Many Sworn Into Office —

Lee Straley Hands In Resignation

Lincoln County government has changed to reflect the November election with the swearing in of the successful candidates. Tuesday those sworn in were Judge George

L. Zimmerman for his fourth term as District Judge, Judge Thomas Sendenaw for his second term as District Judge.

The two district Judges then took turns administering the oath of office to the rest of the elected and appointed officials.

Those elected officials sworn in were: Archie Whitam, Probate Judge,

S.M. Ortiz, Magistrate Judge; Leroy Montes, Magistrate Judge; Barbara Lovelace, County Clerk; Marion Schlarb, County Assessor; Mike Kimbrell, County Treasurer; Ernest Sanchez, Sheriff; and Cotton M. McKnight, Lee Straley, and Ben Hall as County Commissioners.

Immediately upon being sworn in for his second term as County Commissioner, Lee Straley officially announced that due to a change in his business, he would have to resign due to his spending of large amounts of time outside the county.

Also sworn in were the appointments by the Heads of the Departments. In the Treasurers office, the Chief Deputy will be Marie Barola with Lois Collins and Robert Beltran as Deputies.

In the Clerk's office, Jane McSwane will be the Chief Deputy with Juanita C. Lucero as the Deputy Clerk.

In the Assessor's office will be Julia Samora as the Chief Deputy Assessor and Patricia Serma as the Deputy. In the Appraisal office will be Paul Baca as the Chief Appraiser, Ronnie Beltran as appraiser, Aurelia Lueras and Bobby Freeman as clerks, and Albert Baca as Mapper. In Ruidoso is Roger Buckley as an Appraiser.

In the Sheriff's office will be Wayland Hill, Jail Administrator, Linda Housley Secretary, Chris Volquardsen, Deputy in Ruidoso, Charlie Engelking, Deputy in Capitan, Lucas Gallegos, Deputy in Ruidoso, U.S. Montes, Chief Deputy in Ruidoso, John Cupp, Deputy Dispatcher, Judith Hobbs, Dispatcher, W.A. Talley, Dispatcher, W.L. Hasenbuhler, Dispatcher, and Senovia Baca, Cook.

Sheriff Sanchez announced that he had openings for three certified deputies and one secretary in the Ruidoso office.

In the Commission meeting that followed the swearing in, Judge Zimmerman took the place of G.L. Straley until a chairman could be elected. Judge Zimmerman instructed County Clerk Barbara Lovelace to notify Governor Bruce King that a vacancy does exist in the Commission so that Lincoln County may have an appointment by the next regular Commission meeting.

Cotton McKnight was elected Chairman of the County Commission and conducted the rest of the meeting.

In a brief meeting the commission set notice for bids on their yearly fuel contract, decided to sell some old office equipment, signed a joint powers agreement with the Town of Carrizozo as to the School Bus Route Road program and as a purely clerical matter approved the grant money that was given to the county for Ambulance upgrading, and Investigative Photography.

Ruidoso Sunland Board Mapping Out New Plans

RUIDOSO DOWNS, N.M. — Members of the Board of Ruidoso Sunland, Inc. have been a pretty busy team since taking over the helm of both Sunland Park and Ruidoso Downs Race Tracks.

The 11-man board is headed by President W.L. (Sunny) Edwards of Ruidoso.

Ruidoso-Sunland, Inc. is a wholly owned subsidiary of the Ruidoso Jockeys Club.

Main items which have occupied the attention of the board in recent weeks include the management of the current Sunland meeting, the acquisition of badly needed heavy equipment, the addition of such major Ruidoso stakes as the All American Gold Cup and Rainbow Silver Cup, and preliminary planning for a major overhaul of the running surfaces of the two tracks.

According to Edwards the recently-purchased equipment include a Caterpillar Motor grader, a Caterpillar bulldozer, and a Caterpillar loader. The total cost for all three is just under \$200,000. The equipment, Edwards noted, will enable the maintenance crews to do a much more effective job in attending to the running surface and track grounds of both Sunland and Ruidoso.

