Council to Consider Ordinance

The Town of Carrizozo regular meeting was called to order last Monday by Trustee Hernandez, Mayor Pro-tem, in the absence of Mayor Jesse English.

The various items of business on the agenda included the reading of Farmington's municipal ordinance, Section 21-17 by Town Attorney Bill Payne, Municipal Judge S.M. Ortiz requested that Payne bring the ordinance before the council. The council agreed to take the ordinance under advisement. The ordinance reads as follows:

"...Disorderly House. It shall be unlawful for any person to keep any common, ill-governed or disorderly house or to suffer any drunkenness, quarreling, fighting, gambling, or any riotous or disorderly conduct whatever on his premises or the premises under his direct possession or control."

One trustee said with a smile that this ordinance in part, could destroy the institution of marriage.

Permission was granted by the Town of Carrizozo to Pat Vigil to move his insurance business into the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce building where he will be a real estate salesman with Mary Rich.

Rene Burton, executive secretary of the Chamber, presented the request on behalf of Ms. Rich who could not be there. Ms. Rich has a two year town lease on the building, which is the location of her real estate business. Ms. Burton mentioned that Ms. Rich has made many improvements to the building, including landscaping.

Hernandez and trustees discussed problems in the Recreation Center management, such as business hours not clear and trade of Center not being equally distributed among town merchants. It was decided that the Recreation Committee which met next day call the management for a conference. A suggestion was made that one or more trustees attend the Recreation Committee meeting concerning the matter.

During the 'audience participation' part of the meeting, Hernandez jokingly asked the audience, "Anybody have any rocks to throw at us?"

Mrs. Sabino Sandoval, Cedar Street, said, "I don't, but there's plenty by my house," referring to the school bus routes on the south side of town which were 'repaired' by the county.

Hernandez assured Mrs. Vega that the county would redo the routes in more satisfactory manner. Mrs. Sandoval requested that the town road (Cedar) that runs directly in front of her house be fixed as sometimes it is impassable and rain waters drain from it into her property. The Town will see what can be done about the condition.

Mrs. Sandoval joined Mrs. Danny Narvaez of Birch Street in a complaint concerning offensive smells coming from cesspools or sewers in their neighborhood. Mrs. Narvaez had complained last summer and on other occasions to

Mayor English about the situation. The problem was looked into but still exists, depending on wind direction, Town Superintendent Beltran will make a more thorough investigation.

It was brought to the council's attention that the town dump gate is locked when residents go there with trash. Mrs. Sandoval said her husband recently wasted gas driving to the dump and "gave the trash a ride." She suggested that an hour sign be erected at town dump gate.

Hernandez said that two days have always been available for special trash disposal, although many are not aware of this. Every Thursday, town employees pick up trash that doesn't belong in alley containers. It is advised that request be made a day in advance and trash placed in alley, not yard. Saturday 8:00 AM to 6:00 PM the dump is open to the public for their own dumping purposes.

Two dwellings south of town were pointed out by Mrs. Sandoval and Mrs. Narvaez as unsafe. The structures located on Birch and Dogwood Streets will be checked out.

Payne said that five or six years ago the Chamber of Commerce teamed up to make a complete list of town property ownership. Unsafe places were noted and as a result some houses were torn down and others repaired. There has been no follow-up on the project. The council discussed a need for such a plan once again.

Trustee reports included the need of paved street repair, the availability of a landfill fund for fencing and improvements to present site.

School Board Hires Eight

The Carrizozo School board met August 14. The resignations of the following were accepted Mr. Paul Salgado, Mr. Henry Paul, Mrs. Jetty Jo Paul, Mr. Don Hollis and Mr. David Collins. Eileen Serna turned in her bus driving resignation.

A number of teachers were hired on the recommendation of Dr. Jim Miller, superintendent. New teachers for the 79-80 school year are Ms. Carolyn Ward, Mid-school math; Mr. Jerry Peckinpugh, Mid-school language, Arts and JV football; Mr. Alfred Madrid, High school science, Varsity volleyball, JV basketball, Assistant Track; Mr. Joseph F. Schipper, P.E., Health, Basketball Coach, assist in other sports; Ms. Shirley Taylor, High School language, Arts, TV Studio; Mrs. Jane Erwin, part time Title I Teacher; Mr. Rich Bush, Mid-school science.

