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Jockey Club buys Downs

On Aug. 26, 1978 the Board of Directors of the Ruidoso Jockey Club brought to fruition the work of many years and the intensive endeavor of the past few months.

The Board on this date presented to the members of the Jockey Club at a meeting called for this special purpose and held at the Sales Arena at Ruidoso Downs a proposal by which the Ruidoso

Jockey Club would buy "free and clear and without hindrance" the properties, the equipment contracts and other assets owned by Fortuna Properties Inc. and used in conducting horse racing and horse sales at Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park, New Mexico. The guest house at Ruidoso Downs is not and never has been a part of these properties and does not go with the deal.

Depending on S.E.C. clearance of the sale of stock, the planned date of take over is October 1, 1978. This date coincides with the end of the fiscal year of the Ruidoso Jockey Club. It, also, marks the break between the end of racing at Ruidoso Downs and the start of the fall meet at Sunland Park.

The Board of the Ruidoso Jockey Club states that there will be no immediate change in personnel or

conditions of racing at this time. The Board of the Ruidoso Jockey Club, however, has full authority and free hand to manage both Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park as it shall see fit.

The proposal is that the Ruidoso Jockey Club and the two race tracks be separate corporations as they are at present. That the corporation owning the two race tracks be known as "Ruidoso Sunland Inc.", and that all the stock of the Ruidoso Sunland Corporation be owned by the Ruidoso Jockey Club; making Ruidoso Sunland Inc. a wholly owned subsidiary of the Jockey Club.

The Board of Directors of both corporations are to be identical. The officers, however, are to be different. The Board and officers of the Ruidoso Sunland Inc. are to be W.L. (Sunny) Edwards, President; Jess Burner, Vice President; H.J. Hornbuckle, Vice President; Woody Sewall, Secretary; J. Welch, Treasurer; Bill Ross, Director; Monte Stansforth, Director.

The purchase price is \$15,000,000. Of this amount \$6,000,000 is to be provided by the members of the Ruidoso Jockey Club and used as a down payment and for operating expense, necessary track and barn improvements. The remaining \$9,000,000 will be paid out over a time period from operating income.

Each of the 400 members of the Ruidoso Jockey Club are to be offered a package of securities at \$15,000. Should any member not wish to purchase his or her package, then after the refusal of this member the package will be offered to other members who wish to buy more than one package.

Based on a preliminary survey of its members, The Board of Directors do not anticipate any difficulty in completing the purchase of the 400 investment packages.

The offerings of the packages will be made at the time approval is received from the S.E.C. The S.E.C. is already fully acquainted with all details and their approval is expected in due course.

Ruidoso Jockey Club members who do not buy will in no way be affected by this acquisition of the race tracks. Their stakes and enjoyment of racing at Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park will continue as at present.

Ft. Stanton Ranch Holds Dedication

Range management, cow calf operations and mule deer ecology will be discussed at the Fort Stanton Experimental Ranch field day and dedication, August 30.

The 26,000 acre ranch, operated since 1963 by New Mexico State University's Agricultural Experiment Station is located east of Capitan.

The field day will begin with registration and coffee at the Bonita Corral at 8:30 a.m. and will last until

noon. The entrance to the ranch is four and one-half miles east of Capitan on Highway 380. Turn south on Highway 214 and travel one mile to the Bonita Corral turnout.

During the field tour, participants can inspect range research, including the effect of drought on blue grama, rangeland fertilization, and snakeweed, pinon and juniper control.

Research reports on cow calf operations will include range

supplementation of yearlings on grass and mature cows on range. Other range research will include reports on comparing early and late calving dates as well as estrus synchronization and artificial insemination of two year old heifers.


Other topics to be discussed during the tour will be mule deer ecology, cancer eye treatment and NMSU's range assessment team.

After the morning tour, lunch will be provided by Worley Mills at the ranch's headquarters located near the Fort Stanton Hospital.

