## Carrizozo School Board will hold budget hearing

Carrizozo Municipal Schools will be conducting a formal budget hearing on June 2 at 10:30 a.m. in the school board meeting room. The public is invited to attend.

At their previous meeting, Jim Steinepreis, school superintendent, reviewed the 1977-78 budget with school board members.

For total operation of the district in the next fiscal year, the board plans to spend \$860,872.

The major portion of this money will be derived from the following sources: state revenue, \$695,388; local revenue, \$45,935 and federal revenue \$10,076.

The major expenditure slated for the district in the coming year is an estimated \$383,607 in teacher's salaries and other related expenses.

Another, constantly climbing expense for the district is the cost of plant operation. This year, the district is facing an expenditure of some \$67,724 for this purpose.

Steinepreis pointed out that this figure is up from \$40,869 actually spent in the 1975-76 fiscal year. Most of the cost is directly attributed to the soaring cost of utilities.

Other major expenses at the schools in the coming year will include the following: \$27,000 for new equipment; \$76,670 for instructional

support; \$39,286 for administration; \$37,338 for pupil transportation services; \$23,015 for maintenance of the school plant; and \$85,711 in fixed charges such as teachers' retirement, social security, group insurance and workmen's compensation.

In other business, the board accepted Steinepreis' calendar for the 1977-78 school year.

According to the calendar, school will officially begin on August 22 and the last official day of school will be May 26, 1978.

Students will receive the following days off from school: August 26, county fair; September 3, Labor Day; October 27 and 28, teacher's convention; November 24 and 25, Thanksgiving; December through January 2, Christmas vacation; March 24 through March 31, Easter Vacation.

Teachers will begin working on August 22 and make up days for school will be March 30 and 31 if necessary.

Plans are seriously being considered by the New Mexico Department of Hospitals and Institutions to utilize the Lincoln County Municipal Hospital building in Carrizozo for care of mentally retarded patients.

Should this plan be agreed upon, the Ft. Stanton Hospital and Training School would maintain and operate the facility.

According to Mark Delgado, hospital administrator at Ft. Stanton, the facility would probably be used as an intermediate care center for the mentally retarded. Delgado explained further that the building would probably house patients over the age of 40 years, and that vocational and recreational programs would be established for the patients.

"One of the main reasons we are looking at Carrizozo is because of the availability of the hospital building and we would probably be able to work with the hospital clinic to provide the patients with medical care," he said.

Delgado also indicated that initially, there would be a staff of 12 to 15 individuals and this could be expanded at any time. He said that a number of individuals who currently work at the Ft. Stanton hospital have already expressed an interest in working at the Carrizozo center. "These are mostly persons who already live in Carrizozo and commute to Ft. Stanton daily," he said.

Officials with the N.M. Department of Hospitals and Institutions have indicated that they would like to see a community survey performed to gauge the reaction of the community. (See independent survey inside this issue).

According to Dr. George Goldstein, secretary of the department, none of the cost studies have been completed at this time. He explained further that no money has been provided this year by the state to do much of the necessary paper work.

Dr. Goldstein, who toured the facility along with a number of other state officials several weeks ago, said, "I do believe that the possibility is certainly worth looking at."

He feels that the project is still about a year and a half from knowing if it will be feasible or not. The actual building will have to be subjected to state and federal inspection along with a number of other studies.

Delgado added that if the hospital does make use of the Carrizozo facility, it would take between \$180,000 and \$200,000 annually for operational costs which include salaries and maintenance.

When Dr. Goldstein initially toured the facility, he said at that time, that the move of the patients must be considered, if the state can afford it and how to administer the project.

Finally, he added, "Does the community want it?"

Craft Courses, Ruidoso.

## For Kit Carson

The long and short of it . . .

Kit Carson wrote his first column for the Lincoln County News issue of Nov. 1, 1961, headed "The Long and Short of It is . . ." In that column he wrote, "I grew up on a small farm in northeast Texas, in the shadow of the Old Jefferson Trail. The farm was all covered with relics of frontier days, branding irons, home-made tools and a sort of everything that the first settlers acquired when they occupied the timber country.

"The relics were cast aside and remained only as a constant reminder of the most recent days when Grandpa cleared the land, ranged hundreds of head of cattle on the Denton Prairie and freighted over the Jefferson Trail.

"As soon as I was old enough to hone and strop the old Shumate razor and rake the fuzz off my face, I pulled my freight for the west. (Yes, I used the selfsame razor-strop that only a few years back had made a well-disciplined child of me. (I turned my back to the east and looked west, just as my grandparents had done.

"The operation of keeping a little flour in the barrel, a few frijoles in the bag has carried me, since then, to various regions. I survived the Great Depression by the skin of my teeth. It stunted me to such an extent that I doubt that I ever reach the ripe old age of the one who caused it."

