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Tax Extension Causes Heat

MRNS-Lincoln County's Commission Chairman John Sudderth this week continued his objections to the practices and procedures of Tax Assessor Marian Schlarb.

The latest attack was made at the Tuesday meeting of the Commission when Sudderth announced his intervention in a deadline extension for mailing property valuation notices.

Sudderth said he had discovered a request by Assessor Schlarb to the State Property Tax Department for an extension of August 1 on mail deadlines. Sudderth said such an extension would have thrown the county's business out of kilter; that the county would have been out of money by next spring had notices been delayed that long.

Mrs. Schlarb later said there was little or no reason for Sudderth's statements or concern. She said that she had not requested the deadline extension to August and had not intended to delay mailings until that date.

Mrs. Schlarb said she had notified the state office that she would be unable to meet a May 1 mailing date. The extension to May 1 from April 1 had previously been granted, she said. The August extension notice was then sent to her.

According to Sudderth, when he discovered the August extension he immediately called Al Romero of the Department of Finance Local Government Division. Sudderth also called Ceall Pickett, state director of the Property Tax Department.

Sudderth told the Santa Fe offices that Lincoln County operations would be jeopardized by an August mailing date. The Commissioner said that Henry Salazar, manager of the appraisal bureau, was sent to Carrizozo to conduct an investigation. As a result of that investigation, Sudderth said, the county office was given a new deadline

of June. Sudderth said he did not know why the tax assessor had been unable to get the notices of valuation out on time or by the first deadline extension.

Commissioner Lee Straley said that the county assessor had been checking the computer printouts for error and that this duplication of work had been

responsible for the delay. He said the assessor's office was going to have to rely on the computer if deadlines were going to be met.

Mrs. Schlarb agreed that the computer program was responsible for the delay but said that her office had to check for errors. She believes that

She was told, she said, that her office was required to use the computer.

Electric Fence To Aid Ranchers

MRNS-Sheepmen in Lincoln County are looking for the money to build 60 miles of electric fence to keep the coyotes away from their lambs.

The program was described to the Lincoln County Commissioners Tuesday as a major effort to save the sheep raising industry in New Mexico's largest sheep producing county.

County Agent Ralph Dunlap introduced members of a newly organized Arabella and Picacho Livestock Association representing 40 sheep raisers in the southeast part of the county. John Cooper who heads the Arabella division of the organization said his members had commitments from 80 percent of the sheep raisers in his 230,400 acre area to pay a share of the 30 miles of electric fence from Highway 380 at Hondo North to Pine Lodge Road.

Leroy McKnight said his Picacho group which covered about the same amount of territory was still collecting commitments for another 30 miles of fence running south from 380 to the Lincoln-Otero County Line.

The sixty miles of electric fence, Dunlap believes, will eventually be joined by over 200 additional miles of electrified sheep net to keep the coyotes out of ranges in East Lincoln and West Chavez Counties.

The fence is a new type now being

used in Australia, he said. Existing sheep net fence is used as a ground and is wired with two strands at the top and the bottom.

Past attempts at coyote fencing were not successful, he said, because all charged wires were used. Coyotes were not grounded when touching wires and did not receive a shock. The Piesse predator fence alternates electrified and ground wires from top and bottom, making it impossible to avoid simultaneous contact with a charged and a grounded wire.

The shock, according to the sheepmen, does not injure coyotes, dogs or sheep but is adequate to repel invaders. The estimated \$550 per mile construction cost is 25 to 30 percent below previous costs of fencing.

Dunlap said that fence chargers would be placed every 15 to 20 miles and operated at a low current cost.

Sheep ranchers in Chavez County have already built a fence running

Crisis Center Needed In County

MRNS-Lincoln County people talked about opening a Crisis Intervention Center last week.

State Police Sgt. Jack Johnson, who called the session, met with 52 interested residents in Capitán, Thursday to discuss the possibility of obtaining crisis lines. They came from Carrizozo, Hondo, Lincoln, Ruidoso, Capitán and Corona.

