A committee met at the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital Monday evening to discuss the basic guidelines for a program to provide help for the victims of sex crimes.

An application packet from the Health Department was discussed by the group. There is \$120,000 available to the state of New Mexico from the Community Mental Health Section of the Mental Health Bureau of the Behavioral Health Services Division of the Health and Environmental Department.

The committee plans another meeting next week.

At Fort Stanton — Student Job Hunter Seeks Unusual Job

MRNS-Elliott Topper is a student job hunter and a great deal hangs upon his success.

Unlike most student job hunters, Topper isn't looking for something to bring in a little extra cash between semesters. His search may determine the happiness and way of life for a great many students.

They are the people who are in training programs at Ft. Stanton where mentally retarded citizens are taught how to help themselves and help other people.

Elliott is the new community liaison teacher who will be talking to Lincoln County business people about the abilities of Ft. Stanton students and asking that these people be given a chance to work.

It is all a part of a new trend to take people with the ability to live on the outside out of institutions. Mark Delgado, administrator of Fort Stanton Hospital and School described the program as one of maximum fulfillment for the students and the community.

The students, given an opportunity, are able to happily do the work that is needed, that fits their abilities. Each student is different and has different abilities. Out program, and Elliott's job, is designed to put a student into the proper job. If there is an opening and a need in the business or public community, we can train a student to do the job.

The job training program for mentally retarded citizens will be expanded beginning in July when Zia Therapy Center opens a Carrizozo center in the former hospital building. Zia has contracted with the state to accept students from Fort Stanton and perhaps other places, for special job preparation training. George Cardell, Zia director, says that many students have far greater capabilities, than it is commonly believed. "It is a matter of proper training and healthy encouragement," Cardell said. "We have seen remarkable results and wonderful examples of determination in our students."

Delgado and Topper hope that the June job search in Carrizozo and Lincoln County will not only locate immediate but will give an indication of

jobs that additional training might make available.

"We have students ready to go to work," Delgado said, "and there are others that need additional training. We want to enter the program without any preconceived patterns to follow. The community program is a new concept and it will require a new approach."

At a recent meeting of the newly formed Zia advisory committee, County Commissioner Lee Straley spoke about the opportunities for citizens in communities to grow in spirit and in attitudes through participation in these community-based programs. Straley said that by contact with the disadvantaged students, people often learned new things about themselves and their capacities. "We will like ourselves better when we learn to help and to understand these people who have been less fortunate, less gifted than most of us," he said.

But more than just sharing in an awareness of need, Carrizozo and the other towns of Lincoln County will have an opportunity to make use of workers who really want to work, Topper said.

There are a number of programs under which the Fort Stanton student can be employed that will provide financial assistance to employers who want to participate in the program. For those prospective employers who are missed in the June job hunt, Topper, says, can call him at Fort Stanton.

The job hunter himself is an unusual person. Several years ago he and his wife Teena were living in New York state where he taught at a college. Topper's particular field was education but both he and Teena decided there had to be a better way to live and teach then Buffalo, New York offered.

It took several years and most of their savings to find and build that new way of life in the near wilderness north of Carrizozo. The young couple bought land between White Oaks and Raventon and proceeded to find water, plant a garden, build a house and start a family in about that order.

There were several months when it appeared that the baby would arrive before the house, but Elliott, who learned by doing, had the roof on when his new daughter was born.

Teena and Elliott have filled the country side with all the sounds of music as well as hammering. He is a talented jazz musician who has added a little country and western to his songs.

Along with the guitar, piano, banjo and conventional instruments, Elliott plays the zitar, an art learned in travels in India. Teena is a pianist and has taught music in other places where the distance between teacher and prospective student was not so great.

The Toppers are still building on their acres and learning about gardening and land improvement in the southwest. The home project is far enough along to the Toppers to devote full time to this new experience with these students at Fort Stanton.

Elliott is using music in his work with the Fort Stanton students and is exploring new training ideas along with his job hunting. Developing programs in education is exactly what his

educational background equipped him to do and he finds it particularly good that he can do that work here in the southwest where he and Teena chose to live and raise a family.

