Smokey Bear Museum Closed; Maintenance Personnel Hired

Because of a loss in revenue, the Capitan Village Council voted to close the Smokey Bear Museum until the park opens in May. Hearing reports on the decline in receipts from gift sales within the Museum, the council found "no choice" but to give present employees a two-week termination.

Receipts for the Museum in Dec. 1977 was \$1282 and in Dec. '78, \$365. This decline has been steady. Presently the village of Capitan is paying over \$600 in salaries for the museum. A CETA employee in the museum was scheduled for termination March 3.

Approval for a sign regarding the closure was made by the council. Other action taken at the February meeting concerned the hiring of more village maintenance personnel. Eight applications had been received for one position. The board approved Wayne Hobbs for the position. Another position to be open if funds for replacement of pipes were approved was discussed. Larry Caywood, maintenance supervisor suggested the hiring of his uncle Ernest Caywood because of his experience in water pipe laying. The board discussed the possibility of legal problems and agreed not to hire another employee until legality is settled and the opening is advertised.

They also agreed to arrange a special meeting after the funds are approved. A written complaint about unused water tanks was read to the board. Mr. Schwantz, who recently bought property near a tank, complained of the leaks and unsafe condition of the tank and suggested its removal. The board in agreement to the unsafe conditions of the tanks voted to move and store the tanks at the village yard if the county would provide moving services at a reasonable price. An auction was suggested to dispose of the tanks.

Capitan School Board Accepts Resignations

Two letters of resignation and setting of a special meeting to discuss the bond were major topics at the February Capitan School Board Meeting.

Eugene Parker officially resigned his school board post citing "personal problems." The board accepted the resignation and after deliberation in executive session appointed Curtis Payne to fill the position.

The other letter was from teacher and boys basketball coach Jim Johnston. He stated in his letter that small-town living was a reason for leaving. His resignation was accepted by the board.

A special meeting to draw plans for what the board would like to submit to the architect was set. Wednesday, Feb. 21, 7 p.m. was decided as a meeting for teachers and the board to discuss what to do with the \$870,000 bond which recently passed.

Clifton reported that Quinn and Co. will require two and a half months to process the bond and begin the sale. No word has come concerning Capitol Outlay.

Principal T. L. Brooks accepted the one year contract the board offered.

Three bids to remodel the burned gym were read & discussed. Bids were taken in order to send to the insurance company which had given an estimate of \$67,681. Architect Jerry Lake was contacted to take bids on the work.

Armstrong Bros. Albuquerque bid \$104,800, for 180 calendar days; Gerald Martin, Albuquerque, \$110,000 for 140 days and Service Contractors, Inc. Ruidoso, \$99,724 for 120 days. These bids will be sent to the insurance company. Clifton said a meeting with an insurance representative will be necessary for an agreement.

Two special budget increases were approved. A request for \$3,135 for textbooks was approved. The books are necessary due to enrollment increases.

Title IV money increase of \$1,792 for library materials was also approved.

Bookwork on PL 874 was recently audited and reported in good order for three years. PL 874 concerns federal money for students whose parents either work or live on federal lands or both. Capitan School receives about \$2800.

A question about the duration of the ski program was settled with the announcement that the program had no limit set and will be subject to skiing conditions.

The Junior Play was scheduled for late April in the new gym.

The Board approved to take sealed bids on the school Dodge Stationwagon. The sale is precipitated by numerous breakdowns.

A personnel problem sent the board into executive session and the meeting ended after approval of routine reports.

Senator Harrison Schmitt

Discusses Disaster Area Problems

Senator Harrison Schmitt discussed local problems with a group of Capitan citizens while on tour of the Lincoln County Disaster Area recently. It was explained to Senator Schmitt, that the Capitan area received little or no flood damage but that there were several projects that were pressing within the community.

Senator Schmitt asked about the population growth in the village. It was reported to be 11-4 residences with 2 to 3 meters per week being installed. Increase was considered to be by those who commute to work.

Schmitt suggested the village do all the paperwork involved and if a bottleneck occurred then he would assist however necessary.

"Has your tax base increased with the added population," Schmitt asked. "Are you moving toward some way to handle streets?"

