## BLM Denies Airport Proposal

The Bureau of Land Management last Thursday denied a request for land to build the proposed regional airport because "the airport was not compatible with the existing use of the land," and that "the existing use of the land as a research facility with New

Mexico State University along with the New Mexico State Game and Fish Department was in the greater nation interest."

The BLM stated that the airport would be in a local interest where as the research benefits people throughout the

United States.

The decision said, "The livestock interests, wildlife groups, conservation organizations and other research oriented institutions both in state and out of state all opposed the development because of the need for the data produced by the research programs."

The Bureau continued, "The University (NMSU) has shown that the proposed airport development would remove lands from the very heart of the research area and would thus eliminate or disrupt several important ongoing research programs, including several years of research data base."

"The need to continue long-term research studies on an existing data base is critical to providing accurate information and arriving at correct conclusions," the decision said.

Proponents of the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport have until December 29, 1978 to protest the decision to the secretary of the Interior.

The application to build an airport on 3,043 acres of public land at Fort Stanton was filed by the Federal Aviation Administration on behalf of the Mescalero Apache Tribe, Lincoln County and the communities of Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs and Capitan.

The research efforts at Fort Stanton began in 1954 when the pastures were started passively. The active research began in 1964 when the pastures were ready for the research projects. In 1970 the research was listed in a 20 year agreement between

the BLM and New Mexico State University.

A 20 year agreement was necessary for New Mexico State University to obtain the required funding for the research projects.

Other reasons listed for the airport to be turned down, included the possible tax increases for operating expenses and the disruption of the peaceful rural atmosphere.

The announcement of the rejection of the application was made by BLM state Director Arthur Zimmerman stating, "The information provided firmly supports the ongoing research program as being in the greater national interest, the use of which is provided for by a legally binding agreement."


To write in a vote all one has to do is lift the cover upward on the slot labeled above the race that they want to write a name into.

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almost all over except for the shouting as New Mexico voters get set to go to the polls November 7 and cast their ballots in a number of Statewide contests and some "pistol-hot" legislative contest.

The recent television confrontations between Republican gubernatorial candidate Joe Skeen and Democrat hopeful Bruce King did little to add to either man's vote totals, although campaign staffers were breathing big sighs of relief that their candidates did not pull any mammoth boners.

Surprisingly, this reporter talked to a number of undecided voters in the Albuquerque Heights area and found

no one who had any "meanmouthing" for either candidate.

Most of the "undecideds" were queried said they liked both men and were just waiting to make up their minds which candidate they like the most.

The wall-leaners of course, will question just how many of those undecided voters will ever make it to the polls.

At this point in time, both candidates hope they have peaked in the gubernatorial contest and hopefully can maintain a plateau — without losing any votes — between now and election day.

This reporter still feels the race between King-Skeen will be closer than most of the polls have predicted. And as we've said right along, the contest between Toney Anaya and Pete Domenici will be WAY closer than the pollsters crystal-balled.

LFC - Retirement Study: The

Legislative Finance Committee is digesting its quarter-million-dollar contract study of public retirement plans in New Mexico.

The LFCers have been reading through a lengthy report by Howard Winklevoss of Philadelphia, which contains some pretty heavy recommendations — ten pages worth, as a matter of fact.

One recommendation that will trigger some headlines later is the suggestion that the LFC evaluate "the salary structure of judges and articulate a policy as to whether or not the pension plan is to be used as an instrument of increasing the jurists' compensation . . ."

Another recommendation — a major one — is that New Mexico adopt an overall set of pension planning principles and establish a permanent pension commission to monitor those ideas and any proposed changes.

The contract study also recommends exclusion of Comprehensive

Employment and Training Act (CETA) employees from participation in the retirement system of New Mexico . . . with the proviso that service credit could be brought in . . . or both in . . . if the employee is permanently hired by the state.

With these sort of recommendations and Senate Majority Floor Leader C.B. Trujillo's observation that retirement legislation will be one of the most "humane" matters of the 1979 session, the meeting of the lawmakers in January unquestionably will generate reams of headlines in the retirement area.

Don't Say We Didn't Tell You.

The Great Wall of Santa Fe: Months ago this column commented that the next governor would have to decide the future of the governor's reception room art gallery.

Initiated by first lady Clara Apodaca, the gallery has emerged as one of the more important public relation functions of the governor's

office. Plus the gallery has attracted thousands of visitors each month.

When the Apodaca administration first proposed the idea, it received static from some Round Housers who balked at the idea of using the reception room walls to hang paintings and works of art.

The answer to that objection came in the fashion of a false wall — built out from the existing wall.

