Commission Passes Resolution

The Lincoln County Commissioners met with about 40 concerned citizens in Ruidoso and approved a resolution calling for the governor to investigate the procedure used to assign persons to the minimum security facility at Camp Sierra Blanca; requesting no persons guilty of violent crimes, Lincoln County have a respresentative on the screening committee, and a list of inmates and their criminal records to the Lincoln County Sheriff.

The resolution was a result of the recent escapes from the minimum. - security facility where until recently 20 prisoners convicted of violent felons were incarcerated. These twenty were transported to the State Penitentary in Santa Fe leaving 54 nmates at Camp Sierra Blanca.

Those at the meeting felt the Camp posed a threat to the citizens of Lincoln County, feeling those inmates that were paroled were drawn back into this area. The fact that many summer homes are wide open, attracting people interested in breaking and entering was brought up by Nogal Canyon resident Nancy Guck. She was also concerned about the police aid when needed. Mrs. Guck stated phone calls are often met with a busy line and when response was made, the size of the county meant at least-a twenty-minute wiat.

There are not enough to go around," she commented.

The problem of the large areas and the inability to contact the sheriff's department was voiced several times by different persons. Many felt the citizens of Lincoln. County have been snowed, that Camp Sierra Blanca has posed a potential threat since it changed from a juvenile facility, its original use to the present minimum security facility.

Camp Sierra Blanca participates in the work-release program, releasing prisoners to work within the community. Sixty inmates were formally involved in the program which sent prisoners to jobs with no supervision.

The major complaint at the public meeting with the Commissioners was that prisoners convicted of violent felonies (murder, . penetentiary properly, seeking rather

to alleviate the over-crowded length of time involved in getting situation at the Big House. The County Commissioners responded to the complaint by adding to the resolution a stipulation that a representative from Lincoln County be added to the Screening Committee.

*Presently the committee is selected from employees of the state corrections. It was fell that these persons were not free to make judgements that were beneficial to the county to which the inmates is to be sent but rather beneficial to the overcrowding at Santa Fe.

Housing Program Looked Into

to obtain \$200,000 to establish housing rehabilitation program that will enable a minimum of 20 homes to be rehabilitated completely. The proposal would request about 10. percent or \$20,000 to implement the program. The remaining \$200,000 will be used to provide an average of . \$10,000 per house to bring them up to state code and to insure that the houses are liveable."

"The low income families in greatest need will be assisted first with grants and the project director will be responsible for helping other families to obtain HUD Section 312 loans to rehabilitate additional homes. More than 20 homes would be rehabilitated if it can be done with the \$200,000."

This was part of a grant application summary that was read at last Tuesday's town meeting by Mr. Bill Gomez, Community Development Specialist, (NMSU) to one of the biggest crowds since Mayor Jesse English has been in office. .

In addition to the residents present, a list of people unable to attend, as well as a letter addressed to the council will become part of the record of individuals interested in the community development needs project.

The summary stated that-Carrizozo contains many old homes has applied three times in the past that are in great need of and has been turned down three rehabilitation. The majority of these times, the last-time by a few points. homes are owned by elderly or low income families who do not have the

Gomez explained to the audience that low income qualification guidelines are developed by a council and an advisory committee if and when an spplication is accepted. Carrizozo, who competes for these

funds with many other municipalities.

This new application, if accepted means with which to fix up the homes. would mean that the lowest income families in greatest need would be able to obtain a safe, decent home. Twenty families or about 60 indivuiduals would be directly helped while other families would qualify for HUD loans.

Capitan Council Meets

The Capitan Village Council deliberated in closed session to hire a new village clerk to replace Doris Engleking who resigned her position.

The Council called the closed meeting after conducting their regular November meeting where they accepted the low bid of \$23,383.00 Thunderbird Corp., Albuquerque for a Quick. Attack Pumper for the Capitan Fire Department. The Pumper is a 4 WD Dodge and will carry a four-year note. Purchase of the pumper was suggested by the State Fire Marshall. because of rough terrain in the Capitan Area.

