Corrections Commission Holds Meeting--

## CSB Discussed in Capitan

Bud Richards, representative of the Criminal Justice Department assured Lincoln County citizens the criteria for selection of inmates for minimum security facilities would become standard for all state facilities.

Richards with other Criminal Justice Department officials: Ben Gallegos, Felix Rodriguez, John Remming and Joe Romero representing Dr. Becknell, reported the changes in the selection criteria and action taken on the requests from the Citizens Committee, at the Capitan meeting.

The Committee, Cummins, Jungbluth and Guck was appointed by the Lincoln County Commissioners to meet with Criminals Justice to request changes at CSB.

Positive response was made on the request to provide rap sheets on CSB inmates for local law enforcement. Requests concerning work release were acknowledged but nothing could be done until further funding is available to increase the staff at CSB.

Concerns over work release came from a lack of supervision in transporting inmates to their respective jobs. A bus driven to Ruidoso to deliver inmates is driven by an inmate, presently. The citizens committee felt a corrections officer should transport inmates, that a central point to drop inmates to their employers and be picked up in the evening. The Committee felt a need for tighter security in the part of work release.

Statutory differences in escapes make a walk-away from work release a 4th degree felony while a walk-away from an institution is a 2nd degree felony. There have been only two walk-aways from CSB.

Employer status in the work release program will alter; tighter investigation of the employer will be dependent upon a consent form signed by the person to authorize a state police check.

A request that population of CSB be kept at 50 was considered impossible by Richards. The law population would be dependent upon Las Lunas medium security facility being completed by November, if funding is legislated this coming session.

The idea of having a local citizen represent the county was dampened by the lack of funds, and possible legal problems.

Richards assured the citizens gathered that citizens representatives would be appointed by the Governor presently.

Members of the Corrections Commission were present, having met at CSB for their monthly meeting. Andrew Wall, Las Cruces; Herman E. Sanchez, Santa Fe; Bud Richards, Las Cruces; Nancy Mc-Corale, Albuquerque; Gail Casey, Santa Fe; and Edwin Tatum - Clovis met with CSB administrators and Hollis Cummins and Ed Jungbluth, Lincoln County Citizen Committee.

Controversial No. 17 on the criteria for minimum security, stating all above may be waived, has been wiped out, Richards said. The new criteria was done by people who deal with inmates daily, and has been sent to Dr. Becknell with minor modifications expected.

"People really get hung up on people in for murder," Felix Rodriguez, director of Criminal Justice said. "I'd much rather trust one in for murder than a habitual criminal."

Bud Richards stated he felt there was possibly no need for more mini security facilities, but rather medium, which cost more to construct. The proposed Hatch facility will house 200 inmates and cost \$3.2 million. It will ease over crowding in all other state facilities.

The Criminal Justice officials consented giving consideration to the request to have a citizen representative after Capitan area rancher Pete Ponder told the group that many people would be part of the screening committee at their own expense.

Richards had been reluctant on this point, not wanting to create a

precedent with citizen representatives for Los Lunas, Roswell, CSB and Radium Springs facilities.

Nancy Guck felt Lincoln County was unable to provide inmates with enough educational-vocational opportunities for proper rehabilitation.

"If you had to make an intelligent choice, this is not a good choice," Mrs. Guck said.

Hollis Cummins commented on the change of the types of inmates at CSB since its adult status December 1975. Cummins has participated in work-release by hiring CSB inmates. He felt inmates not meeting criteria for Roswell were brought in quietly.

"We did put people here that did not belong here," Richards admitted.

"We don't want to face the same thing next crisis," Cummins replied.

Mike Swickard asked Richards if

the department was complying with state law in sending people who might cause adverse reactions within the community. State Law prohibited this, Richards stated that in the past the state law may not have been complied with, but it was now. Richards related the different requirements for assignment to the work release program.

General guidelines for minisecurity and work release were reviewed. Eligibility for work release is more stringent than assignment to minimum security. Six months of screening at the state Pen and a 45 day waiting period after arrival at minimum security is required. No record of escape in five years prior to minimum status, the inmate must have shown willingness to participate in drug-alcohol programs.

Capitan resident Pat Huey stressed the Commission work more closely with inmates employers.

