Chief Morales Explains —

## Patrolman Spears Dismissed

MRNS—The Carrizozo Board of Trustees set the wheels in motion for a boat to the town's coffers by way of an increase in the gross receipts tax.

The trustees told City Attorney Bill Payne to go ahead in drafting an ordinance calling for a ¼ to ½ of 1 percent addition to the gross receipts tax.

The last session of the legislature authorized town governing bodies to impose the increase without going to the voters.

As of July 1 the Carrizozo rate was reduced from 4¼ to 4 percent, Payne announced. The decrease was in the state's share. Carrizozo businesses should now be collecting only 4 percent.

The recommendations of a ½ of 1 percent increase goes to the state.

Bureau of Revenue. If approved the ordinance will be advertised. The new rate will go into effect not sooner than July, 1979.

The legislature stipulated that voters can stop the increase by petitioning for a referendum election if a sufficient number object. Methods for such a vote will be detailed in the published notices.

The town accepted the low bid of Thunderbird Sales of Phoenix for \$1356.75 for the purchase of safety coats and boots for the Volunteer Fire Department. The equipment will take 60 to 90 days to deliver.

Mayor Jesse English said that 78 percent federal funds were available through the state for improvements to

town streets. He said that Carrizozo should apply for funds to repair existing streets and suggested that several such projects should receive attention.

The town's 22 percent share can be in money or work, Mayor English said. Each program carries a \$100,000 limit.

Town Clerk, Christine Chavez, read a letter from Capitan Village Clerk Doña Engleking transmitting \$900 as a share in swimming pool upkeep. The letter said the children of Capitan enjoyed using the pool and the town was glad to assist.

The trustees instructed Attorney Payne to go ahead on an ordinance to permit the sale and use of certain fireworks in Carrizozo.

Mayor English asked Police Chief

Choncho Morales about any increase in fires in the town over the 4th of July holiday. Morales said the incident appeared to be about the same with or without legalized fireworks.

Mayor English said there were complaints regarding the lack of an attendant at the airport. Yellowbird, contractors for the operation of the airport, will be notified that the airport must be attended or their operating contract will be voided.

The Mayor said that the trustees should expect a continuation of the discussion of police problems. He said that reports were out that decisions had been made at the meeting. Mayor English said that no action had been taken at the closed session, that the discussion concerned personnel matters. Policeman Ron Spears was dismissed by Chief Morales a few days after the session but, according to the Mayor, it was not a decision made at the meeting.

Chief Morales said the dismissal had come before the end of the 90 days probationary period for new employees and had come because of six complaints made by citizens. This is the letter:

I Police Chief C.A. Morales terminated Mr. Spears job as policeman, because of numerous complaints from citizens of Carrizozo.

On June 28, 1978, I called Officer Spear to meet with me at my office at City Hall. I informed Mr. Spear that on Friday 6-30-78 he would be terminated. He replied, "Why wait until Friday, I'll quit right now." He took off his badge and got out his police commission card and threw them on my desk. Mr. Spear asked why he was being fired. I told him he was terminated because of violation of probation while performing his duties as Policeman. Many complaints had been received by me from citizens as to his conduct while performing his duties.

## Mining Process Helps Jicarilla Mill

JICARILLA-MRNS—Fifteen hundred tons of dirt each day will be processed at a new mill located deep in the heart of the Jicarilla Mountains north of Carrizozo.

The five million dollar mill is the beginning of an anticipated 35-year project to extract 12 "noble" metals from North Lincoln County by a radical new process that bears a top secret industrial label.

A Las Vegas, Nevada concern, Lincoln Mines of Nevada, hold the leases on 330 acres in the Jicarillas which Joseph F. Wyson, financier and company secretary-treasurer, is betting will have an almost unbelievable payoff.

The project is under the direction of ALPHA Mineral Processing of New Mexico, James Jones, chairman of the board of that company, said Alpha had contracted to operate the project and it was Alpha's process which would be used in the Jicarillas.

Eventually the company plans to run 5000 tons of mineral bearing earth through the mill each day. The average proven pay load, according to Jones, is \$200 per ton.

