## Carrizozo School Board

### Ferguson, Portillo Honored

It was announced at the regular meeting of the school board May 8, that Lisa Ferguson will be valedictorian and Kaye Portillo, salutatorian for the May 21 Carrizozo commencement exercises.

Other business on the agenda included the May 16 date set for Jim Miller Jr., 79-80 incoming superintendent, to interview three of several principal applicants. Some applicants who had applied for the superintendent job have turned in applications for the principal position.

The board also announced that the position for head football coach is open. Non-certified personnel was approved for employment for the 79-80 school year.

The board approved the request by the Teachers Association to keep sick leave as is, but that records be kept, not only for 60 days at a time, but for as long as teacher is employed. This in case the legislature ever passed the law that permitted accumulated leave to be counted part of the regular school year.

Mrs. Emma Lawson, home economics teacher and FHA advisor went before the board to request and was approved funding for sending Shirley Simmons to the National FHA Convention in Washington, D.C. to represent the Carrizozo Chapter.

Mrs. Gary Persall spoke to the board regarding the reorganization of the mid-school. Mrs. Persall explained the need for separate, closed classrooms or at least homerooms for the 5th and 6th grades. The 10-11 year olds are presently changing classes and Mrs. Persall commented that they are not ready for this type of schooling. Mrs. Persall stated that, "Our society pushes children to grow up to fast and they don't need any help from us. She added, "They need help to be children a little bit longer." Mrs. Persall who had the support of several sets of parents and teacher-parents present that evening received a vote of confidence from the board.

First grade teachers Orsak and Baker told the board that first graders in the 79-80 school year be allowed to be released at 1:30 P.M. the first two weeks. The teachers felt, from experience, that the students need this time to adjust to the change in their day. The board approved the request. Bus students may remain in class room until the end of the regular day.

The Greatest Grizzly Award was discussed with mixed feelings among board members and audience, regarding the value of this presentation awarded outstanding youths. The award is primarily an athletic award renewed in 1974 from earlier years to athletes who letter in three sports in addition for participation leadership, scholarship, and citizenship. Coaches have voted on who received this award.

Additional business was the approval of bus routes and identification of deficient school bus road conditions.

Board member Gail Stackpole, mentioned that school activities not be scheduled on board night. The Band Concert was held that same evening and she expressed that she would have liked to have attended the concert or that parents may have attended the board meeting had the concert been scheduled for another time.

The meeting which lasted past midnight included lengthy discussion of the 79-80 budget which took up most of the board's time. May 17 was date set for going over final preparations before sending them to Santa Fe. Jim Miller, Jr. was present throughout the meeting and commented in various areas.

It is too bad that no one in the Carter Administration really cares to consider the plan. A spokesman for Carter stated that the Administration felt that the plan was not what they considered advisable. Meaning they lacked the guts to make it work.

I guess it may have been television that made us passive. Something sure enough did.

We Americans have been somehow lulled into sitting quietly for a whole host of atrocities.

The problem is one, of us not disciplining ourselves. We know that we can't go on spending more money than we have, yet the talk in Washington, D.C. is the National Health Service.

Maybe Senator Kennedy would like to explain to the American people, where the 32 BILLION is going to come from. It is coming from you and I.

The government doesn't own anything. To give something to us, they first must take it away from us. I would just as soon do without the middleman.

Some alternatives. First we must reinstate the draft. And make it stick. We Americans must do our duty to ourselves if we want to remain a free country. Senator Kennedy cannot buy our protection with our dollars. It takes individual sacrifice. If nothing else, we are teaching our children that they can violate the law whenever they wish. ### BLM Wilderness Effects Discussed by Panel

A New Mexico BLM Task Force recently presented a panel discussion on the social-economic effect of wilderness areas to a group representing ranchers, New Mexico Dept. of Game and Fish, and the U.S. Forest Service.

The task force from NMSI, Dr. Phil Zwank, extension Wildlife Specialist, Dr. John Fowler, Economic Specialist, Jerry Schickendarz, co-ordinator discussed the inventory now being conducted by the Bureau of Land Management. 1,390,673 acres have been recommended for intensive inventory in the Las Cruces District. Half of Lincoln county is included in the district and areas listed for wilderness are the Little Black Peak and the Carrizozo Lava Flow covering 56,960 acres.

The panel discusses the economic impact of the wilderness. With no motor vehicles, or engines allowed timber related industries will be eliminated and ranching will revert to an 1880 standard.