In addition, two dump trucks have been ordered, two new water trucks

have been purchased, two harrows are being built, a pickup truck has been purchased for the maintenance department and a land leveler will be acquired shortly.

A major renovation of the running strips of both Ruidoso and Sunland is in the works. Edwards also pointed out. An engineer has been retained to draw up specifications so the projects can be put out to bid. The plan is to remove the cushion of both tracks, and re-engineer and "re-level" the six inch base. The renovation of the Ruidoso strip will be completed before the start of the '79 season. During the summer the same project will be completed at Sunland Park, preparatory to the start of the 1979-80 meeting in October.

Another project now underway is the re-vamping and improvement of the water and sewer systems at Ruidoso Downs. An engineer is already at work in this area. Also under consideration, Edwards noted, is the possibility of erecting some new stalls in time for the '79 meeting.

So far as the dates for the summer meeting are concerned, Edwards noted that Ruidoso-Sunland has submitted to the New Mexico State Racing Commission a request for a 68-day meeting. The proposed dates extend from Friday, May 11, through Sept. 3, August

will be eliminated. Edwards indicated there'll be some significant purse increases in the thoroughbred stakes schedule. The most eye-catching is the \$25,000 added directed into the Ruidoso Mile (last year, the purse was \$17,500 added). This purse boost will make the Ruidoso Mile one of the richest handicaps in this part of the country.

The following thoroughbred stakes have each gotten a \$2,500 boost: Jockey Club Stakes (it now be \$12,500 added), Ruidoso Speed Handicap (\$12,500 added), Ruidoso Sprint Championship (\$15,000 added), The Brigand Handicap at 870 yards will go from \$10,000 added to \$12,500 added. Other new wrinkles for '79, the bottom claiming price on

Recent Floods In Lincoln County Cause Considerable Damage

The recent floods in Lincoln County caused \$472,000 damage to the irrigation structures on the Ruidoso and Bonto rivers according to Richard T. Smith, Area Conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service in Roswell.

Mr. Smith and his staff made a preliminary assessment of the damage last week. The exact extent of damage could not be determined due to high water and a more detailed survey will be made in the near future.

The Lincoln County Disaster committee of the U.S. Department of Agriculture will meet to determine the Emergency Conservation Program Grants. Disaster grants and loans available that will be needed in the area.

The Emergency Conservation program is an 80 percent cost-share level administered by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. The Farmers Home Administration will make a 3 percent loan for the other 20 percent of the repairs.

The U.S. Forest Service is surveying the damage to roads and recreation areas. Jim Abbott, Supervisor of the Lincoln National

Forest, has surveyed over \$600,000 worth of damage to the roads and recreation sites in the area.

Al Lovato, with the New Mexico State Planning Office, is coordinating the over-all damage in the area.

By having all the agencies that are involved in rural areas, it is hoped that the maximum help can be given to the local citizens which suffered damages caused by the flooding.

Thinkin' In Lincoln

If the new year has you thinking about a resolution to lose weight and yet you love French fries, you can save calories by following this simple recipe.

Cut a baking potato into strips, the size of French fries, place on a greased cookie sheet in one layer. Bake for 45 minutes in a 350-degree oven. Each piece will develop a brownish, crunchy crust. Toss with salt, pepper and if desired, a little melted butter. Serve hot.

They taste like French fries, but are lower in calories.

Avoid Expensive Oversights:
Check Before Calling the Repairman: "The woman on the phone is very agitated. She has called for a serviceman to fix her refrigerator and she's getting the third degree from a calltaker. Then the calltaker asks if anyone has recently moved the refrigerator out from the wall or swept behind it. Is there any chance the plug could have been knocked loose?" Hesitantly the woman admits that, yes, just that morning she did sweep behind the refrigerator. After checking she returns to the phone and says yes, the plug had been knocked loose."