The Alpha process is profitable, he said, because of the broad scope of metals that can be extracted. The company will be removing gold, silver, platinum, copper, lead, zinc, vanadium, uranium, mercury and iron.

The mill is located on the old Lynch properties about two miles north of the former town of Jicarilla. The old Jicarilla school house is being used as a bunk house by some of the workers.

Others are living in some of the rebuilt log cabins that were homes, long ago, of the Jicarilla miners who panned for gold.

There are presently 28 people, not including supervisors and office people, working in production. About 70 percent are Lincoln County residents, Jones said.

As the production increases, Alpha plans to have a production payroll of 50 to 60. Executive offices will be opened in Carrizozo in the next few weeks. The

## Ft. Stanton Employees May Go On Strike

FORT STANTON—Negotiations between Fort Stanton Hospital and Local 2293 of the Southwestern Council of Industrial Workers of the AFL-CIO reached a deadlock last Friday.

Monday night the six man executive council for the local union met & recommended picketing and if necessary a strike. The rank and file are expected to confirm the vote with picket going up by either Friday or Monday.

Tommy Navarez, president of the local commented, "We don't want to strike, but if the management doesn't change their attitudes, it will come to that."

The issues at stake involve the

arbitration of grievance procedures, and the transfers and promotion procedures.

The local doesn't want to have to take their personnel problems to the state Personnel board, but rather would take them to an arbitration board at the hospital composed of two labor team members, and two management members.

The other issue is the procedures used in transfers and promotions with the union wanting a point system of evaluation and transfers.

Other state hospitals that are now being picketed are the Fort Bayard Medical Center, and several units at the Las Vegas New Mexico Hospital.

