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Obstructs Runway Approach

Cable TV Must Alter Antenna

All is not roses for Arl Cope and his Cable TV systems. In Monday's meeting of the Carrizozo Town Council, Mayor English read a letter from the Department of Transportation that pointed out that the tower for the cable is under the south end of the runway approach. The letter read:

Dear Mayor English:

On August 2, a meeting was held in Carrizozo among the Town, Tularosa Cable TV, and FAA representatives to discuss actions needed on the cable TV antenna which obstructs a runway approach at the Carrizozo Municipal Airport. Several alternatives were discussed and the most feasible appears to be relocation of the antenna to the southwest. As you know, the antenna violates the Town's airport height zoning ordinance and, in its present location, the tower will be designated as a hazard to air navigation by the Federal Aviation Administration.

We are sure that the Town will not wish to assume any liability which could result from an accident or incident involving the tower. Therefore, we urge you to take prompt action to enforce the zoning ordinance or take any other steps necessary to protect the interests of aviation and the Town. Please let us know if we can assist in an early resolution of this problem. Enclosed is a copy of the zoning map which could not be located in the Town files.

After discussions with the FAA, it was finally resolved that if Cope would take 62 feet off of the top and go to a different system of antenna called a T-Bar, the council could waive the regulation and the FAA would certify that there was not a hazard.

Mr. Cope also has the lights for the tower but has waited for some word about what was to be done with the tower before he installed the lights.

Mr. Cope, also the owner of Tularosa Cable TV stated that he got verbal permission for the tower from the Dallas office of the FAA, and would not have put up a tower of that expense

if he was in doubt about having to move it.

The city attorney, Bill Payne is attempting to get the certification that the removal of 62 feet will alleviate the problem from the FAA.

In other business, the town Council deferred appointing a councilman to fill the unexpired term of Robert Luna until more applications could be contacted.

Anyone wishing to serve on the town Council should contact Mayor English or any of the other council members. Also needed is a Civil Defense Coordinator.

The Industrial Park was inspected this last week by the engineer and found to be almost complete and in the same light, there seems to be an extra 24,000 dollars left over that the town can use to upgrade the water services in Carrizozo. Crews from the town and the engineering firm will be drawing up plans to try to replace some bad pipe and increase water pressure for parts of Carrizozo. The changes in the order number two have to be ready to finalize in the next three weeks, for Carrizozo to be able to take advantage of the extra money.

Capitan Town Council Draws Up Ordinance, No Annexation

Because of numerous problems with water systems the Town Council of Capitan, at a special meeting, voted to draw an ordinance stating there will be no annexations of water taps until such time there be an adequate supply of water, adequate storage, and pipes downtown be repaired properly.

The action came after the Council heard reports from Larry Kaywood, Capitan Water Supervisor, concerning the cost of pipe replacement and present problems with the filtration and chlorination equipment.

Kaywood stated the new chlorination equipment was due in

from Roswell but had not arrived as scheduled. The equipment was purchased from Clowe and Cowan, a water supply house, about two weeks ago.

Until the automatic chlorinator is installed, the Village will continue to operate on the manual chlorinator that has had excess pressure applied in the past.

"This has been in and out of service for years," Kaywood said.

"At present the major water storage tank is being sand blasted and recoated according to specifications given by Andrews, Asbury, and Robert, Inc., Consulting Engineers. The corporation was involved in the original design of the chlorination-filtration system.

Kaywood also reported the approximate cost to replace pipes, and water taps would be \$8,000. To repair an average leak in the present system was estimated to be \$100. The council agreed that the sooner the pipe is replaced the better off the village would be.

The council also discussed the present water supply situation. Capitan water comes from Bonita Lake, owned by the city Alamogordo, through 4" lines. In a contract signed in 1957, Capitan was allowed use of Bonito water with the stipulation that Capitan would remove itself at the earliest possible date. But Capitan has no alternative water system, although two wells were unsuccessfully tried several years ago.

