## Seven CSB Inmates Escape, - - 'Four are Re-captured'

Camp Sierra Blanca was the scene of much turmoil this last week with the escape of seven inmates, the beating and stabbing death of another and the transfer back to the state penitentiary of 20 other inmates.

Camp Sierra Blanca is a minimum security prison, without any lock on the doors and guards without weapons.

The first escape occurred Sunday morning around 1:00 a.m. Pedro Padilla, 40, of Santa Fe was found beaten up in the bathroom of a

barracks, by prison guards Eddie O'Brien and Charles Schlarb.

The guards took the injured man to the administration office, called David Vega, who was not on duty, but was on call, the other guard, and prepared to transport Padilla to the

Ruidoso Hospital.

O'Brien went outside to start the car and was attacked by three inmates and forced back into the Administration office. Schlarb and O'Brien were not seriously injured, but were overpowered and tied up with cords from the window shades after.

The three forced the guards to open the prison cash box and give them the money from the prisoner work release allowance. At this point Padilla was taken into the conference room, beaten and then stabbed with a blunt instrument. Prison officials have stated that it is not clear whether Padilla was beaten to death and then stabbed or if the stabbing was the cause for Padilla's death.

The three inmates were identified as Joe Pat Lucero, 38, of Santa Fe, serving a life sentence for first-degree murder, Adelando Quintana, 32, Bernalillo County, serving a 2 1/2 to 10 years sentence for conviction as a habitual criminal, and Alfonso Rodriguez, 31, of Lea County serving a 20 to 100 year sentence out of Eddy County on a conviction for the sale of heroin.

The three inmates then took the car of correction officer O'Brien and fled with two other inmates.

The other two were John David Romero, 30, of Santa Fe convicted of the sale of heroin, and Albert Garcia, 38, of San Miguel county serving a 7 to 15 year term for aggravated battery. The aggravated battery was a plea bargain down from first degree murder.

Guard Vega walked into the Administration building just minutes after the five had taken off, untied the guards, called the sheriff's office and checked on Padilla. Padilla was already dead.

Sheriff's deputy James McSwane was in Carrizozo when he got the call at 1:49 a.m. He proceeded east on 380 and spotted O'Brien's car near the turn-off to highway 37 at 2:00 a.m.

McSwane stopped the car, and commanded the driver to stop the engine, and throw the keys out of the car. The driver hit the gas and McSwane calmly shot out the front tire of the car with his rifle.

The driver lost control of the car and rolled the car into the Arroyo. McSwane observed one prisoner walking away and yelled for the man to return. The man started back, but when he reached a shadow, he eluded McSwane. Officer McSwane was at the scene without a back-up for several minutes and so did not pursue the one that got away.

Three inmates were left in the car as one other may have broken off from the group as they went through Capitan.

Still at large is Albert Garcia. Romero was captured about 11:30 a.m. Sunday by the State Police when he abandoned a pickup truck that he had stolen in White Oaks, at a roadblock on U.S. 54 at Corona.

Prison officials state that they have no information to link Garcia or Romero to Padilla's murder.

Rodriguez was transported to Gerald Champion Memorial Hospital

while the other two were treated for their minor injuries in Ruidoso and then taken to the Lincoln County Jail. Rodriguez was treated in Alamogordo and then transported back to Carrizozo.

Wednesday morning, two more inmates John Rushing, 44, serving a sentence of natural life for First Degree Murder, and Kenneth Cranford, 42, life imprisonment for First Degree murder, escaped.