To help you avoid the expense of calling a serviceman unnecessarily, check your instruction book for possible reasons an appliance may have stopped operating. If you cannot find your book, here is a quick checklist of common problems worth checking before you call.

- If the appliance runs on electricity, be sure it's plugged in.
- If it's a gas appliance with a pilot light, check to see if the pilot light is lit.
- Check for blown fuses or tripped circuit breakers.

- Are the doors closed securely? Most washers, dryers, dishwashers, trash compactors and all microwave ovens have electrical interlocks on the doors which prevent them from operating if the doors are not securely closed.

- Examine the controls to see if they are set properly. Refrigerator temperature controls are sometimes inadvertently turned to "off" by someone cleaning the inside. Sometimes dishwasher or washing machine buttons are not fully depressed.
- If a dishwasher or automatic

washer will not fill with water, see if the main water supply has been turned off in the home or by the water company for repairs.

If, after all these checks, the ap-

pliance still refuses to operate, then it's time to get professional help. It's a good idea to have the model number and serial number of the appliance when you call.

thoroughbreds will go from \$1,500 to \$2,000, the bottom claiming price on 870-yard races switches from \$1,500 to \$2,000, the minimum claiming price on quarter horses will be upped from \$2,500 to \$3,000.

Also in the works for Ruidoso Downs is the Norgor Thoroughbred Futurity at four-furlongs. A three-year-old counterpart, the Norgor Thoroughbred Derby, will be run at six furlongs in 1980. The estimated purse for the futurity is \$75,000. It'll be an early season event (June 2, 1979), with the main idea being to capitalizing on all the thoroughbred activity whipped up by the \$300,000 or so - Riley Allison Futurity at Sunland on May 6.

The Norgor is also intended as a kind of early-season prelude to the \$125,000 test 1 Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity during Labor Day weekend. It's geared to open competition.

One of the big news items to come out of Ruidoso-Sunland in recent weeks was the announcement of the All-American Gold Cup. While Ruidoso Downs has become the bellwether of the quarter horse industry, regarding two- and three-year-olds, the same pace has't been applied to older horses. The Board of Directors move to correct this situation with the All-American Gold Cup. It'll be a natural evolution of the All-American Futurity and All-American Derby. The initial running, offering a solid \$250,000 test, is planned for 1982. The Gold Cup will be limited to four-year-olds on whose behalf the trial fee was paid in the previous year's All-American Derby.

The Board also announced the installation of another major event for four-year-old quarter horses, the Rainbow Silver Cup. The first running is scheduled for 1981. The purse is estimated at \$100,000. The Silver Cup will be a spinoff of the Rainbow Futurity and Rainbow Derby, and it'll be limited to those who were paid up in the trials for the previous Rainbow Derby.

With the scheduling of the Gold Cup and Silver Cup, Ruidoso Downs will be offering a "Triple Crown" for older horses. The third leg is the well-established \$100,000 World's Championship Classic. The latter is open to three-year-olds and up. The distance of the Gold Cup, Classic and Silver Cup is 440 yards.

The '79 All-American Futurity is generating cash at a record pace, Edwards notes. The fourth payment came due on Oct. 1, and 971 head were kept eligible. That put the cash total up to \$649,650. At that point, the '78 All-American had 866 eligible and \$572,350 on deposit.

Edwards also pointed out that the purse for the '79 All-American Derby is also building fast. The total now on deposit is some \$100,000 over last year's pace. And since last year's Derby reached \$666,330, this means the chances of reaching \$1 million with the '79 Derby are excellent.

There'll be some slight changes in the scheduling of the three consolation heats of the 1979 All-American Futurity.

