

The Quiet Man Who Could Move A Mountain

I had known from the beginning that one day the Sabino Vidaurri story would fall into place. He was amust...an episode of Americana that should be kept in the archives of universities. Everyone in the United State came from somewhere else. except the Indians. And they did too. It is just a matter of when.

What a truly wonderful thing the written language is. In the 1945 "Historical Encyclopedia of New Mexico", there are two stories it is important here to recall. One, written by Dr. R. E. Blaney. It reads, "In the early Eighties of the past century, the cowmen of the states to the north and east were investigating the possibilities of New Mexico as to the water supply and grazing facilities for their fast increasing herds. At that time this part of the universe was known as the Carrizo Flats. In the early seventies, Tom Catron built a house within a stone's throw of a spring, about one half mile north of the present site of Carrizozo, which he named Carrizozo Spring. In the early years of this century, W. C. McDonald, our first Governor under Statehood, acquired possession of this Spring, by purchase. and several years later built a new dwelling three or four hundred yards to the West of the Spring, where he and his esteemable wife lived, with the exception of nearly five years which they spent in Santa Fe, until called to^{*}their ever-lasting home. The above described property has been known for many years as the Bar W Ranch."

"In the eighties some business men of El Paso came to this vicinity looking for deposits of coal, after a thorough investigation they bought a coal mine near what is now Capitan. Shortly thereafter they built a railroad to that point. The body of a freight car was placed at the side of the track here, which was called Carrizo Siding. Several years later coal in large quantities was found at Dawson in the North West part of the State. In order to tap these deposits and to satisfy the markets of El Paso, also to secure an unfailing supply of coal for their own use, the officials of the El Paso Southeastern Railroad began a survey of the country North of Carrizo Siding. to connect with the rail end of the Rock Island R. R. at Santa Rosa. Several

surveys were made, one through White Oaks, and one where the Road was built. The altitude south of Corona was found to be four feet lover than the high point just North of White Oaks, therefore the choice. In June of 1901 the first train passed over the finished road bed."

"About this time W. C. McDonald prevailed on the officials of the Road to change the name of this place to Carrizozo. The freight car body was still being used as a telegraph office, and there were two or three residents and a few shacks about the town."

"Carrizozo began to grow in earnest in 1905 and 6. A new depot was built, and the Carrizozo Trading Co. put up a building across the street. The Exchange Bank building was up and opened put for business in 1907. That year saw an extensive growth in the town, as the railroad shops were moved here from Alamogordo. A few years later the county seat was transferred from Lincoln to Carrizozo, and a new Court House was built, in the interim, two churches and a school building were constructed."

There is a little poem to end the story, I suppose Dr. Blaney wrote it: "Carrizozo where the hand clasp is a little stronger, Where friendship lasts a little longer, Where the night s are a little colder, And the people never seem older."

On page 854 of this same book there is a picture of Sabino C. Vidaurri, then page 855 this tory is told: "Sabino Cervantez Vidaurri, owner and operator of a general merchandise store at Carrizozo in Lincoln County, is one of the best known merchants of this vicinity and a highly popular citizen and civic leader. Mr. Vidaurri, who has been engaged in the mercantile business in Carrizozo for well over a quarter of a century, started in a small way with a limited stock of merchandise and by consistent, fair dealing and a steadfast effort to provide his customers with their merchandising needs at a reasonable price, has built up a large patronage among both Spanish and American residents of the area. The stock is well selected and highly deversified. Mr. Vidaurri and his family occupy elegant living quarters at the rear of the store building."

"Sabino Cervantez Vidaurri was born at Teocaltiche, Jalisco, Mexico, on the thirtieth of December, 1888, a son of Rito Vidaurri, former merchant tailor, and Mrs. Toribia (Cervantez) Vidaurri Both parents are now deceased. Mr. Vidaurri obtained his education in the schools of the Southern Republic and began earning his living when he was only eleven years old. When he was seventeen years old he came to the United States and settled first at Alamogordo, New Mexico, where he was first employed as dish washer in a

cafe. In a few months he was promoted to the position of pantry man and later served as second cook and chef until he had saved enough money to go in business for himself. Mr. Vidaurri came to Carrizozo and opened his general merchandise store in 1913."