Mayor Stark replied that the village had no materials for street repair.

Schmitt also asked about tourist potential for Capitan. He was told that 38,000 went through the present Smokey Bear Museum and that the new building will open the first of May.

Schmitt cited problems with constituent communication. It was suggested that anyone with problems should write them down before calling so they can be discussed efficiently. The number to call is 622-7113 of Room 175, Federal building in Roswell.

Senator Schmitt was asked why the Federal Disaster Assistance would not help private individuals. He replied that the FDAA was not for private individuals but that Farm Home could do some things.

Schmitt was told that the Upper Hondo Water District was applying for a loan that would become available to private individuals who had suffered damage during the December flooding.

Capitan Councilman Mike Riska asked Senator Schmitt's feeling on waste disposal.

"I have been supportive until recently, now I am non-committal."

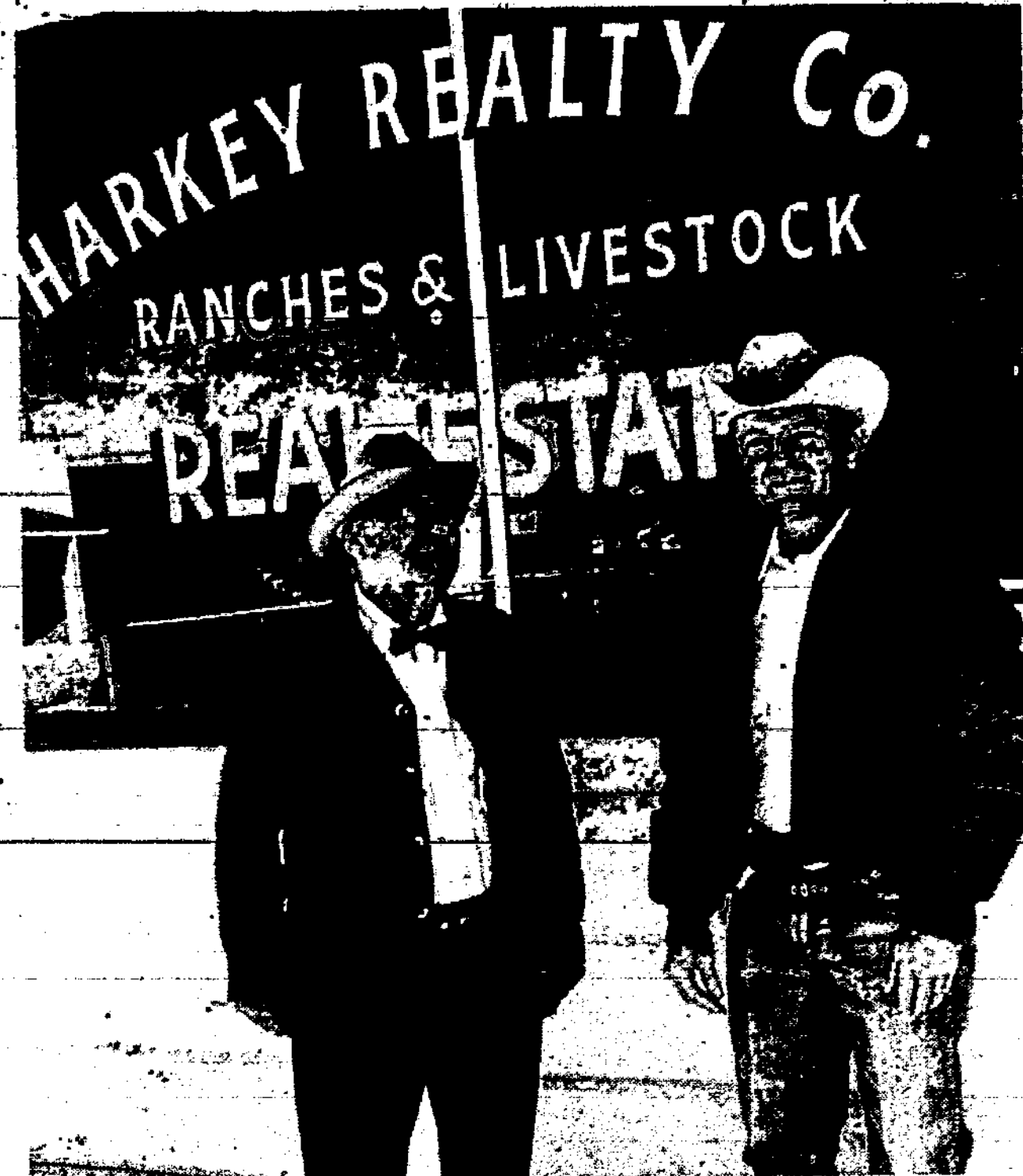

Education Center Elects Officers

Lincoln County Community Education Center took a step closer to reality recently as officers were elected and a proposed itinerary of 3 classes was approved by a group of 28 persons representing Capitan, Ft. Stanton, Ruidoso and San Patricio.

Betty Martin was elected president; Jamal Mackin, secretary; Ronnie Montes, treasurer and Loraine Sanchez, P.R. co-ordinator. The officers were elected on a temporary basis.

Three classes were tentatively scheduled. Lincoln County Folklore will be a class featuring old people of the area telling of the history, as well as other subjects. It was agreed that this class would help generate community interest amongst the senior citizens. Those of the organizational group that have contacted local old timers have been met with 100 percent positive response. The schedule will be announced later.

A class on how to fill you IRS form will be taught by Jack Cisco. Katie Weaver will co-ordinate times and places for the class.

And the 8-hour First Aid is also considered. Mary Alfred is co-ordinator.

The possibility of getting \$800 in a mini-grant from the Community Education Services at NMSU was considered. Loraine Sanchez reported she had spoken to Dr. Caroline O'Donnell, and was informed of additional money available as "seed money." This is intended to help community education centers in their

first stages.

