The kidnapper abducted Mountainair mechanic Kenneth Hendricks and forced him to drive to Colorado where he shot and wounded two other people.

Board rehires teaching staff

The Carrizozo Board of Education approved the recommendation of Superintendent Jim Steinepreis to rehire the entire school teaching staff for the coming year.

The decision appeared to be in question but a thirty minute closed session produced a unanimous decision to go along with the superintendent's recommendations.

Wally Ferguson, prior to the closed session of the meeting discussed tenure which comes with the fourth year

contract of employment. He said that by employing a teacher for the fourth year, the board was saying that the teacher had a lifetime job with the school. He said that the board should make that decision only when the teacher had become a real member of the community and could relate to all sections of the town.

The board room had an unusually large audience for the meeting with quite a number of teachers present. Stearns was presented with a plaque in appreciation of his service.

Steinepreis discussed pending legislation which appears to provide additional funds for the coming year. The budget for the \$13,000 Title I program was left up to the administration by the board.

The board will begin to consider school handbook revisions but the final preparation date is next August.

Board member Richard Vega said he felt there should be better relations between the school administration and parents. "I do not think you should tell parents they are troublemakers when they complain," he said. Steinepreis said he did not believe that had happened.

Vega said that he and other members had inspected the school and found the rest rooms in bad condition. The janitorial staff could not be found, he said, and the girl's restroom were in bad condition.

He said that better supervision was needed and the administration was told to take necessary steps to remedy the problem.

Gary Hightower of Ancho told the board that his daughter would be of kindergarten age next year and asked that the Ancho route be resumed at that time. The matter was discussed and will be studied.

Steinepreis was given the authority to advertise for bids for topping the area north and west of the new gym. A paving company is now working in the area and has estimated that the paving can be done for around \$4800. The muddy area for parking and walking has been a problem this year, the board noted.

In a letter to the board, Sabino & Petra Sandoval questioned the methods of selecting all district and all tournament basketball team members. The letter mentioned their son Danny who has been an outstanding player this year but failed to receive recognition on the district team.

Wally Ferguson said that the methods of selecting were not necessarily fair and he questioned the whole process. "I like for the kids to vote on nominations from the opposition teams," he said.

The board seemed to believe that the nominating and selection process should be changed, if possible, or the all-teams idea stopped altogether.

The wool team members Laurie Voss, Gary Joe Lovelace, Maurita Lovelace, Lorrie Porter and Lee Vega placed second. Gary Joe Lovelace second high individual; Maurita Lovelace third high and Lee Vega fourth high.

The livestock team placed fourth members Rex Wilson, Marc McKinley, Phil Straley, and Lisa Ferguson.

The dairy team placed seventh, members Mitch Colwell, Bernice Sambrano, Carrie Sue Dobbs, Mona Payne, and Michael Baroz.

Cable hookups near

The first hookups of the new underground ZoZo Cable TV are expected to be made in two weeks. Arl Cope, president has announced.

The cable is laid from the tower to the city limits on the west side of Carrizozo and B Avenue will go on service first.

Cope said that he expects to have the entire town on the system in the next two months but there will be some delay in providing two of the nine channels that are planned.

High winds and frozen ground have been responsible for most of the delay, he said, but there has been a delivery delay on some of the equipment.

The company is now owner of the old cable system and is doing some maintenance while the new lines are going in.

In a letter to subscribers Cope said: "Mr. Wesley Lindsay, the Telephone Manager in Carrizozo, whom most of you know I'm sure, has agreed to help me in Carrizozo and is authorized to act for me in regard to the new Carrizozo Cable T.V. System. You may contact him if you have problems with the cable system, if you wish to be hooked up to the new system, or if you

have questions about the old system or your television reception. Wesley will also have a list of the subscribers and a record of their monthly payments.

"Our system is underground and as you probably know, such a system takes time to install, but we are already beginning to hook-up some viewers and should be to your home within 90 to 120 days, provided the weather and availability of equipment and materials cause no problems."

