## "National Interest" Cancels Airport

The hopes for a regional airport at site "B" of the Fort Stanton federal reservation were concluded Monday with a ruling by the United States Department of the Interior that "the national interest would best be served by allowing the present use, that of range research to continue."

Secretary of the Interior, Cecil Andrus wrote his objections, that of national priority, to Governor Bruce King. In part he stated:

"While I recognized the need for a new airport facility to serve the immediate Ruidoso area, I also had to consider the value of the present use

of the proposed site to the general public.

After careful deliberation, I concluded that the national interest would best be served by allowing the present use, that of range research to continue."

Andrus noted in his remarks that his decision confirming the BLM recommendation to reject Site B was based on the merits of the site, and was not an indication that the Department of the Interior or the BLM is against airport development.

"You may be assured that the BLM will expeditiously review any

other airport application to serve the Ruidoso region that the FAA may propose that would affect public lands," Andrus wrote.

Governor King's office released the Andrus letter Monday afternoon with the Governor commenting that in view of the fact that there is a large amount of other public land near Ruidoso, "It seems that a viable site can certainly be found."

The Governor had tried in the last few weeks to strike a compromise on the use of the Site B. The Sierra Blanca Airport Commission had recently agreed to ask for as little as 300 acres for a new airport.

King's efforts at mediation apparently failed because the 300 acre proposal was not raised at hearings that the BLM held on the airport location.

The 5,100 foot Carrizozo Airport and buildings are contained on 280 acres of land.

The Site B for the Regional Airport on the Fort Stanton Reservation was the one recommended several years ago by the Herkenhoff engineering firm of Albuquerque, the consulting engineer for the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission.

## Full Moon Programs Start at White Sands

An unusual range of subjects will be covered by top notch speakers at special full moon programs at White Sands National Monument on July 9, 10 and 11.

"If you've wondered how satellites from space can locate fresh water, minerals or make accurate crop assessments on our tiny planet, come on out and find out" invited Superintendent Donald Harper. This is only one of the special subjects to be covered in this summer series of programs in the dunes picnic area at 8:45 p.m. Following these programs, the dunes area will be open until midnight.

On Monday, July 9, a prominent geologist from El Paso, Dr. William Cornell, will present a slide talk on "Continental Drift, or How America Really Got Where It Is Today." Cornell is on the University of Texas-El Paso Geology staff and covers an engrossing subject little understood by the lay person. Also, a well-known area paleontologist, Cornell has B.S. and M.A. Degrees from the University of Rhode Island and a Ph.D. in Geology from U.C.L.A. "Most of the continents fit together like a giant jig-saw puzzle if you really analyze the globe," Cornell will point out.

Dr. Ernest A. Steinhoff, eminent space scientist and aeronautical engineer from Alamogordo, will give slide program on Tuesday, July 10. Steinhoff, a native of Germany, has an M.A. and Ph.D. Degree in aeronautical engineering and engineering physics from the Darmstadt Institute of Technology Darmstadt, West Germany. One of Germany's pioneer space scientists, Steinhoff worked with Von Braun on the German V-2 project at Peenemuende, Germany from 1939 until 1944.

Coming to the United States, in 1945, Steinhoff has worked on many of this country's top space projects since that time. Now Steinhoff has turned his many talents to remote sensing projects. His program is called

"Remote Sensing and How It Serves Man's Needs." Use of satellites to locate, manage and assess for more effective use, crops, oil, mineral and water resources will be explained in this intriguing talk.

Rounding out the series of programs on Wednesday, July 11, will be Vernon Brook, well-known area archeologist from El Paso. This special slide program is entitled, "Pre-Historic Tularosa People - 10,000 Years of Survival." Brook has a B.A. in education from T.C.U. and an

M.A. from Texas Western (UTEP). Without such aids as the well, metal, burden animals or written records, pre-historic man adapted and survived in the Tularosa Basin for at least 10,000 years. There, by 1400 A.D. he had disappeared. By analyzing the artifacts and ruins these people left behind, archeologists have been able to reconstruct a fairly accurate picture of their subsistence activities.

Brook will show slides of excavated houses and artifacts used

for hunting, food gathering and preparation, pottery waxing and ceremonies, while suggesting what might have happened to these people long ago.

