Starts September 1 —

New owners at News

Dr. Robert E. Cates and Michael Swickard have purchased the Lincoln County News and the Torrance County Citizen from Paul and Eleanor Payton. The new owners will take charge of the publications on September 1.

Contract negotiations between the Payton's and Jim and Paula Moore were terminated due to a divorce in the Moore family.

Dr. Cates has been a professor of journalism at New Mexico State University for the past ten years. In addition to his teaching chores, Cates has served as Chairman of the College of Arts and Sciences Improvement of Instruction Committee and as Chairman of the College's Student Appeals Board.

Prior to his coming to NMSU, Cates

taught English, journalism, and speech courses at Northern Arizona University in Flagstaff, Arizona, Lake Michigan College in Benton Harbor, Michigan, and McKendree College in Lebanon, Illinois.

Swickard is an Alamogordo High School graduate. He attended New Mexico State University, graduating in 1972 in a double major of journalism

and television production. He worked two years for KOB-TV and one year for KNME in Albuquerque.

Mike is known by most of the kids in the area as the swimming pool manager in Carrizozo for the years '73, '74, and 1977.

During the latter part of the Korean War Cates served as an official U.S. Army Correspondent in Japan where he wrote news stories for leading Japanese publications.

Returning to this country, he was engaged as an editor and writer for the Arab Information Center in New York City. There he edited a magazine called the Arab World, a newsletter called Arab News and Views, and a nationally distributed mat service called Biblelands. In addition he wrote speeches for Arab delegates to the United Nations. In all he represented 14 Arab nations and was charged with interpreting their views to readers throughout the United States and Canada.

After leaving the Arab Information Center, Cates worked for a while in Washington, D.C., where he did freelance publications work within the diplomatic community.

Cates next went to Chicago where he served as a communications specialist for the Chicago Chapter of the American Red Cross. It was from this position, that he went to McKendree College and began his academic teaching career.

While serving McKendree College as Public Relations Director, Alumni Director, Assistant Admissions Director, Publications Adviser, and instructor in English, journalism, and speech courses; Cates found time to write a syndicated newspaper column called "What Cogitation Indicated."

Cates is presently Chairman of the Board of the Dona Ana County Chapter of the American Red Cross. He is past president of the Toastmasters Club, president of his church Conference, and founder and charter treasurer of the Rio Bajo Chapter of the Society of Professional Journalists.

He and his wife Patricia have been married for 16 years and have three children; Robert, 13; Laura, 12; and Sharon, 9. Mrs. Cates is an elementary school teacher currently employed as a reading specialist in the Las Cruces school system.

The fair exhibit building will remain open until 9 p.m. both nights.

3-day Rodeo slated soon

A three-day rodeo open to all cowboys will highlight the Labor Day weekend here, sponsored by the newly-formed American Legion Post No. 48.

Post commander Wheeler Gayton said the rodeo, held in conjunction with a two-day Apache ceremonial for two young maidens of the Mescalero Apache Tribe, is a fundraising event for the new post.

Rodeo events will get underway at 1 p.m. each day on Saturday, Sunday and Monday, September 3-5. Contestants will be eligible for the daily jackpot, Gayton said, and must register for each day's go-round between 8 a.m. and noon at the tribe's newly-renovated, 3,000-seat arena.

Baca Brothers Rodeo Producers of Grants, N.M. are bringing "some rough stock" for the five cowboy events, Gayton said. Those events include bullriding, bareback bronc riding, team roping, calf roping and steer wrestling. There also will be barrel racing contests, he said.

"We hope to make this the best rodeo yet at Mescalero," Gayton said. "We have a great new arena, and plenty of parking space," he added.

The rodeo is being held in connection with a private Apache ceremonial sponsored by a long-respected member of the tribe, Nathaniel "Stan" Chee and his wife, Agatha. The Chees are sponsoring a two-day ceremonial, Saturday and Sunday, for their daughter Velva Jean Chee and niece Trudy Treas.

The ceremonials will also feature two days of colorful inter-tribal Indian dances, which will start each day after the rodeo's performance ends, and which are open to the non-Indian public at the tribe's feast grounds.

Group and individual dance exhibitions will be held, highlighted by the traditional dances of several Indian tribes and by exhibitions of the colorful Plains Indian feather dances.

Gregory Haumpy, a Kiowa from Apache, Oklahoma and a well-known Indian drummer & singer, will be a special guest at the dance exhibitions.

There also will be crafts booths open for the public, including one featuring the work of Albuquerquean Ivan Paquin, a Zuni Indian well-known for his turquoise work.

Football season starts September 2

Side bets are already in the making, coaches are pointing the finger at everybody else, and if you follow the papers, there can be no doubt, football season is just one week away.