The group agreed that crisis centers are needed to handle spouse abuse, child abuse, drug abuse, alcohol, suicide and other family problems.

Difficulties of investigation and prosecution of child abuse cases was

discussed. A recently reported case of alleged child abuse was mentioned which had caused difference of opinion among law enforcement officials concerning the facts of the case.

Sgt. Johnson said that most times the incidents are not reported to the law enforcement officials. He said, "If 1 out of 10 cases were reported to the law, perhaps it would prevent future cases."

Dr. Hickey stated, "Many times cases are reported to the law enforcement people and they and the District Attorney work with me on help for the person rather than seeking prosecution."

He said, "Last year in the county one case per week was dealt with. This included incest, child abuse and family problems."

Sgt. Johnson, in discussing the various types of cases that would be dealt with through the crisis center said, "there will be many times that the police will not be notified. The promise of confidentiality is essential to the assurance of handling such cases."

All Lincoln County law enforcement people appear to want to help people in these tragic cases rather than prosecute, in the hopes of preventing future occurrences, Hickey says.

Working with Dr. Hickey families can be saved, disturbed people can be helped and victims can be assisted, Johnson said.

Committees were appointed to organize plans and obtain information on cost and feasibility of a crisis line. The group will report back to Sgt. Johnson and another date will be set for a public meeting.

Sue Stearns, Carrizozo Woman's club president is chairman of the Carrizozo-Corona area. Ken Moore, administrator of the Ruidoso Hospital is chairman of the Ruidoso, Capitán group. This group will meet on Monday June 5, 7 pm, in the conference room of the Ruidoso hospital.

50 Ruidoso Residents Wanted For Task Force

Wanted - Fifty Ruidoso residents who are willing to volunteer as a member of a Ruidoso task force aimed at combating the illegal use, distribution and sale of narcotics in the Ruidoso area.

The Ruidoso anti-drug abuse project, sponsored by the Ruidoso Police Department under the auspices and direct control of the Criminal Investigation Division, will be called "Run Now!" (Ruidoso Undermining Narcotics - Narcotics Obtained Wrongfully.)

All applicants enrolled in RUN NOW must be twenty-one years of age, will be trained and schooled regarding the unlawful use of controlled substances - narcotics and the legalities required to achieve conviction of offenders. The RUN NOW task force will be limited to the first fifty qualifying applicants. All applicants will be screened prior to acceptance.

All members of the task force must be willing to testify under oath before a Grand Jury or a court of law with the exception that some applicants, may be able to give drug abuse information as a Confidential Informant and will not have to personally testify nor reveal their identity in court. The membership roll of RUN NOW will not be made public.

Each of the accepted applicants will be advised personally of the time, date and location of the first meeting of the accepted applicants which will be attended by Robert M. Doughty, II, 12th Judicial District Attorney, Otero-Lincoln Counties. Mr. Doughty has expressed his complete approval and total support of the volunteer RUN NOW task force to combat drug abuse.

Ruidoso residents interested in joining the RUN NOW task force are requested to telephone the Ruidoso Police Department and give their name and telephone number as to where they can be contacted. The Criminal Investigation Division will contact all applicants and arrange a personal interview with the applicant. The Ruidoso Police Department telephone number is 257-7365.

Mona Rae Wins Feature Easily

Mona Rae easily held off the fast-charging favorite, Mr. Clyde, for a length victory in Monday's seven-furlong headliner at Ruidoso Downs.

The fans didn't think Mona Rae stood much of a chance in the classy field and let her get away at 12-1 odds.

But those who did back the sophomore filly in the mutuels were well-rewarded with returns of \$28 to win, \$6.80 to place, \$5 to show. Gilbert Villescas was in the saddle.

Mona Rae is trained by J. Doyal Roberts for F. C. and Frankie McDougals of Berino, N.M. The filly stopped the clock in a bristling 1:28 2-5 seconds.

Mr. Clyde, ridden by Leroy Coombs, refunded \$3 to place and \$2.80 to show. Large John got in third under Salustio Burgos and returned \$4.20.