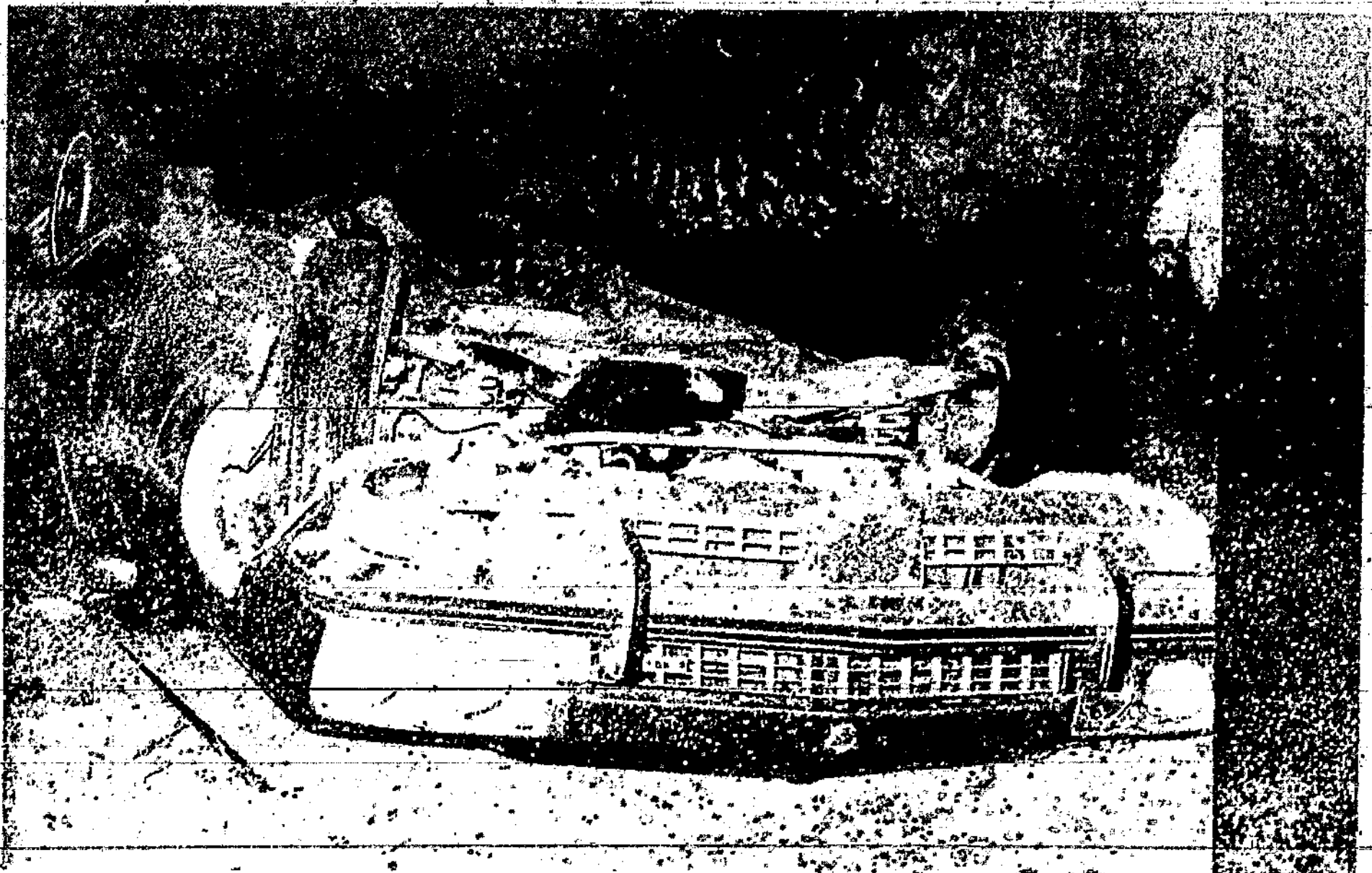
Prison officials stated that Rushing and Cranford rode the bus on work release to Ruidoso, but did not report to their jobs.

Both are still at large as of Thursday morning.

Prison officials then decided to pick up nine prisoners that they felt might attempt to escape. These men, all with violent records were transported to the State Penitentiary for safe keeping.

A group of several more are to be transferred today, (Thursday) in an attempt by prison officials to curb the escapes.

In response to questions by Lincoln County residents, Senator Aubrey Dunn and the legislative finance committee is holding a formal hearing in Santa Fe Friday at 8:00 a.m. to question the Criminal Justice Department and their director Charles Becknell as to the reasons for the violent types of prisoners being sent to minimum security facilities in New Mexico.

