Town Passes Ordinance

Two actions of real importance came out of the Tuesday Town Council meeting in Carrizozo. The first was the council passing an ordinance prohibiting the storage of unsightly cars, and the second was the signing of the lease for their first tenet in the Industrial Park, Geocomputer, Inc.

The special meeting was called specifically to address the council to the matter of cleaning the town up. The automobile ordinance was just the last link in a long chain of ordinances that have been drafted over the years with the various town councils. Town attorney, Gary Mitchell, commented, "With the ordinances on the books the way that you have them, you can clean up this town any time you wish."

The council, with Roy Harmon absent, was reluctant to pass the ordinance because as Mannie Hernandez said, "We have many ordinances on the books which we don't enforce now."

The council solved the problem by voting to enforce all of the ordinances instead of just a few.

About thirty people showed up to voice their opinions, and the council was told by these people in no uncertain terms that the ordinances would be obeyed as long as everyone was treated equal.

The overall plan of clean up will start at the next town council meeting with Attorney Gary Mitchell presenting a list of the owners of property that needs to be condemned by the state Fire Marshall. Owners of these properties will be given a set time to "Put their house in order," and then the town will step in and make sure legally that it is done.

Mayor Jesse English said at the start of the meeting, "It is our hope that no one takes any of these ordinances personally. We are not trying to get anyone, we are just trying to clean up our town so we can be proud of our home."

Several others at the meeting also commented that no one should feel that these ordinances were aimed at anyone, but in fact the ordinances are aimed at a situation instead.

Ruth Armstrong, chairman of the Industrial Development Board, told the

members of the Council that the only fair way to clean up the town was to make a total plan to include all situations.

The Council has decided to pursue this to include livestock within the town limits. Town Attorney Mitchell was instructed by the Council to write letters about livestock within the town limits to two offenders, with more letters to follow.

Also included in the clean up is vacant lots filled with weeds and junk. Offenders will be notified about the situation and legal action will be taken.

The council spoke out several times hoping that the citizens will handle their own clean up, but if they don't the town has no alternative other than to force the clean up.

In a lighter note, the problems with dog and skunks were discussed with the Board deciding to try to have a dog catcher from Ruidoso come to the next regular meeting and make a proposal as to the catching of the stray dogs and impoundment in Ruidoso.

On December 2nd, Carrizozo will have a unique "happening" called Skunk Days. It will be a time when the people will try to with help from the government trapper and other game department officials get rid of the skunk problem. Skunks are one of the usual carries of rabies and so could cause many problems for this community if not handled carefully.

So as it now stands, the town will attempt in the next six months to clean itself up. The car ordinance will go into effect in 60 days and all non-running cars will have to be concealed or removed from view within 30 days.

In talking about the ordinance, Phillip Ortiz asked the Council if they wanted him to abstain from voting since this directly affects him. The Council left it up to Phillip which is what Phillip did. On the question of the cars Mannie Hernandez, and Sandy Whittaker voted for the ordinance and Phillip Ortiz abstained on the issue. On the issue of the overall clean up of the town the Council was united in their desire to clean up the town.

Following the clean up action, several other items were on the agenda. First was the Gasoline Bids with the

bid going to the only bidder, LaMay Distributors.

The town is going to take action this week to nullify their contract with the Yellowbird Flying Service because of "several breeches" by the contractor. The Council heard testimony that the people from Yellowbird have not been in residence and the gasoline is sometimes hard to get for passing planes. The town attorney is looking into the matter and

the town is looking for another contractor for the airport.

In what was called a step toward the future, the town granted a lease to Geocomputer, Inc. for 50 years in the Industrial Park. Geocomputer will build a 4000 sq. ft. metal building on a concrete floor and use about 24000 sq. ft. for themselves and rent the rest to other companies.

The next regular meeting of the Town Council will be November 13, 7:00 p.m. at the town hall.

Mary Ellen Payne, Chamber secretary-treasurer, is dinner chairman. Pre-dinner music will be provided by Glenn Ellison and his Grass Roots Country Band.

Salgado Demonstrates TV Lab To Board

The Carrizozo School Board met for a quiet meeting last week. The Board was given a demonstration of the new Television lab facilities by Mr. Salgado. The facilities include three cameras, a switchers with audio controls, and a studio.