Special ed, math and counseling positions will be filled this week and board approved. Classes begin August 20th. The board approved the employment of Joe Chavez as custodian.

Miller told the board that he would like to publically recognize four individuals who have come to the aid

of the school. Mr. Henry Vega, golf course superintendent and Mr. Emilio Beltran, town superintendent for their participation in getting the football field in shape and Mr. Albert Zamora, frozen food locker owner who stored school food at no cost when school freezer went out. Miller recognized school board chairman Sterling Spencer for his work on the playground.

Miller announced that there has been an increase in the price of cafeteria meals, from 50 cents to 60 cents per meal. There will be an improvement to menu.

Thursday, August 17 at 10:00 AM bids will be opened for a 1979 or 1980, 47 passenger activity bus. The board meeting included the consideration and adoption of bids, among them elementary floor covering, electrical plumbing, plant maintenance, and janitorial supplies.

Trustee Ortiz recognized the 21 years or so of town policing by Chief of Police Morales. Ortiz said that Morales has been working extra due to the fact that police department is short one man who is at the police academy and that Mr. Baker has quit. The council approved the temporary employment of Danny Watson.

A 26 unit trailer park, Triangle Mobile Home Village is ready for business. Rate and a half for utilities will be charged managers because park is located outside city limits. Three mobile homes on Central Avenue were discussed. One trailer who is legally parked because of a 'grandfather clause' is willing to move. A police escort will be provided the owner to his new location. The two other trailers on Central are in violation of the town ordinance and owners will be notified.

Hernandez said that, "quite a few people are interested in doing something" in honor of Juan Jiron who passed away after 20 some years of service to the town. A plaque of recognition will be presented to the family of the former town worker.

A letter addressed to Mayor English was read by Hernandez concerning the Four Winds Restaurant and Lounge trash. Weldon Spencer, Crossroads-Frontier owner signed the letter that suggests that Four Winds owner, James Silva erect a wire cage to keep his trash confined in cans.

Silva will be given a formal notice and a time period to build an enclosure so that the 'winds' will not blow the Four Winds trash to adjacent businesses or face a \$300.00 fine.

Dear Editor

I thought the city was a terrible place for animals being allowed to roam and breed, but it seems the city is nothing to compare with Lincoln County. We certainly need a Humane Society and I am glad to hear one is being organized. I don't understand the callous attitude toward animals held by residents of Lincoln County. Since we moved here, numerous cats and dogs have roamed the area. The attitude is no better toward wild animals. My reasons for bitterness are:

We have had a cat population explosion at our house. Someone allowed three female cats to roam and breed indiscriminately. All three, hardly more than kittens themselves, were skinny, hungry, neglected, and I

took pity on them and fed them. One of these I managed to have neutered before she had kittens. The other two (one a beautiful calico cat, the other a lovely, sweet all-black cat) unbeknownst to me had kittens before they came to our place for a hand-out.

First the calico cat brought her month-old kittens (two blacks, one orange and white), then the black cat brought her kittens (two black, one black and white) to our place. Guess they thought it was a safe harbor for their babies with a plentiful food supply. The kittens are adorable; they are playful, alert, and healthy. All are eating and drinking from dishes.

I would like to find homes for these cats as I cannot afford to feed so many cats. I hope one of your readers will call me at 354-2499 and adopt one of these kittens; enough sympathetic readers of your newspaper adopting a cat each, would show me that Lincoln County isn't so bad after all.

Western Charity Ball Set

The personnel of the Lincoln County Health Center in Carrizozo are trying to provide the best service possible to their patients, but that service can be greatly enhanced by the purchase of some very badly needed lab equipment.

At the present time, most clinical tests must be sent to El Paso for processing with a delay in diagnosis of 2 or 3 days. Sister Adele is a licensed qualified technician, whose abilities are not being utilized because of lack of equipment, and expenses increased for the patients.

Previously, a drive for funds was made with the hopes of opening the hospital, but fell far short of that possibility. It would require too great an amount to open the hospital again and keep it in operation. The funds raised were employed in the purchase of an X-Ray machine.

The Clinic Staff, who have tried for years to re-open the hospital, unfortunately, must be hampered in their efforts to give patient care, by not having that facility at their disposal. They regret that it is financially impossible to re-open it.