### Capitan Council Buys Equipment

The Capitan Village Council at a special meeting agreed to purchase equipment for improvement of the Village water system.

The filter will improve water quality by removing the turbidity present in the water during the summer and autumn months. Last winter's flooding created a major turbidity problem in the village water supply. The council approved the purchase of the filtering system.

The village of Capitan has completed their water line project with successful results. Pressures have been increased 15 percent on the downtown areas.

Six members have completed the NMSU industrial development course, "Bringing in the Sheaves."

Graduation for those completing the course, their friends and any interested persons will be at a dinner on Tuesday, November 20th at 6:30 at the 4-Winds. Bob Coppage of NMSU and two guest speakers will be on the program.

The Industrial Development Committee met immediately after the general meeting to discuss a proposal to be submitted to the State to share in a \$15,000 grant available to small communities to assist in their industrial development programs.

### Johnson, Sanchez Appointed

Two vacancies were filled in the Upper Hondo Soil and Water Conservation District. Jack Johnson, Capitan and Ben Sanchez, San Patricio were elected to fill the three year terms of the seven member district.

The District covers the area east of Indian Divide to Riverside, north of Capitan mountains to the south boundry of Lincoln County.

Elections were held Oct. 31. The upper Hondo District is one of 49 such districts within the State of New Mexico. They are legal subdivisions of the state government. They work with landusers in promoting, planning and applying conservation practices. They assist with urban, suburban, and rural land use planning by providing soil information.

New Mexico landowners with two or more acres are eligible to purchase seedlings from the N.M. Natural Resources Department, Forestry Division.

The seedlings must be used for

### My Time

Lincoln County is frightened and tired. We have been subjected to an overdose of violence in the last month. And the violence does not seem to be over.

The only bright spot in all of this is that maybe some changes will be made. Senator Aubrey Dunn, one of the few legislators anywhere that I personally trust to serve the people's needs, is holding a formal hearing tomorrow in Santa Fe to ask some hard questions at the Criminal Justice Department. Good for him. And I am sure if the answers are not what they should be, he will take on everyone in Santa Fe to protect the people of New Mexico.

Camp Sierra Blanca (CSB) is a

minimum security prison one mile south of Fort Stanton Hospital. These two facilities, Fort Stanton and CSB, are not connected in any way.

The plan for Camp Sierra Blanca is to provide a chance for convicts to adjust to the outside world before they are released.

In this way, convicts will hopefully be better prepared for the outside world and will not return to prison.

This is a plan that I approve of, but like the computer programmer that puts the wrong information in the computer, and then gets the wrong information back out, I feel CSB has had prisoners that do not belong there. In this way, the program can not work without the right type of prisoners.

Of the 70 or so prisoners at CSB, 20 or so are guilty of First Degree Murder, or crimes that involve the

violent death of someone. One of the two Wednesday escapees, John Rushing, was sentenced to Natural Life on a first degree murder charge. What is hard for me to understand is what a man that is supposed to stay in prison for the rest of his life is doing on work release, training to re-enter life on the outside.

The staff at CSB do not make the decisions as to who comes down from Santa Fe, and so are stuck with whoever the screening committee sends.

The people on the screening committee ought to be shot at sunrise on three successive mornings for sending all of these violent prisoners to a minimum security prison. CSB doesn't have any locks on the doors. It is an honor facility, and the "guards" are more counselors than guards, since they have no weapons. We are glad to assist people that

have paid their debt to society in their effort to start a new life, but we are tired and afraid.

The people in Santa Fe don't know what it is like to have to carry a gun out of fear. They don't know what it is like to be uneasy every time the sun goes down. We are never sure what violence is next.

We have the right to demand some competency from the people screening the convicts. We have the right to not be placed in undue danger by the incompetency of our public servants, namely the screening committee in Santa Fe and the Department of Criminal Justice. It would seem that a bunch of them need to go into a different line of work. Somewhere that what they do doesn't hurt anyone.