The beautiful white sands by full moon and an expert group of guest speakers will certainly keep you on the edge of your dune. "Come on out for this special treat and remember to keep your radio tuned to 1610 AM for latest information when in the area," Superintendent Harper concluded.

## Weather Data System

A continuous weather information system to provide 24-hour up-to-date, general weather information has been installed in New Mexico. says Charles Glover, Extension agronomist at New Mexico State University.

Currently there are seven transmitters in the state. They are located near Farmington, Santa Fe, Albuquerque, Melrose, Jallamar, Ruidoso and Las-Cruces. Reception range is 100 miles around Santa Fe and Ruidoso, and 40 miles elsewhere in the state.

This National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration Weather Station is available on 162.400 MHz in Las Cruces, Albuquerque and Maljamar; 162.375 MHz in Melrose and Farmington; and 162.550 MHz in Santa Fe and Ruidoso. Most multi-band radios offer a weather band.

All transmitters are operated from the Weather Service Forecast Office in Albuquerque. Individual programs are tailored to the area of signal reception.

Routine programming will always include the latest current forecasts (updated at least every six hours) and a narrative summary of regional weather conditions. Some current climatology is also broadcast

early in the morning and weather forecasts and advisories especially written for farmer are broadcast through portions of the day. The complete broadcast cycle ranges from two to six minutes before repeating.

When severe weather conditions exist or are forecast for a reception area, routine programming is suspended to permit frequent repetition of the latest warnings and advisories. Most special warnings will be preceded by a 1050 Hz "warning alarm" signal which activates some receivers and is audible from others even when turned to minimum volume. This alerting is routinely tested each Wednesday near noon when weather permits, Glover says.

### Gross Receipts 4 1/2 %

The gross receipts tax in Lincoln County was increased as of July first to 1 1/2 percent. The move from 4 percent to 4 1/2 percent was made possible by the legislature dropping 1/2 percent from the state tax, and allowing the individual towns to raise to 4 1/2 percent if the towns needed the extra tax money.

Most of the towns went to the 4 1/2 percent because of state and federal regulations stated that the communities would not get grants unless they were "taxed to capacity". This means that the government wasn't going to help communities that didn't first help themselves.

The 1/2 percent increase will mean about \$3,000 a year increase for the town of Carrizozo.

The tax increase was approved by the individual town councils with the provision that the voters had the right to bring the issue to a vote. None of the communities were forced into a referendum on the tax increase after the town councils a meeting last October to explain the reasons for the increase.

The gross receipts tax is a percentage of money that is collected by all businesses in Lincoln County with the exception of Liquor Establishments. The money is sent from each business to Santa Fe and then distributed to the Communities.