Edward Vega second



Tech offers new musical

Off-Broadway comes to New Mexico Tech - with the musical comedy, "Little Mary Sunshine!"

"Mary Sunshine" is a musical spoof about an old-time operetta, written by Rick Besoyan, and is one of the most successful off-Broadway shows ever produced in New York.

The Tech performances will be open to the public. Ticket donations will be \$2.50 for adults and \$1.00 for senior citizens and children 16 years and under. Proceeds will go to the NMT Music Scholarship Fund. Producing a musical is to become an annual event at Tech, as one of the projects undertaken by the new music division. The Tech "Miners" may have struck a vein of "gold" when the division was added.

In less than a year, the "Miners" have established two choral and two instrumental performing study groups, are producing a musical comedy, and are raising funds for music scholarships to be awarded to musically talented science and engineering students coming to Tech and willing to perform with one or more of their groups.

In addition to the NMT Chamber Orchestra, there are: a Modern-Choir, which performs Jazz, Rock, Broadway show and popular music; a Jazz-Rock Ensemble, which has already received standing ovations for its performances of dance band, jazz & rock selections; and a Concert Chorus, which sings all styles and periods of choir literature.

every part of the yucca plant for food, housing soap, clothing, household utensils and to restore and maintain good health.

Extracts from the yucca have been used for years as a food flavoring adjunct and plant saponins, because of their detergent (foaming) qualities, have been incorporated with soft drinks, shampoos and other such everyday products.

Results of the yucca extract was reported by Dr. Robert Bingham of Riverside, Calif., and two other doctors. In the Bingham-Balles Study 165 arthritis patients ranging from age 11 to 95 years were given an average of four tablets daily for periods of four weeks to 6 months. Some of the patients were given yucca tablets daily, and some were given inactive tablets. The ones who took the yucca tablets reported relief of pain, stiffness and swelling and none reported ill effects.

It might be a wise idea to try this at least it can't hurt and it might help at least it might be worth looking into. A Cup full of glamour for spring!

The Azaleas, the most beautiful plant, one that you would love in your home. Try finding a Rutherfordia hybrid—these grow for years and years. I know of one that is 20 years old. It was kept indoors all winter in a cool bedroom with an east window, and then moved out doors to a shady spot in the garden during the summer. Surprisingly, it bloomed indoors in early spring. It needs acid soil, humy, moisture retentive soil conditions, plus frequent waterings, soil should be kept moist and fed once a month.

My, my, look here are some beauty recipes. Dear Robbie,

A friend of mine told me to use 1/4 cup honey in a small saucepan and pat your face all over with it. This will fight blackheads and make your face feel so nice.

Here is another mask for oily skin. Peel and seed a ripe red tomatoe (drop it in boiling water for a minute to peel). Mash the pulp and mix with cornmeal. Massage your skin thoroughly with the

mixture and leave on a few minutes, then rinse with cool water.

Boil some water in a large pan and add the juice of 1/2 lemon and a handful of any herbs you have handy, like rosemary, thyme, mint, marjoram, or any others, turn off the heat and after covering your head with a towel, hold your head close to the steam of the pan, steam your face for about 10 minutes. 1 cup of butter milk

Mix all this together and pour into a pie shell, bake at 375 until set about 30 minutes. Watch carefully, the middle won't be set as well as the edges.


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

Frank English came to Carrizozo, N.M. in 1907 with his sleeping bag, carpenter's tools and \$15. But he's a thrifty soul. Sleeping in the vault of the bank he was finishing, taking his meals in a tent across the road, he saved \$25 from his first week's paycheck. Small wonder then that he soon became the busiest carpenter in town.

"I'd take any job anybody would hire me for," he remembers with a chuckle. "One day I'd substituted for the regular water-wagon driver. (We bought our water from the water-wagon, which had huge barrels of good Bonito water). I went to the house of the lady who did laundry for all us men, and told her to haul out all her kegs and barrels and tubs — this was one time she was getting some free water. Finally, when we'd filled every container in sight nearly, I said 'What about that old tub hanging on the wall there?' And she said, 'Oh Frank, that old tub is like me — it leaks!'"