I do not wish CSB to be closed, I and many others just wish that it be run correctly. MS

## Report Shows Foreigners Heavy Investors in U.S. Farmland

Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland reports that a preliminary review shows that foreign investors had an interest in about 4 million acres of U.S. farmland. In New Mexico about 35,570 acres of farmland are under foreign ownership, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The Agricultural Foreign Investment Disclosure Act of 1978, required foreign owners of agricultural land as of Feb. 1, 1979, to file a report with the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) by Aug. 1. However, USDA will accept late filed reports on land owned prior to February 1, 1979.

Nationally, foreigners own less than one-half of 1 percent of all private agricultural land, according to the preliminary review. Although foreign agricultural land holdings were reported in all 50 states, distribution patterns indicated that foreign ownership is heavily concentrated in Georgia (215,898 acres), South Carolina (219,948), and Tennessee (285,773 acres). These three States account for 27 percent of all foreign-owned acreage.

All foreign individuals governments, or legal entities are required to report their agricultural land holdings.

From data examined so far, investors from the United Kingdom, with 907,892 acres, held the highest percentage of foreign-owned land reported. Luxembourg ranked second with 398,550 acres; West Germany, third, with 352,147 acres and Canada, fourth, with 285,894. Owners from these four countries hold 72 percent of all foreign-owned land reported.

Agricultural land is defined as all land used for agricultural, forestry, or timber production. This includes land in agricultural use when purchased as well as land later converted to agriculture use. Tracts smaller than one acre, which produce less than \$1,000 worth of gross agricultural sales a year, are exempt from the reporting requirement.

windbreaks... reforestation or Christmas tree farm establishment. They may not be planted as ornamentals or resold as living trees.

Orders are in minimum of 98 trees, in multiples of 49 trees per species. Applications are available at the Soil Conservation Service office in Capitan.

Eight species are available; Arizona Cypress, Afghanistan Pine, Austrian Pine, Colorado Blue Spruce, Douglas Fir, Ponderosa Pine, Scotch Pine, White Fir. All are conifers or evergreens, five suggested for windbreaks, five for Christmas tree farms and two for reforestation.

The Arizona Cypress and Afghanistan pine, though drought resistant and good windbreak qualities will grow in elevation range of 1,000 to 5,000 feet, excluding most parts of Lincoln County.

The Austrian has moderate drought resistance, high cold resistance and low alkalinity resistance. It is considered an excellent windbreak when irrigation is used, and is suited for this area. The other species available as windbreaks is the Ponderosa Pine. It has a moderate resistance to drought, high resistance to cold and low resistance to alkalinity. It has an elevation range of 4,000 to 8,500 feet and must have supplemental water when planted in windbreaks.

Windbreaks reduce wind velocity for a distance of about 10 times the height of the trees. Knowing how tall your trees will grow can tell you how far apart to place windbreaks.

Colorado Blue Spruce, capable of growing to 60 feet, has moderate drought resistance, high cold resistance, and moderate alkalinity resistance. Its elevation range is 3,500 to 9,500 feet. This tree is recommended for windbreak and as Christmas Tree farms. Scotch Pine, maximum growth 60 feet, has moderate resistance to drought, cold and alkalinity. The elevation range is 3,000 to 7,000 feet and is recommended for Christmas Tree Farms. Other Christ Tree species are; Douglas Fir and White fir. White fir grows to maximum of 60 to 80 feet. It

has low resistance to drought and alkalinity and high resistance to cold. Its elevation range is 5,500 to 10,000. Douglas fir, a native evergreen species of New Mexico, has moderate resistance to drought and to cold. The elevation range is 4,000 to 10,000 feet, but with frequent irrigation recommended below 7,000. This tree is recommended for Christmas Tree farms and for reforestation.

The Ponderosa Pine is also recommended for reforestation.

The containerized seedlings are \$40.00 per 98 trees. They are in individual polyethylene containers (10 cu. in.) with a soil plug around the roots. Root length and top height and approximately six inches each. Total tree height is approximately 12 inches. Survival can be expected to be about 80 per cent with containerized stock. There is no guarantee of survival of the trees by the Division after shipment or delivery is made.

