Texas Students Find Lincoln County A Geological Wonder

The Hardin-Simmons Geological Society of Abilene, Texas made its spring field trip to the South Central area of New Mexico March 1, 2, and 3. The Texas students from Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene Christian University and McMurry College and their sponsors, Dr. A. Ray Jennings and Dr. Del Gann made their headquarters in White Oaks. The campsite was the White Oaks School building, which was made available by the White Oaks Historical Society.

The group saw several interesting and informative geological features and had fun in the process 'roughing it' in the Jicarilla Mountains, in an old mining town.

'Seeing-Geology' was the main reason for the trip. Some of the geologic features the group saw included the Carrizozo Lava Flows (Malpais), cinder cones above the flows, the White Sands, and areas of the Jicarilla Mountains. Other stops included such interests as road cuts, dikes, sills, mine areas and fossil beds.

The students and their sponsors arrived Thursday evening and set up camp. Friday they went to White Sands National Park. One of the striking features of the Tularosa Basin is this large area of pure white gypsum sand dunes. Nowhere in the world is there such a large deposit of gypsum. It covers an area of about 270 square miles within the basin.

Later in the day the students hiked over the Malpais. The Carrizozo Malpais Lava Flow is probably one of the most recent lava flows in the United States. A few of the students went to the cone before it began to snow.

Saturday was spent in White Oaks visiting the mines with Paul Wetzel. The visits included the Boston Boy Mine, fossil beds and mine dumps. Students were cautioned of dangerous shafts, cave-ins and 'bad air', a poisonous gas mixture which can cause unconsciousness, without smell, taste or warning. The group observed geological formations in the area.

Saturday evening the students toured the 'Hoyle House' the prominent red brick house in the once prosperous mining community. A miner and businessman named Hoyle built the house in the 1870's, planning to

bring his sweetheart from the East to live in it. She wouldn't come, the house stood empty for many years and became known as 'Hoyle's Folley'. It is now the home of the Wetzel family.

The Hardin-Simmons Geological Society field trip was arranged by the club president, Calvin Donaghey, student at Abilene Christian University. Mr. Donaghey is a nephew of Mrs. Larue Wetzel.

Counseling Center Helping People With Problems

The counseling center is a community mental health service, financed with federal, state, and county funds. The staff works closely with the schools, priests and ministers, law officers, physicians and nurses in Lincoln County. They are interested in helping people with problems, depression and drug or alcohol abuse. A fee is charged according to the individual's ability to pay. However, no one is refused service regardless of their financial status.

Offices of the counseling center are located in the former hospital annex in Carrizozo. The office is open on Monday afternoons and all day Thursdays. Appointments can be made by calling 348-2188 Monday through Friday. The counseling center is a non-profit

corporation sponsored by the Mental Health Association of Lincoln and Otero Counties. The Lincoln County Mental Health Association is holding a membership meeting, Monday March 12 when officers will be elected for the coming year.

Commissioners Approve Work On Bonita Dam Road

Lincoln County Commissioners, in a regular meeting last week, approved work by the County Road Department on Forest Route 107 to Bonita Dam. The section was damaged in the recent floods before it could be paved by a grant that the County had garnered. To use the paving grant, the company has to first put the road back to a servicable state.

The commissioners had to also reach an agreement with the Forest Service for work on the road, since the Forest Service had funds available to restore the road to original condition. The problem for Lincoln County was if the Forest Service spent their money on the road, the paving would have to be forgotten.

Road Superintendent Guy Henley stated to the NEWS this was the best way to proceed, and the work should be done on the road in time for the April 1st fishing season to start with easy access to Bonita Dam.

A delegation from Lincoln was at the meeting to ask that the zoning of Lincoln be uniform so as to use zone B's boundaries for both Zone A and B. Zone B is 1/2 mile on either side of U.S. 380, the commission concurred.

The commission heard from Viola Fenter as to designating March 11-17 as Employ the Older Americans Week in Lincoln County.

Terry Matlack of the N.C. Ribble Company was the low bidder on the gravel screening and sizing plant at \$1300.00 a month rental.

The Nogal Fire station took a step closer with the acceptance of a bid by Ken Wells of the Carrizozo Welding and Supply company for the construction of the station.

After 'much debate,' the Commission unanimously approved the Road Department going on a 10-hour, 4 Day week. Superintendent Henley pointed out that with present projects, the men spent 2 1/2 hours a day traveling.

and warming up equipment. With the 10 hour day, the total productivity is increased since the men are able to work longer and the crew only makes 4 trips instead of five.

County Manager Les Olsen told the commissioners that the county wide plan of going to a 911 emergency number should be completed by March 23. In Carrizozo, Nogal, Capitan, and Ruidoso for sure, the 911 number will reach the law enforcement personnel.

The next regularly scheduled meeting of the Lincoln County Commission is Tuesday, March 20th.

You're Gonna Get Fined If You Follow Firetruck

State Policeman Dale Housley commented to the NEWS this week that he almost couldn't get through the many people gawking at the last several fires to respond himself. 'If we would have needed the ambulance, it would not have been able to get through, or the other pumper unit', Housley stated.