In previous years, the consolations were run on the three days preceding Labor Day. But the Board felt it would be more appropriate to give the consolations a bigger spotlight. So, starting with the '79 season, the three

consolations (as well as the 550 Championship) will be part of the undercard of the Labor Day program. The Board of Directors, the General Manager Woody Erwin, will be meeting with the heads of the Downs at Santa Fe, La Mesa park and the Albuquerque State Fair meeting. The purpose is to discuss mutual problems affecting racing in New Mexico. The meeting will be held at 9 a.m., Jan. 13, at the Granada Royale in El Paso.

Employers: There's A New Way To Report Wages

Employers should remember that there's a new way to report employees' wages for social security purposes, Don Austin, social security district manager in Roswell, said today. There's also something new to read those reports—a machine called an optical scanner that translates the reports to the magnetic tape language that a computer can understand. Austin said the Social Security Administration is concerned because some early reports are being received in a format the optical scanner can't read—and that means more expensive manual processing.

Beginning with 1978 wages, employers are to use Form W-2 to report their workers' earnings. Form W-2 has been revised for 1978 so it can be read by the scanner. The Form W-2's are printed three to a page, and Copy A of the form is to be submitted to social security in just submitted to social security in just that way—three to a page. Some employers are going to the trouble of cutting the forms apart, which means they cannot be processed by the optical scanner.

Other employers are sending in the Form 941's that were used previously for earnings reports. And some are using older Form W-2's. Those forms

Suit Filed To Block BLM Take Over

Albuquerque, New Mexico -- A law suit was filed today in an effort to stop the take over of private property rights by the Bureau of Land Management (BLM). The suit was filed by the Mountain States Legal Foundation on behalf of its members and landowners, Eduardo Valdez, Melquiades Armigo, Roberto Garcia, and 30 other New Mexico ranchers. The Foundation filed suit against the Secretary of Interior and the BLM in an effort to stop the implementation of range management plans which agricultural experts say will result in the destruction of vegetation and spread of disease of invaluably range lands as well as seriously reduce the cirrome of the residents of the state of New Mexico.

James G. Watt, President and Chief Legal Officer of the Foundation stated, "We are concerned with this case because we feel the federal government cannot be allowed to take over the management of private lands. These ranchers cannot bear the financial cost of defending their individual rights in this case, so the Foundation is going to make sure that this take over of private lands by the federal government does not go unchallenged."

Phil Harvey, President of New Mexico Cattle Growers' Association said, "The new range management plans will affect an 800 square mile area of New Mexico in the Rio Puerco area where the BLM plans to reduce the number of grazing allotments from 96 to 61 (only 57 of which would be allowed for grazing use). Our objections to the

new management plans relate to the fact that some 97,380 acres of state and private land will be included in the federal plan along with the 393,083 acres of federal land."

Area residents contend that the BLM officials used an unusually dry water year to justify their conclusions that the range cannot support current grazing levels. Further, they contend that the Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) prepared by BLM is inadequate.

Bob Jones, President of the New Mexico Public Lands Council said, "The Bureau must have realized the method used for developing the EIS needed changing since they are using a different method other EIS's being developed in the state. The New Mexico Public Lands Council feels it is unfair to use one method on one group of permittees and change the method of study for another group."

Mr. Jones further expressed the ranching industry's opposition to the combining of allotments since most ranchers have their own individual methods of operating breeding and herd management programs, and while these differ, each fits the needs of the permittee. This individuality, which throughout history has been an essential part of the ranching industry, is impossible and creates many problems under a community allotment. In the past, many community allotments in the Rio Puerco area were broken up because of the problems they created.

While the EIS prepared by the BLM contends that only minimal hardships will occur as a result of the new management plans, the parties involved believe that the overall economic impact will be severe. Some small ranchers in the area could be put out of business with many suffering economic hardships.

The Foundation was encouraged to file this case by the New Mexico Cattle Growers' Association, the New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau, the New Mexico Public Lands Council, and the Rio Puerco Grazing and Livestock Association.

The Foundation attempts to bring balance to the courts so that a better perspective can be gained on issues affecting individual liberties, the free enterprise system and the democratic system of government.

