## Carrizozo Town Council Moves to Increase Local Police Salaries

Carrizozo's mayor and trustees spent a major portion of last Monday's lengthy meeting discussing police salaries. The board moved that the starting salary for a full time uncertified police officer, effective January 1, 1980 will be raised to \$650.00 a month, \$700.00 after six months on the job. Certified police work will be discussed at another time.

Earlier in the meeting a request by the town's maintenance workers for a salary increase was tabled because trustees and mayor were not prepared to discuss this matter. Also some trustees felt that police salaries should receive top priority. All town employees had previously been given 10 percent increases. Town superintendent Emilio Beltran, who supports the crew's request on increased salaries will do a study on

comparative towns to present to the board at next month's meeting.

Officer Guy Brown told the board prior to the salary increase that he has spent at least \$1,200.00 out of his pocket in necessary equipment to do his duty, including guns. He said the police department needs good equipment, for example first aid kits and blankets at present he would have to use a \$40.00 jacket for a cover if a medical emergency arises.

He said that he has been assaulted with knives and guns and all he can do is arrest people. He strongly recommended the wage increase, updating police equipment, and supporting an officer when he was doing his duty. Brown said his work involves the poor, "who drink more and who he arrests most often."

Brown told the board, "You don't know I exist, because you don't need

me." He told them that their presence on Friday and Saturday night would provide them (trustees) with real insight into a police officers duties. Brown said that town police make more arrests than the county. 'Census 80' was on the town's agenda. Mayor English said that the "no pay involved" project would be conducted by volunteers.

A committee which consists of Bill Payne, Susana English, Christine Chavez, Roy Harmon, Manny Hernandez and Polly Chavez will meet to discuss the upcoming census, which will include through the mail questionnaires and door-to-door census taking.

Mr. Paul Sturiale, Rural Planner for Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District out of Roswell was present to tell the board that he is available to help draw up a plan to assist the committee with 'Census 80'.

Sturiale, who assists a five county area in a public relation program for the census said, "Most people don't realize how important it is for this area to be accurately counted. It will affect their share of federal and state funding as well as their representation in the state Legislature."

If the area is undercounted, the citizen may not get their rightful

share of representation in the state House and Senate. They could be shortchanged on the number of seats they receive," Sturiale continued to say.

In other business, a letter was read to Douglas Jarrard, acting airport manager who will live on the airport premises, from Yellowbird, Inc. president Ben Morris. Among other things the letter stated that Yellowbird will donate \$10.00 to town and county police who may be called on emergency to refuel aircraft.

Reports from trustees included their concern about gophers at the cemetery, siphoning of gas from town vehicles parked at city yard and grading of town roads.

The mayor's letter opener was busy last Monday opening all sorts of mail - an insurance bid, three proposals on solar heating for pool, an engineer statement and five letters to the mayor, including one that asked if it would be alright if 200 bicyclists and 50 support vehicles passed through Carrizozo at midnight on Saturday, May 3, 1980. The pedal pushers are participating in a cross county race. The group's 'spokesmen' in the letter was coach Carl Cantrell of the Duke City Cyclist Club of Albuquerque.

I have had some spirited conversations lately about the proposal to raise the driving age to at least 18. I would make it clear that I was not

critizing insurance agents with my comments about the lobby attempts by the Insurance Lobby. The people that lobby will not like doing anything that will decrease the amount of business that their people have.

In a nationwide survey of over 50,000 injury claims, it was found that those between the ages of 16 and 24 were responsible of 32 percent of the auto injury claims, even though they make up only 17 percent of the population. Further defined, a driver under 21 is 8 times more likely to have an accident that one over 25, which is why the insurance rates are so high.

Over 2,500 teenagers died in alcohol related car accidents last year. A Department of Transportation study shows that most of these accidents occurred on a Friday or Saturday night between 10:00 p.m. and 1:00 a.m.

Further it has been shown that the accidents involving a vehicle carrying three or more persons, happen while the young people were "cruising", rather than heading for a particular destination, and took place within ten miles of the driver's home.

