## Van Norman Chosen To Demo Nat'l Convention

R.L. Van Norman of Capitan has been chosen at the State Democratic convention to be one of two delegates from the South part of New Mexico to the National Democratic convention in Memphis, Tennessee, December 7th to the 10th.

Twelve members from New Mexico will be present with 5 of the members being state officials.

Most people in Lincoln County know R.L. Van Norman simply as "Van".

As he puts it, "This is a chance for the policies of the Democratic party to be set for the next two years."

"What makes this convention significant is that elections are over and this is an attempt on the part of the

Democratic party to use these workshops to learn what the people are concerned about and find solutions for the problems," Van Norman said.

Van also indicated that the topics which range from inflation to national health care will be discussed in work shops with each topic fully discussed.

As he put it, "The question of stopping inflation will be right with National Health Care. If people want lower taxes and less government spending, and also want National Health Care, then it should be pointed out that both can't happen at the same time."

Much of the input to the national democratic party will be from "grass roots" people such as Van Norman, who every day have to deal with the problems of our country on the local level.



If you are buying firewood you need to know what a cord of wood is. A cord is actually a way to measure wood by volume — 128 cubic feet. Since most firewood is cut in two-foot pieces, a cord is usually thought of as a rectangular stack of 2-foot pieces, four feet high in a 16-foot long stack.

In situations when it is not practical to store a cord of wood, it can be purchased a few pieces at a time. The price per pound is usually slightly higher than wood bought by the cord. Advertised prices generally refer to wood cut into two-foot lengths and delivered to your house. There may be an additional \$10 to \$15 per cord if you expect the supplier to stack the wood instead of dumping it on your driveway.

However, if you choose the cheaper route of wood delivery, you have no immediate way to know if you have received a full cord. Therefore, be sure you know how to get in touch with the supplier in case you do not get a full cord. While this is rarely a problem with resident brokers, it does happen in some transient operations.

In general, hardwoods such as oak are better for fires than soft woods. For example, pine burns better than cottonwood. However, if cottonwood is available locally and pine must be hauled several hundred miles, the price difference quickly overcomes the heating advantage. In Lincoln County, pine, oak, pinon and juniper are most used firewoods. Applewood is also an

excellent wood for fires if you live near a large orchard which has a systematic pruning system.

After you have secured the wood, it is vitally important that you season it. Use wood that has air-dried for about six months or more. There is about 20 percent more heat value in seasoned wood than in freshly cut wood.

### Checks Totalling \$1.6 Million —

# Unemployment Takes Big Jump

Unemployment Insurance compensation checks totalling nearly \$1.6 million were issued out of work New Mexicans and former residents during October. W.A. Anderson, Employment Services Division Director with the Department of Human Services, said 5,832 initial claims were filed in New Mexico during the month.

"This is an increase of about 1,000 claims over September," Anderson said. "The number of claims filed usually climbs noticeably towards the

end of November, in tune with seasonal employment changes." The October increase was partially due to claims by CETA (Comprehensive Employment

and Training Act) workers who were laid off. These claimants, along with other state and local government workers, agricultural laborers and domestics, would formerly have applied under other federal programs. Under a change in the law which became effective this year, these workers now file for state benefits.

"In addition to claims filed by newly covered workers, bad weather in the part of the state during October increased claims," Anderson said. "We hope part of that increase was simply due to temporary employment fluctuations."

The number of checks issued in New Mexico came to 22,611 in October, compared with 20,987 in September. More than 30,600 weeks were claimed against New Mexico. About 2,000 weeks of unemployment were claimed by former Federal Civil Service employees and recently released military.

The King fund-raiser should clear any outstanding obligations "Big Bruce" has from the primary and general election, since the Stanley rancher is not exactly a campaign spendthrift.

Surprisingly, little has been said about the efforts of Larry Ingram, State Democrat Chairman, and his mop-up job on past and current debts of the Demo Party Organization.

According to our figures—and they are NOT official—Ingram took over the job right after the primary with the Party some \$17,000 in the hole.

Our sources say the Tucumcari politico not only paid off the 17,000 bucks but took care of all other outstanding debts (of a fiscal nature) more than one week ago.

Crystal Ball Department: Don't make any predictions on what the Legislature will do to try and dole out some assistance to the underprivileged in the area of food and drug purchases.

Bruce King has his advisors checking now to see what the mechanics would entail to cut the gross receipts on food and drugs—but, efforts in the past have really run into blank walls.

Bumper stickers reading "Ax the Food Tax" are starting to show up on Santa Fe vehicles—the sticker an open support of the proposals to dump the so-called "sales tax" on foods and drugs.

