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Capitan Schools Accept Bond

Due to the lack of room, the Capitan School Board voted to accept the handling of a bond sale by Quinn and Co. of Albuquerque.

Action was taken as a result of a discussion by Dr. C.W. Richards, educational consultant with Krueger, Lake, Hutchinson and Asso, and Architect Jerry Lake concerning the need for a new school building and/or the remodeling of the existing buildings.

"With enrollment up 42 students above the 1978-79 projection, the need is becoming more apparent", Capitan School Superintendent Richard Clifton stated. He also said that although there was funding and possible teachers for two special education classes, these were not feasible because there was no room to put them.

The A.D.M. report showed the 358 students Kindergarten through 12 were enrolled with a budget for 290. "This shows a good increase but is not out of hand, there has been a constant increase in the last 3 to 4 years." Clifton said. Five classes were shown to exceed minimum standards in the number of students per teacher. "We are funded on the number of students and the crowding advocates the use of aides in

such situations," Clifton said.

Because of the crowding, Dough Hensley, of Quinn and Co. said the school system "needs to be bonded to capacity." This would make the system eligible for state funding although it would not guarantee it. Hensley stated that at capacity the system could handle a \$825,000 bond issue, but that this would not provide enough to cover all the building costs.

The need for Capital outlay from the state would then be there, "but, the only way to get this outlay is to be totally bonded," Hensley said.

Hensley then cited examples of school districts the size of Capitan stating that while Capitan was second from the bottom in school tax rates, it was growing faster in valuation than any others. He cited Moriarity System, assessed below Capitan but with the highest of tax rates. He said the school bonded to capacity in order to get Capital Outlay and by showing a "need," received it.

He showed the Board several examples of bonding, each with different options and different tax rates. He added, "you'll never get a dime from Santa Fe unless you pass the 2 mil and there's a good chance you'll need the 2 mil repeatedly."

Hensley then detailed the services

his company would give the board; handle Bond attorneys, draw a pre-election brochure prepare an official statement on the bond sale, "coordinate everything."

Hensley then directed the board to set a date for the Bond Issue election. He suggested Tues. Feb 6, 1979, as a possible date, but also listed the option the Board could take. Elections cannot be held until 42 days after the State-Wide election, making the earliest date open in December. The suggested Feb. 6, also regular election of school board, was also debated as being undesirable because of "too much bias at that time." But Hensley added that if there was no election on Feb. 6, the board would have to wait an additional 90 days.

He also said the sale should be presented so the voters understand what is to be built. "Based on needs of the school, this is at least 1.6 million," he said. "But this is counting on Capital Outlay. The 2 mil levy will enable the system to receive matching state funds with the actual dollar figure based on valuation-student being \$825,000."

Because of high construction costs, the bonds would not be adequate without the addition of Capital Outlay, and there is no guarantee that it will be provided, he added.

The board then heard discussion by Jerry Lake, architect, on the proposed plans. Lake told the board that certain priorities, based on student growth projections and money, had to be made before his firm could make any definite plans. He suggested the school expand in a 3-phase program. "This would distribute the cost at a more realistic rate," he said.

Lake concluded his discussion with a three point objective for the School Board; get architect schemes, examine possibilities of obtaining more property or increasing present building space by moving the football field to a new location, and set a definite date for the bond issue.

Other discussion at the meeting included a court summons served on Virgil Hall, School Board President, concerning a challenge to property rights of the Old Lincoln School. He was informed by Clifton that a title search was now happening.

Milk which had cost cents on the special milk program was voted to be raised to 8 cents due to a raise in cost to the school. Milk prices for the school are 12 cents, regular, 13 cents chocolate. With the raise the school will now be able to match state reimbursements.


Blue Cross Insurance was voted to be picked up so there would be no loss of coverage. The school was informed by Horace Mann they were cancelling their policy on Oct. 1, because of a high claim rate.

Jim Johnson was approved as new Boy's Basketball coach, Assistant Football and social studies teacher. He holds a BA and MA from UNM. Johnson was the third teacher hired in the post. Two others left due to personal problems, with housing listed as "major problem."

Other discussion included tort claims, student release of two students to Hondo and certain budget transfers. Budget transfers were updates of projections made in Feb.

Board members Eugene Parker, Virgil Hall, Horace Cordova, Pat Huey, and Richard Phillips were all present at the meeting which was poorly attended by the public.

Town Council Propose Increase of 1/2 % Tax

A quiet meeting of the Carrizozo town council was held last week with the most important item being the proposed 1/2 percent tax on the gross receipts. In discussion as to the raise, several people including the Mayor Jesse English pointed out that the town needed the money to fix streets and other improvements. City attorney Bill Payne pointed out that one of the requirements for extra state aid in the event of an emergency is that the town has tried to solve their own money problems first.