Other bid received by the Council was for fuel. Only one bid was received from Jennings Oil Company, Ruidoso. Presently the village buys fuel from C and R Petroleum in Capitan. The Council voted to reject the Jennings Bid until they could contact C&R.

"I'd like to keep business at Councilman Valton Hall stated.

Water problems included free water to two individuals in the community. The Council voted to nolonger give Charlie Engleking free water as previously. It was discovered that water was given to Doris Engleking in lieu of a raise. The council agreed he should be charged now that Ms. Engleking is no longer a village employee.

The other water problem dealt with Mrs. Ray Provine who was requesting free water for the number of years that her deceased husband worked for the village.

Legal Council Gary Mitchell-told the Village Council that this is not legal, that municipal property cannot be given away. The Council voted to reject the request.

It was brought to the Council's attention_that_the_cards_regarding_ HBO with the Cablevision Company contained a confusing aspect. Presently HBO will be connected to any home now receiving cable without being requested. A self addressed card is included with HBO literature and must be sent to the company if the housegold does not want the additional \$10 monthly sevice. The Council agreed the company should be contacted regarding this and a change in the wording was needed.

The Dog problem was once again w discussed after a letter from Mrs. Curtis Payne companing of the killing of a lamb by dog(s) was read, "What has happened to our pound?" Hall asked.

Maintenance Supervisor Larry ·Caywood told the council a pound could be started as soon as they fulfill water committments. Presently the village police can kill dogs in a pack if there is an emergency situation. Mayor Stark suggested contacting State Financial Director Al Romero concerning legislation creating mandatory Animal Control Officers in communities. Stark was interested in getting state financial support to fulfill this requirement.

The Council reviewed the village audit report conducted by the private firm Hager, Hollomand and McKay, Clovis. The firm recommended two points be improved; daily cash records be maintained and deposits were not being made daily.

Also reviewed were six certificates of deposit. The total of \$12,000 - building for a community center. is with the Ruidoso State Bank, but

From Your Congressman

The Enemy Is Us

This year I have heard more about energy, in Congress and at home. than any other subject. Everyone is sincerely concerned about whether or not we will have enough energy, at a price most people can afford, to continue the lifestyle we have become accustomed to. The President has staked his political future on solving this problem, but the past is prologue to our current dilemma.

... The Independent Petroleum Association of America (the trade association for 11,000 small businessmen in the oil and gas industry) has compiled a list of the major factors affecting our energy supplies over the past 25 years. Some were beyond our control but most were not. In fact, actions of the federal-government over the last quarter century probably did mose than anything else to get us in trouble. The objectives were cheap energy, but the consequences were a decline in domestic petroleum production and a dangerous dependence on imported oil.

• 1954: The Supreme Court, contrary to the explicit intent of Congress, requires the Federal Power Commission to impose utility-style regulations on individual natural gas pro-

• 1956: Legislation allowing wellhead natural gas prices to be set in the marketplace is vetoed by President Eisenhower for reasons unrelated to the bill's metits.

 1960: The Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC) is founded with the avowed purpose of controlling production levels and increasing the revenues of the oil producing countries. At the time, the U.S. is importing only 18% of its oil consumption.

• 1966: Oil and gas leasing on federal lands is suspended, beginning a policy of denying access to potential domestic oil and gas reserves.

• 1967: Arab oil producers embargo all oil shipments to the U.S. during and following the "Six Days" War. The embargo, the third interruption of exports from Arab countries, fails because producers still have excess oil supplies available for ourselves and our allies.

• 1968: Domestic consumption of petroleum fuels exceeds U.S. petroleum capacity, and the nation for the first time is partially dependent on imported oil, --

• 1969: Following enactment of a "tax reform" act reducing percentage depletion for oil and gas (alone among 105 extractive industries), domestic exploratory drilling begins its sharpest drop since World War II. Oil imports represent 22% of consumption.