In the early going, He's Our Pro, a

10-1 longshot, was allowed to expand himself in a quick pace. He's Our Pro held about three lengths of daylight going down the backstretch. Large John was in close pursuit, while Mona Rae, moving at her own pace, settled in third. Mr. Clyde was well off the pace.

As the field swept into the turn for home, the traffic began to jam up at the front end, and it became evident He's Our Pro was about to toss in the towel.

It was mid-way in the turn when Jockey Villescas gave Mona Rae the green light and the filly quickly came alive and took off. The rapid acceleration probably caught Mr. Clyde by surprise. The latter was also flying at this point, and may have been a bit discouraged to find one of his prospective victims refusing to play dead.

Mona Rae shot into the lead and

was about 1 1/2 lengths to the good. Mr. Clyde, having to circle plenty of horses, lost some ground in the turn. The classy colt tried his best in the straightaway, but Mona Rae had too much in reserve and easily fended off the attack.

The victory was Mona Rae's fourth of the year. It was also the most impressive victory of her career.

Royal Minds Wins

In the co-feature at 6 furlongs Royal Minds, the 2-1 favorite, did a workmanlike job under the silled handling of Richard Bickel. Royal Minds took an early lead, held it all the way, and had plenty left for the stretch. He sailed under the wire with a 1 1/2-length lead. The win payoff was \$6.20.

County Voters Have Chance To Choose

MRNS-Lincoln County voters will have the chance to select party nominees Tuesday for slots in the November general election. As usual, the Democrats found more to argue about than the GOP.

The Democrats and Republicans each have four contested county positions but on the state level the Democrats have a near full slate contest.

The big race between Bruce King and Bob Ferguson for the Governor's desk is expected to draw Democrats to the poll. Lincoln County Rancher Joe Skeen has a free ride for that Republican spot.

In the county, the fight for the top

law office drew four candidates. Sheriff Bill Elliott and Boots Nelson both want the Democratic nod. Former sheriff Ernest Sanchez and Carrizozo policeman Jay McSwane are looking for GOP votes.

The Commissioner District 1 post now occupied by Shorty Stoneman also found four applicants. R.C. Nunez goes against Stoneman and Republicans Cotton McKnight and Michael Hernandez will do battle.

In District III Pat French and Ben Hall want the GOP nod to go against John Sudderth in November.

Incumbent Tax Assessor Marian Schlarb has Chuck Neal to beat for the GOP nomination. The winner will face

George White.

The Carrizozo Magistrate position puts S.M. Ortiz against Jackie Martin. There is no Republican filed. In Division II GOP A.L. Montes gets his party's job against either Jim McEuen or Gertrude Huey. Three candidates win automatically. Lee Straley has no opponent in the general or the primary for Commissioner District II. Treasurer Mike Kimbrell is home safe and Jim Wheeler goes back into Magistrate Division III.

For a complete line-up of state and

district candidates see the political section reprint of the ballot. A big district battle is for the Democratic nomination for state senator. Carrizozo's Bobby Dan Crenshaw and Ruidoso's Charlotte Jarrett are asking the voters to pick between them. The GOP incumbent one will face is John Conway.

Both Democrat Bill Payne and Republican Tom Sandenaw are unopposed in the primary for the District Judge post.

the mail this week, Mrs. Schlarb said, well ahead of the June 9 deadline. She hopes her staff will have the bugs out of the program by next year but notes that this is not the first time deadlines have not been met.

The county's collections are running behind this year as a result of last year's delay in mailing tax notices.

Treasurer Mike Kimbrell was given a December 15 extension in mailing the notices last year because the assessor's office was late in providing him with the tax rolls.

He said that if the valuation notices had not gone out before August, the tax notices would have been even later in the coming year.

The usual procedure for property taxes, if deadlines are met, is as follows, Kimbrell explained: notice of valuation are mailed on April 1. The tax payer has 30 days to protest valuation. The tax payer may settle differences with the assessor in an informal meeting, or may request a

formal hearing before the property tax board.

