Bids Are Opened On Two Bridges

Bids for replacing two bridges over Rio Ruidoso were opened at the regular September Lincoln County Commissioners meeting.

County engineer Herkenhoff opened and read four bids; high bid was \$398,906.76; by Lichsinger of Deming, NM and low bid \$342,639.10, Ken Nolan, Albuquerque. Herkenhoff reviewed the bids and reported to the Commission he would take the bids to Santa Fe for approval. The commission will call a special meeting to award the contract.

Engineers estimate was \$299,578. Funding will come from federal and state emergency funds.

Mary Rich, chairperson of New Horizons Development Center, formerly Zia School requested the County transfer the lease contract for the old Lincoln County Hospital to their non-profit corporation.

Zia was contracted by New Mexico Department of Hospitals and administered the facility 15 months. Zia informed the board it would no longer handle the Carrizozo program.

A group of concerned citizens put together a non-profit corporation. Mary Rich, chairperson and Bill Payne vice-chairman worked on the legalis and announced the New Horizons Development Center will take over October 1 with formal dedications at 10 a.m.

Rich told the commission of the benefits provided by the program, payrolls in Carrizozo, service to forgotten citizens and maintenance on the otherwise vacant building she reported plans to offer programs dealing with mentally retarded students within the public schools, a proposed sheltered cottage for eight retarded women. The county commissioners approved the transfer of the contract and wishes the program continued success.

Ms. Rich also resigned her post as member of the Region IV Sub-area Council of the New Mexico Health Systems Agency. She was replaced by Mrs. Sterling Spencer. Another resigning member of the agency, Dr. David Rouleau was replaced with Dr. Dale Goad.

Lamoyne Peters will replace resigning Juanita Abercrombie on the planning and Zoning Commission.

A request for replating 5-lots in Alto Village Townhouse was approved.

A proposed Type 3 subdivision located off North Cedar Creek Road was approved. After discussion over legal distance from a sanitary landfill. The commission were informed by attorney Dan Bryant the legal distances from a landfill is ten miles, but that this is often waived. The commission approved the subdivision which will now go before Ruidoso Trustees.

Sanitary landfills created considerable discussion. Complaints over blowing trash, poor access roads, cattle grazing in the landfills. The Assistant Commission of the State Land Office informed the County the landfills were not in compliance with State Regulations. A 4 foot wire mesh fence and cattle guards at the entrances are required. The county operates three landfills: Hondo, Lincoln and Fort Stanton.

Discussion concerning charging a fee to dump was heard. The commissioners agreed this would help alleviate costs for fencing and operation. No action was taken on this but the county manager was instructed to get estimates on fencing and check the possibility of getting cattle guards from the state highway department.

Emergency work in Picacho was approved. And the co-operative field agreement with Farm and Range was tackled until questions could be cleared, authority to issue bids for funded courthouse maintenance projects was given.

A group representing the Humane Society of Lincoln County reported to the Commission their activity. The society will begin fund raising soon to help construct an animal shelter in the Ruidoso area. Ed Jungbluth, president of the society listed those involved including village trustees, bank directors, and county commissioner Ben Hall.

"We're aware of animal problems in the county municipalities, Capitan particularly," reported Jungbluth.

The Humane Society plans to offer services for the entire county eventually seeking county funds for operation.

Ben Hall was appointed to the Regional Waste Water System Joint Use Board.

Other problems handled by the commission included: A "wild deed" situation concerning the old Nogal Fire station, on illegal subdivision in Gavilan Canyon, inability to contact Hondo Valley EMT's and inventory of equipment at the old Carrizozo Hospital, and a bill from the sheriff's department for repair to a lightning damaged radio.

The commission instructed Bryant to investigate the deed and the illegal subdivision. No action was taken concerning the last three matters.

The commission will call a special meeting to award contract for replacement of Rio Ruidoso bridges damaged during 1978 winter floods.

A banquet address on September 27 by NMFWC president, Mrs. Emil Kiehne of Reserve, is among the 2-day activities. The banquet, to be held at the Four Winds, will also include the installation of '79-80 district officers. Entertainment will be provided by Joe Werthem of Capitan who will play the piano and sing.