Of the three Class A teams in Lincoln County, Capitan and Carrizozo will compete in the District 3A league, while Corona will play in the District 2A circuit.

Only Corona and Carrizozo will not face each other during the regular season, while Corona and Capitan will open their seasons next Friday night (Sept. 2) in Corona. The Cardinals have already been picked to take their conference by the Albuquerque Journal, but Jack Cisco, the new head coach at Capitan might have some tricks up his sleeve.

junior year, at the center position.

"Injuries could hurt us this year," Cisco said in a recent interview. "We are both small in size and numbers," he added.

"I feel pretty good about this year, but our first game will be a very critical contest," he said.

Also returning for another season are Richard Furula, a wide receiver, Tim Proctor at tackle, Ray Stagg at the other tackle spot and Alex Trujillo at tight end.

Cisco's list of promising newcomers for 1977 includes the following: Richard Sanchez, sophomore; Mark Stewart, junior; Tom Dolin, junior; Terry Reader, senior; and Jack McGarry, sophomore.

Capitan

The Fighting Tigers are returning only five starters from their 1976 squad, but Cisco is still confident that his crew will see post season competition. Robbie Richardson is one of the main reasons. An all-stater in his junior season at Capitan, Richardson was the leading scorer in the entire state. He is already planning another fine season.

Also returning this year are Adam Aldaz at the quarterback spot and Ricky Clifton, who was all state in his

Corona

Many heads are turning towards Corona early this season, but Head Coach John Warfield says that while he feels his program is strong this season, both Vaughn and Melrose are also looking good.

After winning but a single contest three years ago, when Warfield took over, the Cardinals have come on strong ever since. They were rated No. 1 for much of last season, and have been picked tops in the state by many of the outset of the '77 season.

"We still have a few positions to

iron out," says Warfield, but he has 20 to 25 athletes out this year, and 15 earned letters in '76, nine of whom were starters.

Coach Warfield feels he has two of the finest running backs in the state in Scott Nalda and Ken Gibbs. Gibbs is only a junior this season, and scored 84 points in the '76 campaign.

The Cardinals have a strong and experienced first squad. Cully Nalda, senior, will be at the tight end spot again this year with Scott Williams, senior, at split end. The tackles will be Joe Salines and Walter Gensler with Dicky Winchester and sophomore, Michael Chavez at the guard positions.

Warfield is working with a sophomore quarterback in Troy Yancy and is pleased with him so far. Another sophomore to probably see plenty of action this season is Ricky Lueras at fullback.

Warfield looks to be running out of what he calls the Ball and Broken Ball formations, variations of the Pro set. On defense he will be utilizing the 5-4 combination and a Pro 4-3.

Although neither of the two other Class A Lincoln County teams will be facing Corona in league competition this season, there is a good chance they will clash in the district championships in November.

Carrizozo

Whatever the Carrizozo Grizzlies are up to remains a mystery to this reporter. Several attempts to contact Coach Henry Paul were made this week but Coach Paul either could not find the time to return any calls, simply forgot, or has developed a dislike for the local press.

In any event, the Grizzlies, 1976 State Champions, would appear to be on their way once again. A good part of the '76 squad is back again, although Coach Paul said earlier this month that this would be a "rebuilding year."

Last year, Carrizozo battled Capitan for the state title, coming out victorious in a 2-0 contest, although the Grizzlies did lose to the Fighting Tigers in the early going of the season, 8-6.

In another newspaper, Coach Paul was quoted as saying, "The chances of us playing Capitan again for the title are really not very good. I don't think this district is as tough as that other one with Cloudcroft, Hagerman and Tatum. And Corona will be one of the teams to beat."

Obviously, Coach Paul is confident in his "rebuilding year" as he has been quoted as saying, "We had nine positions on that All-State team last year and we could have that many again this year."

Back for another season are Billy Bob Shafer and Mike English, both named to the All State team in '76. Ray Hernandez will direct the Power I offense and in his backfield will be Ed



News from County Agent

Plan on attending the Lincoln County Fair Friday and Saturday - August 26 and 27. You can see two full days of an old County Fair. The Livestock judging starts at 8:00 a.m. Friday with the Horticulture, Home Economics and Poultry, judging starting at 10:00 a.m. You can watch the judge choose the best animals in the swine, beef cattle and sheep classes.

The Pet Show will start the Saturday morning activities at 8:00 a.m. to be followed by the Lead Class and the Junior Livestock Sale. Carolyn Houck is superintendent of the Pet Show. The classes of the Pet Show are:

Tallest dog; Shortest dog; Largest cat; Smallest cat; Pet with longest tail; Pet with shortest tail; Best groomed pet; Pet that does the most tricks; Most unusual pet.