The dedication will take place at 1:15 p.m. at the ranch headquarters. L.S. Pope, dean and director of the College of Agriculture and Home Economics, will give the opening remarks and then chair the dedication ceremonies. Among the speakers will be Gerald W. Thomas, president of NMSU; Arthur Zimmerman, state director of the Bureau of Land Management; and keynote speaker, W.T. (Dub) Berry Jr., vice-president of Western Farm Management, located in Denver, Colorado.

According to Arnold Nelson, head of NMSU's Animal and Range Science Department, "The new laboratory will be quite an asset to our research program. It provides a location for weighing, drying and grinding research samples collected in the many range, beef cattle and wildlife experiments at the ranch." Nelson pointed out that more detailed analyses, requiring sophisticated equipment, will still be completed at the laboratories on the main campus in Las Cruces.

Ranchers can visit research displays in the new laboratory both before and after the dedication ceremonies.



Candidates for New Mexico State



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Bird Season Opens Sept. 1

Santa Fe, N.M. - This fall's early migratory bird, grouse and squirrel seasons will be quite similar to last year's according to the Department of Game and Fish.

Dove season, traditional hunting season opener for several thousand New Mexicans, is proposed to be open statewide Sept. 1-30 & reopens Nov. 23-Dec. 22. Bag limit is 19 birds per day, 20 in possession.

Grouse, chickaree squirrel and tassel-eared squirrel seasons are open in northern N.M. Sept. 1-30. In southwestern N.M., grouse and squirrel season is Oct. 1-20. Bag limit in both areas is three grouse per day, six in possession, and five squirrels per day, 10 possession.

South-central N.M. is open to chickaree squirrel hunting only. Season is Sept. 1-20 and bag limit is five Chickaree squirrels per day, and 10 possession.

Band-tailed pigeon seasons are Oct. 1-20 in the southwestern quadrant of the state and Sept. 1-20 in the rest of N.M. Bag limit is five per day, 10 in possession. In addition to a valid hunting license, each band-tailed pigeon hunter must have a special permit, available free from the Game and Fish Department.

Early teal season, open in the Central Flyway portion of the state east of the Continental Divide, is Sept. 16-24. The Game & Fish Department's La Joya Wildlife Area will also be open during the early teal season. Limit is four per day, eight in possession.

Sora and Virginia rail season is open statewide, Sept. 16-Nov. 24, and bag limit is 25 rails per day 25 in possession.

Common (Wilson's) snipe season is open statewide Sept. 16-Dec. 17. Bag limit is eight per day 16 in possession.

Enlistment Bonus

An enlistment bonus of \$2,500 is being offered to those who qualify to man the Army's armored vehicles, according to Army representatives.

Another fund raiser, suggested to the department by Ray Voos, Los Alamos, brought \$4,385 in from hunters who voluntarily donated refund checks if unsuccessful in antelope and bighorn sheep license drawings. The program, dubbed "X A Poacher," is expected to further aid the reward fund after drawings are held for Barbary sheep, oryx, ibex and javelina licenses in mid-October.

In addition to Albert, new board members for Operation Game Thief are John King, Capulin, and Leonard Mahan, Roswell. Other continuing to serve are Pearson; Tom Reinhardt, Albuquerque, Vice Chairman; Phil J. Ross, Farmington; Howard Menapace, Gallup; Holm Bursum, III, Socorro; John P. Proctor, Las Cruces; Dr. James R. Tanzola, Silver City; George Yaksich, Raton; Bill Gallagher, Eagle Nest; Charles D. Brooks, Toas; Huck Hale, Alamogordo; Gene Echols, Clovis; and Tom Thornton, Carlsbad.

The citizen's task force oversees the reward fund's administration and approves rewards above the minimum \$50 in small game and \$250 in big game cases. The rewards are paid to callers whose information leads to arrests or citations for wildlife law violations.





Medley Glass Noses Out Town Policy To Win \$866,330 All-American Derby

RUIDOSO DOWNS, N.M.—Medley Glass looked heavily favored Town Policy eye-to-eye in the final yards of Sunday's \$866,330 All-American Derby at Ruidoso Downs and pounded out a tugging nose victory.

The filly got a paycheck for \$288,847, one of the fattest bonanzas in racing history.

