Dental Service For Corona

The Dental Clinic will hold an all day dental prevention program in Corona Tuesday, March 6. Dr. & Mrs. Dale Goad will be at the Corona school speaking to the children in grades 1-6 from 10:00 - 12:00. The afternoon will be spent at the health center with Ursula Hanstien. Dr. Goad will be there to screen patients and answer questions.

Capitan Board OK's Elementary Building

The Capitan School Board, following recommendations from faculty and the superintendent, agreed to plan construction of a new elementary building.

The building was based upon the amount of money for the project. The \$870,000 Bond addition to 2 mil. Levy money will be sufficient to cover the

cost of an elementary building but will not be enough to cover the cost of a high school complex. The high school would include grades 7-12, the elementary Kindergarten through 6.

No word on Capital Outlay had been received, so the board proceeded with the scheduling of the bond money. Superintendent Clifton told the board

that Quinn and Co. has published the sale of the bonds and the actual sale would begin soon.

Clifton also reported he has contacted Senators Bigbee and Conway about the Capitol Outlay as well as the Capitol Outlay Committee. He was told by the committee, Capitan School was still "in the pot."

Architect Jerry Lake told Clifton the quicker the school gets the bid out, the better the school will be. He cited the rising costs of building.

A discussion on the present high school expressed the concern about the condition of the building. Board member Richard Phillips asked what will happen if the school does not

receive Capitol Outlay. "Do we leave the high school the way it is?" he asked. Clifton replied with a report concerning the insurance claim on the burned gymnasium. The latest figure to remodel the gym is about \$104,000. This included architect fees.

Discussion about the possible land swap with the Forest Service was renewed. The lack of space to build would be alleviated if the swap occurred, but the board was reminded of the building of the high school was subject to the Capitol Outlay money.

Newly elected board member Ralph Barber suggested the Board tour recently built elementary schools to get an idea of what other schools have constructed. The idea was considered reasonable and Clifton also stated he could have the architect bring plans

from schools throughout the state.

Two rough plans presented by the teachers, showed some simple designs, each with certain priority items. Certain federal requirements must be met as well as space per student requirements. A bill in the legislature, if passed, will require a maximum of 15 students per room for grades K-3. With present elementary enrollment at 180 students the board is figuring for 350 students, two classrooms per grade with a library and teacher's workroom lounge.

The elementary teachers agreed that some type of solar application would be desirable. The board agreed to investigate and also to alert the architect to this.

A meeting with architect was to be planned.

Small Town Development Workshop To Be Held In Carrizozo March 6

Carrizozo will be playing host to an interesting group of people on March 5, 6, & 7. The people making up the group are all interested in formulating a

strategy on Small Town Development. The Workshop will include specialists from several Western States. They are all a part of the Western Rural

Development Center.

The Chamber of Commerce is asking the Community to help this workshop by visiting with the people attending. They will be meeting in the Ruidoso State Bank, Carrizozo Branch, Conference Room.

The workshop will officially begin on Tuesday at 7:00 a.m. with a Chamber of Commerce breakfast meeting. The first session will begin at 8:30 at the Bank. Visitors from the town are welcome at any time, including lunch at the 4-Winds.

The Western Rural Development Center is one of four centers nationwide established through the Rural Development Act of 1972. The Western Rural Development Center covers 13 Western States, including New Mexico. The broad charge of the Center is to encourage application of research results to rural communities throughout the west. To accomplish this objective, the Western Rural Development Center funds several projects each year which address problems of small communities. Recent projects have included health care, tax problems, community water and sewer

services and economic development.

The model used by the Center is that requires multi-state cooperation in the project. Thus, a project must directly benefit small communities and have more than one state involved in implementation of the project.

The project scheduled to have its first meeting in Carrizozo on March 5-7 will involve research and extension personnel from several states, including economists, sociologists, and other disciplines with expertise to offer small towns. Research and extension specialists from Colorado and Montana have accepted the invitation to be in Carrizozo, California, Arizona, Washington, and Oregon may send representatives as well.

The purpose of the Carrizozo meeting will be to investigate the possibilities of development in small communities. Current efforts are to focus on improving the economic development potential of small towns.