Hearings are held during the summer and the tax rolls and tax statements are prepared. The assessor is responsible for delivering the statements and books to the treasurer by October 1. The deadline for mailing tax statements is November 1. The tax payer is expected to pay at least half of his taxes by December 1.

Delays in the mailing of tax notices this year have resulted in slow collections, according to Kimbrell, as well as confusion and misunderstandings. At least one law suit resulted when Commission Sudderth sued the county in protest of a property tax statement.

Kimbrell said he hoped to have the tax roll this year in time to meet his deadline of November 1.

Mrs. Schlarb said that most of the problems were caused by the tremendous number of changes in property ownership in Lincoln County. The growth rate of the county is reflected in property transfers that she says have complicated the computer programming.

north of Roswell for approximately 30 miles. The fence cuts the Pecos River area off from the west Chavez County ranches.

The proposed Lincoln County fence will cut the Apache Reservation and the Sacramento Mountains off from the southeast county ranches and the Capitan Mountains off from the Arabella area ranches.

Thursday ranchers will meet in Corona to discuss the possibilities of an electric fence running from Corona 30 miles south cutting off the Gallinas Mountains. The meeting will begin at 1:30 p.m. in the Corona school.

Dunlap believes that the fence from Arabella will someday connect with the Corona fence section, continue north and east to Vaughn and then southwest to Roswell, then west to the proposed Pine Lodge junction.

Sheep ranchers believe the \$550 cost will more than be paid for in increased lamb production. The savings in the Arabella-Picacho area, are estimated by Dunlap to come to over

\$200,000 per year. Ranchers are losing from 15 percent to 85 percent of their lambs annually to coyotes, he says.

Sheepman Paul Pacheco lost an estimated 170 lambs out of 180 last year according to Dunlap. Lincoln county ranchers own more than 150,000 breeder ewes, he said. The lamb crop should be about 80 percent annually.

With the current market averaging \$40 a lamb, the lamb crop should bring \$5,400,000 annually and even at a low ten percent loss due to coyotes, Dunlap believes the fence would pay for itself in a single year.

The sheepmen asked the commissioners to release some of the predator control funds for the fence construction. The Arabella group asked for \$7000 and the Picacho group is expected to present a like request.

Chairman John Sudderth suggested that the ranchers make their request to A.W. Gnatkowski of the RC&D which administers the range funds. The commissioners asked for further details of the proposals at the next meeting.

With New Airplane -

State Police To Patrol Highway From Sky

SANTA FE-The Traffic Safety Bureau of the New Mexico Transportation Department has awarded a federally-funded grant of \$147,500 to the New Mexico State Police to help im-

plement a three-year Aircraft Traffic Observation Project to aid in enforcement of the 55 mile-per-hour speed limit.

The grant will be used to purchase a twin-engine, high-winged aircraft for use in the project which will cost a total of \$403,214. The State Police will match the Traffic Safety grant by assuming the costs of maintenance, fuel and oil, insurance, hanger rental, pilot's salary and supportive administrative costs.

Police officials hope that stronger enforcement of the 55 mph speed limit will reduce the annual fatality rate in New Mexico by 10 per cent over a three-year period.

In the project, the plane will be dispatched to different parts of the state to aid patrol officers on the ground with traffic observations. The areas of observation will be determined by fatality and citation statistical data. Markers have been painted one-quarter of a mile apart on the highways specifically for use by air traffic observers.

Current plans call for observations to be made 44 weeks of the year, with the remaining weeks to be lost to pilot

leave and weather.

Areas of the state scheduled for observation include the following: Interstate 40-Tucumanari, Santa Rosa, Moriarty, Albuquerque, Grants, Gallup, Interstate 25-Raton, Springer, Wagon Mound, Las Vegas, Santa Fe, Albuquerque, Los Lunas, Belen, Socorro, Truth or Consequences, Interstate 10-Las Cruces, Deming, Lordsburg.

Other areas scheduled for observation include: Espanola, Pojoaque, Farmington, San Ysidro, Silver City, Alamogordo, Portales, Roswell, Artesia, Carlsbad, Hobbs & Orogrande.