It's been the belief of most wall-leaners that when Apodaca left office, the false wall would be dismantled — should the next governor decide against continuance of the art gallery.

But now the gossip crowd has learned that when the governor's office was recaptured several years ago — the carpet was laid only to the false wall — not the original one.

In short, if the next governor dumps the art gallery — it's going to cost a pretty penny to restore the reception area to its original state . . . including more new carpet! Don say we didn't tell you.







## Inside the Capital

SANTA FE—Remember when they taught poetry in schools?

There was a poem of Rudyard Kipling's, written on the close of Queen Victoria's diamond jubilee, that had two lines like this: "The tumult and the shouting dies, The Captains and the Kings depart..."

The words could apply to the close of a political campaign in New Mexico.

American campaigns probably go on too long. They are marked by too many intrusions into our lives, by television, radio and telephone; they are a disturbance to our normal lives; and, by the time they are ended, the average citizen may be bored silly.

There are some people who aren't bored—the professional and semi-professional politicians. During much of the campaign, they sit quietly, biding their time. They don't start to gear up for action till most citizens have grown tired of death of candidates and their campaign promises. They save their strength for the waning days of the campaign.

What they're concentrating on right now is the get-out-the-vote effort,

homing in on you to get you to help, then get their particular man or woman into office.

Here's how that works.

During the long, dreary months while the candidates are criss-crossing the state, they stay home and cultivate their gardens—a precinct, a ward, a county—hoping to locate the voters who are for their man.

They knock on doors, and as friendly neighbors, urge you to support their candidate. After they leave your door, they note down the reception they have received.

In larger counties, they use "boiler rooms"—areas full of phones and callers, who man the phones for hours a day, whenever they are likely to find people home. Sometimes they make a straight-out plea for their candidate, sometimes they pretend they're making surveys. But always their aim is to find out how you plan to vote.

What results is a consolidated list of "preferred voters"—those who are for the candidate of their choice—in "preferred precincts"—the area in which their man or woman should run well.

On election day, their job is to see that all those "preferred voters" get to the polls.

hour or so they call headquarters to report which "preferreds" have not yet signed in. Those who are still absent are liable to get a call, an offer to help in getting to the polls and a stern lecture on their duty to vote by 7:00 p.m.

It's an effective system, worked out by trial and error over many years. Those who use it best usually end up being elected; those who just sit home

They call to be sure you have transportation; they provide rides; and all day long, they are checking the polls to see if the "preferreds" have voted. That's easy to do. Poll watchers just note down the number beside your name when you sign in to vote. Every

on election day and hope usually end up on the Wednesday following the balloting as bridesmaids, not as brides.

So don't be surprised if you get phone calls from strangers in these closing days of the campaign. And don't be shocked if one campaign

headquarters or another thinks you're important enough to call on election day.

All that effort is just New Mexico-type democracy at work, getting out the vote—and making sure it goes the way it should.

### Dying of Trees Around New Homes:

Many homeowners who move into new  
subdivisions with established trees are  
distressed to find that their trees are  
dying after they have been in the new  
home for six months or so. The deaths  
of these trees may be attributed to  
several factors. One of the most  
common is a change in the soil grade  
around the tree. When several inches of  
soil is added about the tree's root  
system, it often excludes oxygen and  
kills the roots, of course, the rest of the  
trees soon dies, too. On the other hand,  
grading three or more inches under the  
spread of the tree disturbs many of the  
feeder roots and causes them to die. As  
a consequence, death of the tree.

Construction equipment, such as  
heavy concrete trucks and bulldozers,  
compact the soil and kill the roots. In  
addition to this, when new subdivisions  
go in, there is a change in water table  
due to construction of streets, storm  
sewers and deep ditches which remove  
water from the lots, water that ordi-  
narily would have soaked into the  
soils supplying water for the tree roots.

These are some of the factors that  
cause the loss of trees in new sub-  
divisions or where new homes are  
constructed. Home buyers, as well as  
those planning to build, should realize  
these factors in their plans for a tree-  
shaded homestead.







# Hunters should utilize time preparing hunt

The door is constantly opening and closing, the phone is ringing off the wall, and the daily mail is full of letters post-marked from all over the U.S.

That is the way it has been here in the Roswell office of the New Mexico Game and Fish Department this week as the first deadline for New Mexico's special species hunt has come and gone.

Now that the application deadline has passed for public antelope and bighorn sheep licenses, applicants will be anxiously awaiting the computer drawing for those species, while eyeing approaching deadlines for elk, Barbary sheep, oryx, ibex and javelina.

Without a doubt, ready or not, the

1978 hunting seasons are upon us.

Therefore, hunters should utilize what little time is left to prepare themselves for their hunts before the seasons start.