"On the tenth of June, 1915, Mr. Vidaurri was married to Miss Apolonia Jauregui, a native of Gomez Palacio. Mexico, and a daughter of Francisco Jauregui and Mrs. Flavia (Vasquez) Jauregui. The children of Mr. and Mrs. Vidaurri are Cecelia, now married to



Salvador Martinez Ortiz, engaged in Uni ted States government contract work at Carrizozo; Lucio Vidaurri, employee of an aeroplane factory in Los Angeles, California: Misses Maria and Theresa Vidaurri, students in the Carrizozo High School: Francisco Sabino Vidaurri, attending grade school here, and the baby, Carmen Torbia Vidaurri."

"Mr. Vidaurri is a naturalized 🔨 American citizen, active in much of the civic life of Carrizozo and a member of the Business Men's Club. Religious affiliation is with the Catholic faith, Golf is his favorite recreation."

To step across the river at El Paso and into a 1032 page book is one giant step. Why did he take it? The wiseness of the man reminds me of Benito Jaurez, of whom it is said, "His integrity and concern for the poor were almost legandary. "During the Civil War the French installed Prince Maximilian as emperor. Juarez directed the war for freedom. In 1866, with the Civil War over, the United States virtually ordered the French out of Mexico. In 1867 Maximilian was captured by Juarez troops and on June 19. 1867 he was executed, much to the apprehension of many nations of the, world. But Juarez, remembering the Monroe Doctrine, set one of his own...which has carried Mexico well these one hundred ten years.

Juarez died in 1872, only 16 years before Sabino Viduarri was born. Juarez was a great national hero and there is no doubt the young Sabino was told about him many times in his early schooling.

It is important to review what thoughtful people left written down for us but is far more involving to talk with those wht knew him best. Those who loved him and were loved by him. I knew him, and I always felt humble when I was around him. Like Vernon Petty said, "He was a man who would look you in the eye and tell you the truth, whether that was what you were wanting to hear or not." There is no doubt in my mind I could choose a

remembers the whistle changing shifts. of seeing literally hundreds of men walking away from the railroad area on their way home. She estimates that at one time the railroad hired close to five hundred men, and Albert Roberts and Johnny Johnson agree that was probably close. Somewhere back there Carrizozo got up to'some 3000 residents. section houses, the shacks, the tents. In 1910 her sister, Justa, married Louis Vidaurri, Louis had come up the track along about 1905, worked a year and sent money back to his younger brother Sabino to come up. It is a good story to listen to how Sabino found mountains of dishes to be washed, if he wished to eat. He came to Carrizozo for some six months but returned to Alamogordo where he worked hard and formulated plans. In 1910, at the small Catholic Church, on the block just south of Jack Harkey, Louis and Justa were married. Sabino came up to be best man. He was particularly impressed by a young lady named Apolonia, and went back to Alamogordo to begin plans of moving to Carrizozo.

In 1913 Sabino came to Carrizozo and purchased the building the family still owns. It was purchased from Esequel Vigil, had been a school house, a restaurant, a little store. As the store increased its stock and service Sabino began to pay more and more attention to the young lady he was so impressed with. Then on the tenth of June 1915 they were married. At first they stayed ... in two rooms at the home of Louis and Justa, then he began to add living. quarters onto the store.

Mrs. Vidaurri smiles so beautifully as she tells of a long ago day when Sabino took her to visit the parents of Sally Ortiz. Sally was a long haired baby crawling around on the floor Salvador...Sabino thought the name fit. A lot of love shines in her face as she remembers back to those days in 1914. 15, 16 and 17. Those were the years in which she changed from a girl, to a lady," to a mother.

