"State Basketball Champs of 1943"

Capitan Reunion Honors

"State Basketball Champs of 1943" was the main theme of the Capitan High School Class reunion. About 125 former students and their guests gathered in the Capitan Multipurpose building to once again honor those players.

Melvin Ferris a former Capitan student who has been researching State Basketball Tournaments, detailed that winning season.

"In 1943 there were no classes," Ferris stated. "Capitan competed against all schools." But that year it didn't matter. Capitan clobbered Hobbs 40-20 for its season opener. And so it went from there with the team finally losing to Lovington. By then the school was on its way to the top.

The big semi-final against Dawson was broadcast by KOB radio, Capitan going all the way 29-27 and finding itself face to face with Navajo Mission, the toughest school around. Capitan won 15-13, the underdog little school on top.

"Times were much the same then as now," Ferris said. "There was gas rationing, and many schools stayed out of competition because of it."

But for Capitan, the 1943 players were heroes.

Among the 1943 graduates was JoNell Brooks, Dean of Women at ENMU.

Thanks for including the former faculty was said by several. Former Basketball Coach "Red" Schuman, 1935-1939, Miss Tuttle and Opal Peters

all thanked everyone rathered for remembering.

The next meeting of Capitan graduates will be July 25, 1981 Hollis Cummins announced.

A dinner and dance concluded the two-day gathering.

Former students representing classes from 1929 to 1972 were on hand to see Hollis Cummins, master of ceremonies, present momentos of that year in basketball. Of that team, five were present and one deceased. Geoffrey Chavez, Maggie Silva,

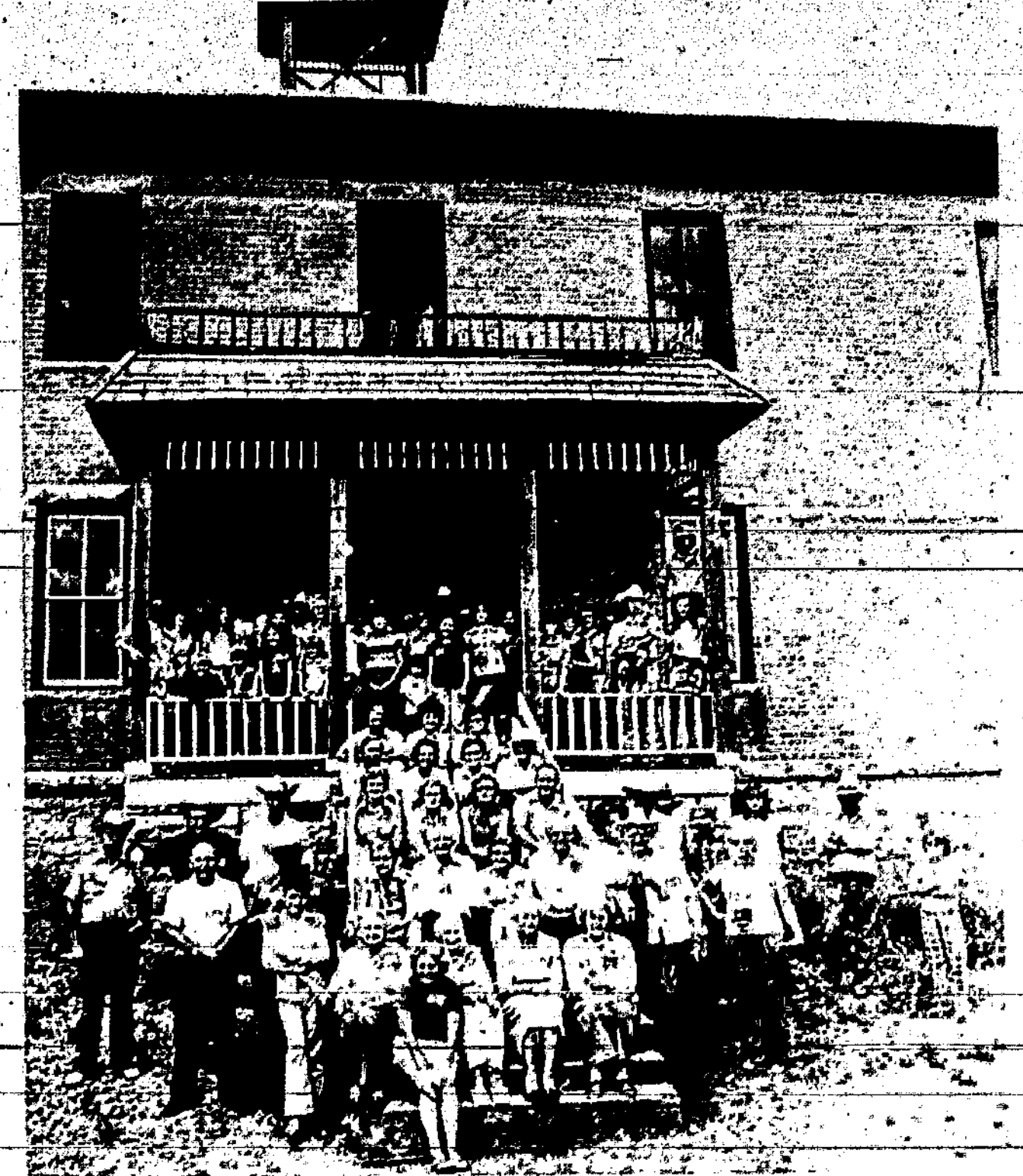
Alberto Gallegos, Leon Fraher, and Ergil Brown received photos of that 1943 team. Deceased is Rosje Runnels.

