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400 Citizens Vote For —

## 16 Vote Against North Central

Editorial.

In the following story, the Carrizozo Board of Education in their regular meeting for June tabled their decision to affiliate with the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools.

The decision was due to the fact that the Superintendent, Jim Steinepreis announced to the Board that he had polled the teachers and had found that they were opposed to the NCA by a vote of 16 to 3.

This was done in spite of 400 citizen signatures asking the board to affiliate with the association.

It would appear that the Teachers, Administrators, and Board of Education have made it plain to those 400 people that they should mind their own business and leave the running of the school to the "professionals". That the aforesaid 400 should send their kids and their tax dollars, but keep their opinions to themselves.

This is just another example of the servant telling the master to go jump in the lake, the tail wagging the dog.

We have heard about the salaries being in the top ten in New Mexico, well we pay that salary out of our tax dollars, with most of us making less money than the teachers.

As the advertisement says, "We are the Boss". If this one point is in dispute, we need to start from the school board on down and weed out those who will not follow the feelings of the voters, since school boards are elected.

The question of the affiliation with North Central is a valid issue in its own right, but one loses sight of this in light of the disregard by elected officials for the feelings of the people that elected the School Board.

The teachers should be the last people to be asked if they wanted to be involved with NCA. That is like asking EXXON if they would like more government regulations. NCA helps bring the school and the community together. Of late, there doesn't seem to be much togetherness in this area. NCA has the double feature of low cost and help to the graduating seniors if they go anywhere else.

In California, the voter drew their sabers and told the governments that they had better listen when spoken to, with the passage of Resolution 13, reducing taxes.

The same mood is present in Carrizozo, so at the next board meeting, it would not seem too far fetched to see the board follow what the community wants, or next year see a new board.

MRNS-Only three teachers in Carrizozo would like to have the school affiliate with the North Central Association of colleges and schools, according to a recent poll of the teaching staff.

School Superintendent Jim Steinepreis told the Carrizozo School Board, at a regular meeting Tuesday, that he had polled the teachers as requested by the Board. Only three teachers, in the written poll, indicated a desire to have the school become a NCA member, he said. Sixteen teachers turned thumbs down on the Association and six had no opinion, the Superintendent reported.

The Board has tabled the decision to affiliate with NCA until later. A parent group, the Carrizozo Education

Forum, says it has the signatures of more than 400 citizens asking the board to affiliate the association.

Also on the table is a request from the Classroom Teachers Association for two days of professional leave to attend meetings, workshops and clinics. Paul Salgado presented the request to the board. He said, school policy state approval for such professional improvement work and the teachers would like two days of leave to implement the policy.

The leave would be in addition to the two days of personal leave and eight days of sick leave presently provided. Salgado said teachers who used personal leave for professional business often had problems later.

Stirling Spencer said he had benefited in his practice of engineering from such clinics which were necessary to keep abreast of new ideas in special fields. Ray Wells indicated that

workshops were not all that helpful in his profession.

Salgado said the professional leave would require the advance clearing with the superintendent and principal. Larry Wilkinson said Carrizozo has difficulty finding qualified substitutes and he appeared reluctant to add to that problem with increased leave time. Superintendent Steinepreis said teachers were sent to workshops when there was a "clear need" and benefit to the students. He said the benefit should always offset the problem of absent teachers.

The request was tabled until the next meeting for additional study.

The board continued a review of the School Board Policy Book but made no major changes at the meeting.

A letter from music teacher Arnold Boyce announcing his intention to retire was read. It was announced that Boyce is now successfully recovering from open heart surgery.

### Indian Life and Culture

The Apache Indian, their life and culture was reviewed by Eve Ball at the Lincoln County Historical Society Saturday June 10th at the McCutcheon-Cole home near San Patricio. Eve Ball has spent 29 years in Ruidoso getting to know the Apaches and their oral history. Chief "Ho" or

Whoa was one of the many Apaches she talked about. He was not known well, but one of the most respected leaders of the Mescalero Tribe. His council was sought and respected by many Apaches such as Coshise and Mangus Colorado. Mrs. Ball related many incidents that she experienced in getting acquainted with and gaining the confidence of the Apaches.