I attended the Mescalero Cattle Sale test Saturday. The prices were good. Steer calves averaged about 50 and a half cents per pound. The steer calves are expected to weigh around 375 pounds. The heifer calves averaged about 44 and a half cents per pound and are expected to weigh around 345 pounds at delivery in October and November.

The group looked at the calves in three areas before the sale. The range was green as a lawn and should help the calves put on some good gains in the next two months.

It's harvest time for pears and apples. The pears are past their harvest peak and apples are just starting. The Jonathan, Golden Delicious and Red Delicious are being sold from fruit stands and in the Ruidoso-Bonita-Hondo Valleys. These apples will increase in

The trip will begin at 9:00 a.m. at the small missile range road intersection with U.S. Highway 70-82, 25 miles west of monument headquarters. This intersection is located between the green and white mileage markers 174 and 175. Park Rangers and Military Police will brief the group on regulations that apply during the trip. The caravan will proceed over paved roads through the White Sands Missile Range to the trailhead to Lake Lucero. About two hours will be spent at the lake to allow time for a one-mile conducted walk, for photography, sight-seeing and lunch. The caravan will return to U.S. Highway 70-82 by 1:00 p.m.

Participants will need to be at the small missile range gate promptly by 9:00 a.m. because they cannot enter through the gate after the caravan leaves for the lake. All persons should come prepared with enough gasoline, a spare tire, drinking water, stout walking shoes, suitable dress for the weather, insect repellent, sun glasses and a lunch. Football Health

Football season is here again. All over the nation American males are tossing and kicking and running with footballs, all the way from 8-year-olds in the backyard to junior and senior high and college teams to the big bruisers of the professional leagues.

Football is a rough contact sport and inevitably will produce its full quota of bumps and bruises, strains and sprains, cuts and gashes. Most of these aren't serious and the lads concerned are back in the game shortly.

A thorough medical examination is highly important for boys preparing to go out for football to make certain that there is no physical condition that should be noted before beginning the rigorous training and hard knocks of the game.

Proper physical conditioning hardens the body and increases resistance to fatigue, thus helping prevent injury. A minimum of three weeks of conditioning are recommended prior to the first game of the season. Coaches and team physicians are alert to the fact that many injuries occur when the player is tiring and thus less alert.

Good coaching enables the players to perform better and thus be less prone to injury. Good officiating makes for better games and also helps protect players. Proper equipment and facilities are important to reduce injuries. Good first aid procedures and medical care, with a physician available during practice drills and on the bench during games are major factors in cutting serious injuries.

Precautions against the extreme heat of early season days also are important. Many coaches now schedule the hot weather workouts in early morning and late afternoon to avoid the heat of the day. The old rule against drinking water during drills and games has long since been proved invalid and dangerous. Water and salt is necessary to replace fluids lost through copious sweating.

If your boy is playing on an organized team, the chances are good that all of these safeguards are observed. If most of his playing is done on a vacant lot in the afternoons and on Saturdays, it becomes the parents' responsibility to see that the player has the benefit of the safety principles.

The commission approved a request from a committee of Truth or Consequences and Sierra County representatives for the commission to lead an effort to locate water to replace 6,000 acre feet which evaporates annually from the permanent 50,000-acre foot pool at Elephant Butte Lake State Park.

The commission approved closing of Conchas Lake North Dock concession from Nov. 15 to Feb. 15. Closing will be for repairs, painting and maintenance. The north dock cafe will be closed after Labor Day weekend until Feb. 15. The commission approved transfer of the Conchas South Dock concession license from Conchas del Sur Ltd. to James A. Clinkenbeard, Anaheim, California. Approval was conditioned on both parties agreeing on sale terms.

The commission approved an amendment to a joint powers agreement between the commission and Air Force allowing moving of the Air Force training site at Elephant Butte Lake. A capital improvements program contract was awarded to Los Patios Inc., Corrales, for a new irrigation system, ball field, landscaping and water system at Kit Carson State Park, Taos.

Members and Associates, Santa Fe, received an architectural contract at Ute Lake State Park to design a boat ramp, recreational vehicle camp site, roads and other improvements. The commission approved a \$3,000 soil and

moisture conservation fund agreement between the state parks and U.S. Bureau of Reclamation for Heron Reservoir, Rio Arriba County, and a project plan for Northern Rio Grande Resource Conservation and Development District.

Dedication of Matias L. Chacon Memorial Visitors Center is set today (Thursday) at Heron Lake State Park. Gov. Jerry Apodaca was scheduled guest speaker. State Park Commission Chairman Phil Lovato, Taos, was set for welcoming remarks. The ceremony marked completion of a 2-year construction program. An Espanola attorney, Chacon was a legislator 17 years.