The impact upon ranching, as explained by the panel, will be a decrease of grazing permits and a decline in the "status" of ranching. The resulting decrease in cattle production will raise beef prices and decrease the number of ranchers.

Operating from an 1880 standard, using horses and mules for maintenance instead of trucks, will put those ranchers at a disadvantage to those with modern standards. Schickendarz stated.

Petrol-gas and mineral industries will also decline, although permits for access to sites existing before Oct. 1976 will be issued.

Basic Recreation Activities within a wilderness include backpacking, hunting and fishing, ballooning, skydiving, cross-country skiing and any kind of recreation not requiring a motorized vehicle. Within existing wilderness areas, back-

packers are 90 percent New Mexico residents, and the areas are used heavily, changing the definition of wilderness.

Hunting, fishing, and trapping will be affected by the change in wildlife within the wilderness. Deer in wilderness will decrease, this due to a preference for browsed areas. Big Horn Sheep will increase with the absence of humans. Wild turkey is reported to do well. Hunting will be different. No motor vehicles will be allowed within a wilderness, so hunting will become more intensive on the wilderness perimeters. "Most hunting will be a tile from the road," Dr. John Fowler stated.

Fishing will depend upon the stocking of streams, presently being done, but a question whether to allow

the sticking is being raised.

The amount of water available within a wilderness will decrease because rancher maintained water sources will be discontinued, the panel explained.

A Wilderness Definition checklist was discussed. The BLM was directed by the Organic Act of 1976 to conduct an inventory of all lands to choose those areas meeting wilderness requirements. For the next fifteen years, the BLM will conduct inventory with the aid of public input. After Jan. 1980, the areas selected will be put into Wilderness Study areas, subject then to USGS (minerals, oil and gas, geothermal) inventory, then in 1991 a final report will be given to the President who will have two years

to study the report. 1993 is the deadline for the report to go to Congress for approval.

Once an area is placed under the Wilderness Study Area designation interim management will exist. Mineral and livestock production existing before 1976 will continue under certain guidelines. New improvements will be reviewed case by case, no permanent roads, but permits for temporary ones, boundaries placed around access to private land within wilderness areas.

In order to meet wilderness specifications several criteria must be met. The area must be 5,000 acres or sufficient size to make practical its preservation and use. It must be roadless, meaning the absence of

roads improved and maintained by mechanical means. A way maintained solely by the passage of chicles does not constitute a road.

The area must generally appear to have the imprint of man's work substantially unnoticeable and has outstanding opportunities for solitude or a primitive and unconfined type of recreation. Certain geological, ecological, or other features of scientific, educational, scenic, or historical value are not necessary for wilderness, but may improve wilderness characteristics.

BLM Wilderness inventory checklists are available at the Extension office at the Courthouse in Carrizozo. The public is urged to participate in this inventory.

### Capitan Schools Allow Film to be Shown

Discussion of a controversial film, report on a new Capitol Outlay proposal and hiring of new personnel topped the agenda of the Capitan School Board.

Jack Johnson and Terri Aldaz approached the board seeking permission to show the controversial film "Scared Straight." Ms. Aldaz had rented the film personally, hoping the area schools would be interested. Hondo and Ruidoso agreed to show the film and Ruidoso agreed to pay \$50 to defray the film rental cost. The uncut film with Peter Falk narrator, involves a group of first offender juveniles exposed to the real life of prison. Because of the controversial nature of the film the board agreed to send parent permission slips home with the students who will be seeing the film. Grades 7-9 and 10-12 will view the film separately and must present a signed slip on order to get in.

Superintendent Clifton announced that a new proposal of \$2 million was presented to the Capitol Outlay committee, the former amount proposed was tentative. A copy of the proposal has been sent to Representative Aubrey Dunn, The Capitol Outlay Committee will send representatives to review the school district and will report to the Council.

Clifton also reported the receipt of the insurance check for the old gym. He suggested the money be put into abatement expenditure, a type of reimbursement which will not show in the budget and will not require a special budget hearing.

A comparative cost list of metal roofs as opposed to a built-up roof showed the initial cost being higher (\$2000) but the insurance on wood is \$3100-year and on metal \$800-year. The board agreed to have the architect investigate the metal roof further.

Billy Henson was approved to be hired on a one year contract for high school personnel.