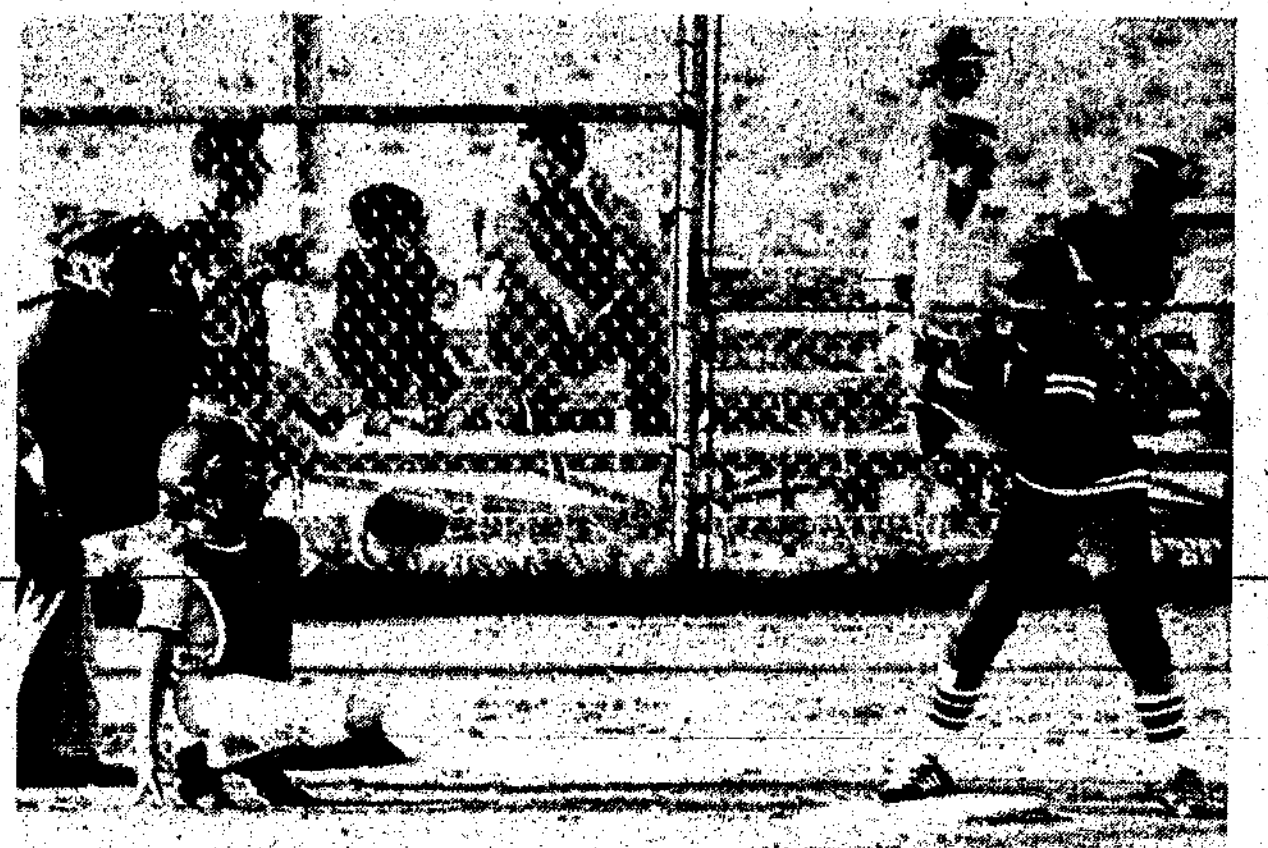

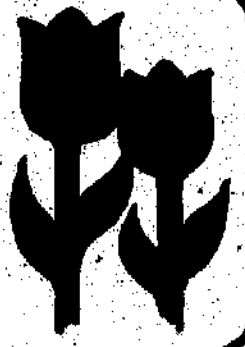

My daughters little 18 month old boy had an ear infection - naturally she took him to the doctor. He prescribed an antibiotic - a liquid, to be taken by teaspoonful, several times a day for ten days. "Ten days, that is the key to the cure." My daughter, said that her little boy was well and stopped giving the antibiotic. This was the mistake. After talking to other young Mothers - it seems that many of them stop the antibiotic too soon, then the child gets an middle ear infection. When antibiotics are dropped again and again there is danger of allergy hazards as child gets older.

Only about one in 15, according to a recent study at Children's Hospital in Buffalo, N.Y. get the full amount of the antibiotic directed.

All antibiotics should be taken exactly as they are directed by the doctor whether the child seems well or not.

Another Flash!! On Health today!! The National Commission on Diabetes issued a report recently whose findings have been referred to as "shocking". The picture that emerges is that Diabetes is taking ten million in the United States. In 1974 some 600,000 new cases were diagnosed and it seems to be increasing at the rate of 6 percent a year. Diabetes ranks third among the nation's leading causes of death.

Memorial services for those who have passed away during the last year will be held Saturday afternoon. "Lights of Heaven" is the featured theme under the direction of Chloe Peters and Glenda Armstrong. The general business meeting is 1:30 Sunday, the last day of the encampment.

For those attending for the first time, there is camping space available at no charge for those participating in the services. All young people must be sponsored or accompanied by adults. Dogs should be left home, as they roam free or disturb by barking. Bring your own campers, tents, or bedrolls. Meals are provided with expenses defrayed by donations. All persons are asked to register at the booth for the purpose.

The tabernacle-and-dining-halls-give roof shelter, but jackets and rainwear are essential for chill evenings and summer showers. The altitude is 7000 feet. A fenced play area

with sponsors is provided for young children.

If camping is not possible, everyone is welcome to attend daily service. Meals are served chuckwagon style at 6:00 a.m., 12:30, and 6:30 p.m. Tabernacle services are held at 11:00 a.m., 2:30 p.m. and 8 p.m. Group prayer meetings are held at 4:30 p.m. A bell is rung 5 minutes before each meal and service. A fun campfire ends each day.

Ministers of all faiths are requested to offer assistance in counseling, and young people are asked to volunteer at least part-time help with dishwashing, baby sitting, Bible school, etc.

If you like to sing, join the volunteers for choir practice.

Booklets are available telling the history, experiences of the founders, and general information about the Nogal Mesa Camp Meeting. The registrars will answer any questions, settle any problems of encampment, and try to make your stay enjoyable. A nurse is present for minor physical handicaps. Certain camp rules are posted only for the comfort and convenience of this totally non-commercial brotherhood gathering.

