CYO sets sunrise services

Worshippers in Lincoln County will open Easter with a sunrise service at the Valley of Fires State Park at 5:45 a.m.
The service which will be followed by a breakfast at the Methodist church is sponsored this year by the Carrizozo Christian Youth Organization.
Last year there was no service but in past years the Easter morning at the park has been a tradition. The first service was in 1966 and was conducted by Father Rebold of Carrizozo.
In 1969 the Rev. Wendell Chino, President of the Mescalero Tribal Council delivered a sermon and for many years Chaplain Alfred S. Kline was director of the services.
The worship has always been interdenominational and it is in keeping that the CYO should be sponsor this year.
The organization was started in 1973 to promote love, understanding and respect among the youth of different denominations in the community. It was organized with eight members and there are now 35 young people with sixteen adult sponsors.
The April 10 service will open with a quartet by Timmy Vega, Vince Vega, Dennis Ortiz and Buddy Hill. Mich Colwell, the CYO president, will give the Easter Story. Rex Wilson will lead the invocation prayer and Lisa Ferguson will read "Savior of the World". Charles Edgren will sing "I saw Jesus".
The sermon will be delivered by the Rev. Roland Armstrong and is titled "Sunrise Meditation".
Immediately following the service breakfast will be served by the CYO at the Methodist Church in Carrizozo.

Smokey park gets \$240,000 booster

Lincoln County and neighboring Otero and Chavez are slated for big parts of the most massive state park improvement program in the history of New Mexico.
Smokey Bear Historical State Park in Capitan has \$240,000 tagged for park improvements and phase two interpretive programming.
A new park to be initiated at the Dog Canyon area in center Otero County is to be designated the "Oliver Lee Memorial State Park". Funding of \$995,000 is scheduled to provide access road work, fencing, utility extensions, a water well, trail reconstructions; reconditioning of an existing historical cabin, horse stable constructions, an administrative complex, an irrigation system, interpretive trails, campground and picnic area construction, signing, landscaping and a dump station. This is planned as a two-year project.
In Chavez County, Bottomless Lakes State Park will get \$660,000 for conversion of the swimming pool to a swimming beach, concession-picnic area reconditioning, construction of a visitor information center and trails as well as other site improvements.
Within the next 15 months, capital improvements totaling \$10,281,000 will either be completed or underway at nearly every state park, funded with state severance tax bonds and a \$421,000 general fund appropriation for administrative services by the New Mexico State Park and Recreation Commission. The massive park improvement project was approved by the 1977 State Legislature.
"These state park projects fit very well into the state's overall recreation planning. I am very pleased that the State Legislature supported this proposal."
"The work of the State Park and Recreation Commission over the past few years in maintaining and improving the state's recreation facilities is, I think, the prime factor in the great success we enjoyed with the legislature this year."
"I don't think any administration has ever been able to secure in a single session, the more than \$10 million in capital outlay projects for the park system. However, all these projects are justified if we are to provide a quality park system," said Gov. Jerry Apodaca.
In praising the governor's interest in revitalization of the state parks, Sam Graft, director of the State Park and Recreation Commission, noted that Gov. Apodaca has been aware of problems in the parks since he was a state senator.
The projects to be funded under the capital improvements program include the construction or operation of new parks in Bernalillo, Guadalupe, Lea and Otero counties and improvement to existing parks in Bernalillo, Chaves, Dona Ana, Eddy, Grant, Harding, Lincoln, Luna, Mora, Quay, Rio Arriba, Santa Fe, San Juan, San Miguel, Sandoval, Sierra, Taos, Torrance, Roosevelt, Union and Valencia counties. Also included is a study of the Sandia-Monzano Mountain area and establishment of a recreation area in Chama.

Emergency medicine is county problem

Accidents are the biggest health problem in Lincoln County and Emergency Medicine, from A to Z, is the greatest need.
That was the conclusion of the twenty-two county citizens who met at the Ruidoso Hospital Thursday night in the first public hearing on Lincoln County health needs.