Ergil Brown was all-state player that year and was listed as one of the best players in New Mexico in 1940-50.

gravy, eggs, bacon, juice or coffee. For those preferring a light breakfast, juice or coffee, biscuits and jam will be available for just \$1.00.

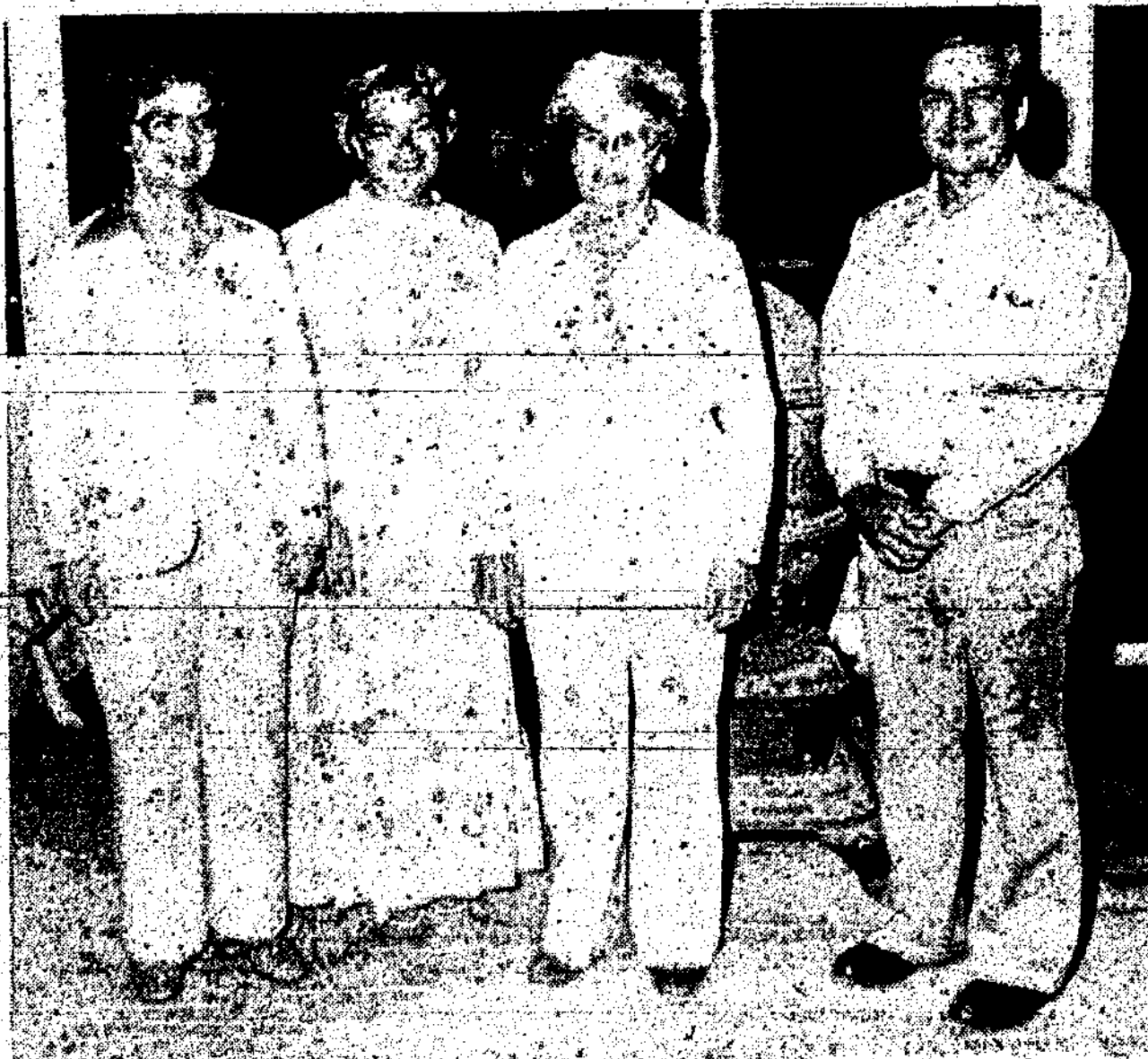
Following the business meeting, Mrs. Florence Ward of Alamogordo presented the program for the evening. Mrs. Ward taught at the