Ms. Sanchez reported the form for the mini-grant was simple and involved a simple budget breakdown and interest. "To qualify for the grant, public interest is the prerequisite," Ms. Sanchez said.

The use of Capitan School facilities was okayed by Superintendent Richard Clifton. The group agreed the meetings in Capitan would help make it more of a central meeting place.

It was also agreed not to charge fees for the classes to be held. Grants and fund raising activities were to be considered.

Carrizozo Health Center Expands To Corona

Carrizozo Health Center is expanding medical service to Corona beginning Tuesday, Feb. 20, 1979.

Ursula Hansteen, Nurse Practitioner, will be in Corona from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. each Tuesday. She will be conducting an out-patient clinic and will be able to do EKGs, blood work, urinalysis, as well as prescribing for sore throats, ear aches, flu symptoms, etc.

Nurse Hansteen will also do school physicals and will handle most routine clinical care. The clinic is in the south part of the building occupied by the Cardinal Country Cafe. It is on the south end of Corona on Highway 54.

The idea of community education originated as a way to get better use of public facilities. It offers a way back to a community sense by a sharing of community talents. A non-profit organization, the center will reflect those classes desired by the community.

A survey team to canvas the area on subjects that would interest residents, potential students and teachers, was proposed. This would represent those who are directly concerned; citizens of the community.

All Other visits are cash. If needed, we will expand our services to two days a week and Dr. Nelson will be at the Corona Clinic as required. Future plans call for a mobile dental unit to be in Corona on a regular basis.

We hope the people in this area will support this program. We look forward to seeing our Corona and area patients on a regular schedule.

Food Preparations At Zia Benefits All

Any morning visitors to the Zia School for Developmental Services instinctively follow their noses to the kitchen. The halls are filled with aromas that promise a delicious meal at lunchtime. Training in food services is a practical job skill area to develop. America is on the move and the need or desire to eat keeps coming back even as we travel. The business of food service has many hard tasks that do not allow much room for creativity; boredom and fatigue keep trying to wear away personnel — a percentage always gives in.

