Water Project Funded

The proposed water desalination project planned for Carrizozo passed both houses during this legislative session and, with the governor's signature, will be funded at the state level for \$200,000. An additional \$600,000 in federal funds for the project have been committed pending the state matching funds.

The bill to fund the plant was proposed by representative Maurice Hobson, and the legislation passed through four committees and both houses without a dissenting vote.

The measure which had the backing of Governor Jerry Apodaca is expected to be signed next week.

The Carrizozo water project will cost over \$800,000 over a two-year period. The remaining \$600,000 is expected from several federal grants, according to Mary Rich, Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce president. The Chamber

function as coordinating agency. Other sponsoring groups were the South Central R C & D, Lincoln and Otero counties, the town of Carrizozo and the town of Tularosa.

The project is the result of four years of study of the water in the Tularosa Water Basin. This vast reservoir extends from north Lincoln County to south of Alamogordo. Water experts believe that there is enough water in this area alone to supply the needs of all New Mexico if that water could be freed of undesirable minerals and mineral salts.

Dr. Ernst A. Steinhoff and a staff from the New Mexico Research Institute, reported that the study of this area showed that the source of salt pollution could be controlled. In the Carrizozo area one of the principal sites of pollution of the water around the town is a well located in the Southern Pacific yard.

This well evidently broke through a layer of salts and caused a seepage of those salts into the water strata.

When this water was pumped continuously, the water in other wells in the area was drastically improved as to salts content.

In order to continue the pumping project and further improve the water, Dr. Steinhoff needed a way to dispose of the waste water and to pay for pumping costs.

The result is the Carrizozo desalination project. The undesirable salts will be removed from this pumped water and the water will be added to the Carrizozo domestic water supply.

This water can be produced at the cost of 60 cents per 1000 gallons. Added to the existing water supply it will give water users a break in the cost of washing clothes, watering lawns and plumbing bills.

This low salt content water cuts drastically on the amount of detergents needed. Residents will find that much less water is needed to keep gardens green and productive. There will be a big reduction in water line and hot water heater residues. Likewise, city water lines will have a much longer life expectancy.

Dr. Steinhoff believes that some of the mineral salts removed from the water can be sold to industry, further reducing the production costs.

Ms. Rich who testified before the House Natural Resources Committee and the Finance Committee for Carrizozo, said that the demonstration of improving the natural water sources and at the same time producing superior domestic water may prove to be the answer to the Southwest water problems.

Attorney Bill Payne and Ms. Rich will meet this week with the NMRI scientists to chart the next steps in the project. Senators Pete Domenici, Jack Schmidt and Congressman Harold Runnels have given strong support to the project and the federal funding is not expected to cause problems. If the project proves economically feasible, the plant will be given to Carrizozo at the end of the demonstration.

Ms. Rich thanked Representative Hobson, Senators John Conway and Aubrey Dunn for their assistance and work.

"This was a bipartisan effort," she said, "with the efforts of everyone directed toward solving New Mexico's water problems."

Bar Is Robbed, Dog Is Rescued

The Lincoln County Sheriff's Department reports that the Nike Bar in Carrizozo was broken into sometime after midnight Sunday. Both the jukebox and the cigarette machine were broken into. Entry was gained through the drive-up window.

On Saturday at about 10 p.m., a Chevy pickup which was towing a Dodge pickup was wrecked on the curve just outside Corona. The driver, Andy Arbuckly of Midland, Texas, was cited for driving while intoxicated.

Both trucks were totaled in the accident, but Arbuckly sustained only minor head injuries. He was taken to Ruidoso Hospital for treatment. State Policeman Albert Claus investigated the incident.

Also on Saturday morning a two car accident outside Carrizozo involved two Colorado drivers. Alice Landros of Pueblo and Rosa Maria Quezada of Denver collided between the Western Texaco station and the city limits. The reason for the accident was the snow-packed road surface. Mrs. Quezada had four girls in the car with her. Two of them were ten years old, one five and one two years old.

The Carrizozo ambulance manned by Belinda Hernandez, Bud Payne and Don Means responded to the accident and transported the victims to Alamogordo to the hospital.

Chamber To Take Stand

Highway Needs Repair

The Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce had a Board of Directors meeting on Sunday to report on legislation that the Chamber had been supporting. All of the bills the Chamber had been actively involved in passed and are expected to be signed into law next week.

Principal among these were the Desalination Plant the Hospital appropriation and the Emergency Medical Services appropriation. In other matters brought before the

Board, the group discussed the progress of new companies in Lincoln County, particularly the coal mining interest being shown in the County by two major companies. In light of increasing commercial activity the Board discussed the possible need for expanded city services.

The Chamber Board also discussed the possibility of attracting business and industry in the community now because of the funding of the Desalination plant. It is anticipated that the plant, when it is in full

production, will produce significantly more water than will be needed for residential use. Contact has already been made with businesses which have need for high quality water to see if they might be interested in relocating in Carrizozo.

