Capitan Council Approves TV Increase; Two Channels, HBO

After considerable discussion, the Capitan Village Council approved a \$1 increase in cable television fees. This additional dollar will allow the company to construct an earth satellite station in Capitan.

Ronnie Battles, manager of Cablevision of Lincoln Co., explained the problem now experienced will be eliminated, as well as the addition of two more channels and the option of Home Box Office. HBO will be an option available for \$10 installation and an additional \$10 per month. HBO offers first-run movies, Las Vegas type shows and no commercials. Some objections to HBO have been made in Ruidoso, where the option is available. "I don't know how they know these movies are so bad unless they see them," Battles stated.

The Council approved of taking the \$1 package, two new stations with the HBO option, and okayed the publishing of the franchise change. The new franchise will be approved next meeting, at which time the Council hopes to have community response on the proposal. Any persons having comments on the choice of channels are urged to attend the April 9 meeting.

Betty Martin, president of the Lincoln County Community Education Center told the council about the center and asked if any permit was required for a garage sale. The council told her no permit was needed and gave the center good wishes.

John West, also of the Center, told the Council of a possible class in building skills being interested in a community project. A playground at Smokey Bear Park was suggested as a possibility.

Ed Raventon, Assistant Park Superintendent, Smokey Bear Park, reported on the progress there.

"I've been asked why so much money is being spent in this little town to build this center," he said. "It's to honor an international symbol." He cited statistics of Smokey's popularity.

Raventon explained the use of passive solar heating for the visitor center. Stone pillars, floors and

fireplace is used as heat storage. Aspen trees will be planted in front of the glass front and will shade in the summer. A curtain will be installed until the trees are mature.

The target opening for the Visitor Center is Memorial Day, he told the council. He also showed the plans for the interior interpretive effort. "It's one of the best I've ever seen," Raventon added. "The Center is the biggest interpretive and the first major solar system in the State."

The additional \$200,000 needed to complete the landscaping was scratched this year, Raventon concluded.

Fred Asbury, engineer for the village, reported on the plans for replacement of village water pipes and the feasibility of a water storage pond. Asbury was directed to draw the plans after the village received the \$20,000 loan from Farm Home to replace the pipes. The plans will be subject to EIAD approval before the actual work can begin. The engineer will have no oversight on the project which will replace present outdated lines with 2" PVC.

The proposed dam for raw water storage was discouraged by Asbury. He cited the ambiguity of the village water rights and the high evaporation rate on a 7-acre lake.

"Do you have legal and perinial water rights to the water supply in order to fill and use this dam?" he asked the board.

"Who owns it (the water) is a problem," Walton Hall stated.

Asbury then told the Council that a 7 acre lake would lose 10 million gallons a year in evaporation. "I don't think you can spare that."

He suggested construction of a 3-5 million gallon storage tank to fulfill the need. The tank would eliminate the evaporation.

The Council was told any storage project was dependent on water rights being legally established; then figures on water consumption, monthly sales and monthly use, must be tabulated.

The present 4" lines junction the

18" main from Bonita Lake near Ft. Stanton. The lines ideally carry 190 gal-min. but are presently running 160 gal-min. or 230,000 gallons/day.

"You are just about as far as you can go with a 4" line," Asbury said.

Capitan population has doubled since 1974 when the present water tank and system was constructed. Asbury suggest the village go to ground water as an alternative. He said certain geologic formations showed possible good water east of the village. "You're running out of water," he said.

Jack Johnson resigned from the cemetery board and Mayor Stark suggested Greg Housler to replace him. The board agreed if Housler was willing.

The Council also approved spending \$2,000 for Emergency Medical Technician equipment.

Permission to send Randy Spears to a \$375 5-week training at the Police Academy was approved.

The hiring of employees, two positions published recently, was postponed until the water improvement money is available. A position to be vacated by Bill Keating March 26 was filled with Ernest Caywood.

Village Maintenance Supervisor Larry Caywood also cited problems with village water meters.

Purchase orders for anything over \$25 was approved and the subject of what to do with dogs closed the meeting.

Capitan School Board Discuss Major Topics

Two resignations, a swearing-in and an insurance settlement of \$11,335.22 were the major topics of discussion at the March meeting of the Capitan School Board.

Kathy Weaver, a first year English and Spanish teacher turned in a letter of resignation to be effective at the school end. Also Mrs. Maurilda Perry sent a letter of her intention to retire at the end of the year. Mrs. Perry stated in her letter that it "has been a great 23 years." Her retirement was absed on advice from her doctor.

Ralph Barber, newly elected member was sworn-in to his position.