At present, water comes from Bonito at 140 gal-min. maximum and is stored in the 100,000 gal. tank south of the village. The water recently has been brown and fishy smelling due to what is termed "thermal inversion." Until the filtration and chlorination system is back to full operation, the water will remain so.

"This happens every year about this time," Kaywood said. Storage is a major problem. Allotments to Capitan from Bonito Lake would amount to 1,376,312,800 gallons if there was a way to harness all 6 sec. ft. But with the present 4" lines and the 100,000 tank it is impossible.

Ft. Stanton Ranch Dedication

The dedication of the new Ranch Headquarters and laboratory will be part of the Field Day at Fort Stanton on August 30th. The program will start at the Bonito Corral with coffee and donuts. The Ranch Tour will begin at 9:00 a.m. and to visit several areas of the Ranch to show results of research done in the area. Worley Mills will sponsor the noon lunch at the Fort Stanton Headquarters.

Fort Stanton ranch is the only major range research facility that represents mid-altitude, delicate range land in the West. Scientific results are applicable to most western ranges. Fort Stanton is part of the Experimental Ecological Reserve System of the United States, representing an area of rangeland set aside for ecological research before permanent changes occur.

Fort Stanton is the only research area in the United States where rangeland was protected from grazing for 12 years before a systematic study

was begun on the existing ecosystem, the effects of re-introduced grazing, and its longtime effects. The ranch is also valuable because its pastures are large enough to simulate those of typical N.M. and western ranches.

The afternoon program will be at Fort Stanton Ranch Headquarters & will include talks by L.S. Pope, Dean of Director College of Agriculture and Home Economics NMSU, Gerald W. Thomas President, NMSU and Arthur Simmerman, State Director, Bureau of Land Management.

Research is the reason for the existence of the Fort Stanton Experimental Ranch. It also provides a living laboratory where students can observe the inter-relationships of wildlife and domestic grazing on range grasslands. The facility also serves as a testing ground for new research procedures.

The Aug. 30 field day will provide the public a chance to see research in progress. "Research at Fort Stanton is vital to livestock producers and those concerned with land and wildlife management."

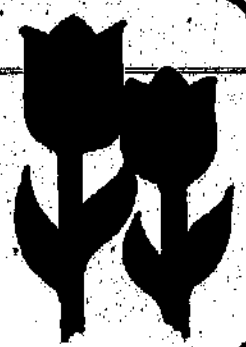
Two To Race In Moto-Cross

New Mexico Needs Sensible Use Of Alaska Lands

Every American has a stake in a bill being considered by the Senate (H.R. 39) that would place in a permanent Federal land vault an area of Alaska one-and-a-half times the size of New Mexico.

In a prime example of environmental overkill, the bill would lock away forever the largest known domestic reserves of petroleum and natural gas, as well as untold amounts of scarce strategic minerals that American industry must now import.

U.S. Geological Survey figures show that New Mexico will lose as much as 29,000 barrels of oil a day if the Federal Government puts a padlock on these Alaska lands. That's enough fuel to power every New Mexico family's automobile 5,000 miles a year, or enough to provide 20 percent of the average home-heating fuel requirements of New Mexico families.

Our state and the rest of the nation would be barred from reaching 10 percent of America's known natural gas reserves as well as manganese, cobalt, chromium, nickel and other vital minerals that lie in the vast territory that H.R. 39 would lock away.

By importing from foreign sources the petroleum, natural gas and minerals that exist in Alaska, the nation's balance-of-payments deficit grows by billions of dollars each year—and the

dollar is weakened. This in turn feeds inflation by forcing consumers to pay higher prices for foreign-made goods.

Sensible, environmental-ly protected development of Alaska's resources will create thousands of jobs, not just in Alaska, but in New Mexico, as well. Because the sound development of Alaska's resources, particularly its oil and natural gas, will contribute to the future growth of New Mexico.

