

380 Bridge Dangerous, Drivers Are Too



The picture on the left was not staged two weeks ago by the Lincoln County News photographer, but instead happened along. On the right is a picture two weeks to the hour later showing the same problem, but a different result. William G. Noyce of La Luz was bringing a load of Stucco sacks on a 1971 Ford Flatbed toward Carrizozo when he had to swerve off of the road to miss a tractor-trailer rig coming up to the bridge in the center of the highway. The tractor-trailer did not stop. There were no citations, or injuries, and the damage came to about \$500.

With the concern lately expressed as to the danger of the bridge, one fact

must be pointed out, that is that in both cases, drivers exceed the posted speed warnings, and the truck on the left was clearly over the center-line with plenty of room on the right.

State Highway Department traffic supervisor for District 2 Ralph E. Smith commented that caution must be used at all times with the 19 foot bridge, but gross driver error was shown with both situations. He further stated that as soon as funds are available, the situation will be worked upon.

The NEWS is inclined to agree with Mr. Smith that a lot of the problem is connected to drivers not obeying posted warnings. When the warnings are disregarded, no state agency can totally protect the public from itself.

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Other County Matters

Zia Therapy Center Funds Completed

At the regular meeting of the Lincoln County Commission, Mary Rich introduced Mr. George Cordell, administrator of the Zia Therapy Center in Alamogordo, who summarized the progress so far of the efforts of Zia Therapy to assume management and operation of the Carrizozo hospital. According to Cordell, the funding for the operation is already complete. Commissioner Sudderth indicated that purchase and renovation of the facility would take place as soon as appraisals and

renovation plans were secured.

IN OTHER BUSINESS: — Sudderth suggested to the Commission that they approve the replacement of the Sheriff's car lost due to accident recently. Orders for the cars have to be made in early April to get June or July delivery, and Sudderth suggested that the car be ordered along with three more to be used to replace worn units in operation. Commissioner Straley objected, saying that he felt the Sheriff's Dept. should get along without the lost patrol car. He was overruled in

a voice vote by the rest of the Commission.

— The Commission is also planning to use funds derived from the sale of the airplane acquired in a September drug incident to defray overages in the Sheriff Department budget.

— Les Olson presented the Commission with the final draft of the Lincoln County Recreational Guide, asking for permission to let bids for the printing. Permission was granted, and an order for 40,000 was placed.

— A resolution was signed by the Commissioners stating that they were

in favor of the use of a 911 emergency number to replace the 35 different numbers now in use. Mountain Bell is presently studying the equipment requirements for the number.

— Mary Rich also reported to the Commission that the desalination plant was being funded from state and federal monies, and that for the first time in many sessions she was not before the Commissioners asking for money. The desalination plant is being directed by the New Mexico Research Institute.

Student Teachers Here

Two student teachers in home economics will begin their duties in Carrizozo March 13 and continue to May 10, under the supervision of Mrs. Emma Catherine Lawson and Mrs. Larue Wetzel.

Miss Joyce Gaussoin is a native of Las Vegas, New Mexico. Most of her family resides in that area of the state and she seems to be very fond of the lovely scenery and mountains around there.

Miss Jennifer Elliot comes from Los Alamos, New Mexico, where she has lived all of her life. She, too, is quite fond of our beautiful state.

Both student teachers are seniors at New Mexico State University,

majoring in Home Economics Education. This course in student teaching is a very important one to them since it entails the practical aspects of teaching and will help them become proficient in their chosen vocation.

Both teachers will have experiences in guiding high school classes in foods theory and laboratory work. One class will be working in child development and present plans call for sharing the teaching of this class so that both can learn how these kinds of classes are conducted. Another class (and it just happens to be all boys) is in clothing construction, but they will be going on to learning about the family laundry and some study in consumer education. The student teachers will share the teaching of this class, too.

FHA-HERO are planning to have a tea on Tuesday, March 14, to introduce the new student teachers to the rest of the faculty and the FHA-HERO members.

Water Safety Set

With summer coming, the Red Cross has announced the schedule for training Life Guards, and Water Safety Instructors. Several requirements are noted for the life-saving course to be taught in Alamogordo.

To take advanced lifesaving a person must be at least 15 years of age and be able to pass a swim test including a standing front dive, 500 yards swimming using the crawl stroke, side stroke and breast stroke, a surface dive to a depth of 8 feet and then swimming 20 feet underwater, and being able to tread water for one minute.

To take the Water Safety Instructor course (WSI) an applicant must be at least 17 years of age, have a current advanced lifesaving certificate and be able to pass a Swimmer Course Test.