Medley Glass is owned by a group headed by Dewitt Logue of Houston, Texas. The group carries the odd name of Lo-Pa, Inc. Jerry Nicodemus does

the riding. Gene Tefertiller is the trainer.

The fans made Medley Glass a 3-1 shot in the 440-yard thriller, and the filly returned \$8.60 to win, \$3.20 to place, \$2.80 to show. The winning time on a fast track was 21.78 seconds.

Town Policy, the star property of Ivan Ashment of Apple Valley, Calif., had to be content with a paycheck of \$120,419. The tote returns were \$3 and \$2.40. —Ken Hart was up.

Seco Mia, off at nearly 10-1, closed

with a brisk late bid to take an upset third, earning \$56,311. Jackie Martin was in the saddle. Seco Mia is owned by the Cryan Ranch of Sealy, Texas. The show price was \$3.

Seco Mia never managed to intrude, on the private war being waged by Medley Glass and Town Policy, and was a length behind the two when she reached the wire.

Here's how the rest of the field checked in, with money earned: 4th—Miss Thermolark, \$39,851; 5th—Top

Pass, \$32,054; 6th—Easy Saint, \$30,326; 7th—Ima Gates Gal, \$28,588; 8th—Madam, President, \$27,722; 9th—Stoa Minga, \$25,989; 10th—Luccks Image Girl, \$24,257.

Town Policy came out of the gate like a tiger lunging for raw meat and quickly established a strong toehold. Miss Thermolark, who usually breaks on top, was unable to keep up with Town Policy's fire-starting get-away.

After about a half-dozen strides, it was apparent Town Policy had shown up to do some racing. But Medley Glass didn't let the people's choice get out of range. The filly got off to a hustling start from the rail post, found herself about a half-length off the pace, then gained quickly to reach a side-by-side position with Town Policy at the midway point.

Top Pass, who had some early lick, quickly dropped back, and there was no one to bother the two leaders.

From that point on, it was clearly a test of will and stamina between Medley Glass and Town Policy.

Medley Glass snared the lead with about 100 yards to go, but Town Policy dug in and tried to come roaring back. The two remained on even terms the rest of the way as Medley Glass courageously refused to concede her inch-or-two margin.

It was a touch-and-go battle over the last furious strides, but Medley Glass got the win by keeping her nose in front as she bulletted under the wire. Town Policy recovered some precious terrain at the end, but just couldn't catch the filly.

In winning the Derby, Medley Glass boosted her career earnings up to \$375,851.

HOOFBEATS

By Karen Halloran

Norgor, an 11-year-old gelding who developed a tremendous following at Ruidoso Downs over the years, has been retired. The old fellow, who had been campaigning at the current meeting, was paraded before the fans after Saturday's sixth race, and was led into the winner's circle to receive a blanket and the ovation of the fans.

Norgor broke his maiden at Evangeline Downs in Louisiana in 1969; but after two years of racing, he still had only one win to brag about. But all that changed when he shipped to the Southwest in 1971 and got introduced to 870-yard racing—a distance in which he was to shine brilliantly for more than half a decade. His first win came at Ruidoso in an allowance sprint on May 30, 1971. Later that year, he dropped down to a four-grand claiming race, and was taken by Grady Hopper of Dallas. Before the summer was out, Norgor had won the Ruidoso Speed Handicap (four furlongs) and the Brigand Handicap (870 yards).

In 1973, he was sold to Manuel W. Davis of Claremont, Texas, and kept right on winning at power-burst distances. His credits include two wins in the Speed Handicap, three conquests of the Flying Charm Stakes, two wins of the Brigand, plus other stakes at Albuquerque and Sunland Park.

His greatest accomplishment, perhaps, was the setting of the four-furlong world record at Ruidoso in 1976. The feat came in the Speed Handicap, and the world mark still stands. All told, Norgor won 28 races in his long career.

Johny Mito, the gray colt who banked over \$145,000 with his brilliant win in Sunland Park's \$291,950 Riley Allison Futurity last Spring, made his first appearance since then in the trials for the \$128,450 Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity. But fans who had anticipated a re-match with the sensational Pocket Coin were disappointed. Johny Mito, after setting a quick pace in the six-furlong battle, conked out in the stretch

and ran third—thus missing the qualifying cut.