Alaskans, like the people of New Mexico, have a love affair with the natural scenic wonders of their state. And yet Alaska's Senators, her Congressmen and Governor and the Alaskan Legislature are united in their opposition to the bill before the Senate.

As we in New Mexico have learned, conservation and development are not incompatible. Both are needed, both are desirable, and both can be accomplished through sensible land use programs.

A bill being drafted by Alaska's Senators Mike Gravel (D.) and Ted Stevens (R.), together with many of their concerned colleagues, will preserve Alaska's scenic wilderness and wildlife while providing sensible and controlled access to the natural resources the state and the nation need. Their proposal merits serious consideration.

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Around Town & Surrounding Areas

On Monday August 14, my sister Rita Narvaez, Baby Zachary and I took a drive to Nogal. We chatted a while with Mrs. Greer and Mrs. Stearns at the post office. We visited with Al (Cynthia) Witham. Her married children had been there recently. We exchanged family news, as she knew my family when they lived in Nogal Canyon. To top our visit, I asked her to tell us about her paintings.

We waved to Roberta Burkstaller, Nogal reporter (A Bowl of Activities from Nogal), who was getting down from her car at Mrs. Miles Williams' house. (Zozo school teacher).

We stopped to visit with Ralph Forsythe, who used to drive the school bus from Nogal when Rita was in high school.

Our drive to Nogal was very pleasant. Zachary enjoyed the trip to the town his mom once lived in. According to a July 25, 1968 Lincoln County news, the Nogal post office first opened for business on May 1880. "Nogal" means walnut and came from black walnut trees that grew in Nogal Canyon.

Keep Cattle Cool

This summer 16 Carlsbad youths are helping keep cattle cool and wild animals from getting thirsty.

The young people, enrollees in the Youth Conservation Corps of the Bureau of Land Management, are building combination livestock shades and wildlife waterers on public lands near Carlsbad.

The carpent-like shades are built of heavy wooden posts supporting a slanted roof of corrugated steel. Rain hitting the roof runs into a metal gutter leading to a storage tank and an automatic watering device for wildlife.

"We've located these away from water and in areas where there is very little shade," said Roy Stovall, chief of operations for the Roswell district of the Bureau of Land Management.

David Renwald, a wildlife management biologist for the BLM, said the structures relieve ranchers of some of the responsibility of watering wildlife.

Renwald said the watering device of a similar structure built 10 years ago is used by songbirds and game birds, antelope and deer. He said a three-strand fence enclosing 2 to 5 acres around the waterer keeps cattle out, but a smooth bottom wire lets antelope and other animals crawl under.