Bridge to be Renovated

The bridge renovation 1 1/2 miles East of 380 on Highway 37 (Nogal highway) was delayed a week by the wet weather according to Joe Nail, the Project Supervisor for the State Highway Department.

The bridge will be replaced with a concrete type with the project lasting between 5 to 7 weeks depending upon the weather.

The signs for the detour are out now, but the detour will not be used until Nail can certify the safety factor. "By all means our major concern is safety and we hope everyone will use care around the detour site."

This project, and the Oscuro project which is the rock lining of the canyon one mile south of Oscuro are on a budget of \$236,000.

The Oscuro project was prompted by the erosion of the arroyo which in turn treated the Bonita Water Line running adjacent to Highway 54.

World's Richest Mule Race

In the spring of 1976 several mule men got together with Richard Cothrun, then Manager of the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Chamber of Commerce, and formed the Lincoln County Mule-O-Rama Association. The purpose was to hold mule races in the slack season between the horse races and the ski season, and help the economy of the area.

Our first meet was in October 1976. Since we already had the world's richest horse race, we decided to have the world's richest mule races. To do this we added \$10,000.00 purse money: \$5,000.00 funded by the Department of Development and matched by \$5,000.00 from the Lodgers' Tax Funds of the Village of Ruidoso, plus some donations from individuals and companies interested in this unique event. We had mule races, mule show events, cutting mules, team tying, steer stopping, barrel racing, pole bending, a mule sale and fiddler's contest, and it was quite successful. It made no money, but brought quite a lot of people to the Ruidoso area.

We also started a mule futurity to be run in 1979, which could possibly be worth \$50,000.00. In the spring of 1977, it looked doubtful that we would receive any state funds and we wanted to increase the purses to be sure of getting quality mules from throughout the U.S. About this time, Richard Cothrun resigned from the Chamber of Commerce and did not want to be active in the Mule-O-Rama. Ray Reed, one of the Limited Partners of the Mule-O-Rama, was hired by the Village of Ruidoso to take care of the ever-increasing flow of Mule-O-Rama mail. He also started our condition book for 1977 races.

After the Chamber of Commerce hired a new manager, it seemed that things just did not work out for the best for the Mule-O-Rama with the Chamber involved. We knew we would have the mule events, but did not know how. We started asking for purse sponsors and donations from mule people and friends and things started shaping up. I went to

New Mexico State Fair to work, and while there, I received a call from the chairman of the Lodgers' Tax Committee and was assured we would receive \$12,500.00 from Lodgers' Tax funds to help finance the Mule-O-Rama. With this commitment, I called Ray Reed and told him to send out the entry blanks and the Condition Book, as we had only 30 days left for organization.

Our Mule-O-Rama went fairly well considering the short time we had to plan. We had an increase of over 200 percent in mules and entries and spectators over 1976. We had a \$20,000.00 matched race, winner take all; fiddler's contest, and two dances. A team roping Futurity was added, and all in all it looked real successful. Now somewhere down the line we inherited the Village of Ruidoso accountant, perhaps through the Chamber. I did not worry too much, as he assured me he was bonded, and handled both Village and Lodgers Tax funds. We approved a \$3,000.00 labor budget which seemed ample, but ended up being \$11,000.00 plus. This same man also ordered a tower for the Village of Ruidoso that was to be set up at the Mule-O-Rama and then taken to the Municipal Airport for an observation tower, and we were assured that this would be of no cost whatsoever to the Mule-O-Rama. We ended up paying over \$3,000.00 of badly needed Mule-O-Rama funds on this unnecessary project. Then there was a matter of \$3,500.00 worth of unauthorized T-shirts paid for with Mule-O-Rama funds.

In trying to get all this settled and paid, we were advised by the Lodgers' Tax Committee that the Chairman had no authority to commit the \$12,500.00, but they would work with us. After several meetings, the Lodgers' Tax Committee came up with a figure that would have helped quite a lot with our problems, but it had to be approved by Ruidoso Village Council.

It seems the Ruidoso Village Attorney is like the Chamber of Commerce Manager and does not want to see the Mule-O-Rama continue and therefore interpreted the advertising and promotion angle to almost leave the Mule-O-Rama without funding.

Now, the future of the Lincoln

County Mule-O-Rama: We will not make these mistakes again. We no longer have the Village accountant. We are not out of debt, but we will have the Mule-O-Rama and the Mule-O-Rama Futurity and it will be bigger and better. We can see that we can expect very little support and lots of opposition to an event that would have brought Nation-wide advertising to the Ruidoso Area. So an event that could have really helped the Ruidoso Area at the right time now has to look for a new home where it is wanted and supported.