Cooperative Celebrates 40th Year

Otero County Electric Cooperative, Inc. is celebrating its 40th year of operation. Otero County Electric Cooperative was organized October 18, 1939 with the aim to make electric energy available to its members at the lowest cost consistent with sound economy and good management.

The Cooperative began in Clouderoft, New Mexico with the purchase of the Southern Pacific Railroad's generating plant and facilities in Clouderoft.

The first loan from the Rural Electrification Administration (REA) was for \$80,000.00 to build 76 miles of line from High Rolls, New Mexico to below Elk, New Mexico.

Mobile generators were purchased and for a period of years Otero County Electric generated its own power.

As the Cooperative began to outgrow its generating facilities they joined with other Cooperatives in the state to form Plains Generating and Transmission Cooperative located in Albuquerque for the purpose of

supplying electricity to the members of the Cooperative.

Otero County Electric Cooperative, Inc. still buys its power from Plains Generating and Transmission Cooperative, Inc.

When the Cooperative organized in October 18, 1939 the original incorporators were: Ray Daniels, L.A. Hendrix, J. M. Walker, M. D. Brantley, Bryan Runyan, Charles Bell, Mrs. A.L. Cleve, Mrs. Ora Swope and John Mershon.

Ray Daniels was the first President of the Board of Trustees. J.B. Runyan is the present President of the Board. J.B. Runyan has served continuously for 40 years.

J.B. Runyan was on the original Board of Trustees of Otero County Electric Cooperative and has been President of the Board twice - once from 1952 to 1956 and the other from 1962 onward. He was instrumental in organizing the Penasco Valley Telephone Cooperative and served as its President until 1978. He is President of the Artesia Wool Cooperative, a director of the First

National Bank of Artesia, Valley Savings and Loan and has served on the Board of Directors of the Albuquerque Production Credit Association, Penasco Valley Soil Conservation District, the Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management Grazing Advisory Boards.

J.B. Runyan has been a 32nd degree Mason since 1922, a Shriner since 1932. He is a member of the New Mexico Apple Council, New Farm and Livestock Bureau, New Mexico Cattle Growers Association, the New Mexico Wool Growers Association, and the National Cattle Growers Association.

Otero County Electric Cooperative now serves 7,267 consumers over 10,000 square miles stretching from Orogrande to north of Carrizozo, east nearly to Roswell and back south to below Pinon. The power lines have grown to 1,900 miles of line. The electric system is valued in excess of 12 million dollars. Otero County Electric Cooperative has its main office in Clouderoft with branch offices in Alto and Carrizozo.