Howard Shanks proposed the Capitan School begin working on a Vocational Agriculture program. He stated it takes two years to reach the four-year program. The board accepted the proposal to look into a vo-ag program.

Harv Abercrombie proposed two projects, an all weather outdoor track and a little league baseball field. \$80,000 had been requested from the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation last

year but was declined. Abercrombie suggested the Board reply for "kick back" money, stating the present BOR administration was more favorable to small communities than the present one.

Abercrombie reported the Capitan Little League had no place to play and was presently working cooperatively with Carrizozo. He explained the liability waiver each players parents must sign, stating the

school would not be liable for accidents incurred playing in the filed. Abercrombie was requesting permission to build the diamond on the school property north of the highway and west of Boohers.

The board agreed to review both proposals and to give Abercrombie a report next meeting.

The announcement of the sale of bonds on May 15 was made and routine reports closed the meeting.

### Upper Rio Hondo Watershed Funded

Twenty-one special water quality projects involving 30 counties in 20 states and two water basins in Puerto Rico were funded under the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) at levels totaling \$4.3 million.

Included in these special projects in the Upper Rio Hondo Watershed in Lincoln and Otero Counties, New Mexico. According to Pablo Roybal, Chairperson of the New Mexico State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee, the Rio Hondo Watershed Project was funded in the amount of \$275,000. This project will serve approximately 150 producers in the area.

The national ACP provides economic incentives to individual

landowners for solving resource conservation and pollution programs. ACP is administered by ASCS. Farmer-elected county committees operate the program at the local level, choosing conservation practices specially developed to meet county problems.

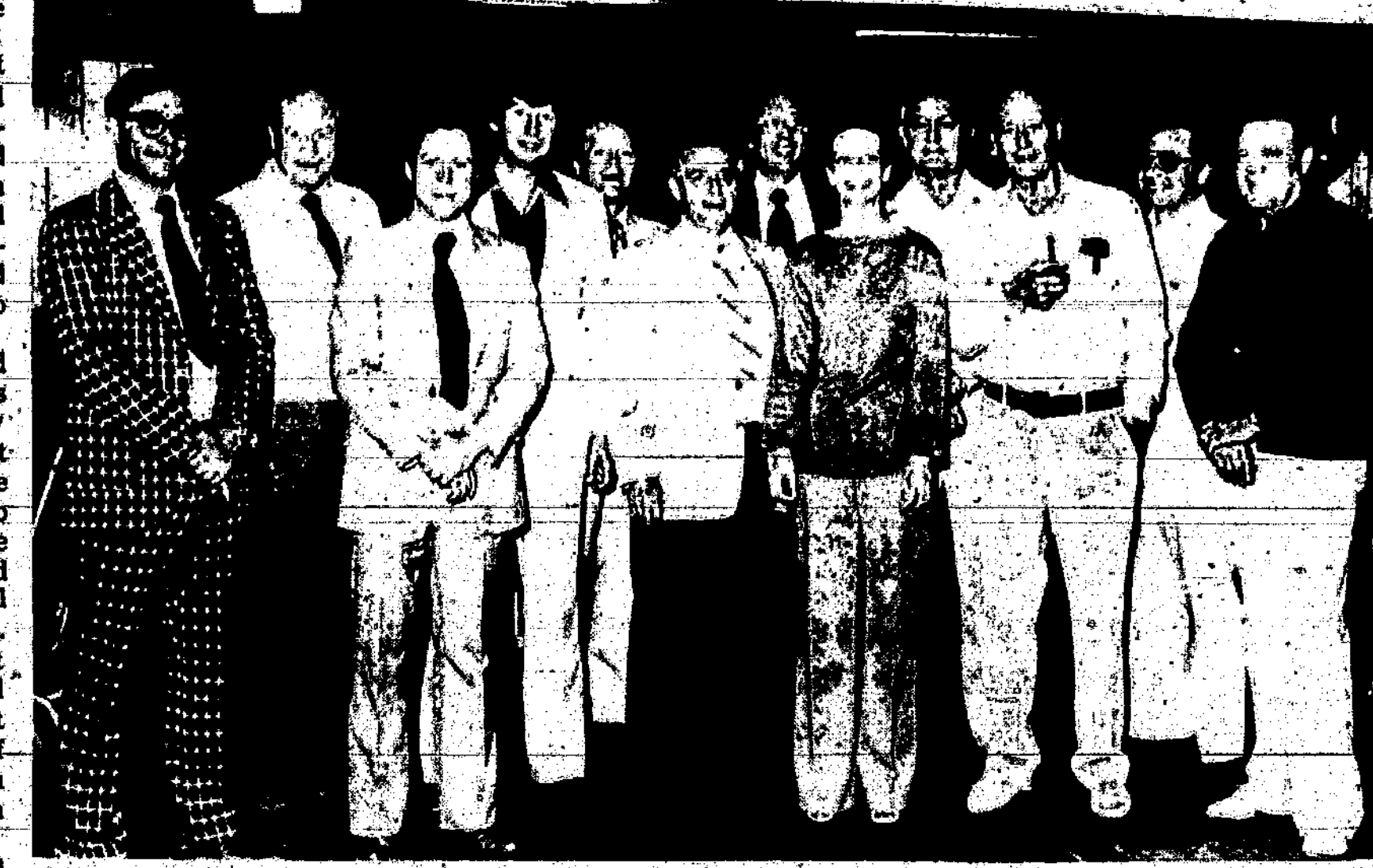
Mr. Roybal said an ACP national development group, consisting of representatives from ASCS, SCS, Forest Service, Farmers Home Administration, and the Environmental Protection Agency; studied 43 water quality proposals before recommending the 21 projects. The special projects will assist in solving non-point water pollution problems from agricultural sources, such as animal waste, cropland