Frank worked at all the nearby ranches, building windmills to seek the precious white gold — water. And armed with his drafting skills and carpentry tools, he built half the town of Carrizozo, which was beginning to grow.

"I built that house Vernon Petty owns, for Albert Ziegler — he was the grocer. That's a two-story house, built for about \$7,200," he recalls. "I built that brick house down on Main Street and a house for H.B. Hamilton the lawyer over there in front of the courthouse. I also built that adobe where Mrs. Shafer lives — built that for Dr. Watson, who was county treasurer. I'd never worked with adobe before, but, well... when in Rome..."

"One summer — it was 1916 — I went up into the mountains and built the first houses in Ruidoso. 'Twasn't Ruidoso then — we just built on the Ruidoso River, so to speak. Built those houses for Dr. Watson, Benson Newell, and Judge Medler.

"And you know that old water wheel there in Ruidoso? Well, that was there then — it'd been built years and years ago by a settler. It had an old carved log for an axle, and it was rotting out and getting all out of plumb. So I drew up plans and figured and figured, and had a steel axle and bearings put in it — they're in it still, since 1916."

Somewhere along in here — Frank can't remember for sure just when — he married pretty Mae Bureson, who worked at the Carrizozo Trading Co.

"She didn't know my name or nothing," he recalls of their first meeting. "I was building the old post office for Mr. Wetmore and I kept going back and forth to the store to buy nails. She got to calling me 'Mr. Nails,' and one thing led to another and..."

Frank and Mae had five children. "She was certainly a fine woman," her widower sighs today. The oldest child, Donald, died in 1942 after an overdose of sulphur for a sinus infection. Daughter Glenneth (Stokes), who graduated from the University of New Mexico, now teaches in Roswell. Marguerite (Burton) lives in Mitchell, Neb. Frank Arthur English Jr., graduated from Syracuse University and is an allergist in Roswell, and son Fred now runs the hardware store in Carrizozo that the elder Frank began.

All the children graduated from high school in Carrizozo, something that makes Frank proud. "When I came here, I was only 20 years old," he says. "I remember because there was some kind of election and they wanted me to vote and I couldn't — I wasn't old enough."


In 1916-17, Frank was startled when he lost the bid on a large new office building being planned by Old Man Lutz, who was part-owner in the Trading Company. "I lost the bid by \$300," he recalls with a grin. "But I got the building."

For some reason, the building never held enough clients to make its way, and it was acquired by default by the First National Bank of Santa Fe in 1920. "The roof leaked," says Frank, "but basically it's a good building — has a good basement and floors." Frank bought the \$60,000 building for about \$20,000.

"The first dance hall was in this building," he says of the place where he now lives above the hardware store. "They even roller skated in here up on the second floor at one time — I've made it into apartments now. I wanted the building for my hardware store and I moved it in here."

Frank was a hardworking father, trying during the Depression to keep his hardware store and other efforts afloat. "I can remember an attorney telling me I ought to take bankruptcy after I'd lost all my money in the banks. I said 'I can't. I've got five children,' and I just fought it out. Got a loan on my insurance to pay my bills and just fought it out. A lot of us did."

Besides hardware and tools, Frank

sold Delco light plants — a gasoline-engine-powered generator — all over the countryside, from Estancia to Magdalena to Orogrande to Cloudcroft and in between. "Then, after I'd sold 'em a light plant, I'd go back and sell 'em a Frigidaire," he chuckles. "I sold mostly to meat markets at first, and later to people's homes."
"I made two bits or so in my life," he

grins. "But things change, and you gotta follow along with them. I never had to go to war — by the first World War I had five kids — but both the boys served in the Second War. Now we're in a little bit of a depression again — I hope they don't have to have a war to break it up. That's the last thing we need is a war . . ."

The houses that 70 year old Frank English built in Lincoln County are still standing and still occupied. There is a good reason for that: they were built to last and be lived in.

These homes will remain Lincoln County landmarks as will the home in the center of Capitán and the old gym in Corona that Mr. English helped to rebuild after it blew down in the early 1920's.