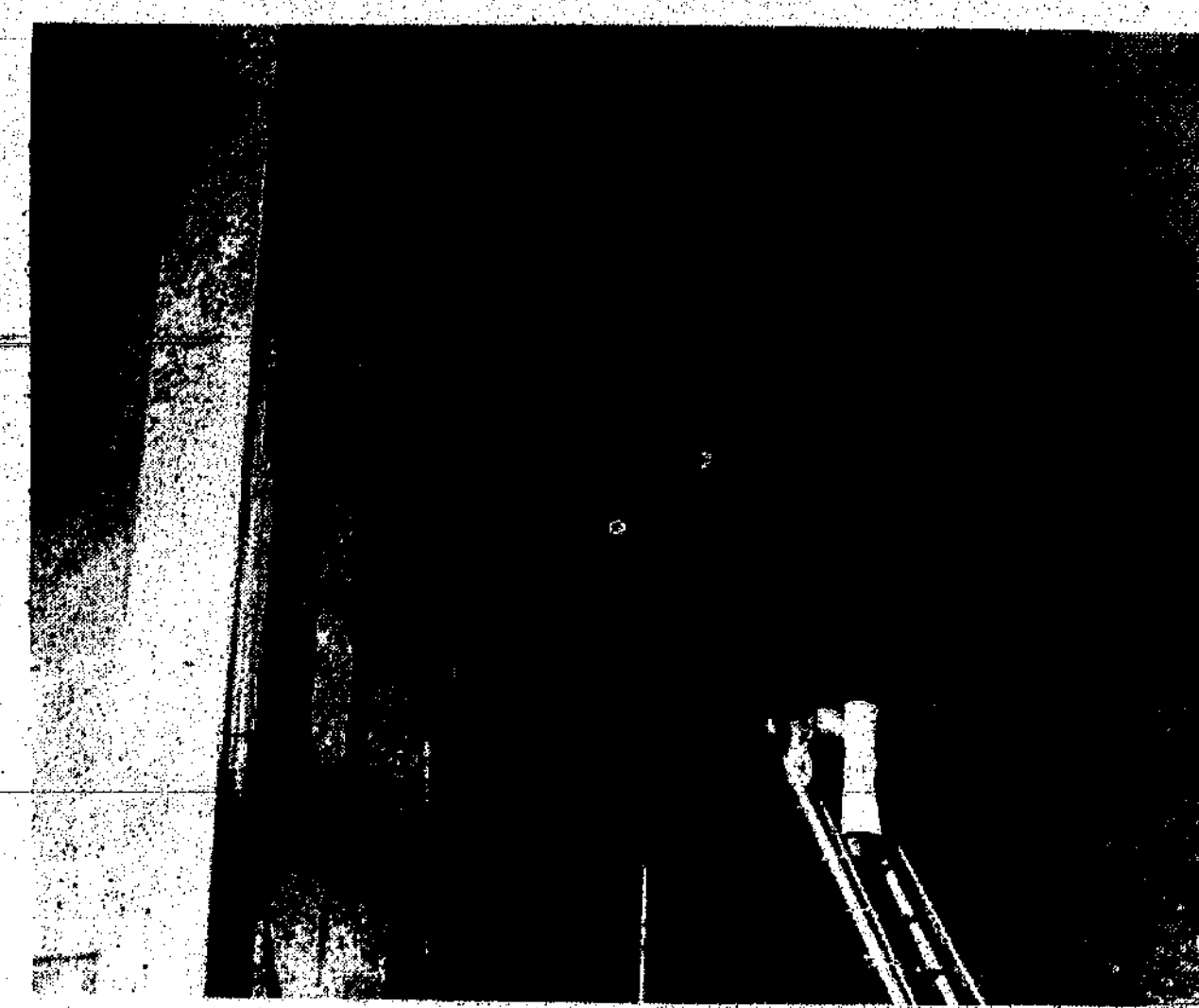
Spencer To Speak At NMMI

Ruidoso Downs, N.M., June 4. Gentlemen's Feature, A 19-1 Outsider, came on in the final strides and pulled out a brilliant nose win in Sunday's grand final of the Kansas Quarter Horse Futurity at Ruidoso Downs.

Gentlemen's Feature was ridden by Ken Hart. H.C. Werner Jr. — who saddled an unprecedented four horses for the Kansas—is the trainer.