The Legislative School Study Committee heard a complaint from spokesman Jimmy Johnson of Santa Rosa against non-renewal of school bus driver contracts by the Santa Rosa School Board for Pat Quintana, Juan Tenorio, Luis Salz and Frank Maestas. Quintana had been a school bus driver 18 years, Tenorio 20 years, Salz 9 years and Maestas 11 years. State School Transportation Director Bill Loshbough said: "I have received numerous letters from parents and others in the Santa Rosa community supporting the services that these people had provided." Loshbough said: "Our office has not ratified any action of the local board at this point." Official notification of Santa Rosa board action had not been received. Loshbough said: "I was highly concerned when I read a newspaper account of the board's action, but on the advice of State Education Department counsel, I could take no action."

Fort Stanton

Fall is almost here. We are starting our new fall schedule this week if possible. By September 1 we should have all of the problem areas worked out and everything in order. We should have our full staff back on duty which will be a great help. On September 2 we will have the all day staff-student picnic at Baca Campground. The dietary department will be bar-b-queing for the total staff and children. Games will be played and everyone is hoping that it does not rain all day.

The students will be still having a few all day events but this will be planned as learning experiences. Weekends will be devoted primarily for recreational events.

A couple of weeks ago I wrote about

a child who was typical of an institution. The boy was a classic example of a misdiagnosed child who was a product of his environment. Actually brain damage was not found. Another case similar to the boy was a little girl who could be called a closet child. Her family hid her and did not want the community to know about her. Closet children are still common. Many people who have severely retarded children and some who are not as serious feel guilt and try to keep the child out of the public. Many of these children can learn if placed in school or in special programs at an early age. Usually the children are kept at home until they are too difficult to work with or the parents become unable to devote much of their time in care. I'll call the first little girl Bee. As with the boy she was not from the state of New Mexico. Her case file started in the early sixties. Bee was the second twin born to a middle aged mother. There were five older siblings and eventually three younger ones.

The family was on welfare due to the father's condition. He had a drinking problem and was unable to work after suffering frost bite. The twins were identical. The second twin had a delayed birth due to complications. She did not have enough oxygen while the mother was in labor.

From birth on the first twin weighed more and developed normally. The second twin suffered from malnutrition and many respiratory problems. The case worker often felt that the family did not actually try to care for the second twin. Her medical file was full of information - burns, mal-nutrition, dehydration, skin rashes, ear infections, colds, stomach problems.

The child was admitted to the local hospital frequently. The first twin entered first grade while Bee was still in diapers and weighed only 15 pounds. The child was finally taken into a special program when she was eight years old and still not toilet trained eating solid food, or walking. She was suffering from a chronic ear infection, mal-nutrition, and a skin problem. The father had not been in the home for several months and was later admitted to the hospital where he died. The mother had three small children at home and was encouraged to visit the program often. The children soon began to visit weekly and learned to care for their sister who at that time was a "crib baby".

The people in the project worked out a program for Bee. After she had recovered from all of the pressing medical problems she was placed on a special diet to encourage her to learn to chew. She received daily gross motor exercise to strengthen her arms and legs. She was given every type of stimulation possible - radio, T.V., trips to town, tactile, auditory, visual, and contact with people. Many of the medical staff felt that Bee was hopeless but the program people felt that she had the potential to become ambulatory and to develop basic elements of language.

Bee had the full dedication of a small staff of people who knew her

family and knew that she had seldom been out of the home. The second child was also a crib baby who had had spinal meningitis. She had seldom been out of the home and her parents overprotected her. She was small, had temper tantrums, her legs were beginning to scissor and she had limited use of only her left hand. The difference between the two cases was that the parents had had some training in how to assist the child in learning to eat and how to give ROM exercises.

The second child would always be a crib baby and due to the medical condition and would probably not live too many years. Her parents cared for her until the condition became too severe. She was placed in an institution where she would have better medical care. Next week more about the two crib babies, Paul With is a new teacher at Fort Stanton. Last week Barbara Noonan was featured. This week a small sketch about Paul, Paul, Patty, and Scott live here at the Fort. Scott is 14 months old and is into everything.

Both Patty and Paul are teachers. Paul has worked in special education for six years. He worked for three years on the Navajo Reservation. Patty worked in special education until Scott was born. She does not plan to teach until Scott is older. Here at the Fort Paul is the QMRP for Sierra and Socorro as well as being in charge of the special programs.

His education background includes a BSMA in special education and advanced work towards his doctorate in special education. He has developed several resource rooms, worked with

several camps, physically handicapped, and in vocational programs. Paul and Patty are both from New York. We knew Paul while he worked on the reservation and recruited him for Fort Stanton due to his professional knowledge in the field of TMH. The Withs enjoy living in the area and plan to stay for several years. They especially like the community and the relaxed atmosphere. It is a change from New York and they are very happy to be living and working here.
