## Commission Passes Resolution

The Lincoln County Commissioners met with about 40 concerned citizens in Ruidoso and approved a resolution calling for the governor to investigate the procedure used to assign persons to the minimum security facility at Camp Sierra Blanca; requesting no persons guilty of violent crimes, Lincoln County have a representative on the screening committee, and a list of inmates and their criminal records to the Lincoln County Sheriff.

She was also concerned about the length of time involved in getting police aid when needed. Mrs. Guck stated phone calls are often met with a busy line and when response was made, the size of the county meant at least a twenty-minute wait.

to alleviate the over-crowded situation at the Big House. The County Commissioners responded to the complaint by adding to the resolution a stipulation that a representative from Lincoln County be added to the Screening Committee.

The resolution was a result of the recent escapes from the minimum security facility where until recently 20 prisoners convicted of violent felonies were incarcerated. These twenty were transported to the State Penitentiary in Santa Fe leaving 54 inmates at Camp Sierra Blanca.

The problem of the large areas and the inability to contact the sheriff's department was voiced several times by different persons. Many felt the citizens of Lincoln County have been snowed, that Camp Sierra Blanca has posed a potential threat since it changed from a juvenile facility, its original use to the present minimum security facility.

Presently the committee is selected from employees of the state corrections. It was felt that these persons were not free to make judgements that were beneficial to the county to which the inmates is to be sent but rather beneficial to the overcrowding at Santa Fe.

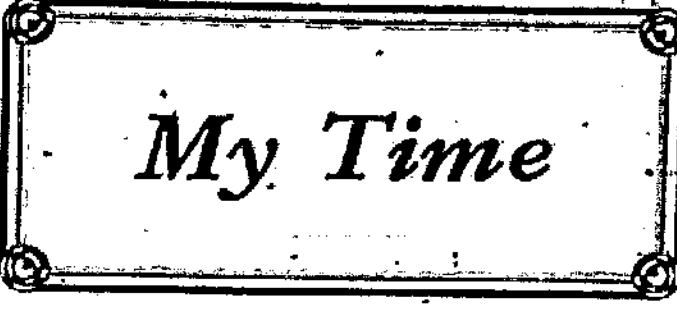

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When you find a starving dog homeless and without direction and you feed the dog and make him well he will not bite you. That is the difference between dogs and men.

The problem is caused by our remoteness, not by any inefficiency on the part of the different police agencies. We are so spread out that our police are sometimes many miles away when a call comes in.

Lincoln County knows what it is like to be like New Mexico. In the WIPP discussions, the government has given New Mexico the word that they, the government, will make the decisions.

Several areas have no phone service, such as White Oaks. We also have a great deal of mostly vacant homes used for vacations. Along with that is that we have many father absent homes.

In all of the discussions about Camp Sierra Blanca, I have not heard much about the safety of the resident of Lincoln County. Apparently we do not exist in the minds of the people in Santa Fe.

There has been 14 escapes from Camp Sierra Blanca in the last year. In fact Robert Elton Cox escaped once several years ago.

What this adds up to is that Lincoln County is not suited for an adult prison.

Tonight in Capitan at the Church of Christ, Dr. Becknell and several of his staff will be answering questions.

There is no security, even minimum, at CSB. With no fence, no guards, well, without guns, they can not be called guards, and only one counselor for every 30 inmates, the place is on its own.

He needs to know that the people of Lincoln County want the CSB returned to a juvenile facility or closed.

Cox had no history of violent behavior, until he murdered Tom Bedford. How many other potential Robert Elton Cox'es are there at CSB.

We are receiving "professional criminals" along with the violent criminals and this county can not protect itself.

## Casons to be Tested

The Capitan School Board approved spending \$943 to take care tests on three casons of the elementary building now under construction.

Board President Pat Huey stated he felt if the tests were no good on the casons, then the whole project is no good. Similar discussion led the Board to approve spending the \$943 on the core tests.

We live in a county where the response time by police can be from 20 to 30 minutes, if the phones work well enough to use.