In addition to touring the building, Schmitt has expressed interest in viewing the Einstein Centennial Exhibit which had its New Mexico premiere at the Space Hall July 20. The exhibit centers on the myriad aspects of Einstein as a scientist and humanitarian.

Also to be included in the Senator's visit will be a walking tour of the construction of the ISHF Outdoor Exhibit. Schmitt will be given a detailed account of the plans for the scheduled display of several space vehicles and will view the first phase of the display, the Little Joe rocket.

Lincoln County's 24 Hour HELpline

Some of the most serious of life's problems come at very inconvenient times. It was with this consideration in mind that the 24 Hour HELpline was established in Lincoln County in February of this year. Although the service is most often called a "crisis line", Sandy Taylor, marriage and family therapist and coordinator of the HELpline, describes it as more accurately a "listening and referral service". Volunteer workers are trained to handle emergencies as well as less urgent problems.

Since there is no 24 hour answering service in Lincoln County, the calls are routed through an answering service in Alamogordo. The HELpline number is 1-437-8680 and collect calls are accepted when a caller feels unable to pay. Once a person calls, the answering service immediately contacts the volunteer on schedule for that time and the call

is returned by the volunteer in a matter of a few minutes.

A large percentage of the calls to the HELpline involve family problems. Also frequent among calls are those involving varying degrees of depression and loneliness. Occasionally callers are troubled enough to be considering suicide. Other reasons people call the HELpline include drug or alcohol problems, child abuse and rape.

Referral to the proper source for help is a very important part of the service and this is one of three major areas in which volunteers are trained. All volunteers have a thorough knowledge of the resources in the county and are provided with a list of available services. Referrals are often made to the counseling centers in Ruidoso and Carrizozo, to public agencies, to the clergy and to private sources. The two other major skills taught to volunteers are listening skills and how to be nonjudgmental in dealing with persons in crisis.

The Lincoln County HELpline is staffed entirely by residents of Lincoln County from Carrizozo, Ruidoso, Corona, Nogal and rural areas. All have had at least 10 hours of special training sessions before beginning work and most have had more. All volunteers sign a statement of their intent to keep all contacts confidential, and both callers and volunteers remain anonymous to further insure confidentiality.

Ms. Taylor said, "There is no real way to measure the success of a program such as the HELpline except in human terms, and perhaps that is also the best way. It is difficult to assess the value of the supportive human contact provided to troubled persons."

The HELpline is a service of the Lincoln County Mental Health Association operated through Lincoln County Counseling Centers located at Four Seasons Mall in Ruidoso and, as of August 1, 1979, at the County Health Office in the Courthouse Annex in Carrizozo.

Capitan Schools today announced its policy for free & reduced-price meals, free milk (free and reduced-priced meals, free milk, as applicable) for children eligible for such meals-milk served under the National School Lunch, School Breakfast, and Special Milk Programs (as applicable).

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced-price meals and free milk (free and reduced-price meals and free milk as applicable.)

In addition, families not meeting these criteria but with other unusual expenses due to unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply.

If there is a change in family income due to reasons such as unemployment, or there is a change in family size, parents and guardians are urged to contact school officials. Such changes may qualify students for free or reduced price meals and free milk (as applicable).

Application forms are being sent to all homes in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available in the principal's office in each school. The information provided in the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

To discourage the possibility of misrepresentation, the application forms contain a statement above the space for signature certifying that all information furnished in the application is true and correct. An additional statement is added to warn that the application is being made in connection with the receipt of federal funds, that school officials may, for cause, verify the information in the application, and that deliberate misrepresentation of information may subject the applicant to prosecution under applicable state and federal criminal statutes.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals and milk for them, it should contact the school.

In the operation of child nutrition programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, or Under the provisions of the policy, Glen Crane (title of approving official) will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent, is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official he may make a request either orally or in writing to Richard Clifton P.O. Box 278 Capitan, N. Mex. telephone No. 354-2238 (name, address, phone of the hearing official) for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

Parental conferences may be called to verify information on applications prior to formal hearings.

Each school and the office of the Superintendent (central office) has a copy of the complete policy which may be reviewed by any interested party.