But, the teenagers are not all at fault, they have parents. Each parent reading this column must face the possibility that by letting their sons or daughters cruise they might not come back. Our most important moments in life are those few that we have with our children, we should do our best to protect the children. MS

## Municipal Elections Upcoming in Capitan (March 4, 1980)

A Municipal election was announced at the Capitan Town Council meeting. The election will be March 4, 1980. Two councilmen positions for four years and one judge position for two years are open.

Deadline for declaration of candidacy is 5 p.m. Jan. 29, 1980 at the village hall in Capitan.

A complaint about the landfill was filed by Dick Beck. A fire recently spread from the landfill and burned grass on Beck's property. Beck claimed the landfill is not within state specifications; there is no retainer fence, no 20 ft. trench, gates are not locked.

The council voted to table any action on this until village attorney Gary Mitchell could investigate state statutes concerning landfills and to meet with Beck's attorney.

Mayor Stark commented the newly acquired Emergency Attack Pumper was put to good use, during the recent fire, "It paid for itself."

The Pumper lease-purchase contract was again presented and was signed.

Animal Control was discussed, Mitchell telling the council N.M. state statutes state dogs may be shot on sight with no liability to the village in an emergency situation.

Village Maintenance Supervisor Larry Caywood told the Council an animal retention would be constructed as soon as a price for fencing could be obtained. Fencing is to be purchased from Olan Booher, who also will be billed for water pipes to his property. Booher is to pay half the cost of the pipe. Caywood stated no meter would be installed until Booher quotes the price of fencing and pays the pipe costs.

Excess water from the Capitan Waste Water Treatment, a problem in the winter months, should be used in some irrigation plan, according to the EID. Water presently goes into the Maggado Creek. The Council was reluctant to act because there is no farming to use the water.

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Caywood reported water lines are complete and the modification on the

filter plant was to be completed this week.

Plans for the proposed raw water storage are being completed by the Southeast Economic Development, Mayor Stark reported.

The Council moved to donate \$112 to the Southeast office of the Criminal Justice LEAA. Stark informed the council of the intention to meet with the County Commissioners to have the amount requested of Lincoln County absorbed into the taxes. "Let everyone pay a small share of the

funding to keep the Southeast office open," Stark said.

Last year Lincoln County received \$90,373 from LEAA. Capitan will apply for a new police car through the program. Last year, \$8500 was funded to the village for police salary.

The council moved to keep the 1980 Census local by not hiring outside clerical aides and supervisors. Mitchell stressed the importance of an accurate census, pointing out the many federal programs dependent on population count.

Mayor Stark reported two mature certificates of deposit have been placed into a passbook account in order to gain more interest. He also stated the action was legal according to State Financial Director Al Romberg. Once all CDs mature, the money will be placed into one account to gain a higher interest.

A bill for constructing picnic tables for the park behind Village Hall was discussed. Camp Sierra Blanca inmates built the tables with materials formerly purchased by the village. The village agreed to the building with the understanding CSB was to do all labor free. The bill for 30 percent of materials and .25 cents hour labor, the total bill \$221.51. Councilman Tom Sullivan was appointed to investigate the situation.

Sullivan informed the Council of the project by the CSB Jaycee Organization of inmates to aid the village. The inmates are willing to come to Capitan, clean-up streets, pick up yards for old people, do minor cleaning and carpentry. This would be done free of charge. Anyone needing help should contact CSB administration.

A suit concerning property with easement-only-across-private-was property was bought before the Council. Village employee Ernest Caywood objected to an easement, presently used for water-line maintenance and trash trucks, becoming a public road because it cut his property in two. The easement is being sought as a public road because a landlocked property had been sold, needing access.

The biggest problem is one party involved is a councilman and the other party is an employee," Councilman Riaka replied.

The council moved to ask the court for a declaratory judgement.

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. - The State Crime Stoppers Commission announced Tuesday it would offer immediately \$500 rewards for information leading to the capture of each of the remaining five convicts who escaped Sunday from the State Penitentiary.

The announcement followed consultation with the State Criminal Justice Department.

State Police officials warn that the five escapees might be armed and exhort all law enforcement members and citizens to use "extreme caution" if they come in contact with them.

The escapees probably have changed from their prison-issued garb to civilian clothes, police theorize.