She was born in 1899, and came to Alamogordo with her folks in 1905 and then on up to Carrizozo. As ayoung girl she saw Carrizozo grow from a small acorn into a tall tree, then watched it stall out, lose some branches and leaves, and settle down to the town we know. She remembers the old roundhouse having burned down, of a new one being built and a new crew coming up from Alamo to staff it. She duction, but armistice came first and he did not go to the service. well known, being in the store one day with his feet pretty well out on the ground, but admitting he didn't have any money. Sabino fit him out and he promised as soon as he could find some work he would pay for them. Those were days when a good man was like good weather and a good rain, you just had to have some or Carrizozo would have gone the way of Pumkin Center or Donkey Flats. He sold anything from wedding dresses to coffins...if you needed it he could get it.

There is a very personal element along right about here. Sabino bought a small place south of town. Her parents lived out there, built a house there. A lot of things were grown there to help make the store fit the needs of its customers. He built a couple of greens

out there and knocked a golf ball around. On Sunday afternoons many town people went out there to sit under the big trees, look back at the town about a mile away. I live there now and it pleases me when now and then some people come out to see where they used to run and play when they were kids.

Sabino was one of the powers in the building of the country club, of helping to get the packet of land together which now gives the country club so much room to grow with. He helped with building the convent, with building the school, with building the church. He left no doubt in anyone's mind he believed in the institution of the Catholic Church. He helped in getting the land set aside for the Cemetary south of town, where one didn't have to purchase a plot.

Mrs. Vidaurri told about 1940, their 25th anniversary, about a big party_out at the country club. Her parents went on out to California and even she and Sabino thought at times about moving. I remembered back to the summers of '64 and '65, of Paul Baca pitching and Gaby Chavez catching, back when I had them and Willie, Matt, Marc, Micheal, Marcos and others. I hated to see Paul go back to California and not attend Carrizozo High School.

Bunny Osorio and I have been friends for years. His Mother and Mrs. Vidaurri were sisters. Cresencia. Her first son, Alfredo was born in Mexico, came here a baby in arms. Then here Ernesto was born, as was Florintino, (Tino). Then the Father, Sabas Lopez seems to have been killed and left Cresencia with her three small children. Then up the path from southern Mexico, to work a year and go back_home_there_came_a_man_35 years &d named Osorio. He liked it here, tell in love with Crecencia, married and worked for the railroad for 30 years. On the day Bunny was born the Almanac said a good name for that day, January 21, 1920, a good name was Fructuoso.

One time, in the early fifties, Bunny and

The Lincoln County News, June 25, 1964 ran a picture of Mr. Vidaurri using his-new-dial-phone.—The-story-noted-hehad held service in Carrizozo longer than anyone else. He had had number 47 since 1917 and was active in the ceremonies converting Carrizozo to dial operation.

The News, June 24, 1965 ran a picture of their 50th wedding anniversary reception at the country club.

Mr. Vidaurri lived here 63 years. He passed away July 25, 1976. Pall bearers were Tino Lopez, Fructoso Osorio, Joe Ventura, Fred English, J. P. Aguilar, Pablo Ortiz, Albert Roberts, and Johnson Stearns.



Demo Update: As this reporter predicted, Demo Gubernatorial nominee Bruce King tempered his stand on Right-to-Work, indicating the issue should be put to a vote of the people in the form of a Constitutional Amendment.

King's record since serving in the Legislature in the late fifties indicates a personal opposition to traditional Rightto-Work laws that have been dropped in the Legislative hoppers.

Our birdies say Big Bruce was not exactly overwhelmed with the support he got from organized labor in his primary race against Demo Bob Ferguson-and that's one reason King would like to see the Right-to-Work issue de-emphasized for the general election campaign,

Cash Concern: The New Mexico Municipal League is really concerned about a new state rule that requires non-salaried public officers to be paid thirty-two dollars, per meeting attended. Traditionally, the non-salaried positions line zoning commissioners or ' library board member have been volunteer slots.

Municipal League director Bill Fulgineti says the law mandates the payment of thirty-two bucks even if the meeting last only several minutes.

A league survey indicates the law could cost financially-tight cities of New Mexico a million dollars.