At first glance, such a tax cut would seem to have unanimous support, but old-timers who have studied the mechanics in the past say it could cause a multitude of problems.

Those problems include less money for already financially-strapped city, and the need for sophisticated expensive cash registers to compute both taxable and non-taxable sales at large outlets such as supermarkets.

Kelly Salute: Fourth Floor sources say Gov. Jerry Apodaca is scheduled to make an appearance next month at a Capital City benefit during which Santa

Fe singing star Kelly Garrett will perform.

Apodaca will proclaim December 17th as Kelly Garrett day in New Mexico and will salute her contributions to her hometown and State.

It could be one of Apodaca's final public appearances as Chief Executive.

Measles Confab: Our sources say the Federal Health, Education and Welfare people in Washington, D. C. soon will announce a conference dealing with measles in the United States.

The Land OF Enchantment presently has the longest string of months without a reported case of measles—more than twelve consecutive months.

Our information says the Feds will salute New Mexico's record by asking the State Health and Environment Department to make a presentation at the measles confab.

It's expected that State Public Health Officer Dr. Jonathan Mann will deliver the State's story on or about December 12th in the nation's Capital.

Health officials in this state feel there is a direct correlation between this state's anti-measles success and the State's compulsory school immunization law for students.

Transition Chatter: Hardly anybody noticed, but Bill Stephens, the Apodaca Cabinet Secretary for Agriculture is one of the guys locked in to his post.

It's true. Popular Stephens serves as Cabinet Secretary for Agriculture not as a gubernatorial appointee, but as the head of the agriculture department at New Mexico State University at Las Cruces.

More Transition Chatter: While most of the headlines concern Bruce King's choices for top Cabinet posts, insiders say the King people are talking reorganization "turkey" with their legal beagles.

Our sources report the King staffers want a determination of just what is mandatory and what is discretionary under the State Government reorganization, which took effect last Spring and was approved by the last Legislature.

Right now, it appears as if the Cabinet structure with twelve secretaries really is the only "heavy must" under the law.

It also looks as if the Governor-elect could order "lower echelon em-

ployees" who serve under the Cabinet Secretaries to report directly to him.

Just as a sidelight: There has been much talk about waiting to see how the reorganized State Government will operate—in fact, that's just about all either gubernatorial candidate would say during the general election campaign.

However, there appears to be just as much ignorance about how the reorganized State Government DOES operate on the part of some of the new Administration people.

Sign of the Times: One old-timer was keeping count of the faces showing up at the King transitional offices on the Third Floor of the Round House.

Surprisingly, he told us a big bulk of the people applying for jobs were absolute newcomers to the political scene—he had never seen their faces anywhere before.

That's one of the things this column has been predicting—that a big bunch of newcomers are on their way—and fast. And they'll need jobs badly.

# Inside the Capitol . . . .

**By FRED McCAFFREY**  
**SANTA FE**—People who watch legislative sessions closely are already betting that the 60-day meeting scheduled for 1979 will have to be held over in a special session. Reason: an extraordinary number of difficult bills almost sure to be introduced.  
 Here are some we already know we can look for.  
 Elimination of "sales tax" on medicine and food: Will be a part of the Governor's package of bills and already has wide support in both House and Senate.

**Right to Work:** Should pass the House handily, but may have more trouble in the Senate. Governor-elect hopes for a clause calling for a referendum of the voters.  
**"Deorganization":** There will be many efforts to iron out problems, real or imaginary, in Apodaca reorganization plan. Major effects on State Police and what is now Employment Security Division of Department of Human Services are to be expected. Other bills may come, to take care of pet agencies of various legislators.

**Liquor Laws:** There will be usual calls for changes, with some concrete results. Bill to allow sale of wine and beer only in eating establishments, with no cocktails or hard liquor, may pass. Some for attempt to establish a Liquor Commission, five-man board to oversee liquor control operation. As usual, liquor interests will be out in force to lobby all legislators.  
**Property taxes:** Most legislators agree there is need for a change. Trouble is, they can't agree on what it is. They may at least abolish the state's portion of present property tax, order

full study for following session.  
**Election code:** New laws will call for purge of those who fail to vote at least every second year, maybe yearly. Look for proposals to include fuller reporting requirements for state-wide candidates. Efforts will also be made to do away with pre-primary nominating conventions.  
**Highway funds and Commissioners:** Need for additional tax sources for Highway Trust Fund will have to be addressed. One suggestion is to add "sales tax" to price of gasoline, in effort to find revenue which rises with inflation, as cost of road-building does. There will also be a push, which probably won't succeed, to return the Commission to its old status, with Commissioners who are difficult to