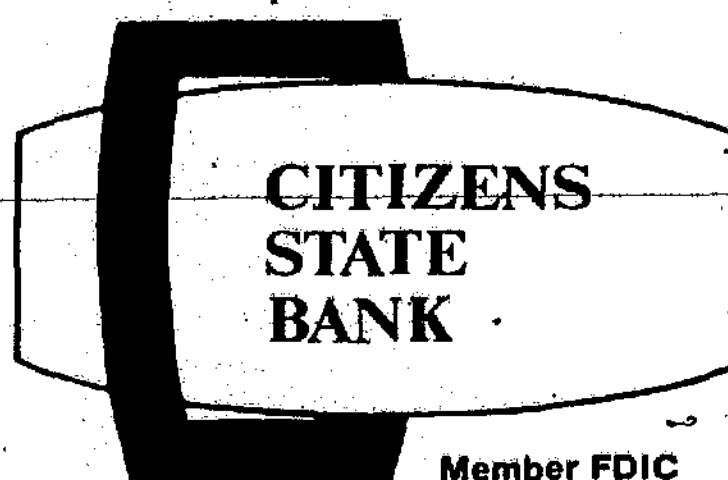

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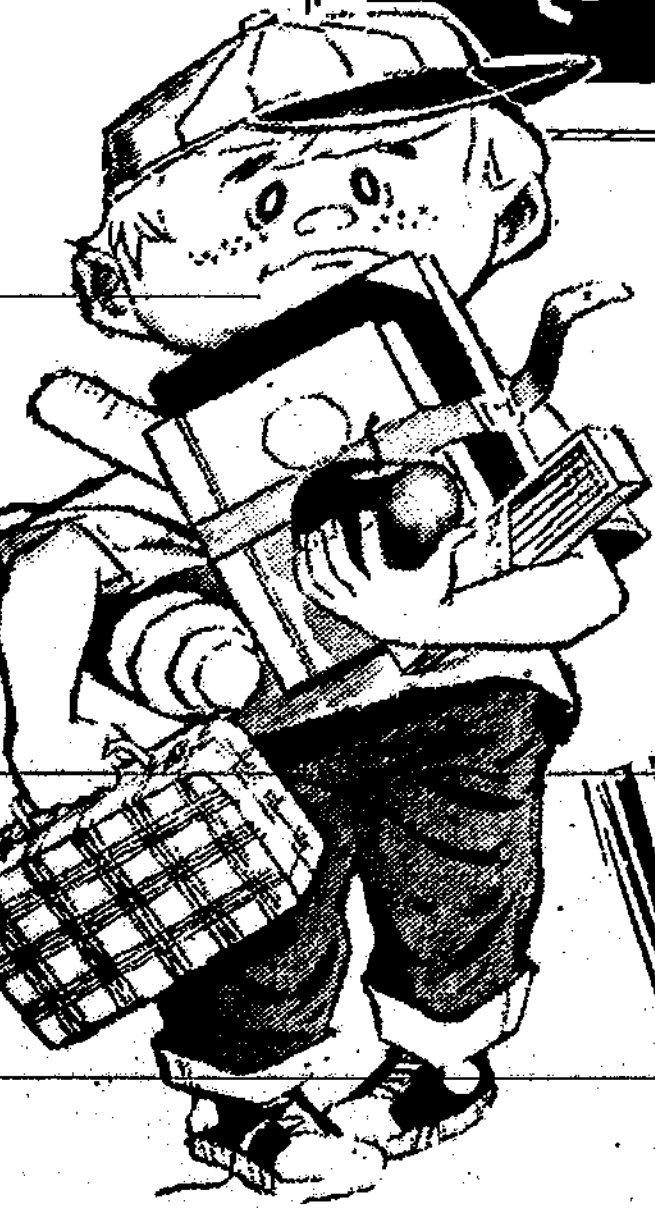

