## Screwworm Cases Down

Five lab identified scewworm samples from animals in three New Mexico Counties during October brought the state's ten-month count to 22, reports a U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) spokesman.

This compares to 15 October cases and a 83 total by this time last year, says Dr. David A. Mitchell, veterinarian in charge of the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) Screwworm Eradication Program's sterile fly distribution center.

#### A Handful of Vision!

Good vision is a key factor in the hunting season. It is always good advice to see the hunter also so that you can get out of the way. A hunter's decision to squeeze the trigger is influenced primarily by what he sees, or by what he thinks he sees. The quality of his vision is a must! If vision is inadequate, the accident potential increases to that, hunters become a hazard to themselves and to others. Many hunters are unaware that their vision is defective.

Here are some suggestions of the skills & visual ability you should have.

1. Distinguish detail at a distance against various backgrounds.
2. Focus on near and distant objects and switch form rapidly.
3. Judge distances accurately.
4. Detect objects or movements to the side of target.
5. Identify colors.
6. See comfortably under different light.

### A Flash in Health!

Doctors are using eye tissue to repair diseased gums and save the teeth. Gum disease is the major cause of tooth loss in people over 35; Dr. Klingsberg uses the tissue, used from the eye banks in Long Island at the Medical Center. The operation is simple, the dentist takes pieces of the sclera and lays them down onto the jawbone after lifting back the flesh surrounding it. "Within weeks, the teeth are firm again and the gums don't bleed." Dr. John Duffy of Madison, Wis., said: "The new tooth is very impressive and the results good. Sclera, is actually the white of the eye.

## Calves Eat Cottonseed

Can you feed heifer calves cottonseed meal and watch them grow? That's what four researchers at New Mexico State University's Agricultural Experiment Station did, and they found that feeding cottonseed meal as a supplement significantly increased the winter weight gains of heifer calves during drought years.

The results of their study are available in Research Bulletin 627. The bulletin summarizes several winter supplemental feeding trials with cottonseed meal for both weaning calves and producing cows at the Fort Stanton Experimental Ranch in south-central New Mexico. It also reports the results of one trial comparing first calving at two and three years of age with different winter feed supplementation levels.

The researchers, E.E. Parker, Joe Wallace, Arnold Nelson and Rex Pieper, fed two pounds of cottonseed meal as compared to one pound to heifer calves. The results were significant. During a 133-day winter period, heifer calves gained 37 pounds.

In three trials, the researchers found that calves fed one pound of cottonseed meal daily, as compared to calves fed no supplement, showed an average winter gain of 47, 30 and 77 pounds.

According to the researchers, the question of whether to provide feed supplement to weaner calves should be based on their future use. If calves are to be sold in the spring or bred to calve as two-year-olds, supplemental feeding would probably be beneficial.

However, if calves are to be sold the following fall, or kept and bred to calve first as three-year-olds, the benefits from supplemental feeding may be marginal.

Another factor to consider when deciding whether to provide a feed supplement is the weather.

The data indicated that, during normal years, a relatively high level of performance can be maintained with no supplementation other than salt and phosphorus. However, production was generally increased with supplemental cottonseed meal.