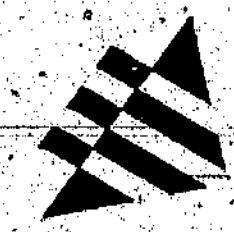

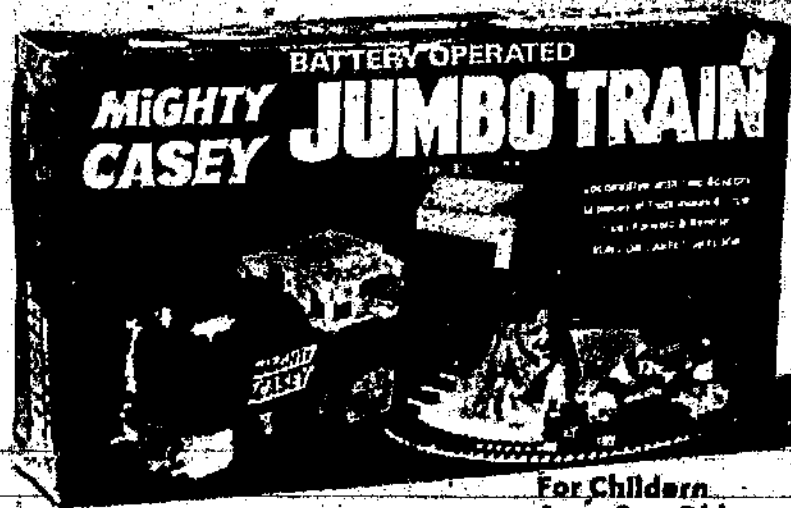

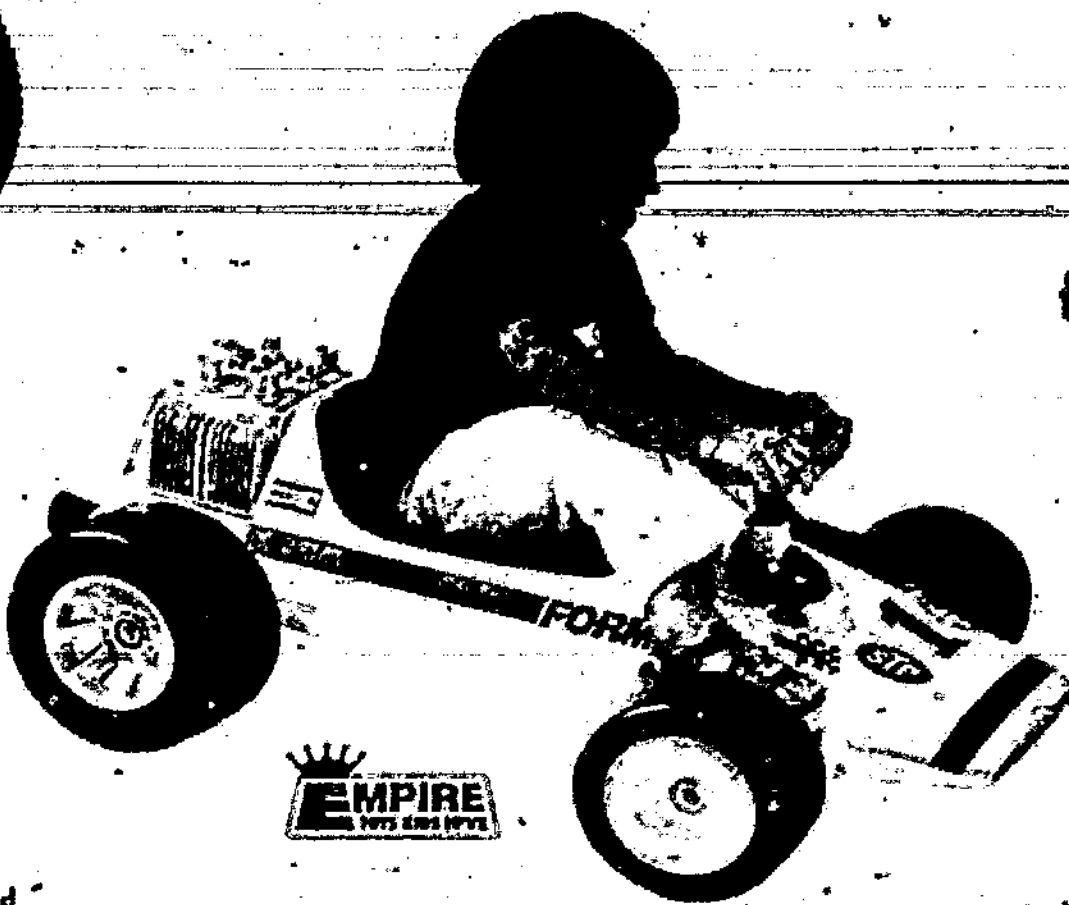