The very first thing each person considering hunting in New Mexico should do is to obtain a big game proclamation from one of our offices or license vendors.

Read the proclamation carefully in its entirety noting particularly areas, open and closed, season dates, application deadlines, and special rules and regulations. Then, concentrate your thoughts on the sections concerning those species you want to hunt.

Should you have trouble understanding any part of the proclamation contact your local game and fish officer for assistance.

Once you have decided upon what game you are going to hunt and have obtained your license for that species, start preparing yourself physically and mentally.

If you have been inactive physically since last hunting season, get out and walk, do some exercises, even ride a bike. Start slowly, but increase your output as you progress in order to improve your endurance.

Decide in advance of the season's opening what area you are going to

hunt. Obtain maps of the area and make a few trips into it to familiarize yourself. Visit with locals in the area about recent weather factors, game observations, and areas closed to hunting.

If you have youngsters under 18 years of age that will be hunting with you, make sure they have successfully completed the required hunter training course and have the card in their possession which states they have done so. If the cards have been lost, have them replaced now.

In final preparation, review until you know completely the rules and regulations pertaining to the species

you are hunting.

Note license requirements, bag limits, shooting hours, limited areas of hunting, and weapon restrictions.

Also be aware of the general regulations which pertain to all hunters in all seasons. For example, it is unlawful to leave a campfire burning and unattended, just as it is unlawful to camp within 300 yards of a stock-watering area.

Keep one thing in mind as the seasons approach, & that is that you cannot judge the success of your hunt on whether you bag your game or not.

Obviously with the costs of hunting licenses, vehicle fuels, guns, am-

munition, and camping gear, subsistence hunting is a thing of the past. Your costs per pound of wild game meat far surpass the costs of meat that can be obtained over the supermarket counter.

Instead, hunting today is sport hunting. That is, you must accept the challenges which confront you, including expenses, time, competition, and game.

Judge your success on if you have had good companionship, a memorable experience, and respect and appreciation for the great out-of-doors.

When you do, you too, will be a sport hunter.

# Many Uses for the Commonly used Potato

Potatoes in Main Dish... Add Color to Any Meal: Russet, red, tan - changing leaves aren't nature's only Fall display of many colors. Each variety of potato, through white inside, wears its own particular skin hue, too. Favorable weather and larger plantings of a colorful array of potatoes will yield an abundant harvest - greater than either of the past two years - according to the U.S. Dept. of Ag. Potatoes are being grown and harvested somewhere in the U.S. all year long. But the fall crop is the largest and may be stored for 9 to 12 months, allowing good supplies on the market all year long. This year's active

harvest of the big crop is pushing shipping-point prices downward, reports USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service. Potatoes grown near to us in Lincoln County are at their peak supply.

Baked, roasted, creamed, hash browned, au gratin, curried, souffled, chips, shoestrings, dehydrated, canned - in whatever form or fashion you serve them - potatoes can be the star of any meal or snack. Try these main dishes along with a salad and dessert for hearty lunches or light suppers.

### Potato Cheese Puff

3 egg yolks, beaten

1/4 cup milk  
3 cups mashed, seasoned potatoes  
1 teaspoon grated onion  
1 tablespoon chopped parsley  
2 cups cheddar cheese, coarsely shredded  
3 egg whites, beaten stiffly  
Combine egg yolks and milk. Add remaining ingredients, except for the egg whites; beat well. Fold egg whites into mixture. Bake in greased 2-quart baking dish in a 375 degree oven for 40 to 45 minutes, or until a knife inserted in the center comes out clean and the top is browned. Serve immediately. Yield: 6 servings - about 1 cup each.

### Potato Kugel

6 potatoes, grated & drained  
3 eggs, well beaten  
1/2 cup bread crumbs  
Salt and Pepper to taste  
1 onion, grated  
4 tablespoons melted shortening  
Mix eggs with potatoes, bread crumbs, salt, pepper, onion and melted shortening. Turn into a greased baking dish and bake for 1 hour in a 375 degree oven.

### Potato & Frankfurter Soup


2 cups diced potatoes  
1 small onion, sliced  
1 1/2 cups boiling water  
2 frankfurters

1/4 teaspoons salt  
Pepper  
2 cups milk  
2 tablespoons minced parsley  
Cook potatoes and onion in boiling water until soft. Put through a ricer or mash slightly.

Cut frankfurters into 1/4-inch slices. Add frankfurters, seasonings and milk to potato mixture. Heat thoroughly, add parsley and serve.

For Variety - Salsal or other lunch meat, cut in pieces, may be used instead of frankfurters. Allow one slice per person. Or sprinkle the soup with chopped cooked ham before serving.