Quite a bit of the proposed new tax would be paid by people traveling through Carrizozo and so would bring money into the community.

The new tax will go into effect July 1, 1978, because the state repealed a quarter percent of their taxes.

Sister Gail Stackpole gave the Council a program on the Zia Therapy Center including a film on the types of projects that the center will be using. The municipal Fireworks ordinance was amended to conform to the State ordinance.

The proposed 62 foot reduction for the Television tower by Arl Cope and the Tularosa Cable TV was discussed and a variance to the Airport Ordinance was approved for this situation. This allows the town to approve the new lower tower without changing the ordinance.

Zozo Art Gallery To Feature One-man Show

Mr. DeTrevis has announced, however, that no one will be turned away if this fee cannot be paid by those that cannot afford it especially if he or she has an artistic ability.

Names of art enthusiasts wishing to form an art league whereby monthly meetings will be devoted to bringing speakers in the field of art to Carrizozo are still being sought. Anyone interested in asked to sign at the gallery during the hours it is open.

N.M. Racing Commission Approves Fortuna Properties To Open Fall Meet October 7

As previously reported, the Ruidoso Jockey Club had planned to open Sunland Park Fall Meet starting October 7, 1978.

The Jockey Club, however, had not heard from the S.E.C. and had not received their expected approval of the sale of Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park by Fortuna Properties to the Jockey Club. S.E.C. approval is all that stands in the way of closing the sale. It is expected anyday.

Mr. Al Rosa therefore submitted his list of personnel for running the Sunland Meet this fall. The racing commission approved it.

One major change is the resignation of Tom Dawson as racing secretary and the appointment of Gordon Graham, his assistant, in his place. Mr. Graham is Dean Turpitt, the well-known starter, son-in-law. He has come up through racing and has been in it all his life.

The commission also replaced Jhn Phillips, a racing steward with long years of experience with George Garcia who has been shot steward at La Mesa this summer and is well-known in Santa Fe.

Hondo Leader wins N.M. TB Futurity

Hondo Leader scored an upset win over Pocket Coin in the N.M. Thoroughbred Futurity at the State Fair Sunday, Sept. 17, 1978 at 6 furlongs. The running time was 1:12 and the winners purse \$51,318. He won by 5 lengths.

Pocket Coin was the outstanding favorite with odds of 3-5 as the tote board closed. \$25,000 was bet on Pocket Coin to win. The total handle wagered in the race was \$110,833, the highest of the Fair which showed the keen interest in the race. Hondo Leader closed at 5-2 and some \$18,000 was bet on him to win.

It was a stirring race but was not run as most racing fans expected. The fans thought that these two great horses from Lincoln County would hook each other and some tearing up the stretch.

At the State Fair, the 6 furlongs is run like the 4 furlongs at Ruidoso Downs. Down the back stretch, around the far turn and into the stretch.

As we saw it the race was run as follows: All horses broke well, Hondo Leader took the lead in the back stretch with Pocket Coin running about third. When they rounded the turn and entered the stretch, Pocket Coin drew up but Hondo Leader drew away. Pocket Coin tried but could not catch him.

Hondo Leader crossed the finish line 5 lengths in the lead.

Ruff Racket owned by Bloss and Dupont of El Paso, Texas and trained by James Hughes finished third for a purse of \$13,684.

The second place purse was \$22,808 to add to Pocket Coin's winnings of \$164,395. He is trained by Michael Welch of Ruidoso, N.M. and owned by E.M. and M.C. Riggs of Ft. Stockton, Texas and Ruidoso, N.M.

Pocket Coin is by Master Hand out of Midiminni by Hasty Road and bred by Beddo and Miller of the Hondo Farm at Anthony, N.M.

Hondo Leader is owned by Sharon R. Thomas who is the daughter of Forrest Niccum, owner of the Hondo Ranch, Hondo, N.M.

The win took Hondo Leader's winnings over the \$100,000 for 1978. He

is by Island Leader who stands at the Hondo Ranch at Hondo. The dam - Warm Mittens by Swaps.

Incidentally another colt by Island Leader "Who Leader" owned by L.A. McCasland also qualified and race fourth.

According to their owners and trainers, both of these great horses,

Pocket Coin and Hondo Leader will now get a well-earned rest. Then Hondo Leader may race in California and later at Hot Springs.

But the big event coming up is next year when both Hondo Leader and Pocket Coin will be three year olds. Both are entered in the N.M. Thoroughbred Derby at the State Fair.

Remember Seattle Slew, the unbeatable. He went to the coast and lost. You have just read of Affirmed, the unbeatable, favored 8-5 odds to beat Seattle Slew. Seattle Slew beat Affirmed. This is what makes horse racing go. Next years' confrontation of these two Lincoln County greats is a race to look forward to.



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

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