Several prisoners are suspected of robbing and stabbing an 81-year old man in the outskirts of Santa Fe Sunday night. The men escaped in a 1969 light blue Chevrolet pick-up truck with New Mexico license plates BH-8159. They took with them a .38-caliber pistol and a 12-gauge shotgun along with some money.

The prisoners escaped from Cell Block 2 at the State Pen, using a hacksaw blade to cut out some window bars. They then climbed a wall to the roof of an adjoining building, used some wire to lower themselves to the ground and then cut some holes with some wirecutters in two parallel chain link fences on the east side of the prison yard to climax their escape.

The State Crime Stoppers Commission is authorizing \$500 rewards for information leading to the capture of each of the escaped convicts.

The \$2,500 in rewards also will be paid if citizens contact any of the 26 local Crime Stoppers programs and provide information leading to the arrests of any of the escapees.

Anyone having any information regarding the whereabouts of the escaped convicts can call the State Crime Stoppers Commission at its toll-free number, 1-800-432-6933 any time between 8:00 a.m. and 11:00 p.m. daily. Callers do not have to reveal their identities and their calls are not tapped.

The State Crime Stoppers Commission also pays cash rewards for information leading to the arrests of other wanted persons in New Mexico as well as for tips which help solve major crimes committed anywhere in the state.

## Posts \$100<sup>00</sup> Reward

The Carrizozo School Board moved to post a \$100.00 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of person or persons responsible for the vandalism which occurred on November 30 on school grounds. Until further details are available to the news media those desiring more information about the reward may contact the administration office.

The board took this action as the result of a tire slashing incident which was discovered when the basketball team returned from the Clouderoff game at 1:15 a.m. on Nov. 30. Police continue the investigating of the crime. Informants will be protected. Confidentiality will be respected.

Eight individuals including teachers and students had their vehicle's tires vandalized. In some cases the tires had just been slashed and air was still escaping. Two vehicles were seen leaving the area and were identified by several of the players.

The Carrizozo Teachers Association presented the board with a statement of concern in regard to the vandalism. The teachers' vehicles were parked on school property and were there as a result of the owners taking part in a school sponsored activity.

The CTA is intensely concerned about the occurrence and possible recurrence of the crime. They asked that the school board evaluate the magnitude of the crime and consider some possible measures of immediate compensation to these teachers for their financial loss and mental anguish.

To help defray expenses not covered by owner's vehicle insurance the school will sponsor a special basketball game this coming Monday, Dec. 17 at 7:00 p.m. in the old gym. The varsity girls will compete against the faculty. Prices - adults, \$1.00; students, \$.75; and special rates to senior citizens, 50 cents.