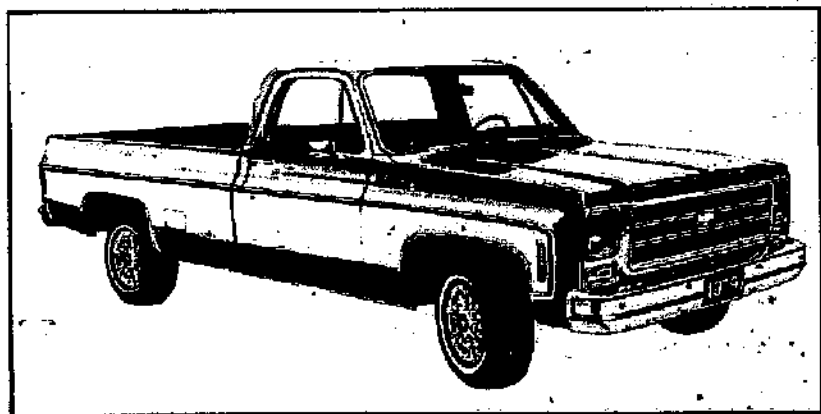

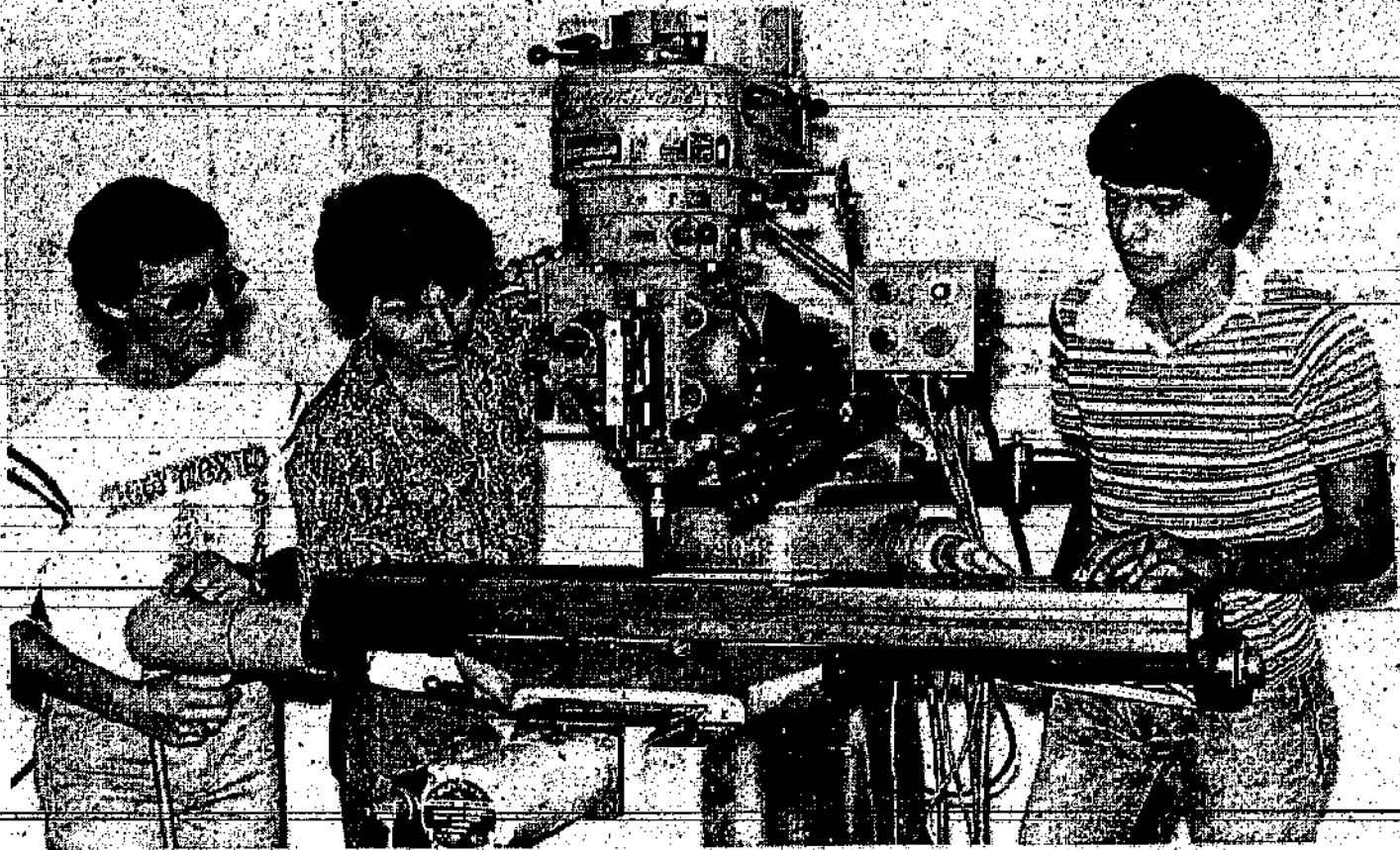

A short business meeting was held at which time it was decided to attend the Ranchman's Camp Meeting on Nogal Mesa for the July meeting.