Without the hospital, the Clinic personnel are forced to send many patients the long trip to other facilities. However, those patients only requiring more thorough lab testing, could be saved that long trip and extra expense by more complete lab equipment at the Carrizozo Clinic. A minimum of \$9000 is needed.

The Clinic personnel and Advisory Board are working to raise the funds to supply that equipment and are receiving outstanding support

from everyone in the County. The first fund-raiser was the J.B. decanter, won by Melvin Ferris at the Capitan Alumni dance. It brought in \$650.

The next fund-raiser will be a Western Charity Ball to be held at the Carrizozo Country Club, Saturday, August 18. It is bound to be one of the outstanding events of the year. Music by The Traveling Countrymen - 25 valuable door prizes - costume prizes - variety dances - and a full evening of fun from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m.

You don't have to dance to enjoy yourself, just watch the others and listen to the music. Or if you cannot attend, the purchase of a ticket will give you the chance of winning the door prizes to be given during each intermission.

Wear a western outfit or your 1976 colonial costume if you care to, but costumes are not necessary. Just be sure not to miss the event! A donation of \$10 for couples and \$7.50 for singles is asked.

Site 'A' Study Approved

Ruidoso, NM - An agreement was signed today between Sierra Blanca Airport Commission and New Mexico Transportation Department Aviation Division which is the first phase of a new initiative to solve the critical Ruidoso airport situation.

The agreement provides up to \$30,000 in state funds to conduct a detailed engineering, environmental and financial study for a new airport on the so called Site A which was originally discussed and discounted in the Sierra Blanca Airport Master Plan.

In signing the agreement for the State, Aviation Director Bob White stated that while Site B, the preferential site as determined by the master plan, would be superior for the construction of an airport, the controversy surrounding it would make development virtually impossible in the near future, whereas the prospects are good for a successful project at Site A at an early date. The sooner a new airport can be completed, the better the chances are that lives will be saved.

He also assured the Commission that the State will lend its full support to the development of a new airport at the earliest possible time.

SBAC Chairman Richard C. Hall assured Mr. White that the total efforts of the Commission are being channeled toward the development of Site A and any consideration of pursuing the old Fort Stanton airport site have been discounted.

Gordon Herkenhoff & Associates are to begin work immediately on the site A study. Plans are to have the study and all necessary hearings completed well in advance of the 1980 Legislative session since it appears that a special state appropriation may be required to assist in the development of this facility.

Capitan Elementary--

School Building Bid at \$823,500.00

Shackelford Construction Co. of Portales was awarded the contract for the Capitan Elementary School building with low bid of \$823,500.00.

Selected by the Capitan School Board from nine bidders, Shackelford Construction's low bid was based on a 365 calendar day schedule. High bidder, Ray Ward & Son, El Paso, Tx. - \$933,000.00, listed 270 days to completion.

Contracts, orders and application for a state building permit will start immediately with actual digging beginning in thirty days.

Shackelford Const. included a bid-bond from Trans-America Bonding Services. The bond protects the

school in case the contract is not fulfilled.

Sub-contracting the job will be Jacobi Plumbing - Socorro, Allen Roofing - Albuquerque, Wilder Electric - Las Cruces, Otero Ventilation - Alamogordo.

Non-union wages will be based on a pay schedule set by the state labor commission.

Questions concerning work supervision, paying, landscaping, and concrete were clarified before any action was taken. Harold Shackelford, representative, cited his family background in construction, adding supervision would be a family member. Concrete will be provided

by the company and Shackelford assured the board landscaping had been accounted for. A possible cost reduction for paving was discussed.

Safety precautions for students during construction were emphasized by the board.

Jerry Lake, of Kruger, Lake, Hutchinson and Brown Architects, designers of the school, and Dr. Richards, Consultant, expressed their approval of the selection. Lake informed the Board legal steps will be taken immediately.

Shackelford Construction recently completed an \$800,000.00 project in Elida, N.M. similar to the Capitan School.