erosion, and chemical run-off. The conservation measures will emphasize pollution abatement, soil and water conservation and woodland preservation practices.

The projects are ready to be implemented at the local level. Although the figures represent 1979 funding, most of the projects will require three years to complete.

John Cooper, Chairman of the Lincoln County ASC Committee, reported that the Lincoln County Development Group met May 8 and decided on the recommended program for the Upper Rio Hondo Watershed projects.

When final approval of the program has been received producers will be notified of program benefits.

The baby chimps wear disposable diapers and feed from bottles with prepared formula. After they mature, they are placed in nursery rooms with other chimps their age. Play equipment and companionship are available to provide stimulus for physical and mental growth. At one year of age the chimps travel to other research organizations throughout the nation, again to aid in conquering disease.

The Zozo students toured the 'Chimp Nursery'. They marveled at the similarities with human babies. The group saw the newest member of the hospital, five day old Muffin. The students learned about new careers. There might even be a few chimp fanclers in Zozo.

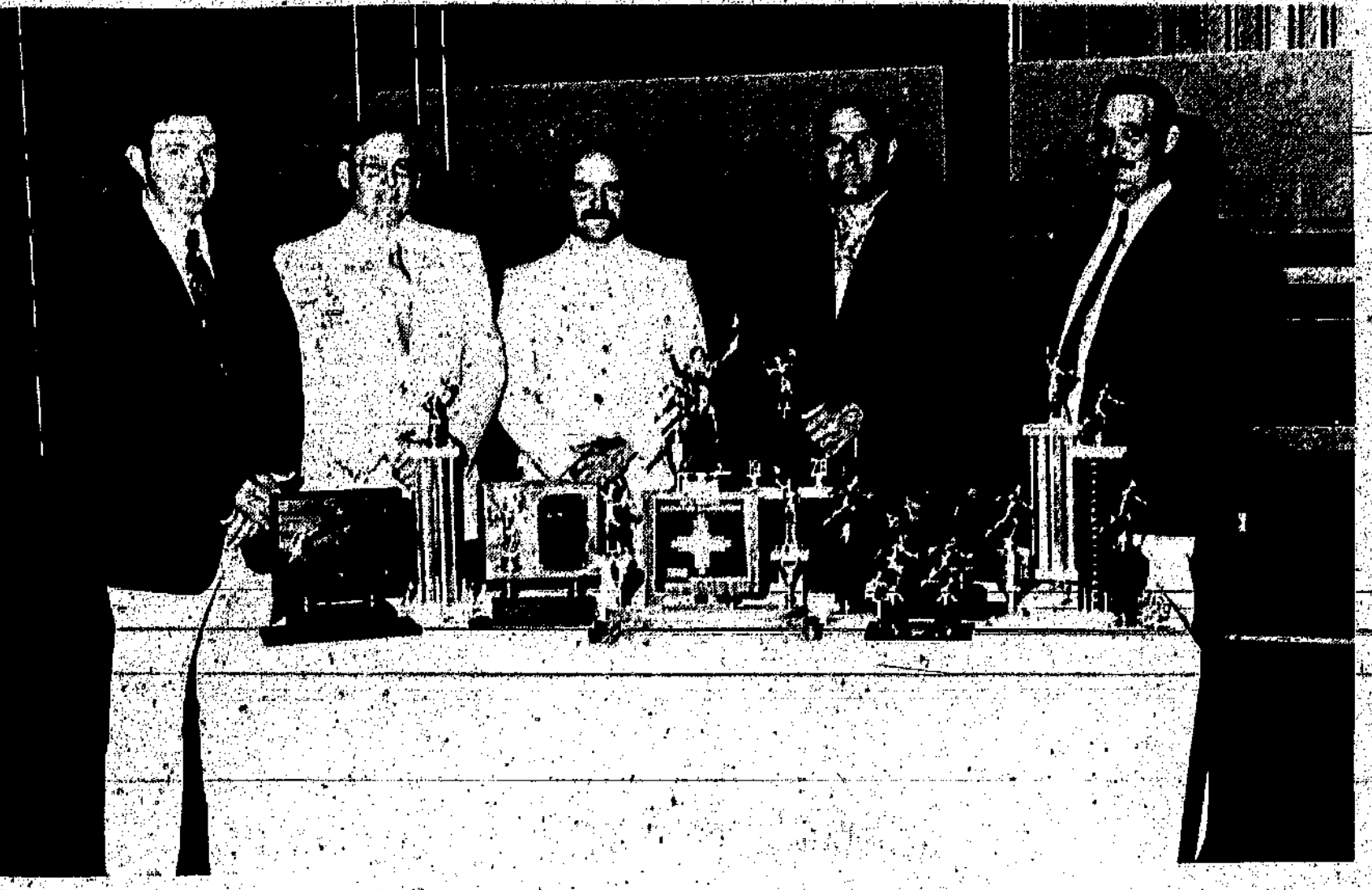

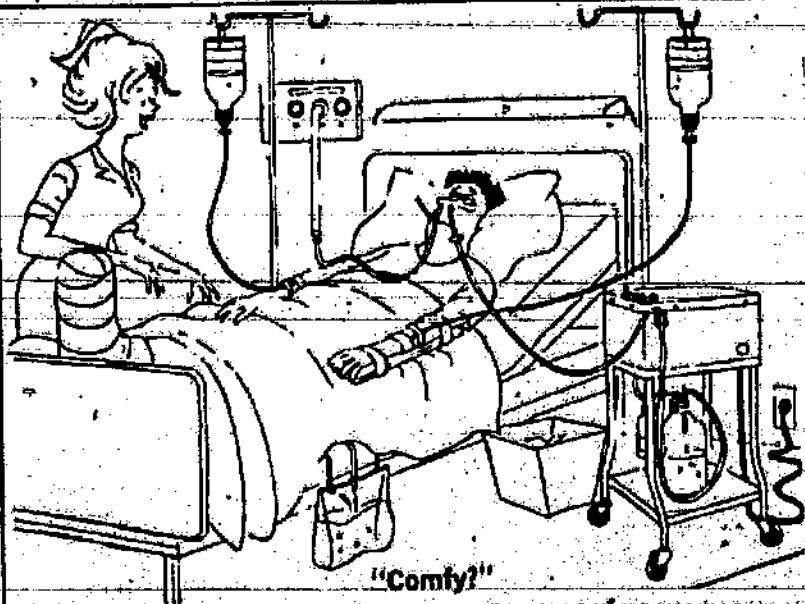

After 33 years---

## Jumbo Moves to the Gate

WHITE SANDS MISSILE RANGE - After spending more than 33 years resting in a ditch providing shade for desert wildlife, Jumbo has moved into the limelight. No, Jumbo is not an elephant.

Jumbo is a huge steel jug or bottle built during the later days of World War II to preserve plutonium in case the first atomic bomb fizzles at Trinity Site. The July 16, 1945 test proved successful without Jumbo.

Jumbo was actually at 200-ton-jug designed to contain the initial TNT blast that was to set off the chain reaction for the first nuclear blast. If the chain reaction failed, Jumbo would hold the plutonium so it could be used again in another test.

Nuclear material was scarce in 1945. In fact the U.S. only had enough to build three bombs, history books now reveal. One bomb was tested at Trinity Site on White Sands Missile Range and the other two were dropped on Japan.