One incident was when she visited the home of one Apachemany times and his wife would meet her at the door saying "he was not home." When she later confronted him, he explained "that's the way the white eyes do it when they do not want to see someone!" Another time she related how this same Indian came to her house for a visit. Eve had already promised to take another Indian to the ceremonial the next morning. During the visit, she asked him if he wanted to go. He replied, "yes, I already have my bag packed."

Eve Ball is doing three volumes on the Mescalero Apaches. The first volume will be available this fall and is co-authored by Linda Sanchez. Eve Ball kept the entire crowd spell bound for an hour and a half with her stories about the Apaches. Everyone left with just a little better understanding of the Mescalero Apaches.

## Town Council Approves Budget

MRNS-The Carrizozo trustees gave tentative approval to a 1978-79 budget which kept the town in the black and provided a safe year-end cash balance.

The town fathers also put a town cleanup into motion. The improvements will include condemnation of dangerous structures and debris which constitute a health hazard.

Carrizozo has been operating on a tight budget for the past two years in an effort to recover from a 1976 miss-budgeting and overspending year which put the town in the red.

The town goes into the new budget with a \$2000 balance and expectations of an ending balance in 1979 of \$19,319.00.

General fund resources are expected to be \$129,096 and expenditures are set at \$109,777.

Special budgets which include the recreation funds are also in the black. Utilities are expected to bring in \$79,003 as compared to this year's \$62,156. Expenditures will remain about the same at \$58,754 leaving a cash balance of \$14,249.

The outdoor recreation, which relies on a heavy donation from Dr. and Mrs. A.N. Spencer, expects to spend \$100,029 in the coming year. The recreation center budget which also is subsidized by the Spencers call for a \$51,227 budget.

A \$50 a month salary hike scheduled for January represents the biggest increase in expenditures. These are minor increases in resources including revenue sharing and gross receipts tax.

The trustees told the city attorney Bill Payne to proceed with the first

legal steps in condemning buildings which are considered a fire, health or other danger.

Mayor English read the resignation from the town board of Robert Luna. Luna said he had been named post-master at Hagerman and would be unable to serve Carrizozo. His resignation was accepted with regrets.

The town board took under consideration a request by Sister Jan of the Senior Citizens Center for permission to equip the town-owned building with aids for the handicapped. Sister Jan also wanted to make improvements in the kitchen area. The Board indicated approval for the renovations which will be funded federally, provided they proved structurally feasible.

The trustees and the mayor told Attorney Bill Payne to investigate further additional engineering bills from Wm. Matolan and Associates, in connection with the Industrial Park.

Mayor English said the bill which covered certain change orders in the park were excessive and possibly not allowable under the contract.

The Mayor told the trustees that a recent inspection by the Federal Aviation Agency showed repairs were needed at the Carrizozo airport. The town plans to have new lines painted, weeds removed, gravel swept and broken lights fixed beginning immediately.

Mayor English reviewed progress on the swimming pool and said repairs were almost complete. He expects the pool to open Saturday or Sunday.

Police officer Jay McSwane asked the town to review salaries of the law enforcement officers. He said Carrizozo was below pay scales of other under-2000 towns. Chief Choncho Morales told the trustees that more funds were needed to equipment his department. The officers also discussed problems with night bicycle riders and said citations would be issued to those operating vehicles at night without lights.

Mayor English appointed a committee to coordinate the town's desalination water project which will serve under Water Committee Trustee Sandy Whitaker. Members are: Bob Watson, Robert McChesney, Weldon Spencer, Bill Gallacher, Jr., Fred Vega, Rick Coea, Emilio Beltran, Al Whitaker, Bill Payne, Willie Silva, Mary Rich, Lee Straley and Stirling Spencer.