As an indicator of the growth of the city, the Chamber of Commerce Board noted that Carrizozo had required 59 new telephone hookups last year. This represents more new hookups than in the three previous years put together.

A major concern of the Chamber of Commerce is the condition of Highway 380. This has reportedly been given a high priority by the State Highway Department for reconditioning as it is one of the five worst highways in the state at this time. The Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce is asking the Socorro Chamber of Commerce to join with it in urging the Highway Department to adhere to the priorities and start work on this route as soon as possible.

Chamber of Commerce president Mary Rich reports that these activities on behalf of the community by the Chamber have made quite a dent in the Chamber's financial resources.

A major Chamber fund raising event, a party and dance, is planned at the Carrizozo Country Club sometime in April. Details are still in the planning stage.

Mrs. Rich, in the meantime, urges businessmen who have not yet paid their Chamber dues and individual citizens who would like to support the Chamber of Commerce, to send in their dues now. Business dues are \$40 a year and individual citizens dues are \$10 a year.

Many readers do not know the meaning of the word 'potpourri' in the heading of this column. Potpourri means, (1.) originally, a stew. (2.) a mixture, as of dried flower petals with spices kept in a jar for its fragrance. (3.) a medley, miscellany, or anthology. This column consists of local happenings, church, school and town items of interest to its citizens with a mixture of out-of-town visitors to your home. They may be relatives or friends, some which were former residents. Phone me when you have something of potpourri interest.

As for the original meaning 'potpourri', in the years since World War II, the ready availability of artificial scents and canned air fresheners has seen the once widely practiced art of potpourri-making decline. There are two methods of making potpourri, dry and moist. The former is the most straightforward, but the moist method results in greater fragrance.

To make potpourri, gather in whatever petals and, or fragrant leaves you have and spread them one layer thick on a flat surface, such as an old window screen. Leave them to dry in a warm, airy room or porch, but keep them out of direct sunlight. When crackly dry, they are ready to use in whatever mix or recipe you fancy.

Store the dried petals, mixed with a little fragrance fixative, in sealed jars until needed. The two most common fixatives, gum benzoin and orris root, are available in most drug stores or natural food centers. Use about one ounce of the powdered or chopped fixative to two quarts of potpourri.

Next week: Moist method potpourri and other potpourri-making hints.

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Astronomer Honored

Forty-eight years ago this month (Feb. 18) Clyde Tombaugh, now professor emeritus of astronomy at New Mexico State University, discovered the planet Pluto—the ninth and last planet to be found in our solar system. Associated Press voted that discovery one of the top ten news stories of 1930.

He was a raw-boned Kansas farm boy who loved the thousands of acres of wheat he had cut.

But he loved the skies more.

It was in 1929 that Tombaugh, armed only with a high school diploma, an impressive store of self-taught knowledge of astronomy, and a tremendous fascination with the world beyond our world, submitted his drawings of Mars and Jupiter to the astronomers at Lowell Observatory in Flagstaff, Arizona.

The Lowell staff were so impressed with those drawings, made while he had looked through a home-made telescope, that they invited him to Flagstaff for a trial employment. He went to work carefully examining photographic plates of some 30 million different stars with a Zeiss blink microscope.

After 7,000 hours of this, he was sure. He had discovered a new planet.

Along with world-wide acclaim came an offer of a four-year science scholarship to the University of Kansas. He graduated in 1936 and returned two years later for a master's degree.

During the war, he suspended his search of the heavens to teach navigation to hundreds of young men at a Navy V-12 school. In 1946 he was invited to White Sands Missile Range in New Mexico where he supervised an optical photographic tracking system for nine years before joining nearby NMSU as an astronomy professor.

At the university, Tombaugh helped

develop one of the world's best planetary observatories.

He confirmed the rotation period of Mercury on its axis as 58 days. He determined the vortex nature of the great red spot on Jupiter.

And he developed a completely new photographic technique for a search he was supervising—a search for large pieces of rock rotating around the earth called small earth satellites.

He had already found, during his 14 early star-gazing years, 700 new asteroids, 6 new star clusters, and several dozen new clusters of galaxies.

It was a long way from his first-stargazing nights in Streator, Ill., to the discovery of Pluto and the eventual granting to Tombaugh of an honorary doctorate of science by Northern Arizona University.

When his family moved to Burdett, Kans., his father and uncle bought a two-inch telescope from Sears Roebuck. During the long, cold winters that followed, he constructed his first hand-made telescopes.

"The first was a complete failure," he said. "But the second was good and the third was very good." It was with this nine-inch telescope with a seven-foot tube that he made the drawings of Mars and Jupiter submitted to Lowell Observatory. He still uses it.

Tombaugh still spends many hours in his cluttered office at the NMSU Research Center. He still makes occasional visits to several nearby telescopes. He still spends many nights in the back yard of his Las Cruces home viewing the skies through his hand-made telescope.

He is still excited about astronomy, citing recent discoveries of quasars, strange types of galaxies, new knowledge about the life history of stars—how they are formed.