remove, who in turn choose the head of the Department, rather than his being chosen by Governor.  
**Usury limits:** Bankers and other financial organizations will probably ask raising of limits on interest ceiling, due to high rates they must pay on borrowed money. They feel present top rate allowed is unrealistic in today's money market.  
**Utilities:** Some cities are banding together to seek a law allowing them to purchase power-generating plants and utilities, as group rather than as single municipalities. This should meet opposition from the power companies, who may prevail.  
**Children's code:** One effort at change will be to make first hearings on delinquency matters, now closed, open to

public. Law officers consider present system gives kids one "free" crime.  
**Open meetings:** News media want clearer definition of "personnel" matters, which are excluded from present law.  
 These and many other matters will keep lawmakers' noses to the grindstone in early 1979. Other legislation proposed will be reviewed here as more details become available.

## Inside The Outdoors

By Gary Dollahan

Now that you bird hunters have had a chance to limber up the actions on your shotguns on quail and waterfowl and have made-up all those excuses for not bringin' the "meat" home, you should be ready for the rapidly approaching prairie chicken and pheasant hunts.

Prairie chicken season is December 2 thru December 4, and pheasant season is December 9 thru December 12. (Refer to Bird Proclamation for prairie chicken hunt area.)

The lesser prairie chicken, the species inhabiting eastern New Mexico,

is one of the four subspecies known, all of which are unique to North America. However, one species, the eastern prairie chicken, or heath hen, became extinct in the 1930's.

In New Mexico the lesser prairie chicken's main area of concentration is in the Roosevelt and northern Lea counties. However, observations in the 1960's indicated light populations occurring in Lea, Eddy, Chaves, De Baca, Guadalupe, and Curry Counties.

Early records have shown the prairie chicken to have formerly inhabited all of the sandhill country in eastern New Mexico. As the disappearance of these birds from much of their former range occurred, concern for the welfare of the prairie chicken was voiced in the early 1930's.

No legal hunting was allowed from this time until 1948, and then again no hunting between 1950 and 1958. In addition, the trapping and trans-

planting of wild birds was attempted from 1932 through 1934, from 1943 through 1945, and in 1947 to restore prairie chickens to uninhabited ranges.

However, these transplants were not successful. J. Stokley Ligon, renowned New Mexico wildlife specialist, reported in 1961 that the transplanted birds had a tendency to return to their home range.

The Department's concern and interest in prairie chicken management was stressed in 1940 as they began the purchase of land in the major prairie chicken concentration areas. These areas have been further developed to exclude or control livestock, and establish watering units, feeders, and shelters.

Prairie chickens, often seen in flocks of hundreds are interesting birds to watch, whether it be with shotgun in hand, or a camera.

Pheasants also have an interesting

background. Natives to Asia, pheasants have been a permanent part of the state's bird life since about the 1920's.

The ring-necked pheasant, the Afghan white-winged pheasants, and their crosses, are found in New Mexico.

In the 1870's, an unrecorded number of pheasants, possibly English pheasants are said to have been released by the famous cattleman John Chisum in the Pecos Valley near Hagerman. However, this planting evidently failed.

The first definitely dated attempt to stock pheasants in New Mexico was in 1916 when Aldo Leopold released a number of ringnecks in the Rio Grande Valley near Albuquerque. Again, the release apparently failed.

The Department of Game and Fish attempted its first releases in 1929. In that year, 296 birds were released in various locations. Within the next

sixteen years, 3,302 pheasants were released by the state. It was during this period, by 1940, that pheasants had established homes in most of the state's suitable habitat, mainly in the Rio Grande and Pecos Valleys.

Several methods of obtaining pheasants and pheasant eggs for transplanting were experimented with initially. However, in the spring of 1946, the Department purchased the Ligon Game Farm just outside of Carlsbad and enlarged it as the State Bird Farm for the production of native and exotic game birds.

From 1946 to 1958, 70,000 ring-necked pheasants were produced at the farm and released in the state. 1959 marked the last release of ringnecks by the state.

The Afghan white-winged pheasants received culturing attention at the Carlsbad farm in 1958. Three cocks and two hens had been wild-

trapped in Afghanistan and sent to New Mexico through the Foreign Game Introduction Program of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

At first, propagation efforts were directed at a ring-necked and white-winged cross, which was successful. However, soon it was realized that a pure strain of Afghans could survive in New Mexico. White-winged releases were performed in various areas of the state through the 1960's.

The outlook for pheasant populations in the state will remain good as long as there is no major change in agricultural practices and grain and alfalfa farming exists in large numbers.

As it comes time to seek the elusive prairie chicken and pheasant, remember to respect private land and trespass rights. Since most of these birds utilize private farmlands, permission is required to gain access.