Mary Ellen Payne, Chamber of Commerce President is asking all citizens to take part in this workshop. "It could mean a lot to Carrizozo and its future," she said.

Community Ed Center Sets Stage For Classes

A Pot Luck dinner and a film will set the Lincoln County Community Education Center moving toward the first series of classes. The dinner will be held March 7, 6:30 p.m. at the Capitan School Cafeteria.

The film "A Sense of Community," describes community education programs and processes, and is intended to give a clearer view of what community education can do.

Anyone interested in the dinner should call Marlene Lobbs at 354-2264. Classes scheduled for March will be first Aid, Lincoln County Historical Roundtable and Income Tax Preparation.

First Aid will be held March 27, April 3 and April 17, 7 - 10 p.m. The class is open to all ages and the instructor requests students either wear jeans or bring a blanket. Co-ordinator Mary Allred can be contacted at 354-2274.

March 11 will be the first meeting of the Lincoln County Historical Roundtable. At 2 p.m. the Roundtable will serve as a voice for older citizens of the area.

Income Tax Preparation will be March 13 and 20, 7 - 9 p.m. at Capitan School. This will be a class on basic tax preparation.

All classes are free. A \$50 donation from Joseph Donahoe of Capitan was received to help defray the cost of mailing and publicity. The organizational group plans to publish a newsletter. Organizational meetings are open to all persons in the area.

Aluminum can collection was agreed for a money project at a recent meeting. The Community Education Center has been in the planning for three months and now has expanded to a sizeable group with three classes scheduled. Lorraine Sanchez, who was instrumental in the formation of the Center will be attending an all-day workshop in Albuquerque. She has been nominated secretary to the New Mexico Association for Community Education. The workshop will be in conjunction with the election of officers for the association.

Workshops presented by the Community Education Mobile Training Institute have attracted four persons. A March workshop in Fort Worth will train Community Education Co-ordinators and personnel. Grant money from the C. S. Mott Foundation available through the Center for Community Education at NMSU has

been applied for. The grant will go to cover costs of the participants of the workshops. Application for "seed" money to cover the cost of newsletter and education of community education personnel has also been made.

Betty Martin, Ann Buffington, Gwen Jones and Lorraine Sanchez have expressed their interest in the workshops.

The ultimate program of the Community Education Center depends on the needs and wishes of the community. The idea is a sharing and exchange of knowledge and skills within Lincoln County.



Shop Rite Foods, Inc. Moves To Duke City

Shop Rite Foods, Inc., which owns and operates 42 Piggly Wiggly supermarkets in New Mexico and West Texas including Lincoln County's Capitan Store is moving its corporate headquarters to Albuquerque from Grand Prairie, Texas, next month.

Announcement of the move was made by Wallace Williams, president of Shop Rite Foods, who pointed out that the move is actually a return to the city where the company was founded. Shop Rite began in Albuquerque in October 1953 with four Riggly Wiggly stores, and the company's headquarters were located in the Duke City until 1971.

"We feel as if we're coming home again, and it's really a good feeling," Williams said. "Although our main offices have been just outside Fort Worth for the past eight years, we've always been a New Mexico Corporation, and our original four stores in Albuquerque have now grown to 11." Shop Rite is even moving back into the building at 617 Truman N.E. that served as corporate headquarters

before the 1971 move to Grand Prairie. The building is now being remodeled and is expected to be ready for occupancy in early March.

The number of people to be employed in the main office is estimated at 45 by Aubrey Jones, executive vice president of Shop Rite Foods. Altogether, some 1,324 people are employed by Shop Rite throughout the two-state area.

of the 50 Piggly Wiggly stores in the Shop Rite network, 29 are located in New Mexico, and the New Mexico payroll now averages \$173,288 a week.

With its purchase of Boston Stores in the Amarillo area in 1958, Shop Rite acquired Piggly Wiggly stores in Clovis and Roswell, and the company's merger with Food Mart of El Paso in 1965 brought stores in Silver City, Carrizozo, Alamogordo, and Truth or Consequences under the Shop Rite-Piggly Wiggly banner.

