

Carrizozo Clean-up is 'Big' Success

"The change is amazing," Maurice Hobson, State Representative for Lincoln and Otero Counties told the sunburned, bone weary, but happy townspeople at the bar-becue following Carrizozo's clean-up day last Saturday.

Hobson, mystery guest for the event, said he is proud that Carrizozo is part of his district. He pulled winning names for prizes out of a bag and joined the crowd in singing 'Happy Birthday' to clean-up enthusiasts Charles Adams and Sterling Spencer, who celebrated their birthdays during this town's first 'trash-a-thon'.

June 16, Carrizozo Beautification Day also marked the 5th wedding anniversary of Hobson and his wife, Linda, who live in Alamogordo.

Hobson said that this cleanup day was, "The beginnings of great things that can happen with you and for you."

He named organizations and town employees who co-sponsored the event along with the Woman's Club and Churches. Hobson said, "That's gotta be everybody in town. Let's give you good people a hand."

Hobson gave recognition to "attack captain", Joe Orsak who was Beautification Drive chairman.

Other speakers at the Rec Center for the event were town mayor, Jesse English and Michael Swickard, publisher-editor of the NEWS, who spoke of community pride.

Mayor English who strongly supported clean-up activities, said that the people involved ac-

complished, "One outstanding job" and added, "As Mayor, I appreciate this from the bottom of my heart." He said 90 percent of the effort in the project drive was by Orsak, town trustee.

Approximately 2,400 plastic bags of litter were taken to the dump. Recycling was required when supply run short. Over 1,400 swimming pool tickets were tallied for those who requested them for each bag of trash.

Branches, scrap wood and large pieces of trash were gathered separate.

Victor Cisneros, clean-up day coordinator was at the busy Rec Center base station with CB Radio. Elva Wilson was manning the Rec phone. Cisneros said the action at the Rec was "Fantastic". Runners were

all over the place.

The Beautification Drive Committee is appreciative of all services, prizes, supplies, money and labor donated for the clean-up activities, including the help of the LINCOLN COUNTY NEWS, the Town of Carrizozo and the Lincoln County Commission.

Orsak said later, "The community demonstrated that it has more spirit and pride in itself than it gives itself credit for."

"I'm proud of everyone," said See Stearns, Carrizozo Women's Club president.

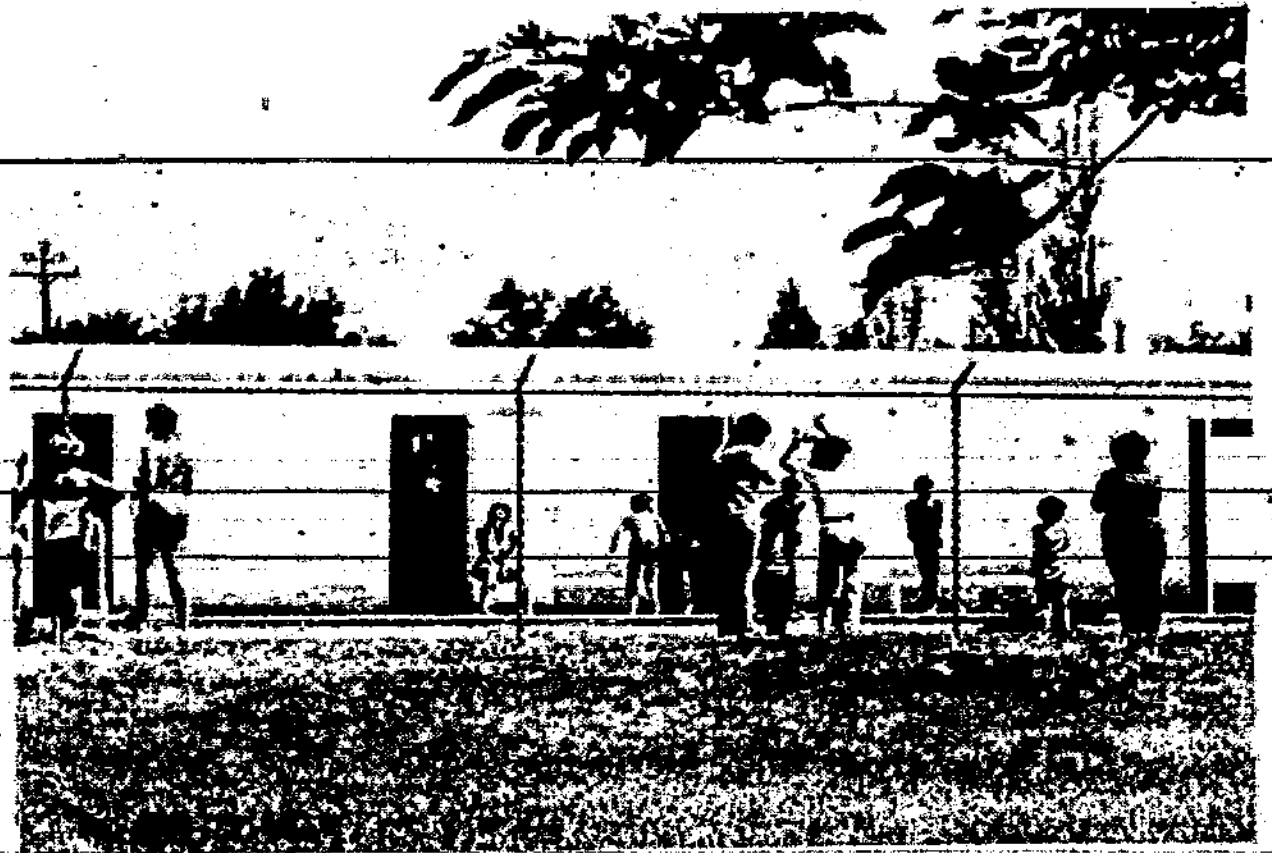
The Pittillos belong to the Assembly of God Church. They are happy to be living in Carrizozo, and Fran feels, "Carrizozo is going to boom."

