## Capitan's New Teachers Ready For Busy Year

Pat Sullivan teaches first grade, a position she has done for the last seven years in Lubbock. Pat is married, and her husband is the owner of Sullivan's Security Service and Private Investigations. She has three boys, Mike aged 16, Brian, aged 14, and Paul aged 13. She got her B.S. from UTEP and her Masters in Education at Texas Tech.

Linda Irion graduated from Ft. Sumner High, and then from ENMU. She started teaching Kindergarten in Capitan in January. She will teach Special Math and Kindergarten, and she has a son, Scott who is five years of age.

## Ft. Stanton Airport Meeting Slated For September 15

The proposed use of public lands near Fort Stanton for a new airport will be discussed this month at a public hearing in Ruidoso. The meeting is scheduled for 7-10 p.m., Sept. 15, and 9 a.m.-1 p.m., Sept. 16, at the All American Room of the Chaparral Motor Hotel.

The Bureau of Land Management in August received a formal application for the land filed by the Federal Aviation Administration on behalf of the Sierra Blanca Airport Development Commission, a coalition of Lincoln County groups supporting the proposed airport. The airport would serve Ruidoso, Capitan, the Mesquero Indian Reservation and other nearby communities.

New Mexico State University, the New Mexico Cattlegrowers Association and some Ruidoso home owners, however, are opposed to the project, according to the Bureau of Land Management.

The land is part of the old Fort Stanton Military Reservation, which has been managed by the BLM since 1956. NMSU uses 26,000 acres for range research under a 20-year cooperative agreement with the BLM.

James "Smokey" O'Connor, Roswell district manager for the BLM,

said testimony from the public hearing will be used by the BLM in making a decision on the application. If approved, the federal land would be transferred to the development commission free of charge.

O'Connor said the BLM has asked congressmen, interest groups, and state and federal agencies for written comments on the proposal. These comments will be made part of the hearing record.

Those at the hearing will have about 10 minutes each to make oral comments, he said. Further written comments will be accepted by the BLM through October 1.

Rehabilitation is a word used often around correctional facilities, but all too often has no real meaning. This is not the case at Camp Sierra Blanca. Under Mr. E.B. Gutierrez, the Administrator, this word has come to mean the main step in re-establishing a man back into society. Many programs to blend men with the free society are in use. Over sixty percent of the men are on work release and more are approved every week. The camp has a softball team what won the All-American League in Ruidoso and surrounding teams come in to play on many different occasions bringing their families and friends. These games are on the order of an open house. Inmates and civilians meet and mix as friends should. We hear a lot about the staff at other facilities but our staff doesn't brag, they just do their job and a little more. Mr. Monreal and

Mr. Ortiz gave many hours of their own time to take the ball team to Ruidoso for games and league meetings. Even several members of the staff drove to Ruidoso to watch the team play. Inmates attend both Catholic and Protestant churches in Capitan. They participate in any church activities they wish. The A.A. group is extremely active with numerous free movie guests and speakers. They also attend out of town meetings as would any other group. The camp has had a recent concert by Karen Lafferty, a well known singer, and had about twenty guests for that concert. The youth of Ruidoso brought a stage production to Camp Sierra Blanca, not once but twice. They brought a fifty member cast and about forty guests each time. This is part of a rapidly expanding program of religious, recreational and educational activities approved and

encouraged by Mr. Gutierrez. Several men from the Camp have recently joined the American Contract Bridge League and go to Ruidoso to play bridge there. This group already has several men improving their bridge in order to be added to the team. Working with two excellent cast workers, a library has been established and is growing rapidly. These two case workers, Evelyn Genta and Lee Onsrud, work very hard to help every man in any program for self improvement with both giving hours of personal time to help men with personal problems. While many correctional people talk a lot about rehabilitation, we feel that for a real good look at it in action they should take a close look at Camp Sierra Blanca. Working with a staff and administrator who are more a friend than correctional officers, rehabilitation is a practice, not a word.

She will be the Resource Room Teacher - aiding students in additional work in Reading, Math, Writing, and any other areas of need. She will also begin teaching Fundamentals of Art in the High School. Her Education Philosophy is High expectation - High achievement in students work and construction of individual program to maximize learning in students. Miss Mueller came to Corona, because she wanted to teach in a highly personalized atmosphere, in a rural setting. Ms. Mueller is single.





## Mary Fritz Johnson

Mary was born July 23, 1898 to Henry and Maude Fritz pioneers, Lincoln County residents. When Mary was still in grade school in 1913 the Lincoln County High School was at Capitan. Carrizozo had a 4 year high school, Corona a 2 year, Ancho a 2 year and White Oaks a one year. At that time even the term lengths of some Lincoln County schools was limited.

In 1913 the teachers for Lincoln County's 1723 students were paid \$17,286.85 an average of \$61 per month per teacher.

Mary started her teaching career at Lincoln after receiving her teacher's certificate in Silver City.

In 1925 Mary was elected County School Superintendent and was re-elected to a second term.

While in Carrizozo as County School Superintendent Mary met Pete Johnson, a Deputy Sheriff who was a member of another pioneer Lincoln County family and there were married in April, 1929. Pete had served in the Army in France and Germany during World War I and was well known and respected in Lincoln County. His father, Peter M. Johnson had been a trusted forman of the Bar W Ranch and his ability in the capacity was unexcelled.

Pete and Mary had one daughter Emily Ann who was born 1933. Emily Ann is now Mrs. Gerald King of Isawuah, Washington and has three children.