Richards suggested Huey speak with the Citizens Committee concerning this.

A mood of appreciation for quick action was expressed by the Committee and other officials. John Bigsbee summed the feeling of most present.

"The community is unhappy over the people at CSB; criteria had not been followed, there were problems on the over-all management of the facility. They appreciate what has been done but they are still unhappy. The citizens committee appointed by the County Commissioners is there to give advice and you (The Criminal Justice) should work closely with them."

## Shotgun Blast Stops Break-In

A shooting took place at the Ernest Wright Ranch north of Corona at 4:15 a.m. Thursday morning. William L. Weaver, 38, of Elk Hart, Indiana was shot in the upper right side of his body with a single shot 12 gauge shotgun by Ernest Wright.

Weaver is a truck driver for the IPM Corporation and had stopped his Semi at the Wright Ranch, turned around in the back yard and came to the kitchen door.

According to police sources, Weaver cut the screen door open, and then kicked the kitchen door open. This occurred while Mr. Wright was telling Weaver to go away. Neither had met. A quantity of various unidentified pills and alcohol were found in Weaver's truck. Police sources stated to the NEWS, that Weaver smelled of alcohol.

Weaver entered the kitchen with Mr. Wright retreating into the hall. Weaver verbally abused Mr. Wright and told him to "turn on the lights."

The Wright Ranch House has no wall switches, instead they are the hanging type and Weaver could not find the lights. Officers suspect that Weaver threw a tire iron at Wright, at which time Wright fired once hitting Weaver on the right side of his chest. The over 6 foot Weaver then crawled out of the house leaving a trail of blood. Wright in the meantime went out the other door, got into his car and summoned the State Police. Officer Jim Hillsley was first on the scene. Hillsley accompanied Wright back to the ranch. Weaver had crawled to his truck and climbed in, but had not moved the truck.

The Corona ambulance transported Weaver to Carrizozo, and then he was transported to Alamogordo for surgery.

No charges have been filed on Weaver yet, and the New Mexico State Police are continuing to investigate.

## Robert O. Anderson Group Takes Control of BSI

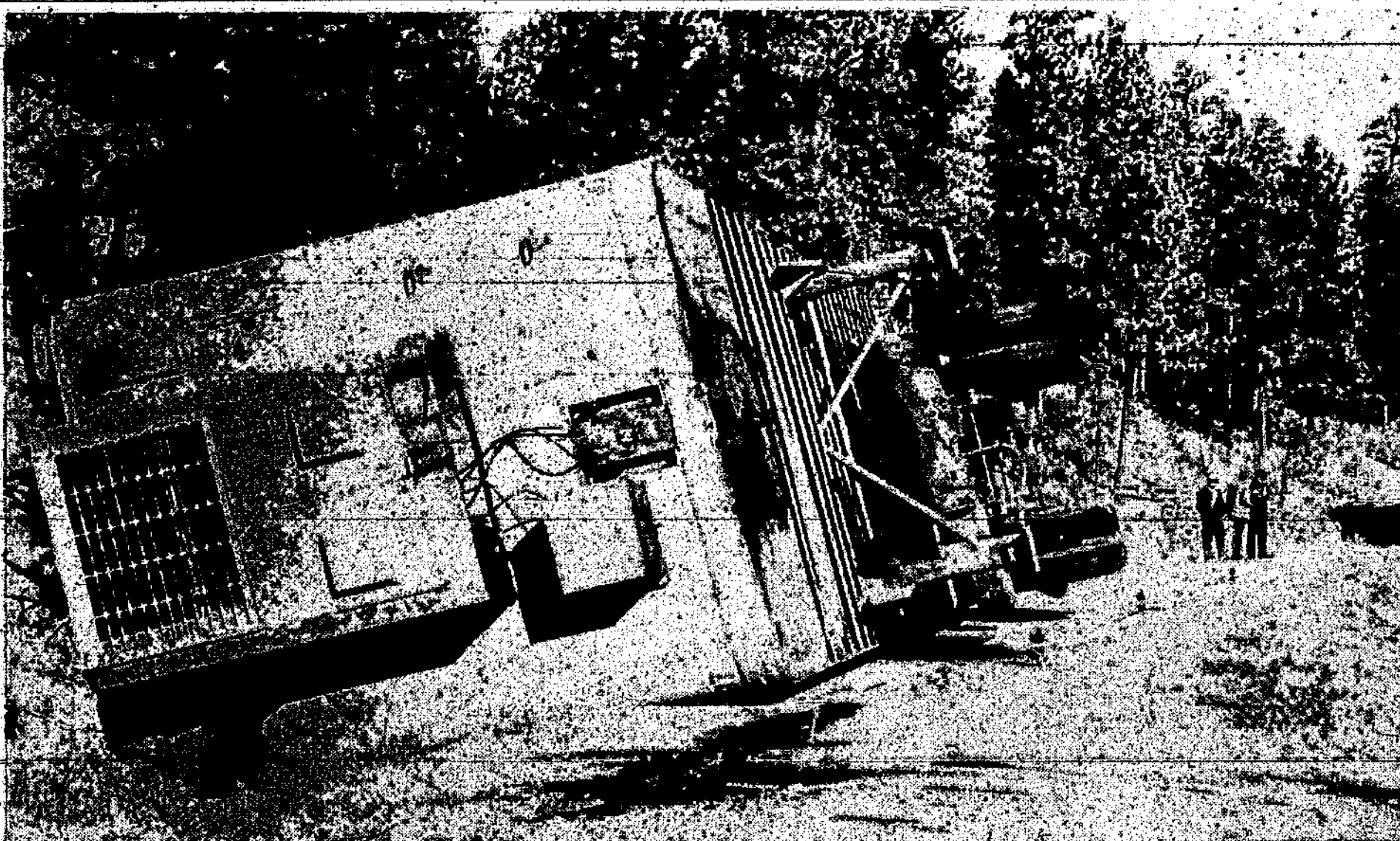
The Board of Directors of Bank Securities, Inc. today announced the consummation of a previously announced agreement between the New Mexico based bank holding company and a group headed by Robert O.