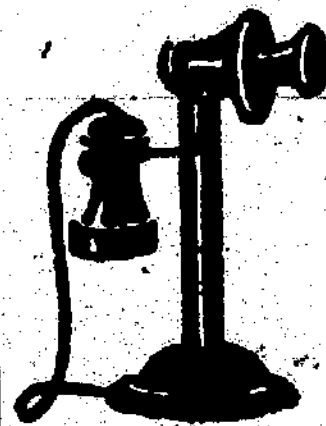

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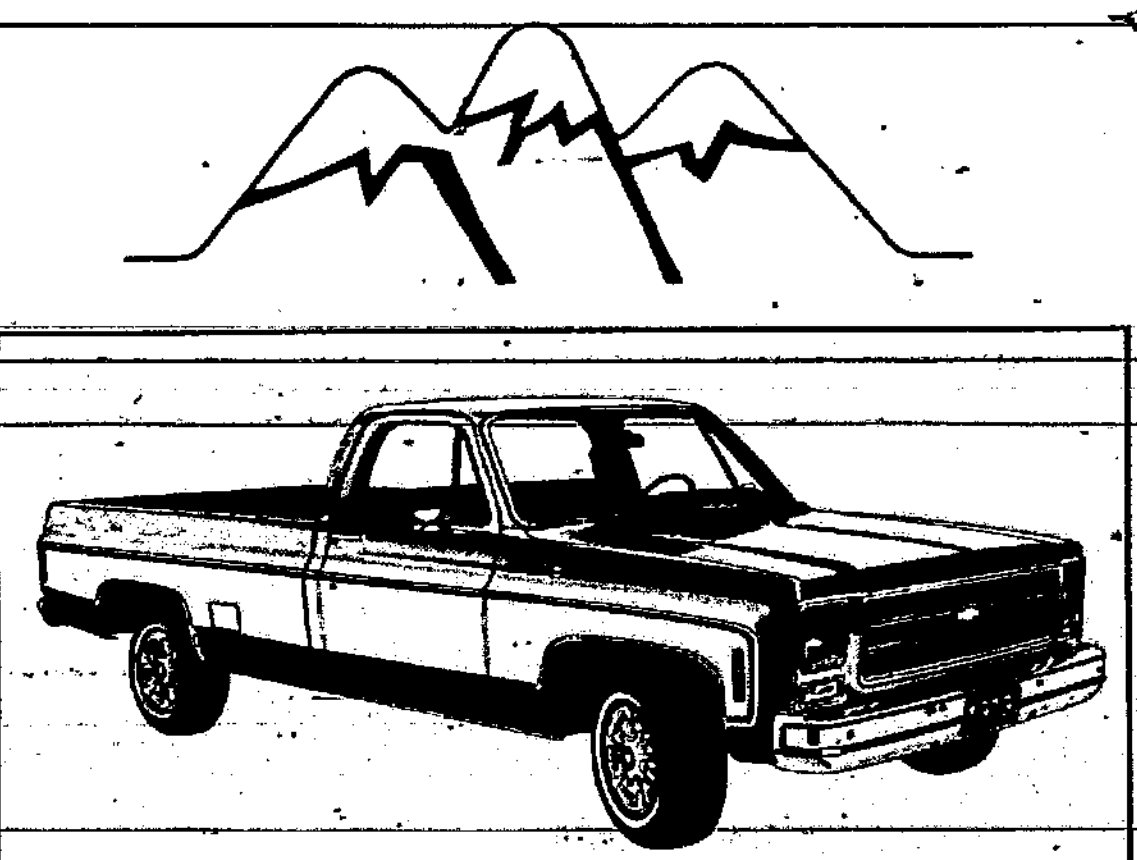