Currently, the aircraft section of the State Police Division is manned by two pilots who fly a single engine aircraft and a helicopter. The pilots are assigned to fly search and rescue missions, transport state government officials and department personnel, and at times, assist the Narcotics Division on some cases.

The new pilot and plane could be used only for traffic observations, and except in emergency situations, according to terms of the grant.

The present authorized strength of the division is 361 officers, but only 190 are responsible for patrolling New Mexico highways. A recent survey showed that many New Mexico drivers cited enforcement of the law as the leading reason they felt compelled to drive 55 mph even though 84 percent felt that driving 55 mph saved lives.

Stained Glass Art - Western Style

Not too long ago stained glass was only seen in Churches or Cathedrals but it is now being used in homes in many innovative ways. Michael Sutton, stained glass artist in Ruidoso, recently designed a window to be used in a bath room featuring Sierra Blanca. It is a delightful way to bring a view of the mountain into your home.

"It will be installed inside the regular window pane," Sutton explained, "which will give better insulation and protection to the stained glass."

Sutton's designs lean toward the western because that is where his interests lie. The western theme is new in stained glass art. "From the traditional it seemed stained glass art went in the direction of the contemporary," Sutton said, "there has been very little western stained glass." That is one of the reasons Sutton came to Ruidoso.

His designs include horses and one was on display at the All American Turf Club last weekend. This week the horse in stained glass will be displayed at the Jockey Club.

Sutton also teaches stained glass art and is currently holding classes at the Senior Citizens building. He plans some mini-courses this summer for the

people who are visiting. "I can teach them the basics in a few days," he said.

The most popular way to use stained glass art in your home is to hang a framed or unframed piece in the window of your home rather than in-

stalling a window. Sutton feels that this is the way most people use stained glass because our society is so mobile.

There are many different ways that Sutton would like to use stained glass besides as a window treatment.

"I want to do the fronts of kitchen cabinets," he said, "with a light behind the doors. I am also planning to do some furniture." He visualizes a coffee table in rich wood combining stained glass in the top.

The glass is bought in sheets and comes from America, France and Germany. The German glass is called "antique" but this does not mean old. "It refers to the process," Sutton explained, "it is mouth blown and hand rolled." American glass is machine made. The German glass is the finest. It varies in thickness and is translucent. The colors in the German glass are more vibrant.


There are two methods used in putting the pieces of glass together. The oldest way is with lead and the newer method is with copper foil and solder. "Tiffany founded the copper foil method," Sutton said, "and was the biggest innovator in bringing stained glass into the home. Lead is too heavy

for the more intricate designs."

Sutton starts by making a pattern. Each piece must fit exactly. It is an intricate process and you have to know what you are doing. It is evident that Sutton knows what he is doing by the beautiful displays of his stained glass art found in his studio.

"I think it is healthy to add color to a room," Sutton commented, "when I do custom work I try to create a mood or atmosphere in that room by my choice of colors and designs."

Stained glass art is going in many directions - room dividers or screens, kitchen cabinets, furniture and window treatments - or even your favorite horse! And Michael Sutton knows the direction that he is going in stained glass art.




The holiday crowd made Loma Vista Man a lukewarm favorite and collected mutual returns of \$7 to win, \$4.40 to place and \$3 to show.

Lincoln County Voters will go to the polls on Tuesday, June 6 to choose the candidates they wish to represent them. Lincoln County is divided into 3 Districts in the State Representative races.

A. The rest of the county is represented by District 50. Two Democrats, Jose O. Villanueva and Jose M. Marquez will battle it out in the Primary to then run against incumbent, John Bigbee, Republican.

B. Angus, Precinct number 12 is District 31. In this State Representative contest John Mershon has served as Representative for the past 16 years and the past twelve years has run unopposed.

C. In the Carrizozo area they are represented by District 52. On the Democratic ticket Cliff McDonald of Alamogordo is seeking the post. Republican, incumbent, Maurice Hobson is asking the voters to re-elect him for another two years.