Fulgineti is seeking relief from State Finance and Administration Cabinet Secretary Maxine Gerhart. Mrs. Gerhart has the authority to reduce the thirty-two dollar rate. Fulgineti would like the payment figure reduced to zero dollars...or at least...a pro-rated salary schedule.

Want Ads: The Department of Finance is looking for an Administrator to head up the Unemployment Compensation section of the Risk Management Division. The post pays between \$1300 and \$1800 a month! St. Vincent Follow-up: The plast. Vincent Hospital in downtown States Fe remains vacant, And the states bears no closer to buying it than it when the new hospital complex was opened.

As time went by and the world became more densely populated there. were, naturally, others who broke the law. Always as part of their punishment a minor change in surname was added to indicate they were no longer true Smiths. Names such as Smitt, Smutt, Smithers, etc. began appearing on the rolls.

Heinrich, who had a harsh gutteral voice, moved northward taking with him the family name, but when pronounced in his peculiar tones, it. came out Schmidt.

The twin curly-haired boys, Solomon and Levy, moved to the Mideast, retaining the old name with an added syllable. Both Solomon Goldsmith and Levy Smithberg later amassed fortunes in real estate.

Still another young man with peculiar eyes, and who had apparently been over dosed with atabrine, moved to the Far East and established the Hop Sing dynasty. Hop Sing, I am informed. means Smith in Chinese.

Another young guitar player went south to bask in the Mediterranean sun and became the founder of the Spanish branch of the Smiths. He took the name of Chavez which my informants tell me is Spanish for Smith.

While the migration was transpiring, there was still trouble back home. When the courts began to run out of derivatives from the name Smith, they started making name changes proportionate to the crime. Names like Jones, Brown, White, etc., began to, appear and, of course, for major of-

fenses, the names got pretty far out.

I hesitate to consider the magnitude of an offense which would cause one to be given a name like Hakanson or Andrtlewicz.

Several Smiths have done very well for themselves. One in particular achieved quite a degree of fame just standing around under à spreading Chestnut tree and pounding on an anvil. He must have had a great press agent.

Another gave the entire fortune he made raising scallions and chives to an agricultural museum which still bears his name: Smith's Onion Institute.

That's the story as it came to me. I do not youch for it's authenticity, but do offer the following names. Without their help, advice and inspiration, this article would never have been possible: Jack Smith, Richard Smith, Paul





The Rio Grande Kindergarten Futurity is a great story and maybe it illustrates why some New Mexico breeders are a little upset.

At present a New Mexico bred andor foal was either a horse bred by a New Mexico based stallion out of a mare based in New Mexico or a horse born of a mare based in New Mexico who had been taken to a stud outside the state but who had been brought back within 120 days to New Mexico where the foal was dropped. The offspring of the first union was known as a New Mexico bred. The offspring of the second union vas-known-as-a-New-Mexico-foal.

Both "Bred" and "Foal" shared equal rights under New Mexico law. They could race against each other and the winner got the 10 percent of the purse which the track adds to the purse. for New Mexico bred, and or foal winner.

Sire, dam, and foal all had to be registered with the New Mexico Horse Breeders Assoc.



Anyway "Doc" Joe Miller one of the owners of the Ho Jo Farm in Anthony, New Mexico so we were told. went to Kentucky and bought a mare named Midimini by Hasty Road. She was bred to Master Hand, a Kentucky stud, one of the best sons of Bold Ruler who had won some \$300,000. The mare Midi was brought back to New Mexico. The foal was dropped in New Mexico named Pocket Coin and registered as a N.M. foal with the N.M. Horse Breeder's Assoc.

The matter might have stopped right there had not the Riggs father and son. of Fort Stockton, Texas, got interested in horse racing. The elder Riggs the father is a rousing 84 and the son a dynamic 60.

Both like to race in New Mexico. They like to run New Mexico "Bred" or "Foal" horses. "The added 10 percent makes the purses bigger."