Anderson of Roswell, New Mexico. The group includes his sons, Robert B. Anderson and Phelps Anderson, and A. G. Hamilton. Today, Mr. Robert O. Anderson assumed the Chairmanship of the Board of Bank Securities, Inc. and A. G. Hamilton became President and Chief Executive Officer.

In accordance with terms of the transaction previously announced, the Anderson group purchased 200,000 shares of authorized unissued Bank Securities common stock. In addition, they obtained irrevocable proxies, expiring not later than in December,

1982, for 295,000 outstanding Bank Securities shares currently held by major stockholders. Also purchased by the Anderson group were an aggregate of \$7,425,000 of 9 percent subordinated debentures due 1986, of subsidiary banks of Bank Securities, Inc. Warrants allow the Anderson Group to exercise and warrants expiring in 1986 for the purchase of 550,000 shares of Bank Securities, Inc. common stock at \$13.50 per share. The total investment of the Anderson group is \$10,125,000.

Bank Securities' Board of Directors on Tuesday, November 27th passed a resolution to expand the Board to 25 members. New members of the Board elected to fill these positions are Robert O. Anderson, Robert B. Anderson, Phelps Anderson, A. G. Hamilton, Thomas Denton of Roswell and Franklin Jones and C. E. Woodcock of Albuquerque.

driving now or in a couple of years. We as a nation only have so much resource, and someday they might be a little colder in their home, because they "needed" to drive around town now. MS

With all of the stink about recruiting violations at UNM, maybe it would be nice to do away with all recruiting inducements. I went to New Mexico State and the athletes usually were a bother in class.

The local Brownie Troop will be taking 1980 calendar orders soon. The young ladies meet every week and are busy as elves this holiday season.