The grounds can be reached by the Lincoln National Forest road turning off US 380 about 5 miles west of Capitan and 15 miles east of Carrizozo; or by the road off State Road 37 by Nogal Lake. Further information may be obtained from Johnson Stearns, Citizens State Bank, Carrizozo, New Mexico 88301. No reservations are necessary. The first meal will be at 6:30 Wednesday evening, July 19, to be followed by the first service at 8 p.m. The Camp Meeting will close with the last service, Sunday, July 23, at 8 p.m.

This annual encampment experience of hundreds is a unique sharing of friendship and brotherhood in the beautiful forest lands of Nogal Mesa, with its awe-inspiring vistas of distant mountains and deserts. It is one of the outstanding events in Lincoln County's mountain summer. All are welcome to join for a day or four.

The sixth Cowboy Camp Meeting of the Southwest is to have their first encampment the second week of August at Mesa Redondo, in Quay County, south of Tucumcari. Others besides Nogal Mesa will be at Kiowa, Colo., Des

Moines, N.M., Mancos, Colo., Cortez, Colo., and Wilcox, Ariz.

A work day at the grounds will be held Saturday, July 15. Bring your basket lunch and lend a hand.

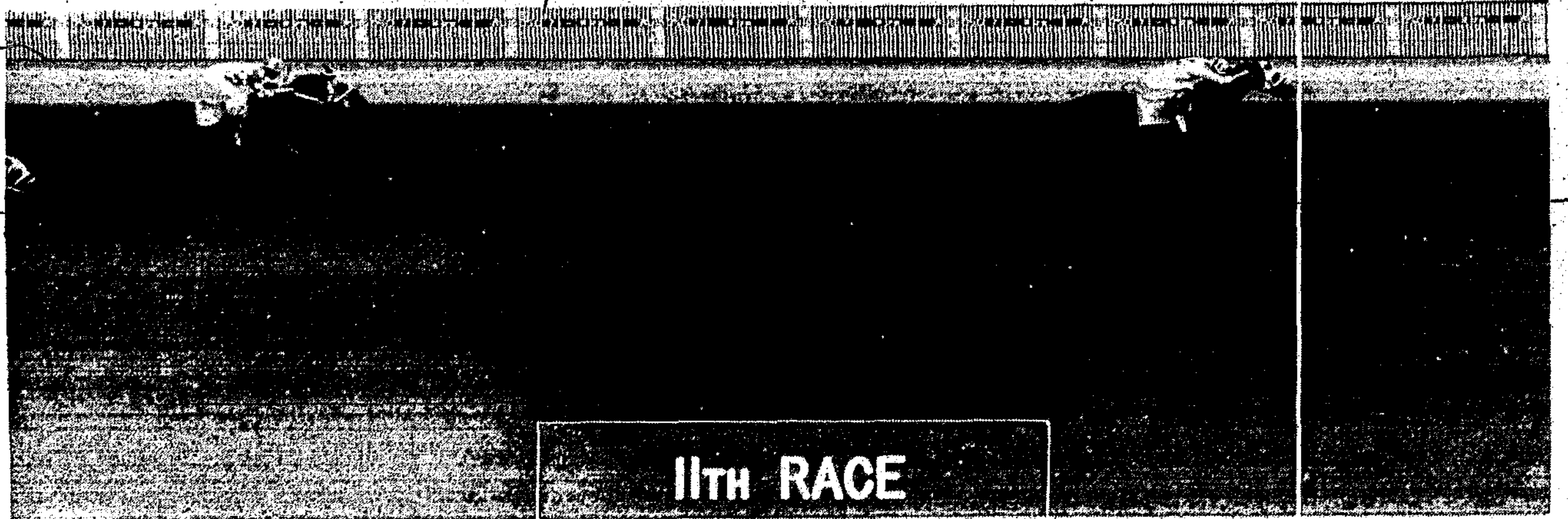

## In 1:12 3-5 seconds (six-furlongs) The Drake first in 12th running of Peter Hurd Handicap (for 3-yr. olds)

RUIDOSO DOWNS, N.M. — The Drake toyed with fellow three-year-olds at Ruidoso Downs before administering the coup de grace in Sunday's 12th running of the Peter Hurd Handicap.