Kit checked it all in May 11, 1977. After a ceremony in Albuquerque, Kit's final resting place was Santa Fe National Cemetery on May 16. A beautiful message on the Memoriam reads in part, "Life can be the same after a trinket has been lost, but never after the loss of a treasure."

Kit was a treasure in the lives of many people, including Paul and Eleanor Payton. From the first column in the Lincoln County News he went on to have two books published and over 400 magazine articles. Kit told us one time that magazine publishers were after him all the time to write more articles.

His special love was the southwest and the many stories and tales that abound in this vast country. In that first column he told about the one-armed customer in the barber chair, when the barber was careless and cut his customer's face like a cat had clawed it. The barber remarked as the fellow arose, "Say, feller, haven't I seen you some place before?" Wherein, the one-armed customer belligerently replied "Hell no! I lost this arm in a sawmill accident!"

Kit did not have the fancy type education one might expect a top-flight writer to have and Payton has always appreciated the fact that here was a guy who did it the hard way. He made himself into a fine writer - maybe just the memory of the razor strop was all he needed.

He must have written several million words, all duly printed and read by millions of people - mostly people who love a good story about the frontier country - the southwest we live in. Not very many of us in this whole world have done that well.

Our heart is with his wife, Loyas, and we know full well that Kit's final resting will be as honored as his place on this earth.

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# Ofelia Salas retires from Capitan after 40 years of teaching service

"You are a born teacher and you should go into the teaching field. If you really want to go on to college, you can find a way." Those words of the late Ola Jones in 1934 to Ofelia Salas inspired her to a dedicated career in education. Ola Jones at that time was Lincoln County Superintendent of Schools. Mrs. Salas was a substitute teacher in Lincoln.

Ofelia Salas was born in Lincoln, New Mexico, attended elementary school in Las Cruces, and graduated from high school in Capitan. That was during the hard times of the great depression. Financially unable to go to college, she had all but given up hope of further education until Mrs. Jones' encouragement.

That spring, she borrowed the money to go to New Mexico State Normal, a school for teachers in Las Vegas. Her secretarial training taken in high school helped tremendously to augment expenses. Teachers needed fewer credits then so she obtained her first assignment in the Lincoln School in 1935. Her salary was \$75.00 a month on a nine-month basis. That started a round of saving enough in the school term, or borrowing, for further studies in summers.

Mrs. Salas was married and transferred her studies to the closer-to-home New Mexico State University until earning her BS degree in 1954. Each summer until she graduated, her two sons attended the campus nursery while she went to classes.

Her beginning, life, and career saw fruition in New Mexico, yet her achievements were never provincial.

At the end of this school year, Mrs. Salas will complete 40 years of service as an educator. She put in 16 years in the Lincoln School, 23 years for the Capitan Municipal Schools, and one year in a one-room school. She says, "During that time, I've enjoyed the experience of having taught classes to students in grades 1 through 12."

For three years, Mrs. Salas served as principal of the Lincoln School, besides her teaching duties, she also sponsored the Hot Lunch Program. That program was not subsidized by the

May 12, a dinner was given for Mrs. Salas at the home of Mrs. Ray Province, with teachers and former co-teachers. They included Ms. Pfingsten, Ferguson, Young, Perry, Pryor, Aldrich, Cozzens, Peters, Hall, and Guck and their husbands. An engraved letter-opener was presented. Some of the accolades voiced were, "She motivated their interest to such an extent, they learned without realizing that was the purpose of her interesting discourses;" "she commanded not only respect, but deep affection;" "enriched the lives of all she touched;" "lent an intriguing essence to learning;" "was not a by-stander, but a doer;" "was an exemplary lady in all its connotations."

When Ofelia Salas was chosen the Lincoln County Teacher of the Year in 1974, she voiced her philosophy of teaching: "I feel the responsibility for giving to the community the best I can offer towards the education of that community's young people, the total child."

"I must constantly strive to improve and learn the newer approved methods and try to find more interesting ways of putting across ideas and materials in this ever-changing world."

"I have great faith, respect, and confidence in our young people and their great potential. I shall try to reach them, stimulate, motivate, and arouse their interest, then try to channel and guide them along with patience and understanding."

Her days of achievement are not over. She is enthused about new ventures into activities for which she previously never had the time. No one else can ever quite fill her shoes.

During the Lincoln School days, she served as 4-H leader, Den Mother with Cub Scouts, and taught many catechism classes in the Catholic Church.