Pocket Coin continued his crushing dominance of the two-year-old division by winning his trial heat by 3½ lengths. The win was his sixth of the meeting, and clearly makes Pocket Coin a heavy favorite in the Sept. 2 grand finale. The other qualifiers; Rich 'N Royal, Vested Ways, Fols Native, Festos, Allegiance, Light Fandango, Watch Country Boy, She's Distinctive, Dandy Binge.

Osage Juana, a filly making only her third career start with relative unknown Bill Hayes aboard, upset highly favored Vespero and set the top qualifying time for the upcoming \$1,280,000 All-American Futurity. Osage Juana was clocked in 22:16 seconds for 440 yards. The All-American Trials drew 17 late nominees at a hefty \$15,000 each, and two made the big race. They are Osage Juana, the top qualifier, and Holme Maid, who came in with the sixth-best clocking. Four of the finalists got in via a late payment of \$6,250 on June 1. These are Moon Lark, Vespero, Boonanza and Oh Shiny. These 23 horses added \$281,000 to the total purse.

Three of the All-American finalists went through last year's All-American Yearling Sale, this adding more glitter to the venue. Copasetti was taken for \$21,000. Gentlemen's Feature, the Kansas Futurity winner, was a great bargain at \$16,500. Ironically, Flying Passem had gone through the ring with a minimum price of \$7,000, and when this figure wasn't reached, the gelding was re-purchased by his owner for \$5,500. Flying Passem has already earned \$62,413. Gentlemen's Feature is a cash heavyweight with earnings of \$170,576.

The All-American Third Consolation (Friday, Sept. 1) is Shaping up as quite a battle. The group includes three hot shots; Easy Treasure, Miss Royal Cynthia, The First Edition. Easy Treasure, a \$67,000 acquisition at the All-American Sale, recently copped the \$400,000 Kindergarten Stakes in California. The First Edition took both the West Texas and Sun Country Futurities at Sunland. Miss Royal Cynthia has looked extremely sharp in four Ruidoso wins.

The fans got ichy trigger finger and built up a show pool of \$26,930 in the 17th All-American trial race. Of that amount, \$20,784 was bet on Vespero, in the 21st trial race. Copasetti returned out-of-balance mutual payoffs of \$7.80 to win, \$3.60 to place, \$7 to show.

For the first time in All-American Futurity history, the trials were clocked with Omega Swiss timing

equipment. The solid-state system provides greater accuracy and greater dependability, according to Cy Leland, who is in command of Ruidoso's electronic hardware. "The Omega system is by far the finest timing device for quarter horse racing," Leland notes.

First Day All American Q.H. Yearling Sale

"How is the sale going, Liz?" "Like a house a fire!" answered Devine, chief clerk. The first day of the sale Monday Aug. 28 ended with a total of \$1,499,500. "Miles above last year," according to Liz Devine, chief clerk. The number sold was 175, the average \$8,568.

The top selling horse \$140,000 was Hlp 49 Tiny Tornado Too, a bay colt born March 26, 1977. He's by Tiny Gay out of Vansarita Too. She is a AAA mare with 7 wins and has produced 7 foals, 6 of them ROM winners and 3 of them stakes winners.

Tiny Tornado Too was consigned by Susan and Vernon L. Pool.

B. Kunumera By Four Lengths In Ruidoso Sprint

Bradley's Kunumera galloped to an easy four-length win in Saturday's Ruidoso Sprint Championship at Ruidoso Downs.

The gelding, ridden by Richard Bickel in the second-high load of 122 pounds, stalked the front-running Credit Reference in the first half of the six-furlong dash, then moved out rapidly at the turn for home to win as he pleased.

Bradley's Kunumera earned \$8,220, clocked the off-track distance in 1:15 flat, and returned tote payoffs of \$6.80, \$3.40 and \$2.60. The winning owner is James H. Bradley of Hereford, Texas.

Barrister Sib came in second, refunding \$4 and \$3.40. Ute took third and returned \$3.80.