The board also discussed the paint on the school buildings and how soon they might need to be repainted.

The board set policy concerning activity trips, and placed it in the hand book. This was not in response to any one incident, but so that the board would already have set the policy.

Two regular resolutions concerning the regular meeting of the Board of Education, and the policies on sex discrimination were approved.

In final action, Board member Stirling Spencer brought up the subject of the North Central Accreditation Association for discussion. The

superintendent was asked to research entrance requirements of colleges in New Mexico and to include some of the out of state colleges.

The next regular meeting of the Board of Education will be November 14th at 7:30 in the conference room.

Capitan School Board Looks Into \$3.7 Million Complex

Plans for a \$3.7 million school complex were shown to the Capitan School Board at the recent meeting. Jerry Lake and Steve Hundley architects for Kruger, Lake, Hutchinson and Brown Inc., reviewed the plans for a new grade school and high school.

Based on projected growth of the Capitan area, the buildings will have a maximum capacity of 500 students, that enrollment being projected for 1994.

Dr. Richards, Educational Consultant, stated, "It's a mistake if you didn't plan for growth - that's what's happening to New Mexico as a state."

The plans include separate buildings for Elementary and Jr. High-High School. The Elementary would have 15,350 sq. ft., high school would have 37,000 sq. ft. and an additional vocational building with 3,500. The total area would be 55,850 sq. ft., including an auditorium. This figure is based on the required 30 sq. ft. per pupil.

Lake stressed that the plans were just schematic. "Move along this kind of program, once you get bonded then go on to your complete needs." He added, "all final designs are dependent on money."

He then showed the Board estimated costs of the complex computed on an assumed price of \$55 per sq. ft.

Junior High and High School 7-12, plus equipment, furnishings, architectural fee and taxes would be \$2,401,463; Elementary 1-6, \$990,136; and a vocational building, \$227,166. With a site survey and soil analysis and a 2 1/2 percent contingency, the total is \$3.7 million.

The Board was shown an alternative to the vocational building when District Ranger, U.S. Forest Service reported on a proposed land trade with the school. The Board had earlier suggested a land swap with the Forest Service for the Capitan Work Station and Helitac Base.

Gordon stated, "the base is in an undesirable situation with the helicopter next to the school. It may be highly interesting to the students but it's not the safest in the world."

High Risks In The Farm-Ranch Business

A cowtown? Do people really say such things about Phoenix, Arizona? Well, not if they're from Phoenix.

It doesn't take a visitor long to see that the city of Phoenix is growing so fast that even census bureaus have thrown up their hands in disbelief. But ranchers and farmers see another problem at hand.

This 5 percent of the Arizona population that helps clothe and feed nearly 50 percent of the world is finding out that his urban brother know less about what he (the farmer-rancher) is doing.

Being in the age of computers,

mass communication and incredible knowledge all of us are confronted with tons (literally) of information each day. But being the intelligent discrete and up-to-date individuals that we are, we let much of this information slide from one ear canal to the other. We retain very little of these messages and usually - gold, beer and free - capture our attention somewhat longer.

One message the farmer-rancher has been trying to get across to his urban brother is the tremendous amount of gambling that has become crucial in the farmer-rancher's existence.

An initial investment of \$200,000 in equipment or animals and another \$100,000 in land can get a small rancher or farmer "into" the business. But noting a grain price fluctuation of just 10 cents a bushel and with a small amount of 10,000 bushels of what, it could mean a loss of \$1,000 instantly. And if cattle is the subject, 20,000 head of market animals - a 2 cent drop in prices, per hundred weight on a 1,000 pound steer means a loss of \$20 a head and in this case a \$400,000 loss! Unbelievable? You bet.

OK - so the risks are high, but anything that goes down must come up,

you inquire. True - at some infinite point in time. But farmers and ranchers deal with tangible products. Beef doesn't store in perfect condition until the price is right and cotton won't keep it's structure until the selling time is right. In agricultural products timing is everything.

Timing is also important to the fashion industry and gambling is second nature in the business world. But when was the last time you fixed yourself a bowl of designer scarves for breakfast, or roasted a hub-cap on your barbecue grill? It's not that we need to rid ourselves of these products, but I

think we need to rearrange our priorities. So far the farmer-rancher has not been on the priority list.