A settlement on the fire-damaged gym was approved for \$11,335.22 from General Adjustment Insurance. Discussion of the payment of the architect's fee was clarified with a call from Dr. Richards. He told Superintendent Clifton the school owes the fee only if the money is used to remodel the old gym. The fee was for the plans that were drawn in order to increase the original insurance settlement.

A special meeting March 19 with Quinn and Co. to sign the resolution for Sale of Bonds was announced. Clifton reported the sell should begin by April. \$710,000 will be sold now.

The Board discussed the possibility of putting the insurance settlement with the bond money for the new building, as opposed to the remodeling of the gym. Doing this would eliminate the additional architect fees for the gym plans, and the need for a special budget hearing.

"If we can get by without a special budget hearing, we're better off," said Boardmember R. Phillips.

Clifton told the Board there was a need for a special meeting to work on the budget before the April 17 hearing. He said the budget must be typed and delivered to Santa Fe by April 10. Some budget items were subject to State

legislative vote and could not be acutally computed until the session was over. The budget hearing will be at 9 a.m.

Hiring Lynda Sanchez as social studies teacher to fill the position vacated by Johnson, was approved and the only bid for the station wagon for \$551.10 from LaMoynne Carpenter was accepted.

The next meeting was changed to April 19, at 7p.m. because of Easter holidays.

The board also approved the switching of the Bonita bus back to Encinosa. This was warranted to overcrowding. "Bus overloads are going to be a problem, we're pretty well loaded," Clifton said. He also said a new bus takes a year to get. A bus may be purchased without approval, but the state will not reimburse the payment without the one year prior approval.

"We should start planning for this now," R. Phillips stated.

The board also approved a change in the rules for Cheerleaders. Beginning next year, cheerleaders will not be allowed to also participate in sports. The decision was made after discussion of the problems created when cheerleaders participated in both activities. The proposal was drawn by the cheerleader sponsors.

Orsak Is New Town Trustee

Joe Orsak was sworn in as Trustee at last Monday's regular meeting of the Town of Carrizozo Board. Orsak began his duty that evening with a full agenda, so lengthy it was, that many items required to be tabled for a special 7 p.m. meeting on March 19 to settle the unfinished business and other items that required research.

Orsak, an elementary resource room teacher at Carrizozo Public School, is also the school's ski trip advisor, and has been with the school for eight years.

The backhoe bid opening took most of the Board's time. Seven companies turned in bids. Many of the companies representatives were present. It was recommended that Emilio Beltran, Town Foreman travel to Albuquerque and El Paso to check out new and used equipment on bid. He will report of his findings at the March 19 special meeting.

Five bids were opened on the police car did not meet specifications. Chief of Police Morales was advised to get data on smaller vehicles before the special meeting on March 19 when new bids would be advertised.

Henry Vega, Golf Course Superintendent was present for the fertilizer bid opening. Roswell Mitchell Seed and Grain bid offer accepted.

In conjunction with the Chamber of Commerce in helping promote town beautification, the board agreed to donate towards seed purchase. The Board also donated paint to be used on the Zia Senior Citizen building front.

The garbage system was discussed by Mayor English, he noted that Carrizozo is one of the few municipalities still using alley pickup. He suggested the town clean alleys and then turn them over to the resident and that it be his responsibility there after. He recommended that plastic-bagged front yard pickup be taken into consideration and discussed at the special meeting on March 19.

Bill Gomez, Extension Service, NMSU, was present to comment on the swimming pool business. The solar system method was questioned and an alternative, a solar blanket, was to be investigated by Town Foreman Beltran. Bidding for a chlorinator will start as well as a quest for a pool manager. Mary Ellen Payne, President of Chamber Commerce, volunteered to obtain a crew of pool clean-up volunteers.

Mary Ellen recommended the need of the present Recreation Committee and for replacements to be filled for

persons who have resigned, preferably by individuals with children participating in local activities.

LINCOLN COUNTY POLICE REPORT

Early Saturday morning, Sheriff deputy Charlie Engelking was called to the Ft. Stanton Hospital to investigate an incident where a female employee was assaulted and raped. Stanton Hospital for treatment, was arrested and booked into the Lincoln County Jail. Charges of aggravated Battery, Rape and residential burglary were filed on Harris by the Sheriff's Department.

On 3-9-79 the Sheriff Dept. transported three prisoners to the State Penitentiary. Transported were: Douglas M. Burgess of Ruidoso Downs, who was sentenced from one to five years in the N.M. State Penitentiary on the charge of criminal sexual contact. Elias Medina of Roswell was sentenced on one count of kidnapping 10 to 50 years in the State Penitentiary, one count of criminal sexual penetration 10 to 50 years to run concurrently.