The training aid in food services is a seasoned veteran of all aspects of the food service business. Liz Sambrano worked in La Junta Cafe in Hondo doing everything — cooking, waiting on tables, bussing tables, and washing dishes. When her husband came to Carrizozo to work for the county, Liz worked in Carrizozo as a cook at both The Truck Stop and The Central Cafe. Before coming to work at the Zia School, Liz was a waitress at the Four Winds Restaurant where she also bussed tables. Liz has lived in Carrizozo for thirteen years now and has seen three of her children graduate from Carrizozo High School. She has one son who graduates this year and two more to take part in future graduations.

The many skills that Liz had to use in her work helps her know how to prepare her students for the work field. One self-contained task the girls do daily is to set up for the coffee break. It taxes their memory to get the coffee pot, the milk, sugar, mugs, and spoons to the coffee room within a half hour of their arrival at the school.

When Liz got her first group of students, she spent much time getting them acquainted with the names of objects used in the kitchen. Liz had to teach the names of foods and how to recognize foods from their pictures. Janet learned to recognize labels on canned foods. In the beginning she would bring Liz every can from the cupboard until she got the right one. By repeated association of the name, the picture, and the printed word, now Janet usually can get the right can on the first try.

The girl who sets the table for lunch has to know a teaspoon from a soup spoon from an iced tea spoon from a tablespoon — not an easy distinction to make for a mentally handicapped student. The spatial relationships needed to make a complete place setting are difficult to teach. Sometimes we sit down to eat and have three plates with four place settings. We need ten people to a table and each person needs a chair, plate, silverware, napkin, milk, glass, dessert — that leaves a lot of room for error!

Involvement in the actual preparation of the food depends on the students' abilities to safely handle a sharp knife or work around a gas stove. Dicing onions for an enchilada casserole or cutting cabbage for cold slaw are tasks that must be done slowly and carefully. Janet was afraid of the stove, but Liz says that Janet will now help her turn the meat or serve the hot food into bowls (the students at Zia School eat "family style").

Cleaning up after the meal is a complicated business when you are just learning it. Getting all the dishes on a cart in the dining room and wheeling it to the kitchen; scraping garbage into the proper containers; preparing the wash and rinse waters; washing, rinsing, drying, and putting away the dishes; washing the food cart; cleaning the dining room tables and mopping the dining room floor; cleaning the counters and floor in the kitchen; these are the many tasks to do — more than most of us who prepare a family meal think about! These skills are being developed

to meet the requirements of the Department of Environmental Improvement standards. Liz says that Dorothy is one of her best workers. She will stay all afternoon in the kitchen and clean everything, even washing the refrigerators. The key condition for this work is that she wants to be alone. Some jobs allow for a worker to be alone, but food service is a cooperative venture. So Dorothy's greatest task in this area is how to get along with people — no easy task to teach!

An exciting and rewarding adventure for the Zia School food services crew began when the Zia Senior Citizen

Center got funding for a hot lunch program. Jan Geha, director, wanted to serve the meals at the center but lacked the facilities and the personnel to cook each day. She knew the Zia School had a food service program and consulted with Wayland Holbrook, director of the school. They agreed that a cooperative effort would benefit people served by both organizations. After more than three months in the program, she says, "we are so pleased with the fact that we are fulfilling the

nutritional needs of our Seniors by the delicious meals prepared by the Zia School and that we are also able to fill their need to socialize. The Zia School has been so helpful with this program and we hope that our need has been fulfilled in their program as well."

The Senior Citizen Van comes to the School to pick up the hot lunch. It is served in their center by the staff.

The senior citizens who are served by the lunch program had lots of things to say. Fred Current says, "I think this

lunch program is one of the nicest things we have. Even if you don't have a dime, you can still eat." About the food, Paul Otero says, "Good food, good cooks!" Librado Torres says, "Always have good food; can't pick one meal to say it is better than another."

Rafeal Ortega "I really enjoy when we have beans and rice." The women interviewed were just as enthusiastic.

Ellyn Cady says, "Very good! This program is wonderful." Dorothy Queen reflects, "Many of us live alone and hate to eat alone. This lunch program is good for all of us." When asked what her favorite lunch was, she said, "Green enchiladas." Gertrude Risher agreed and added, "Rolls, biscuits, corn bread..." Each item she mentioned was met with approval from the others at the table. Gertrude also said, "This is one of the best services for older Americans. Not all of us qualify for winterization or home improvement loans; but EVERYONE benefits from a lunch program." The girls in the kitchen at the Zia School are delighted to know that they are helping others.