The colt, shouldering the top load of 123 pounds in the six-furlong sprint, fearlessly stayed well off the pace in the early going.

Hopeful Journey, as usual, went winging along the front end and got some early competition from the 10-1 outsider, Keeper of My Heart. One Bold Scout, the 8-5 second favorite with a 122 pound on his back, stayed within striking distance.

As the field skimmed down the back stretch, The Drake was well out of the picture—perhaps as much as 10 lengths in arrears at one point.

Hopeful Journey was able to keep the lead to herself until the top of the stretch, then cooked out in predictable fashion. Jockey Willie Lovell aboard One Bold Scout asked his mount for all he had, and was inching toward the front when he reached the top of the lane.

But by this time, Jockey Gilbert Villegas had The Drake in overdrive.

The colt delivered a mighty surge around the turn for home, then had each of his foes in tow when he straightened out for the stretch drive.

With those high-octance strides, it was apparent no one would catch the people's choice in the final furlong. The Drake opened up at well and flashed across the finish with nearly a four-length lead.

The competition chalked up crisp fractions of 22 2-5 seconds for the first

two furlongs, and 46 1-5 for the half. But The Drake's final clocking of 1:12 3-5 seconds was most impressive of all.

The mark was only a second short of the track standard. But it was the swiftest so far this season.