Dow is referring to several economic categories.

First, manufacturing jobs gained between 1966 and 1976. Texas led the nation by gaining 234,200 manufacturing jobs. Arizona gained 27,900 and Utah 20,300 during the same period. Meanwhile, New Mexico gained only 11,700.

Second, in 1976 per capita personal income figures, Arizona residents had \$5,817, Texas residents \$6,243 and Utah residents \$5,482. Meanwhile in New

Mexico the average per capita personal income was \$5,213 in 1976.

Third is the category of average weekly earnings for production workers employed in manufacturing firms. Again, New Mexico citizens finished last with \$160, behind Texas (\$204), Arizona (\$205) and Utah (\$192).

"These economic statistics are startling and lead me to conclude that New Mexico's number one priority in the coming years is to see that new and expanding businesses locate in our state so that our standard of living can improve."

Dow continued, "We must make a commitment that our young people and the unemployed will never have to travel from the Land of Enchantment to find a good paying job."

"Our neighboring Right to Work states of Texas, Arizona and Utah are

out-pacing us in economic development. I'm convinced a Right to Work law in New Mexico will raise the standard of living of our citizens, bring down the unemployment rate, and provide good paying jobs for our young people."

Dow ended by saying, "Those politicians who oppose a Right to Work law are public enemies number one of New Mexico's economic future."





King Using Local Help In Campaign

Former Governor Bruce King has emphasized that he is conducting his campaign for a second term entirely with New Mexico people and firms.

In seeking a second term, he added: "I pledge to you that my administration will be the same."

King said that he feels that New Mexico public relations & advertising agencies and film producers are capable of high quality work.

"I see no reason why any candidate should need to go out of state for public relations work," he said. "All of the people involved in our campaign are New Mexicans."

The former Governor said, "I did not find it necessary to go to Colorado, California, Texas, Arkansas, Georgia or anywhere else to get advice on how to

conduct this campaign, what to tell voters or how to prepare campaign material and television commercials.

"I did not find it necessary to go out state to get advice on what's best for New Mexico."

King added, "Nor will I find it necessary to go out of state to find people for state government. I don't believe there is any job in state government in New Mexico for which we do not have a competent New Mexican to fill."

He concluded, "I think New Mexicans understand New Mexico best and have the best interests of New Mexico at heart. I don't feel I need a Madison Avenue type of campaign and I surely will not have Madison Avenue type of administration."



Rutherford Pledges

An aggressive active lieutenant governor's office involved in long range planning, was pledged Friday by Senator Tom Rutherford, Democratic candidate for lieutenant governor in a talk to volunteers and supporters meeting in Santa Fe County.

"The role of the lieutenant governor is primarily that of being a people's lobbyist. Santa Fe Hold the Line: One of the heavy weight standing interim Legislative committees is the School Study group, chaired by Sen. Frank Papan of Dona Ana County-- a "heavy" committee when you remember that more than seventy-five cents out of every New Mexico tax dollar goes toward education!

For the "crystal ball", keep an eye on some of the areas singled out by Papan's group for specific attention around mid-Summer.

Our "birdies" say the LSSC especially is interested in the number of school teachers being cranked - out by New Mexico's institutions of higher learning.

Everywhere you look there appears to be an abundance of school teachers-- but, there seems no end to the number being turned out for teaching certificates.

Keep in mind that enrollment in schools has been constantly declining and will continue to decline over the next decade.

The lawmakers want to see what can be done now to stave off an obvious critical situation right around the corner.

Sidelight: Another area that will come under the critical eye of the LSSC will be the minimum requirements for educators graduating from State colleges and Universities.

It all shapes up to some very serious soul searching and undoubtedly some corrective legislative when next January rolls around.

You can also expect some joint meetings before next Fall between the LSSC and the brass at the State Board of Educational Finance.

Following the most recent Cabinet meeting, Judi was seen cleaning ash trays and picking up empty coffee cups for disposal from around the Cabinet "round-table".



Inside the Capitol . . .