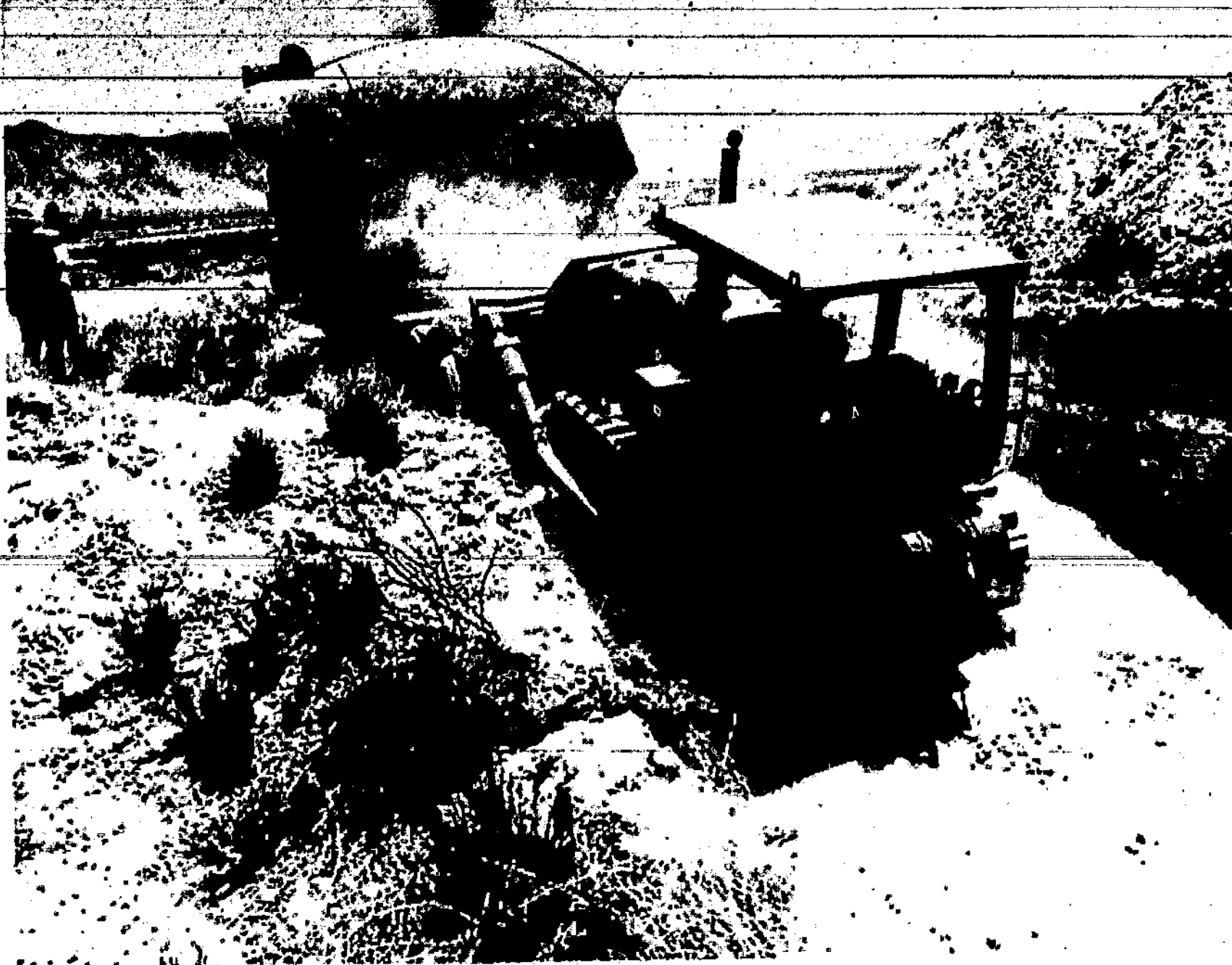
Jumbo, now resting at the main entrance to Trinity Site, was constructed in Ohio and shipped to White Sands by rail. It was hung in a tower, but was never used. A week before the

test, scientists decided not to put the bomb in Jumbo. They had gained more confidence in their design, plus they worried about the effect Jumbo would have on measuring the strength of the blast.

Jumbo came through the Trinity test unscathed. Later a munitions test managed to blow the ends open, which turned Jumbo into a simple cylinder with eight inch walls.

