to three hundred days after the date the protest is filed. This is the second extension of this deadline, the first extension being found in General Order No. 30, dated April 6, 1977. The effect of this Order is that all protests to 1977 notices of valuation filed with county assessors pursuant to the provisions of Section 72-31-24 NMSA 1953 (Supp. 1975) are required to be decided by the County Valuation-Protest Boards for the county within three hundred days after the date the particular protest is filed. This extension is made because of the number of protests filed in some counties, and the procedural requirements regarding these protests set forth by the Court of Appeals of the State of New Mexico in In The Matter of the Petition of the First National Bank, et al. v. Bernalillo County Valuation Protests Board, No. 2871.

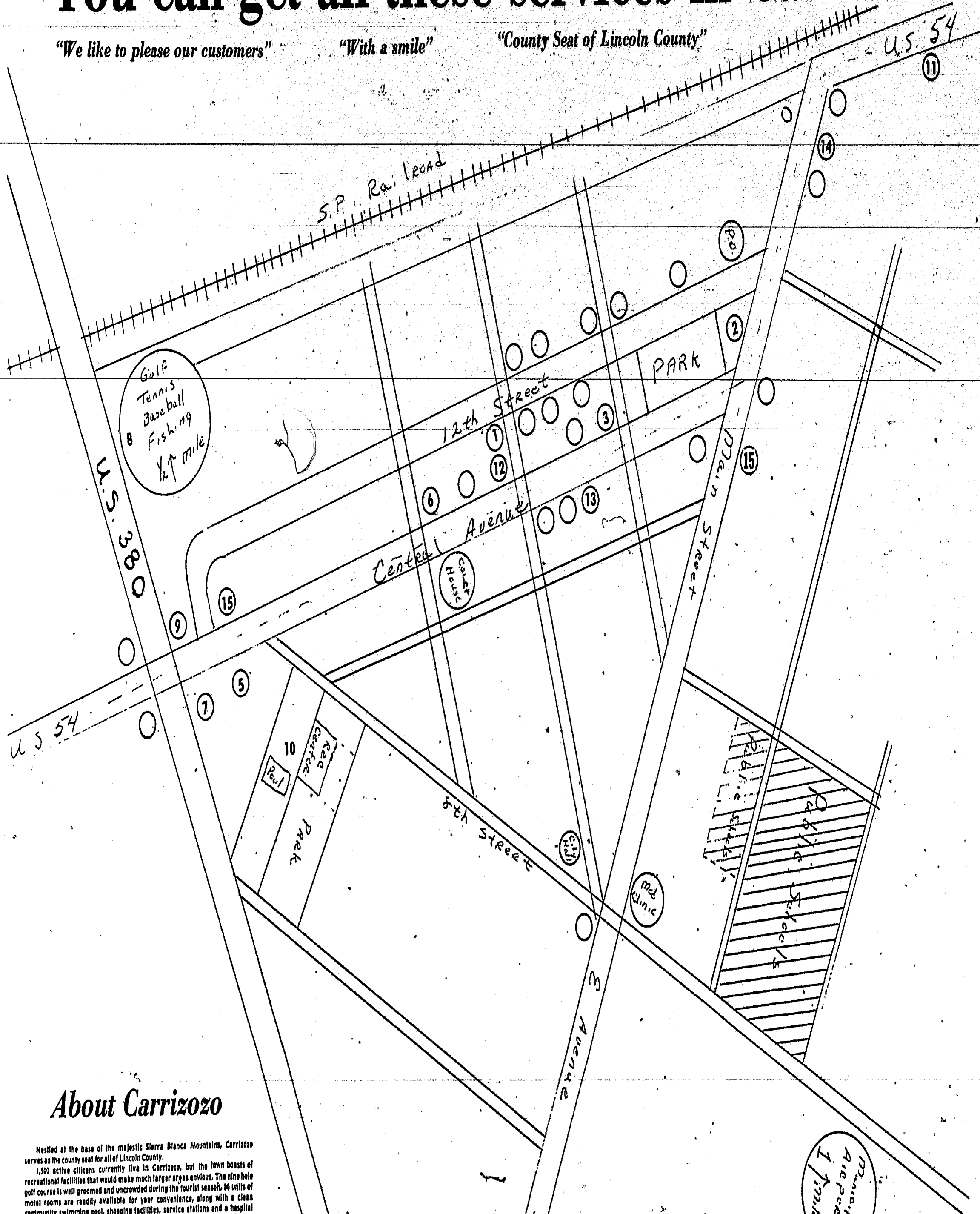

Ortiz found dead at Capitan home

An apparent suicide was investigated by area law enforcement officers last Monday afternoon when Lee Roy Ortiz, 44, of Capitan was found fatally wounded near a shed behind his home.

Health Council holds meeting

Members of the newly appointed Carrizozo Health Center Advisory Council discussed staffing and future facility plans in a meeting Wednesday with St. Joseph Hospital Clinic Administrator Mike Brown. Serving on the Advisory Council are Les Olson, Lee Straley, Dr. David Rouleau, Jack Magee, Jean Chavez, Aileen Lindamood, Robert Stearns, Verlon Petty, Joan Means, and Mary Rich. Council will advise on operation of the Health Center; health care needs of the local residents; and help plan the future development of the clinic and the facilities of the Lincoln County Municipal Hospital.

Mike Brown reported on the first year operation. Patients have increased from 400 per month to over 600, and collections have been increased from \$5500 to about \$8500. National Health Service Corps and St. Joseph Hospital are interviewing doctors for the Carrizozo Medical Area. The plans are for one physician and two family nurse practitioners to replace the two physicians who are going into private practice having completed their contract with NHSC. Dr. David Rouleau from Capitan will serve as interim doctor until a full time physician can be placed here. There will be no disruption of the medical care at the Health Center.

Ruth Mayhall, Family Nurse Practitioner was present at the meeting. She is looking over the facilities prior to accepting assignment here. Dr. Rolando Lavarro is also planning to be in Carrizozo in the near future to look at the facilities. He states, he is very interested in moving to New Mexico.

1/4% Sales tax vote is July 26

Registered voters in Carrizozo will be going to the polls on July 26 to determine whether or not the gross receipts tax will be raised another 1/4 percent.

In the event this measure passes, as of Jan. 1, 1978 the total sales tax in Carrizozo would be 4 1/2 percent. An increase of 1/4 percent went into effect July 1 of this year raising the tax to its current mark of 4 1/4 percent.

Mental health program

Federal money is now available for the establishment of a Community Mental Health Program in District VI which includes the five southeastern counties of the state, Lincoln, Otero, Chaves, Eddy and Lea.

A community Mental Health Program is defined as a service that promotes communication and interaction between those who have problems and those who feel they can help.

Local individuals are now forming a committee to explore the possibilities of establishing such a comprehensive program. A Planning Council, made up of people from District VI will decide what local services should be initiated or expanded, based on information supplied by the community.