Mona Payne, representing the Carrizozo Cheerleaders, was given permission to use Spider Park for a rummage sale. The trustees agreed that parks are available to special groups by request on a "first come" basis providing the groups agreed to cleanup afterward.

## RC&D Accepts Three Projects

MRNS-Three new projects were accepted for coordination by the South Central Mountain RC&D Meeting Tuesday in Carrizozo.

Members of the area endorsed the Executive Committee's recommendations for assisting the Carrizozo Schools in planning and equipping a multi-use playground and track. The request, made in a letter from Superintendent Jim Steinepreis, said that the school was used by all members of the community, that a

planned and equipped playground was needed.

Capitan Superintendent Richard Clifton made a like request in behalf of his school district. "The school is a center of community activity, Capitan needs a track around the football field," he said.

RC&D coordinator Howard Abercrombie confirmed Cliftons statement "People are jogging all over the town," he said.

Juanita Abercrombie presented a Capitan Woman's Club project for

publication of a directory of area Emergency Medical Technicians. She cited instances when emergency help was required in the rural area and there was no immediate name available.

Mary Rich asked that she amend her project to include a directory of all county medical services. She said that the county EMS hopes to have a central telephone number for emergencies shortly but, even so, a directory of medical services would be needed. She said Dr. David Rouleau had most of the information collected.

The amended project was accepted by Chairman E. R. Bagley and approved by the members.

State Farm Administration Director David King talked to the meeting about progress in response to rural needs. He said that FHA had handled more rural loans in the past six months than in the entire previous three years. He said loans in rural housing had doubled.

Water is the number one problem for most rural communities, King said. His organization has devoted its community grants to towns attempting to solve water supply problems. Grant funds are exhausted for this year, he said, but loans are still available for communities with major utility problems.

Emergency farm and ranch loans are being approved in a number of New Mexico counties, King said. Hail damage has been extensive in several parts of the state and grasshopper problems are causing major damage. He said there is no limit to emergency loans.


On the entertainment fare will be fiddling from some of our best local fiddlers, barbershop quartet and group singing, among other things which are still being planned.

They tell me many young two year olds do that but it's a heartbreak just the same. Now and again thank heavens he seems all right so we are looking forward to the Rainbow Trials. But I love it and despite all our set backs we are in their going at it with all we can muster.

The Spencer Ranch is in two parts. The broodmares and their colts are at the Spencer's lovely home in Carrizozo, N.M.

At the Carrizozo Ranch at present are six broodmares, 2 are Go Man Go mares. They have colts by Easy Jet, Hopeful Venture, Island Leader (two) Turn Him On and Shepard Boy by their sides.

Both were entered in the West Texas. Rocket Light had the fastest qualifying time but bowed in the finals.


He has been kept in training and looks as if he would be in good shape for the Rainbow. Depending on how he does he might be supplemented for the All American.

Jockey Bickel explains: "She broke a little bit better than she did last time. But she kept running out and went wide on both turns. There doesn't seem to be any way to control that,

POCKET COIN, flashed to a five-length victory in Friday's feature and set the fastest seasonal time for four furlongs. The two-year-old colt, owned by Melvin and Ernest Riggs of Ft. Stockton, Texas, made it to the wire in 45 four fifths seconds. Pocket Coin, who already boasts earnings of over \$58,000, took his only career defeat in the Riley Allison Futurity at Sunland Park in which he finished second by a neck.

WHEN YOUNG TRAINER JOE MERRICK sends out a mount to the starting gate, the fans take notice. And rightly so, Joe, son of well-known owner-trainer Walter Merrick, long a top name in Southwest quarter horse racing, has chalked up an in-the-money percentage of 100, so far this season. He's sent out a total of eight horses and each has lit the board for a record of three wins, two seconds and three thirds.