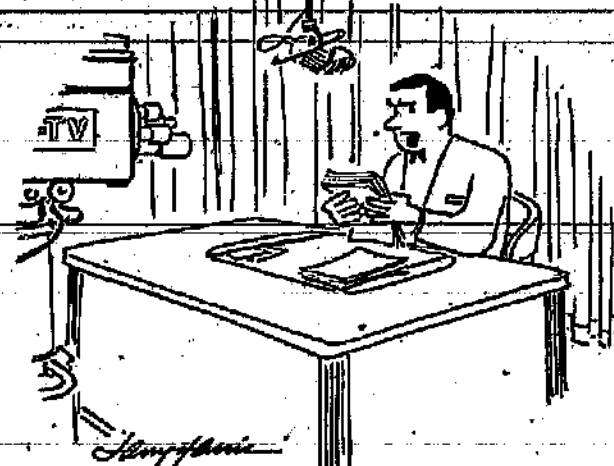

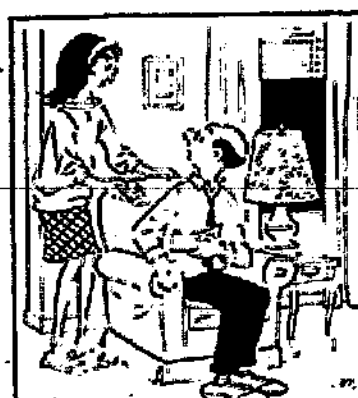

### Telecommunications And The West

For the past several months, the Senate Communications Subcommittee, of which I am a member, has been holding hearings on S. 622 and S. 611, bills to amend the Communications Act of 1934. We have taken testimony from 152 witnesses over a 22 day period. To date, the hearings have supported the view that the legislation, S. 622, which Senator Barry Goldwater and I introduced, is the best starting point for preserving the good parts of our present telecommunications system while encouraging improvements in service made possible by new technologies. These new technologies can improve the availability of a wide variety of medical, educational, and entertainment services.

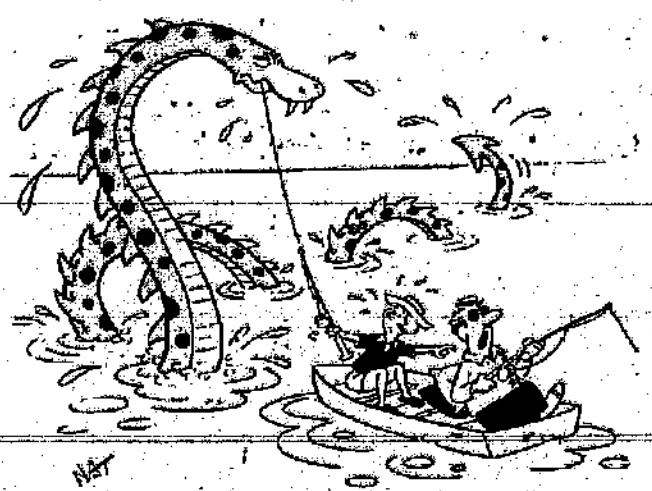
Before we pass any comprehensive telecommunications legislation, however, Congress must specifically address the unique communication needs of rural America. Basic telephone service must continue to be available in all parts of this country at reasonable rates. With the advent of new technologies and the eventual deregulation of the telecommunications industry, the Congress should ensure that telephone service in rural areas will not be impaired. These areas should have equitable and steadily improving access to high quality phone systems and other telecommunications services which can significantly improve the quality of life.

To achieve this goal, I have introduced an amendment to S. 622 which calls for the creation, within the Executive Branch, of a Federal Rural Telecommunications Council to coordinate federal policies and programs. The Council would include the Secretary of Commerce, the Secretary of Agriculture, the representatives of various federal agencies, and the governors of States with major rural communication needs.

Once needs and programs are coordinated, an effective means of ensuring delivery of these services to rural areas must be provided. Thus, my amendment would also establish the non-profit Rural Telecommunications Development Corporation. The Corporation will be responsible for stimulating the provision of rural telecommunications services by interacting with Federal and State governments and the private sector.

The Corporation would also assist others in delivering services to rural America. Satellites, cable, fiber optics, and translators are just a few of the delivery systems available. In addition to conducting research and training programs, the Corporation would be able to intervene with Federal agencies, to facilitate the provision of telecommunications services to rural areas.

New Mexico, which has not always profited from the present regulatory system, deserves improved telecommunications service. With the advent of the Rural Telecommunications Development Council and the Corporation, New Mexico and the entire West will receive the most advanced telecommunications services available.