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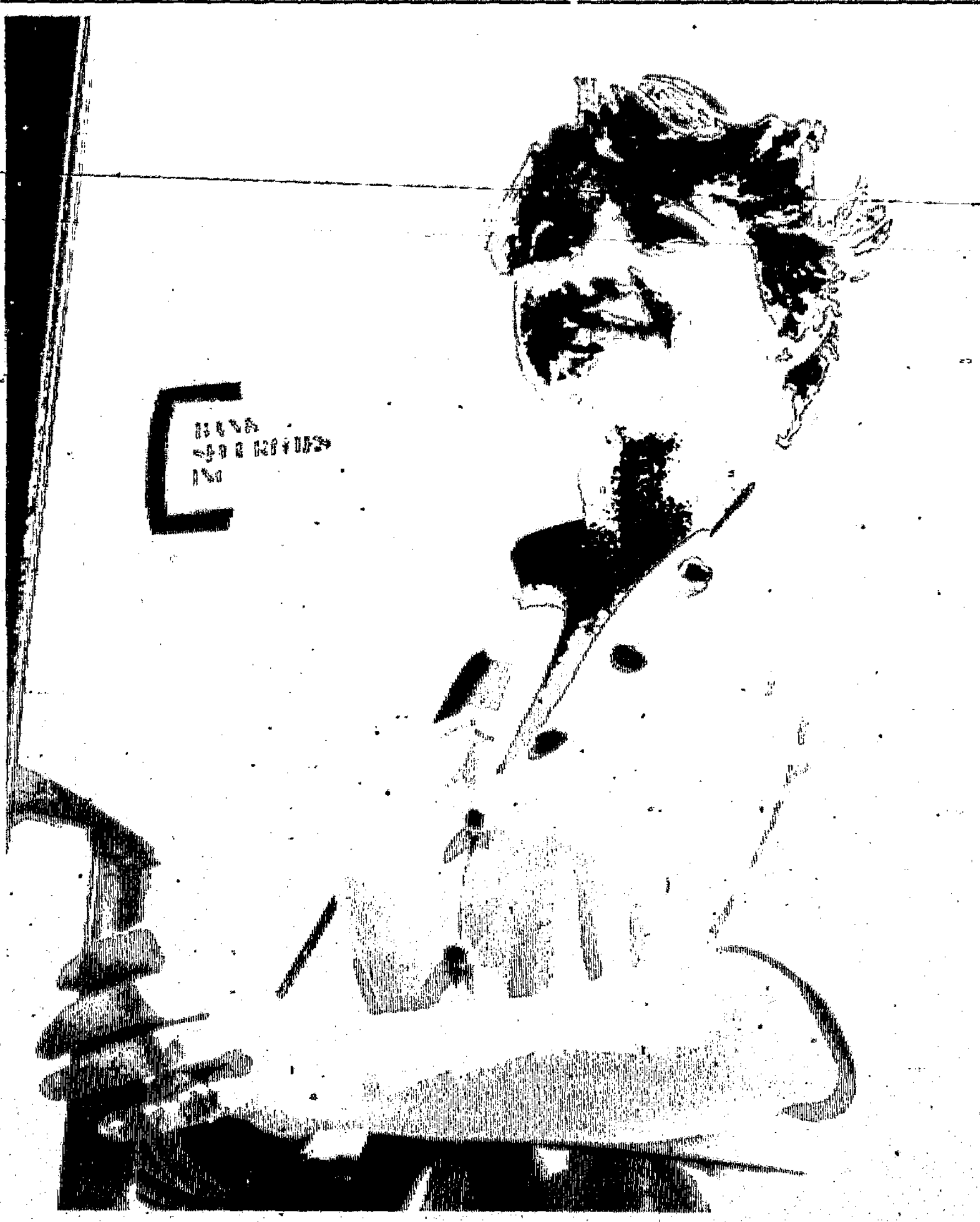
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# Xi Beta Epsilon Discusses Queen Victoria

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

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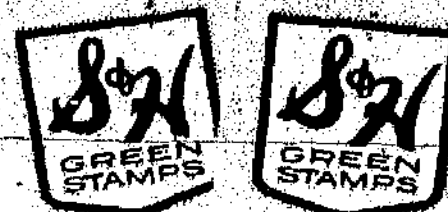

## 7 to 6, but still a win

The Carrizozo Grizzlies behind the running of quarterback Ray Hernandez and a stout defense managed to edge by the visiting Tatum Coyotes 7-6 Saturday afternoon.

Coach Henry Paul's squad came out of the start and dominated the visiting Coyotes throughout the first-half but only managed a 0-0 deadlock at half-time.

With Tatum driving at start of last quarter Grizzlies again hold visitors on a fourth and one situation at Zozo 36 yard line. Bruce English and Tommy Samora combination, on the stop.

Two plays later Hernandez sweeps left on a keeper on a 2nd and 14 from his own 41 yd. line, shakes loos from a couple of would-be tacklers and out-runs the Tatum secondary into the end-zone for Grizzly touchdown. Mike English kicks for PAT and Zozo takes lead with 6:29 left in the game.

Tatum comes right back after receiving kick-off and with the help of a pass interference against the Grizzlies, plus long pass completion, and some fine running by half-back Walker manage to get to the Zozo 4 yard line. On first down from the 4 yard line Walker sweeps left into the end-zone. Score now 7-6 Grizzlies. Coyotes call time-out before attempting conversion. Visitors decide to go with same play for two-points, but John Chavez and Bruce English come through for the Grizzlies and stop Walker short of the end-zone. Score still 7-6.

The Coyotes decided to kick deep on the kick-off hoping to stop the Grizzlies and get one more shot, but Buggy Vega and Hernandez managed three first downs between them and the Grizzlies killed the last 3:35 on the clock as the gun went off.

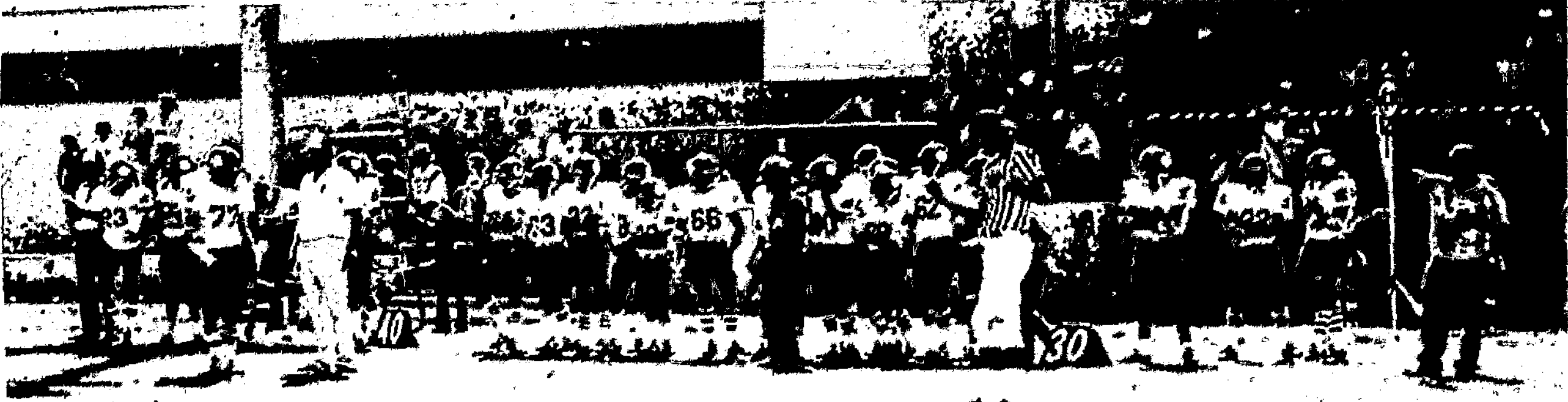
Carrizozo now advances to semi-final game against county-rival Corona, which defeated highly regarded