TRIALS FOR THE UPCOMING \$27,620 RIO GRANDE KINDERGARTEN FUTURITY took the spotlight on Friday with the top three finishers from each division and one fourth-place finisher going into the finale to be held June 18. Draconic's Loom, Pocket Coin and Easy Million won each of their divisions to qualify. The other finalists are Shelley's Scooter, Ernest Scout, Allegiance, Mysiswasadancer, Indi's Rockette, Thomas Vogel and Self Sparkling.

EASY MILLION was the biggest surprise in the trials. The filly got away at 25-1 in the second division. She jetted to the lead and held on to win by 2 1/2 lengths for a payoff of \$51.60.

ONLY TWO WINNING BIG Q TICKETS surfaced on Sunday for the highest mutual payoff of the weekend. The combination of Native Vengeance (No. 2) and Esters Jet (No. 9) in the 550-yard eighth race matched with Barrister Sib (No. 6) and Ute (No. 5) in the six-furlong ninth race returned a hefty \$13,224.80.

EXCLUSIVE TALENT, owned by Mack Yates of Cherokee, Texas, showed plenty of class as he notched

Saturday's 1/2-furlong allowance feature with a come-from-behind move that left him 4 3/4 lengths ahead at the wire. But his success should come as no surprise since he's sired by Exclusive Native who just happens to be the daddy of Triple Crown winner Aff-o-Denny Boy, who's failed to finish in the money only twice out of his last 12 starts, took his first victory of the Ruidoso season in Sunday's fourth race. The five-year-old gelding, who runs in the upper claiming brackets, coursed to an easy 6 3/4 length margin in the six-furlong test as a heavy favorite.

NED HANGER, winner of last year's All-American Derby First Consolation, stretched out to the 870-yard distance for the first time in his career in Saturday's seventh race and not only won handily but set a seasonal record for the distance. The four-year-old gelding, owned by Dorothy Adams of Bartlesville, Okla., had W. R. Hunt aboard as he blazed to 5 1/2-length victory in the brisk time of 45.69 seconds.

ALLEGIANCE continued his penchant for grabbing the runnerup slot in Saturday's fourth race, a four-furlong venture. The two-year-old, sired by Scout Leader, missed by only a neck to give him a consistent career record of six seconds from six outs.

THE FASTEST SEASONAL TIME FOR 350 YARDS was set by Real Easy Jet in an allowance test on Friday when the colt notched his first victory this year. The Walter Merrick-charge took control of the event from the outset with Gary Sumpter at the helm to finish in 17.89 seconds.

IN STEWARDS' RULINGS: Seco Mia, who was disqualified from all purse monies after winning the Top Deck Stakes due to a positive drug test, has been reinstated and declared capable of racing without medication by Track Veterinarian William Pitt. Trainer Don Hassell was fined \$25 for being late to the paddock for the second race, Saturday June 3. Jockey Gilbert Villescas took a \$50 bite for making a frivolous claim of foul following the fourth race, Sunday, June 4.

Fletcher Hall or "Fletch", respected throughout New Mexico for his skill with horses and running rodeos especially the Capitan Rodeo, July 4 weekend has broken and trained horses all his life. He says it was his good fortune to get his early start working for Hunt Hobbs "one of the finest horsemen there ever was."

Fletch outlined the Spencer-Fletcher racing history and program and spoke of its future.

The start was in 1962 when Tonto Sky Bars was bought at the All American sale for about \$2,200. We ran him in 1963.

But we really never tried to do anything until we got Belle Boone. She was by Johnny Boone out of a dam we had raised ourselves. She turned out to be a big strong mare that looked like she could run. We sent her to Ruidoso and then to the State Fair in 1975. She won at both places.

Right there the enthusiasm started to build.

In 1976, Native Son and the Red Hare were bought at the All American sale. We ran second in the West Texas with Native Son. We ran him in the Kansas Trials but he didn't make it in. Then he got killed in a freak accident at Raton.