Although Bruce King is planning on stepping up his media advertising this week as the June 6 primary election looms, his advisers still figure he'll be out-spent by three-to-one on media by Bob Ferguson.

The two Democrats are vying for their party's nomination for governor and King is considered by most veteran observers to have a lead in the race, perhaps a substantial one.

But Ferguson, who has acknowledged all along that King had greater support within the organized party structure, has been seeking to overcome that built-in advantage of the former governor.

Part of his effort has involved media outlays, particularly for television.

Operation Game Thief Scores

Santa Fe, NM - Operation Game Thief wants to receive reports of law violations involving fishing, small game and nongame cases, as well as those involving big game. Two recent cases in southern New Mexico show the benefits of such reports, according to Game and Fish Department Director Harold Olson.

One of the cases involved an Alamogordo man who was in illegal possession of a red-tailed hawk, and another involved three men who killed bullfrogs out of season near Las Cruces.

"These cases may not be as striking as those involving several elk, but each species has its own importance and special management needs," Olson said. "We have limited numbers of bullfrogs in this state, and we closely manage their harvest. The place of hawks in the environment is unique, and they are also protected."

Operation Game Thief caller No. 300 should contact the department to collect \$50 reward in the Las Cruces case, and caller No. 230 should contact it for the same reward in the hawk case.

The Operation Game Thief number, 1-800-432-4263, is toll free. The program is a cooperative citizen-department effort to curb wildlife law violations. Callers are not asked to give their names or testify in court.

Convicted of illegal possession of bullfrogs were Ruben A. Telles, 23, Ramon M. Telles, 53, both of Mesilla, and Gilbert Valencia, 54, Montclair, California. Magistrate Roberto Rodriguez, Las-Cruces, heard the case and fined Ruben Telles \$50, plus \$10 court costs, and suspended \$50 fines assessed against the other two defendants.

Olson credited rapid response to the call for leading to the citations against the Mesilla men. Investigating officers were Byron Donaldson and Harry Mikel.

The current lieutenant governor has stepped up his advertising in the final days, particularly on TV channels in vote-rich Albuquerque, in an effort to overcome the greater name identification the former governor has with rank-and-file, non-activist voters.

In addition, Ferguson has been getting organizational help from political friends of the current governor, Jerry Apodaca, who has long been an intraparty adversary of King.

King and Apodaca, and their respective allies, have been engaged in periodic struggles for control of the party and state government for years. In the primary election of 1970, Apodaca supported Jack Daniels, but Bruce King won and went on to beat Republican Pete Domenici in the general election. It was the first time, under the State Constitution, that a governor served a four-year term.

Previously, governors could serve a maximum of two two-year terms. In 1970, it was changed to a maximum of one four-year term—the same length but minus an intervening re-election effort.

When he got into office, King launched an effort to have the Legislature pass a measure which would allow voters to okay two four-year terms.

But Apodaca, then a state senator from Las Cruces, helped lead a legislative battle against it, and it never was cleared by the lawmakers.


Then in 1974, during King's last year as governor, King backed State Sen. Tibo Chavez of Belen against Apodaca and others in the gubernatorial primary. Apodaca built up his own organization, outside normal party channels, and went on to win on to get the nomination and beat Joe seen in the general election.

Immediately, Apodaca began his own effort to get voter approval of two four-year terms for the governor. This time, the Legislature did approve it being sent to the voters.

But, with King's allies working against it, the proposal went down to defeat in the 1976 election. This was in spite of a big media campaign on behalf of the proposal by the Apodaca-backed "Yes for Two" committee.

Now, it's another King-Apodaca contest. Although publicly Apodaca hasn't stated a preference, his main allies are actively working for Ferguson.

The AFL-CIO's Committee on Political Education (COPE) endorsed King, not so much purely from a liking for the wealthy rancher, but because of opposition to Ferguson's right-to-work notions.

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
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

especially this day and time when the word friend has just about been forgotten in the society that we live in today. Thanks again and we look forward to coming back to Capitan for another visit in the near future.


Ruidoso C of C Kicks off Drive