No Gas Lines In New Mexico

Allocations in May were about 80 percent of what they were a year ago; in June, they'll be about 95 percent.

There haven't been any lines at gas stations anywhere in the state, and there've been few closings on Sundays. Per-gallon prices at self-serve pumps on Thursday (May 31) were averaging about 72 cents for diesel, 78 cents for regular, 83 cents for unleaded and 86 cents for premium.

There are 24-hour-a-day, seven-day-a-week stations in every major community along Interstates 40, 25 (except Las Vegas) and 10; U.S. Highway 285 and State Highway 44; and in Clayton and Clovis. In other communities, stations generally have been open from 5 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Anyone having specific questions on gasoline availability and travel in New Mexico can call first from out-of-state and then from in-state, toll-free. The out-of-state number is 800-545-9877; the in-state number is 800-432-4269.

Both toll-free numbers operate from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., MST, Monday through Friday.

Inside the Capitol

By Fred McCaffrey

SANTA FE—As the Capital city began to fill with its summer supply of tourists, politicians continued to go their own way and do their own things. For example:

TIGHT SUPPLY: There wasn't much cabinet secretary Larry Kehoe, our man in charge of energy and minerals, could tell the Legislature's new interim Energy and Environment Committee in two hours on the stand except that things will get a lot worse before they get better. Gasoline supplies to the state are down at least 5 percent this month as compared to same month last year, and likely to remain at least that much down until September, Kehoe says gasoline supplies will fluctuate—now tight, now slightly looser—for at least the next ten years. It will be interesting to see what if anything a legislative committee can do to ease that situation.

GRACEFUL RETREAT: Judges of Supreme Court voted unanimously to reverse themselves on that new rule which would have allowed judges at all levels to moonlight to increase their income, as long as they didn't practice law. Outcry from public and straight talk from some of their legal brethren apparently helped to speed decision on this subject. Look for judges, through newly established New Mexico Judges Association, to mount strong lobbying campaign for increased pay for themselves and court employees.

LITTLE HELPER: Governor Jerry Brown of California did not attend the Western Governor's Conference in Idaho. He can't leave home, because he can't trust his Lieutenant Governor, who is a Republican. Governor Bruce King has a Lieutenant Governor who is a member of his own party, but who likes to go off on his own. Last time he was acting governor, he declared state of emergency, for first time in

state's history, over something which hadn't happened yet. This time, he commuted sentence of a prisoner in the pen, admittedly a friend of his family, though Governor thought he had made it clear he thought the commutation was a bad idea. Governor King's undoubtedly right when he says, "We're going to have to have some understandings."

WARNINGS: Ex-Governor Jerry Apodaca used to threaten anyone who mentioned the existence of some wiretap evidence that crooks were using his name with severe damage, including libel suits. He seems to have mellowed a little. Last week, in an interview, he said on the subject of these mysterious FBI tapes: "They're not hard to understand. Just a small-time hood bragging to a bigger one, to impress him. When you're in office, your name gets used. Anybody who's ever been elected to an office worth having has had that experience."

NOTE BOARD: Chances that Harold Runnels will run for governor, once thought to be 50-50, have now moved up to 95 percent, according to Runnels' friend Ben Alexander of Hobbs, whose word you can believe.

YES OR NO? Governor King says he vetoed that Right to Work bill passed by the last Legislature. Attorney General Jeff Bingaman agrees that the Governor did everything all nice and legal. But there's one man

who still disagrees. He claims we now have a Right to Work law in effect, as of last Friday. He's House Speaker Gene Samberson of Lovington, who says he's studied the matter and studied it and, no matter what Bingaman says, the Gov's veto was invalid. Samberson, who was a Right to Work supporter himself, says he has no plans for going to court to test his position, so the two—Governor King, who keeps saying "no no no," and Samberson, who keeps saying "yes yes yes"—may end up holding those positions for some time to come.