Blaylock Wins Tourney

The 1st Annual Carrizozo Bowling Tournament turned out to be quite an event. With 38 Pro Bowlers from Texas, Colorado, and New Mexico bowling for the top prize.

After 20 games of bowling, the leaders had not changed with J.B. Blaylock and Robby Heinzel still remaining as the leaders with only 9 pins separating them. With a final-game bowl-off, J.B. Blaylock took the commanding lead with a 257, while Robby Heinzel managed a 228. The game, a lot closer than the score indicates, with Blaylock finishing the final game with spare and strike, giving way to Heinzel, who only needed two strikes in the tenth to take the win, rolled his first ball only to get robbed of a needed strike by a "solid eight pin."

As for the other bowlers' final game, Henry Gonzales rolled over Lionel Jordan 216 to 195; Fred Vega nipped Chuy Casteneda 229 to 191 and Butch Calvert nudged Johnnie Short 196 to 162.

The highest game, 299, of this torney was bowled by Jeff Miles of Santa Fe, Sunday afternoon with a sticky "10 pin" ruining the perfect game.

With Blaylock's win, which netted him \$1000.000, was also awarded a beautiful 3 foot trophy.

In the amateur division, a great turn out of 61 amateurs, bowled in two shifts. Having an established handicap, each bowler bowled three games with 3 pros for total pins.

1st place was taken by Charlotte Archuleta; 2nd by Ken Means; 3rd by Alton Whittaker Sr.; 4th by Billy Means; 5th by Steve Ortiz tying with James Peralta.

Only 4 pins separated Charlotte Archuleta and Ken Means.

Asking Ken Means if he knew that he needed only 4 pins, he answered "If I would have known, I probably would have choked!"

The First Annual Tournament was well attended by both bowlers and spectators, with both management and bowlers expecting a bigger and better turnout next year.







Cook Of The Month —

Emma Lawson 'Still the Boss'

Starting young people on the road to being good cooks is one of her goals. She's a teacher of outstanding ability. Our featured cook is Emma Catherine

Lawson. She has been teaching Home Economics at Carrizozo for 18 years. While across the way, her husband Basil (Ed) has been teaching mathematics.

Mrs. Lawson has taught a wide variety of Home Economics including

the present Foods Speciality Class. This is a part of the H.E.R.O. (Home Economics Related Occupations) program. The young people enrolled in this class conduct a complete business operation. They plan what they are going to prepare, buy the food, do the bookkeeping, prepare the food and sell it. Mrs. Lawson says they keep their own records and are responsible for their own operation, but adds "I'm still the boss." The students have been preparing meat and bean burritos, pizza, tacos, enchiladas and cookies. They make the rounds every day of the Courthouse, school and businesses to sell their wares.

To take this class, students must have taken Home Economics I, and Foods I and II as prerequisites. The foods can be a life saver for working people who want to eat at their desks. Some of the students have gone on to careers in food service. Artie Ortiz is a chef at the Hilton in Albuquerque and Tommy Luercas is also cooking in the big city. Many other students have food jobs in University Foods Service when they go on for higher education.

While Mrs. Lawson has been teaching hundreds of young people the various Home Economics skills, she and Mr. Lawson have reared a daughter, Nancy Northrup. Nancy is living in Fontana, California and working in publishing. She is a graduate of N.M.S.U. and attended Carrizozo schools first through 12th grade. Mrs. Lawson emphasizes that she is a cook concerned primarily with nutrition and good health. Her background and training have prepared her for this philosophy. She grew up in Center, Missouri, a small town near Hannibal and graduated from the University of Missouri, Columbia campus. Then it was on to Oklahoma State University for two years where her immediate supervisor was a New Mexico gal. She must have said nice things about our fair State, because Mr. and Mrs. Lawson decided they wanted to try New Mexico.

Mr. Clegg was the superintendent she talked to and they came to Carrizozo on one of our few windy days. They loved it because the people were so great. Mrs. Lawson says there were two people who made her feel the most welcome and really "sold" Carrizozo to her. They were Jovita Torres and Tino Lopez. I'm sure

she knows she made a smart move when last week the low temperature in Columbia, Missouri was 9 below zero and they have had snow on the ground for weeks!

No article on our cook of the month would be complete without some of her professional and personal accomplishments. Emma Catherine is very active and dedicated in her church work. She is Director of Church Training, Chairman of the Church Council, a member of the choir and teaches a Sunday School class at the First Baptist Church. She was named State Home Economics Teacher of the Year for 1977. She holds membership in a tremendous number of professional organizations including the American and New Mexico Home Economics Associations, the National Education Association and the American Vocational Association just to name a few. Her list of Honorary Societies include Phi Upsilon Omicron, Pi Lambda Theta and Phi Kappa Phi. She is a member of the Carrizozo Woman's Club.