Water Project In Alamogordo

WASHINGTON, D.C.—U.S. Senator Pete Domenici announced today that the Department of the Interior has selected Alamogordo, New Mexico as one of two sites for an experimental multi-million dollar water desalination project.
"The potential of this project for the Tularosa basin is tremendous", Domenici said. "Brackish water in the Alamogordo area has always been a problem, and now for the first time we are really going to be able to do something about it", the Senator said.
Domenici was a key mover in passing legislation during the 95th Congress to bring a desalination program. In a statement made on the Senate floor last March, Domenici noted "that water supplies for irrigation, energy development and domestic uses in the inland West are contained in vast, brackish-saline aquifers. In the Tularosa Basin this aquifer contains more than a 150 million acre feet of water—enough to create a river the size of the Rio Grande.
Prior to construction of the actual plant, a research study will be commissioned by the Water Resources Division of the Interior Department. This study will begin in early 1979.
It is "entirely conceivable", Domenici said, "that actual construction of this project could begin in fiscal year 1980 or 1981.
The project, which will cost several million dollars, is expected to provide greater supplies of potable water to thousands in the Tularosa Basin.
The other similar project is in Virginia Beach, Virginia.
The two programs were selected after an evaluation of 37 areas plagued with brackish water problems.

And Away We Go: Capitol Wall-leaners will be watching with interest to see just how quickly the new Bruce King Administration gets off the mark considering the number of experienced hands that will be returning to the Merry Round House.

Ordinarily, a new Administration takes about six months to get oriented. Initially, a new Governor has to spend precious weeks ascertaining whether some of the supporters who worked diligently on his campaign also possess the abilities to handle top-drawer administrative posts. The two abilities do not necessarily go hand-in-hand.

But, even before the new Chief Executive gets settled, he is faced with preparing a Legislative program that will have to last for almost a two-year period — and for a newcomer that's a job in itself.

Then, loss in a two-month Legislative Session that sometimes stretches out to three months and it's June before a brand new Administration knows for certain what they have to work with.

It should be a different story with the King Administration. Big Bruce has been Governor before and he knows what actions have to be made im-

mediately and which ones can be put off to a later date.

The new Governor has served long in the Legislature and was speaker of the House so he is familiar as any Governor in the past with the Legislative process.

And like former Gov. Jerry Apodaca, Gov. King recognizes those prerogatives that are the Legislature's and he is wise enough not to intrude on those prerogatives.

Hopefully, in the next ten days, the new Governor will reveal those priorities and imaginative programs he will present to the Legislature that

will help New Mexico cope with the exciting years ahead.

Indian Input: Governor Bruce King says he plans to keep an Indian Liaison position within his administration.

Jerry Apodaca created the post, as part of his office, during a time when both Indian leaders and the U.S. Civil Rights Commission were expressing concern about the relatively small number of Native-Americans in the state government.

State Finance secretary David King says the exact location of the Indian Liaison within the King ad-

ministration is unknown. He recalls that such a post was located in the State Planning Office structure when he headed it up in the early and mid-1970's.

And on the topic of Indian input, young King promises to place a Native American in one of the critical budget analysis positions within the Department of Finance and Administration.

More In-state: State Finance Secretary David King says he and incoming State Investment Officer Sam Garcia plan to expand the in-state horizons of the large New Mexico permanent fund investments.

Young King wants more in-state advice and investments where possible. There are some constitutional barriers regarding the permanent fund money and its investment activities. But David wants to give some new thoughts a whirl.

More to Come: Those of you who figured the state purchase of the vacant St. Vincent Hospital in downtown Santa Fe will hear no more about that issue — forget it.

Just as it took months to complete the state buy, look for another lengthy period to determine how to best use the old complex.

Governor Bruce King has plenty of ideas on paper how to utilize the giant building — including an Indian Arts Museum, state office space, storage space, nursing home, etc.