• 1970: U.S. production of crude oil peaks and begins a decline that has yet to be arrested. Passage of the National Environmental Policy Act initiates a decade of frustration in the effort to drill offshore, site refineries, build pipelines, stimulate coal use, and develop nuclear power.

• 1971: Crude oil prices, along with those of other industrial commodities are controlled in "Phase I" of the Nixon Administration Economic Stabilization Program.

• 1972: For the first time since World War II, the U.S. is producing crude oil at full capacity. There is no spare domestic capacity to cushion the impact of foreign supply cutoffs.

• 1973: U.S. natural gas production peaks and begins declining. The "Yom Kippur" War precipitates an Arab oil embargo against the U.S. and the Netherlands. We are 33% dependent on foreign oil. "

• 1974: Price controls implemented in 1971 by the Nixon Administration are listed from all commodities- except crude oil.

• 1975: Congress repeals the percentage depletion for about 85% of U.S. oil and natural gas production, singling out petroleum suels again. President Ford signs the Energy Policy and Conservation Act extending price controls on crude oil until October 1981 under a complex "composite pric-

• 1976: In February, the Federal Energy Administration reduces domestic crude oil prices by about \$1.30 per barrel; in July, freezes them; and in December, reduces them by another 20-cents per barrel. Congress enacts the Tax Reform Act of 1976 retroactively imposing a punitive tax on cash expenditures by domestic oil and gas producers for intangible drilling costs. The U.S. is now 42% dependent

on foreign oil. • 1977; In February, the Department of Interior retroactively doubles rental fees on most oil and gas leases in Federal onshore areas of the U.S. On March I, U.S. crude oil prices are again trimmed through a 45-cents per barrel reduction on new oil.

1978: In October, after almost two years debate, Congress passes the Natural Gas Policy Act embodying the most complex regulatory system ever imposed on an American industry. ** Regulation is extended to the intrastate natural gas markei, thus imposing federal controls on 100% of U.S. gas production for the first time.

• 1979: Political turmoil in Iran interrupts their oil exports and the Federal gasoline allocation system in this country cannot cope with the shortage so gasoline lines spring up. President Carter announces a phased program to decontrol U.S. oil prices by October 1981 as intended by Congress. but proposes an additional tax on domestic-oil. Revenues needed to increase U.S. energy production would instead be diverted to the U.S. Treasury. Some 31 different synthetic fuels bills are currently pending in the House alone and the President has proposed cutting "red tape" for energy production. This year U.S. dependence on foreign. oil will exceed 45% and cost about \$65 billion.

This growing dependence on others for essential energy supplies is a threat to our economy, our national security and our position of world leadership. In the immortal words of Pogo, the cartoon character, in this war for energy independence, "We have met the enemy and he is

WHEREAS, the recent escape of inmates from the Camp Sierra Blanca Adult Rehabilitiation Center has brought to the attention of the Lincoln County Citizens that felons serving long term sentences for violent crimes are serving their sentences in this facility, and

WHEREAS, the Camp Sierra Blanca Adult Rehabilitation Center is a minimum security, facility with no restraining devices such as fences, walls, armed guards, or other means of preventing escape of its inmates,

WHEREAS, the Camp Sierra Blanca facility was built originally for juvenile offenders, and

WHEREAS, the placement of hardened criminals serving long term sentences for violent crimes in the camp Sierra Blanca facility is a potential threat to the lives and property of persons residing in Lincoin County,

NOW THEREFORE, be it resolved by the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners hereby requests the governor of the State of New Mexico to investigate the procedure used by the Department of Criminal Justice in assigning prisoners to the Camp Sierra Blanca facility and to order that no prisoners guilty of a violent crime be assigned in the future.

FURTHER, the Lincoln County be represented on the Screening Board and that a list of all inmates, with their criminal record be provided the Lincoln County Sheriff.