Deadline for purchasing trees is April 30, 1980, but application as soon as possible is suggested. Trees are sold on first come basis, with second choices to be listed on the application. Trees purchased by persons in this area will be distributed from Roswell on March 20, 1980, so application before then is high encouraged.

Applications and additional information is available at the Soil Conservation Office in Capitan.

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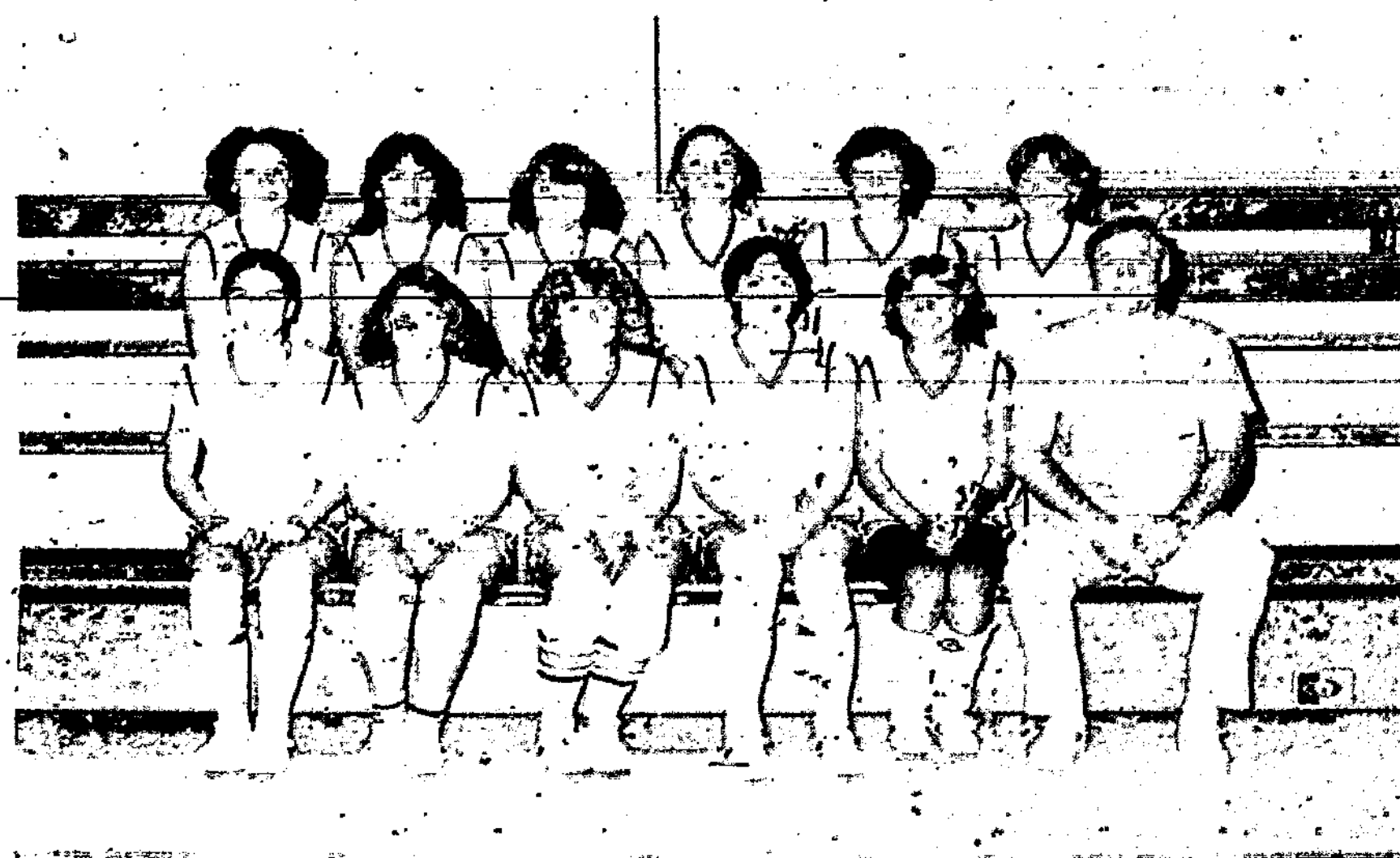