The festivities begin with a 9:00 am - 5:00 pm registration on September 27 at the Carrizozo club building. Exhibit registration is 9:00 am - 2:00 pm. Women club members from Carrizozo, Capitan and the district will be awarded ribbons for their arts and crafts. Work will be displayed for member viewing at the Medallion Room in the REA building between 4:30-6:30 pm that same day. Penny Arts of local school students will also be displayed.

Committee Discusses Highway 70 Routing

The South Central Mountain RC&D Steering and Executive Committees held their regular meetings in Ruidoso Downs recently.

Wally Ferguson chaired the Executive meeting in the morning session. The Committee discussed Highway 70 routing and improving. The group voted to support adding only passing lanes and widening of the highway and further, that if four lanes are to be constructed to do so outside the irrigated valley.

The afternoon session was chaired by Clem Weindorf. Two new measures were adopted by the group. The first one is for a coordinated effort for flood protection and erosion control along the west side of the Sacramento mountains. The second is to assist the Soil and Water Conservation Districts get their long range Plans printed.

Harve Abercrombie, RC&D Coordinator, was the program speaker. He reported that the funding situation for RC&D looks good. He stated that there would always be a need for rural development and urged the groups to continue to support programs and agencies that assist rural areas. He cited numerous projects that would never have been completed without the RC&D assistance. Some of these are large and some small but were important to the person submitting the measure.

Project measure progress was given on seven measures. The Next meeting will be October 30th in Carrizozo.

October 22 is Deadline for Recording Mining & Mill Sites

All unpatented mining, mill or tunnel site claims on the Lincoln National Forest must be recorded by October 22 or they may be invalidated, Forest Supervisor James R. Abbott said this week.

Abbott said Section 314 of the Federal Land Policy and Management Act of 1976 requires that claims located on or before October 21, 1976, must be recorded before October 22 of the current year. Claims located after October 21, 1976, must be

recorded within 90 days of the date of location.

The claims are to be recorded with the Bureau of Land Management. Further information on the process can be obtained from the BLM offices at either Roswell or Las Cruces, New Mexico.

BLM requires evidence of assessment work performed during the preceding year of a Notice of Intent to hold the claim in order to record the claim.