It was a desperate struggle over the final yards of the 350-yard dash, and matters looked like a toss-up with just a few more steps to go. Oh Jet Van, NS, A 40-1 Outsider, and Bug Tuff Johnny, packing odds of 20-1, were slugging it out on the rail in a nip-and-tuck battle.

Gentlemen's Feature broke well, was out of contention most of the way. When the filly hit the half-way point, she began putting more muscle in her stride, and took dead aim on the leaders, the filly kept churning up the dust in a tremendous finish and waved her nose in front on the final stride.

The Stewards quickly flashed the photo sign and took a long look at the picture. Gentlemen's Feature, Oh Jet Van, and Bug Tuff Johnny had their noses separated by a matter of an inch or two.

Gentlemen's Feature got the win by a tissue-thin margin, and Oh Jet Van and Bug Tuff Johnny ended in a

deadheat. Keith Asmussen rode Oh Jet Van. The pilot of Bug Tuff Johnny was the California star, Bobby Adair.

Gentlemen's Feature, who went into the Kansas with slim earnings, of \$1,514 covered the distance in 18.36. A headwind was blowing.

Oh Jet Van is owned by John McRae of Ponder, Texas. Bug Tuff Johnny is the property of Robert W. Moore of Norman, Okla.

Here's the way the rest of the field checked in, with purse money earned; 4th—Song O My Heart, \$22,724; 5th—Flying Passem, \$18,278; 6th—Six Te, \$17,290; 7th—More Excuses, \$16,302; 8th—Trucklin Moon, \$15,808; 9th—Trashy Man, \$14,820; 10th—Mito Easy, \$13,832.

Six Te, making only the second start of his career, raced as a 9-5 favorite largely on the strength of having set the fastest qualifying time. The gelding broke cleanly, but his fortunes dipped drastically as he found himself swallowed up in the field, and was unable to muster a challenge.

Song O My Heart also broke well and was clearly in contention during most of the dash. As the field thundered down the final 100 yards, Oh Jet Van looked like a winner on the rail, but Bug Tuff Johnny was giving him a stern run for his money.

When it comes to buying race horses, Gerald and Darlene Blue of Amarillo are no pickers.

A couple years ago, for example, they went to the All-American Sale at Ruidoso Downs and paid \$87,000 for the filly, Hanks Azure Doll. So far, the filly has paid no dividends.

Last year, the Blues were back at the All-American Sale, and a filly caught Darlene's eye. "I told Gerry I wanted the filly, because she looked to me like she can run," Darlene explained. "Gerry said, 'Okay, go ahead and buy her.' He never even looked at her."

So Darlene bought the filly for \$18,500—and from the way things have turned it, that purchase was a whale of a bargain.

Gentlemen's Feature, ridden by Ken Hart, turned in a gutsy performance while getting up for a nose win in the 350-yard thriller. The winner's purse came out to almost \$165,000.

In the post-race interview, Darlene said: "I was so nervous before the race. I didn't think she had a good chance. So I told all my friends to buy her to show. Now I'm so excited can hardly talk. I told my priest if she finished dead last, I'd donate \$1,000 to the church. Now you'd be surprised how much the church will get."

Trashy Man Injured In Kansas Futurity

"It's the luck of Q.H. Racing" says Sunny Edwards's at Ruidoso Q.H. & T.B. owner and Breeder.

Trashy Man and Six Te Two of the heavy favorites in the Kansas Futurity just about eliminated each other when they bumped together about 150 yards out. "Looks like a shoe caught him in the right front leg. Don't look like anything permanent."

The break from the gate was excellent. This trouble developed early in the race.

"Whose fault it was isn't the point" says Sunny. "It's one of those things that happen in quarter horse racing."

Sunny Edwards was first well known as a roper. He had national standing and competed from Madison Square Garden to the Coast.

He went into the racing and then breeding of quarter horses and thoroughbreds some four years ago. At that time he bought two colts Laddie Face at the All American Sale and Deck of Cards in Texas. Laddie Face won the Kindergarten Futurity in California as a two year old. He was crippled and now is turned out. Deck of Cards foundered.

Next Sunny bought two mares. One, She's Right was bought at the All-

American sale for \$30,000. She's Right qualified for the All American and won six stakes races. She now has her first colt by her side by Hempen and is bred back to Easy Jet.