The winner of the \$65, 841 second consolation of the All-American Quarter Horse Derby was Lillie Bug, who held a 1½-length gap at the finish in a clocking of 22:47 seconds. Roy Brooks was up.

Lillie Bug earned \$9,058 and handed her mutual backers \$11 to win. The chestnut filly is owned by H.M. and Kendall Adudell of Piedmont, Okla.

440 Yards (22:16)

Osage Juana Beats Vespero On Sloppy Track, Top Qualifier For All-American

RUIDOSO DOWNS, N.M. — Osage Juana, a bay filly owned by Thomas Ballenger of Thousand Oaks, Calif., is the top qualifier for the upcoming \$1,280,000 All-American Quarter Horse Futurity at Ruidoso Downs. The field for the world's richest race was set during Friday's program as 25 elimination trials were run. Qualifiers were determined strictly on time.

The distance of the trials, and the All-American grand finale on Labor Day, is 440 yards.

All-American Trials, "A Trial Day!"

On Friday August 25 it rained in the night. It rained again in the morning. Then it stopped and the sun came out and the track started drying.

"I tried to make it as even for everyone as I could. It was sealed for the night rain. It took the day rain okay if it had just kept on raining. Now, with it hardening and with some hundred horses yet to go leaving four hundred hoof cups, and we can't smooth them out," said Wendell Leeling, Track Superintendent.

Of the 254 horses that ran there was only one injury. "I was hoping we'd come thru with none. I don't like to see a horse get hurt. This track is different now," said Leeling.

The winning post positions for the trials were No. 1-2; No. 2-3; No. 3-1; No. 4-3; No. 5-2; No. 6-2; No. 7-0; No. 8-4; No. 9-1; No. 10-6.

Osage Juana went into the 17th trial as a 6-1 shot, was relegated to a backseat due to the presence of the Rainbow Futurity winner, Vespero. The latter carried skimpy odds of 1-9 & shot into the early lead. But when Keith Asmussen applied some leather to keep Vespero going at full throttle, the gelding suddenly veered inward. He never really got back into high gear, and the maneuver played right into Osage Juana's Hands. The filly swept by the people's choice for a half-length win and stopped the clock in 22:16 seconds. The track was sloppy from recent rains.

The outing was only the fourth in Osage Juana's career. She went into the trials with earnings of only \$1,059. A win on Labor Day would be worth \$437,500. Larry Sharp is the trainer.

Fans who backed Osage Juana in the trials got \$13.60 to win. Bill Hayes does the riding.



Hondo School Lunch Program

Hondo Valley Public Schools today announced its policy for (local school food authority) (free and reduced-price meals, free milk) for children unable to pay the full price of meals and milk served under the National School Lunch, Breakfast, and Special Milk Programs (as applicable).

Local school officials have adopted the following family size and income criteria for determining eligibility:

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for (free and reduced-price meals and free milk as applicable.)

In addition, families not meeting these criteria but with special unusual expenses due to unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply.

If there is a change in family income due to reasons such as unemployment, or there is a change in family size, parents and guardians are urged to contact school officials. Such changes may qualify students for free or reduced price meals and free milk (as applicable).

Application forms are being sent to all homes in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available to the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

To discourage the possibility of misrepresentation, the application forms contain a statement about the space for signature certifying that all information furnished to the application is true and correct. An additional statement is added to warn that the application is being made in connection with the receipt of federal funds, that school officials may, for cause, verify the information in the application, and that deliberate misrepresentation of information may subject the applicant to prosecution under applicable state and federal criminal statutes.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals and milk for them, it should contact the school.

In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, or national origin.

Under the provisions of the policy, Ernest J. Booky, Superintendent (and of determining official) will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official he may make a request either orally or in writing to Ernest J. Booky, Hondo Valley Public Schools, P.O. Box 55, Hondo, N.M. 88333 (office, address, phone of the hearing official) for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

Parental conferences may be called to verify information on applications prior to formal hearings.

Each school and the office of the Hondo Valley Public Schools (central office) has a copy of the complete policy which may be reviewed by any interested party.