Hopefully, this is just the first of many projects which will bring the mentally handicapped students from the Zia School into relationship with the senior citizens of this community. Besides all the food skills that Liz brings to her job, she also has a variety of craft skills that she has been able to use with the students. Early in the year, the craft program was on a very low budget. So the exercise class went out and gathered small rocks and brought them

back. Liz then showed the students how to paint them. They made a variety of creatures, some of which were used in creating wood centerpieces. Many of the students liked to glitter the silver paint and it was hard to restrict their use of it. Their "creatures" look like something from Star Wars. A craft project such as this gives the training aids a chance to observe the students' eye-hand coordination, to see who has visual problems, who needs to develop their gross or fine motor skills; it gives the students a time for creativity, for relaxing.

A recent craft project which involves the women centers on crocheting. Connie is enthused about the chain stitch; in fact, she doesn't want to stop. Her "chain" is now ten feet long and she talks about the afghan she is making. Liz will work with Connie more to "even up" the tightness of the stitch before teaching her to come back across the chain. The Zia School hopes eventually to specialize in a particular craft area. At that time, a few of the students will be assigned to production of objects which can be marketed for their income.

manufacture of plutonium, a product of reprocessed wastes, has been banned in the U.S. under the Nuclear Proliferation Treaty. The U.S. stands alone in this ban, however. The demand for uranium could be cut one third if the wastes can be reprocessed. Reprocessing would be some an-

swer to spent fuel assemblies so states like California would join and it would be realizing that this would be a resource.

"If we don't reprocess, we'll be left out and we'll be so dependent on those foreign sources of oil," he said as he left for other county meetings.







INSIDE THE CAPITOL

By FRED McCAFFREY

SANTA FE—Legislators don't go at their work in the steady, plodding, day-to-day manner most of us use.

Their job is full of fits and starts, the hard work bunched in clots, with spaces of free-and-easy time interspersed.

First phase, which closes this week, is bill-introduction time. Some obvious bills get thrown in for early action, like Right to Work; but most early bills, like those to allow beer-wine licenses to restaurants, are trial balloons to see how the wind is blowing. Meanwhile, legislators are eyeing one another warily, conferring in corners and keeping their major bills locked in their desks till they've got the feel of this session's climate.

Then comes the knock-down-drag-out period. Serious bills are introduced in a rush; the work-load, including daily committee sessions, gets heavier; and week-ends at home or on the ski slopes are no longer in order.

That's where we are now—with the frantic closing days, toughest of all on the physical constitution, still ahead.

Some observations on bills now under consideration:

BOOZE: At time of this writing, there were 23 bills in on this subject, with more to come by the time you read this. Some would allow "brown bagging" (carrying your own stuff into unlicensed premises) and several set up special licenses (no heavy stuff) for food-serving establishments.

At least one will try to re-do whole present quota system on this pesky subject.

Probably all are to no avail. Observers here agree no substantial legislation will come out of this session on alcohol. Industry opposes any change, being satisfied with the way things are. "Drys" don't want any loosening of present arrangements.

Liquor control division will get increased budget, to sharpen up agents in the field, toughen law enforcement. There may be serious efforts to straighten out present "canopy" situation (two or more establishments operating under a single license), but