Kate McGraw wrote articles for the El Paso Times which are included here at Mr. English's request. They tell something of the background of this man who has left such an important mark on his community.

There is something unique and lovely about each home but the heart of the construction would be its endurance, the same endurance and courage that marks the builder.

Frank English built this home as a rent house for Len Granum. It is now owned by Mr. and Mrs. Albert Seay who have an attractive turquoise trim on a lovely window arrangement.

On the west side of town is the home owned by Nat Palomarez. It was built for a Lincoln Lawyer George Barber. Nat has died quite a bit to the original structure.

The house was built for George Dingwall, a conductor on the El Paso and Southwest Railroad. Jim and Sharon Stejneger live in the home.

Another house built for Len Granum was this large two story home now owned by C.E. Degner. Mr. English said he built the chimney around a wooden frame and one day the frame caught on fire and burned leaving the chimney just like it is now. Beautiful hardwood beams and masonry are a feature of the English homes.

The Vernon Peffy home is the only English house designed by an architect. It was built for Albert Zepher who once owned the store that the Peffy's later bought. The first floor walls are 18 inch adobe and the second story is made of 12 inch adobe bricks. The house cost \$7200 when it was built.

The Place family home is the home of Beatrice Ortiz. The Place family came to Carrizozo with FREDERICK CLARENCE SPENCE.

The Place home is now the home of rancher Clarence Spence who operated a large sheep ranch west of Carrizozo. Frank English worked for almost a year building this home. It is now owned by Otto and Ernest Prehm and is unoccupied.

The first house that Mr. English lived in was this three room home. He lived here with John Gallacher before he was married to them. It was the place he and his wife had their first home in.

The Grace Jones home is now owned by Ernest and Susie Alford.

The Stanley Squires home is now owned by Paul Otero. Since Mr. English built it there have been additions that give the place a special effect.

Mabel Vigil has lived in this home since 1942. It was built for John Bell and is beautifully maintained.

The detail work on the eaves of this home is typical of the touches of beauty on the old English homes. The house was built Dan Tiffney as a rent house. The Paul Salgado's live here now.

This pretty pink house was built for H.P. Dawson who was working for the Exchange Bank when they moved it from White Oaks to Carrizozo.

The George Spence home was built from New Mexico Penitentiary brick. Mr. English worked with Hank Purdy on the use. Spence was a lawyer and the brother of rancher Clarence Spence. Later it was owned by the family.

This is the home in which Frank and Mae English raised their five children. It is now owned by Mr. and Mrs. Joe Orsack who teach in the Carrizozo School.

Frank English and Jack Shaw look at an old relic Jack found buried near the house. It may have been one Frank used all those years ago when he built the Capitán house.

Mr. English still spends the summer in this Bohito River home. A beautiful rock fireplace is the center interest in the living room.

The offices of Baldo are located in this adobe building which once housed a millinery store and fine apartments.

Still in good condition is the home of Family Pharmacy. Mr. English built the building in the 20's for Rolland Drug.

Mae Burleson English was Frank English's first wife and the mother of his five children.

The Corona gym still stands but two times it was in ruins. The first was when the walls were blown down in a big storm. Mr. English rebuilt it within a year. Work in the early twenties led to about 1925, fire partially destroyed the building and since it was rebuilt.

The ruins of the Corona gym were printed on a post card sometime in the 1920's. This picture was probably made after the first were blown down.

The attractive house on Central was built for an engineer, Walter Warner. Quite a few of the English houses were the homes of doctors. It is now the home of Margaret Holguin.

Mr. English built quite a few buildings for the Welmore. Once the Cibola Hotel and the Ford Agency, this is now the home of a manufacturing company in Carrizozo.

Mrs. Birdie Walker who once ran the Lyric Theater lives in the home built for Mr. Stewart who managed a Foxworth Brothers lumber yard in Carrizozo.

Sam Fred English uses the building for storage now but it was once the home of the Lincoln Bank when Carrizozo had three banks in operation.

