Mental Health Meeting Held

A group of 35 interested people attended an organizational meeting for the Lincoln County Mental Health Association held Monday night in the Capitan School cafeteria. Officer Jack Johnson of the State Police headed up the meeting. Johnson is a member of the Area 6 Mental Health Board in Otero County and also a participant of the Crisis Intervention Program now being started in Lincoln County.

Present at the Capitan meeting was Karen Conway who is also on the Otero County Mental Health Board. Ms. Conway informed the group of how it could be organized using the

Alamogordo Center as an example. She voiced the enthusiasm and support of the Alamogordo Board to form a Mental Health Center here in Lincoln County. She invited a committee of Lincoln County representatives to attend a Board meeting in Alamogordo on December 18 in order to get a good idea on organization, purposes, and goals of a counseling center.

Dr. Mike Hickey also representing the Otero Center informed the group of the kinds of areas under consideration. These include children-parent relationship problems, alcoholism, drug abuse and marriage as specific

areas where counseling can be of help.

Federal funding totaling \$142,000 is available with 90 percent of this earmarked for Lincoln County mental health projects. In addition, the County will provide \$4,290. The funds will be used for office space, a 5-person staff, and needed resource materials. Mr. Don Hoover is the Program Coordi-

inator and he is still taking applications for a nurse and secretary. Interested persons may contact him at the Mental Health Counseling Center in Alamogordo, phone 437-7404. The Center is located at 809 Delaware.

A steering committee was selected from the members present. These include Mindy Bates of Ruidoso; Jetty

Jo Paul-Carrizozo; Dorcy Grover-Ruidoso; Lucy Wilson-Fort Stanton; Dale Houseley-Carrizozo; and Father William Young of Ruidoso. The Committee will send 3 representatives to the December 18th Board meeting in Alamogordo and will then call a follow-up meeting to report on organizational aspects and nominate officers for the Lincoln County Association.

My Time by Mike Swickard

Several people have asked me in the last week what became of the last two columns. As I explained: I sat down before the typewriter those two weeks and thought of something to say and seeing that I had nothing to say... MS

Went out hunting in the third hunt to see if the stories about lack of deer were true. They were true. I saw a lot of predator's tracks but very few deer tracks. I believe there is a connection. But what I did get was a few "sworn to" stories from the other hunters.

One guy told me of trying to teach his wife to hunt deer. Seems he set her up at the edge of a clearing and then worked around to the other side to chase the deer into the clearing. Presently he heard a shot and hurrying back to the clearing he saw his wife pointing her rifle at a man standing over a dead animal saying, "Honest lady it's your deer, I just want to get my saddle off." Another guy told a searching behind every tree, up every hill and down the other side and changed to not even see a deer.

Discussed and tired he headed back to Amarillo in his new Jeep Waggoner at sunset of the last day.

Along about Lincoln he ran into a 8 point 250 lb. buck totalling out the front end of his car. MS

But I didn't have any good stories to tell about hunting so I decided to try fishing. I figured it would make up for the deer that I didn't even see, if I could "land the big one." It was a cold but sunny day when I went to my favorite spring some distance from here. Along with my favorite tackle I carried a lunch that I had made for myself consisting of coffee, sandwich and a plastic container of my own home cooked posole. Tucked neatly in my tackle box was a package of Roloids to ease the effects of the posole.

I usually bait a small hook with salmon eggs and let it drift down with the current, then retrieve it slowly. As I worked by way down the stream I spotted a huge Rainbow trout lying in a deep pool. I drifted my baited line down and bumped him on the nose. He never even flinched. I took a handful of eggs and tossed them in the current. The trout eagerly gobbled up all, but the cluster containing my hook. I tried every hook, lure, and fly in my tackle box. The big fish seemed to be grinning as he watched all of my best efforts. I sat and pondered the situation for a moment. Suddenly I was struck with a brilliant idea. I took out the posole and dumped the hole container full into the pool. I looked gleefully as the Rainbow ate with gusto. After about half an hour, the trout began to swim in circles and rolling his eyes.

I then offered him a lure I knew he couldn't resist, a Rolaid taped by my hook. After a seesaw battle I landed my prize.

After much experimenting I have found that half of a container of my home cooked posole is sufficient for even the most stubborn fish. MS

There are 16 members of the Recorder players which is also known as a Fippel flute and is played facing the flute instead of out to the side of the face.



REPORT CARDS:

Report cards were distributed on Tuesday, November 28.

FOR YOUR INFORMATION:

The form of sports with which the public is most familiar is interscholastic athletics, which is formal competition in designated sports between schools of comparable size. The primary objective of interscholastic competition is to play the game, play the game well and to win the game. Traditionally, all schools may compete in football, basketball, track, baseball, softball, and volleyball. Larger schools may compete in individual sports such as swimming, golf, wrestling, cross country, and tennis. In New Mexico schools are divided for competition in all athletics according to the number of students enrolled in grades 9-12.

Carrizozo is a Class A school; we have fewer than 150 students in grades 9-12. Class AA schools such as Hatch have from 151-400 students in high school. Class AAA schools such as Tularosa and Ruidoso have 401-1,200 students while Class AAAA schools such as Alamogordo have over 1,200 students in grades 9-12. Among the reasons for the breakdown is that the more students in a school, the more chances exist for really talented athletes. In a small school most of the students have to participate in athletics or have the opportunity to do so. In a small school, athletes usually have to work very hard for their successes. In a larger school usually only the talented and skilled participate in athletics; only those students with perseverance and determination make the team and if the athlete falters or misses practice there is another athlete just as good right there to take his or her place.