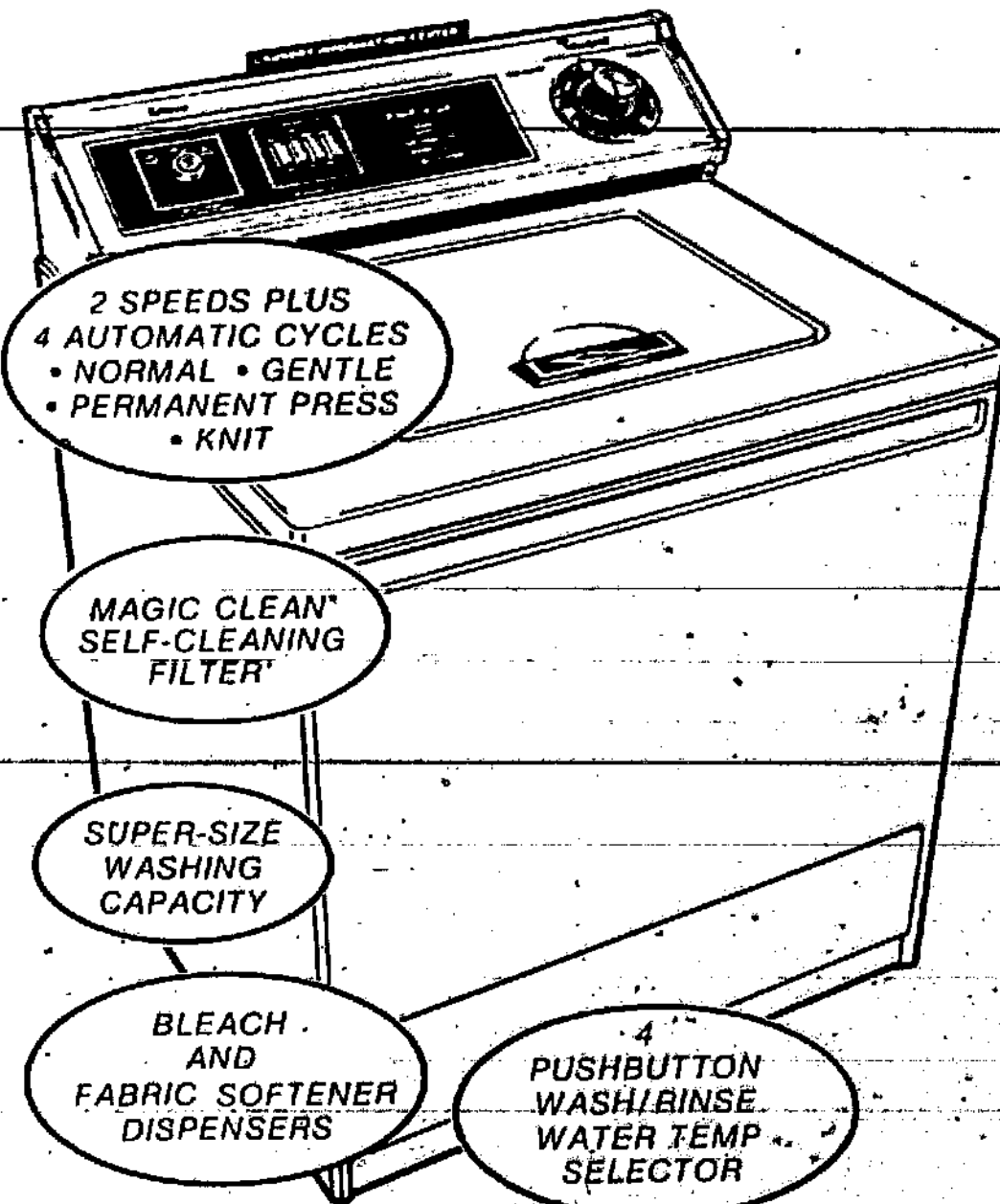

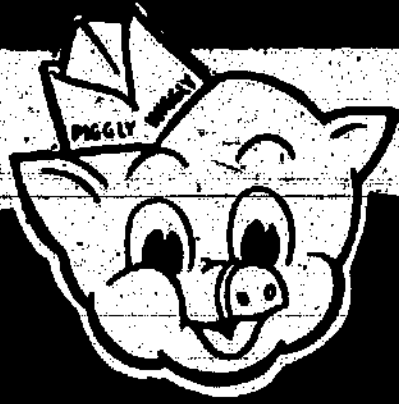

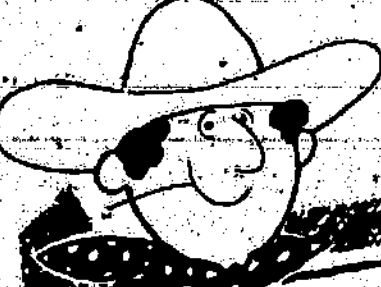