This is what El Paso looked like in 1919 when it was the main street of Carrizozo. Mr. English built the brick buildings on the west side of the street. The Woman's Club is sponsoring a restoration project on this street.

The H.B. Hamilton house is now owned by Paul Moore. Hamilton was the district attorney and once was responsible for a whole car load of convicts to Santa Fe from Lincoln County.

The worth house is a Capitán landmark. Frank, Hank Purdy and Renaldo Duran built the beautiful home which now goes to Jack and Frances Shaw. It is in superb condition and wonderfully liveable.

This is the last house that Mr. English. The stone came from Arizona and the rock construction idea came from homes he saw on a trip to Canada. The Ralph Barco family now owns the home.

Mr. Roy Shater now lives in the home that was built for T.W. Watson.

Mr. and Mrs. Herb Totten, Ruth, a retired nurse now owns this home that Frank English built for a rent house. The profits from the lumber sale for the Clarence Spence house went into this home. Later he sold this home to Kitty Allen who became Mrs. Dan Spencer, Sr.

One of the English built homes are adobe construction and the adobes were made right on the building site. The C.A. Snow was built for Major H.P. Campbell around 1911.

red Lopez lives in the home built for Stanley Squires a clerk in the old Rolland Drug Store. The detailing on the eaves is fine on the garage.

rs. Minnie Reil owns this little home that was built for Charlie Jones.

he John Harkey home was built for George Ulrich, president of the Exchange Bank. Note the wood stripping on the walls in the eaves.

ORANGE TORTE

Crust:
1 1/2 c. flour
3/4 oz. coconut cream pudding mix (not instant)
1/4 tsp. salt
1/2 c. shortening
2 Tbsp. margarine
1 egg

Combine all ingredients in a large mixing bowl, blend at low speed until moistened. Press into ungreased 13 x 9 inch baking pan; bake at 350 degrees for 15 to 18 minutes until golden brown. Cool.

Filling:
2 c. (1 pt.) sour cream
1 one-third c. (14 oz.) sweetened condensed milk
1 (4 1/2 oz) can orange flavored instant breakfast drink start
Combine in small mixer bowl, beat 1 minute. Pour into baked crust. Top with whipped topping.

BANANA SPLIT CAKE

2 c. graham crackers
2 sticks oleo
3 c. powdered sugar
1 egg
1 tsp. vanilla
1 (No. 2) can crushed pineapple
4 to 5 ripe bananas
9 oz. carton Cool Whip
8 oz. bottle cherries
1/2 c. nuts
1 small can chocolate syrup
1/4 c. coconut

Crush graham crackers with 1 stick oleo. Mix well and press into 9 x 13 inch dish. Mix sugar, oleo, egg, vanilla, and enough pineapple juice to make it spread easily. Spread over crust, spread pineapple on top, cut bananas and add. Top bananas with Cool Whip. Top with cherries, nuts, coconut. Swirl chocolate syrup on top and chill.

For the past two weeks I have been writing about the various departments at Fort Stanton. This week I will cover the Educational programs at Luna School and at Recreation.

Barbara Noonan is the certified special education teacher at Luna. She is hired under Title I funding to teach students under the age of 21. Abby Baldwin, Gloria Griego, and Lucy Griego are other non-certified teachers. The staff at Luna work as a team. Students are divided into small groups after the initial social circle activities. Each teacher works on physical motor skills, language development, auditory and perceptual skill development, social awareness, eye-hand coordination, and arts-crafts. Students are in individualized programs. A 90 day plan is made at IDT staffings. From this long range plan weekly objectives are written. In addition to the educational classes, the Luna staff, known locally as the "Luna Loonies", have developed a special program for the CP children at the Fort. Daily passive resistive exercises are done on each child to gain greater range of motion, control drooling, and improve the walking gait.