People can start this list by learning something about this process called agriculture by attending fairs and events that describe, depict and display agriculture.

The Arizona National Livestock Show has one of the largest displays of farm machinery and live animals anywhere in the country. And it's all in our backyard. A chance to actually see the equipment that a farmer must invest in to make the crops grow. A chance to view livestock that later

becomes lamb chops or round steaks. And most important of all to understand what these truly, last, self-employed businessmen (the farmer-rancher I'm talking about) are all about and the problems they face.

Building city - country cooperation. And maybe bringing back the romance of the ranch back to the city. That's what the Arizona National Livestock Show is all about on December 31 - January 7, 1979.

Of course we can solve the whole problem by just implementing a bumper sticker that I've seen - "Boycott Farmers, Don't Eat." - And that says it all.

CAPITAL

SANTA FE — If you're not opposed to betting, there's still time to get your money down on the gubernatorial race in New Mexico.

Just to be helpful, here's how the betting is going in the state's capital city. Smart money calls the race even, and bets that way — dollar for dollar. Some folks are hedging a bit and asking for points: my boy will win by so many votes and your boy will lose by so many votes. Loyalty money ("I'm for this guy, and I'll put my money where my mouth is" is going down, all or nothing, on the candidate of the bettor's choice.

One big reason for the even-steven position in the betting circles is the Zia Research poll aired by KOAT in Albuquerque. Though the results showed Bruce King with a slight edge, the difference between the two candidates had dropped steadily since the previous poll. In fact, they are so close together now that, utilizing the plus or minus four percentage points which are built into the polling process, the race is, for all intents and purposes, a dead heat.

But there's one trouble with polls of this kind: most of them are made by

picking up the telephone and calling people. That means you have to be connected to a phone to be counted in the results. So technically, all anyone can say about such a poll is that "this is the way telephone subscribers in New Mexico are likely to vote on November 7."

What about all the rest of the folks — the kind who don't subscribe to Ma Bell, or who keep their phone numbers secret?

Nobody knows what they're thinking — and they could be the people who make the difference.

That's because, this year, the governor's race is extremely tight. Most of the time, shrewd political observers in the state can pretty well predict the results, without recourse to the necromancy of polling. Both the Lujan vs. Hawk and the Demencia vs. Anaya race are pretty easy to predict, for example. But the race for the

Statehouse is a super tight one; it may be long past midnight on November 7-8 before that one is decided. So one or two persons polled or not polled can make a difference when you're predicting the result of that one.

One group which may make a big difference are what we may call, though not very politely, the liars. Those are the folks who just plain won't tell you their plans, or if they do, will throw you off by not telling the truth. Lots of people like that around nowadays; they keep their own counsel tell they get inside the voting machines, and they don't take kindly to snoopers who want to know before hand what they're going to do.

Another group who don't get polled adequately are the older folks. Some can't afford telephones, on fixed incomes, and some just plain won't tell you what they plan to do. Yet every vote count shows that they take balloting

seriously. They show up, and they vote relatively independently.

This time, with things as close as they are, either of these relatively

unmeasurable blocks could be the deciding factor.

The candidates should realize that, and that ought to be out wooing voters of these two kinds of all they're worth.

TEXTS OF CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS TO BE VOTED ON AT THE NOVEMBER 7, 1978, GENERAL ELECTION

UNDER LINED MATERIAL IS NEW AND OVER LINED MATERIAL IS WORDING BEING DELETED
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 6, SECTION 32 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO, AUTHORIZING THE JUDICIAL STANDARDS COMMISSION TO REMOVE THE DISCIPLINE OR REMOVAL FROM OFFICE OF ANY JUDGE OR MAGISTRATE UNDER CERTAIN CIRCUMSTANCES.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 6, Section 32 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:
"There is created the 'judicial standards commission' consisting of two justices or judges and two lawyers selected as may be provided by law to serve for terms of four years, and five citizens, none of whom is a justice, judge or magistrate, to be appointed to practice law in this state, who shall be appointed by the governor for five-year staggered terms as may be provided by law. If a position on the commission becomes vacant for any reason, the successor shall be selected by the original appointing authority in the same manner as the original appointment was made and shall serve for the remainder of the term vacated. No act of the commission is valid unless concurred in by a majority of its members. The commission shall select one of the members appointed by the governor to serve as chairman.