A well worn and cherished cookbook that has her maiden name penned on the inside cover has been the source of many of her favorite recipes. Like all good cooks she adjusts, changes and adds to suit her own style of cooking. She says, "I'm not a recipe cook." This is one of her favorites because it is a "low-sugar dessert."

Pumpkin Custard

- 1 cup cooked pumpkin, fresh or canned
- 1 1/2 cups milk, scalded
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon allspice
- 1 1/2 tablespoons sugar
- 2 teaspoons 'Sweet and Low' (sugar substitute)
- 3 eggs, slightly beaten
- 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg

Combine pumpkin, sugar, sugar substitute, salt, spices and eggs. Add milk slowly stirring constantly. Pour into well oiled custard cups. Set in pan of warm water. Bake in moderate oven (375 degrees F.) until an inserted knife comes out clean. About 45 minutes. Serve with whipped cream.

Cranberry and Apple Salad

- 2 cups uncooked cranberries
- 1 large thin-skinned orange
- 1 red apple
- 1 cup chopped celery
- 1 package lemon flavored gelatin
- 1 1/2 cups boiling water
- 1 1/4 cups sugar
- 1/2 cup chopped nuts

Chop cranberries, apple and orange with food chopper. Add sugar, nuts and celery. Combine gelatin and boiling water. Stir until dissolved. Cool until partially set. Add remaining ingredients. Pour into large or individual molds. Chill until firm. Unmold. Serve on crisp lettuce. Garnish with mayonnaise if desired. Makes 8 servings.

Mrs. Lawson likes her own dressing for this salad. She combines one cup mayonnaise with one cup of yogurt and one teaspoon of sugar. This dressing also goes well on other salads.

While teaching speciality foods over the years she has found that many of the groups wanted to learn to make candy. This is one of the recipes she uses with the students.

Carmels

- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup evaporated milk (use 1/2 cup first - other half later. See Below)
- 1/4 cup + 2 tablespoons corn syrup
- 1/2 cup oleo
- Few grains of salt.

Boil all together (using only half the milk) 20 minutes. Add rest of milk and boil to firm ball stage. Pour into well-buttered pan. When cold, cut into squares.

I have had questions several times about using Lentils in cooking. Mrs. Lawson has a recipe for Lentil Soup that makes 2 quarts of hearty soup. Lentils are a good source of protein.

Lentil Soup

- 1 1/2 cups lentils
- 6 cups water
- 2 slices diced bacon
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 2 carrots, sliced
- 2 stalks celery, sliced
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1/2 teaspoon crushed oregano
- 1 pound can tomatoes
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice

Combine all ingredients. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer slowly for 1 to 1 1/2 hours.

The lentil is an old world legume, that is disc-shaped, about the size of a pea. Thousands of years old, lentils were perhaps the first of the convenience foods. With no coddling at all, they cook to puffed tenderness in a mere half hour. With such a short cooking time, the use of a pressure cooker is not advised. If the cooked lentils are to be drained, as in making salad, save the cooking liquid (which is loaded with nutrients) for a cup of luncheon soup or to use in gravies and stews.

Lentils are an excellent partner with many foods - fruits, vegetables, and meat. To cook, place 2 cups of lentils in a heavy saucepan, and add 5 cups of cold or warm water and 2 teaspoon salt. Bring to boiling point, reduce heat, cover tightly and boil gently for 30 minutes.

It's a lucky day when you catch some of Mrs. Lawson's students from the Foods Class selling their specialities. It is also a delight to visit this talented and energetic teacher. She makes good cooking and nutrition come alive!

Professional Cooking by James "Willie" Silva

Here's something that most people don't think about when washing vegetables to remove dirt and sand. Remove the greens from the water rather than the water from the greens. This allows the grit and sand to settle to the bottom of the container, not back in the vegetables.

Thyme is an excellent seasoning for clam chowder, meat soups, and stews. Also good on vegetables such as carrots, peas, egg plant, and onions.

Eggs, because of their composition and extremely porous body absorb odors very rapidly in the refrigerator. Buy only enough to last for short periods of time.

In cooking beef for a roast, especially a large one, always use a meat thermometer. Large roasts continue to cook for some time after removing from the oven, so take them out when the thermometer registers several degrees below the recommended temperature. Then the roast will finish up just right. Also cook roasts at no more than 300 degrees oven temperature. This prevents shrinkage, and will not toughen the meat. Many a tender cut of meat has been toughened by cooking too fast in too hot an oven.