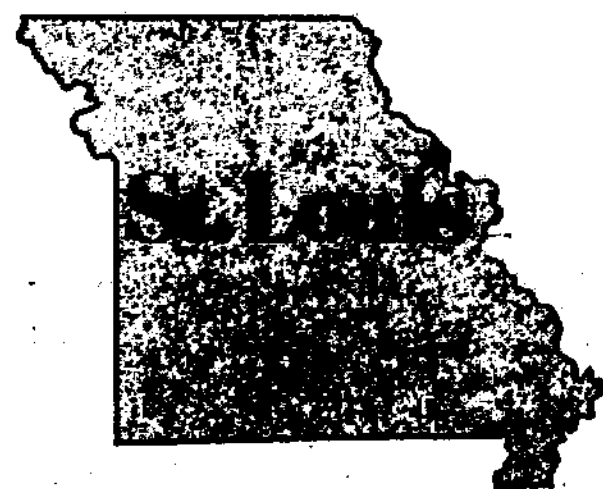

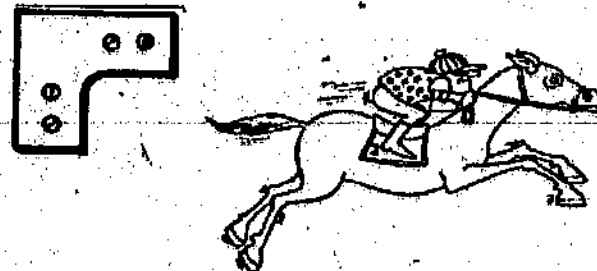

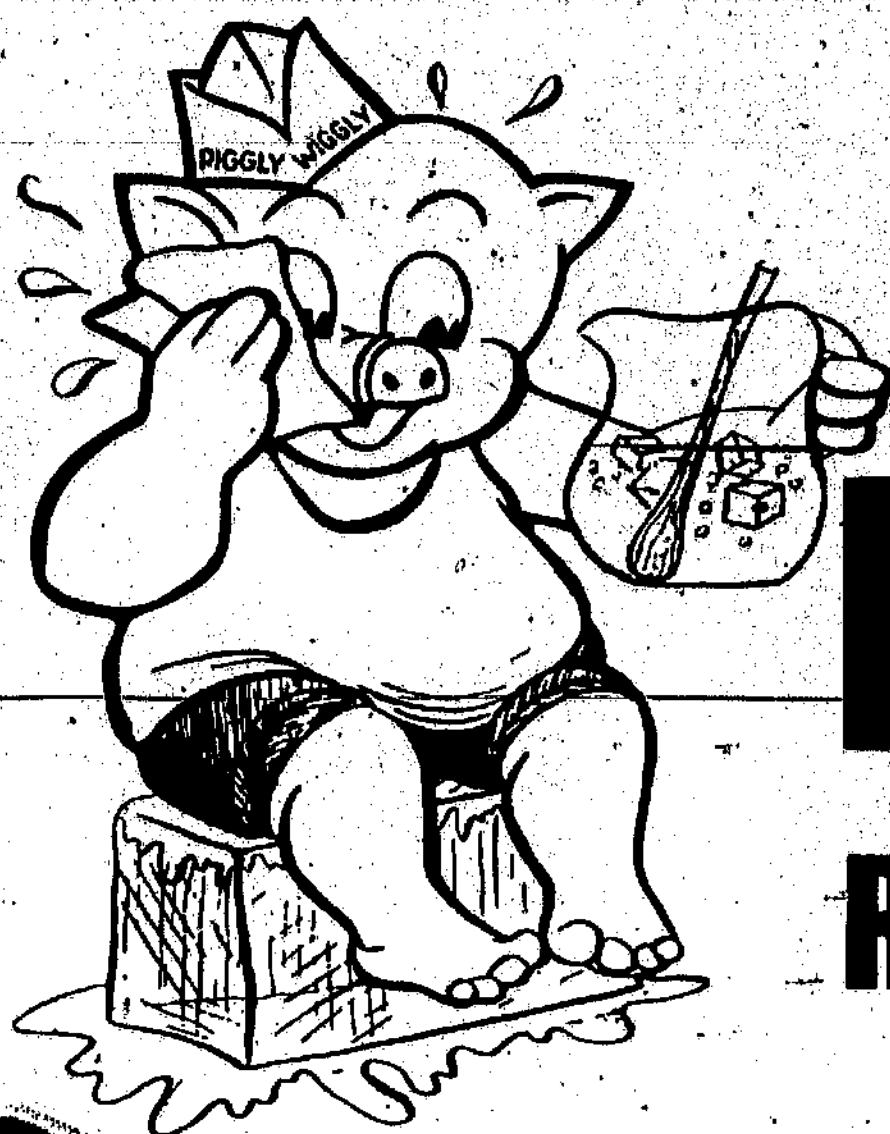

**Don't Let Your Pet Get Ticked Off:**  
Don't let your pet get ticked off.  
Although most ticks cause more  
distress to pet owners than to the pets,  
they can sometimes cause your pet to  
get sick, depending on the tick. Pet  
owners living in or near mountains and  
wooded areas should be especially  
careful. Ticks in these areas can  
release a nerve toxin which could cause  
paralysis.  
Ear ticks usually go deep inside  
your pet's ear and can cause quite a bit  
of pain. On the other hand, the brown  
tick and the fowl tick may stay on your  
pet's ear flaps or skin. They often go  
almost unnoticed by the pet.  
If your pet is hosting a crop of ticks,  
the easiest solution is to simply pull the  
ticks off with tweezers. While you may  
not be able to see the tick's head, it will  
probably come out of the animal's skin  
when you remove the insect. If your pet  
has a large number of ticks, hand  
removal can be time consuming and  
may result in skin irritation or in-  
fection. You may choose to use  
chemical sprays, dips or special collars  
to free your pet from the pests. These  
supplies are available at most pet  
shops, feed stores and general supply  
stores.

## New Mexico Receipt Tax Takes Drop

New Mexicans will be paying a  
quarter-cent less in sales tax beginning  
Saturday. The 1978 Legislature voted to  
cut the state's share of the gross  
receipts tax by a quarter cent July 1.  
This means State shoppers will be  
paying 4 cents sales tax instead of the  
present 4 1/4 cents.  
State officials said the reduction  
will mean a savings of \$30 per year for  
the average family of four earning  
\$15,700 if that family spends \$12,000 on  
taxable goods.

up with a lot of green out of the 5000 tons  
per day at \$200 per ton figures that  
Alpha projects.  
If the piles of ore look like rather  
poor dirt then the sight of five million in  
mill equipment and earth moving  
machines creates quite an impressive  
sight. The weekly payroll alone will put  
sparkles in the eyes of Lincoln County  
merchants. Jones adds that his people  
have come to stay, at least for 35 years.