Last week with a bulldozer and lowboy trailer, workers from the range's Facility Engineering Directorate moved Jumbo from a ditch where it had rested for more than 30 years. Range officials wanted to make Jumbo more accessible for guests during the annual trek to Trinity each October. This year the tour will be conducted Oct. 6.

Moving the giant wreck wasn't easy, range engineers said. A ramp was dug under Jumbo. Then a bulldozer pushed the jug onto the lowboy. A similar ramp was dug at the new resting spot and Jumbo was rolled off the truck by a bulldozer.

### Airport Problems Discussed

A new proposal to take over management of the Carrizozo Municipal Airport. A trustee says that the town is in violation of its own codes. A letter of complaint against a city police officer. Two resignations from the Recreation Committee. These and many other items were discussed at the regular meeting of the Town of Carrizozo held May 16.

Many items were tabled because the town attorney was not able to be present, due to illness. Mary Rich, on behalf of her client, Alpha Minerals introduced the new proposal of submitting an application to take over management of the airport, despite the fact that the town is currently under contract with Yellow Bird, Inc., whose president Ben M. Morris was present.

Ms. Rich informed the board what her client could offer, for example: 24 hour service, increased air travel, necessary equipment, and 15 percent gross profit to the town. She added pessimistic opinion that Yellow Bird will fulfill their contract obligations. Ms. Rich stated that the airport is "not the pride of the town anymore," and her client would "endeavor to maintain the airport in the proper way".

Morris responded by saying that no service was available for four years prior to his contract. He added that he cleaned the airport and is presently in the process of locating a proper site to construct a hanger. He admitted he did not expect to make it "another Albuquerque International," but that he was making every effort to live up to his contract. Earlier in the meeting Mayor English read the following letter, a report of airport progress as requested by the board in a previous meeting:

Dear Mr. English:  
Doug Jarrard has informed me that your next council meeting will be the 2nd Monday in May. I intend to attend it if possible.

Enclosed is my financial statement in case it is of interest to the council. Also a copy of present aircraft rates.

1. I do have aviation fuel available. And have applied for my guaranteed availability of same from Department of Energy because of my Federal & State contracts.

2. I am financially ready to construct a hanger as soon as location is determined.

3. I have just purchased another helicopter from the Ventura, California Sheriff's department.

4. One helicopter will be permanently based here at Carrizozo. Of course that does not mean it will be physically here all of the time.

5. Fixed wing instruction will again be available with my nephew setting up the instruction program for both fixed wing & helicopter.

6. Enclosed is my financial statement in case it is of interest to the council. Also a copy of present aircraft rates.

7. Prices on fuel tanks for underground installation are 4000 gal approx. \$1,171.00 8,000 gal. \$1,980.00. I have installed a new wind sock & purchased two spares.

The following comments by Ms. Rich and Morris; Jim Jones, secretary-treasurer Alpha Minerals took the floor and approached the council. He informed them that in the one and a half years Yellow Bird was in management, that there was no radio communication, no one available for fueling, and weeds obstructed strip lights.

Morris at one point attempted to respond but was requested by Jones not to interrupt. Jones went on to say that the airport is well located, is a good energy strip, and a credit to the community if well-equipped and that Alpha Mineral is "ready to move in."

Mayor English said regardless of outcome, the town will install vassa lights, and a pump on an existing city-owned tank. Morris added that he

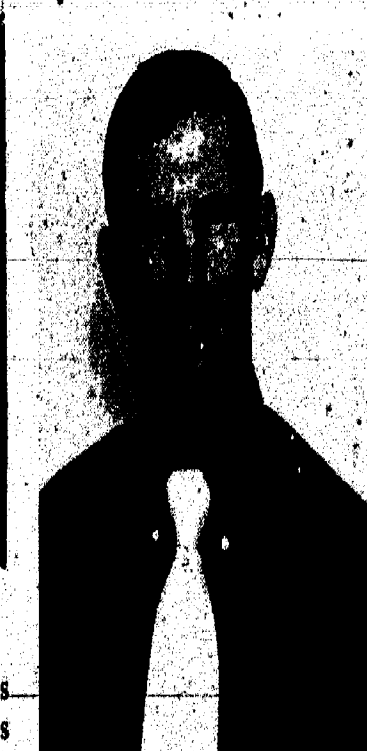
The temporary appointment was announced today by Dr. John Oren, associate director of Extension at New Mexico State University.