The Recreation Department is headed by Bonnie McEuen. Working with her are Robert McCarty and Rito Samora. There is another position to be filled in Recreation in the near future. Every student at the Fort goes to recreation daily. Classes are scheduled from 8:30 a.m. until 8:30 p.m. Bonnie and her staff make weekly individualized lesson plans based upon the long range treatment plans, students exercise, work on motor development, receive O.T., and participate in social activities during these hour long classes. The O.T. room is located at recreation. Aides from the cottages go to recreation to work with the identified students who need occupational therapy. Aides currently working in the O.T. program are Steve Moreno and Mona Griego from Eddy Cottage. Rudy Garcia from Sierra, and Gloria Griego from Luna. Marie Perrea had worked in O.T. for Sierra, but she is still in the hospital at

Ruidoso. She has been ill since January. Bonnie is also in charge of helping to plan for special recreational of leisure time activities. She has a marching drill team and a square dance team. Recreation staff also work helping to train for the Special Olympics.

Another educational program is our Senior Citizens Class. We have 28 residents over the age of 40, currently 20 are enrolled in Pat Hicks class. The emphasis of the Senior Citizens Program is a relaxed learning atmosphere, where the students pursue interest areas. This program has been in operation for two months. Pat has worked at the Fort for several years and was at Luna as a teacher before she began the program for the elderly. A proposal has been written to move this program to the hospital at Carrizozo.

The elderly residents enjoy the same time activities as the non-retardates. They enjoy T.V., looking at magazines, working on craft projects, exercising, and simply talking. Several of the elderly residents enjoy reading newspapers and discussing current events.

Next week, I will discuss types of students at Fort Stanton. Many people are not aware of the causes of mental retardation. Usually about one fourth of the retardates at any given institution, were born not retarded, but due to illnesses and accidents, became retarded.

Lorraine Sanchez has been back in the hospital for additional tests. She should be back to work soon. Bill Hines has returned to Fort Stanton. He is doing extremely well after open heart surgery. Connie will be back to work Monday.

Nearly everyone is recovering from the flu and are coming back to work. While Vic Rameriz was at home recovering from the flu, his wife had a little girl. All three are doing fine. Vic is back at work and wife and baby have returned home from the hospital.

Currently all jobs at Fort Stanton are filled, except for the recreation job. The position date on it closes 3-7-77.



County Agent

The U.S. Department of Agriculture
is being asked to consider the northern
portion of Lincoln County as a disaster,
because of the severe infestation of
range caterpillars. Range caterpillar
is a yellow spring worm that detudes
the rangeland. Two worms to a square
yard will consume more than a cow. As
many as 150 per square yard were
found last year. Not only does the worm
eat the grass but the spines sting the
nose of the grazing livestock and stop
the grazing in that area.

The only way to adequately control
this pest is to spray it before it gets over
an inch long - the worms get about 3 1/2
inches long before they pupate.

The County Emergency Board wrote
the State Emergency Board requesting
their help. The letter reads:

State Emergency Board -
ASCS
Albuquerque, New Mexico.

The Lincoln County Emergency
Board met today, and would like to
request your help with a potential
disaster that may develop in Lincoln
County. This disaster concerns the
possibility that large areas of
rangeland in the northern portion of
Lincoln County as well as parts of
Chaves, De Baca, Guadalupe and
Torrance Counties may be subject to
devastating infestations of range
caterpillars (Hemileuca oliviae). The
attached map shows areas of
infestation by range caterpillars as
compiled by the New Mexico State
Department of Agriculture.

A large count of egg clusters now
exist in portions of the infested areas
and with normal climatic conditions we
will have a large hatch of caterpillars
in May and June of 1977.

We request your help in obtaining
Federal Financial and Technical
assistance to adequately control this
devastating range pest. The present
economic plight of the livestock
industry will not allow individual

ranchers to remain in operation if they
are subjected to severe forage losses
from range caterpillars. The economic
condition of the livestock industry over
the last several years has also severely
hampered the financial situation of the
rancher so that it is doubtful that he
would be able to make a significant
monetary contribution toward control
of range caterpillars.

The attached document, RANGE
CATERPILLAR - FACTS AND
FIGURES, compiled by the New
Mexico Department of Agriculture
shows the general situation in New
Mexico and the need for immediate
action to control this pest.

with this problem will be greatly
appreciated.