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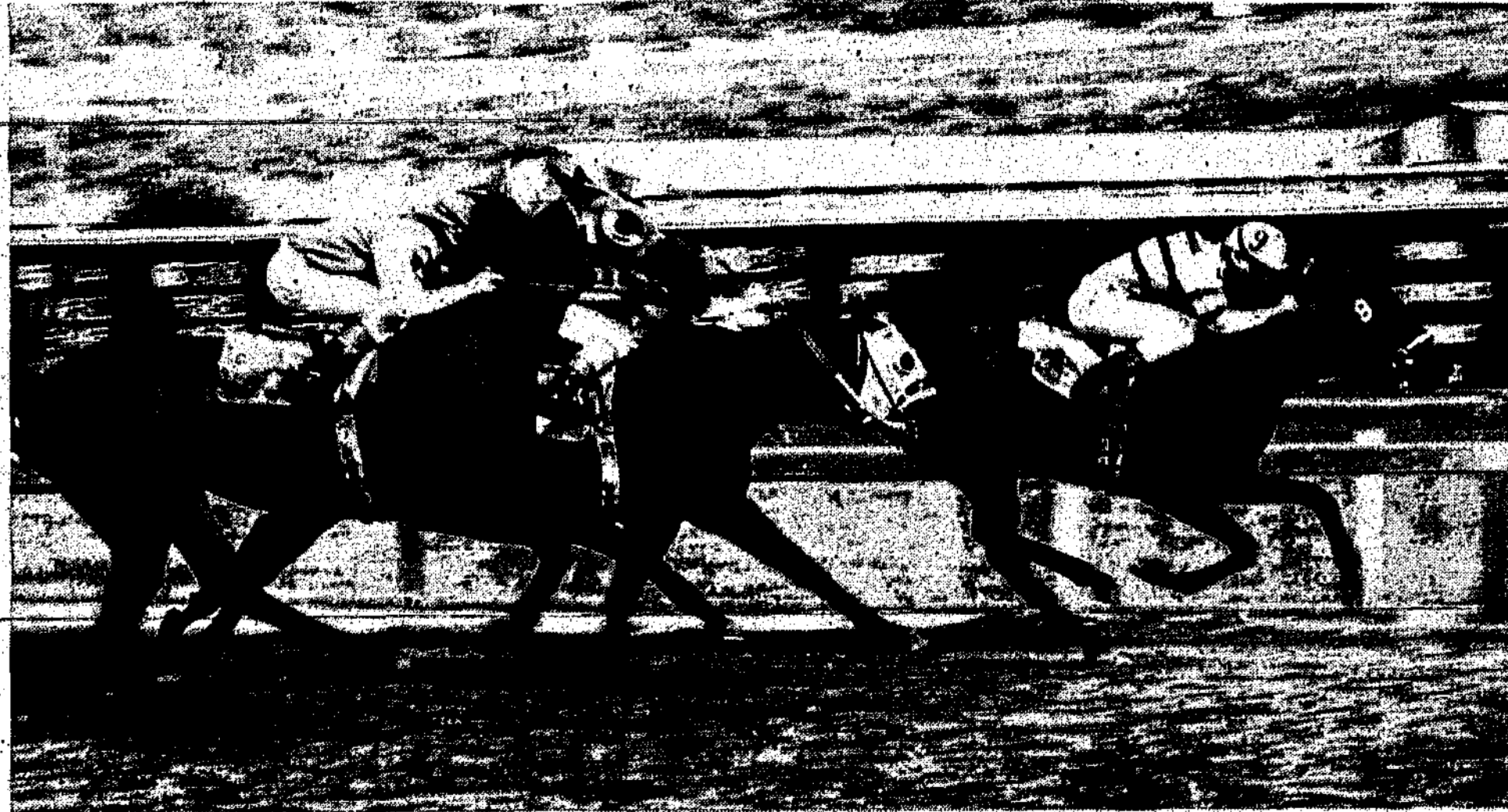

Scott's Courtship Upsets Star-studded Field in Ruidoso Thoroughbred Derby

RUIDOSO DOWNS, N.M.—Scott's Courtship, a colt who was risked in a \$8,600 claiming race late last year—and hadn't won since—earned more than twice that claiming figure with a sparkling upset in Sunday's 30th running of the Ruidoso Thoroughbred Derby.

Scott's Courtship overturned a star-studded field in the mile-and-sixteenth struggle over a rain-dampened track.

In the final sixteenth, it was a hard-hitting battle between Scott's Courtship, Double B. Express and the people's choice, Bionic Babe. But Scott's Courtship refused to quit when put to pressure and came on with a late powerburst to win going away by three quarters of a length.

Dale Irion was up in an overweight package of 118 pounds, five more than originally scheduled. But the extra load appeared to make no difference when Scott's Courtship turned on the afterburners at the end of the backstretch run. The colt obviously liked the sticky going and was full of run during the second half of the marathon.

The winner is trained by Victor Karns for Ralph Maynard and Warren Siegel of Phoenix, Ariz. The Derby gross purse was \$23,250, and the victory slice came out to \$13,950.

Fan who were brave enough to back Scott's Courtship in the betting, against some of the finest three-year-

old competition in the Southwest, were well-rewarded with tote returns of \$24.60, \$11.60 and \$4.80.

Double B. Express, who was in contention nearly from the first jump and fought his heart out, collected a purse of \$5,115 and returned mutual payoffs of \$11.60 and \$5. He operated as a 15-1 longshot. Salustio Burgos was in the saddle.