These two know a good horse when they see one and are not afraid to pay for it.

an early lead. He looked like a winner at the top of the stretch, but as he neared the wire, he was unable to hold off the fast-charging Johney Mito and lost by a neck.

In the Kindergarten trials, he made his first outing since the Allison defeat. He led all the way, winning by nearly five lengths.

To date he has five outs, four wins, one-second and has won \$73,911.

Do the Riggs feel it is unfair to other New Mexico Breeders whose horses are the product of local studs to be out running them with a colt by a Kentucky_stud

To try to prove that a New Mexico Bred foal can out run Pocket Coin, the Riggs went after this objective themselves.



A horse called "Me Francis" had done very well for them. This horse was 100 percent New Mexico bred by any definition. He's sire was Scout Leader, his dam, Me Challenge. Both reside permanently at Ho Jo Farm in Anthony, N.M. Me Francis'had a full brother Earnest Scout. So the Riggs. bought him and gave him to Mike Welch to train and entered him to run against Pocket Coin in the Rio Grande Kindergarten. First though he was altered. He had some foot trouble but he was ready at race time.

He didn't get the job done but he ran good second. Says Mike, "Before he gets through that horse is going to make some folks around this race track pay some attention."

Why was one altered and not the other?" Well we thought New Mexico breeding might be helped by the infusion of some Master Hand blood. Fine but in the meantime where do

the rest of us go?



With those two impressive wins to his credit, Pocket Coin got away as the Allison favorite, and went storming into



I wish I could have been a schoolgirl in Quitaque, Texas during the early 60's. Because our Cook of the Month, Orby Neatherlin, was lunchroom manager and head cook at the Quitague School. The meals she turned out were a real treat for youngsters and adults alike.

Orby is Mrs. Seaborn Neatherlin and she and her husband make their home in Ruidoso. Her life is an exciting blend of children, grandchildren, community service, hobbie, traveling and home.

When you sit and visit with Orby you realize she has the traveling bug and has it bad! She was on her way to Los Angeles when I saw her last. The tour she was going on was sponsored through Security Bank to the King Tut Exhibit. There was a group of her friends from the Senior Citizens Center in Ruidoso who also went. Orby also went on the 1976 Bicentennial Tour from the Center that spent almost a month in the Eastern and Southern parts of the United States, Her traveling started when her daughter Glorianna Lane and husband Al lived in Idaho. She made more trips to Idaho than you can count on both hands. She has traveled New Mexico, too.

When we think about good cooks, we think about years of experience. Orby has tried her hand at many different food related jobs. It was working in the Bakery where she learned how to glaze pies to make them look pretty and professional. This recipe for Apple Pie includes the directions for glazing.

APPLE PIÈ

2 cups sliced fresh apples

Cook all vegetables until tender and Put through a ricer add soft. seasonings and reheat.

LIVER LYONNAISE

1 pound chicken or pork liver (beef if desired) 3 tablespoons flour 2 teaspoons salt 1/4 teaspoon pepper 3 tablespoons fat 3 ½ cups cubed potatoes, uncooked

1 cup thinly sliced onions 1 - 10½ ounce cream of celery soup


½ cup milk

Cut liver into 11/2 inch pieces. Blend flour and half of salt and pepper. Roll liver in flour mix and brown lightly in the 3 tablespoons fat. Remove from pan. Saute onion and potatoes in the same heavy pan until slightly tender and lightly brown. Layer liver and onion potatoes in baking dish. Combine milk, salt, pepper and soup. Pour over and bake 350 degrees for 10-12 minutes covered.

Combine dry ingredients, cut in peanut butter. Beat egg and milk, soak peaches in mixture, for 5 minutes. Add flour mixture. Pour in greased loaf pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 50 minutes or well browned.





Dear Editor:

I wanted to add some information to the article you had last week.