### M-Y T-I-M-E

I went to several graduations, and instead of my usual column, I am presenting the speech given by James Lueraas of Carrizozo. I feel this graduate thinks very much as I do.

Good evening Ladies and Gentlemen. And welcome to the 1979 commencement exercises. I would like to read to you a newspaper clipping and dedicate it to all teenagers.

Three teenage boys, products not of the slums but of a very good suburb of Cleveland, have been found guilty of 11 burglaries. Why did they commit them? They had "nothing to do."

This case inspires us to present a message we have been saving for just such an occasion. The words were delivered by a juvenile court judge—one who speaks to young people every day. This is his message:

"Always we hear the plaintive cry of the teenager: 'What can we do? Where can we go?' The answer is clear: Go home! Hang the storm windows, paint the woodwork, rake the leaves, mow the lawn, wash the car, learn to cook, scrub the floors, repair the sink, build a boat, get a job. 'Help the minister, priest or rabbi. Help the Red Cross, the Salvation Army. Visit the sick, assist the poor, study your lessons, and when you're through, read a book.'

"Your parents do not owe you entertainment. Your community does not owe you recreational facilities. The world does not owe you a living. You owe the world your time and your energy and your talents so that no one will be at war, in poverty, sick or lonely again."

"In plain, simple words, grow up. Quit being a crybaby. Get out of your dream world and develop a backbone, not a wishbone. Start acting like a man or a woman."

"You're supposed to be mature enough to accept some of the responsibility your parents have carried for years. They have nursed, protected, helped, appealed, begged, excused, and tolerated you and denied themselves needed comfort so that you could have every benefit."

"You have no right to expect them to bow to your every whim and fancy."

"In heaven's name, grow up."

Tell me honestly are we the Graduation Class of 1979 really mature. Stop and think. You always seem to hear those famous words. I'm 18 years old now I'm considered an adult. Our age doesn't make us adults our minds do, when we are ready to take on the changes that life has to offer instead of sitting on our chairs and being critics. Then that is when we are considered ADULTS, when we are ready to gather up all our courage and sail our ships on the open sea. Then that is when we are considered ADULTS, when we are willing to break that barrier between student and teacher; between child and parent and realize that they are the best thing that ever happened to us. Then my friends, we are considered adults.

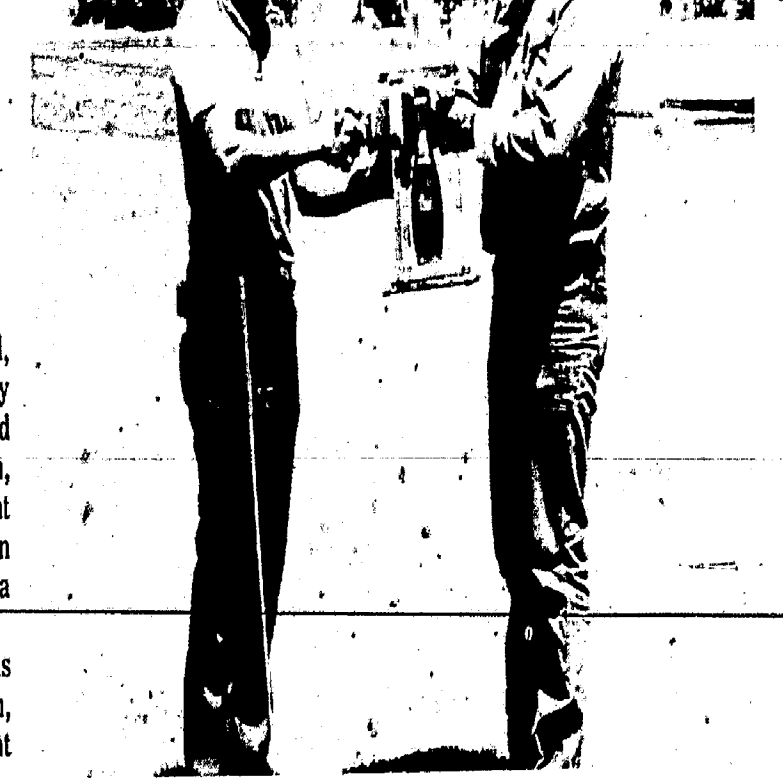
### Capitan High School Graduates Twenty-five