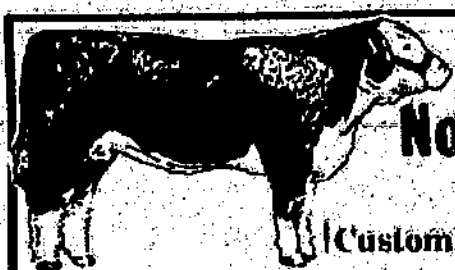

Feed Funds Total \$28,797.70

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) issued emergency feed checks totaling \$28,797.70 to livestock producers in Lincoln County between October and May. Allen Trammell, an official of the agency, said the financial aid enabled farmers to purchase 1,439,885 pounds of feed. "By sharing the cost of feed with livestock producers, we help prevent widespread selling of herds due to natural disaster."

The ASCS official said 11 applications for emergency feed funds were approved during this period. To be eligible for the assistance, farmers must have suffered a substantial loss in the amount of feed normally produced, have insufficient feed for the period of the disaster, and must purchase larger-than-normal quantities of feed.

Under the emergency feed program, farmers are authorized to receive financial aid when their livestock are threatened by conditions brought on by a natural disaster. Participants may be reimbursed up to 50 percent of the cost of feed purchased during the emergency period. This, however, may not exceed two cents per pound in terms of feed grain equivalent, Mr. Trammell explained.

In fiscal year 1978, the first year of the program, Lincoln County producers received \$17,529.48 in emergency feed funds to purchase more than 884,691 pounds of feed.

Mentally retarded students supervised by Al Haines, Rudy Saiz and Bill Morris of Buildings Trades at Ft. Stanton put together the cabin as a "on-the-job" work experience. The cabin will feature storage for special equipment for the program and will also be used as an office for Diana Person, director of the four-year-old Handicap Ski Association.

Materials were purchased at cost from T-Bird Lumber in Ruidoso and the students assembled parts of the cabin in their classrooms. The students gain carpentry skills and can see their accomplishments.

The on-the-job training programs at Ft. Stanton are designated to help improve student self-confidence and self-worth in relation to the world outside of the institution.

By doing something productive that is a positive contribution to the community further increases our students self-confidence by showing themselves and the community they can be productive members of our society and even help others through their efforts," expressed Elliot Topper, Education Director at Fort Stanton.

The cabin project will be used by members of the H.S.A. Ft. Stanton has been with the association three years. Last season a student at Ft. Stanton made it to Special Olympics competition. But the association would not be here without Diana Person. Inspired by a program run by Hal O'Leary in Winter Park, Colorado, Ms. Person began the association with nine students and three instructors in 1975. Last year there were ninety students and sixteen instructors.

Ms. Person received her initial training from an amputee program out of Fort Bliss in the late 1960's. Since she has had additional training in Winter Park.

Actual work begins in November with meetings to recruit new instructors, and skiing begins after Christmas. Anyone handicapped and able to stand and support their own weight is eligible. There is no age limit. Equipment is provided by the association.

"The equipment is very expensive and must be ordered," Ms. Person stated.

The Sierra Blanca Ski Association is a full-time program, one of the two full-time programs in the U.S. The other is at Winter Park.

Here's where you come in. Our Congressional delegation holds key positions on the Legislative Committees that regulate the price of Hydro Power from Glen Canyon. It is vitally important that you let them know that you don't want an unnecessary increase in your electricity rates from the Federal Government.

The most effective way to get your message across is through a letter to each of your members of Congress and to our law Senators. If enough people are concerned about this increase and so write expressing their views, this unjustified step will not be approved by Congress.

Nancy Guck wants to remind everyone that the dance Saturday night will benefit the community by improving the health centers lab.

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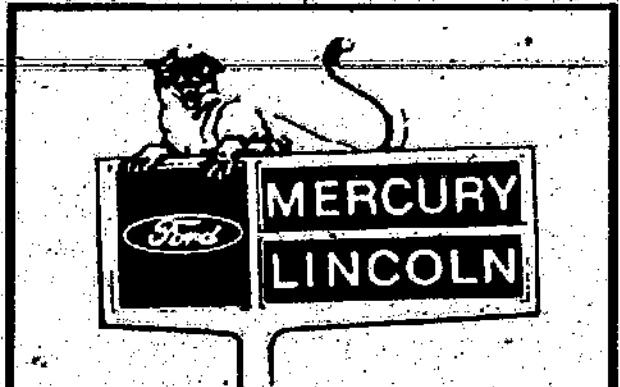