The most memorable incident of those days occurred when a sixth grade basketball tournament was to be held in Capitan and her students begged to enter. "I sought the help of Bud Darling, the Capitan coach, which wasn't exactly cricket. Armed with his instructions, I would put the boys through their practices on the rough dirt court outside the school. The schools entered in the tournament were Capitan, Ruidoso, Hondo, Carrizozo and Corona. My players won! That was in the early 50's, I still get a thrill when I remember."

She actively supported all community projects. She served as secretary-treasurer for the Lincoln County Historical Society for many years. It was this organization that initiated the Billy the Kid Pageant in 1940 with Peter Hurd as Billy. She and her husband raised as an officer in the county school association and as delegate to the state convention.

In the Capitan School, Mrs. Salas taught junior high grades & Spanish in the high school. She applied for a Foreign Language Institute Grant and was accepted as one of 52 from a field of 782 applicants. For eight weeks, she attended the University of Tacoma in Washington State, studying linguistics and furthering her exceptional abilities as a bi-lingual teacher.

Later, she was selected one of a team of four teachers from Capitan to attend a Reading Institute at New Mexico State University. Her summer travels have been concentrated on the sites and places of Spanish heritage. "To Mrs. Ofelia Salas, for giving me something to live up to," wrote one of her former students, Don Crawford, when he graduated Magna Cum Laude from The College of the Ozarks. "At a time that was crucial in my life, when I needed it most, you believed in me and gave inspiration. If more teachers had your uncompromising integrity, I'm sure the future of many students who ended as failures would be changed."

Mrs. Salas has been a member of NEA-New Mexico for 40 years, serving in many offices, in the very active local chapter, county, and state. She is chairman of the Necrology Committee of SENMEA. She is a charter member of Eta Chapter of Alpha Delta Kappa, an honorary teacher's sorority, and a member of Sigma Delta Pi, a Foreign Language Sorority.

Her husband has a disability retirement from Fort Stanton. Son,

### Lemon Chiffon Pie

- 2 tablespoons cornstarch
- 1½ teaspoons unflavored gelatin
- ¼ cup reconstituted nonfat dry milk
- ¼ cups water
- Noncaloric sweetener to equal 1-3 cup sugar
- 4 beaten egg yolks
- ¼ teaspoon grated lemon peel
- ¼ cup lemon juice
- 1 or 2 drops lemon extract
- 4 egg whites
- ½ teaspoon vanilla
- ¼ teaspoon cream of tartar
- 1 baked 9 inch Yogurt Pastry shell

In medium saucepan combine cornstarch and unflavored gelatin; gradually blend in reconstituted nonfat dry milk. Add water and non-caloric sweetener. Cook and stir over medium heat till mixture is thickened and bubbly. Gradually stir a moderate amount of hot mixture into beaten egg yolks, return mixture to saucepan. Cook 2 minutes more over low heat. Remove from heat; stir in lemon peel, lemon juice and lemon extract. Cool mixture slightly.

Beat egg whites with vanilla and cream of tartar till stiff peaks form. Fold beaten egg white mixture into lemon mixture. Carefully pile into baked and cooled yogurt pastry shell. Chill till firm.

### Yogurt Pastry

- 2-3 cup sifted all purpose flour
  - 3 tablespoons shortening
  - 3 tablespoons yogurt
- Sift flour and ¼ teaspoon salt together, cut in shortening till pieces are the size of small peas. Add Yogurt. Gently stir with fork till all the mixture is moistened. Form into a ball. Flatten dough on lightly floured surface. Roll ¼

inch thick. Fit pastry into 8 inch pie plate flute edges. Prick well with fork. Bake at 450 till golden, about 10 minutes.

This extension is made to permit the Department to complete auditing of 1977 taxpayer reports made to the Department.

Two groups of foods specialties at Carrizozo High School surpasses all previous earnings records.  
Businesses closed last Friday and The Friendly Bakers had earned a total of \$648.46 profit. When divided among the three partners this came to \$216.15 each. The Mean Machine, also with three partners, earned a total of \$172.26. The previous record was \$134.01 for the total business.

The Friendly Bakers were Thelma Padilla, Rose Padilla and Jerry Lueras. The Mean Machine were Mildred Means, Liz Lueras and Veronica Zamora.  
Food Specialties is a class in which students set up their own businesses, buy supplies, take orders, sell baked goods and divide the profits. Usually, the first semester is spent learning accounting and food preparation principles necessary for a successful operation business. This year, most

students had taken Home Economics I, Foods I and Foods II as prerequisites to the course, so they were able to set up their businesses almost six weeks earlier than previous classes.  
The double entry system of bookkeeping is used for records. Each week the accountant must write checks for bills, keep check stubs up to be dated and fill in a system of checks and balances to determine if his records are accurate. In this manner, each group can set a goal and watch profits accumulate during the school year.

Baked goods prepared by the students include pizzas, burritos, enchiladas, various kinds of cookies.