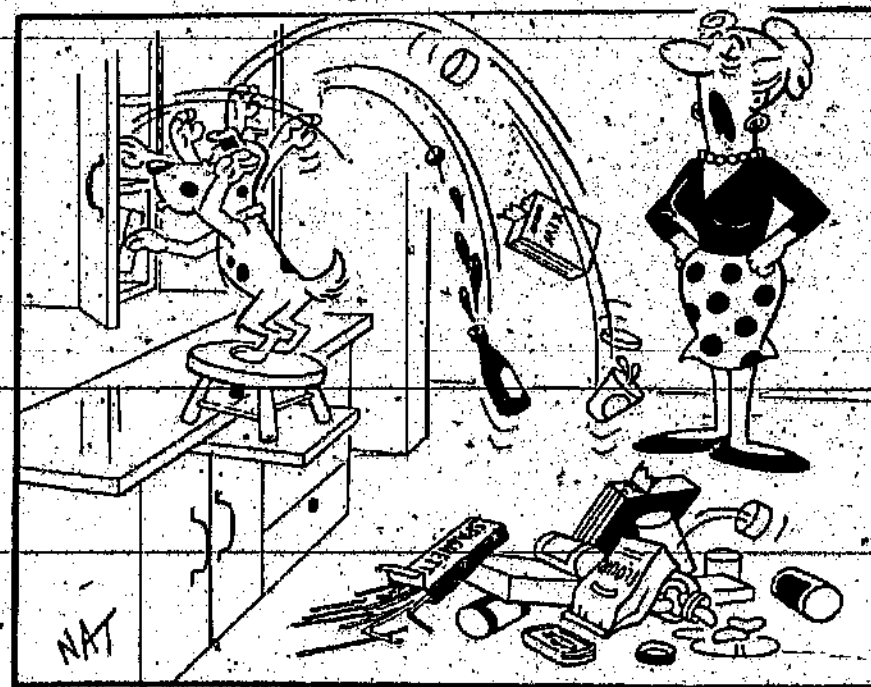
Carrizozo Women Club members and their families are planning an old