Mule-O-Rama Association Still Kicking Despite Financial Hardtimes

In the spring of 1976 several mule men got together with Richard Cothrun, then Manager of the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Chamber of Commerce, and formed the Lincoln County Mule-O-Rama Association. The purpose was to hold mule races in the slack season between the horse races and the ski season, and help the economy of the area.

Our first meet was in October 1976. Since we already had the world's richest horse race, we decided to have the world's richest mule races. To do this we funded \$10,000.00 purse money; \$5,000.00 added by the Department of Development and matched by \$5,000.00 from the Lodgers' Tax Funds of the Village of Ruidoso, plus some donations from individuals and companies interested in this unique event. We had mule races, mule show events, cutting mules, team tying, steer stopping barrel racing, pole bending, a mule sale and fiddler's contest, and it was quite successful. It made no money, but brought quite a lot of people to the Ruidoso area.

Now, the future of the Lincoln County Mule-O-Rama; We will not make these mistakes again. We no longer have the Village accountant. We are not out of debt, but we will have the Mule-O-Rama and the Mule-O-Rama Futurity and it will be bigger and better. We can see that we can expect very little support and lots of opposition to an event that would have brought Nation-wide advertising to the Ruidoso Area. So an event that could have really wanted and supported.

We also started a mule futurity to be run in 1979, which could possibly be worth \$50,000. In the spring of 1977, it looked doubtful that we would receive any state funds, and we wanted to increase the purses to be sure of getting quality mules from throughout the U.S. About this time, Richard Cothrun resigned from the Chamber of Commerce and did not want to be active in the Mule-O-Rama, was hired by the Village of Ruidoso to take care of the ever-increasing flow of Mule-O-Rama, was hired by the Village of

Ruidoso to take care of the ever-increasing flow of Mule-O-Rama mail. He also started our condition book for 1977 races.

After the Chamber of Commerce hired a new manager, it seemed that things just did not work out for the best for the Mule-O-Rama with the Chamber involved. We knew we would have the mule events, but did not know how. We started asking for purse sponsors and donations from mule people and friends and things started shaping up. I went to New Mexico State Fair to work, and while there, I received a call from the chairman of the Lodgers' Tax Committee and was assured we would receive \$12,500.00 from Lodgers' Tax funds to help finance the Mule-O-Rama. With this commitment, I called Ray Reed and told him to send out the entry blanks and the Condition Book, as we had only 30 days left for organization.

Our Mule-O-Rama went fairly well considering the short time we had to plan. We had an increase of over 200 percent in mules and entries and spectators over 1976. We had a

\$20,000.00 matched race, winter take all; fiddler's contest, and two dances. A team roping Futurity was added, and all in all it looked real successful. Now somewhere down the line we inherited the Village of Ruidoso accountant, perhaps through the Chamber. I did not worry too much, as he assured me he was bonded, and handled both Village and Lodgers Tax funds. We approved a \$3,000.00 labor budget which seemed ample, but ended up being \$11,000.00 plus. This same man also ordered a tower for the Village of Ruidoso that was to be set up at the Mule-O-Rama and then taken to the Municipal Airport for an observation tower, and we were assured that this would be of no cost ended up paying over \$3,000.00 of badly needed Mule-O-Rama funds on this unnecessary project. Then there was a matter of \$3,500.00 worth of unauthorized T-shirts paid for with Mule-O-Rama funds.

In trying to get all this settled and

whatsoever to the Mule-O-Rama. We paid, we were advised by the Lodgers' Tax Committee that the Chairman had no authority to commit the \$12,500.00, but they would work with us. After several meetings, the Lodgers' Tax Committee came up with a figure that would have helped quite a lot with our problems, but it had to be approved by Ruidoso Village Council.

It seems the Village Attorney is like the Chamber of Commerce Manager and does not want to see the Mule-O-Rama continue and therefore interpreted the advertising and promotion angle to almost leave the Mule-O-Rama without funding.

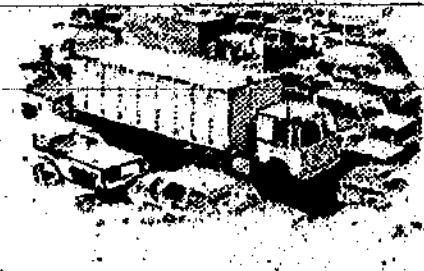

Title IV Grant For Corona

Corona is very fortunate in having been selected as a recipient of federal funds for the Title IV C English program. This program, Practical Communication Skills, supplements the regular course in the English department. Students are scheduled into these classes if they are one-half year or more below their grade level based on scores of the California Test of

Basic Skills which is given to every student annually. There are twenty-eight types of these programs which are funded in the state on a competitive basis. The grant which Corona receives goes for materials for the class, teacher's salary, and field trips.

In Corona High School the emphasis is on listening, oral communication, writing. Students interviewed that are now participating in this class said that their speech has improved, comprehension and understanding the meaning of words have improved, and they feel that they now have better study habits. They also highly recommend this program to other schools. Schools wishing to obtain federal funding must apply yearly. Corona's program is expected to be funded for three years.

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