Under state and federal legislation the State Health Agency is responsible for a study of New Mexico health needs, problems and finally with finding solutions to the problems.
The group Thursday night first listed what each considered the most pressing health problems facing citizens of the county. From the list a vote was taken to determine the order or priority.
Accidents drew concern as the number one problem with geriatric care (problems of aging) coming second. The group decided arteriosclerosis (hardening of the arteries) was number three problems and chronic respiratory diseases came in fourth. Fifth was mental health including alcohol-drug abuse.
The order of problems does not necessarily coincide with incident rate in the county. In explaining his selection of priorities, for instance, Dr. David Rouleau of Capitan said that cancer and heart-circulatory diseases in Lincoln County reflected the national number one and two problems but that the availability of medical services in the treatment of these diseases was not the county first problem.
The greatest medical service improvements are needed in the field of emergency medicine according to the group. This includes transportation to a hospital, lack of communications to and from remote areas, the scarcity of trained emergency medical technicians, costs and the many other

problems of keeping emergency cases alive over the long trips in this area.
The number two problem in the field of providing medical services in Lincoln County was believed to be the availability and distribution of medical personnel. Geraldine Perkins of Corona pointed out that there is no such person in Corona - doctor, nurse or full time EMT. The same is true in the Hondo Valley. Mrs. Adeline Kimbrell said, Betty Howell of the Carrizozo

Health Center said there is needed a lab and X-ray technician in Carrizozo. The availability of trained medical people, especially doctors, in rural areas is

Van crash kills two

Two members of the Zuni tribe were still in the hospital Tuesday following a one vehicle wreck three miles south of Carrizozo on Hwy 54.
Phillip Joe Pinto, 27, and his two year old daughter Mona died in the Friday night crash that put six more persons in the hospital in Alamogordo.
Officer Max Watson who investigated the accident said that the Chevrolet Van was traveling south when the driver who was killed in the accident evidently lost control of the vehicle. When the van turned over the door came open, Watson said, and the other eleven passengers were thrown out of the vehicle.
The accidents occurred at 10:25 p.m. Officer Watson said the Zuni tribe members were traveling to Mescalero where they intended to take part in a weekend celebration. The brightly colored Zuni costumes for the Indian dances were tossed around the tragic scene.

Such a disease would also cause a loss of feeling, in-sensitivity. In a spiritual sense, this is what sin does to each of us. Sin endeavors to silently disable the spirit by gradually

affecting a loss of sensitivity, a careless attitude toward God. Sin has the ability to eventually kill any desire we may have to do what is right in the sight of God. Paul warned against this very thing in Eph 4:19 and Titm 4:2. It is unlikely this man woke up one morning to discover something useless and withered where a functional hand had once been; sin is just as subtle in the spiritual realm. Losing touch with God can only lead us into a powerless condition.

always of concern, and Horace Cordova of Ft. Stanton discussed ways of utilizing and sharing such people. The total absence of specialists and the lack of any dental services outside of Ruidoso was discussed.

The problem ranking third is the cost of medical services. The average cost per day in the Ruidoso hospital now is \$180 and is much higher in city hospitals. Estimates of up to \$500 a day are being mentioned in metropolitan areas in the next few years.

Lincoln County has a large number of people who are not covered by any hospitalization insurance and who are not eligible for state and federal assistance. High medical bills prevent them from seeking assistance. High

medical bills prevent them from seeking adequate health care. Jim Burns of the Ruidoso hospital talked of that institutions rising costs and the group in general expressed doubts that the average person in Lincoln County could afford long, serious illness care or the high charges for certain type of surgery and care.

Utilization of the hospital building in Carrizozo was of fourth ranking concern and particularly interested the people from the west side of the county.

Nancy Knight, said it should be used as some kind of medical center. She said if the state would put it into operation as an adjunct to Ft. Stanton the people would feel that at least the million dollar plant was being used. She and Betty Howell discussed possible federal assistance for small rural hospitals that would make the Carrizozo hospital operation feasible someday.

A licensed nursing home in Lincoln County ranked fifth in priority. With an increasing number of retirees moving to the area and with the expanded life spans, care for the elderly both in and out of the home concerned the participants.

Carrizozo's Mayor Bobby Dan Crenshaw warned that with inadequate medical facilities and personnel now a problem in the county, the forecasted growth rate made the future grim unless planning was based on that growth.

Informing people about the existing services and how to make use of them was of interest. The five Lincoln County members of the State Health Agency Area 6 committee said that they had prepared a list of these services and expected to have it available for distribution soon.

Members of the committee are Dr. Rouleau, Mrs. Perkins, Bill Hirschfeld, Jim Burns and Mary Rich.

John Hudson conducted the meeting. He is the newly hired staff member for this region and will be holding similar hearing in each of the five counties in this area.

The next step in the program will be detailed study of the problems and compilation of these and others in the area for use in making a state plan.