Today an estimated six million persons in the United States are affected by mental retardation. This is directly felt by some twenty million American family members. Of these, 75 percent are trainable to some extent according to their individual handicap; 20 percent are trainable for immediate community placement, and 5 percent are untrainable. The truth is, a large percentage of these people are educable and can achieve adequate socialeconomic adjustment in the community with proper education and training. One basic difference between a retarded person and a non-retarded person is the rate of learning. The retarded person learns at a different rate depending upon the degree of retardation, A growing interest in improving the education and treatment of the mentally retarded is now indicated by the fact that the total health, education, and welfare expenditures for mental retardation has risen tremendously in the past twenty years. Continual research by the National Institute of Mental Health and state and county governments has made possible improved lives for many of our citizens. Here in Lincoln County, Fort

Stanton Hospital and Training School is constantly striving for the betterment of our retarded citizens. Fort Stanton provides training programs for mild. moderate and severly retarded people ranging in age from 12 to 60. Specialized programs for the retarded person include self care and hygiene, academic training, vocational training, physical education and recreational education. A logical sequence of progress within these programs is established for the students. First, basic self care and hygiene is taught. This is incorporated in the academic program and cottage daily life. Once a student has proven competency through careful testing and evaluation in this first phase of training, he-she

> may enter the various vocational training programs offered at Fort Stanton. These programs include farming; ranching, building trades, ceramics, as well as on-the-job work situations, Students in on-the-job work situations learn in the following areas: plumbing, carpentry, agriculture and ranch skills, custodian and maintenance skills, and infirmary duties. These on-the-job work experiences will help them gain confidence and skill in a vocational area which will be of great value to the student in his-her growth towards self independence. When the student has successfully mastered self care and hygiene, vocational skills, and social behavior, he or she will qualify for placement in Fort Stanton's transitional home; a training program designed to further educate students toward self reliance, group living, positive social behavior and community placement. After successful adjustment to the transitional home, the student may qualify for community placement,

In the beginning of July, the Zia Therapy Center, working with qualified students from Fort Stanton, will open a new-community-center-in-Carrizozo's former hospital building. This new program will consist of vocational programs, recreational programs, a sheltered workshop, group home living, full and part time job placement and eventual community placement.

Some students at Fort Stanton are prepared for job placement now; others will need further training in the sheltered workshop. A sheltered work shop is a work-orientated rehabilitation facility with a controlled working environment and individual goals which utilize work experience and related services for assisting the handicapped person to progress toward normal living and productive educational status (Sheltered Workshops - A -Handbook 1966, Page 1). The sheltered workshop in the new Carrizozo center will analyze the skill requirements of a specific job and work individually with the students

to train them to fulfill job assignments as well as to help the students with their work attitudes and community adjustment. The students will commute from Fort Stanton to Carrizozo daily. The new Carrizozo center will also establish a group home. Fort Stanton students will live together under the supervision of a group home supervisor and the new center.

A new trend is being established in the United States to prepare handicapped people toward community placement. Here in New Mexico, under a new state program called "Mainstream", retarded citizens are being returned from state hospitals and training schools to communities where it is possible for them to function in school, home, and job placement. Similiar programs have been established across our country. The Villa Solano Project, started approximately one year ago at the Tabosa School in Roswell; places handicapped. people in several group homes in the Roswell and Haggerman area. Some of these people attend public school programs in Haggerman and Roswell, & some commute daily to the Tabosa school. The consensus is that the project has been an outstanding success. The people involved in the Program have shown a greater feeling of self-worth and productivity,

It will take time, cooperative understanding, and communication among all those involved and interested in the new Carrizozo Community Center for success to be achieved. I am looking forward to meeting all people in Carrizozo and the surrounding areas to discuss our new Center. In the next few weeks, I will be meeting with our community's business people and the general public to establish proper job placement for the gulified students at Fort Stanton. Any ideas you have, or help you may give regarding this new Center would be greatly appreciated. This is a community program and we need your support so we all can learn and grow together in this community effort to help those less fortunate than us, and to give those people the chance. they deserve in their courageous struggle to overcome their handicap. School of Banking this week on the University of New Mexico campus in Albuquerque.


Straley will graduate from the bank management program with 50 other seniors, while 51 freshmen will be welcomed into the two-year course.