I was happy to see John Lucero and his sister Bobbie last weekend while they were at home. Bobbie is still in Albuquerque, still working as a nurse.

Ralph Dunlap Writes

Dear Friends,
I know many of you already know about my two year assignment as Sheep Production Specialist in Tunis, Tunisia. Plans are now to return to Lincoln County after two years.

When I received the job offer last July, I had to locate Tunisia. It is on the North Coast of Africa just south of Italy and between Algeria and Libya. Tunisia is about the size of the state of Georgia or 100 miles wide and 250 miles long.

There are over five million sheep in Tunisia, with over 45,000 owners. They have many small flocks; 57 percent of the sheep are in flocks of 20 head or less. These people never sell their grease wool, but make it into finished articles. Many of these are nomadic and move wherever there is feed for their sheep. This contributes to the spread of diseases such as sheep scabies and sheep pox.

I will be the first one over there to work with them in improving their sheep especially meat production, as they import about 30 percent of mutton consumed. The major type of sheep in Tunisia is a Barbarian which is a fat tailed sheep. The tail can weigh up to 8 kilograms (18 pounds). This is a food reserve for the hot dry summer. All the rain occurs in the winter time and varies from 2 to 40 inches per year. The most rain is in the northern part of Tunisia. The central part looks a great deal like the Carrizozo area.

Feel that this job has a tremendous challenge to it and would provide me with an excellent experience. Tunisia is a stable country and has had the same government since its independence from France in 1957.

I would like to thank all of you for the help you have given me during my 26 years in Lincoln County. It has been

very rewarding for me. Without help from many people in beef, sheep, apples, 4-H and Community Development, I would not have been able to qualify for this job. I hope you will help the County Agent that comes in as much as you help me.

I will be in Washington, D.C. starting March 5th. I will spend a month there taking an orientation program. Rosalie, my wife will join me in the later part of March. We will be learning French either there or in Tunisia.

Thanks again, I hope to see you in two years.





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Inside the Capitol . . . by Fred McCaffrey

SANTA FE—There was a sudden jump in the quotient of energy given to discussing liquor bills in the closing days of the present legislative session. In fact, the rise of vehemence on the subject left many Santa Fe observers just a little breathless.

There's nothing new about having a Legislature touch on the topic of our peculiar liquor laws; they have been cussed and discussed almost every session since the first of them passed in 1939.

But suddenly we were hearing something very close to accusations

that the wholesale liquor distributors of New Mexico are some sort of "family," in the sense in which Godfathers I and II taught us to understand that word, and that "contracts" would be let if the Senate Finance Committee dared to do anything about that fact.

That's pretty stiff talk, coming from the chairman of the Finance Committee.

But the redoubtable Aubrey Dunn came right out and said it. It's all there on the tapes, so no one can deny it, though when he was asked if he meant what those of us who heard him thought

he meant, he got a little evasive. "There are all sorts of families and all sorts of contracts" was all he would say.

He also had some words about his committee. "There are a lot of Senators," he said, "who frankly don't want to be on this committee—and I suspect there are some right now who are thinking of getting off."

Why was he so vehement? Because he thinks wholesale houses have what he calls a "guaranteed-add-on-plus deal." He goes on to say, "It's definitely a monopoly. It's absolute

control. They don't fix prices as much as they used to—not since the Supreme Court stopped them—but it's very possible they coordinate prices. If you can only buy from a certain 10, naturally they are going to keep the prices higher."

So what he proposed was a radical change: let retail liquor sellers, whether in package stores or bars and lounges, buy directly from the distillers and brewers, instead of through the wholesalers, as long as they pay the state tax on the merchandise they bring in.


This, he implied, was the only way to break what he sees as a stranglehold by the 10 firms which are licensed to wholesale booze on the liquor business in the state. He didn't say so, but Dunn obviously believes these firms, which he sees as a "family," are bulwarking the efforts to stop any change in liquor legislation.

It's a complex subject, as you can tell if you follow the fast-breaking daily news on the topic. What is likely to come out of this session probably won't get to the heart of the matter. (In the closing days, the major activity is

trading off one bill for another, not creating a whole new approach to problems.)

Those who have some grasp on the subject, which the state Liquor Control Director describes as a "can of worms," think the only way to accomplish major change is to do what Senator C. B. Trujillo suggests: spend two years preparing to discuss the matter. And, the smart folks here add, you'd probably better take up liquor laws then only at a special session, when the Legislature has nothing else to divert its attention.