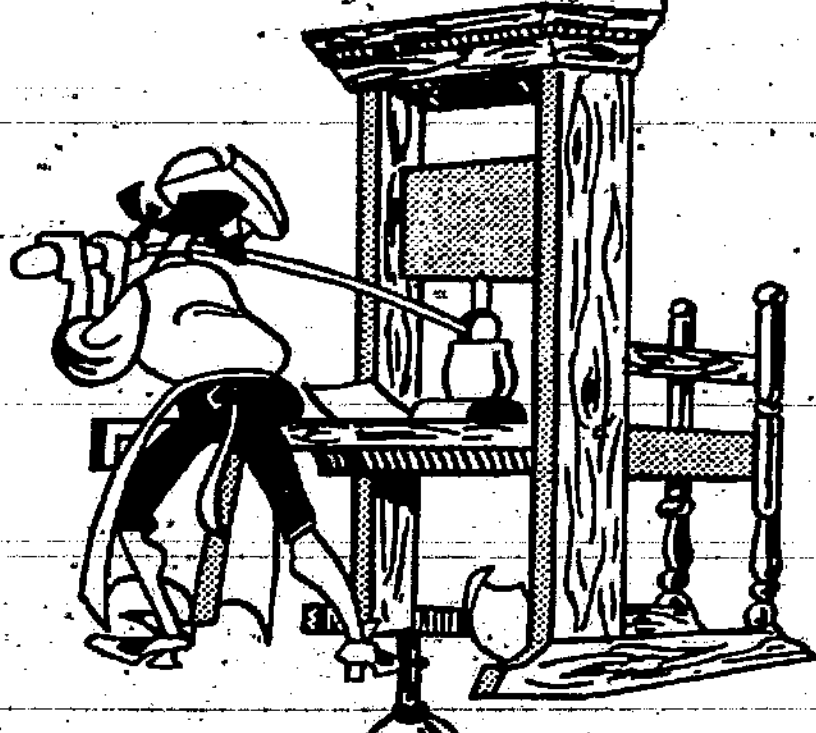

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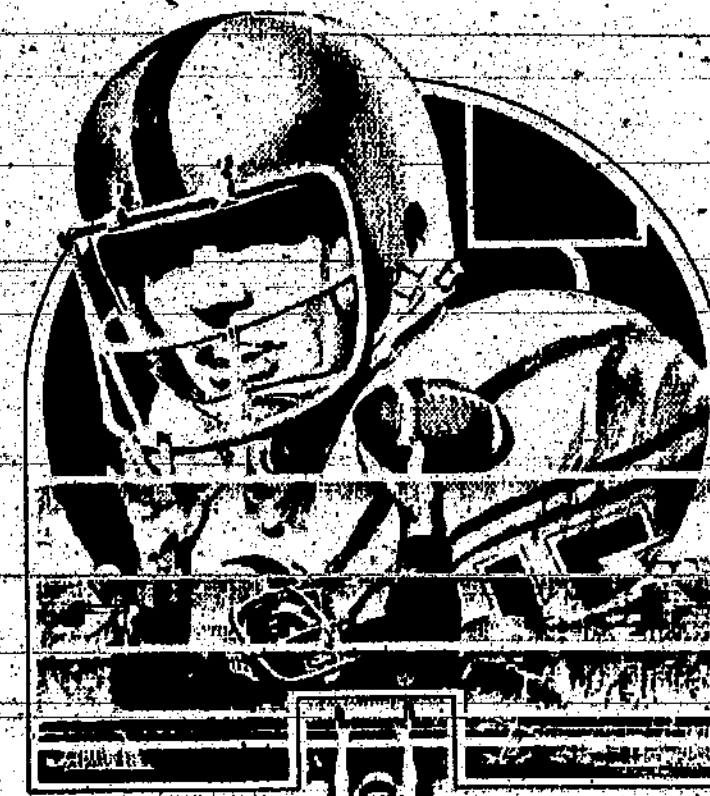