Nancy Guck is a young and beautiful mother of two children and a nurse at the Carrizozo Health Center. She is married to Tom Guck who works with the Forestry Service. We in Nogal are proud of the whole family. But on this day we are especially proud of Nancy because she was selected out of 950 applicants to train at the University of Utah to become a Physicians Assistant in a Medix program. This is a very great honor and we congratulate her.

Nancy tells me that we also have a very special lab technician working for Dr. Nelson in Carrizozo. Adele Stommel is from Detroit, Mich. and does general lab work, and they both say that our new Dr. is super to work for besides being a good Dr.

Molly has a delightful party in her grand-daughter's home in Alamogordo. Some of her favorite friends didn't get to come to the party, but Mrs. Stearns and Johnson Stearns did get to go. The friends who didn't get to come send their love and best wishes for another one next year.

While Mr. Manire was Carrizozo School Superintendent, Mary served the Carrizozo schools as Secretary and returned to teaching in 1943 and retired in 1961 43 years after she started teaching.

In paying tribute to this wonderful lady it should be noted that Mary played a very great part in the advancement of the Lincoln County School System. Her intense loyalty to her family and to the people of Lincoln County will be long remembered.





Ruidoso Downs, N.M.—Moon Lark got off to a powerful start in Monday's 20th running of the All-American Futurity at Ruidoso Downs, then continued to pour it on and flashed to a three-quarter-length victory.

The colt hauled down the richest prize in racing history—\$437,500.

In the process, he put the finishing touches on one of the great Cinderella stories in racing. Moon Lark is owned by the brothers, Paul and James Howard, and their nephew, Sam Howard. At the start of the season, the trio barely had enough to make ends meet.

But Moon Lark began paying off right from the start of his running career. He went into the All-American with a record of four wins and second from five starts, good for winnings of \$75,668.

After breaking the jackpot in the All-American, Moon Lark ended up with a career bankroll of \$513,168, and that vaulted him into seventh place on the list of all-time money makers.

Jackie Martin who qualified three horses for the All-American grand finale—selected Moon Lark as his mount in the Labor Day showdown and came away with a \$43,750. Jack Brooks, the colt's trainer, picked up a similar paycheck.

Sam Howard, who served as Moon Lark's trainer for the first part of the season, hails from Coppell, Texas (near Ft. Worth). Paul's hometown is Ada, Okla. James is from Oklahoma City.

Sam, 27, drives a truck for a living. James works in the stockyards in Oklahoma City. Paul says he trains horses.

Moon Lark, who is by Top Moon out of Pan O Lan, came flying out of the gate in the Labor Day classic. But the colt was closely hounded by the 8-5 favorite, Vespero. On the other side, he was getting a stiff run from the 30-1 outsider, Holme Maid.

For a couple of strides, Jockey Keith Asmussen really had Vespero in high gear, and the gelding—owner of the third-best qualifying time—appeared to snare the lead. At around the halfway point of the 440-yard route, Vespero began gliding inward. He got close to Moon Lark, but the two didn't make contact.

At about the time Vespero was starting that inward slide, Moon Lark was really beginning to fire. As the field thundered down to the wire, Moon Lark began to get the upper hand. Vespero gave every indication of having run himself out, and began to fade. But Moon Lark picked up more strength with each stride. In the final dozen strides or so, he was clearly in command, and gaining with each jump.

Osage Juana, the top qualifier handled by Bill Hayes, was out of it in the early going, but launched a tremendous bid in the middle of the track and was moving powerfully at the end. Still, with all that closing kick, she never threatened the winner.

Holme Maid, ridden by Danny Cardoza on the rail, also had a lot of octane at the end. The filly, who was a late supplemental nominee to the All-American at cost of \$15,000, was truing her best throughout and showed no inclination to quit. But she was unable to hold off Osage Juana in the last desperate jump and missed the place

slot by a slim nose.

Moon Lark clocked the distance in 21.84 seconds, which was considered pretty brisk, considering the track was listed as good. A tailwind was blowing.

Here are the mutual payoffs: Moon Lark, \$5.60; \$3.20, \$3.40; Osage Juana, \$6.40, \$4.80; Holme Maid, \$9.40.

Osage Juana is trained by Larry Sharp for Thomas H. Ballenger of Thousand Oaks, Calif. The filly earned \$177,500. Holme Maid, the property of

Frank Merrill of Purcell, Okla., and Charles Weik of San Antonio, collected \$82,500.



Copasgti was scratched, but earned \$35,000 nonetheless.


Wagering on the All-American Futurity reached \$236,404, which was the highest one-race handle in New Mexico history. The previous high was set at \$221,882 in the '76 All-American (won by Real Wind).

The total handle for Monday's 12-race season-closing program was \$1,020,338, second best in Ruidoso history. The top mark of \$1,038,995 was set with a 13-race program on Labor Day of 1976.



The fans had a hard time deciding on a favorite, but finally gave the honor to Bradley's Kunnera. He packed odds of just over 3-1 and found himself hooked in a front-running duel with the 8-1 outsider, Honor John. As the two swept into the backstretch, they were

about a half-dozen lengths ahead of the pack.

But the fat margin dissolved quickly and Pleasure Ridge, moving well on the far outside, was in control when he turned for home. Freeman M. circled horses to engage Pleasure Ridge at mid-stretch; but to no avail. Strate Miss made his move on the rail, saving ground, but was more than three lengths out of the place spot when he hit the wire.