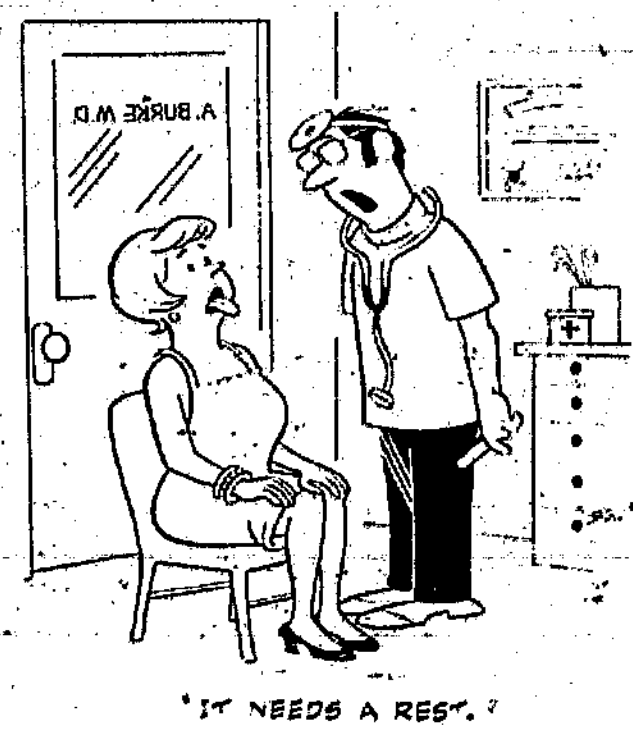

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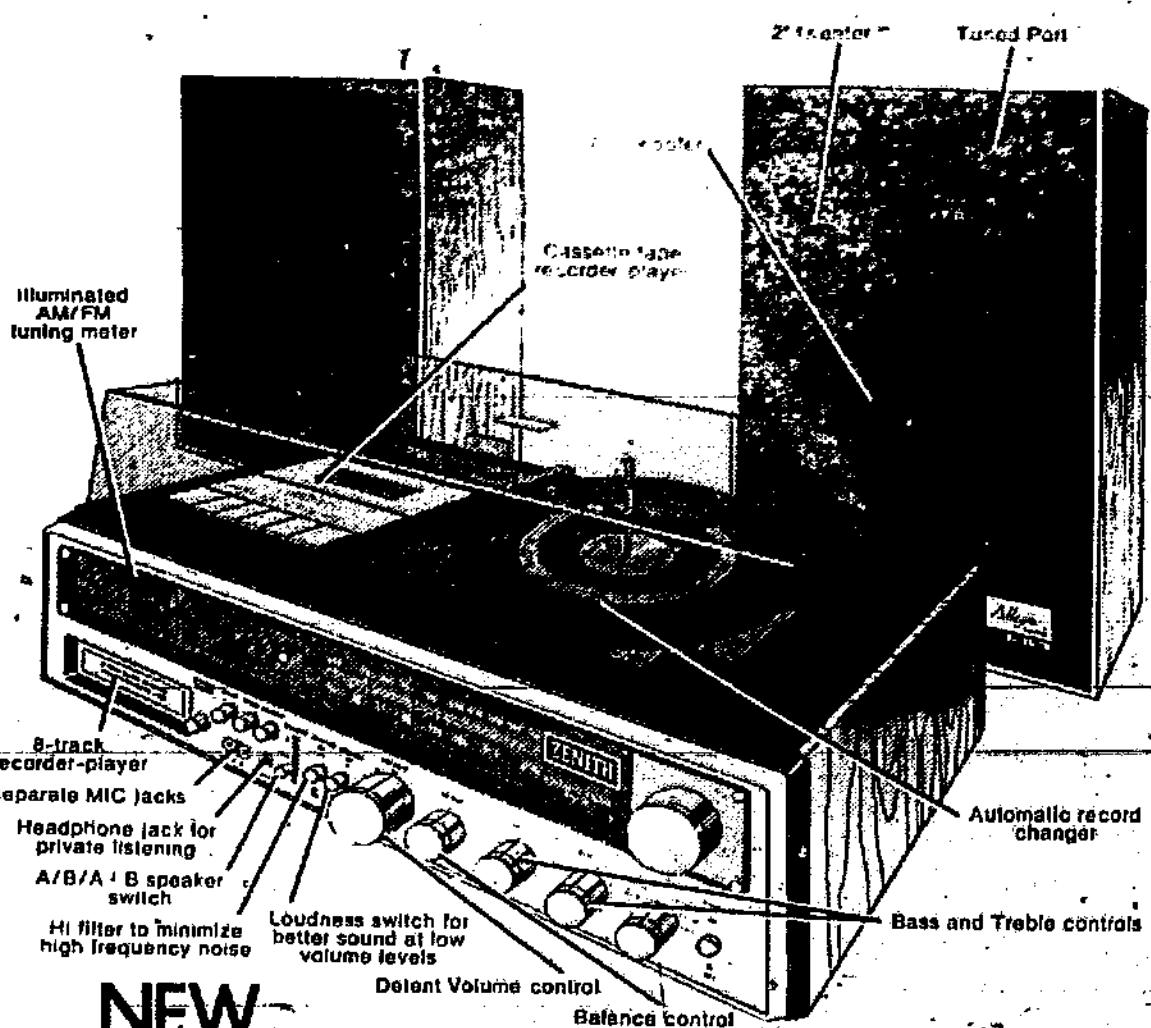

The Christmas Concert will be held on December 13 in the evening.

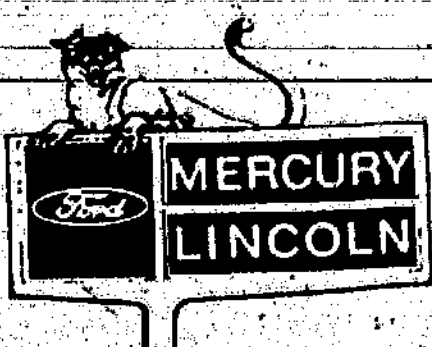

WHEREAS, the accuracy and completeness of the census for the Town of Carrizozo will determine its population rank among other communities of the country;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Jesse W. English, Mayor of the Town of Carrizozo, do hereby proclaim April 1, 1980, as CENSUS DAY in Carrizozo, and do urge and implore all residents to cooperate fully during the month of April with those who are charged with the responsibility of this most important work.

OF CONGRESS**


The U.S. Constitution (Article 1, Section 2) requires the apportioning of seats in the House of Representatives based on the population of each State. If everyone in our community is not counted in the 1980 census, we could have reduced Congressional representation in the Congresses to be elected in 1982, 1984, 1986, 1988, and 1990.

**FEDERAL AND  
STATE AID PROGRAMS**


A significant part of our local government's budget is based on revenues received from the State and Federal Governments. Many of these aid programs use census statistics as a fair way to distribute funds. Examples: Revenue sharing, community development, health, education, highways, job training, school lunch program, economic development.