While it was already illegal to follow emergency vehicles to the scene, now it will also become expensive.

Citizens are advised also to not call the Sheriff's office when the alarm sounds. The fire department personnel need the line to be open so that members of the fire department can respond directly to the scene of the fire. The lines right now are being tied up by curious people just wondering where the fire is.

'You may not realize how serious this matter is until it is your house in flames and the units are having to maneuver around all of the people just sight-seeing,' concluded Housley.

Lincoln County Police Report

On Feb. 26th thru the 28th, Sheriff Sanchez and Chief Deputy Montes attended a first line supervision school at the New Mexico Law Enforcement Academy in Santa Fe.

On March 8th the New Mexico Sheriff's Association will be having a meeting in Santa Fe. Sheriff Sanchez is scheduled to attend.

On Feb. 19th, a bulldozer was taken from Alpha mine lease, northwest of Carrizozo and taken across country sixteen miles, going through fences, cattleguards and pastures causing several hundred dollars worth of damages. The bulldozer was trailed up to where it had been abandoned in a ravine on Bonds ranch north of Carrizozo. Upon investigation, criminal Damage to property charges were filed by the Sheriff's department upon a juvenile from Albuquerque.

Clyde Powell Simmons was arrested and taken to Torrance County to answer to charges of larceny.

The Sheriff's department now has a full crew for the first time since Sheriff Sanchez took office on January 1, 1979. James McSwane and Bill Hasenbuhler are the Carrizozo-Corona deputies; Charles Engelking, Captain deputy; O. S. Montes, Duane Skellett, Chris Volguardsen, Lucas Gallegos and John Cupp are the Ruidoso-Hondo deputies.

Alton Talley, South of Carrizozo, reported that someone had run down his fence with a car or truck. Incident took place between 3 A.M. and 6 P.M. Officer assigned: Bennett.

Henry Paul reported to Officer Baker that person or persons unknown had cut a tire beyond repair on his

Fire fighting is one of the most important community activities. The Carrizozo Volunteer Fire Department stands as the first line of defense against one of the most serious dangers that can threaten Carrizozo and Lincoln County — Fire.

Volunteer firemen protect small town and rural communities without personal gain. They do not earn their living by fighting fires as do firemen in large cities. When the alarm sounds, they dash from their work or their homes to the fire station. They learn to do their job under the strain of danger and fatigue. Some fire departments often face such problems as inadequate equipment, water shortages and

sometimes the need to travel long distances to answer alarms.

Carrizozo is fortunate that its fire department has up to date equipment, adequate pumpers and currently the firemen are learning modern fire fighting techniques and other skills of firemanship.

Carrizozo Fire Chief Albert Najar received a letter from Carl Standefer, Fire Services Chief of the State Fire Marshal's Office in Santa Fe, offering the Carrizozo Volunteer Fire Department a training program to keep them abreast of modern fire fighting techniques. The program consists of four sessions conducted at the fire department one night per week for four consecutive weeks. David F. Rubio, Sr. Fire Protection Instructor, State Fire Marshal's Office, conducts the training.

Their first session was held on March 1. It included search and rescue operations. Four smoke bombs were released to enable firemen to practice with their air masks.

The Carrizozo Fire Department purchased a 1979 Ford Detroit Diesel on October 15th, 1978. The brand new pumper carries hose, water tanks and a pump that can shoot up to 1,200 gallons of water a minute through hose lines. In addition to this the department has standing by a '64 Ford (700 gal.), a '56 Ford (500 gal.), and a '76 Ford Scat unit (250 gal.), which is used for brush and railroad fires.

The firemen work hard in the community to enforce fire regulations. They learn the importance of team work in fire fighting. Each Monday evening Carrizozo Fire Department has a meeting. They keep a neat log of fire runs — (date, time, location, owner, method of extinguish, time out and men used).

Following the order of business at last Monday's meeting, Fire Chief Najar joined fellow firemen in draining hoses from last fire alarm answered and to return hoses to truck. Equipment and tools were inspected and replaced so that they will be ready to use again. Fire extinguishers were filled for use in public building.

Fire Chief Najar thoroughly enjoys and knows his volunteer work. The department has 17 active members. George Serna is the newest member. Moises Sambrano, Fire Marshal, has been with the department 12 years. Raymond Lueras is First Assistant Chief, Gilbert Barcla, Second Assistant Chief and Gilbert Archuleta is secretary of the department. Honorary members are Friday Sherrill, Ernie Roberts and Herman McKibben.

Although fighting is the most important contribution to Carrizozo, fire fighting is not all that the fireman do. They donate their fire fighting movies and their time towards their community projects for children. For years now they have assisted Santa Claus in handing out Christmas goodies that they donated and bagged. The firemen fully support a Little League baseball team. Coaches for this coming season are Bobby J. Ventura and Ben Bradley. The Zia Senior Citizen Center was donated by the Carrizozo Volunteer Fire Department.