Completes MEDEX Training —

Nancy Guck

Joins Dr. Nelson

The newest addition to the local health care team has just arrived in Carrizozo.

Dr. Craig Nelson announced today that Nancy Guck will join his practice as a Medex. Medex Guck has just completed the first phase of Medex (physician's assistant) training with the Utah MEDEX Project at the University of Utah Medical Center in Salt Lake City. She is one of 17 members of the ninth class the project has trained to assist overworked physicians in the intermountain area.

Dr. Nelson, who is a member of the Clinical Faculty of the College of Medicine's Department of Family and Community Medicine, will serve as Medex Guck's "preceptor" or teacher for the second phase of the program. During the next 7-9 months, Medex Guck will work under Dr. Nelson's direct supervision, performing part of physical examinations, taking patient histories, suturing minor lacerations, performing laboratory tests, assisting at surgery, and completing numerous other medical tasks for which she has been trained.

All Medex must have had extensive previous medical training and experience, in military or civilian settings, before they can be considered for the program.

Prior to her selection, from more than 500 applicants for MEDEX training, Nancy spent six years in the medical field as a practical nurse. In addition to her nursing training, she has completed an Emergency medical technician course and has received training in laboratory procedures. For the three years immediately prior to her selection, Nancy worked for the Carrizozo Health Center. She will reside with her husband Tom and their two children in Noga.

At the conclusion of preceptorship, Medex Guck will likely join Dr. Nelson's practice on a permanent basis,

thereby extending his capacity to provide high quality health care to increased numbers of patients.

The Utah MEDEX Program, sponsored by the Department of Family and Community Medicine and the Utah State Medical Association, was established at the University of Utah Medical Center in June 1971. The program is fully accredited by the American Medical Association as a program to train primary care physician's assistants. To date, over 135 Medex have been trained by the program and over 75 percent are located in intermountain region communities of less than 25,000 population.

Lincoln Logs

As lambing season is upon us again, we need to watch out for those profit getters. This is the most important time of the year when ewes and lambs are more susceptible to disease and infection. In this article, will be a few things to watch for during lambing season.

VIBRIOSIS in sheep is similar to Brucellosis in cattle in that it causes abortion of the lamb. The disease is not a great threat to the large sheep man, but tends to bother the smaller farm flocks.

The raiser will not usually know when it is coming. The ewe will not show any symptoms. She will abort the fetus around 4-8 weeks prior to lambing. Some lambs will be born but they will be weak and probably die.

Control of vibriosis can be very economical and practical for the small producer. Sanitation in and around lambing facilities is recommended for control.

KETOSIS or pregnancy disease is another profit getter. This disease usually gets the ewe and the lamb. It is caused by poor management and a few cases are caused by sudden storms during pregnancy.

Pregnancy disease is caused by a sudden change or lack of feed. The last six weeks of pregnancy is the most critical time. Usually ewes carrying twins or triplets are affected. The reason for this is because the last six weeks of gestation the lamb requires more nutrients and sugar in the blood. When the ewe's intake of feed is decreased her blood sugar goes down therefore causing a deficiency for both the ewe and the lamb. This causes a weak staggering sheep.

The ewe will stay away from the other sheep. She will be very weak and have the staggers. The ewe will usually die before lambing. Avoid reducing the feed to ewes to help prevent this problem.

NAVEL INFECTION in lambs is another problem for the producer.

Lambing in a corral can cause many complications. Corrals are usually full of infections and parasites which can cause diseases in lambs and ewes. Keep lambing pens as clean as possible. Be sure to apply iodine to the lambs navels when they are born.

These diseases and problems are some things that can happen during and before lambing. If you have any questions, please contact the Lincoln County Extension Office - 648-2471.

Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — Here's how things have been in your Capital City this week, for those who care to know.
MUSCLE: Legislators, acting tougher than they have in many seasons, have voted to restore death penalty and stiffen punishment for juvenile offenders. (Both bills have passed House and are now moving through Senate.) Juvenile code has been softened somewhat, due to Governor's wife, who has a formal office on the fourth floor of the Roundhouse... Mrs. King, state chairperson

for the International Year of the Child, met with backers of the new Juvenile Code there and won some concessions from them... Bill is still tough, in line with attitude of Senator C.B. Trujillo of Taos, who says, "The public is demanding a little more sternness."
BIG-TOWNED: Village of Jemez Springs, sitting on top of running hot water (like Ojo Caliente, T of C and other state communities), decided to try a unique experiment — developing hydrothermal energy, first to heat Village Hall complex, then for other uses... Experimental well they sunk

brought up hot water from a mere 9 feet, but water flowed up outside piping. Upon which, state agencies descended... Oil Conservation Division complained well was to be experimental, not producing; State Engineer bolstered that they were using water without his permission; Energy and Minerals Department said, "This is our money"... Tough mayor, ex-cop Eddie Armada, is reportedly sorry he ever heard of all this in the first place.
HOMEWORK: New state agency heads are learning they'd better be prepared before they show up to explain

their budgets to legislative committees. Most dramatic example was John Salvo, named by King to head Department of Commerce and Industry. He got thrown out of John Merston's House Appropriations and Finance Committee even before testifying, because the chairman thought he was trying to con the committee about number of his employees and their pay scales... Merston, highly respectful of the value of a dollar, considers such "inaccuracies" a mortal sin.
TODD SE PASA: Tom Watson, certified egghead and "observer" for the Governor at legislative committee hearings, is doing a penetrating, step-by-step analysis of how voting patterns in New Mexico are changing.

his first compilation, a study of Santa Fe county, led to some startling conclusions: gringos have out-voted Hispanics there in some recent elections... If pattern holds for other northern counties, politicians will have to sit up and take notice.
GASSING UP: The noise made by the little wheels in the gasoline pump as your car drinks up that fuel may sound even less pleasant in the future. Some expect gasoline to reach a dollar a gallon in the foreseeable future... Add to that the increased tax Highway Department is asking for, which could add 4 cents a gallon to price at the pump in the up-coming years and eventually go to an additional 10 cents per gallon, and figure where that leaves your pocketbook.

RIGHT NUMBER: Navajo Tribal Chairman Peter McDonald capitulated totally on tribe's request for higher minimum wage than the rest of us get. That allows for quick progress on road-building projects in western New Mexico, on moratorium bill issue could be settled.



WASHINGTON, D.C. — China and Vietnam, Iran, Cambodia, Afghanistan, Latin America, Africa — the seeds of dissension and turmoil continue to be sewn throughout the world.

And the Soviet Union is playing the role of grim reaper.

To restate a fact increasingly evident these days: America is in grave danger of becoming strategically and militarily inferior to the Soviet Union.

Few seriously dispute that, because for 15 years we have let our defenses slide.

For example, measured in constant

dollars, we spend about 1.1 percent less on our nation's defense than we did in 1964.

And since 1964, our nation's military manpower has been reduced 24 percent, our total active navy ships down by 43 percent, our active military aircraft slashed by 40 percent, and funds for strategic forces for America's fundamental defense have shrunk 53 percent.

Secretary of Defense Harold Brown, in hearings before the Senate Budget Committee last week, testified, "For its security today, the U.S.

depends on fewer forces, fewer men, and fewer real resources than perhaps it has at any time since the beginning of World War II."

That's a precarious tightrope to walk.

But it doesn't appear to bother everyone. For instance, Victor Utgoff, a National Security Council member who deals with strategic arms limitation matters.

Utgoff said recently, "Even if the United States could attain strategic superiority it would not be desirable because I suspect we would oc-

asionally use it as a way of throwing our weight around in some very risky ways. . . . It is in the U.S. interest to allow the few remaining areas of strategic advantage to fade away."

That thinking completely ignores the realities of today's world, and the philosophies of communist countries.

The bottom line is that we MUST keep our defenses stronger than any adversary.

We cannot be the world's policeman, but neither can we nor should we be the world's whipping boy.

The 1980 budget is the place to begin to get our defense posture back on the proper track again.

As a member of the Senate Budget Committee, I intend to battle for proper funding of that defense posture.