FACTS**


The 1980 census also will measure the status of our housing. The number of rooms, types of heating and cooking fuels, value of the property or rent paid, plumbing facilities, utility and other costs—all these census facts will give us a statistical snapshot of our living quarters and help our community plan for future housing needs.

REDISTRICTING**

Our State legislative districts also are dependent on census population totals to assure fair representation. Other election and administrative boundary lines often are based on census statistics. It's the fair way to make sure that your vote carries the same relative weight as every other vote in the State.

Each population question on the census questionnaire produces statistical totals which will help us better understand how our residents are doing. Age, race, sex, marital status, educational level, ethnic background, occupation, employment status, income, veteran status—these are important facts we need to have to draw a statistical profile of our community.

AHEAD**

Without accurate information, no one in government, private business, or a civic organization can plan ahead with confidence. The 1980 census will give our community solid facts on which to base our future actions in many activities during the years to come. Answering the census is an investment in our future.

## Wins Oratorical Contest

Today the age old battle of the sexes is taking on new meaning and moving towards sexual equality at all levels. Now men's job is the trend. This was a portion of the oration that ninth grader and first place winner, Robert Montano delivered at last week's local oratorical contest. Kathy Hemphill, senior and Shirley Simmons, junior received second and third place. The Forty-third Annual National High School Oratorical Contest is sponsored by the American Legion and approved by the National Association of Secondary School Principals.

"I'm proud to be a part of the United States Constitution because it helps solve problems by means of freedom of speech, freedom of the press, freedom to vote for who we want, and freedom of choice. To me ERA means that we the people are equal, people are people no matter what sex, race, religion or color."

Fourteen year old Montano, whose oration topic was on the ERA (Equal Rights Amendment) ended with the recital of the preamble, the introductory part of the United States Constitution.

Montano is the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Mike Montano. The journalism-speech student is a member of the junior varsity basketball team and the FFA-HERO Chapter. His favorite subjects are algebra and science. The ambitious young man plans to attend NMSU and major in business and law.

or some phase of the Constitution of the United States. The contestants were also required to give a 2-5 minute extemporaneous, without previous study) response to Amendment VIII - "Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishment inflicted."

The five Carrizozo high school students who participated were judged on presence (poise and personality), composition (accuracy and effectiveness), oratory (power to convince). First place winner, Robert Montano will compete in the District oratorical contest which will be held in Alamogordo on April of 1980. Four finalists in a national contest will receive scholarships from the National Organization of the American Legion which may be used to attend any college or university in the United States.

The purpose of the National High School Oratorical Contest is to develop a deeper knowledge and

appreciation of the Constitution of the United States on the part of high school students. Other objectives of the contest include the development of leadership, the ability to think and speak clearly and intelligently and the preparation for acceptance of duties and responsibilities, the rights and privileges of American citizenship.

The National High School Oratorical Contest was first conducted as a national contest in 1938. Today nearly 20,000 students participate in the contest, representing fifty-two departments of the American Legion. The local American Legion, established in 1937, last sponsored an oratorical contest in Carrizozo 10 years ago.

Besides providing excellent experience for students participating in the contest, the program affords an audience of American public the opportunity to better understand the meaning of the United States Constitution.

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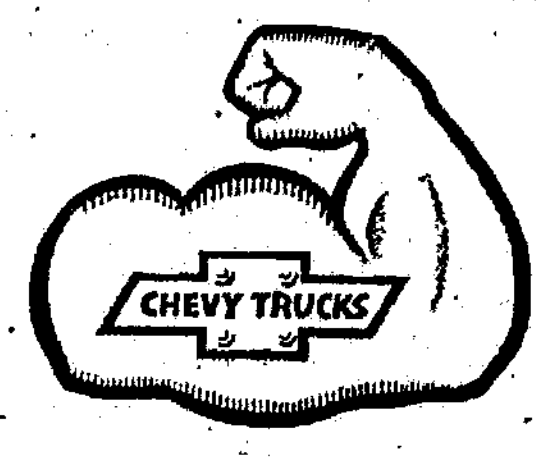