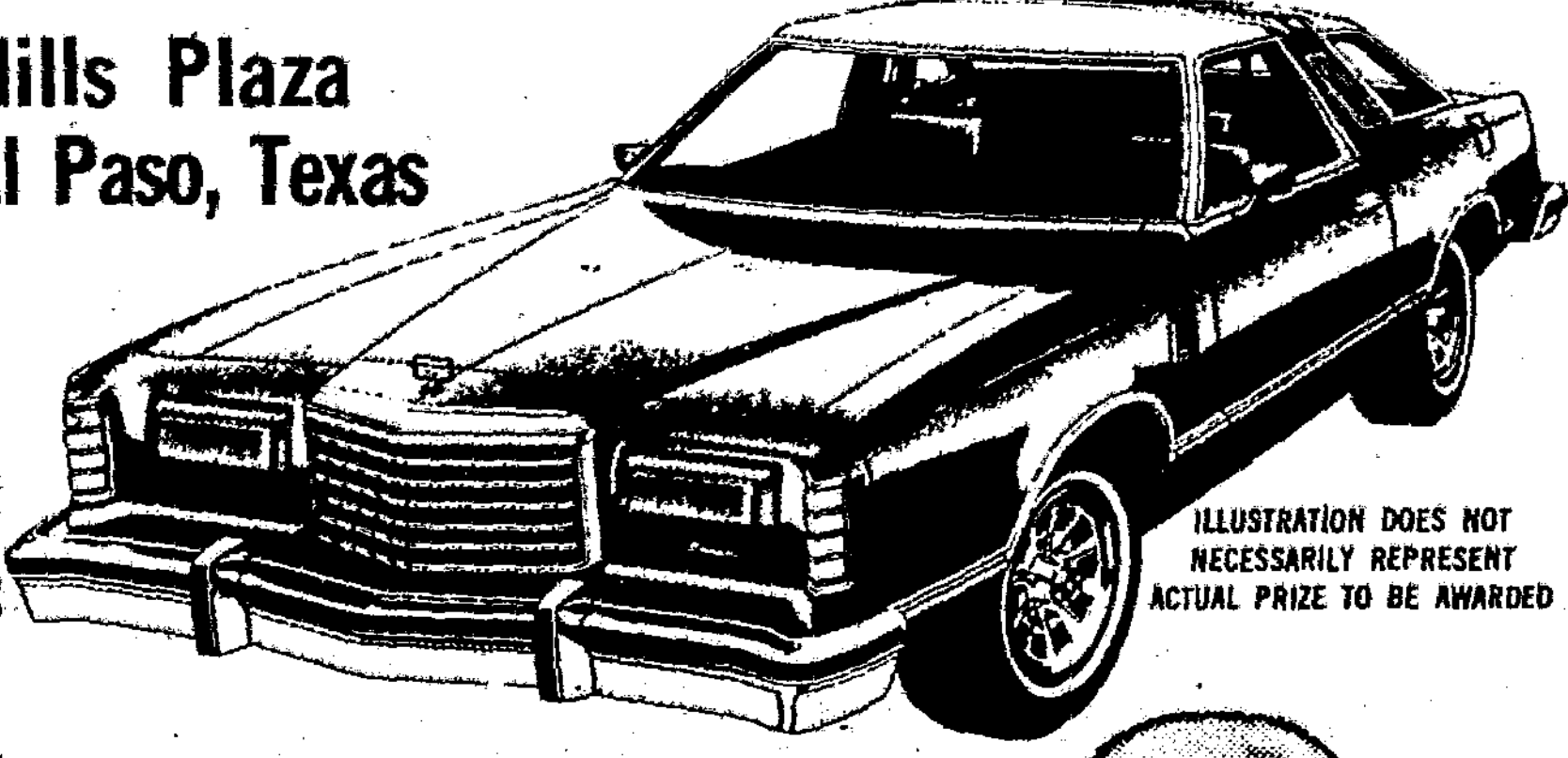