The second mare was a thoroughbred bought in Texas "Roll on Dolly" for a brood mare. She had Wired To Win who won many races at Ruidoso. Wired To Win has a yearling by Three Oh's and a baby by Easy Jet.

Then a filly "Chargette 105" was bought at the All American Sale. She

won 4 races at Ruidoso and is now bred to Hempen.

These three mares, She's Right, Wired To Win, and Chargette 105 are bringing the top runners of the future.

In the meantime there is Trashy Man. Sunny bought him at the All American Sale also for \$3,500. He won his first out and made Register of Merit at Del Rio. He ran the fastest time of the day in his trials for the Kansas Futurity.

As Sunny says "The injury is not permanent." Trashy man will be back.

All-American Sale Provides Five Finalists In Kansas Futurity Field

This year's Kansas shootout looks like something of a testament to Ruidoso's All-American Yearling Sale. Four of the finalists are graduates of the '77 sale and each didn't require particularly big money.

Flying Passem—whose current money line of \$41,785 could easily put him at the forefront of the wagering—was picked out of the All-American Sale for only \$5,500. Gentlemen's Feature went for \$16,500, and Mito Easy traded hands for \$18,500. But probably the biggest bargain of all is More Excuses, the colt who flashed to nearly a two-length win in the trials. That victory swelled his career record to a 3-1-1 tally from six starts.

More Excuses is owned by Charles Arnold of Lewisville, Texas. Arnold originally bought the colt's dam, Top Mandy, for a paltry \$800. She was bred to Mito Paint at a cost of \$1,500, and the result was More Excuses.

Trashy Man was bought for \$13,500.

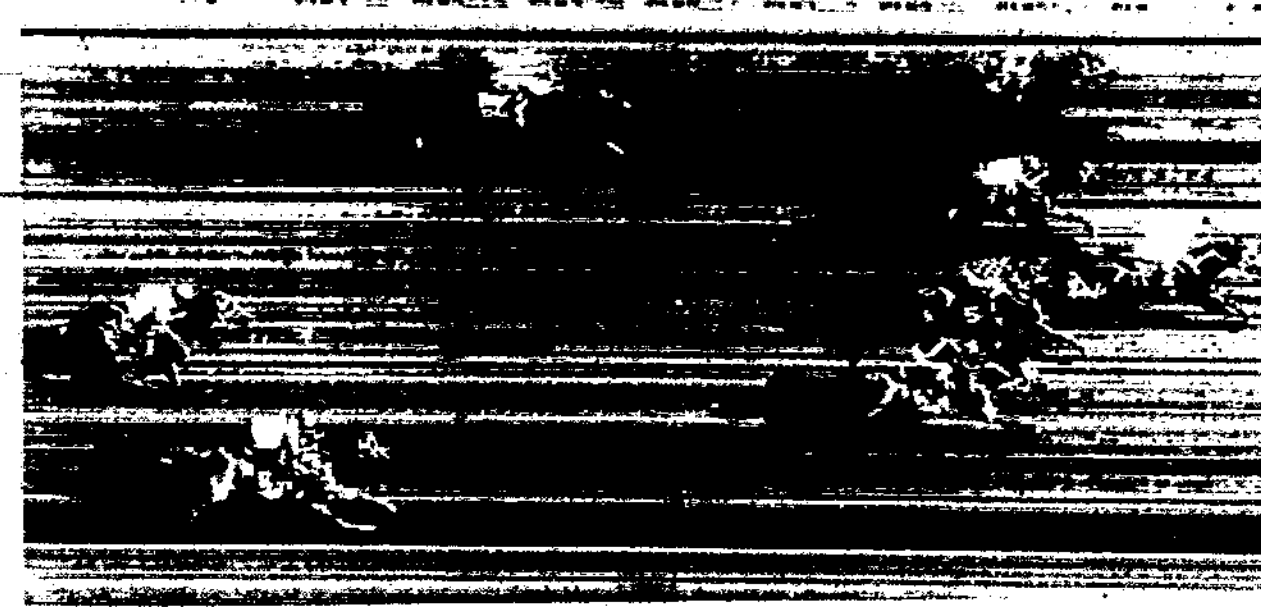
Gerald had this observation: "I had faith in the filly. We'll be back for the Rainbow Futurity."