We look for the use question to be a real headline maker for some time to come. Don't say we didn't tell you.

In Case You Missed It: The New Mexico Commission on the Status of Women has issued a newsletter about Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault matters.

In its "editorial policy statement" the newsletter announces publication five times a year on sexual crimes and domestic violence matters.

The newsletter was made possible by a grant from Levi Strauss Foundation. Now that's an unusual, but welcome, cooperation between the private sector and government!

Heap of Junk? The Santa Fe City Council has passed a resolution asking the state to find some way for private industry to use stored "surplus" property of the government.

The state's surplus property division is located on Santa Fe's Siringo Road and is fronted by thousands of dollars worth of materials (some would call it junk) ranging from desks to motorized equipment.

The Santa Fe council people gripe that some of the "surplus" property is being allowed to rust and rot because no other government entity wants it.

Here's the background: A private firm approached the city of Santa Fe asking the City Council to buy a specific item from the surplus yard: The private firm would then reimburse the city what it had paid. The firm would be allowed to lease the equipment at a low cost for five years. At the end of that time the firm would have an option to renew, or the city would receive the material back to use itself or sell.

Proponents of the idea theorized that even if the equipment was worthless at that time, the city could sell it as scrap iron and still turn a profit.

In case you missed it, this reporter, along with one of our favorite colleagues, interviewed incumbent Governor Jerry Apodaca at what we still call "mansion" and which he corrected us again to refer to as the "residence."

In a very relaxed manner, the Governor fielded our queries in a straight-forward manner, indicating he would move the family this week to a temporary home not far from the rather ostentatious house he is building in the Northern part of the Capital City.

It's obvious, Apodaca is going to assess his business priorities, and determine which gets first call on his time — and that includes service on the President's Physical Fitness Council, the raquet court investment and probably several other speculative ventures.

We asked the Chief Executive whether he would accept a Cabinet appointment at this late date from President Jimmy Carter if the President were able to break away Education from the huge Health, Education and Welfare Department.

Apodaca said it would be almost impossible to turn down, although he hoped the President would never offer it to him.

Then...very simply...Gov. Apodaca said some day he would like to run for President. He said that it was not very likely anyone could get the kind of exposure necessary to become a presidential candidate by running for office in New Mexico unless it were for a U.S. Senate seat.

So, you can almost make bet that if and when Jerry Apodaca decides to enter the political arena again, it will be for U.S. Senate. And he'll give the prospects plenty of thought before he takes hasty action.

But...don't forget our items in this column weeks and weeks ago about the size of the Spanish-American minority growing in this country. And...if Apodaca does get elected to the U.S. Senate, you can make bet he'll be looking for all the national exposure he can get.

A neat interview to wrap up a four-year administration and a very candid one from the outgoing Chief Executive.

Toxic Tractor Incident Postscript: State Health and Environment Department personnel worked well during the recent incident near Clines Corners involving a toxic chemical fire on a hauling truck.

Insiders were pleased with the way the situation was handled, but commented that the state really got off easy on that potentially dangerous chemical problem and warned that the government should get a clear plan ready to attack any such incident (or worse one) in the future.

Birdies said the State Health and Environment Department needs trained personnel and adequate equipment to properly tackle such matters. And that, of course, takes money. Reportedly, the Environmental Improvement Division's expansion budget contains monies to fulfill the training and equipment needs.

Tool-free Telephone Established to BLM

A toll-free telephone directly to the public information office of the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) in Santa Fe, New Mexico went into operation earlier this month to provide better service to the public.

The number 1-800-545-8943 can be called by the public from all of the following states: Arizona, Utah, Colorado, Oklahoma, Texas, Arkansas, Louisiana, Missouri, Iowa, South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, Wyoming, Idaho, Nevada and California. Arrangements are presently underway to initiate the same service for residents of New Mexico.