In accordance with this section, any justice, judge or magistrate of any court may be disciplined or removed for willful misconduct in office, (to-wit: willful persistent failure or inability to perform the duties of his office, habitual intemperance, or he may be retired for disability seriously interfering with the performance of his duties which is, or it likely to become, a permanent disability) or if the commission may, after investigation it deems necessary, order a hearing to be held before it for the purpose of disciplining, removing or retiring any justice, judge or magistrate. The commission may appoint three masters who are justices or judges of courts of record to hear and take evidence in the hearing and to report their findings to the commission. In considering the record and the findings and report of the masters, if the commission finds good cause, it shall recommend to the Supreme Court the discipline, removal or retirement of the justice, judge or magistrate. The Supreme Court shall review the record of the proceedings on the facts and may permit the introduction of additional evidence and it shall order the discipline, removal or retirement as it finds just and proper or wholly reject the recommendation. Upon an order for retirement, any justice, judge or magistrate participating in a statutory retirement program shall be retired with the same rights as if he had retired pursuant to the retirement program. Upon an order for removal of a justice, judge or magistrate shall thereby be removed from office.

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

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Belco - Two Reasons Why In ZoZo

I have sat down many times in the last few weeks and thought of things to be included in the Belco story. But as in most stories as a person goes along, one thing will catch his interest. One thing will stand head and shoulders above the rest.

At the luncheon for Belco I found myself feeling that the big picture of the story was not presented. What was presented was the regular luncheon jokes and a few pats on the back for Jim and Carolyn.

The pats on the back do not make up for all of the sleepless nights and working weekends, but it helps. What was not mentioned just could not be mentioned. You have to see it to understand it.

In last week's paper and in this article are the pictures of the people of Belco. As you look at these people, as you see them where they work, you see two things. First you see a family. A very close group of people that are proud of their product. Second and

most important you see a group of people that are proud of themselves.

These people had to be trained for each position. It takes time and understanding to work 35 people into one unit.

Jim and Carolyn go back a long ways. Both attended Las Cruces High School, Jim being from Tennessee but the West held his love.

Jim went into the Marines from high school and learned a trade, Radio Communications, Carolyn went into office management. Both worked for IBM in El Paso, she as head receptionist, he on a technical basis.

In a lot of ways, many of the Belco employees are like Jim and Carolyn. They wanted to feel like a family. Harold Scott was Carolyn's brother and a partnership started in 1972 in Dallas, through several twists of fate, Jim was in El Paso on a contract to make air conditioners for the Army buses, Scott air conditioners they were called. While in Dallas the partnership was

making arc welders, only these were the conventional kind. With the 1973 shortages, the welder company was stymied with a lack of materials, and so started experimenting on a light weight model.

Scott Air was the company that approached BSI (Bank Securities, Inc.) through vice president Bob Hoffman and asked if they, BSI, knew of any towns looking for a small industry.

The Cantrells came to Carrizozo, liked what they saw and stayed. They first set up shop in a small office while one of the inticements, the old power plant, was fixed up. Seems Mayor Johnson Stearns, also president of Citizens State Bank, a member of BSI, had heard about Scott Air, and as Carrizozo had been trying for several years to get a small industry, all that remained was to offer the old power building that wasn't being used anymore.

So much for history, what happened then was one by one the work force in Carrizozo grew as trained workers.

Carrizozo has more that its share of untrained workers so this was a bonanza in several ways, first the people themselves grew in self esteem, and second the tax base of the town grew. The first is what is important.

At first the people in shipping could barely believe their eyes that this welder was going to Florida, or Iran, or Sweden. The thought that something they had done was going around the world was amazing. Now if you ask any of the workers they will say "Of course, they are the best welders in the world." Senator Pete Domenici was here

Monday and it was obvious that he was impressed by Belco. He, the United States Senator, and he, the working man, both were impressed by this group of people, this family of people.

and several signs on their buildings, but Belco in Carrizozo is a spirit among workers and a direction for a whole town.