Bionic Babe ended up with a good closing rally but was a nose behind Double B. Express on the finish. Joe Blackburn was aboard. The filly collected \$2,325 and paid \$2.80. The winning time of 1:49 1-5 seconds was well off the track standard.

The big disappointment had to be The Drake, who went off as a 5-2 shot looking for his third stakes win of the meeting. The Drake stayed within striking distance until the turn for home, but appeared to be laboring. When jockey Gilbert Villacast called upon The Drake for his best, the colt had little left to give, and drifted back into a fourth-place finish.

Freeman M., another two-time stakes winner at the meeting, also showed little liking for the assignment and sailed in fifth in a listless try.

Bionic Babe, who went into the test with the high load of 123 pounds and a 78 money line of better than \$50,000, turned in a game performance and was in the thick of things right from the first jump. She dogged Double B. Express all the way, lost some ground in the turn for home, but was making up the deficit rapidly when she ran out of ground.

Double B. Express looked like a winner at the top of the stretch when he tried to regain the lead from Scott's Courtship, but the gelding just didn't have enough in reserve when he needed it in the final yards.

Lopsided Victory for Kinni Jorene

RUIDOSO DOWNS, N.M.—Kinni Jorene shook off her foes at the turn for home in Wednesday's feature at Ruidoso Downs and rambled to a lopsided victory.

The filly, ridden by Stuart Dolphus, ended the six-furlong sprint with a 3 1/2-length lead. She clocked the distance in 1:14 flat.

Kinni Jorene is owned by Joe Welch of Carlsbad, N.M. The mutual returns were \$9, \$3.80 and \$2.40.

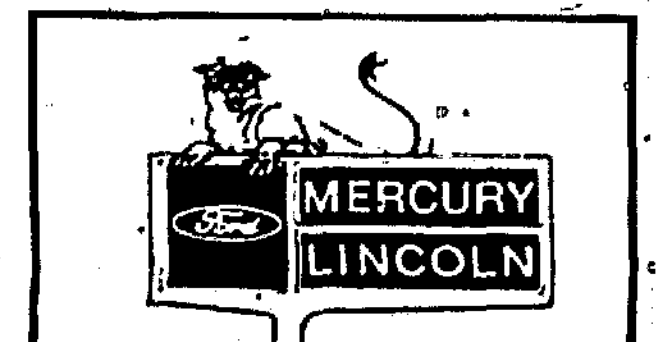

HOOFBEATS By Karen Halloran

Town Policy, the noted stakes-winner, grabbed the top berth for the upcoming \$874,004 All American Derby finale last Friday and set the fastest seasonal time for 440 yards in the process. Owned by Ivan Ashment of Apple Valley, Calif., the sophomore dashed to the wire in 21.70 seconds with a breezing 4 1/4 length margin. Last year, he set the fastest qualifying time for the million-dollar All-American Futurity (at the same distance) in 22.06 1/2 seconds and took second in the finale as a 5-2 favorite.

Two other veterans of the All-American Futurity grabbed spots in the All-American Derby finale as well--Stoa Mings and Medley Glass. She went off at 4-1 and won her trial by nearly two lengths.

The lightweight rider came back the next weekend, had 13 starts and tabbed three wins and two seconds. Last weekend, he took 14 trips to the starting gate and maneuvered three wins and a second.

Hey Chargette, the sale topper in last year's All American Yearling Sale, made her first career start on Thursday. The filly, purchased for \$78,000 by Eddie Beasley of Fairacres, N.M., is by Tiny Charger out of Chiquita Karen. But the youngster had some problems in her first 400-yard venture, got closed off coming out of the gate and made up ground but finished fifth.

Bradley's Kunumera and Barrister Sib met in a hard-fought battle in Saturday's feature race. Bradley's finally prevailed in the 5 1/2-furlong sprint by a very slim nose margin and matched the seasonal record of 1:05 3-5 seconds set by Hopeful Journey as well. That time lags only 2-5 off the track record established by Barlaris in 1971.