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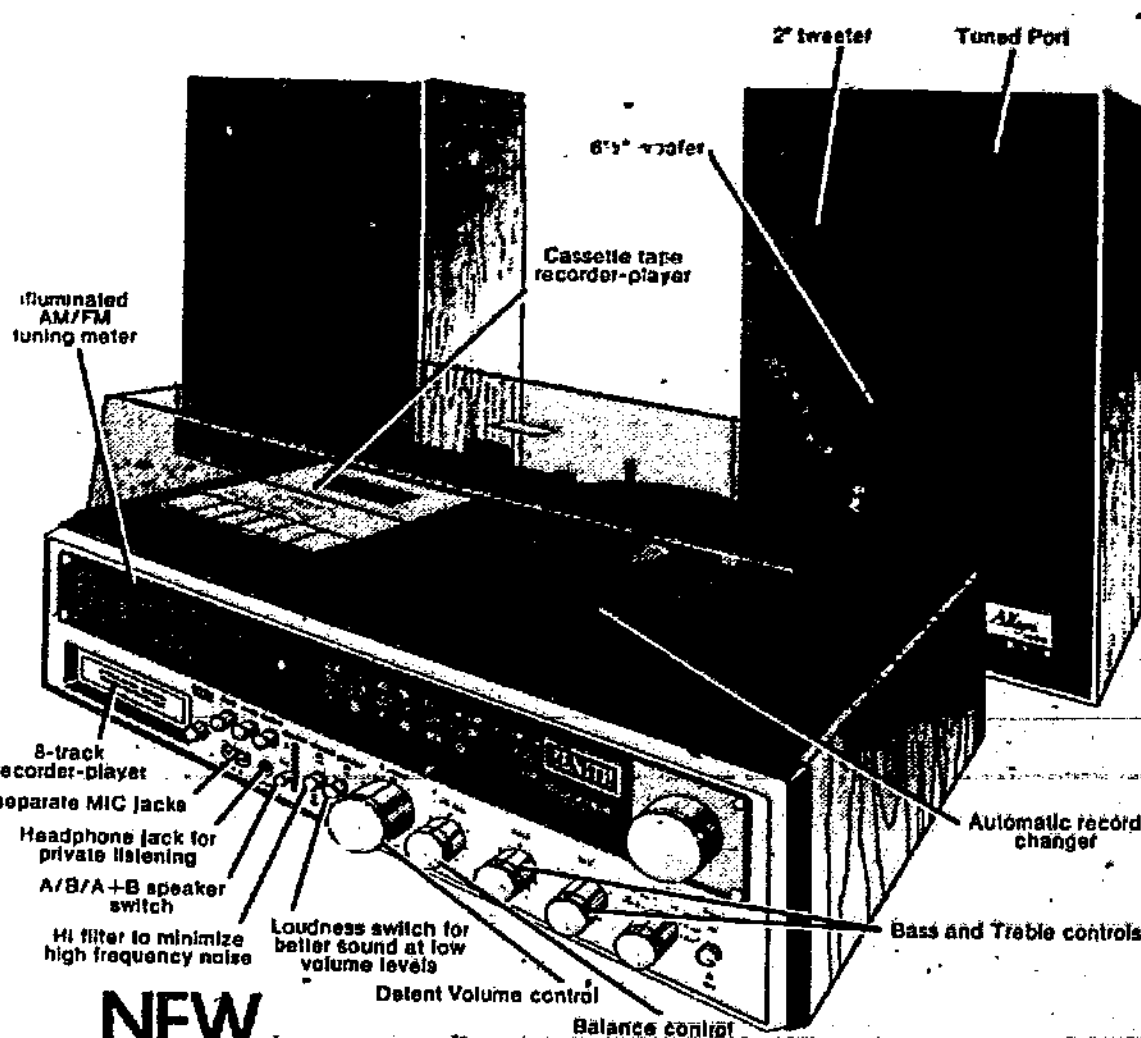
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# Grizzly School News

According to a spokesman from the 49th Transportation Squadron at Holloman, commuting to and from work accounts for approximately 33 percent of the total gasoline consumed by automobiles in the U.S. The majority of commuter trips are made with only one or two persons in the car. Raising the occupancy levels would result in tremendous fuel savings as well as reduced commuting costs for the individuals concerned.

In a vanpool 12 to 15 workers share the ride to work in a comfortable van that is driven by one of the workers. Such an arrangement would take a lot of cars off the road; it would relieve traffic congestion and air pollution and, very importantly, it would result in savings to the workers. The savings could be realized by less cash costs for travel;

by not having to buy a second car or by extending the life of an existing car.

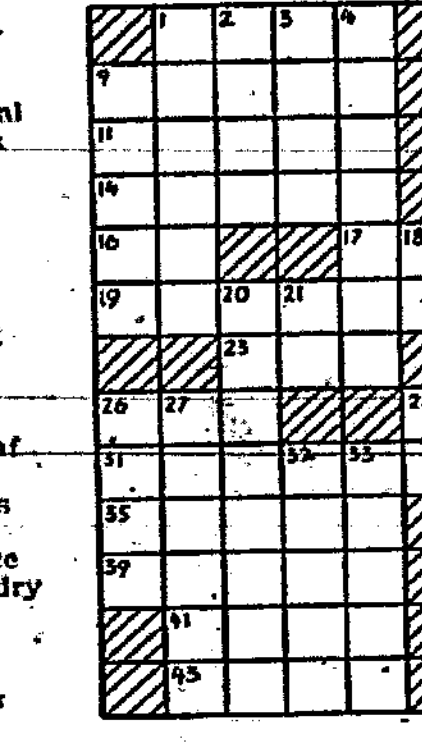