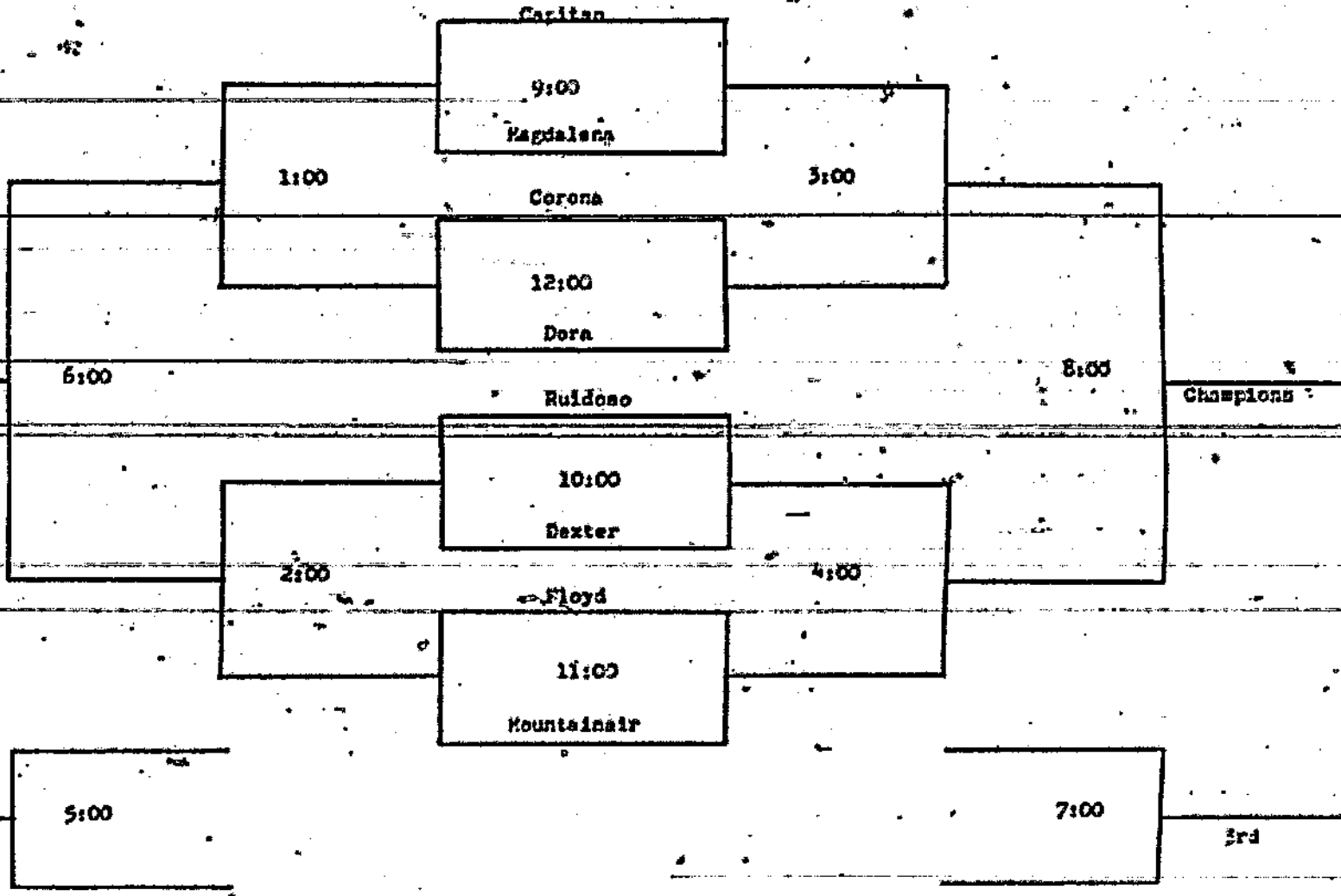

New Program Aims at Curbing Alcohol Misuse

A new 12-part program to help U.S. cities and communities reduce problems related to alcohol misuse has been announced here by the United States Brewers Association.

Based on extensive research as well as the Association's past work, the Association's new Alcohol Awareness Program, titled "Think Twice—About Drinking," is supported by all segments of the brewing industry and is co-sponsored by the National Beer Wholesalers Association, according to Mike Doll, Regional Representative of the USBA.

"Our goal, however, is to involve as many community groups as possible in all phases of the continuing work so that our objectives will be fully met," he added.

Among these, he said, are the reduction of alcohol use by persons not of legal age, the proper operation of retail establishments and the wide dissemination of facts and other data about alcohol, its use and misuse.

The first phase of the new program, already underway, includes publication of a twice-monthly Alcohol Newsletter, reporting on current, nationwide developments in that field.

The second phase of the program, now ready for introduction, features

beer wholesaler-sponsored advertisements, urging underage persons NOT to buy beer.

Carrying that same message, point-of-sale posters will be displayed by retailers and tavern owners, who also will receive a special brochure outlining the dangers of selling to underage persons.

Privileges and responsibilities of persons receiving drivers licenses for the first time will be detailed in a new pamphlet for distribution soon by Motor Vehicle Bureaus, law enforcement officials and highway safety departments.

THIRD PHASE-SCHOOLS

The third phase of the program being readied for the 1979-80 academic year, will focus on elementary and secondary schools, colleges and universities, community, youth, and civic groups.

"Our present and long-range plans are, in effect, a total commitment by our entire industry to work with citizens, government agencies, civic groups and other industries in helping to solve the growing health problem of alcohol misuse," Mr. Doll said.

A major component of the program, he explained, is the development of an Employee Assistance Manual to guide business and industry in establishing their own in-house prevention and treatment programs for employees who tend to misuse alcohol.

PROGRAM BACKGROUND

Past work done by the Association in the area of alcohol misuse provides a foundation for the new program, Mr. Doll said.

He cited, for example, the Association's funding of a Medical Advisory Group, which operates entirely independently from the Association. The group sponsors numerous research programs on alcohol and monitors worldwide alcohol research developments.

Further, the Association provides assistance to several private educational organizations active in reducing alcohol misuse and has long conducted Youth Understanding programs throughout the country.