Trainer Penny Corradine, well-known in the area for her drawings of race horses, has her first painting hanging in a local art gallery in Ruidoso. And the lady conditioner is having plenty of luck with her charges as well. In Wednesday's third race, she sent Re Feature, a two-year-old quarter horse filly, to her first career start and ended up in the winner's circle.

Job Services Places Many

Ruidoso's Job Service office placed 226 applicants in jobs during the first three quarters of Fiscal Year 1978, Employment Services Division Director W.A. Anderson of the Human Services Department said today. Two hundred and fifty six job openings were filled, with some applicants working at two or more jobs during the nine month period.

Employers listed 471 jobs with the area office during the same period, all but three in nonagricultural occupations.

"Many groups of job seekers enjoyed high placement rates, reflecting fine work by our Ruidoso office staff," Anderson said. "One hundred and nine minority applicants found work, along with 117 youth under 22. Rural workers accounted for 187 placements, reflecting Job Service commitment to provide high quality assistance for all population groups."

Job seekers using the Ruidoso office also received counseling, skills and aptitude testing and referral to other programs offered by the Human Services Department and other state and Federal agencies. The office enrolled five applicants in special training programs and referred seven people to programs funded under the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act.

State Job Services offices registered or renewed applications from 121,681 job seekers during the nine month period, providing counseling for 10,070 of those registered, testing for just over 4,200, and referral to training programs for 1,022. Because some of the 30,858 individuals who found work were placed more than once, 44,048 of the 53,133 job openings listed by employers were filled.

"I'm encouraged by the number of applicants Job Service counseled, tested and/or placed in training," Anderson noted. "As a full service employment agency, we try to help individual job seekers and employers in every way we can. Another positive sign is the number of applicants placed in jobs paying \$4 an hour or more. Three thousand, six hundred and ninety six job seekers found work in this category, indicating a large number of skilled, technical and professional placements."

Among those successfully referred were 5,261 veterans and 2,690 workers 45 and older. Nineteen thousand, four hundred and thirty nine minority

applicants found work through Job Service, along with just over 13,000 disadvantaged job seekers and 4,361 handicapped persons. Eleven thousand, nine hundred and sixty eight of those placed were women, over one third of those finding work.

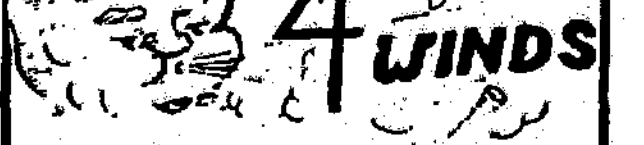

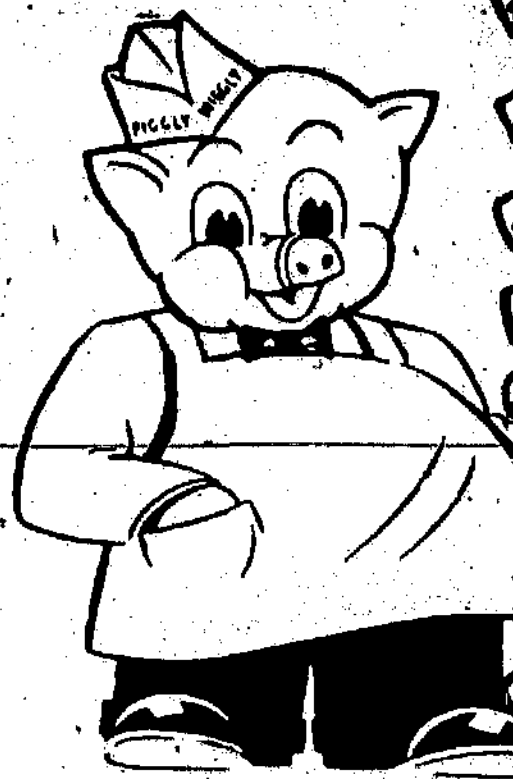