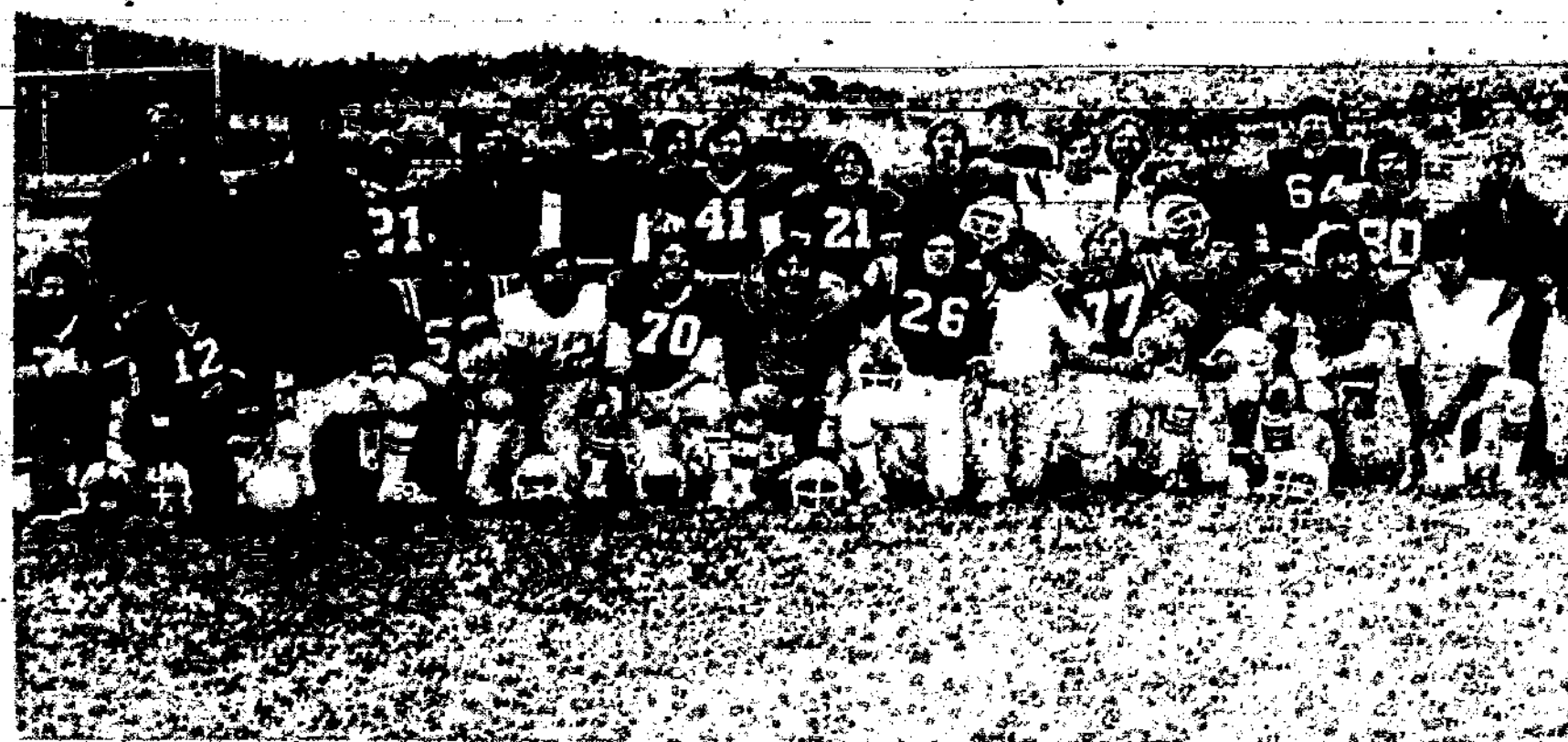