A physical examination by a doctor is required to participate in athletics; special medical insurance is required also and is at the expense of the student; regular officials who belong to a recognized officiating association are required to referee at the games. Any person who has a knowledge of the game and who has the desire may be hired by a school to coach a team. An individual does not have to be certified by the State Department of Education to coach. Interscholastic athletics are called extracurricular activities—that means that they happen outside the regular curriculum (English, math, science, physical education, social studies and vocational classes) which has been established at the school.

Practice for extracurricular activities should take place outside the regular classroom—before school, after school, at noon or on week-ends. The activity itself, in this case a football game, a basketball game, a volleyball game, etc., should also take place outside the regular school day, if possible. Athletics require the use of talented and skilled athletes. Only the best athletes are used during the game because the objective is to WIN THE GAME, or to learn how to lose gracefully.





A Christmas recipe for you:

Fast Fruit Cookies
1 cup butter or margarine, softened
1 cup confectioner's sugar
1 egg
1 cup pecans

Toll Free Telephone Established To BLM

A toll free telephone directly to the public information office of the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) in Santa Fe, New Mexico, went into operation today to provide better service to the public. The number is: 1-800-545-8943. Anyone calling this number can reach a public information specialist who can answer most questions about the agency.

The BLM manages about 13 million surface acres and 25 million subsurface acres of public land and minerals in New Mexico and Oklahoma. The BLM also handles federal mineral leasing and wild horse management in Texas.

After office hours (7:45 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday thru Friday), the telephone will record incoming messages and questions will be answered the next working day, either by return telephone call or by letter.

According to Arthur W. Zimmerman, BLM State Director, his information office receives more than 50 long distance calls each day from persons wanting to know about such things as wild horses, oil and gas

leasing, recreation opportunities and other programs of the BLM. "We will now be able to offer the public a free telephone service, a service that will operate 24 hours a day," says Zimmerman.

Another feature of the toll free number is that persons who wish to talk to specific person at the BLM office but do not know the proper telephone number can call toll free to get the


correct number, and in most cases determine if the individual is in the office at that particular time.

"Since we do not have a central switchboard in Santa Fe to transfer incoming telephone calls, persons can call the new number without cost and get the correct extension for an individual and then re-dial with the assurance that their calls will get to the right office," says Zimmerman.


HUD Awarded Additional Units

The Housing and Urban Development has notified Region VI Housing Authority, that they have been awarded an additional 100 units under the Section 8 Existing Housing Assistance Rental Subsidy Program to begin December 1, 1978. The Section 8 Existing Housing Program allows eligible lower income tenants to pay only 25 percent of their adjusted gross income toward the rent with Region VI Housing Authority paying the difference between the 25 percent family contribution and the total rent directly to the landlord. Santa Fe--Anything BUT Romantic! At least a couple of times every year, the power fails at the Merry Round House we call the Capitol and everyone has to operate by candlelight--at least those who have the forethought to put in a stock of candles.

It happened again last week--an internal outage and not the fault of the Public Service Company--and the Capitol complex came apart at the seams.

Only a few offices on the outside rim of the building have windows and the rest of the structure is in almost complete darkness. In fact, this go-round, even the emergency power system failed.

There really is no more poignant reminder of how "fat" we have gotten and how incapable of fending for ourselves.

Some secretaries tried to work by candlelight, but quickly realized their typewriters are electric. Statehouses wandered the corridors, some taking time to grab a cup of coffee in the little shop provided for that purpose--only to realize the coffee machine is electric.

In fact, several offices, recognizing it was Friday, just threw up their hands and sent everybody home.

You have to give a pat-on-the-back to Governor-elect Bruce King, however. Big Bruce had a long list of people waiting to consult with the incoming Governor so he just set up two candles on his desk and it was "business as usual".

Sidelight: While the incoming Administration was trying to cope with the powerless situation at the Round House last week, Gov. Jerry Apodaca was in Los Angeles with his youngest

daughter, Judy, lunching with movie star John Travolta.

It seems, according to a press release, that Judy Apodaca has seen Travolta's movie "Grease" fifteen times, "Saturday Night Fever" six times, owns all the Travolta records and has his picture posters decorating her bedroom walls.

How About That?: The State canvassing Board has finally certified the results of the November 7th Statewide elections and it will be up to any losing candidates to go through the courts to protest any election irregularities.

In case you missed it, the final figures show Bruce King the victor over Republican Joe Skeen by 3,783 votes--which is just 217 off the prediction we made around mid-October.

And try this on for size. In 1974, if our figures are correct, incumbent Gov. Jerry Apodaca totaled 3,742 votes in the General Election!

Tip Sheet: There won't be any big formal announcement of this item we expect until after January 1st when the new Administration takes over... but...the Commerce and Industry Department has donated offices for the new Regional Energy Advisory Center which is funded by the U.S. Department of Energy and the National Conference of States on Building Codes and Standards (the national construction organization).

Aim of the office is to disseminate information on energy conservation in building construction to interested State agencies West of the Mississippi and to New Mexico consumers.

There are only two such regional offices in the nation...one in Santa Fe and one in Boston.

Even though no formal announcement has been made, the advisory office is open for business and the phone is 983-1120 in the Capital City.

What a Mandate: When Governor-elect Bruce King announced his reappointment of Fred Muniz as Taxation and Revenue Secretary he said Fred would be "equally unfair to everyone..."

And on the topic of Tax and Revenue--Muniz is going full steam ahead on his plan to "decentralize" the department. Muniz says that entails giving more responsibility to the local department field offices statewide.

Fred maintains, and nobody disagrees, that citizens outside of Santa Fe should be able to take care of their business at local field offices without lengthy trips to Santa Fe and long distance telephone calls.

A small fish is suspended from the saint's right hand. It has been missing from the Santuario since Nov. 28, where the thief had to cut through a glass case behind the main altar to reach it.