The toll-free number will reach the BLM's public information specialist, who can answer most questions about the agency. The BLM manages about 13 million surface acres and 25 million subsurface acres of public land and minerals in New Mexico. BLM also handles federal mineral leasing and wild horse management in Texas and Oklahoma. After office hours (7:45 AM to 4:30 pm, Monday thru Friday), the telephone will record incoming messages and questions will be answered the next working day, either by return call or by letter.

According to Arthur W. Zimmerman, BLM state director, his information office receives more than 50 long distance calls each day from persons wanting to know about such things as wild horses, oil and gas leasing, recreation opportunities and other programs of the BLM. "We will now be able to offer the public a free telephone service that will operate 24 hours a day," Zimmerman said.

Another feature of the toll-free number is that persons who wish to talk to a specific person at the BLM office but don't know the proper telephone

number, can call toll-free and get the correct number and in most cases determine of the individual is in the office at that particular time. "Since we do not have a central switchboard in Santa Fe to transfer incoming telephone calls, persons can call the new number without cost and get the correct extension for an individual and then re-dial with the assurance that their call will get to the right office," says Zimmerman.

County Mental Health Offices Open Feb. 1




Ironic, isn't it? Probably no one really believed that Bruce King, whose election has just been formally certified, was a fearless partisan of labor unions, though the AFL-CIO did back him and may be in part responsible for his victory. He could not have accepted union support and then come out in favor of Right to Work, which is a provision that says no one may be required to belong to a union as a requirement toward holding his or her job.
About all that Mr. King could do was what he did: Make it clear that he would prefer to let all the voters of the state have their way in deciding the issue.
Most people who think they understand the Legislature predict that he will get his wish.
The likeliest way is through making the Right to Work provision an amendment to state's constitution. Such a proposed amendment must be passed by both houses of the Legislature by a two-thirds majority. It then goes to the voters for their approval, with no action required on the part of the governor.
If that script works as planned, we can expect another intensive political campaign on the issue. This time it won't be two men pitted against one another; it will be two ideas: Right to Work is a good thing for New Mexico, and Right to Work is a bad thing for New Mexico.
There are national groups which support anti-Right to Work activities wherever they occur, and they will undoubtedly pour money into the state for purposes of convincing us to vote the way they want us to, just as the AFL-CIO and the Teamsters will do, for the same purpose. Between them they will make us feel very important for a little while, and the likelihood appears to be that a majority of New Mexicans will support the so-called Right to Work issue.
But the Legislature comes first. Both houses must act affirmatively on such a proposal before it can go to the people for decision. Last time it surfaced, it died in the Senate, by a single vote, cast by John Pinto of McKinley and San Juan counties, a Navajo who said he just got tired of the pressure put on him by both sides.
Those of us who were there that day could see that pressure. The galleries were packed with people and the halls were awash with informal lobbyists buttonholing every Senator who stepped off the floor for even a minute.
Such days are colorful and dramatic. Whether or not they lead to the best of decisions by legislators may be open to question. But we are about to see such days again; on that almost everyone in Santa Fe agrees.
New Mexicans might do well to prepare their souls for a carnival of pro and con arguments such as we have seldom seen.
This may not be the best way to go about making what should be logical and intellectual decisions, but it is what makes politics so colorful.

Army's 2-year Enlistment Offered

The Army's test two-year enlistment with a \$7,400 education program is now being offered for the first time here to selected high school graduates.
"All openings are for certain skill positions in Europe and the Continental United States," the Colonel said. Qualified two-year volunteers may enroll in what he termed a "more liberal" Veterans Education Assistance Program (VEAP) option.
The VEAP, commonly called the Peacetime GI Bill, matches a soldier's educational savings two-for-one up to a certain amount. The two-year VEAP "kicker" during this test, adds an extra \$2,000 to the fund.
Colonel Vay pointed out that this special offering appears simple on the surface, "but," he added, "some rather complex requirements exist for the limited openings." Further information and application assistance, he said, can be obtained at the nearest Army Recruiting Station.
